

Patriot Boys, Girls Win And Lose

The Prairiland Patriots improved their record to a perfect 4-0 in district play Tuesday night in Paul Pewitt as they defeated the Brahman 63-46.

After jumping out to a quick 21-2 lead in the first quarter, the Patriot victory was never in doubt. Senior Mike Connot led the Patriot scoring attack with 22 points and Scott Scudder followed with 11.

In the Patriot girls game with Paul Pewitt, the Lady Patriots fell to the Brahman 43-37. The loss left the Lady Patriots with a 4-2 record in district play. Jenissa Baker was the high point Lady Patriot with 17 points.

In the first round of the North Lamar Classic played December 20, the Lady Patriots played one of their better games, winning 48-46 over Mt. Pleasant.

The first quarter was nip and tuck all the way. Because both teams were so equally good, the game was destined to be close. Both teams answered each others baskets and Jenissa Baker hit a jumper to put Prairiland in front 10-9 at the end of the first quarter.

In the second quarter, the game was again close, but Mt. Pleasant seemed to be playing even better than they did early in the game. Baker got 6 points in the quarter and Kristi Bankhead made the last shot of the first half, although Prairiland trailed by a score of 27-24.

The third period of play was dominated by the scoring of Baker and Bankhead. Baker put Prairiland out in front 30-29 with 5:49 left in the quarter and after four straight Mt. Pleasant points, Bankhead knotted up the score at 33-33 with a three point play. However, although Baker and Bankhead combined for 11 points in the quarter, a late Mt. Pleasant rally ended the third quarter with Prairiland trailing 39-35.

The final quarter was the best one of the game with both teams using a pressing defense and playing good fundamental basketball. Baker put the Patriots ahead again 43-42 with 3:31 left in the game with another jumper. After four consecutive Mt. Pleasant points, Aaron Morgan cut the lead to 46-45 on a good inside shot. Finally, with 1:46 remaining in the game, Deana Watson stole the ball and made the winning basket for the Patriots putting Prairiland ahead 47-46. Watson later made the final point of the game to give Prairiland an exciting 48-46 win.

As soon as the game was over, Prairiland fans drove across town to watch the Prairiland boys play Sulphur Springs in the Paris Classic.

Like the Lady Patriots, the Patriots won, although they had a somewhat easier time of doing so in winning a 53-38 decision.

In the first half, both teams seemed to be just trying to evaluate the other. In a slow-paced half, neither team could ever shake off the other. However, with six Patriots scoring in the half and Scott Scudder and Joel Ballard shooting high percentage shots, the halftime lead of 26-25 appeared to be much larger.

In the second half, the Patriots began to run on all wheels. With Joseph Whelchel, Craig Burns and Mike Connot controlling the boards and Joel Ballard swishing baskets, the game began to be a runaway. Ballard got 12 of his game high 18 points in the second half as Prairiland went on to win 53-38.

In Saturday's action of the North Lamar Classic final, the Lady Patriots fell to West Lamar-Delmar for the third time of the year as they lost 44-33.

In the first half, the Lady Patriots held the upper hand in the game to surprise a few people. Because of West Lamar-Delmar's earlier wins, many fans only planned to watch the game until it got out of hand, and then go watch the final of the Paris Classic. Fortunately, by using a hustling defense and some Deana Watson magic, the Patriot feds led at the half 21-17.

In the second half, however, the table turned and West Lamar-Delmar

began to gain momentum as well as the lead in the game. West Lamar-Delmar took the lead early in the fourth quarter 30-29. Jenissa Baker then put Prairiland in front with a basket to put Prairiland in a short-lived 31-30 lead. Unfortunately, West Lamar-Delmar outscored the Patriots 13-2 the rest of the game as they went on to win the North Lamar Classic 44-33.

After the girls game, Patriot fans again made the trek across town to

watch the Patriots play the Paris Wildcats in the finals of the Paris Classic. Unfortunately, like the girls, they also lost a close game, losing 53-41.

In the first half, both teams played excellent basketball, although Paris played a tad better. Both teams swapped leads with Prairiland holding a 15-14 lead near the end of the half. However, a late blitz by the Wildcats left Prairiland trailing at intermission.

In the second half, momentum changed with the blowing of the wind. Each team scored in spurts with Scott Scudder doing most of the Patriot scoring. However, when the game got to a footrace near the end of the game, neither Scudder's 15 second half points nor the Patriots fierce determination could stop the Wildcats from taking a 53-41 win.

Scudder was the leading scorer for the Patriots with 21, and Joel Ballard added seven.

