## Local Farmers And Implement Dealers To Meet

Information has come to the office of County Agent T. A. Barfield explaining that a request direct from the farmers of the South Plains to the War Production Board in Washington will have to be made before materials can be allocated for the production of cotton harvesters for use in this area.

A meeting of all farmers and implement dealers in Dawson County is called for 2 p. m. Saturday, March 9, in the District Court room in Lamesa for the purpose of explaining the procedure in obtaining such an allocation. The more farmers that are present at this meeting, the better will be the prospects for getting cotton harvesting machinery for the next cotton harvest.

This is a very important meeting. Labor may be more scarce this Fall than ever before, and harvesting machinery is needed badly, according to County Agent Barfield. He states, "Every farmer, implement dealer, and farm agency in Dawson County should be present at this meeting. Some of the neighboring counties have had similar meetings and as many as five hundred farmers were reported in attendance at one of the sessions."

## J. L. Chiles Was Buried Here On Sunday, March 4

J. L. Chiles, Dawson County farmer and teacher passed away Friday, March 2, at a local hospital following an appendicitis operation. Mr. Chiles was born in East Texas on December 24, 1890. He moved from there to San Saba County at the age of 10 years. Educated in Central Texas he took his degree from Daniel Baker College in Brownwood, after which he taught in the schools of San Saba County for a number of years.

He moved to Dawson County to assume the position of principal at O. K. School in the Fall of 1927. He filled this post for a number of years, and then accepted a position as principal of Grandview School, his present home, where he taught until elected superintendent of Ackery High School.

For a number of years he served as principal at Ackery, and saw the school rise from an unclassified to a fully accredited school under his management. He then retired from teaching to manage his farms. With the war came a teacher shortage, and willing always, to do more than his share, Mr. Chiles started teaching again, serving as principal of his home school.

Mr. Chiles was converted at an early age and remained a consistent church worker. He held membership with the Grandview Baptist Church. He was also a member of the Masonic Lodge. A truly good citizen, Mr. Chiles will be greatly missed in his home, his community and country.

Mr. Chiles was married to Lula Mae Lord on September 5, 1915. To this union two sons were born, Carlos and Doyle. He had four grandsons, two now living and two preceding him in death.

Left to mourn his going are his wife, two sons, Carlos of Dawson County and Doyle of Beaumont; two grandsons, Gary and Don; two brothers Hal Chiles of Beaumont and Gordon Chiles of Denver City; two sisters, Mrs. H. L. Richmond of Richland Springs, and many other relatives and a great host of friends.

Those who went to the meeting state that in a few days local citizens can make application for crop insurance at the AAA office in Lamesa.

## Commission To Discuss Charter At Meet Tonight

According to an announcement from M. C. Lindsey, chairman of the charter commission, members of that organization are asked to meet at the local Chamber of Commerce office at 8 p. m. tonight (Thursday, March 8).

Chairman Lindsey states that this will be an important meeting and it is hoped that all members of the commission will be able to attend. This is expected to be the final session of that group, and they will make a study of the final draft of the proposed charter.

For several weeks a movement has been underway in this city to change the present form of government to a city management government, whereby five councilmen will be elected to be a portion of the governing body of Lamesa. These councilmen will in turn select a mayor, and will hire a city manager, secretary, police force, and other necessary officials.

Under the proposed charter, the mayor of the city will be paid a salary of \$25.00 per month and councilmen will be given \$10.00 each month.

Chairman Lindsey explained that the proposed charter must be checked and signed by members of the charter commission at the Thursday session, and then the charter will be ordered to be published. After the charter has been printed, it will be distributed among citizens for study.

On May 1, the first Tuesday in May, an election will be held, and if the charter is approved by 2-3 of the voters, a new form of city government will be set up here.

## Car Of Waste Paper To Be Loaded Here March 23-24

According to members of the local salvage committee a car of waste paper will be shipped from this county on Tuesday, March 27, and all Dawson County citizens are asked to begin saving their waste paper now. Plans have been made to load the paper on Friday and Saturday, March 23 and 24, and everyone will have to save a supply of paper in order that the car can be filled completely.

As in past paper drives, the car will be loaded on the railroad track, and loads will be accepted throughout the two days set aside for this purpose.

Demand for paper is reaching unheard-of tonnage after years of war. Paper has gone to war by the hundreds of thousands of tons in the form of containers for foods, medicines, blood plasma and similar packaged supplies.

