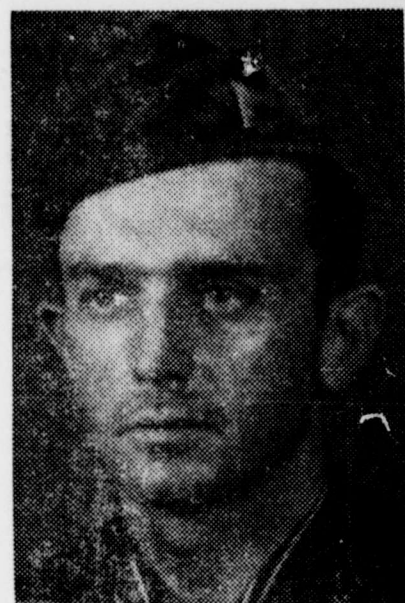

CHANGE IN POSTAL RATES

A reduction in rates on money orders and insured mail, and an increase in rates on special delivery was announced by the post office department for Nov. 1. Rate changes affecting most local users are as follows: Money order fees, from 1c to \$2.50, 6c; \$2.51 to \$5, 8c; \$5.01 to \$10, 11c; \$10.01 to \$20, 13c; \$20.01 to \$40, 15c; \$40.01 to \$60, 18c; \$60.01 to \$80, 20c; \$80.01 to \$100, 22c. Insured mail, 1c to \$5, 3c; \$5.01 to \$25, 10c; \$25.01 to \$50, 15c; \$50.01 to \$200, 25c.

To this date in 1943, Abernathy's gins had turned out 4,012 bales. Reports Tuesday morning said the local plants had ginned 971 bales this season.

The two gins at Monroe have turned out 1,850 bales this season. The early November report last year was 4,500 bales ginned there.

GENERAL ELECTION IS NEXT TUESDAY

Texans, and the nation, will trek to the polls next Tuesday to cast votes in an historical election, when another, and fourth term, for President Franklin D. Roosevelt, will be approved or rejected by balloting of the people. The watchword across the nation is for every eligible voter to go to the polls and express his or her preference by ballot.

Besides voting on political party nominees for national, state and local elective offices, Texans will vote on two proposed amendments to the state constitution. First amendment on the ballot is in two parts, one to provide power to cities and towns to pay pensions to appointive officers; and, two, to provide power for the state legislature to set up a system of retirement and disability pension for appointive officers and employees of towns and cities.

The second proposed amendment would allow county courts to reallocate tax levies, after people of the county have voted on same in a county-wide election. A limitation of taxable valuations is in the amendment, of 80c on the \$100.

