Additional Plans For Local Stock Show Are Announced

Members of the Dawson County Fair Association Livestock Committee and persons serving as superintendents of the various livestock divisions met Friday, February 9, in the local county agent's office to formulate further plans for the stock show to be held at the fair grounds in this city on April 4, 5, and 6.

The group agreed to have a show of saddle horses in connection with the livestock show, and Dr. J. M. Harrington was selected as superintendent of the saddle horse division. The following classes of dairy stock will be shown in each breed it was decided: senior yearling heifer, junior yearling heifer, senior heifer calves, junior heifer calves, cows two to three years old, cows three to four years of age, and cows above four years of age.

Officials of the association plan to open all age and weight classes in beef cattle divisions to be shown.

According to present plans ribbons and banners will be given each breed class for the first five places. Rules and regulations governing the show will be published in the near future and prize lists will be made available to the public.

FIFTH AIR FORCE, SOUTHWEST PACIFIC: First Lieutenant Benjamin H. Allen, veteran pilot of a transport plane of the Fifth Air Force Troop Carrier Command, has returned to Lamesa for combat leave. He is the son of J. T. Allen, Sr., who resides at 505 South First Street in Lamesa.

Since going overseas in July, 1943, Lt. Allen has flown more than 1,100 hours. He has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross with one Oak Leaf Cluster, the Air Medal with one Oak Leaf Cluster, and the Asiatic-Pacific theater ribbon with one Bronze campaign star.

He received his pilot training at the Army Air Base, Lake Charles, La., and was commissioned as a second lieutenant January 14, 1943.

Before he entered the army in April, 1942, Lt. Allen was a partner in the Allen Hardware Co., Lamesa. His wife, Mrs. Polly Allen lives at their home, 706 North Sixth Street.

Cousin Of Mrs. R. Parker Pursues Art In War Plant

Editor's Note: The following article concerns Grover B. Smith Sr., a frequent visitor in Lamesa and a cousin to Mrs. Rube Parker, who resides at 1312 South Second Street in this city. Smith, a former resident of Whitewright but now employee of North American Aviation in Dallas, was well known in Whitewright for his interest in art while he pursued his trade of paper-hanging, painting and interior decoration. His wife was active in organizing the Navy Mothers Club in Whitewright, and has been an active member of that organization since her removal to Dallas and an officer of the same at the present. Smith was the subject of an interesting feature story in a recent issue of The Skit, NAA house organ. The article in the NAA Skit in part is as follows:

Without going outside the factory doors men and women endowed with talents in all manner of artistic pursuits could be recruited from NAA ranks. One of these is Grover B. Smith Sr., now a tool crib attendant. Smith paints. He paints on anything from discarded sandpaper to canvass. He paints still life, panoramas or murals with media ranging from water colors to pastel chalk. He paints because he loves to paint and shyly calls his art "just a hobby." But if ever you see his polished work you'll realize why judges in four exhibitions where his paintings were awarded him blue ribbons.

During lunch periods, surrounded by the world's most modern machinery, this gray-haired, soft spoken, mild mannered man finds relaxation, and an outlet for his artistic instincts through the creation of beauty by means of the world's oldest medium of expression—drawing pictures. There is a mural in black and white—a snow scene three by eight feet—so real it makes one cold; so simple it warms one's heart. Smith seeks no profit from this mural or any of his other paintings, preferring to give away his drawings to anyone who see beauty in them.

Perhaps four good reasons why Smith puts his war job ahead of successful career as an artist which he might well achieve, are his sons. Two of his boys are in service overseas; one is a naval dentist and attached to the Marines in Hawaii and the other is a Seabee somewhere in the South Pacific; a third son is a lieutenant in the AAF now stationed in Arizona learning to fly B-29's. The fourth son, Marvin N. Smith, was given a medical discharge by the army; he has swapped his Garand for a rivet gun in the production army and works in Department 27. So, perhaps Mr. Smith figures it is something of an art to be a patriotic American and a good father.

