EIGHT DEAD IN OKLAHOMA TORNADO

BLAIR HARDEST HIT; PROPERTY DAMAGE GREAT

THIRTEEN FEARED DEAD AS RESCUE WORK IN ZONE IS STARTED

BLAIR, Okla., June 18.—Persons believed dead of a tornado that struck southwestern Oklahoma Saturday night, Jackson, Oklahoma, and Tillman counties Sunday administering aid to those who had suffered minor injuries and the devastated area for further dead or injured.

The town of Blair, Okla., was the hardest hit today on the ground. The three dead—Elmer Smith, 12, L. C. Cann, 10, and a woman, 10, are in the city hospital at Tulsa, suffering from a broken back. His recovery is considered doubtful.

Three negroes were reported killed in a bridge near Headrick, Okla., but confirmation is not yet obtained.

Kiowa man killed. The Rice, formerly of Kiowa county, was reported killed.

The fog of Blair and E. A. Smith of Headrick both were in hospital at Tulsa, suffering from a broken back, but are expected to recover.

C. McHanna, Headrick postmaster, sustained a broken arm in the wind threw him violently to the ground.

Several parties checking the devastated area were amazed at the loss of life. Over the forty mile area, from three to five acres of trees were uprooted, and barns flattened and a spilted remained standing.

Highway bridges in the area were badly damaged. Traffic was at a standstill. Communications are non-existent.

Friendship Lands On British Coast Completing Trans-Atlantic Flight

MISS EARHART IS FIRST WOMAN TO COMPLETE TRIP OVER OCEAN

LONDON, June 18.—The trans-Atlantic monoplane Friendship, carrying the first woman ever to span the Atlantic by air, landed at Barry Port, Wales, at 12:40 p. m. today, just 20 hours and 49 minutes after taking off from Trepassey, Newfoundland.

Come Aboard in Boat. Amelia Earhart, Boston social worker and co-pilot of the plane, came ashore with her companions in a motor boat which set out immediately from the coast guard station.

The crew of the Friendship, which included Louis Gordon, mechanic, was in the best of spirits and looked none the worse for their 21 hour flight across the almost 2,000 miles stretch between Newfoundland and Great Britain.

Although the plane settled down off a swampy region some distance from the little town of Barry Port, which had never dreamed of its arrival, it was not long before hundreds of spectators were on the scene.

Given Great Reception. The plane, on foot and by motor, rushed to the port and the nearby city of Llandrilly and gave the aviators a great reception.

In the confusion of news from Barry Port, reports were received in London that there had been four passengers on the plane, including Lincoln Ellsworth, the American explorer. Advice from New York, however, definitely stated that Mr. Ellsworth was in that city.

The fliers were in the best of spirits as they landed. Stultz told the Associated Press that the plane had been forced to land because of a shortage of fuel. He said had weather and a heavy mist accompanied the ship the greater part of the journey while rain was almost incessant.

Plane Is Refueled. Stultz immediately made preparations to obtain fresh supplies of gasoline to proceed to Bristol as soon as possible.

The London newspapers this afternoon were still publishing reports that four persons were aboard the plane including Ellsworth, but this apparently was incorrect. Ellsworth, at least definitely if there were four passengers, and if so who was the fourth, were hindered by the difficulty of communications with Barry Port and the confusion attendant upon the arrival of the trans-Atlantic plane at that little place.

Three Women Killed. Three women have lost their lives in previously attempted trans-Atlantic flights and the only one attempting it who was not lost, Ruth, as soon as possible.

PLANS HELD UP FOR COLUMBIA

SERIOUS DISSENSION IN CAMP REPORTED IN NEWFOUNDLAND

(By Associated Press) HARBOR GRACE, N. F., June 18.—The monoplane Columbia stood idle here today, the plans of its crew unsettled, as word was received of the safe arrival of its rival, the Friendship, on the other side of the Atlantic.

Miss Mabel Boll, who had hoped to be the first woman to make the trans-Atlantic flight was not about when the news of the success of Miss Amelia Earhart and her companions, Wilmer Stultz and Louis Gordon, was flashed to Harbor Grace. Captain Oliver Le Bouthillier, co-pilot with Captain Arthur Argles, received the news.

Glad For Success. "I'm mighty glad that Bill Stultz and his friends are safe," he said. He admitted that he was disappointed at not having risked a take-off yesterday when the Friendship made the hop from Trepassey and he made little effort to conceal his regret.

Weather conditions here were much improved today and the pilots indicated that the next step in their plans would depend upon Miss Boll. Her decision was expected later in the day.

There were reports of serious dissension in the Columbia camp here with Miss Boll depicted as far from satisfied with judgment of her pilot, Capt. Oliver Le Bouthillier.

Said Cirling Coast. Le Bouthillier had expressed the opinion a few hours after Miss Earhart's departure that the Friendship was only circling the coast to study weather conditions and asserted the Columbia "would not be drawn out." Later when it became apparent that the other ship was off in earnest, Miss Boll said, "I just can't imagine Bill Stultz taking such a foolhardy jump with a three corner gale racing in the Atlantic. I wish them luck but I think twenty hours fuel is not sufficient to carry them across."

