P.O.W WORKERS ARE NOW ALLOTTED THRU WAR MANPOWER COM.

Requests for prisoner of war labor for agricultural purposes now are channeled to the military authorities thru the War Manpower Commission, Eighth Service Command Headquarters announces.

Under the new procedure which became effective Sept. 17, contract are executed and administered by the military authorities after a certification of need of employment of prisoners of war has been provided by the War Manpower Commission.

Farmers heretofore have made direct requests to commanding officers of Prisoners of War Camp. Now they will apply to authorized representatives of the War Manpower Commission.

These representatives, who will secure the certificates from the WMC will be the county agricultural agents in the states of Louisiana, New Mexico and either the county agents or the U. S. Employment Service offices in Texas, the regional office of the WMC in Dallas announced.

The certificate is furnished by the WMC after the Commission determines that the hiring of POW will not be in competition with free labor, and will not impair wages, working conditions and employment opportunities or displace employed workers.

NEW FSA COMMITTEE IS NAMED ON LOANS

Creation of a new FSA committee of three Coryell county farmers who will have power to approve or disapprove each FSA loan made is announced by Wilburn H. Denham, FSA Supervisor.

Fred Schloeman, Sam Powell and Lloyd Williamson are the 3 new members. George Fritz of Copperas Cove is the alternate.

They will keep a check on all functions of the FSA including the lending and servicing of loans to food production borrowers, rural rehabilitation borrowers, farm ownership borrowers, and farm debt adjustment, water facilities loans, tenure improvement and all other related activities.

A wallet containing \$274 cash was brought to the office of Capt. Frank J. Husband, Jr., Provost Marshall of Camp Bowie Wednesday by Walter Clemons, Rt. 2, Gatesville, who is employed by the Texas Highway Department near Brownwood. Mr. Clemons said he found the wallet about 400 yards inside the west boundary line of Hamilton county on U.S. 84. It was concealed in tall grass bordering the highway.

The wallet contained the photograph and identification cards of Lt. Geo. W. Ashby, formerly stationed at Camp Bowie with a tank destroyer outfit. A receipt for the wallet was tendered Mr. Clemons, who said he regretted that he would have no opportunity to deliver the wallet to its owner.

Cafe Prices Here To Be "Froze" As Of April 4-10

That's what they say, nobody but Mark McGee, OPA Director in Ft. Worth.

The article reads in the Lort Worth Star-Telegram: "A hearing preliminary to 'freezing' restaurant food and drink prices at last April 4-10 levels thruout the 49 county, Ft. Worth district and establishment of dollars-and-cents prices for meals and specified food items served by eating places in McLennan, Bell and Coryell counties will be held here next Thursday (that's in Ft. Worth), District OPA director Mark McGee announced Saturday.

McGee said the hearing is to receive suggestions from members of the industry and others as to any revision of an order drafted tentatively by the district OPA office, and scheduled for issuance Thursday unless reason for change is found. He said the order will go into effect in about 10 days after issuance.

The order will apply to food and beverage prices charged to all eating and drinking establishments in the district, with the omission of beer, which is controlled by a separate ceiling rice order. In most cases, district OPA said, the return to the price level of last April 4-10 will mean a "rollback" of food and beverage prices currently being charged.

The counties of McLennan, Bell and Coryell, in the Camp Hood area, will be under the double restraint of the freeze order and the flat pricing order.

McGee said the tentative order may be modified as a result of suggestions offered at the hearing, but stated that "very definitely a freeze order is going to be issued".

"Food prices of public eating establishments in some places, especially in the area around Camp Hood, have got out of line, he said. "The general tendency thruout the district is toward price increased in food-serving places and has been the subject of numerous public complaints".

It was pointed out that costs of most foods served by restaurants have been brought under price control regulations, leaving little reason for marked rises in the price of food served to customers. Did he ever hear anything about labor costs?

A SUMMARY OF WORLD, NATIONAL AND STATE NEWS

AXIS BALKAN FIELD HIT

Algiers, Oct. 10 (AP).—North-west African air forces uncorked a blistering aerial offensive against the Germans in the Balkans and Aegean area Saturday, with Flying Fortresses and Liberators pounding five big enemy airfields in Greece and Crete, and U. S. Lightnings wiped out 10 Nazi bombers near Rhodes.

