In addition to putting the Christmas lights in place, the members of the fire department assumed the task of making up the light stringers, some of which are shown draped over the read end of the fire truck.

Soil Sampling Demonstration Planned at Hart

A soil sampling demonstration will be held at Hart Monday, December 8, at 2:00 p. m. The demonstration will be conducted by Ed McLeroy, Castro County Agricultural Agent, on the Harvey Davis farm two miles north and one mile east of the Hill store.

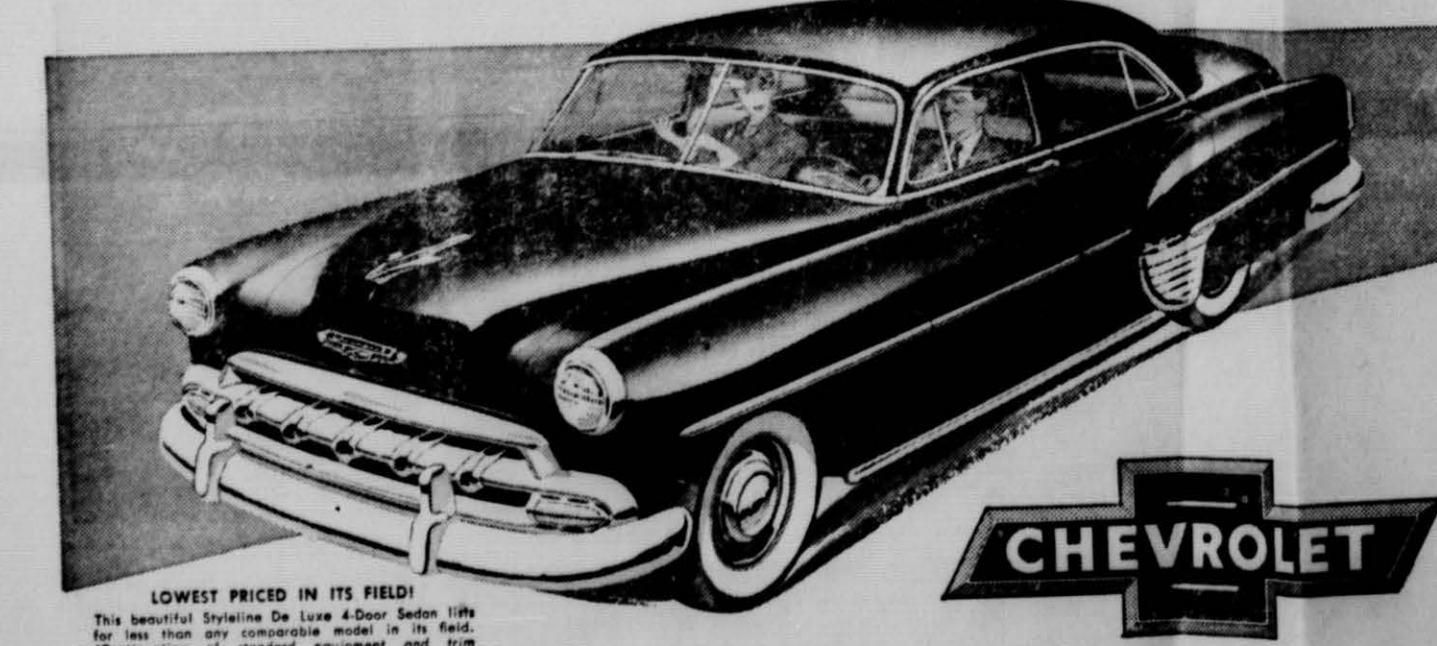

Fruit Cake The Cake-Mix Way!

Cake-Mix Fruit Cake

4 cups raisins
Combine cake mix, one egg, water, salt and flavoring and beat until smooth, about 2 minutes. Add the remaining 2 eggs, one at a time, and beat well after each addition. Total mixing time in second step—at least 2 minutes.
Fruit Mixture
1 lb. whole pecans or walnuts
1 lb. whole raisins
1 cup water
2 level teaspoons salt
2 lemons
Combine nuts, fruit and flour and blend into the cake batter. Pour into a 10-inch tube pan, two loaf pans (4x8) or 5 one-pound coffee cans. Bake at 350° F. for 1 hour and 15 minutes. Cool in pan for 10 minutes. Turn out and slice. Total baking time in second step—at least 2 minutes.