American inventive genius has produced bomb bands of paper, shell cases of paper and ammunition chests, practice bombs and camouflage material. It takes 25 tons of blueprint paper to build one big battleship, 700,000 different kinds of items are shipped to the Army—paper wrapped or boxed. Each 500 pound bomb requires 12 pounds of paper in the form of rings (bands), tops and bottoms, Each 75mm shell takes 1.8 pounds of paper for its protective container.

It takes 52 pounds of paper to protect an Army ambulance for overseas shipment. These vital uses of paper must be met. Supplies for the fighting men must be packaged and adequately protected. Paper and paper products have been substituted for war-short metals, further increasing demand.

With such heavy demand on paper of all kinds, shortages have appeared, grown progressively worse, and are now at a critical stage with war production threatened by mill closings. You can help in this crisis by saving every scrap of waste paper and transporting it to the car on March 23 and 24, and it will be shipped to the paper mills to be converted into vital war materials.

## Lamesa Still On List Of Proposed Hospital Sites

According to an announcement from Washington, more than a score of towns and cities are bidding for the proposed West Texas veterans hospital site for which is expected to be selected within two or three weeks.

The choice is understood to rest among the following eight localities: Lamesa, Sweetwater, San Angelo, Big Spring, Lubbock, Midland, Plainview, and Colorado City.

Plans call for initial consideration of a 250-bed facility at a cost of about \$1,000,000. Later, as demands increase, it is expected to be enlarged to a capacity of possibly 1,000 beds.

Representatives of Lubbock, San Angelo and Odessa are now in Washington, and others from Big Spring are expected to arrive momentarily.

## Military Service Tests To Be Held In Local School

Seventeen year old boys who are to graduate from high school by July or who have already graduated, will have opportunity to take tests for qualifying for membership in the Army Specialized Training program on April 12, 1945.

Lamesa High School has been designated as one of the examination centers with V. Z. Rogers and H. S. Fitzgerald appointed to conduct the tests.

The young men who pass the tests will be eligible for specialized courses in selected colleges or universities beginning later in the Summer. Dr. H. T. Manuel of the University of Texas is the chief examining officer for the southwest.

Boys who desire to take the test should report to Lamesa High School so that an adequate number of test supplies can be requisitioned. Twelve sets of supplies have been allocated to this test center and if more are needed, the fact should be determined at once.

Announcement was made this week that Ernest Rhodes, long time resident of this city, has bought half interest in Piggly Wiggly, a grocery store which has been owned and operated by Dan Davis, well known Lamesan, for the past 13 years. Rhodes will serve as active manager of the firm.

For several years the firm was located where East Variety Store is now situated, but since 1936 it has been located at 503-505 South First Street. Throughout its existence here Dan Davis has operated the firm, except for a period of 8 months from July of 1932 to March of 1943 when he served in the military service. Davis, who makes his home at 406 North Main Street, plans to spend some time now at Odessa where he owns Lawson Food Market and in Kermit where he has the Reed Food Market.

Davis and Rhodes plan to completely remodel their store as soon as materials for this move can be manufactured. New fixtures will be installed in the store and probably changes will be made in the front of the building.

Piggly Wiggly, which has established a wide reputation for its quality and variety of foods and meats, will be open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m., each day of the week except Saturday, when they will remain open until 11 p. m. The staff there includes seven employees.

Ernest Rhodes invited all his friends to visit Piggly Wiggly and to make their selections from their lines of merchandise.

### Latest News From THE HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT

**MYRTLE DICKIE NEGY PLANS FOR MARCH**  
Home Demonstration Women will study canning equipment at their meeting with the agent during April. Mrs. Mabel Tucker Phintzy, Emergency War Food Assistant, will assist with a demonstration on cleaning, repairing, adjusting, and correctly using sealers. Communities or individuals who feel the need of this demonstration should arrange

to attend a club meeting where the demonstration is shown, or arrange for a meeting in their own homes or communities.  
There are definite reasons why this demonstration was planned by the club women for this time. Tin cans will be more plentiful this year, but practically no new sealers will be offered for sale. Parts for old sealers can be obtained. Rationing is tightening up again. The necessity for home production and home preservation of food is even greater this year than it was last year. Meats are better canned in tin than in glass, because they can be cooled more quickly and do not become as over-cooked as they do in glass. All sealers in the County

should be put in good condition. Neighbors should plan to "swap out" on the use of equipment.  
Some attention will be given to planning well balanced canning budgets. Food in frozen food lockers and in cans is much better if it is put up instead of being allowed to stand over for a year or two. Besides losing flavor, becoming dark and unattractive in color, it loses valuable vitamins and other nutrients. About 145 containers, or 305 pounds of food, should be stored for each person in the family. It is usually a waste to store more than this amount.  
Most varieties of hard cheese are made from whole milk.