HEAVY BOMBERS HIT NAZIS

London, Oct. 11 (AP).—Heavy American bombers made their 3rd successive daylight raid on Germany Sunday by pounding munster, in the northwest sector, less than 24 hours after their record penetration into Poland and East Prussia in which they dealt severe blows to aircraft production and shipping.

YANKS SEIZE 44 MILES OF RIVER FRONT

Algiers, Oct. 10 (AP).—Pushing ahead against 7 German divisions in Italy, the Allied Fifth Army has increased the pressure along a 44 mile water line on the Volturno and Calore Rivers and the Eighth Army has cut one to four miles deeper on the Adriatic flank.

REDS HURL NAZZIS FROM DNIEPER

London, Oct. 10 (AP).—The Red Army has thrown the Germans back out of artillery range of the

west bank of the Dnieper River bridgeheads, Moscow dispatches said Sunday night, while a Soviet communique announced the capture of nearly 200 villages to the north, including one only eleven miles east of Gomel.

JAPS EVACUATE VILA BASE

S. Pac. Oct. 11 (AP).—American forces have occupied Vila, on Kolombangara Island in the central Solomon, the Monday communique said.

FAVORS NATIONAL SALES TAX

Washington, Oct. 10 (AP). — Representative A. Willis Robertson, member of the tax-framing ways and means committee, came out flatly Sunday for a federal retail sales tax, thus assuring a congressional showdown on this levy as a possible substitute for the administrations badly trampled \$10,500,000,000 new revenue program. It's a debacle, not a program.

TRUCK DRIVERS STRIKE

Nashville, Tenn., Oct. 10 (AP). —With more than 3,200 truck drivers and helpers on strike amid indications that others would join them by Monday, motor freight transportation in the mid-South Sunday was virtually paralyzed.

KAI-SHEK CHINA PRESIDENT

Chungking, Oct. 10 (AP).—Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek took the oath of president of China on this 32nd anniversary of the founding of the republic today, and in a speech declared that China's policy was to achieve early establishment of constitutional government and to defeat aggressor nations in co-operation with the United States.

WAKE HARD HIT BY SHIPS. PLANES

Pearl Harbor, Oct. 10 (AP). —Jap positions on Wake Island were smashed heavily and more than 61 enemy planes were destroyed in a 2-day bombing and shelling of Wake's tiny atolls Tuesday and Wednesday, it was announced.

Camp Hood

The first Legion of Merit Medals awarded at the Tank Destroyer Center have been presented to Lt. Charles B. Adkins and Staff Sergeant Joseph B. Woods by Major Gen. Orlando Ward, commanding general, during a review attended by officers and men of the Unit Training Center, headed by Col. Thomas J. Heavey, commanding officer.

Adkins, of Callands, Va., was honored "for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service as motor sergeant of his organization and as motor inspector and sergeant instructor of the Unit Training Center of the Tank Destroyer Command," according to his citation from the president. At the time he was a member of the 93rd Anti-Tank Battalion, later redesignated as the 893rd Tank Destroyer Battalion. Later he was commissioned, and for the past 10 months he has been conducting tests of motor equipment for the Tank Destroyer Board.

Wood's Legion of Merit was for his work in perfecting a sub-caliber device for firing at moving targets. It consists of a special mounting for a rifle on the barrel of a 75 MM gun, and has come into wide use at Camp Hood and at other training centers. Working on his own time, Woods perfected his model from materials he found at scrap and salvage dumps. Before enlisting in the Army, he resided at Cheyenne, Wyo.

The new Legion of Merit medal is awarded members of the armed services for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service. The presentations at Camp Hood are believed to be among the first to be awarded during World War II.

Tank Destroyer soldiers and weapons were viewed last week by Lt. Governor John Lee Smith during his first visit to Camp Hood. He was taken to a battle conditioning course, where he observed trainees "capture" a Nazi village, and was shown a modern tank destroyer in action and methods for knocking out enemy vehicles and personnel at close range. Major Gen. Orlando Ward, commanding general of the Tank Destroyer Center, was host at a luncheon given at the 50th St. Officers' Club and attended by high ranking camp officers.

