This country got that "one more rain" last week which insures this territory of a big, if not a bumper, crop this season.

One new business is opening up in Loraine this week, work has started on the construction of the new grain storage building and business prospects in general are looking up.

We still have some vacant business buildings in town that would be ideal for most any kind of business. Loraine is in the heart of the irrigation in this section and there is room here for other businesses since the drought is over.

Peach Borers Can Be Controlled

Editor's Note: There are quite a few peach trees in home orchards in this territory and a lot of them have the borers, according to reports we have heard so below you will find a way to treat your trees to rid them of the borers. The recommended treatment is from Taylor County agent H. C. Stanley.

Trees infected with the borers should be treated between Oct. 20 and Nov. 15, Stanley says. Stanley recommends treating trees with parathion or benzene crystals (PDB) when the soil is dry and soil temperature is 55 degrees or above.

"Remove weeds and loosen and level soil about one foot from the tree trunk," the county agent advises. "Place PDB crystals in a narrow, circular band, preferably in a groove about two inches from the trunk."

Several shovels of clean soil should be placed over the crystals, Stanley says, and the earth should be tamped down. The crystals should be placed in a cone-shaped pile about six inches high around the base of the tree.

"In placing the first few shovels of soil, avoid pushing any of the material against the tree, since crystals in contact with the tree cause injury," Stanley says. Compact the soil with the back of the shovel and remove earth mounds in early spring."

The agent says treatment should include a half ounce of crystals for two and three-year-old trees, three-fourths of an ounce for mature trees.

Ethylene dichloride emulsion will also give good results if used according to the manufacturer's label, the agent says.

Peach trees should also be treated in the winter for San Jose scale or peach leaf curl, the other big enemy of peach trees in this area, the agent says. The trees should be treated with four gallons of 97 per cent miscible oil spray during the dormant season in December and January.

Max Carriker Of Roby Elected State Representative Last Sat.

Max Carriker of Roby won the nomination for Representative from the 91st district over Temple Dickson of Sweetwater in the runoff primary last Saturday.

Carriker, who was second in the first primary, reversed the count in Mitchell County last Saturday to lead by a small margin, and polled an overwhelming vote in his home county of Fisher to emerge with a majority of 231 in the district.

The vote in the three-county district Saturday was 3420 for Carriker and 3189 for Dickson. Dickson led in the Loraine box and Mitchell County as a whole in the first primary but in the second primary Carriker carried both Loraine and the county.

In the other race on the ticket, Saturday Judge Hamilton won the nomination for a place on the Texas Supreme Court, defeating J. Edwin Smith by a large majority.

W. N. Bacon was nominated commissioner in the Westbrook precinct, defeating Louis Rees by 13 votes.

Wheat Stubble Protects Land

Wheat stubble properly managed proved its value during the severe wind, rain and hail storm that struck the Bledsoe farm one mile south of Westbrook recently. The farm is operated by P. E. Clawson, who is a cooper with the Mitchell County Soil Conservation District.

The wheat stubble had been chiseled so as to open up the soil and leave a maximum amount of residue on the surface. A. V. Sheppard, Work Unit Conservationist has reported.

The storm dumped 2 1/2 inches of rain on the farm in less than 30 minutes. The stubble protected the surface of the soil to such an extent that the soil was able to take up all of the rain while it was falling. "No water was ponded against the terraces," Sheppard explained.

Nearby terraced farms planted to cotton and grain sorghum suffered severe damage to crops as well as to the soil. Several of these farms had water running out of the terraces and ends of the rows. Fields with level closed end terraces were able to hold most of the rain that fell during the storm," Sheppard explained.

"The crop and soil damage was very heavy on farms that were being farmed with straight rows. Each row acted like a little diversion leading the water off of the farms carrying valuable top soil with it," Sheppard observed.

Hunters Cautioned NOT TO SHOOT MORE THAN 10 DOVES A DAY

Austin, Aug. 25—Don't be fooled, it may cost you a fine for killing too many doves, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game & Fish Commission. The North Zone season opens Sept. 1.

This year's hunting regulations, approved by the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service, permits a possession limit of 20 birds after the first day. This does not mean, the director warns, that a hunter can go out and kill 20 birds in one day and get by with it.

The daily limit is still 10 birds. However, after the first day a hunter may have two days' possession, provided he doesn't have them on his person or in a manner to indicate they were all killed on the same day.

"The dove is a migratory bird and as such comes under final federal control," the chief says. "This year the possession limit has been modified, as well as the season lengthened. A good dove crop indicated early this year is responsible."

The chief also warned that new licenses must be obtained before hunting Sept. 1. These licenses are required for all hunters between the ages of 17 and 65 who hunt out of their own county. The new licenses will be available next week from game wardens, sporting goods stores and county clerks.

New fishing licenses also will be required at the same time.

A Year of Growth

For the Texas Egg Law

The Texas egg law—a milestone in Texas agricultural legislation—is a year old this month. And the year that has passed has been a year of growth—complete with growing pains—for the law and for the industry it serves.

When the law requiring accurate labeling of eggs offered for sale in Texas became official in August of 1957, it had already suffered pre-natal pains of growth. Heated complaints were heard that, once in operation, the law would ruin the industry.

This was somewhat like cussing the cook before the soup was poured. And, fortunately once the soup was poured, the complaints began to subside and the law continued to develop.

One of the biggest factors in this successful development was the foresight of legislators and industry men who helped to design the law in providing extra months to prepare the industry for actual enforcement. In this respect, provision was made that, although the law was effective in August, those people concerned with licensing under the law were given until late October to do so, and actual enforcement of all the law's provisions was delayed until February 17th of this year.

It was this period of preparation that made possible the ordered development which we can now review. The time was utilized to print licenses and related forms which would be needed in enforcement and to formulate rules and regulations provided by the law.

In addition, a far-reaching educational program was launched to inform interested people as to how the egg law would affect them, and an intensive egg grading training program was set up.

Even with these months of preparatory work, however, results of first inspections during the first days of the law's enforcement in late February showed

ed a high percentage of violations—and hinted of growth pains to come.

But the industry responded keenly to the problem and steady improvement was noted. Whereas February inspections turned up an alarming 35.5 percent of total violations, in July of this year—one of our hottest months—violations were 7.8 percent, an encouraging change, and an indication that everything will work out well with Texas and the Texas Egg Law.