TRIAL SET FOR FIVE ACCUSED

BANK ROBBERY PROBE ENDS IN ARREST OF KANSAS CITY GANG

(By Associated Press) KANSAS CITY, June 18.—Preliminary hearing was demanded and set for Friday when five persons charged with the murder of James H. (Happy) Smith, patrolman, in the Home Trust company robbery last Wednesday were taken before Judge A. S. Lyon in circuit court today.

The persons charged are Tony (Lollypop) Mangiarino, Carl Nappello, John Messino, driver of the bandit car, and Maurice Nagle and his wife, owners of the car.

Efforts were being made by police to determine whether any of the home trust bandits were connected with the recent bank robbery in Lamar, Colo., which cost the lives of four persons. Photographs of the known members of the gang have been sent to Colorado officers.

Court Dismissed As Aid To Farmer

"Things at home" were rated as more important than court matters by Judge Homer Pharr in the 72nd district court this afternoon as he dismissed his jurors, most of whom were farmers, for the week. Criminal cases were scheduled to be tried in the court.

Pressing needs of their crops were presented as excuses by the jurors present, their excuses being justified by Judge Pharr who soon dismissed the group.

NEGRO CHOKES GIRL TO DEATH THEN SUICIDES

TWO BODIES FOUND IN DOCTOR'S OFFICE IN PHILADELPHIA

PHILADELPHIA, June 18.—Responding to a telephone call in answer to her advertisement for a position as maid, Mary McGinty, 23, was choked to death in a physician's office here by the doctor's negro chauffeur-Butler, who was alone in the house. In the kitchen of the home the negro, Clarence Tull, 25, was found dead from illuminating gas. At his side lay a razor.

The tragedy was discovered today by the son of Dr. William B. G. Terry in West Philadelphia, who had returned home from his father's farm near Pemberton, N. J., where the family had spent the week end.

Negro Leaves Note. Near the negro was a note addressed to "good mother and sister" in which it was stated that he had nothing to live for and asked that his body be buried.

Miss McGinty boarded with her three sisters in west Philadelphia. About 8 o'clock last night she received a telephone message to call at the office of the physician it being represented he was in need of a maid. The young woman immediately left for the doctor's home and was not heard from again.

City Plan Expert Coming This Month

John E. It was learned here today. The date of Mr. Surratt's appearance will be decided upon this week.

He is to appear in a joint meeting of the Rotary and Kiwanis clubs, while here according to the present plans, and in the afternoon in a round table discussion of a number of civic leaders. That night he is scheduled to give a stereopticon lecture on city planning before a mass meeting of Lubbock people.

Plans for his appearance here will be completed this week, it was said.

Littlefield Paving Work To Start Soon

LITTLEFIELD, June 18.—The machinery for paving the streets of Littlefield was unloaded here Saturday and actual work of paving will start now within the next few days. A new parking system has been inaugurated which will greatly relieve the congested conditions, which have existed here on Main street for the past several months.

Work on the dormitories of Littlefield college is progressing nicely; crop conditions in this section are excellent, and conditions generally are excellent.

Rotary Convention Will Open Tonight

MINNEAPOLIS, June 18.—(P)—Most of the world has sent delegates to the 19th annual convention of Rotary International, which opened a week's session today. More than 5,000 delegates already have registered, and President Arthur S. Sapp of Huntington, Ind., predicted 12,000 registrations before the books are closed. The convention will open tonight when James Hamilton Lewis, former senator of Illinois, will address the Rotarians.

BREAKS RECORD

Haynie Flies To WTCC Convention In Quick Time

(Special To The Journal) FORT WORTH, June 18.—Bob Haynie, Abilene, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, still holds the airplane speed record between his home city and Fort Worth.

Haynie first grabbed it off last February when, as a passenger in a Hiss-motored Travelair piloted by L. E. DeLong of West Texas Air Transport, he flew from Fort Worth to Abilene in one hour 11 minutes. Today, in the Ryan brougham powered with a Wright Whirlwind motor, with Tom Hardin at the stick and two girls as fellow passengers, Haynie rode from Abilene to Fort Worth in one hour 10 minutes, lowering his former record by one minute. A stiff quarter tail wind helped the ship along.

The two girls were Miss Mabel Gouldy, reporter of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, and Miss West Texas whose identity we aren't yet permitted to divulge. The Ryan was sent to Abilene by Temple Bowen, president of Texas Air Transport, to bring Haynie and Miss West Texas to the Fort Worth convention; and Miss Gouldy was taken along to interview Miss West Texas in route.

Tom Hardin is T. A. E.'s chief pilot. It took him two hours and over to fly from here to Abilene, against a head wind, but coming back everything was in his favor. Hopping off from Kinsolving Airport, Abilene, at 9:45 a. m., the ship dropped down on its home field here at 10:55. Haynie and Miss West Texas jumped into a waiting automobile and were borne to the Texas and Pacific passenger station in time to greet the delegation arriving on the Sunshine Special.

STATE FIGHTS PREYING FISH

ELECTRICITY WILL BE USED IN EFFORT TO HALT DEPREDACTIONS

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, June 18.—Destruction of predatory fish through use of electricity will be tried again by the state game, fish and oyster department, after one successful experiment, it was announced Monday at the department.