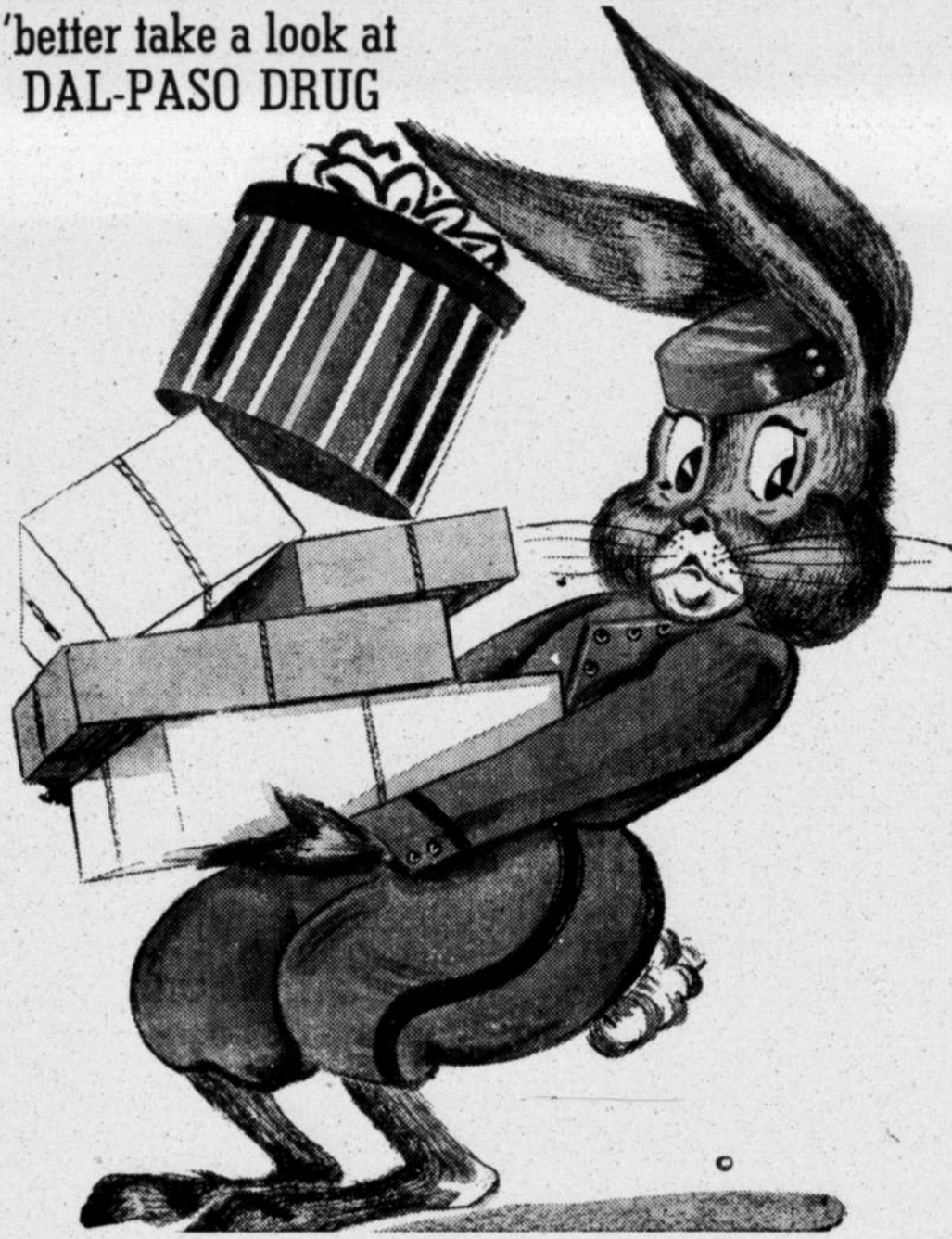

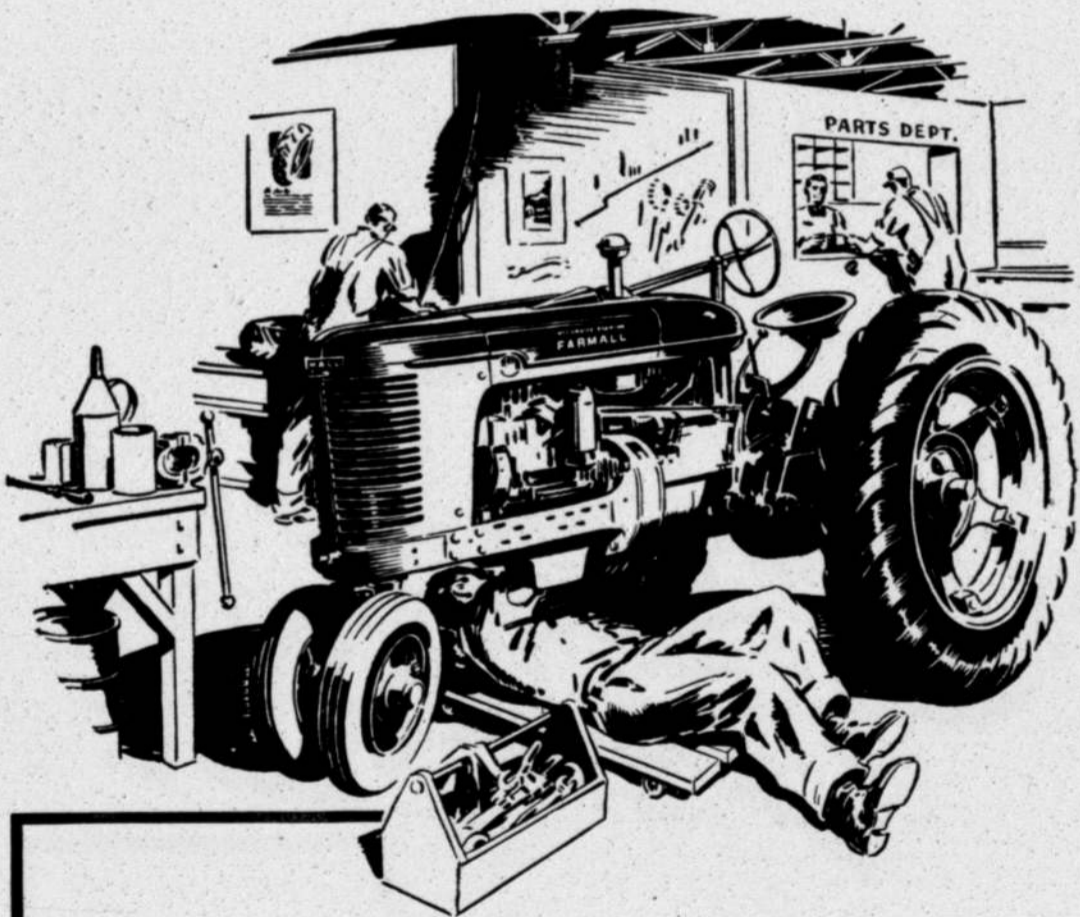

Porter has been in service since January 31, 1944. He received his training for the Infantry at Camp Roberts, California. A brother, Pfc. Richard E. Porter, is a member of the Field Artillery who is stationed in France. His wife, Mrs. Dorothy Porter, and two children, Richard Edward and Francine, live in Dallas.

January 31, 1945  
Dear Folks:  
Just a few lines to let you know I am still doing O. K. In closed is a paper which we were allowed to send home. Well, I wrote you last night and there is no more news.

The paper is as follows:  
Headquarters 30th Infantry Division  
24 January 1945  
To: The Soldiers of Every Unit (Assigned and Attached) of the 30th Infantry Division.

