Bosque Watershed Hearing at Tuesday at Stephenville

The most important meeting of the Bosque Watershed Association will be held Tuesday afternoon at the court room in Stephenville, when members of the Water Board will hold a hearing at that time.

The purpose of the hearing will be to establish a priority for the Bosque project, and the outcome of the hearing will determine when the project will actually commence on the proposed detention dams.

The meeting has been set for 2:30 p.m.

Members of the Bosque Association point out that water board members will consider the importance of the local project, compared to others in the state, and will definitely take into consideration the desire of landowners and individuals in this area to go through with the program.

A place high on the priority list is expected, due mainly to efforts of local leaders and soil conservationists in the area in securing a large percentage of landowner's signatures on conservation agreements. Between 70 and 80 per cent of all landowners in the district have signed the agreements.

Leaders in the Hico area are urging a strong delegation of businessmen, farmers, ranchers, and individuals interested in the program, to make the trip to Stephenville Tuesday and lend support to the program.

Fire Destroys 1,000 Bales of Hay

School Bells To Ring Tuesday For Fall Term

Hico Public Schools will open for the 1957-58 term, Tuesday, September 3 at 9:00 a.m. The following information was compiled by Superintendent O. C. Cook, and gives timely information about the faculty and other data on the local plant.

Pre-registration for High School students will begin Friday and Saturday, August 30 and 31. All elementary students will enroll Tuesday, September 3.

Children entering school for the first time must present a birth certificate upon registering. A child must be 6 years of age, on or before the first day of September to enroll.

The lunchroom will begin serving meals Tuesday, Sept. 3. Prices for lunches will be twenty cents for children from first grade through third grade, and twenty-five cents for fourth grade through high school. Lunches include meat,

two vegetables, salad, two one-half pints of milk, and dessert. Children may eat in the lunchroom, bring their lunch or go to their homes.

Improvements.

All buildings have been cleaned and made ready for the coming year. The gym floor has been re-laid to take care of the new ruling in basketball. School colors were used and all the floor refinished with a shining coat of floor finish. Some repairs in the high school include redecoration of offices. Also halls and rest rooms have been freshly painted, etc.

The elementary building is spic and span. All floors have been waxed and polished and all desks have received a fresh coat of gym finish which keeps them like new. Two large fans have been installed in the dining room of the cafeteria. The dressing rooms in the football fieldhouse have also been rearranged with new lockers and

other equipment added. Repairs have been made in 1957 equipment and some new uniforms purchased.

New Bus.

One new 48-passenger bus has been purchased and will be used as an extra.

Buses will make their regular run Tuesday, Sept. 3. A general assembly will be held at 9:00 a.m. in the high school auditorium. High School classes will have a short period. Elementary students will go to their home rooms to be enrolled. The buses will leave at 2:30 p.m.

Single-Crop Experiment Pays Off At Tarleton State

A single-crop system has been developed at Tarleton State College to meet drought conditions. Raeford Evans, a graduate agronomist of Texas A. & M. College, saw the need of a suitable forage program when he was employed as Farm Manager of the Tarleton Farm a few years ago. Evans knew that moisture was a limiting factor in the Tarleton College and Erath County area. He quickly surveyed the situation and devised the following plan: Plants early to take advantage of spring rains, and does not grow a winter cover-crop which would use all the available moisture. Evans submitted his ideas to J. W. Autry, head of the agriculture division of Tarleton College for approval. Autry was skeptical at first, but he soon gave his approval of the plan.

The first year of the new plan did not work as Evans had hoped. The weather was dry, and subsoil moisture was very limited. Nevertheless, Evans, the farm manager, was able to put-up several tons of silage and several bales of hay. He was unhappy about his yields at first, but after inquiring in various parts of the county, he soon

realized he was more successful than he thought.

The second year of the new plan was successful from the beginning. Enough moisture was available for plowing in January and February. Evans plowed the land with a one-way then with a chisel-plow. When he finished plowing the land the second time, good rains put suitable moisture in the ground.