Fish were brought to the surface near Del Rio in an unconscious condition by an electric current discharged in the water in the first experiment. The floating fish were gathered into a boat, suckers were dumped on the shore, and the bass and perch returned to the water where they soon regained self control and swam away. Not a fish was killed by the current, which ranged in voltage from 330 to 440.

Reports From Germany. The experiment was made as the result of published reports that engineers in Germany had successfully cleared ponds of predatory or otherwise undesirable fish by this method.

Another trout is to be made in Devils river where game of great size are working havoc with the fish population. Engineers believe that gas and snakes can be brought to the surface with a degree of voltage not injurious to game fish.

Youths Found Dead Believed Suicides

WAUSAU, Wis., June 18.—(P)—The bodies of Charles Morrison, 21, of Weston, four miles east of here, and Verna Tietz, 19, Wausau, were found a quarter of a mile from his home late Sunday. The girl had been shot twice and the boy once. Sheriff Arthur Stewart is investigating the probability of a suicide pact in which Morrison shot his sweetheart and then turned the gun on himself.

WATER RIGHTS PROTECTION ALSO DISCUSSED IN ANNUAL ADDRESS OPENING MEETING

(By The Associated Press)

FORT WORTH, June 18.—An aviation committee to encourage building of airports in the principal cities of West Texas and a legislative committee to work for protection of water rights were urged by R. W. Haynie, president, in his annual address today at the opening session of the tenth annual convention of the West Texas chamber of commerce.

More than 10,000 visitors were here and trains were bringing in additional crowds while automobiles and airplanes were arriving with more delegates. Scores of colorful bands paraded the streets and gave concerts in hotel lobbies and newspaper offices.

R. E. Harding, president of the Fort Worth Association of commerce brought to order a cheering throng of delegates and visitors as the organization representing the largest section of the state met for business and a three-day frolic.

"Texas, our Texas," chosen as the opening song for the session, was led by Sam S. Losh, accompanied by the Southwest Gold Medal band immediately after the invocation was spoken by Rev. J. K. Thompson, pastor of the First Presbyterian church.

Delegates were welcomed by Mayor William Bryce, the response being by R. E. Thompson, mayor of El Paso. At 10 a. m., president Haynie was presented to the convention by Armon G. Carter, chairman of the general arrangements committee. He immediately launched into the president's annual address.

Massed Band Concert. Two of the principal features of the session were reeled off before hundreds of visitors before the convention was opened. They were the massed band concert on the T. and P. reservation in which all visiting bands participated under direction of Colonel E. D. Irons, North Texas Agricultural college and the aviation formation and review at the municipal airport on the Decatur road.

Sunday, thought not formally dedicated to the convention, was perhaps the best day for delegates and visitors, as well as seen in the three formal sessions Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

Miss West Texas, whose identity will not be disclosed until her coronation at Texas Christian University tomorrow, arrived by a magnificent passenger, arrived by airplane with President Haynie.

Dr. P. C. Coleman of Colorado, prominent factor in the West Texas chamber of commerce since its organization ten years ago, and a candidate for the position of the body, arrived early.

Known For Tech Work. Coleman was among those who assisted in forming the body, but is known principally for his activity in the campaign for establishment.

Old Time Style

Several of the coaches dated back to the days of the old Butterfield stage line. A special train will bring north Texas and eastern delegates today.

MOVE ON HOUSTON IS UNDERWAY AS MEET IS ONE WEEK OFF

(By Associated Press) HOUSTON, June 18.—Leaders of the Democratic party were moving toward Houston today, where a week hence, they will be called upon to settle numerous issues and select candidates at the national convention.

Among other things, Clem Shaver, chairman of the democratic executive committee, who has been in Houston for a week approving arrangements for the convention, expected an invasion of farmers who were denied admittance to the republican convention at Kansas City.

By Their Hair You Can Know 'Em



The single ornament worn in the hair of the Chinese woman on the left tells at a glance that she is not prosperous. The other woman, wife of a wealthy merchant, wears a jeweled bandeau, pearl, jade and ivory flowers.

NEW YORK, June 18.—Famine in interior China has struck thousands of Chinese women in the head.

For, in times of peace and prosperity, a Chinese husband makes his wife's hair the family exchequer. Every extra tael, equal to \$1.30 in Mexican money, goes into an ornament for the sleek, black locks of the first lady of his household.

It is not necessary that he loves his wife more, but that he fears losing his savings less when they are in the form of negotiable ornaments. For there are no savings banks in the interior.

Barometer of Prosperity By the long silver hairpins, the golden butterflies, the filigreed flowers carved ivory bits, studded caps, bandeaux with jewels embedded in them, jade geegaws and so on, one could tell a family's prosperity.

Now, not a head is left with even a single ornament for vast areas in the famine district, according to J. Earl Baker, former railroad official for the Chinese government, now returned, after 10 years in the interior, to work for the China Famine Relief.