1. Another brilliant phase of your campaigning on the Western Front has been successfully accomplished.
2. The operations from 16 December to the present date (which include the taking and holding of Malmedy, Stavelot, Stoumont, La Gleize, Thirimont and the hill to the southwest thereof; Linneville, Pont, Bellevaux, the famous crossroads at road block No. 2, Recht, Obr, Emmels, Ndr, Emmels, Ndr, Emmels, Heide, Rodt, Hinderhausen, Neundorf, Kromach, Weisten), represent a display of courage, fortitude, and endurance that will remain forever as a glorious part of the work of your division, of your unit and of yourselves as individuals.
3. Again the division was in the right place at the right time to stop and then throw back the best the Germans had to offer on the Western Front.
4. All praise to you for a task well done. Your reputation as a fine fighting unit has been increased. You have fought the good fight, under terrific hardships of weather and terrain. My congratulations to you, one and all.

**Cow Saved Sgt. A. B. Johnson From German Mines**

Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Johnson who reside on South First Street in this city have had word that their son, Sgt. Aubrey J. Johnson, has been awarded the Bronze Star.

A story sent to Mr. and Mrs. Johnson from Major Frank G. Prassel explaining the award is as follows:  
"Sergeant Aubrey J. Johnson, Combat Engineer Squad Leader of the 2nd Infantry Division, was instructed to open a supply road for

the Infantry advancing into Germany, so that bed rolls could be taken forward in jeeps. Advancing ahead of his mine detecting crew and snow removing bulldozer, Sgt. Johnson decided that there may be trip wires stretched across the road, so he herded a cow just a head of him. Instead of tripping a wire, the cow stepped on a German schmine. The cow was killed, and the blast had only slight effect on Sgt. Johnson, who continued on his mission.

"Further investigation revealed that the road was abundantly strewn with schmines, so an alternate route was found and cleared, saving time and avoiding unnecessary casualties. Owing to the tactical situation, Sgt. Johnson was regretfully unable to turn the heroic bovine over to his Mess Sergeant."

Sgt. Johnson entered the service in December of 1939, prior to which time he had been employed by Luke and George Key in this city. The 25 year old sergeant has been overseas for the past 16 months, and has had 8 months of combat service. His wife, Mrs. Lucile L. Johnson, resides in Seguin, Texas.

**Pvt. Henderson Wounded In Left Hand In Belgium**

THE 129TH GENERAL HOSPITAL, England—Struck in the left hand by metal fragments from a German 88mm shell during bitter fighting against units of the German Panzer spearhead into Belgium, Private Mabron E. Henderson, 26, of 802 South Maverick Street, Lamesa, is now recuperating at the United States Army general hospital in England.

"We were moving up closer to German positions in the vicinity of Bastogne, and faced terrific small arms and artillery fire," related the Lamesa soldier, member of the Parachute Infantry. "When an 88 dropped a few yards from me, a fragment struck me in the hand and arm."

"I was given first aid immediately by a company aid man and moved at once to an aid station in the rear for further treatment. Later I was evacuated to England."

"Pvt. Henderson is making satisfactory progress," said First Lieutenant Kreher of Wisconsin, his ward surgeon.

The Texas man is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Henderson of Lamesa. His wife, who resides at the Maverick Street address, is the former Miss Lura Houston. Pvt. Henderson entered the Army in February, 1944, and received infantry training at Camp Roberts, California, and paratrooper training at Ft. Benning, Georgia. In civilian life he was engaged in construction work in Texas.

**NEW LETTUCE IS CALLED SLOBOLT**  
 A new summer leaf lettuce called slobolt has been announced by the Department of Agriculture, and is already being increased by seed growers to make it available to gardeners. It will be listed in the 1946 seed catalogs. This new lettuce withstands midsummer temperatures without quickly shooting or "bolting" to seed. If plants are set 10 to 12 inches apart and only the basal leaves are used as they reach a desirable size, lettuce may be harvested from the same plants over a period of several weeks, making it a very desirable home-garden variety. Slobolt has frilled light-green leaves that have the very wrinkled effect described as savoyed. The plants are of moderate size and the seeds are black.

**HEALTH OF NATION SHOWS NO SERIOUS DECLINE**

Despite the strains of three years of wartime living and working, and an increasing shortage of physicians, psychiatrists, nurses and hospital facilities, the physical and mental health of America's civilians shows no indication of a serious decline, the Office of War Information States in a comprehensive report on the state of the nation's health. It adds, however, a warning from Surgeon General Parran that our lines against disease are lightly held, and that our shortages of health and medical manpower leave us vulnerable to a breakthrough on many fronts. The shortage of doctors continues to be more acute in rural areas than in towns and cities. Sanitation in many rural parts of the country remains at a low level. Correction of deficiencies in the nation's sanitary equipment would require construction of about 11,500 water systems, adequate sewerage facilities in more than 10,500 communities, safe water and privies for 5,000,000 rural homes, 400 milk pasteurization plants in 34 states.