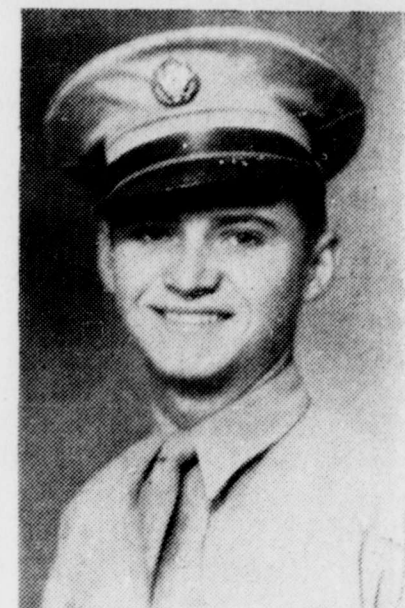

Somewhere in Burma, Oct. 6, 1944

Dear BFD: Just a few lines to say hello and thank you for the paper. It keeps me in touch with all the home boys. Every now and then I get someone's address from the paper. I drop them a few lines. I know the other day before I came back to Burma I got Dewey Smith's address. I had been wanting it for some time, so thanks again for the paper. . . . I would like to take this time to set a few people straight about what is known as the beautiful Burma country. A lot of them seem to think when they read in the paper about some place in Burma taken by our armed forces that it is a town. Well, I've covered a good bit of this country and I have yet to see a town. They see on a screen about the beautiful Burma girls. Here they are as black as the ace of spades. It's been some time since we've seen a white woman, in fact, it's been some time since we've seen a woman of any color. I've been overseas about a year. With the exception of about two months I spent the rest in the jungles with ants, lizards, snakes, Japs and the rain. I've been places that the foot of a white man had never trod before this war. We know what it is to work all day and spend a good portion of the night in a fox-hole, trying to secure ourselves from the Japs. Several of the boys have received letters from home saying they are urged to use V-Mail to the troops overseas. There, too, is room for an argument. V-Mail is about the best we can do for it is the only paper we can get unless someone at home sends us some. Mail is our one sure thing, and Uncle Sam has plenty of space on his ships for mail. If he doesn't, where