Fire losses at Camp Hood have amounted to an estimated total of only \$4,107 since July 1, 1943, it was revealed last week. With the hundreds of buildings and millions of square feet of floor space in Camp Hood, this corresponds to an approximate loss per square foot of \$0.000587, far below the usual percentages. Major Ross Beas, camp fire marshal and camp engineer, asserts that "the keynote of keeping fire losses at a minimum is proper inspection to make certain that no fire hazards exists."

Recent camp promotion include those of Lt. Col. Henry M. Smith, camp inspector, from the rank of major; and Major Dorothy Kurtz, principal chief nurse at the Camp Hood station hospital, from capt.

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The only two women licensed by the Texas State Health Department to operate sewage disposal plants are employed at Camp Hood. They are Maxine Akers of

Cameron, 21-year old graduate of Baylor University, and Miss Mildred Mayes, 29, of San Antonio who holds a master's degree from Texas State College for Women. Both are chemists at the two sewage disposal plants.

The two make frequent analysis of sewage at all processing stages in order that other operators may obtain more efficient disposal, and sample water from the Leon River within the Camp Hood reservation and from Nolan Creek between Killeen and Belton. Their work day lasts from eight to four, but three afternoons weekly they take turns at running tests at the North Camp Hood plant. Both women received a grade of 100 following completion of a course on sewage plant operation conducted recently for civilian employees at the plant.

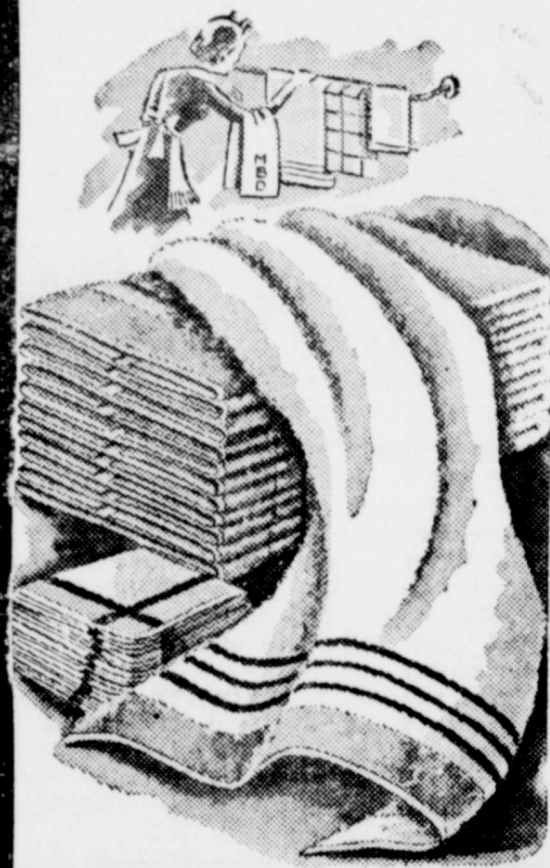

Only the united, unstinted, sustained effort of all the free peoples of the world can avert that outcome. Munitions, ships, guns, and airplanes must be had in limitless quantities, but they are valueless without effective manover. The organization must not be thought of as an end in itself not as just the instrumentality of a number of social agencies."

"It is, rather, a civilian arm of the American Government and a representative body through which the American people can support our fighting forces," he said. "The officers and staff of the USO regard themselves merely as agents of the American people."