THE Army Answers

Your Personal War Problems

Your questions on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matters as they relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters Eighth Service Command, Dallas 2, Texas.

Q. If a soldier is declared missing in action, will his children receive insurance, overseas pay and social security benefits?

A. Since a soldier listed as "missing in action" is presumed still to be alive, no insurance will be paid to his beneficiaries. Overseas pay is a portion of a soldier's salary and is not paid to his dependents in any event. Social security benefits are given to a soldier's children and their guardian only after the soldier's death and then only if he was eligible to receive them at the time of his entry into the service.

Q. Our son was killed in action and buried overseas. We plan to have his body returned when possible. Is it ethical to have memorial services held for him now? Will the

government furnish a flag if we do?

A. It is in keeping to hold memorial services now. A flag is furnished, however, only when the body is present for funeral services and burial.

Q. I was discharged from the Army in January and would like to go to college under the G. I. Bill of Rights. Where can I obtain some information on colleges to attend and courses to take?

A. Write the American Schools and Colleges Association, either at 30 Rockefeller Plaza, New York 20, New York, or at 921 Marshall Field Annex, Chicago, Illinois.

Q. My husband is in the Army overseas. I am not listed on his identification tags as the person to be notified in case of an emergency. Could he change this?

A. Yes. A soldier may change his emergency addressee at any time by filling out a new form to be filed with The Adjutant General.

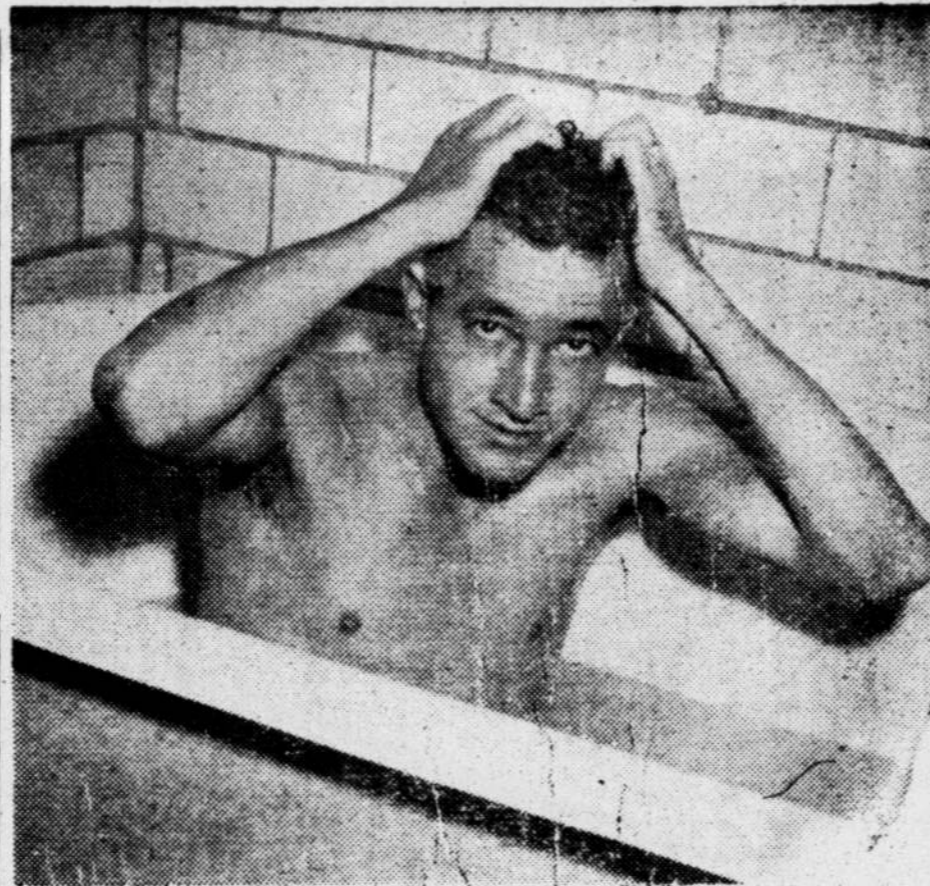

ment also is essential to most economical gains.