are the ships that are sent out? Along launches a ship every four days. . . . If the Japs want this place, I'd gladly give it to them, and that is the idea of thousands of others. We aren't complaining about all this, however, but papers tell how good our eats are. Let

me give you some idea — our eats consist of bully beef that comes off a steer just behind the steak, and it tastes the same. We seldom eat it, once in awhile we get fresh goat meat, and the rest consists of dehydrated food. Also, vegetable oil unfit for a dog to eat. If I had a dog and he ate anything like that, he'd be shot on the spot. . . . Back to the mail situation—if they'd lay off the bully beef that we carry from the kitchen to the garbage can, he would be doing all the boys a favor, and then he would have plenty of room for all the mail. . . . About the guys howling about the amount of mail carried over here, just let them know we'd gladly change places with them and not let out a whimper about the size of anything sent through the mail. We're fighting a war and don't use V-Mail unless nothing else is available and circumstances won't permit. If anyone doesn't believe it, let them give it a whirl, it's no lie. It has been almost a year and a half since I've been home or seen anyone from there. However, I've only been overseas about a year. I don't know as yet how long a man can last under our present strength. Only time will tell. . . . I'd like for you to print this in the Abernathy paper. If anyone has any doubts as to what I've said, they can get my address from you and I'd gladly set them straight on the subject. Sgt. Wilson Tate, P. S. 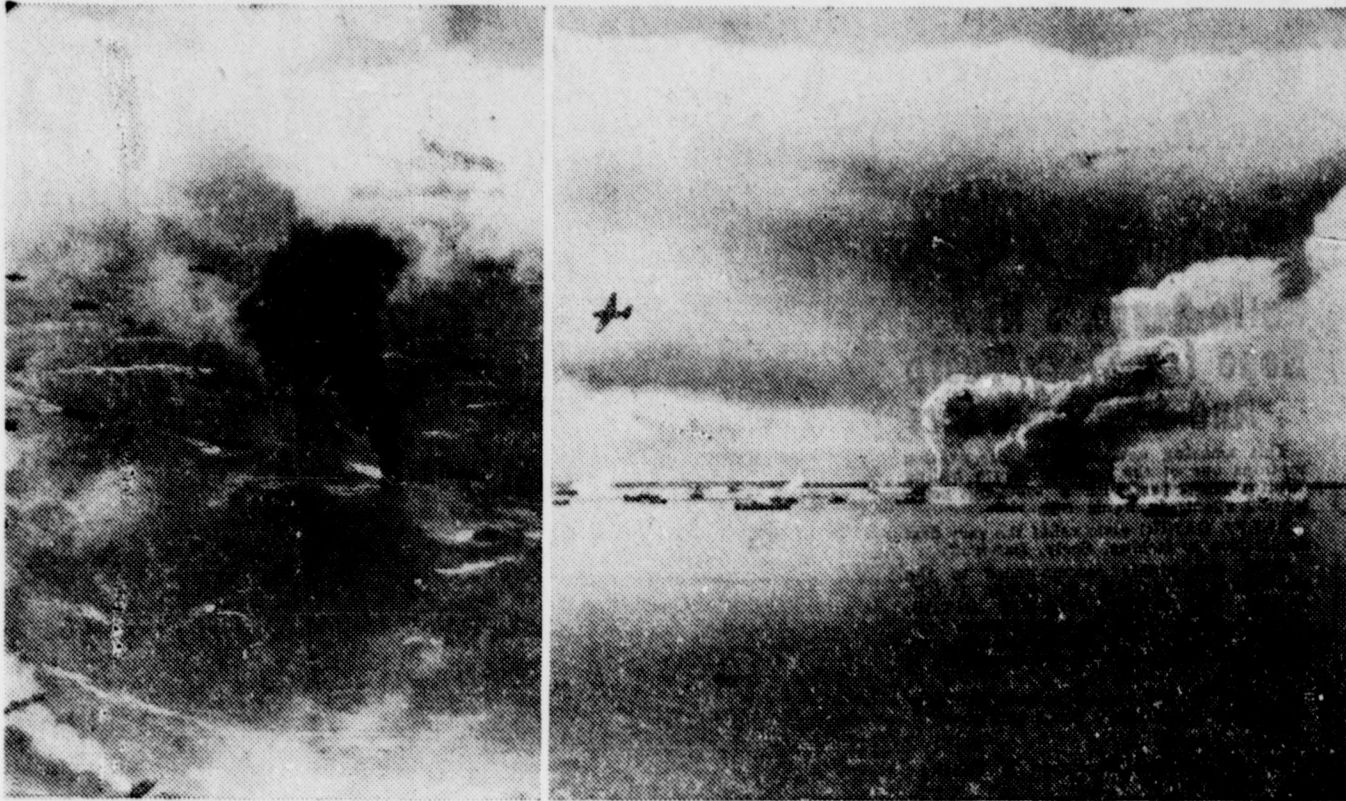