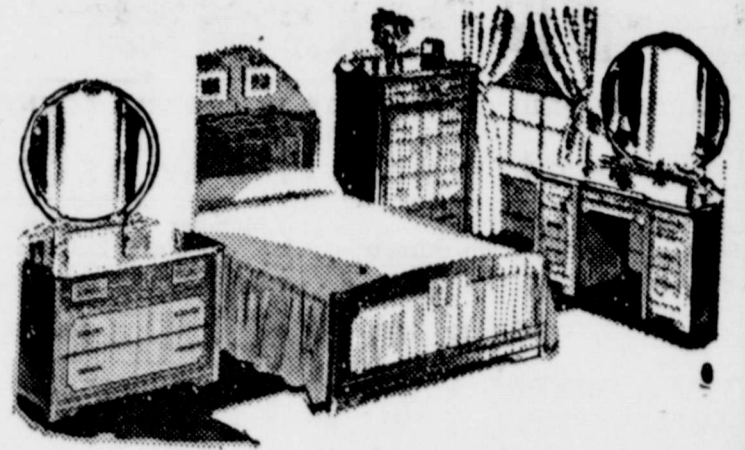

Dear Friends:

It was mighty fine to be at home for the past two months. That seems like a long time, but there were so many friends who wanted to see us and so many problems to consider and so many places to go that it was impossible to do all the things we wanted to do. Nevertheless, we enjoyed the opportunity of meeting as many of our friends as we did. I believe that our time was well spent as I know that it is impossible to "represent" a district unless the "representative" maintains constant contact with the district and its people. Mrs. Poage and I got back

to Washington on Monday (Sept. 13), the day before Congress convened. I believe that the entire Congress will be more truly representative as a result of the opportunity which the Members had to visit at home. I want to personally thank the people of Central Texas for the many courtesies they extended to us. I still think I represent the finest people in the United States.

The session has been a little slow getting under way, but we seem to be headed into some hot fights on some vital issues. The President's message was read this afternoon (Sept. 17th). I thought it was a fine report of excellent progress of the war. We can all be proud of our military effort. Especially can Texans be proud of the record of our own Texas boys in the fighting in Italy. A substantial part of the gallant Fifth Army was made up of Texas National Guard Units. I am sure that Texans at home will remember their heroism when they determine the amount they are going to invest in war bonds.

The question of the draft of fathers is the subject of much discussion, but as I see it, the House has long ago expressed its view and taken proper action, by the passage of the Kilday Bill. This bill which was passed by a substantial vote last spring provides that fathers may not be drafted in any state until all eligible single men have been called. I voted for this bill. I think it is fair. I think that it would be much better if the Senate would go on and pass this bill than to become engaged in a fight over the Wheeler Bill which prohibits the drafting of fathers regardless of the need of our armed forces. I don't think fathers should be called until eligible single men are exhausted, and I don't think that any more men, married or single, should be drafted than are absolutely needed; but I would not be willing to say that I would not call every man, grandfather if necessary to supply the number actually needed to win the war.

Finally the question of using bond money to pay food subsidies is sure to be up again as is the question of increased taxes and forced savings (compulsory bond purchases). I have discussed these problems rather fully with the people of Central Texas during the past weeks. I am still convinced that farm products should be al-

lowed to bring enough to make their production profitable to the farmer and that those of us who eat the food should pay for it now while income is high rather than to try to pay part of our grocery bill out of public funds derived from the sale of bonds that will have to be paid with interest by the very boys who have fought this war. I still believe that the way to prevent inflation is to meet the issue squarely and to reduce or postpone purchasing power until such time (after the war) as we can increase the supply of things people want to purchase. The simple way to postponing purchasing power is to increase taxes now and to require the investment of income in bonds. Every dollar of taxes paid now means two or three dollars that tax payers will not have to pay after the war as the interest always doubles or triples the cost of government expenditures made on borrowed money, and every dollar invested in bonds today help to restrain inflation now and at the same time assures the bond buyer of the ability to buy goods at a later day when he will probably get lots more for his money.