About April 1st, Evans planted sudan and red top cane. Evans says that early planting is essential. A farmer in the Erath County and Tarleton College area must take advantage of spring rains. If possible, Evans advises farmers to plow early and be ready for the spring rains when they come. Of course, the sudan was used for hay and red top cane was used for silage.

Currently, Evans reports 300 tons of silage and 5000 bales of hay made at the Tarleton farm this year. The 5000 bales of hay was produced from 100 acres of sudan and the silage was produced from about 50 acres of Red Top Cane. Evans has not purchased any grass hay for several years. "In fact," said Evans, "we have 55 dairy animals, 38 beef animals, 100 sheep, and 70 goats, and we raise enough hay and silage to feed them all, except for a few bales of legume

hay. Nevertheless, we still grow 99 per cent of the hay and silage, even during the dry years, for our livestock," said Evans. Also, Evans is of the strong opinion that a one crop program, as described here, is the most dependable of any type of forage program for the Erath area. However, a farmer may be hampered because of limited amount of land in some cases.

For a winter forage, Evans uses oats in combination with peas and vetch. However, as previously stated, he does not plant the winter crop on the same land that he is planning to use for the summer crop.

Since the single-crop system is proving adequate at Tarleton College Farm, it might prove satisfactory for dairymen in the surrounding area. The Erath County dairy committee decided long ago that an adequate forage program is needed in this area. Thus, it might prove worthwhile to follow Tarleton College practices.

Other employees of the Tarleton Farm besides Evans includes Junior McNeil, dairyman, L. O. Elston, asst. dairyman, W. E. Gage, farm operator, Ben Bolling, herdman, and Cecil Lee, utility man.

IT HAPPENED HERE OR NEAR—

Old Geography Reveals Interesting Facts of Area

So you like "Jargafy," eh? Well, so do I. It has always intrigued me. So when our soldier boy sent "Modern Geography" in is big letter I took to it like a duck to the front yard after a heavy rain. "Modern Geography" is in big letters on the front cover. And it was really Modern when it appeared with its fresh copper-plate maps in the year 1864, just seven years less than a hundred.

Here is a map of Texas on Page 46, along with maps of Louisiana and Arkansas. What it shows is illuminating, and in like manner what it does not show is surprising. For example, here is shown Stephenville southwest of Worth— not Fort Worth, as it is today. Then a bit southwest of Stephenville is shown Cora. And nothing west or southwest of Cora is shown but a number of forts: Ft. McKavett, Ft. Mason, Ft. Terrell, Ft. Clark, Ft. Duncan, and westward appears Ft. Davis, Ft. Leaton, Ft. Quitman, but not another town west or southwest of Cora until one gets to San Elizario and El Paso right in the extreme west end of the state. Ft. Chadbourne and Ft. Phantom Hill are shown north

and northwest of Cora. Places that are not shown: Brownwood, San Angelo, Abilene, Midland, Pecos, and all that multitude of prosperous and populous towns that now are in that region.

And what of Cora? Some years ago a story appeared in the Star-Telegram about Cora, the one-time county seat, or maybe just the administrative center of what is now Comanche County. It was located in the general vicinity of where Gustine is now, though Gustine is not the successor of Cora. When I first saw the map and spied Cora, I imagined it was that ancient stage stop and post office known as Harpers Mill, about two miles southwest of Alexander, where Cleon Carr and his good wife Burl and their three boys now live. But when I interviewed Postmaster Munroe at Alexander, who was born right near that pioneer post office, Harper's Mill, we decided Cora was that ancient capital of Comanche County.

Bob Jenkins and Artie Payne and the two youngest of the kids came by Saturday last as they returned from their vacation in Wyoming. Which reminded me that this old geography does not show Wyoming and Montana at all, but the territory they now occupy was then all a part of Idaho. The state of Dakota was shown, which later was changed to North Dakota and South Dakota.