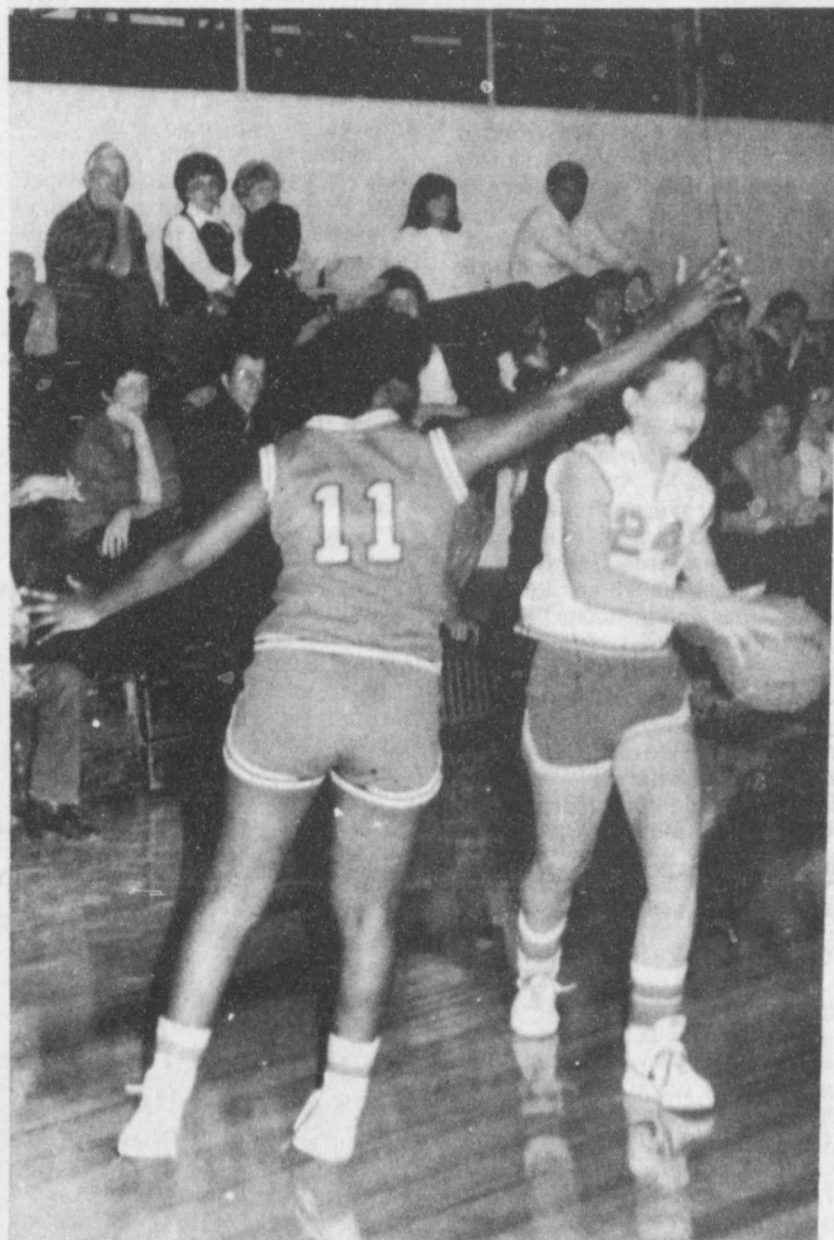

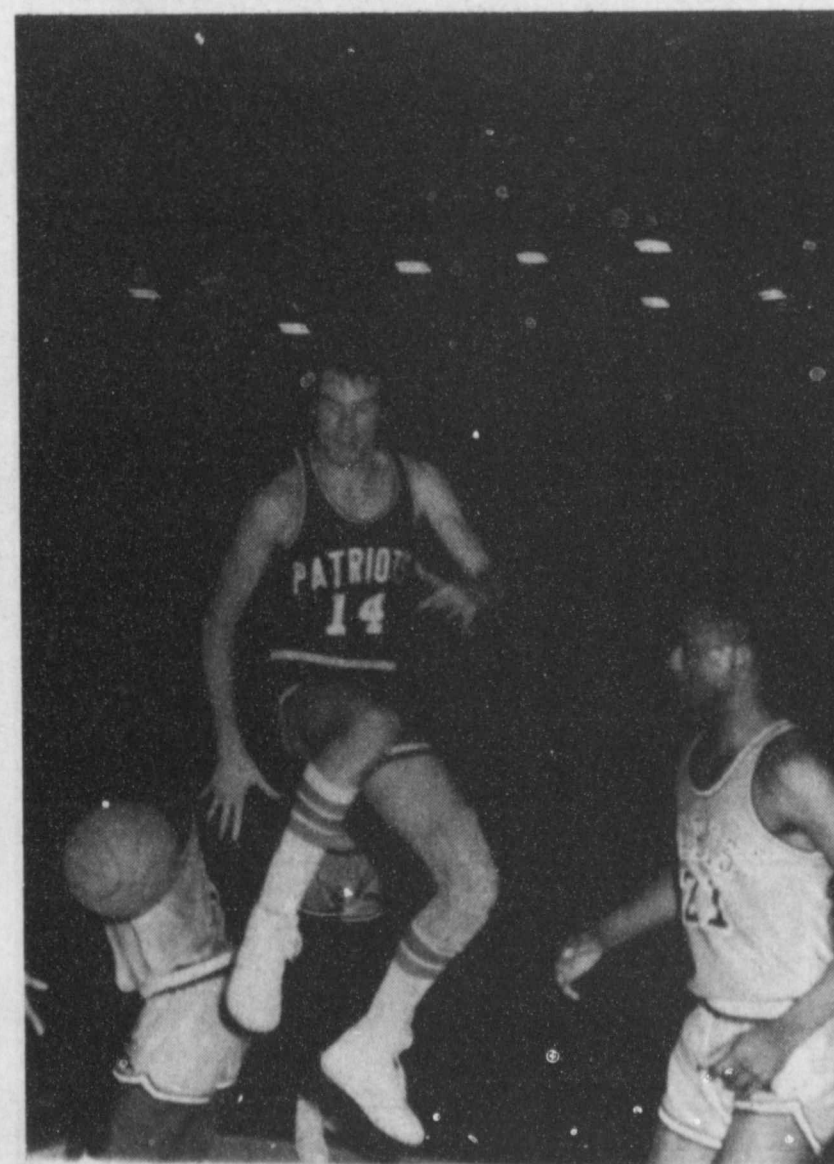

Glynn, Winnie Pearce In Wagon Train

Sesquicentennial-Definition: 150th birthday of Texas; year of the Wagon Train, where 150 wagons, some odd 300 horses and riders and an entourage of support vehicles will leave Sulphur Springs on the morning of January 2, 1986. Among them will be Blossom's own Glynn and Winnie Pearce. They will drive the W.B.A.P. sponsored wagon. Glynn and Winnie will make the complete 3,000 mile trip, picking up winners along the route, that will win a two day wagon ride, complete with all the trimmings, sponsored by W.B.A.P.

Glynn will be driving a team of mules, 12 year old Pat and 7 year old Kit, owned by John Madewell of Blossom. The wagon is also owned by John Madewell. Somewhere along the first of March, Glynn and Winnie will switch over to a team of horses owned by the Pearces. The mules will only be used the first two months because of the bad weather, hopefully, will be behind them and the mules are more adapted for this. The wagon is equipped with a 40-gallon water tank, a butane heater, and a portapotty. All the conveniences of home. At the time of departure, the Pearces

had estimated that they had stored up enough food and provisions for a month. Along the way they will replenish with hay and feed for the mules and food for themselves.

At the end of the day, support vehicles will take each teamster back to the town they left that morning to pick up their camper, RV or whatever and bring them back to the camp they will stay in that night. The first nights stay will be in Como-Pickton, 15 miles outside of Sulphur Springs. Special meals and entertainment will be set up for all people participating in the wagon train. Special buttons were made up and you must wear it to be able to participate in any of the activities. No open fires are allowed in the camps, so each wagon must have a portable unit of some type to cook on. This rule was made because most of the camps are on private property and would be a hazard. As the trip goes on, some people will drop out and others will join, but you must have special permission to join and can only join in before departure in the mornings, not anytime during the day. West Pearce, brother of Glynn, is the Head Camp Jack from Lampasas. He makes sure all campsites are approved and ready that night.

The wagon train is headed by Gary France, Head Wagonmaster, and Walt Garrison of Cowboy fame, is Honorary State Wagon Master. Other Honorary Assistant Wagon Masters are Tom Landry, coach for Dallas Cowboys, Billy Bob Barnett, owner of the famous Billy Bob's, Gib Lewis, Speaker of the House of Texas Representatives and Glen Courson, an Irving businessman.