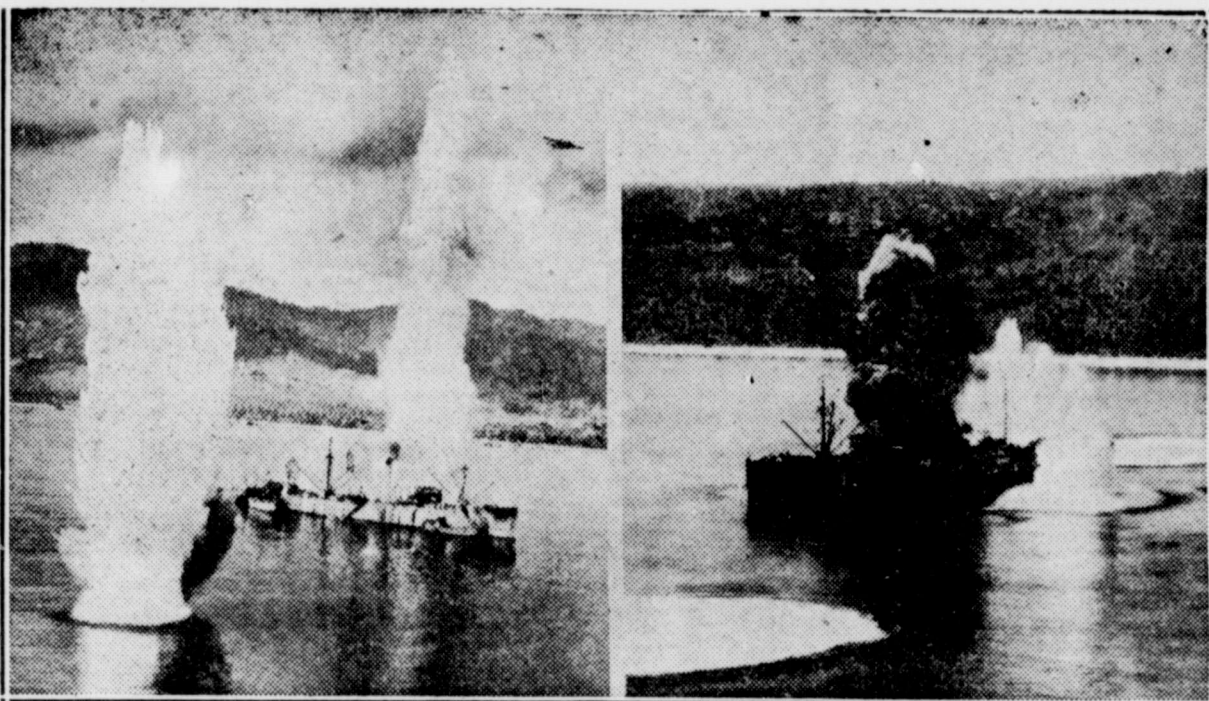

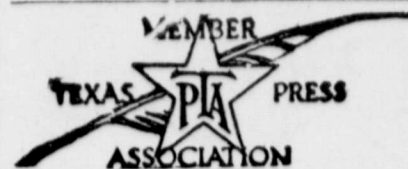

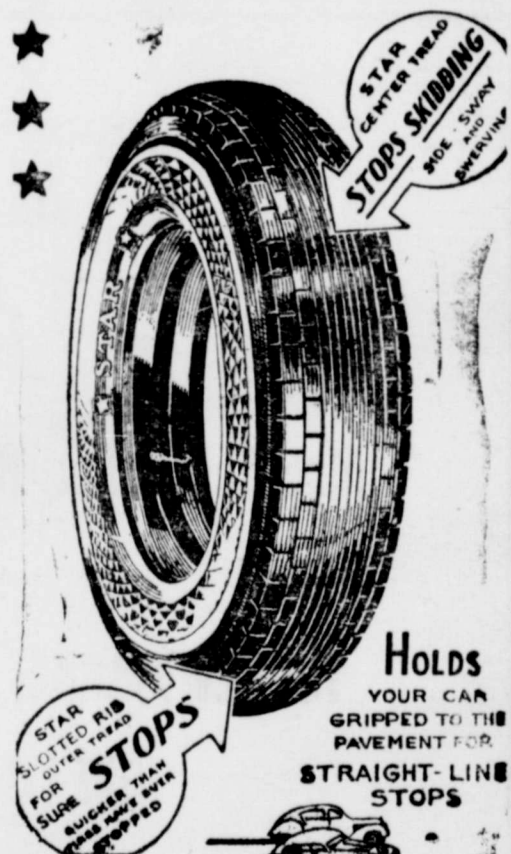

Hornets Open Conference With Trojans; Too Easy Win 39-0

Gatesville high school Hornets are still battling 1000 per cent as a result of their Friday night win over the luckless West high school Trojans, who presented little competition, since the Hornet "B" squad rolled up two of the touchdowns.