**HALF U.S. SPINNING FACILITIES TO BE CONVERTED TO COTTON YARN**

As a further step toward increasing the production of yarns and fabrics needed to meet urgent military requirements, WPB has directed the conversion to cotton yarn production of at least 50 per cent of the country's spinning facilities producing spun rayon and similar yarns. The direction affects all mills operating on the cotton system and

producing spun rayon, cotton-rayon mixed or other blended or mixed-fiber yarn except cotton-wool blended or mixed yarns. It applies to both sale yarn and integrated mills. The direction becomes effective on March 26, 1945 for all persons who produce yarn, but no fabrics; and on April 9, 1945 for all persons who produce both yarns and fabrics.

### Pvt. Foy Futrell Describes Recent Tour In Rome

**Editor's Note:** The following letter was written by Pvt. Foy Futrell to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Futrell of this city. Overseas since last October, Pvt. Futrell is stationed in Italy where he is a member of the Air Corps attached to the message department. Pvt. Futrell has been in service for approximately 18 months, prior to which time he was employed with

his father in this city. He is a former student of Lamesa High School. 27 February 1945  
Hi Mom and Pop, and Infants, and whatever else you all have around.  
Well, guess what, I'm C. Q. again tonight so you're gonna have to listen to my troubles again. I don't see how I manage to get this job so often, but I'm taking another guy's place tonight so I can be off next Saturday night and take in the USO show in town, so I guess that's why it comes so often. After tonight I won't have it for quite a while.  
Off hand, I don't think of a thing to write about tonight, so

I reckon it'll have to be more about the Rome trip. This will probably be the same junk as last weeks letter but I'll try to go a little more into detail.  
I reckon, first of all, I should say that the Red Cross was more like what I've always thought it should be than I've ever seen it. They really gave us something. They furnished the tour completely and it didn't cost a cent—also there was a guide that went along to explain things to us. I don't believe I can go the rounds and tell you about the trip without doing a little research, so I'll try in my own little way to describe the St. Peter's Church.  
It sits back in a square, which is called the People Square. It real-

ly isn't a square at all but a big circle, which is surrounded by high pillars, about four feet deep and approximately twenty-five feet high. These pillars go up to the roof, as strange as that may seem, and on the roof there are sixty statues which are placed at regular intervals and are about fifteen feet high. These represent the Saints of the Catholic Church. Of course each of these is a work of art.

The circle of pillars making the outside of the Peoples square, which is about three hundred yards across, only covers two-thirds of the circle on accounts of there is an opening for the people to enter, and the rest is for the front of the church. There is a high pole or something—I forgot what—in the very center of this big circle. From the pole in the center, the pavement slopes gradually to the step of the church. As for the front of the building, you can draw a pretty good idea from the pictures about it—infact you could have drawn a better picture of the whole grounds from the pictures—but I'm doing this my way. In the front of the church there are several doors, strange as that may seem. Now, one of these doors is made out of solid bronze and I think the guide said it weighed 22 tons. The day I got it, they only open this door three times a year and I think it would take some better men than I saw in that place to open it. Occasions for opening it are the Christmas, Easter and some other Catholic holiday.

Natives of the country think if you go through all four (there are three other doors like this one in three other churches in Rome) of these doors that you're sanctified, or something or other, but never the less, the door is about 20 feet high and hand carved. The carving on it tells the story of something or other, and is very beautiful in its own weather beaten way (and what wouldn't get a little weather beaten after all those years.)

Then you sneak through one of the other lesser doors which are still too darned big for Uncle Levi, and you're inside, just like that. From there you can see all the way to the back, which I believe is about a hundred or so yards away, and there is of course a beautiful altar and what I would have called a painted glass or stained glass window with a dove. But, what do you know, the glass ain't glass, it's marble, of which there is plenty. This is a very special kind of marble that Caesar or some of those old birds, brought all the way from Egypt. But naturally before you get a look at the back, you gape at the floors which are made of the best grade of marble, and are inlaid in various colors. The guide said they had been there about a couple of thousand years.