"No barbaric princess ever decked her head more gorgeously than the Chinese women did a few years ago," he said. "One of our Christmas trees would look dingy in comparison with the wives of some of the prosperous Chinese men. Even the poorest farmer would have been decked indeed whose wife could not boast one little gold tassel or jade spear. For in that geegaw lay home of food for the children when the wolf growled at the door."

"The fluctuation of paper money, together with the fact that buried silver runs a chance of being stolen gave rise to this custom of putting savings into some valuable thing that can be exchanged."

"Now it is heartbreaking to go miles and see not a single decoration. One by one they have gone for food for the family. For Chinese love their children with tremendous devotion."

Shantung province has scarcely one hair ornament in its whole length and breadth. Even the well-to-do families have given up their savings. Their homes have been robbed of the objects that they saved to bury in the ancestral graves. They are destitute as we can not imagine anyone's being destitute.

"They are leaving their babies by the wayside in the hope that some foreigner will pick them up and care for them," Mr. Baker said. "The mothers can not feed them. Some fathers are selling their children into the mills and sing-song houses because they hear they could get food and live there."

"It looks as if it will be many years," he continued, "before the water lilies in carved ivory, the miniature temples, war weapons, and symbolic pins of jade and gold would reappear in the shiny black hair of the women."

"The first ornaments that do appear will mean far more than mere decoration. They will mean that the interior of China again has hope of life and happiness."

BAPTIST PASTOR LEADS LESSON SUNDAY ON CRUCIFIXION

The attendance at the Down Town Bible class at the Palace theater continues to hold up in spite of vacation and the inviting diversions that tend to draw men out of town for week ends. About ninety men were present Sunday morning to hear the lesson on the "Crucifixion." Dr. W. R. White is proving to be a most acceptable speaker for this type of class in that he covers the lesson in about twenty minutes. Sunday he said in part:

"The cross was the most shameful form of death and execution. No Roman citizen could be executed on a cross even though he committed the vilest of crimes. To impress the people with a show of guilt which evidence had not been established they placed the Master between two thieves."

The manner in which Jesus died needs an extraordinary impression on the witnesses. One of them was a thief, a confirmed criminal; the other was a hardened Roman soldier. The thieves joined in the decision of the multitude but one of them was so impressed with Jesus that he decided that their fellow sufferer was not a criminal but a king to whom he could trust his destiny. There was something about the dying Lord that made the thief believe that He was master of death who would come into a kingdom. The Roman soldier was accustomed to executions. Something about the man in the middle made him exclaim: "Surely this man is the son of God."

"They said, 'He saved others, himself He cannot save.' The hands that touched the fevered brow, that raised the son of the widow of Nain are limp now; the eyes that looked with forgiving kindness at erring Peter are glassy now. The voice that had called Lazarus from the chambers of death and had spoken forgiveness to the trembling woman of the street, is strangely silent. Those feet that had gone on so many errands of unselfish mercy are nailed to the cross now. The Rose of Sharon is faded, the Lily of the Valley is withered, the myrtle is in eclipse. The Rock of Ages is crumbling. By not saving himself He becomes the savior of others."

GOLD MEDAL BAND OF SWEETWATER DECIDES TO ATTEND MEET

(Special To The Journal)
FORT WORTH, June 18.—The West Texas Chamber of Commerce will "carry on" through this convention because Luther Gordon, if he were living, would wish it so.

Gordon, first clarinet, is dead. He died Saturday night at 11:30 at Alpine, six days after he had been treated in Sul Ross State Teachers college. He had left Sweetwater the Sunday preceding, is thought to have caught a severe cold on the trail en route to Alpine, and became ill Wednesday. His condition became swiftly critical.

But Saturday night, Jack Armstrong, director, talked matters over with his bandmen, and they decided to "carry on" for Gordon's sake. So they came here over the Texas and Pacific today with Monte Owen, Band of City Development secretary, and a delegation of fifty.

The Sweetwater bandmen were met at the station by the Stamford band, Dick Rowland, director, and escorted uptown through flag-decorated streets in which the official W. T. C. C. flag, red and blue, with the rising sun emblem, was much in evidence. At today's opening session of the big convention, the Gold Medal band will sound taps for its departed member.

Three Students In Tech Seek Masters
Three students of Texas Technological college are completing arrangements for their master of arts degrees this summer, officials of the college state. They are W. I. Wilkins, superintendent of the El Paso schools; R. W. Matthews, principal of the Lubbock schools; and H. B. Carroll, of Lubbock.

Matthews is majoring in education, Wilkins in sociology and Carroll in history. Each are preparing interesting theses, it was said. Matthews is writing of a phase of the Lubbock schools, Carroll is collecting information regarding the history of West Texas from 1875 to 1900, while Wilkins is said to be writing on the pathology of the Plains.

Burning Winds Do Slight Damage Here
The burning winds which swept the South Plains during the past three days did only slight damage to the cotton and other crops. D. F. Eaton, county agent, said today following the receipts of reports from over the section.

"The cotton is old enough in most cases, especially in Lubbock county, to get by the effects of the wind," he said. "Mr. Eaton said a number of slight losses due to the past three days blow were reported to him, however, he said."

which has driven a thousand families from their homes in southeast Missouri, a citizen army pushed its strength against a 600-foot levee, seven miles above the newest crevasse, and early today apparently had won a skirmish from the river.