IT'S THE LAW

Historians often amuse themselves by trying to list the ten most important inventions of all times. They invite us to pay tribute to the unknown geniuses who invented ways of using fire, the lever, the wheel, and many other such useful things.
But great and useful as the material inventions have been, there is yet another class of useful ideas and devices which have served mankind and without which we would have lost much of the benefits of our material discoveries.
One of the most simple and remarkable ideas in this class is the idea of a contract. Possibly extending back into prehistoric times, the idea in its simple outlines is found in one form or another in the earliest recorded writings of man.
The application of the concept has grown and changed to meet the conditions of every age.
A central idea of a contract has always remained simple.
What is the basic idea of a contract? Simply, two or more persons are willing to bind each other to play some specific part in the accomplishment of a task, or some which is mutually agreed to be desirable, each party expecting to gain some benefit from the transaction. The very simplicity of this idea, and its almost universal applicability to the affairs of men, is its great merit.
Contracts make possible most of the things we undertake in modern life. Practically without exception we carry out our daily work under the terms of some contract. We are able to plan ahead because of the assurance that our contracts will be enforceable at law if need be.
Every person who rents, leases or buys a home—everyone who buys a car, washing machine, groceries or almost any other thing or service—is doing so under some contract, written, spoken or understood.
Even marriage is a contract. And most of the personal and real property owned in Texas is owned under the law of contract, property which arises out of the marriage contract and its implied and expressed obligations and rights.
Workers and employers produce the good of our economic life under some form of contract. The trains, trucks and planes which carry those goods are governed by contract. The Federal Government makes contracts with the several states, with business men with the states, with individuals and groups. Your insurance policy is a contract. Your train, bus or plane ticket is a contract.
Obviously, a device which we use so frequently cannot always be handled with a great amount of ceremony and red tape. There simply isn't time for extended formalities upon every occasion in which a contract comes into being.
Yet, to many people, the mere mention of the word "contract" brings visions of lengthy documents, written in legal terms of many syllables, and executed with elaborate ceremony.
While this picture does not apply to the great majority of situations, contracts should not be taken lightly in spite of their frequent and informal use. For, by law, we must live up to our end of each such bargain.
The main thing each of us needs to know is when our words and actions will serve to create a contract. Knowing this, we are in a position to weigh and determine the advisability of going ahead.
We can consider our ability to go through with all of the obligations imposed upon us by the prospective contract and ponder the consequences of possible inability to meet these obligations.

Chicago were awarded four Texas 4-H Club members for superior achievement in the 1952 National Clothing, Farm and Home Safety, Girls' Record and Tractor Maintenance programs. The state winners and summaries of their achievements follow: Elvera Durksen, Donald Bayer, Julia Kirby, Delbert Davidson.

Top in the Girls' Record program for Texas, Elvera Durksen, 16, of Plainview, will compare notes with other top home-makers at the Chicago 4-H Club Congress. As guest of Montgomery Ward, she will join record-making girls from all parts of the country for good times, exciting experiences, and serious discussions. Sound planning and plain hard work, during six years in 4-H, was Elvera's successful formula. She completed 33 projects including food preparation, gardening, poultry, home improvement and electricity. Elvera is especially fond of sewing and food projects, which she has carried for six years. She has made 108 garments, prepared 585 meals and 575 dishes, frozen 360 quarts of fruits and vegetables and 158 chickens, and canned 200 quarts of vegetables. Her demonstrations on dairy foods, of which she has given 28, have won many blue ribbons.

Donald Bayer, 17, of Muenster, has accomplished noteworthy results in the 4-H Farm and Home Safety program, for which he received the General Motors trip award to the Chicago Club Congress. By means of surveys, demonstrations and other aids, he has helped to make his community more safety conscious, locating and correcting 40 safety hazards. Donald began with a survey of his own farmstead where he built a shield for the electric milk, checked the electric key haler, lengthened the sewer line and buried it with the correct slope and drainage, taped bare areas on all wiring, labeled gas and kerosene cans, and cleared the yard of refuse. During National Farm Safety Week, Donald arranged two safety displays in Muenster and neighborhood. All these programs are conducted under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service.