Either the Hornet machine had too much, or the Trojans had too little, and you can take it either way you like. A hard game for the Hornets would have shown them up worse than they showed Friday night. They have a lot of rough points to knock off before the final whistle blows in conference competition, if they are to come out on top of the heap, which they should.

Stands were practically full, and that somebody that leads the band must have done a swell job because they're well above the last year's end of the season performance. That band's good, and we're no authority. Then those three Pep Squad leaders look like a machine from the starboard side of the gridiron, and those vaudeville performing baton lassies can show some of the colleges a few tricks, and that's not bragging. Lots of college towns would blow awfully hard about a band and pep squad like we've got in this "little" old high school.

But, you thought we were going to talk about a football game, and we are. That "Lightfoot-Lengefeld" don't have to be in long to register. On 2 plays, he made 2 touchdowns, or thereabouts, on a 45 yd. canter, and another nice run. His blocking, featuring Edwards looked like the real stuff. The "B's" got in for some good football, and they even changed and gave the liners a chance, running Edwards, Gartman, and some of the other boys with the ball, and Morgan "brained" the club, pushing them over for a touch. Gandy did his stuff, but had a little more competition. Can't mention them all, but Fry was outstanding on defense, snagging a number of interceptions and those wings, Williams and Whittenburg registered, as did Tatum. Doggone it, when you begin to calling names, you just might as well go from end to end and from back to back, and then clear down to the water boy, who yet, is unnamed. It was a nice

performance, generally, but boys, it was easy beside the rest. Better get hep, and do some hard work—it isn't in the bag not by a long shot yet.

Hornets receive, West kicks, Hornets defending S. goal. Winkler kicks, Snelson holds, ball goes to Gartman on the 46, returns to 47, on a very poor kick.

Boynton passes to Voss and he kicks up 9 yards. Boynton takes temporarily fumbles, recovers for no gain. Deavers takes over RT. and makes 1st D. Ball now on 39 yd line. Boynton passes, intercepted by H. Snokhouse, ball on the 35 yd. line. He returns 3 after interception.

Snelson carries over LT for 3 yds. Winkler passes to Holacek, making 8 yards and 1st D. H. Snokhouse out, with injured hand. McCoy in at C. Winkler hits Hornets first defence for none. Triple hand-off, and Holacek picks up 3, but there's a penalty. Hornets get 5 lost off side. Snelson to somebody, and he fumbles, and referee ruled whistle blew before but, nevertheless the Hornets lose 5, and it may be 1st D. And it is.

Laxson, attempting to pass is thrown for 5 yard loss, when he sees no receiver. 14 for a 1st D. Winkler don't get started when thrown by Edwards for a 2 yard loss.

Handback to Snelson, drops 8 yds. more for them, and it looks like the Hornets have woken up, finally. Spread formation, and Winkler kicks high and it is killed by Adams on the 35 yd. line. Kicked from about his own 40.

Boynton hits C. for 4 pds. Voss carries at RT., and makes 3 yds. Deavers carries making 3. Half yard needed for 1st D. They kick, Henderson kicking, and it goes out on about the 42. West's. H. Snokhouse goes back in, McCoy hits side line.

Snelson is handed ball, and take it for 1 yd. loss. Laxson spins with ball, but loses another yard. Winkler kicks a wobbly kick to Voss on the 13, returns to the 35, laterals to Fry, and he carries to the 52 yd. line as the quarter ends.

2nd Quarter
Lengefeld for Henderson. Lengefeld takes ball and goes around R.E. taking the ball to the 20 yd. line for a 28 end run, and a 1st D. Deavers on a hand-off cross back, runs over standing up with nobody around, 2 20 yd. gallop. Boynton takes over for extra at RT. GHS 7, WHS 0.

Hornets kick, Whittenburg kicks Lengefeld kicks, and it goes to Laxson on the 22, and he returns to the 37 yd. line. Laxson passes, intercepted by Williams on the 45 yard line, Trojan's. Adams out Coffee in.