They have stood up under the wear and tear wonderfully, much better than your last linoleum rug. In fact you would swear that they were just put down a few years back and just getting broken in good. They make very pretty designs and most every Pope that comes along thinks he should have his coat of arms put in it. Being the big bug around there, he usually has his way and does it.

Now for the surprise — inside there aren't any seats. Those preachers must preach a little better than ours, because I can't see our people standing up through a sermon—or maybe there's the catch. Maybe he doesn't do it as long. Never the less, there aren't any seats. But they have had some boys like Michaelangelo and a few others do a few paintings on the walls. Here's another surprise, all these beautiful paintings aren't painting at all. They're mosaics—or some such word. There are thousands of tiny rocks that will remain the same color from

now on, in each one and they've been worked into a painting. You have to get very close to them to tell the difference. When the light shines a certain way, you can see the difference. You can imagine how long it took them to do this.

Now we come to the gold (from here on when I refer to gold you'll take it for granted that I mean solid and pure gold, at least that's the story they told us.) The gold is hung around like moss on an old willow tree. There are statues (they seem to go strong for those things) upon statues. Literally speaking they are all over the place and parts of the ceiling are also made of gold. Of course there is a very special design for the overall effect of the church. There are statues of the different disciples and saints and of Mary and Christ and they along with the mosaics, tell stories of the Bible. However they are a few that are just there because they are so darned good. The one by Michaelangelo of Mary and Jesus when they took Him down from the cross is very good. In fact it is supposed to be about the world's best.

All this is very vague I know but my heart's right. No kidding I'll explain it all when I get there. I just flat can't do it from here.

The weather here has been swell for the past few days—no rain or nothing.  
I've been drawing nearly every night and still I can't manage to get anything to look like anything. I think I told you that I was sending all the drawings and will send them home some of these days. Well I will, if and when I get around to it. You know I lead such a busy life. Well, I'm about to go to sleep and I'm sure you've enjoyed the whole thing immensely and look at the practice I've gotten out of the deal, to say nothing of the fun the censor's had trying to figure it out. Good night folks.



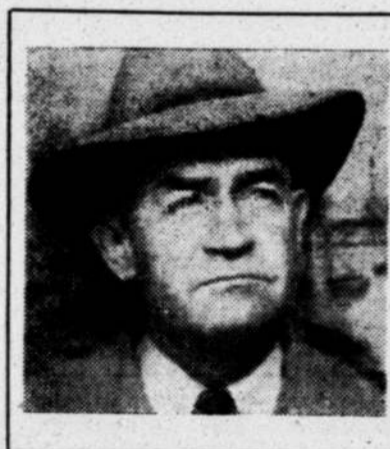

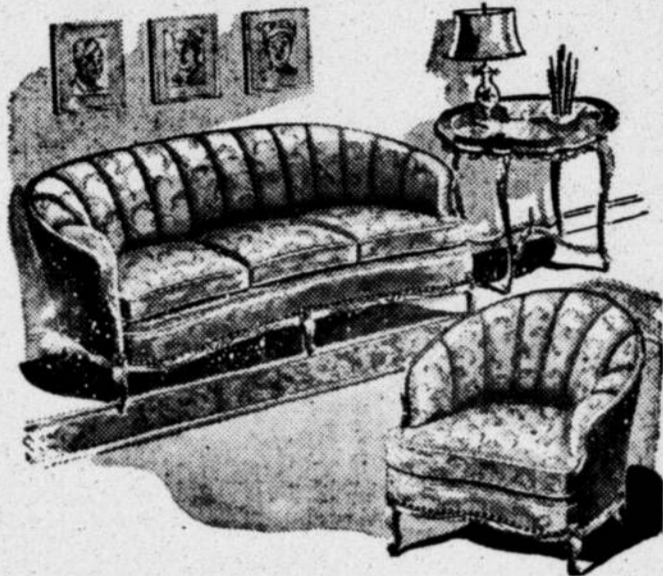

Editor's Note: The letter printed below was received at the Courier Office this week and concerns Judge Louis B. Reeds, who arrived in this city recently to assume duties as District Judge for this area. Until recently, Judge Reeds has been serving in the Field Artillery at a replacement training center at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma. A lieutenant colonel, he has spent 28 years in the military service, either active or reserve. He arrived in this city February 22, after being released into the inactive reserve of the Army.