One of the surprising things of the map of Texas is that it shows Hamilton fully a hundred miles southwest of Stephenville, and southeast of San Saba, while it is southwest of Belton. Lampasas is not shown. What is now Cleburne is shown as Wardville. There is a Wardville street in Cleburne now. But Meridian, Gatesville and Waco are shown.

Railroads shown are one running from Houston to Beaumont and then down to Sabine City. Another runs from Galveston to Houston and up to Washington on the Brazos, and a branch line from Hempstead to Brenham, while still a third one is shown running from

Harrisburg, which is now a part of Houston, out to Richmond, and thence up the Colorado River to La Grange and Bastrop to Austin. The map shows Indianola on Matagorda Bay, south of Victoria. Once upon a time in the twenties, I spent a night at that place and went floundering a good part of the night and never got as tired in all my life before or since.

It lists the population of America at that time as twenty million. Some of the city populations look like this: New York, 3,655,551; Philadelphia 562,520; Brooklyn 206,661; Baltimore 212,418; Boston 177,812. Those were the top five cities in the United States. Chicago had 109,102 at that time.

Looks like we have grown quite a bit in a hundred years. This old Geography is in the Jeff Lawson Museum.

HOW TO JUDGE A WITNESS

As a juror you are a judge of the evidence presented at a trial. In order to reach a proper verdict, you have to decide what to believe and what not to believe. One person can't believe two diametrically opposed statements.

But alas, there is no fool-proof way to sift out the true from the false. Lacking a surefire truth detector, our jury system is the best method yet found.

So the jurors must consider the factors affecting the witnesses' credibility so far as the evidence discloses them—age, education, work, or looks and conduct on the witness stand, relationships between the witness and the parties; stakes in the trial's outcome; bias, if it appears; the strength of the witness' memory; the chances they had to see, hear, and know what they have testified to; their candor; the reasonableness of their testimony.

Witnesses often differ in details due to their different opportunities or powers to observe, or their memory of what they saw, heard, or did. In view of these differences try to reconcile gaps when you reasonably can.

Consider why a witness may make untrue statements: Is it because of confusion, nervousness, mistakes, poor memory, thoughtlessness, lack of intelligence, or evil intent?

The law assumes that the common sense and experience of twelve men will be more reliable than that of only one, in finding the truth among the statements offered by witnesses in a trial. The conclusions of the twelve jurors will be safer and wiser because of the broad background of education, age, profession, and experience brought to bear on disputed matters.

On the Home Range

PREPARE FABRIC BEFORE CUTTING

Lovely fall fabrics now are available for every type of garment. Read labels carefully and prepare fabric properly before cutting.

Look for labels that state shrinkage control. If sanforized or guaranteed not to shrink more than 2 per cent, additional shrinkage is not necessary.

Check the grain of the fabrics before cutting. Correct grain line insures proper hang and drape of garment. During weaving, warp yarns are parallel to each other and so are filling yarns. The one set of yarns is at right angles to the other set. By the time fabrics are purchased in the store, one or more of these conditions may have been changed. Yarns may have been pulled or stretched "off grain" in the handling process.

To check:

1. Straighten each end of fabric by pulling thread or tearing.
2. Fold fabric lengthwise with selvages together.
3. Lay folded fabric on flat table.
4. If crosswise yarns are on the diagonal, stretch in place by carefully pulling on the true bias. If after stretching, the grain of fabric is on the diagonal it should be steam pressed or dampened, dried and pressed so the grain will return to its correct position.

Hatch Act to Be Investigated By Congress House Committee

Congressman Omar Burleson, Chairman of the Committee on House Administration, this week announced plans to form a special subcommittee to look into the Hatch Act and related laws pertaining to federal elections.