The total area submerged by three crevasses in two days was approximately a hundred thousand acres. Damage to crops and farms was estimated between a million and a half and two million dollars.

Levee Being Bolstered
The present goal is to save a 25,000 acre expanse protected by the smaller levee, which has been bolstered several times since it was swept out by the 1927 floods. This section lies between "the Cotton" railroad tracks and Crowley's Ridge, west of Campt and just north of the Arkansas line. It is seven miles upstream from the crevasse which developed Sunday morning, inundating 75,000 acres.

O. S. Harrison, Dunklin county chairman of the Red Cross, called a committee meeting for today, after which rehabilitation steps will be taken for the homeless.

NEWPORT, Ark., June 18 (AP)—Heavy rains Saturday night and early Sunday checked the fall of the swollen White River, here and will keep it stationary for the next 24 hours but general improvement in the flood situation was reported today.

Red Cross workers went out in motor boats today to survey the region. Indications were that the approximately 1,000 refugees would be able to return to their homes by the latter part of the week.

Incinerarium Gets Joyland Fire Blame
Joyland auditorium, a dance hall southeast of the city which burned early Sunday morning, is thought to have been set afire, it was learned here this morning. A can which is believed to have contained gasoline was found near the charred ruins of the building, members of the sheriff's department said today.

The loss estimated at more than \$3,000 was partly covered by insurance. The hall was owned by J. Cline Moore of the Lubbock Inn. It was not learned whether any other structure will be erected.

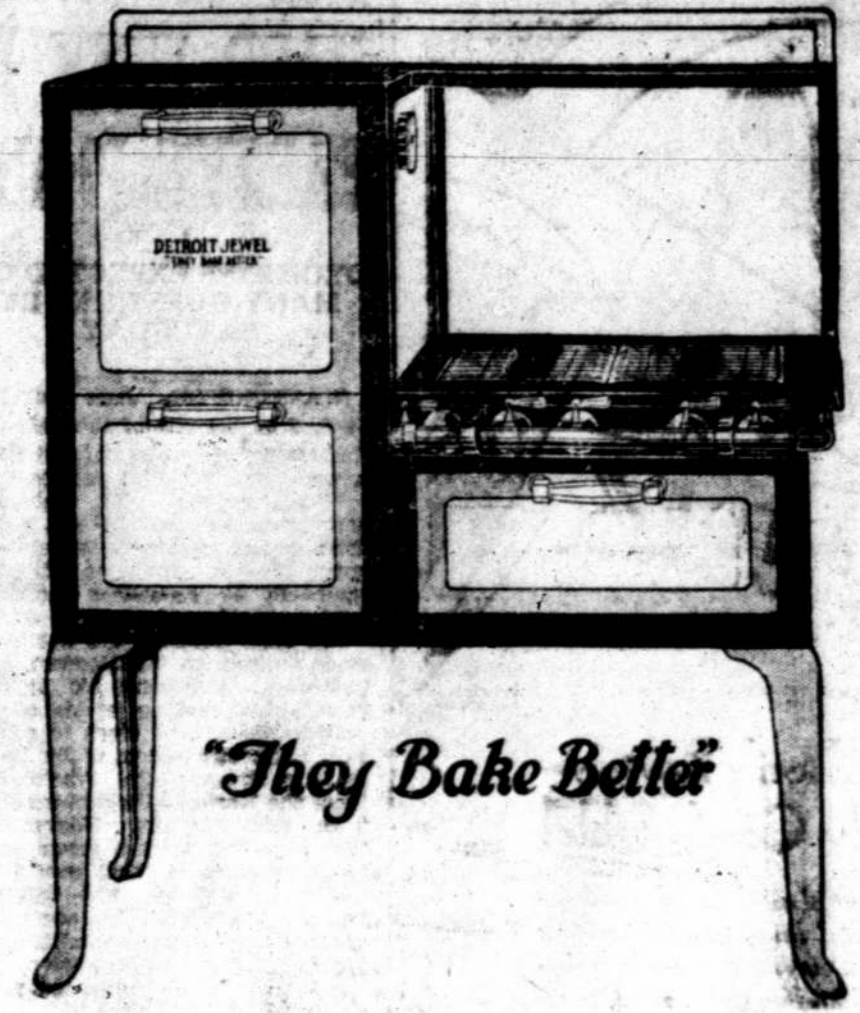

HOOVER FACES HARD WEEK IN PARTY'S PLANS

DECISIONS EXPECTED ON MANY QUESTIONS BY SATURDAY

WASHINGTON, June 18.—Refreshed by the rest of the Sabbath, Herbert Hoover today entered upon a week anticipated as replete with political activity. By Saturday night it is expected he will reach decisions on numerous points of importance in connection with his campaign as republican nominee for the presidency.

But these decisions are not to be made entirely on Mr. Hoover's own initiative. Following his avowed intention of seeking advice of his political friends, he plans to confer with numerous leaders of his party as they struggle into Washington from the Kansas City convention.