Lengefeld runs it over from the 45 with Edwards doing a lot of clearing by Edwards, who layed 'em low, so Lenge could go over on a beautiful run, untouched. On a hand-off, the ball is fumbled, and they fail to make the extra. GV. 13, West 0. Laxson out, Swinscoe in.

Hornets, ball goes to 25 to Coffee, and he returns to 12 yds. to the 38. Swinscoe carries, but lose 1 yd. Adams back. Swinscoe takes ball, trying to pass is swarmed for 4 or 5 yds gone. Winkler gets off nice kick from 35 to the 35 to Lengefeld and he returns to the 38. Taylor for Freund.

Adams stops Deavers for 2 yd. only at LE. Lengefeld takes from 50 and laterals to Gartman after he'd already made about 25 yds. Ball now on 20 yd. line. Trojans lose 5 for holding, putting it on the 18. Henderson for Boynton. Lengefeld over RG. makes 1. Voss dodging two tackles, carries ball to 10 yd. line before being stopped, Good for 1st. D. Boynton for Lengefeld. Henderson passes, is knocked down by Swinscoe. Deavers takes, picks up 4 yds. around RT. Deavers, thru nice hole over RT., makes 6 more. Whittenburg kicks, Boynton holds, and is good. GV. 20 West 0.

Entire Hornet "B" squad goes in. Winkler out, Gandy, Powell, Sullivan, Tatum, Fry in. Ball goes to Coffee, and he returns to the 36 yd. line. Somebody was off-side on the kick-off, West off side and they kick from the 45 instead of 40. Powell in, Weaver, Painter Potts. They kick out on the 35. Tatum kicking. Bone, Yows, and Brown are in.

On fake reverse, Swinscoe loses 2 yds. Swinscoe passes incomplete. Winkler kicks low and wobbly, and rolls out on the 43 in the Hornet end of the field.

Painter passes to Yows, good for 1st D. and 11 yds. Pustevosky replaces Adams. Laxson for Swinscoe. Trojans lose.

Painter to Weaver, pass, picking up another 9 yds. and 1 yd. for 1st D. but Hornets lose 5. Gandy carried for no gain. Weaver takes it from Gandy, and to the 25 yd. line on a beautiful run, and 27 yds. Painter passes too long to Sullivan. Murphy in for Ruzeka. Gandy carries but loses 2 at RE., as H. Snokhouse is dazed. McCoy for Snokhouse. Hornets lose 15, for something. Painter passes too long, Powell out, Coskrey in. Another enalty against Hornets. Painter's just throwing his arm away. Yows couldn't get there. Painter, faking pass, makes 8 yds. The half is over. GV. 20 W. 0.

3rd Quarter

Here we go again! Hornets kick, ball to 20 to 49, and ball is returned to 35. Fumble in the backfield, and Hornets recover on the Trojan's 30. Voss carries, taking to the 24, 6 yds. Voss to deavers, and the Trojans get their defense working. He makes 2. Boynton passes nicely to Whittenburg and they make a 1st D. putting ball on the 12 yard line. Miscue from C., and Boynton recovers for a 15 yd. loss. Winkler in Pustevosky in. Boynton fades to pass, runs, and doesn't gain. Boynton runs wide, and carries for 7 yds. ball on 17 yd. line. Voss carries, and takes to 4 yd. line, a 11 yard canter, and ball goes over.

Adams in, Busby out. Trojan's ball. Taylor in, Freund out. Winkler punts to Voss on the 40 and he is still going, but he ran out on the 17 yard line.

Hand-off, Henderson makes 4. Ball on 11. Boynton fumbles again, and he loses what we got. Deavers carries over RT. for 4. Voss carries, stumbles and loses some, but it doesn't mater, Trojans take over.

Trojans lose 5 for too many times out. They pile up and don't go, Laxson carrying, loses 3. Winkler kicks, from 10, to the 42, taken by Voss and he carries to the 14, where he is run out of bounds.