The Wagon Train will also have its own school. At present there are 28 students enrolled in this "private school" for six months. The Texas Education Agency has and will work closely with the school to assure that the curriculum, textbooks, and instruction comply with TEA guidelines. There are two teachers, Randy Russell of Gainesville, and Susan Venus of Nacogdoches. Administrator and head teacher is Anita Pitchford of Gainesville.

Grass Fires Burn Off Large Areas

The area has been plagued with a number of grass fires, one, near Blossom, which burned off more than 200 acres.

Early on the morning of the following day, Deport and Bogata responded to a call on the Cunningham road, near Highway 37.

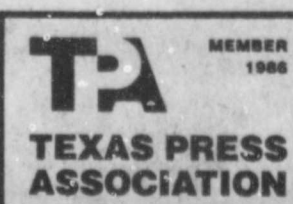
The big grass fire could not be fought, because of the wet ground, and burned through a great deal of wooded ground.

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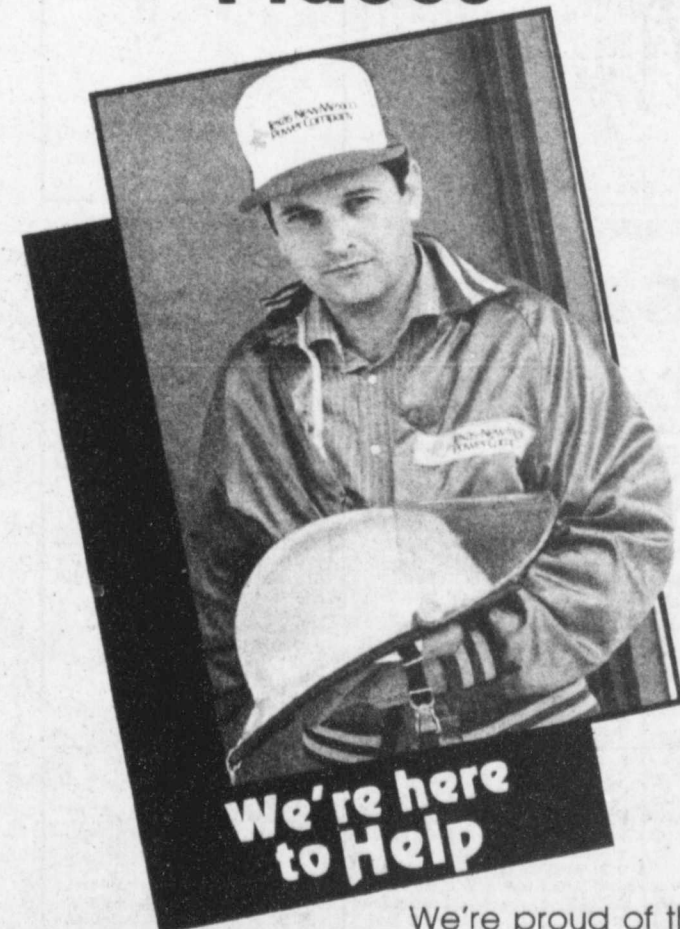

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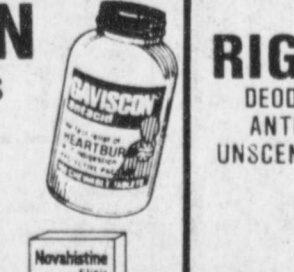

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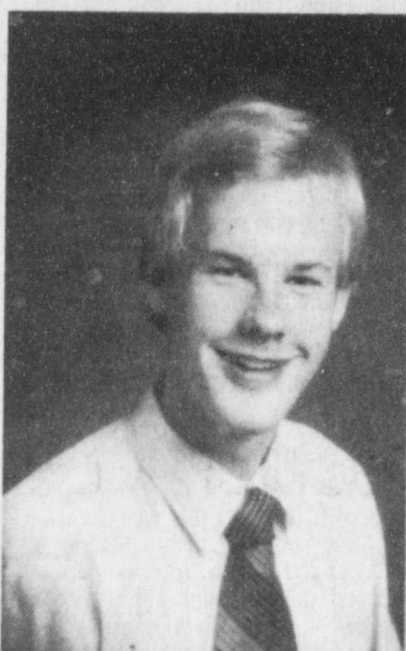