In addition, Mr. Hoover on Thursday will meet a group of 24 representatives of the republican national committee, who will expect him to indicate his choice for chairmanship of the committee. Mr. Hoover, too, is to lay before the committee his campaign plans, as evolved by that time.

In addition to this point, Mr. Hoover today faced the necessity of early decisions as to when he will resign from his position in the cabinet, a visit to President Coolidge at the summer white house in Wisconsin, the receipt of official notification of his nomination and various details of his campaign organization.

The belief was spread here that he may submit his resignation to President Coolidge in person and go from Wisconsin to his home in California, there to receive the committee from the convention which will notify him officially of his nomination.

COOLIDGE HAS NO SET PLANS FOR HIS WORK

BUTLER AND LENROOT TO CONFER WITH HIM IN VACATION HOME

SUPERIOR, Wis., June 18.—The first day of routine business at the White House executive offices opened today with no definite engagements on President Coolidge's books, but with informal plans to receive both William M. Butler, who resigned last week as chairman of the national republican committee, and Irving L. Lenroot, former senator from Wisconsin. Butler came here fresh from the Kansas City convention, and while it was said that his desire to see Mr. Coolidge had no special significance, it was generally supposed that he would give the chief executive a personal account of events at the republican convention.

Lenroot's purpose. Lenroot's wish to see President Coolidge was ascribed to a desire to ascertain what impression the summer White House, in whose transfer to Wisconsin this year the former senator had been so instrumental, had made on Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge.

Yesterday the president attended church in Brule, a hamlet six miles from Cedar Island lodge. Worshipping for the first time in Wisconsin, Mr. Coolidge chose the tiny white-washed church at Brule, at which a 69 year old blind lay minister for years has been preaching to a small congregation.

It was a great day for the little church and for the occasion it had been revarnished and decorated. The service itself, however, was unaltered from the simple ceremonial followed each Sunday. Sitting alone in a white pine pew, President Coolidge heard old favorite hymns sung with only a piano to lead the choir of four male voices to which, as the single concession to the occasion, a soprano from Superior had been added.

Blind Preacher Leads
John Taylor, the blind preacher, conducted the service. From memory he quoted twelve verses of the gospel as the day's lesson. Later, with strong voice and vigorous gestures, he delivered a sermon for which he took the same text as the lesson he had just recited: The twenty first chapter of the gospel according to St. John where the second appearance of Christ to the disciples by the lake of Tiberias is related.

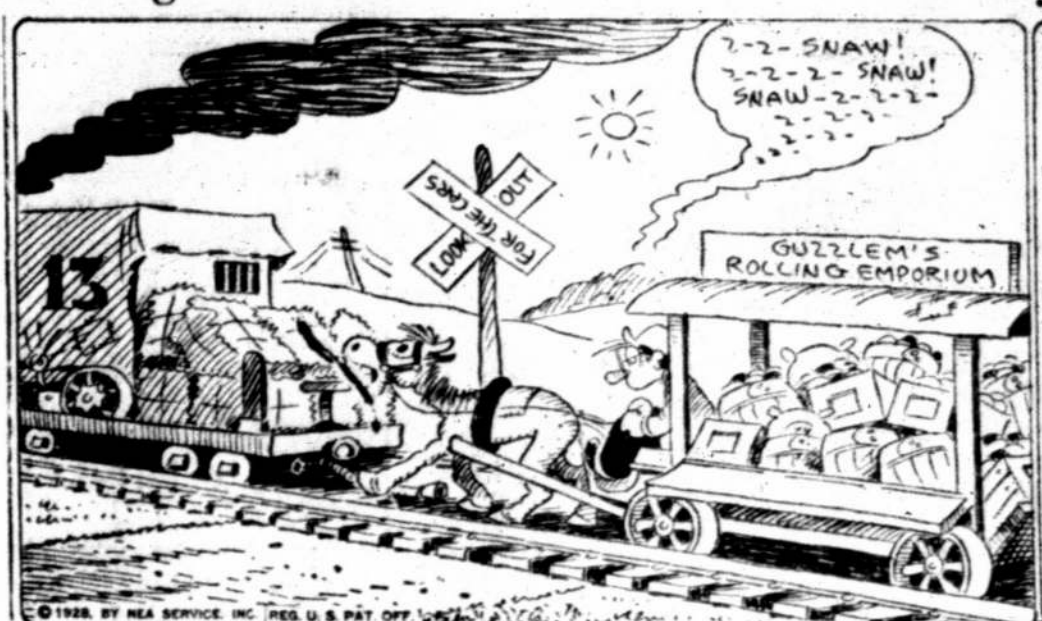

NOBILE SIGHTS RESCUE SHIPS BUT NOT SEEN

EARLY RESCUE IS SEEN SINCE POSITION IS DEFINITELY FIXED

(By Associated Press)

KINGS BAY, Spitzbergen, June 18.—Two seaplanes which flew out to aid General Umberto Nobile and five other survivors of the Italia apparently were within sight of the marooned men but failed to find them.

Captain Riser-Larsen and Lieutenant Luetzow Holm returned to their base ship the ice breaker Braganza after an hour's flight and reported to General Nobile's base ship that they had seen no trace of the silk tent he had painted red to aid them. Neither had they seen any of the survivors of the Italia.

