Red River County Hay Show Planned

At the February meeting of the Agricultural Improvement Association, a decision was made to survey Red River County hay producers to determine if there is enough interest to conduct a hay show at the 1981 Red River County Fair.

Hay entries will be analyzed for protein and total digestible nutrients. A

hay production educational meeting is also planned.

Specific rules and regulations will be made available at a later date when sufficient interest justifies a hay show. Contact any A.I.A. member or the County Extension Office if you would like to participate in a hay show at this year's fair.

Gardening Made Easy

Eighty degree temperatures have put a rush on new growth - plants are far ahead of normal progress.

Hurry to finish dormant oil spraying on peach, plum and apricot this week. Apples and pears will stay dormant longer so you have a bit more time to spray them. Remember that this early spray schedule will make or break the crop you expect to be picking this summer. The next step is a combination insecticide - fungicide spray as the buds show color and after most of the petals drop. Don't spray during full bloom as this will kill bees that set the crop. Feed 10-20-10 to fruit trees at the same time as spraying and that should take care of nutrition for the season. Young trees can be fed lightly once a month all summer to get heavy growth and earlier bearing.

Keep planting bare root trees and shrubs-fruit and pecan trees usually come this way and need to go out first. Container plants can be set out all summer if kept watered. Roses can be set out now as bare root, but need to be covered with soil until they root out. Or you can buy them growing in containers after they have sprouted out in a few weeks. Packaged roses covered with wax are a poor investment as the roots dry in the packing material and usually the plants have frozen outside or have been forced into growth too early inside a warm store. Fruit trees get the same treatment and usually packaged trees have only a 50-50 chance of survival. Try to get this planting done while the soil is dry. Soon the monsoons will hit again and wet soil is not easy to work. Don't fertilize bare root plants until they are well into growth sometime in May, and then lightly once a month. Use peatmoss in planing to hold the moisture-fertilizer isn't needed until the plant regrows roots and has leaves to manufacture carbohydrates.

If you like strawberries (and who doesn't), it's also planting time for these. Tioga has proven to be the best variety for this area as

it is heat resistant and prolific in production of exceptional sweet fruit. It is also the longest producing variety.

Stocking Program To Be Conducted

The Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District will conduct a fish-pond stocking program again this year. The district conducts the program as a service to area landowner.

Pond owners may present their orders with pre-payment at the Soil Conservation Service office. The office is located in the basement of the postoffice in

Clarksville. While placing an order, SCS personnel can furnish assistance on stocking rates, fish available, feeding and other information helpful to making a good fishpond.

Arrangements will be made with private supplier to furnish the fish taht are on order. Delivery date is tentatively set for April 16. Pond owners with orders will be notified as to date, time

and location to receive their fish. The small fish may be placed in oxygen bags to transport to the owner's pond. One oxygen bag is furnished free with additional bags costing \$2.00 each.

Channel catfish, 4 to 6 inches long are 25 cents each. Redear Bream are also 25 cents and fathead minnows cost \$5.50 per pound. Fathead minnows are recommended as forage for catfish. However, a pond or lake should have some brush or woody material for the minnows to raise and replenish themselves.

Local pondowners received about 10,100 catfish and fifty pounds of minnows through the district's program last year. Many pond owners have reported good growth on their catfish. Another big order is expected this year.

Rebates Total \$37.9 Million For March

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said rebates of the optional one-percent sales tax this month total \$37.9 million.

The March payments will raise 1981 payments to date to more than \$162.5 million, up \$23.8 million over the first quarter last year.

Houston's check this month is \$8 million for a yearly total through March of \$32.9 million, a 20 percent increase over the 1980 first quarter.

Locally, Bogata received a check for \$628.48, totaling payments of \$5,254.51 to date for an 11 percent increase over the same period last year.

Bullock said most cities received smaller payments this month compared to March of last year because

of a change in the agency's accounting period and processing timetable but that generally 1981 payments to cities are running well ahead of the 1980 rebates for the first three months.

The city sales tax is collected along with the state tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly to the cities in which the tax is collected by the Comptroller.

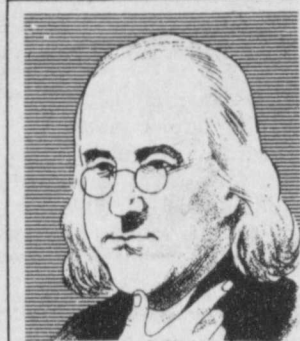

When the crops were "Laid By" and the farmers got all caught up with their spring and summer work the men of the community would gather at a small church or maybe a pasture and they would put up an arbor of brush and then hire or invite a preacher to come into the area and hold a revival. Now those revivals used to last for one or two weeks!

Folks would come from miles around in their wagons, on foot or horse back.

It was always one of the highlights of the year, and was a break in the hard work as well as a chance to hear someone new preach.

There weren't many churches in the country, and folks couldn't always get into town every Sunday, since both they and the mules needed rest.

Every evening about dusk the people would begin assembling for the night of visiting and preaching.

The small children would run and play until time to sit in the brush arbor for the services. The services would start and all was quiet except for the preacher and the little kids when they got sleepy. So some of the elders would take them out to the wagon and put them to sleep on pallets. You never woke them up until you got them home.

One time the older boys got the idea that it would be funny to switch kids from wagon to wagon, and when folks got home they found they had the wrong younguns! They had to go back and forth until they got them all straightened out.

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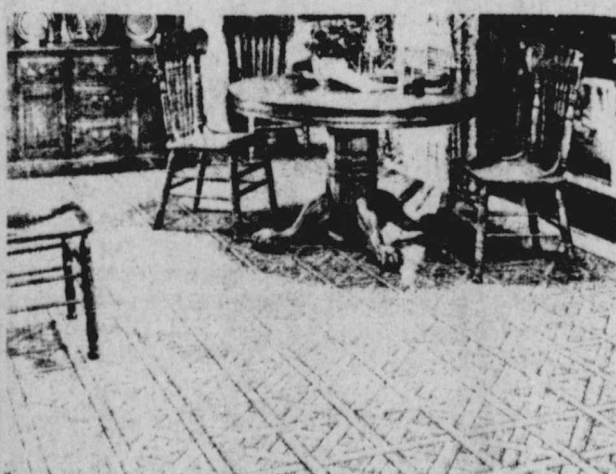
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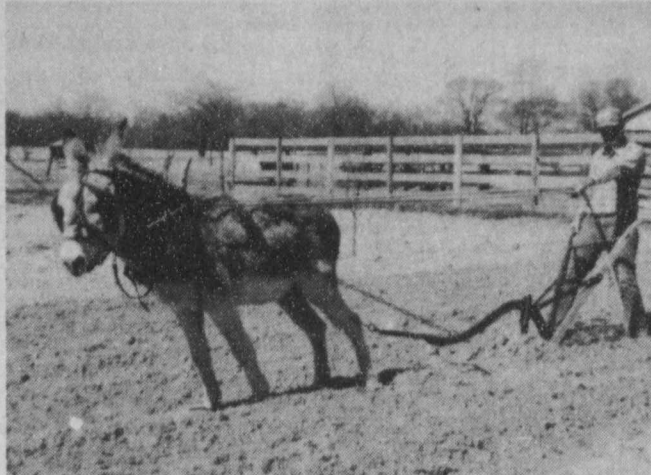