Mr. Burleson said, "The Hatch Act was passed some 18 years ago when there was a tremendous Federal Public Works Program underway, and has never been revised to meet changing conditions. The law was originally designed to protect employees of the Government from political pressures of officials and, at the same time, protect Government from greater bureaucratic control through those employees, but has since become outmoded. Many agencies have varying interpretations of the Act, which creates confusion. The idea of the Federal Government restricting the political activities of our state and local employees, who are

under the provisions of the Hatch Act, is extremely anomalous. The difficulty in enforcement of the Act displays its weaknesses, and the penalty features are vicious.

"Few persons realize just how far the Hatch Act reaches into the state and local domain. All state and local employees whose salaries are derived in part from federal funds are under the restrictions of the Hatch Act. Employee organizations, federal officials, and even the Civil Service Commission which is charged with administering the Hatch Act, recognize the need for adjustments.

"The principal objective of the study is to inaugurate changes which will insure the greatest possible freedom of political activity to the greatest possible number of persons whose political activities are now restricted, consistent with the preservation of governmental efficiency and impartiality," the Congressman concluded.

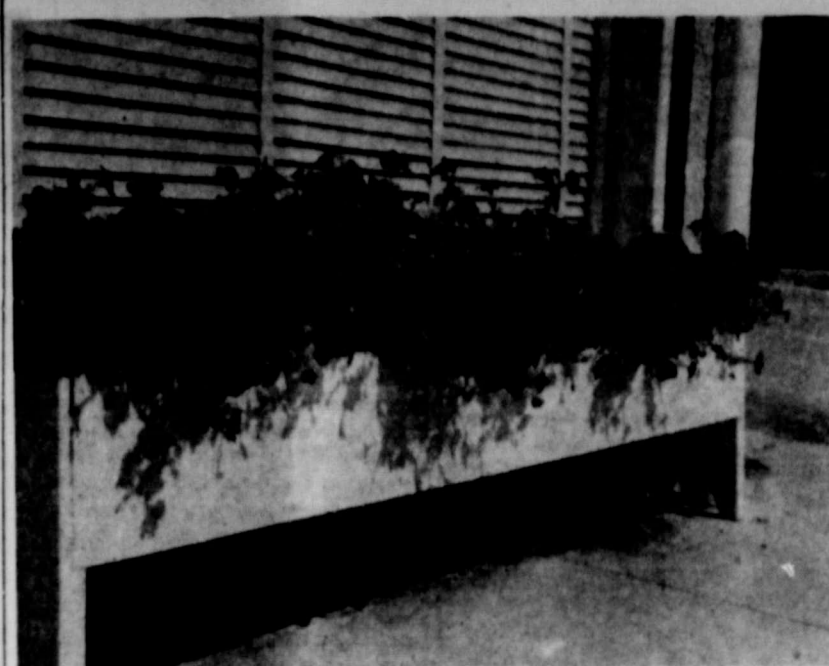

Mesquite Wood Found to Be Economical Roughage

College Station, August 28.—Mesquite wood ground into a meal is a source of bulk in rations for cattle when other roughages are scarce and relatively high in price.

Yearling steers fed a ration containing 7.2 pounds of ground mesquite wood gained 2.2 pounds per head daily in feeding tests at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Spur, said P. T. Marion, station superintendent. Similar steers fed cottonseed hulls instead of mesquite meal gained 2.29 pounds daily. The feeding period was 140 days.

In a more recent test lasting 112 days yearling steers fed a ration containing 12.23 pounds of ground mesquite wood per head daily gained an average of 2.54 pounds daily, compared with 2.71 pounds gained daily by steers fed a silage ration, he added.

The steers fed the mesquite meal made a higher net profit on the basis of \$10 per ton for ground mesquite and \$18 per ton for cottonseed hulls than those fed the cottonseed hull ration.

A chemical analysis shows that mesquite meal has a higher protein, fiber and calcium content than cottonseed hulls, but a slightly lower fat and carbohydrate content.

Carotene (Vitamin A) also is in the mesquite meal, but this essential element is not present or is very low in quantity in many dry roughages.