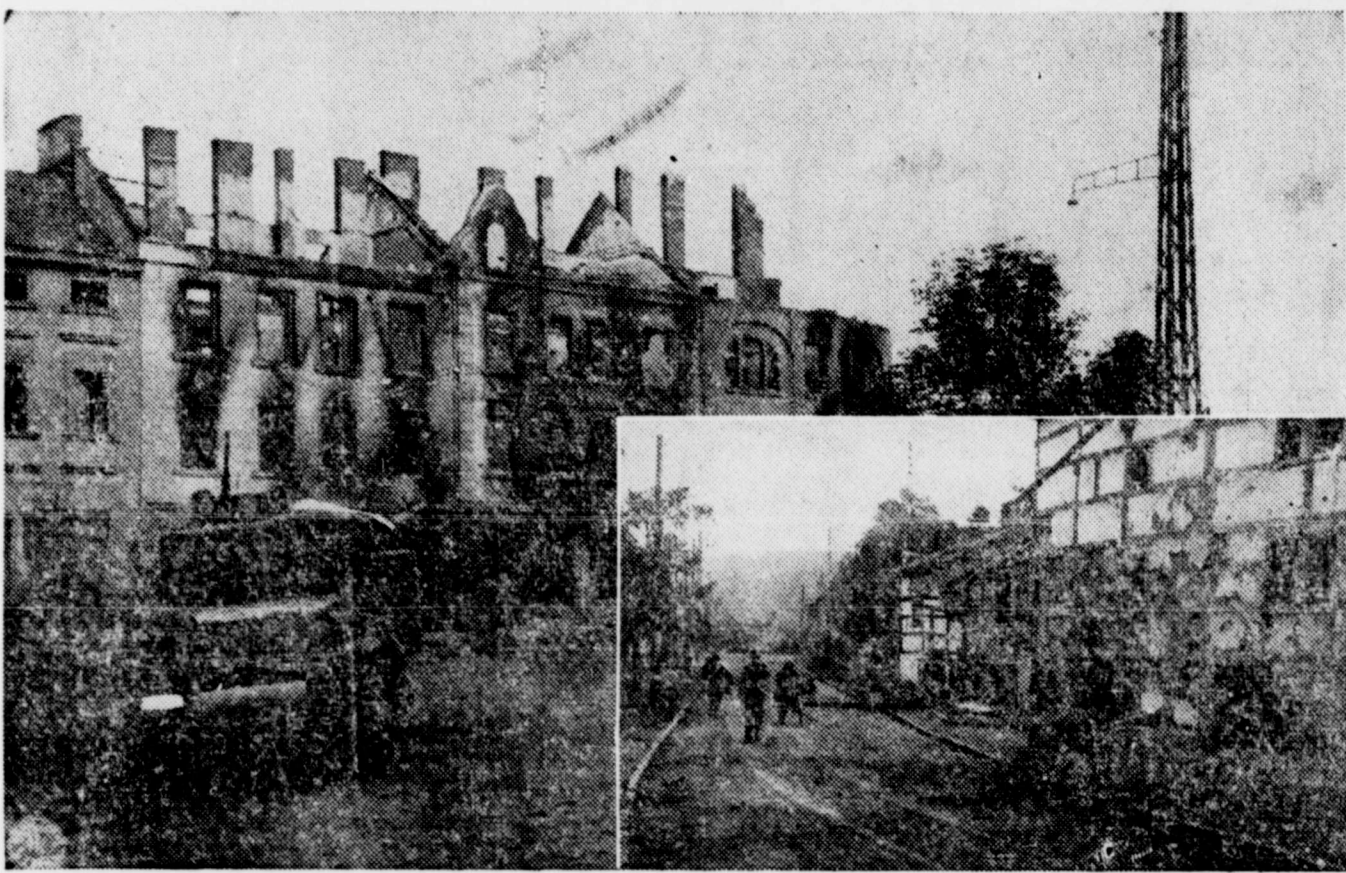

German Cities Show Results of Allied Might



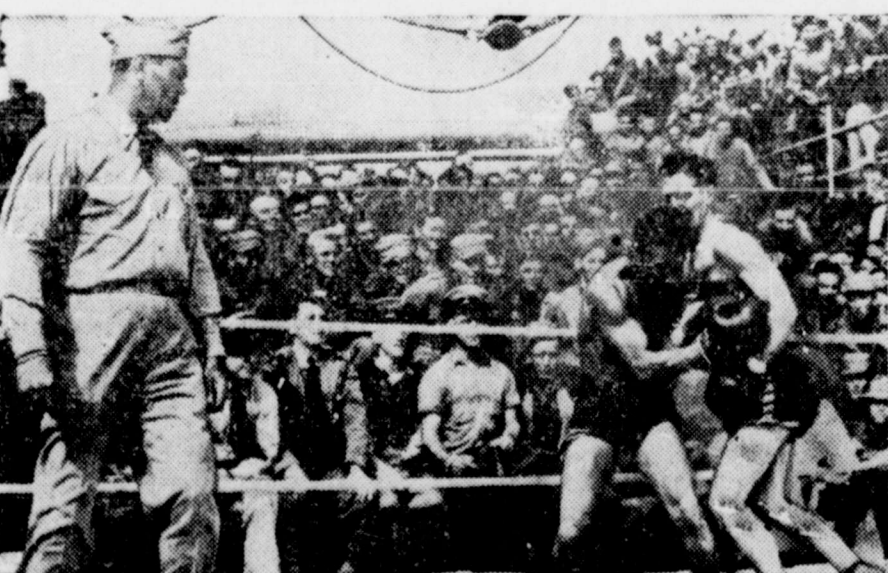

Jack Dempsey Refereeing Bout