Patriots Defeat Daingerfield

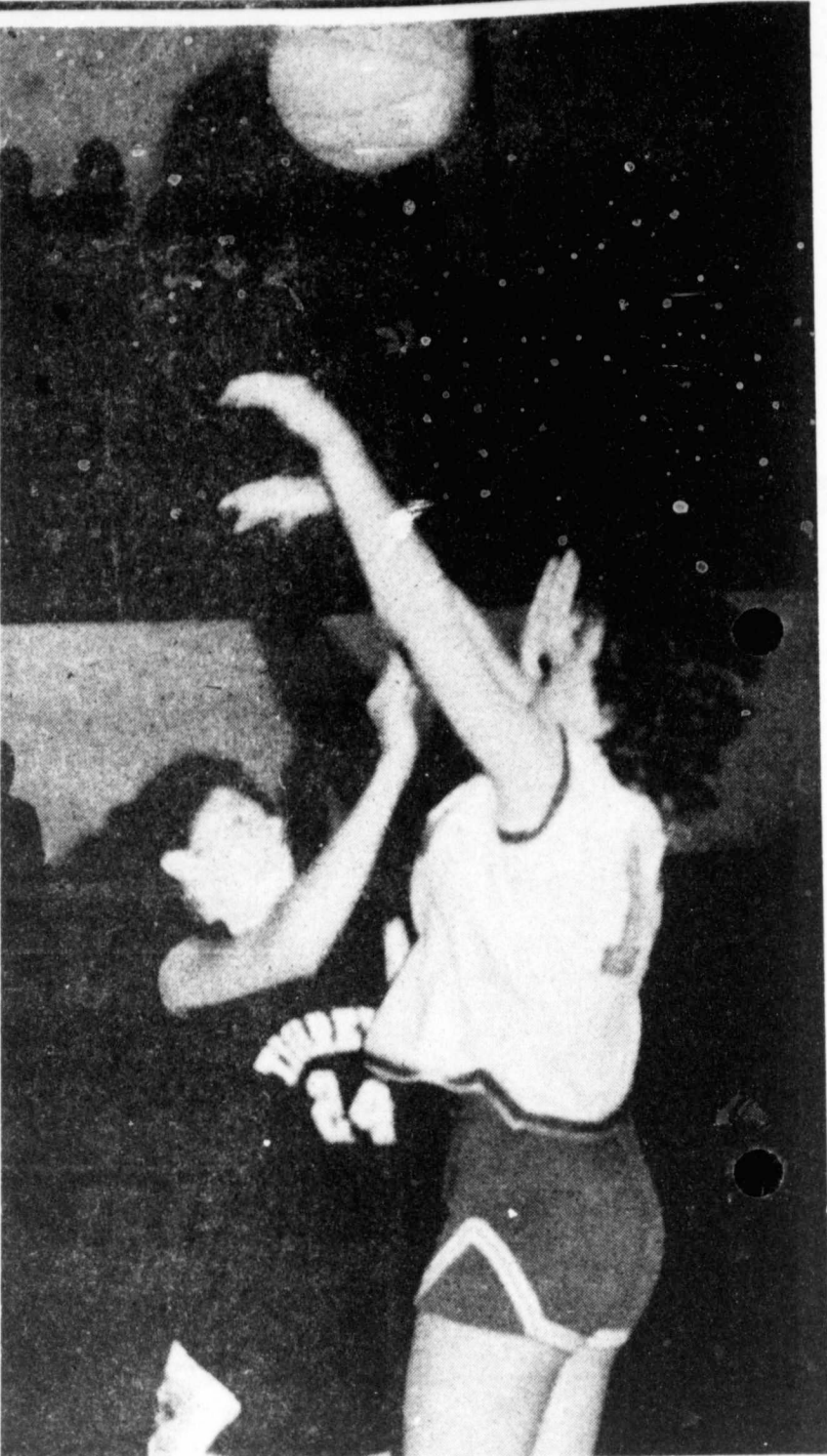
Finally, all the madness was over. New Year's was through, and we had a long gap where we kept the office open for renewal customers, but had a paper out already.

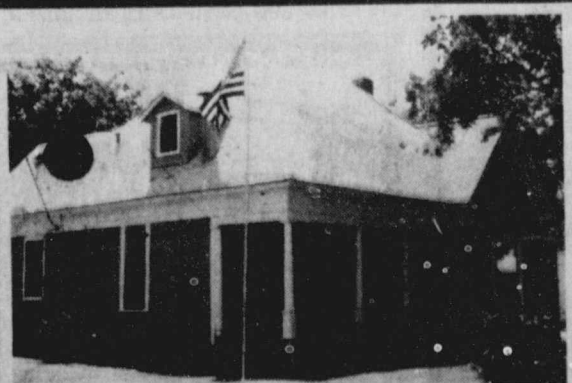