Mesquite to be used should be green stems and branches 1 to 3 inches in diameter, and should be allowed to cure for 5 to 7 days before grinding. Curing will make grinding easier and will lower the moisture content, eliminating molding after grinding.

The wood apparently may be harvested at any time of the year, but it usually has the highest nutritive value in the spring before leaf development begins.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. R. LAWRENCE

Billy Chumney, West Point community, and Rudolph Elsen of Aleman, who are both Grade A dairymen, have the only two bunker type silos in the county. Rudolph has been using his for a year or so while Billy constructed his this summer.

This type silo has some advantages over the trench silo and for these two dairymen the advantages mean quite a bit to them. Dairymen need at all times all the roughage and silage they can manage for. Too, they need this type feed located so as to use the least amount of work to get it to and into their cattle. As we all know, a trench should be located on a good slope so it can drain well when and after it is opened. With dirt floors in them, they are not too good when it comes to taking out the feed during wet spells.

Holding in mind a good slope for the trench, it can not always be located to the best advantage of the dairyman. The bunker silo can be so located that it will be most advantageous from a feeding standpoint. It can be easily constructed with sloping walls for best feed saving. It is not much more expensive, as a trench.

Self-feeder gates can be used easier on the bunker than on a trench. These advantages seem to make the bunkers more desirable than a trench and I believe we are going to see more of them over the county in the next few years. They are about as easy to fill as a trench and also as easy to pack. One of the big disadvantages of the bunker is that the feed can be destroyed more easily than in a trench. Too, I do not know how long feed can be kept in a bunker, while it is known that a trench has kept feed for as long as 14 years.

Yearling steers fed a ration containing 7.2 pounds of ground mesquite wood gained 2.20 pounds per head daily in a 140-day feeding trial in 1955-56 at the Spur Station. Similar steers fed cottonseed hulls instead of mesquite meal gained 2.29 pounds per head daily. The steers fed the mesquite meal made

a higher net return on the basis of \$10.00 per ton for ground wood and \$18.00 per ton for cottonseed hulls than those fed the cottonseed hull ration.

Yearling steers fed a ration containing 12.23 pounds of ground mesquite wood per head daily in a 112-day trial in 1956-57 made an average daily gain of 2.54 pounds, compared with 2.71 pounds for steers fed a silage ration. Both groups were fed a concentrate mixture with stilbestrol and aureomycin. No ill effects resulted from feeding the ground wood. After 70 days of the 112-day trial, the steers weighed 1,050 pounds and consumed 16 pounds of mesquite meal per head daily in addition to 16 pounds of concentrate feed. This brings to mind the old Scotchman who tried to teach his mule not to eat. About the time he got him trained, he up and died on him.

The report goes on to state that mesquite meal is a possible source of bulk in rations for cattle when other roughages are scarce and relatively high in price. When other feeds are cheap and plentiful there likely would be little or no demand for this type of roughage. However, mesquite may prove to be a dependable source of rough feed during a drouth.

One of the farm magazines states that cotton that is picked carefully, well prepared for ginning and ginned properly to retain its inherent qualities will be in greater demand than ever before. It says further that many operators who have used machines for picking in past years, are already making plans for additional labor so they can hand pick their cotton as long as possible.

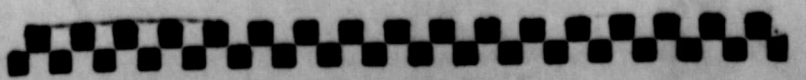

Auto Inspection Time Set September 1st Through April 15

Inspection time has rolled around again for more than four million automobile and truck owners in Texas.

The inspection period has been lengthened this year under a provision of a state law setting Sept. 1, 1937 until April 15, 1938 as the time in which all vehicles must be checked for mechanical defects.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, in announcing the opening of the inspection period, recommended that every owner have his cars and trucks inspected at the beginning of the period. This, he said, will enable vehicle owners to obtain inspection stickers before the holidays and before the last minute "log jam" at inspection stations.