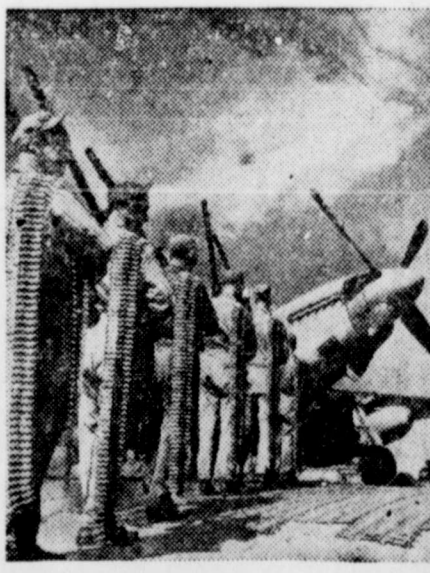

Bullets for Axis



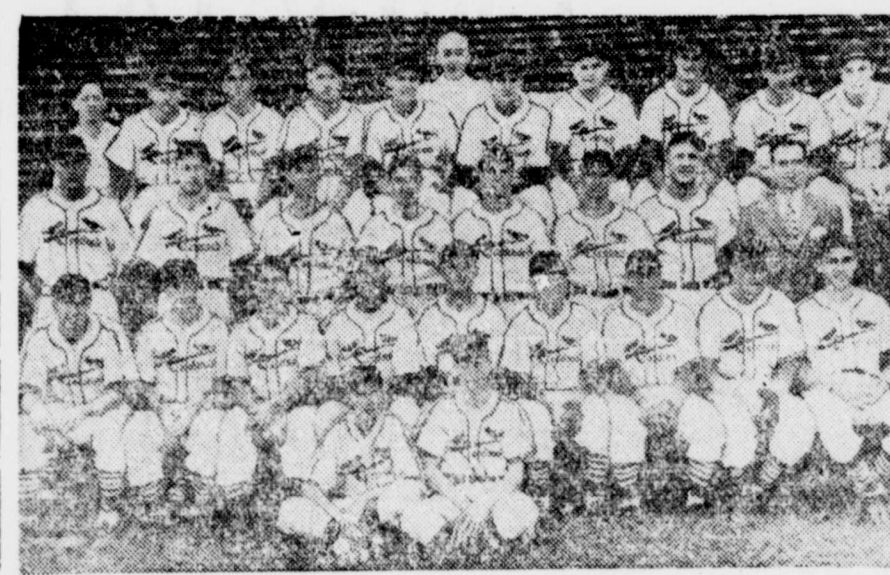

Models New Jacket



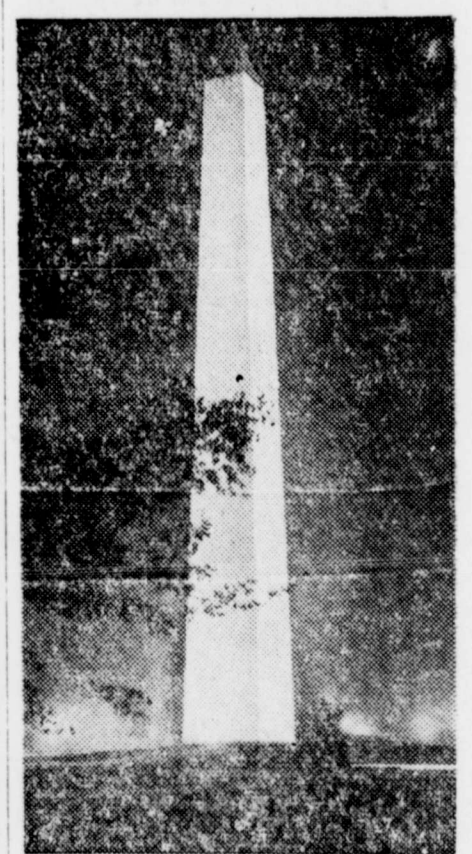