Dear Sir:  
 The Army has recently suffered the loss of the valuable services of Lieutenant Colonel Louis B. Reeds, FA, in order that he might resume his important duties as a judicial official in your district.

His departure is greatly regretted by all his associates, and his loss will be felt very keenly. Because of his exceptional qualifications his services were of great value in a position in which he had little prospect of promotion. For nearly two years he was my personal adviser on all disciplinary matters which he handled with rare skill and judgment.

He soon earned the high respect of young battery commanders who were in charge of about 250 trainees and 35 instructors. His friendly advice and deep interest in their responsibilities helped them to solve the many problems which arise in handling men that are new to the Army. His fine judgment and experience was an effective influence in assuring a contented command. Every trainee found that his problems were the subject of full and considerate attention. His kindly advice to them and his evident interest in their welfare helped them to realize they were amongst friends. The services of the American Red Cross are versatile, and far reaching.

The Army and Navy see to it that sick and wounded men have the best possible medical care. But there are many other things these men need to speed their recovery—relief from the fears that spring up in sick men's minds, and diversion of their unoccupied hours.

The Red Cross, by agreement with the Army and Navy, sends trained women to hospitals here and overseas to deal with these special needs. Some of them even go on hospital ships to comfort the wounded on their way home.

These Red Cross hospital staffs include social case workers and recreation workers, who work closely with medical officers and nurses. A complete list of all they do would cover pages. But here are a few highlights:

The case workers help the servicemen solve his personal problems, and overcome anxieties connected with his injury or illness. Often she enlists the aid of the Red Cross home chapter in interpreting his condition to his family. Or she may write his letters for him. She sees that he has toilet articles and cigarettes; she arranges a loan if he needs one.

If he is to be discharged because of disability, she assists him with his pension claim, and helps him with his plans for returning to civilian life.

The recreation worker organizes parties and games, movies and entertainments, both in the wards and the recreation room. She tries to keep a wide variety of activities going on, so that men may choose the things they like. And she's sympathetic enough to know when a patient just needs somebody to talk to, or when he'd like to be left alone.

For patients who are up and about, the Red Cross recreation room is a daily gathering place — furnished with lounge chairs, pianos, radios, ping-pong tables, and other home comforts.

At holiday times, recreation workers plan special decorations and parties for the hospital patients.

In domestic hospitals, Gray Lady volunteers from the community are part of the Red Cross staff, assisting case and recreation workers.

W. B. Collins of this city is a director of the Levelland State Bank, and his son, D. E. Collins, is president of the institution.

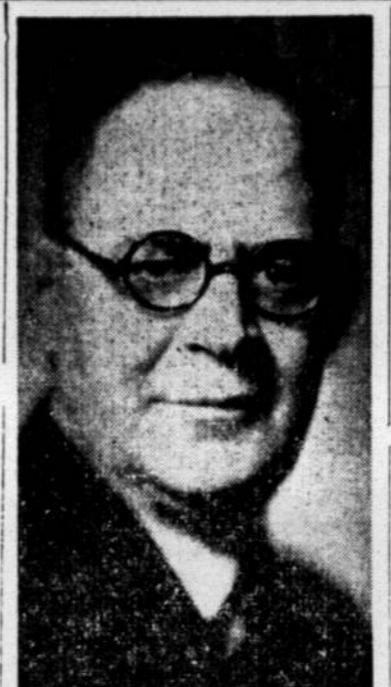
It is reported that a good crowd was present for the opening, and that many flowers were sent for the occasion.

**Salvage Program**

Dawson County's 4,043 families can fill an entire day's medicinal needs of 1,516 battlefield casualties if each home will save one tablespoon of waste kitchen fat. It was estimated today by the nation's largest single collector of this vital war material.

"There are few direct ways a wife, mother or daughter can help safeguard the life of a loved one at the fighting front, and salvaging used fats is one of them," said T. A. Connor, head of a large meat department. "The value of the 1,928,000 pounds salvaged by our customers throughout the nation last year is evident in the fact that a single pound of fat will process about 260 quarts of life-giving blood plasma."

The increased tempo of the war has intensified the need for drugs, ointments and acids to ease pain and lessen mortality among our soldiers as well as for synthetic rubber, protective coatings and other vital war materials in which waste fats figure, Connors pointed out. Further, he said, the OPA has continued its offer of red ration points for each pound of grease turned in at stores.