Garrison said that more than 4,200 licensed inspection stations in the state would have stickers on hand by the starting date and would be equipped to check vehicles without delay.

"This enforcement program," he said, "will be closely coordinated with local law enforcement in counties and cities throughout the state. Enforcement's greatest help will come from the drivers themselves who observe our traffic laws and safely operate their automobiles in accordance with traffic and other conditions they encounter."

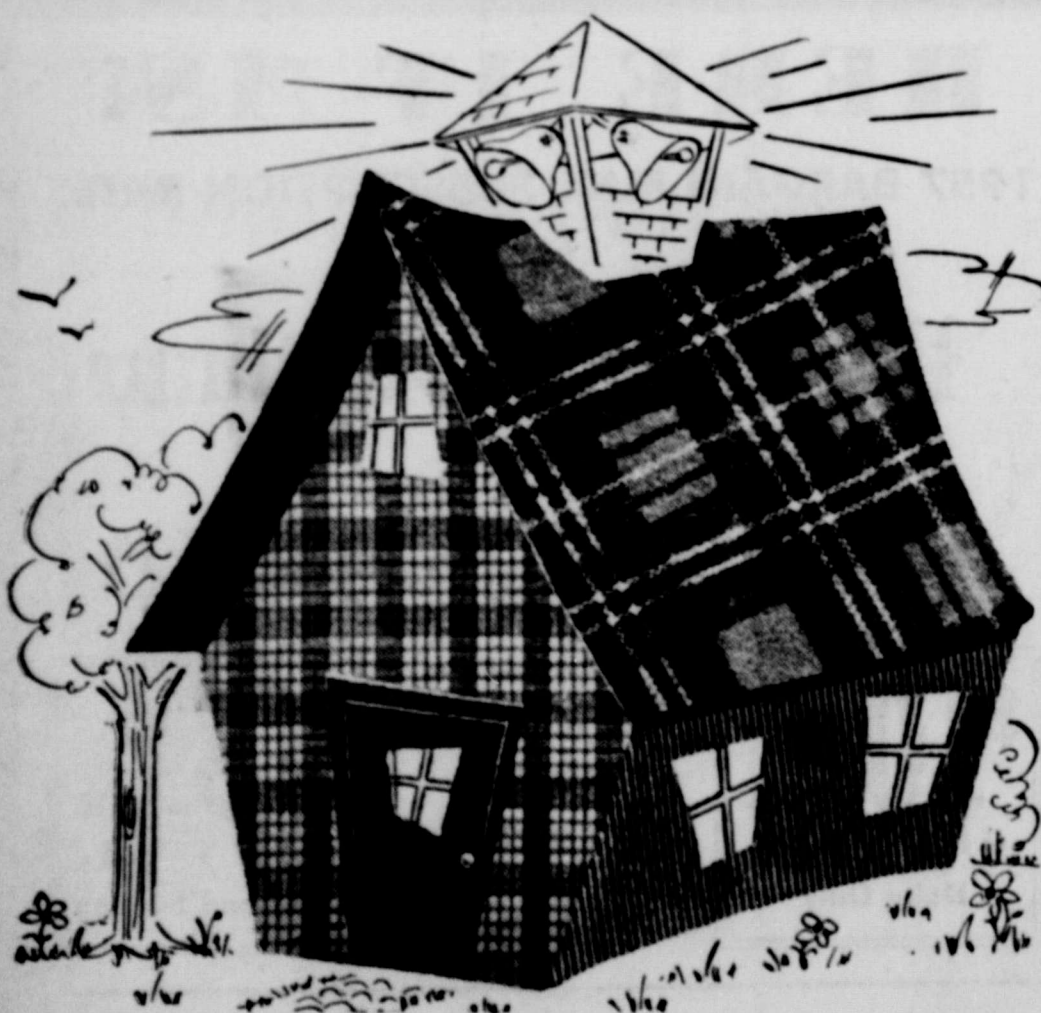