Radio Call Issued

Almost immediately the Italia's radio called the Citta Di Milano and Nobile said his party had seen the planes searching for them. To aid further searches he gave his present position as 88.33 north and 37.12 east. This would put him about five miles to the east of Fom Island.

The fliers at once prepared to change the motors of their planes and set out again for the new position.

Commander Romagna of the Citta Di Milano said he believed that since Nobile had now definitely established his location the party would probably be found on the Norwegian's next flight.

Captain Riser-Larsen said he flew over North Cape, Cape Platen and Reys Island all off the North coast of Northeast Land. Lieutenant Luetzow Holm followed parallel 80.40 to the south of Charles xii island.

Followed Sledge Tracks

In returning from Cape Plate, Captain Riser-Larsen reported he followed the tracks of sledges which left Whalenberg Bay on Wednesday. He saw traces of an encampment near Godresby Island and noted the presence of two leaders of the dog team.

From the findings of the aviators it appeared that the ice in the zone over which Captain A. Mariano and his two companions must cross if they reach land was in a very favorable condition for the hike. These three men left Nobile's group on May 30 and have not been heard of since then.

LARGE AREA IN MEXICO SWEEP BY BIG QUAKE

PEOPLE STRICKEN WITH TERROR AND DAMAGE REPORTED GREAT

(By Associated Press)
MEXICO CITY, June 18.—Terror reigned in central and southern Mexico today after earthquakes had shaken the region from the Gulf of Mexico to the Gulf of Tehuantepec for two days.

Apparently the only casualties occurred in the state of Oaxaca. Dispatches from there stated there were casualties and numerous houses collapsed. The number of the victims was not given.

In many places people were camped in the open, refusing to reenter their homes in fear of new tremors.

Recovering Recent Shocks

Oaxaca was just beginning to recover from an earthquake of two months ago and was the center of the disturbance. Fifty distinct shocks were felt there in the first hour of the quake Saturday night and tremors of less intensity were felt Sunday. Streets in the city of Oaxaca were cluttered with the debris of fallen walls.

Heavy rains rushed inland at Puerto Angel for a distance of six miles. Various warehouses along the waterfront were destroyed.

Big fissures were opened in the hills along the railroad tracks at Puchitla and landslides were threatened.

Some casualties occurred at Mazatlan and the property damage was heavy.

Mexico City Shaken
In Mexico City the earthquakes were felt as late as 5:30 last night and these awakened the cracks which had appeared in the streets and pavements. Many plate glass windows were shattered in the building section and a few adobe walls fell.

In the hotels groups of foreign tourists including many Americans fled into the streets.

The movement in the capital was strong enough to sweep automobiles from their course and throw pedestrians from their feet. One of the hospitals reported a case of hysteria on the part of a taxicab driver.

He became delirious with fear when his car skidded erratically. The driver lost control of his automobile and it plumed across the sidewalk at full speed, smashing into a building and cutting two passengers.

In every theater the audiences dashed for exits. There were arm and crushed at the doors but no serious injuries resulted.

Showing Crucifixion
In one theater a motion picture depicting the life of Christ was being shown. A representation of the crucifixion was cast on the screen and the title describing how the veil of the temple was rent in twain at the moment of Christ's death had just been flashed when the first shock came.

The audience rushed for the street. Men and women crossed themselves and dropped to their knees on the sidewalks invoking divine mercy. All attempts of theater employees to stop the rush were futile.

The electric lights went off for a time and increased the panic. Water mains were also broken.

There was panic as well in Puebla, Vera Cruz and other towns. People rushed from their homes into the streets and plazas and fell on their knees in prayer.

NEW JEWISH LAND
RIGA—Cooperating with various Jewish organizations the Soviet Republic is contemplating the transportation of 1,000 Jewish families into eastern Siberia forming an autonomous Jewish republic on the Amur river. This new land some 600 miles from Vladivostok is expected to support more than 100,000 Jewish families in the future.

LEBANON Ky. Mrs. Mary Hundley hadn't seen her nine sons for nearly 30 years. She became seriously ill recently and the boys were notified. They rushed to her bedside several coming from distant cities. Her illness immediately had a turn for the better and doctors promised she would regain her health.

LONDON, June 18.—Slowly but steadily women are pushing down the barriers that keep them from high government places in Europe and the Near East.

One and only one Turkish woman has risen to an important government post under the new regime. She is Dr. Bedrich Hanem, who as specialist on school hygiene in the ministry of education is the sole woman to appear in the long line of officials received by President Mustafa Kemal on national holidays and feast days.

In Austria a woman holds a job that corresponds with that of Vice-President Davies in the United States. Olga Rudel-Zejnek, a sturdy fighter for women's rights is the president of the Austrian senate.

She is Dr. Bedrich Hanem, who as specialist on school hygiene in the ministry of education is the sole woman to appear in the long line of officials received by President Mustafa Kemal on national holidays and feast days.

Dr. Bedrich is a graduate of the American College for Women at Constantinople. She has promoted medical inspection for school children throughout Turkey and has helped establish two tuberculosis preventoriums. She is married and finds time to care for a baby of her own without the help of a nursemaid.