Boynton out, Lengefeld in. Murphy in, Ruzeka out. Voss took it for 3. Henderson to Lengefeld, pass, incomplete. Deavers run thru a big bone on left side for a touchdown. GV. 26, West 0. They kick and isn't good.

Fruene, Busby, and Swenscoe in, replacing Laxson, Taylor and Murphy. Third quarter ends.

4th Quarter

Coskrey for Whittenburg. Hornets kick to Snelson, stopped by Edwards. Trojans lose 5. They pass to Halasek, incomplete. Winkler passing. Winkler kicks high, taken by Lengefeld and he is downed in his tracks on the 45 yd. line.

Somebody did something and it was the Hornets, off side. Boynton in, Henderson out. They pass, Fry intercepts, laterals to Williams,

but it is nogo. Ball on 22 yard line. Lenge over RT takes ball to 15, 7 yds. Deavers to Lengefeld takes over LG to the 3 yd. line. Boynton goes over C. for the pay dirt. GV. 32, W. 0. Extra point good, GV. 33, W. 0, Deavers carries.

All new but Williams and Fry. Kick end over end, goes to 27, taken by Swinscoe to 33. Swinscoe passes, knocked down by Williams. Potts throws them for 4 yd. loss. Swinscoe passes to Archer, incomplete. Winkler punts ball to Gandy on the 40. he returns 7 yards before being downed to the 46.

Trojans lose 5 more for too much time. Morgan in, Powell out. Painter passes to Yows, complete for 12 yards and 1st D. Painter passes to Weaver and it scooted out of his arms. Gandy carries over RT for 2. Painter takes ball fades and then runs, taking to the 26 before he is stopped, making a 1st down, 10 yards. Gandy over R.T., makes 7 yards.

Gandy to Weaver, takes it on the 8 yard line, a first down. Gandy makes long R. end run for touchdown. GV. 39, West 0. Kick hits goal post, and it's no good. GV. 39, W. 0.

Shock troops go back in. Hornets kick, ball to Tatum, kicks, stopped by a lineman, and recovered by West. Ball on 46. Swinscoe passes

intercepted by Fry, ball now on Trojan 49 yd. line. 1 minute to go.

Edwards carries ball, jicking up 6 yds. Gartman carries ball and is running to the 16 yd. line for a beautiful run. Ball on 16 yd. line. Edwards who's got plenty ower, takes on to the 10 yd. line. A little slow in the backfield, and they lose 2 yards. Edwards trying to pass, loses 5 yards when swamped. Edwards takes back to 10 yard line, and Trojans take over on downs. They make a play. Holace takes the ball for 4. The game's over.

This camp was supposed to have been just a resting-up place or rather a short vacation from the regular army routine, but I've been here over a month now and it looks like I'll be here another month or so.

This isn't a training camp so all there is to do is KP and guard duty, and a little detail work, if you happen to be the unlucky one.

At present, I am working with the Colonel helping him with his twice-daily inspection of the Regimental Area, etc. Now, don't get me wrong—I just drive him around while he does the inspecting. Anyway, what I intended to say was that I'm not only talking it easy, but am gaining back fast some of that 25 pounds I lost during my basic training.

I just received the Sept. 24 is-

sue of your paper today and it reminded me to have you change my mailing address. It traveled quite a ways before I finally got it—Wyoming and then Pennsylvania. RENT ADMINISTRATOR HAVE SOMETHING TO SAY

The OPA thru the Temple-Killeen Defense Rental Area Office, announces it has amended the provisions of the Rent Regulation for Housing to permit bona fide purchase of housing accommodations with a down payment of 20 percent to the purchase price instead of the previous one-third required.

Tenants will continue to be protected under the requirement of a three months' notice before eviction.

If the OPA finds the liberalized procedure does not afford proper protection to conform with the Rent Control Act, it will be necessary to go back to the original one-third.

Here's another:

In an amendment to the Rent Regulation for Housing, effective Oct. 1, if a landlord fails to file a registration statement on a housing unit within the time specified, which is within 30 days after first renting the unit, the rent received will be subject to a refund to the tenant or any amount in excess of the maximum rent to be later fixed by an order from the area rent office.