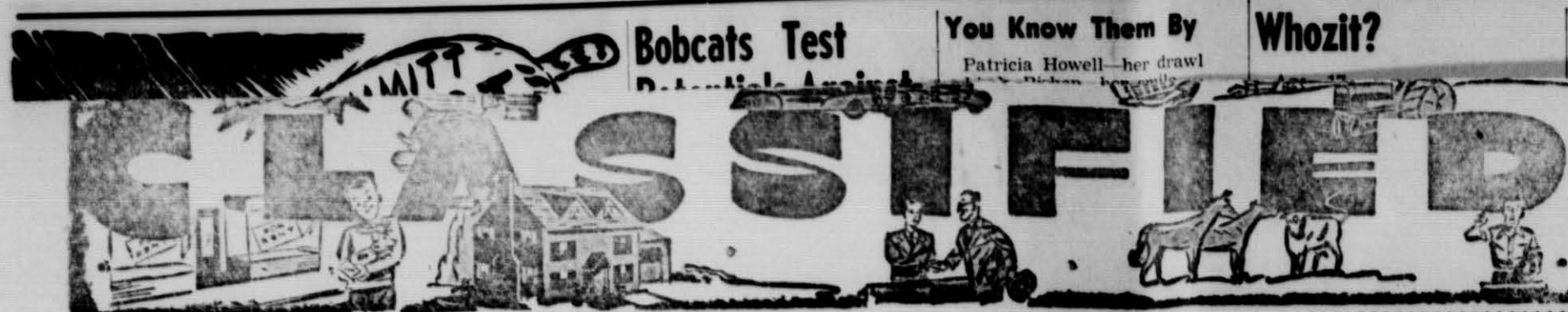

Corned Beef Dinner

"Beefed" Corned Beef Dinner

(Makes 6-8 Servings)

4 pounds corned beef brisket
6-8 small potatoes

In a large kettle, place corned beef. Cover with cold water. Allow 45-50 minutes a pound, simmer slowly 2 hours, or until beef is tender. Do not boil. About 30 minutes before meat is done, add washed unpeeled potatoes. Continue to cook over low heat until potatoes are tender. Serve with sauerkraut heated separately with a few caraway seeds.

Sports Afield

Here's good news for bird hunters. The chukar partridge after many long and disappointing experiments, now suddenly looms as a great white hope over immense stretches of our submarginal western land, much of which is worthless for everything except hunting. There is even a mild hope that he may eventually come through in a good part of the United States and southern Canada, according to outdoor writer Byron Dalrymple.

The chukar was first introduced in California in the late 20's; then Oregon tried them; Washington, Nevada, Nebraska and North Dakota came in with some success. The eastern states heard of these experiments and they started raising chukars. Before long, practically every state in the Union was working with the bird.

But early hopes and successes were swiftly dashed. The chukar began vanishing just about as fast as the game mer could raise and stock him. Outdoor writers began to clamor for an end to such nonsense as chukar raising.

What a waste of funds! And then when new hunting books were mentioning the chukar with little more than a line saying it had failed miserably and expensively, a most embarrassing thing happened. The chukar did an about-face and put everyone on a hot spot.

Washington woke up one fine day to discover that she had an estimated several hundred thousand chukars living in rugged back-country canyons, and increasing crazily. In Nye County, Nevada, which probably has the largest chukar population of any comparable area in the country today, the state game commission was able to trap for replanting over a thousand birds as fast as a single rugged canyon! In parts of the West the vanished birds were back in force. Nobody knew just why, or how, but there they were. Other states have also been doing a double take.

What appears to be happening is that a new race of American chukars has been slowly building itself up in the West, a race forged in the hard going of a new land which all but did in its stocked ancestors. This seems especially evident when current stocking methods are considered. Pen-reared stock, still used to some extent, is not very successful in planting. But when the "native" birds are trapped and transplanted, they do fine.

The chukar is now being talked of in many sportsmen's circles as possibly being the savior of deteriorating wing shooting. Game men won't go that far, but they are mighty happy and quietly optimistic, just the same.

Carbon Monoxide Dangerous Poison

"You can't see it... you can't smell it... you can't taste it and yet it can kill you!" said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer referring to carbon monoxide. A silent enemy, it strikes its victims in closed rooms, garages and cars where wood, coal, gasoline, or natural gas is burning.

Some victims of this silent poison never knew their life was in danger. As others died, they may have realized that the killer was at hand, but were helpless to do anything about it. They were so benumbed that they could not get out into the fresh air; they could not walk or even stand up. Those who escape death, once this silent killer permeates a closed room, garage or automobile, are rescued by someone who discovers their plight.

Carbon monoxide is given off when wood, coal, gasoline or natural gas is burning, but not all the gas is burned. Its danger is greatest in cold weather because people tend to close their houses and cut the tight that no fresh air can circulate. When this happens, carbon monoxide accumulates to a dangerous concentration. It kills because it prevents the victims from getting enough oxygen.

To help prevent such deaths all stoves should be vented, kept heated rooms ventilated, do not leave heaters burning while you and your family are asleep, do not close all the windows in your car and do not run your car in a closed garage.

Whether your stoves, heaters and your car serve you and your family usefully, capably and safely, or whether they become agencies of death depend upon how wisely you use them. Remember, ventilate at all times.