In other countries women are still struggling for greater independence.

Spanish women have a staunch leader in the Marchioness del Ter, Countess of Moralia who was prominently identified with the hospitalization of allied soldiers during the World War.

Although she has not taken a direct part in politics, the marchioness has been extremely active in suffrage and other women's movements.

The first coated tasteless pill was made by Brighton, England, chemist in 1859.

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Germany has just honored Helene Lange, its pioneer in the feminist movement, on the occasion of her eightieth birthday anniversary. For 40 years Helene Lange sought to extend woman's scope beyond the three K's—kitchen, kinder, kuche (church, children, kitchen). The higher institutions of learning were closed to women until she persuaded educators and statesmen that women were unfit to bring up useful citizens if they themselves were without education.

The health work is progressing nicely in our community and we feel that Miss Sheldon is very efficient in this line.

T. Reed of this city while Mr. Edwards is of Canyon and not a stranger to most of us. The friends of this happy couple wish for them much happiness and a successful wedded life.

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E. T. MEREDITH DIES IN IOWA

HEART ATTACK FATAL TO EX-MEMBER OF WILSON CABINET

(By Associated Press)
DES MOINES, Ia., June 18.—Edwin T. Meredith, secretary of agriculture in the Wilson Cabinet, died last night. The end of a long illness came at 6 o'clock as Mr. Meredith slept.

At the bedside of the 51 year old farm publisher and democratic presidential candidate were Mrs. Meredith, his mother, Mrs. M. J. Meredith of Los Angeles, a son, a daughter, four brothers and a sister.

Heart failure resulting from high blood pressure was given as the cause of death. Mr. Meredith had been ill for several months, but the illness did not take a critical turn until a month ago shortly after he had returned from John Hopkins hospital, Baltimore, where he had gone for observation.

Funeral services will be held from the Meredith home Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Despite his illness, Mr. Meredith permitted the use of his name against Gov. Al Smith of New York in the recent Iowa democratic presidential preference primary, which Governor Smith won. Mr. Meredith always had been known as a "progressive" and he was an outspoken opponent of the New York governor's views on prohibition.

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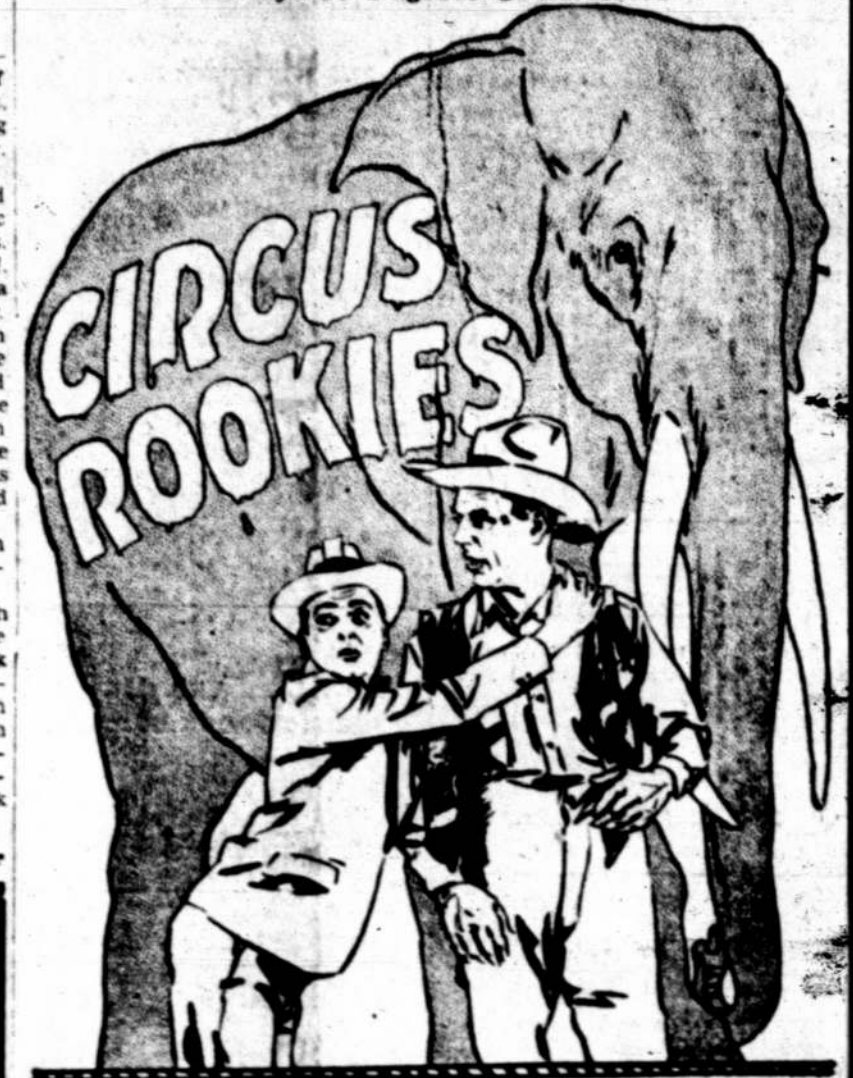