R. R. Lancaster, pasture specialist for the A. and M. College Extension Service, says recent studies by the Agricultural Experiment Station and the Soil Conservation Service bear out this idea. Experiments carried on over a year's period with 59 Hereford steer calves near Amarillo, showed that re-seeded pasturage offers some definite advantages over native pasturage in that vicinity, especially during the spring and summer months.

Re-seeded pasturage consisting of Western wheatgrass and blue grama seemed most desirable, closely followed by a combination of Western wheatgrass and wild rye, plus sudan in September. Steers grazed on these re-seeded pastures sold at higher prices and provided carcasses of greater weights than the animals grazed on native grasses. The lot grazed on Western wheatgrass and blue grama gained an average of 310 pounds per steer in 213 days. Western wheatgrass appeared to have a definite relation to both gain and finish of the steers.

Lancaster says county agricultural agents report considerable land in the Panhandle and South Plains is being re-seeded to range grasses and stockmen might profit from careful study of the winter grasses such as the wild rye and wheat grasses.

Another pasture of blue grama, buffalo, lake weeds, and wheatgrass led native blue grama and buffalo grass in their studies. Regardless of the type of pasture, however, maximum gain and finish proved impossible without proper management.

A good plan to follow, Lancaster says, is to graze cool-season grasses in the spring and fall, utilizing native pasture and sudan in the hot, dry, months.

Nazis Rush 'A Last Ditch' In Denmark

STOCKHOLM — Across the narrow neck of Jutland north of the Schleswig-Holstein border, German troops, Russian prisoners and forced Danish labor are completing a series of "defense lines" which virtually are nothing but water-filled ditches.

This enterprise has furnished considerable amusement for the Jutland farmers whose native wit not even the hordes of Hitler can suppress. One such farmer reportedly told a German officer: "I can understand how the Americans cross the Atlantic but how they will be able to hurdle these ditches is beyond my comprehension."

The Nazis are building two defense ditches on Danish territory. The most northerly runs from Kolding just opposite Fyn Island westward to Esbjerg on the North Sea. A second parallels this some seven miles south, filled with water from the Kongeaa river.

Two fortified positions reportedly are being constructed to the south on German territory.

In Jutland, advices reaching Stockholm say, some Nazi troop units are composed of youngsters only 12 and 13.

Since Danish patriots several

weeks ago ran away to Sweden in one of the world's largest ferry boats operating between Zeland and Jutland, traffic has been severely limited. Before a person goes aboard, German police search his pockets and baggage. German civilians and soldiers take all seats while the Danes must stand.
 Around 6,000 Danes have been imprisoned. Their treatment varies

but since most all prisoners are supervised by the Gestapo, conditions are bad.
 "Prisoners are often forced to stand motionless against a wall for hours," one source said. "If they move they receive a kick. Prisons are overflowing. Often five persons are placed in a cell built for one."

T-Sgt. O. Houchin In Group Battling Four Jap Planes

HEADQUARTERS 13TH AAF, SOUTHWEST PACIFIC — The 13th AAF's husky Liberators can take "a hell of a pounding" without giving in, a Lamesa Texas, flier testified when his plane flew back from a Philippines raid with nine 20 millimeter cannon shell holes in the wings and shrapnel scars all over the fuselage and nose.

Technical Sergeant Orbin E. Houchin of Lamesa was engineer on the Liberator. Lead ship in a strong

13th AAF formation attacking Bacolod airdrome on Negros Island in the central Philippines, Sergeant Houchin's plane was singled out by four Jap fighters for a bitter sky duel. Three of the Nips streaked out of the clouds a few minutes after the Liberator dumped its bomb load squarely on the Bacolod runway. They sent 20 millimeter shells crashing into the tail of the big, lumbering bomber.

Staff Sergeant G. Carson, Boulder, Colorado, the tail gunner, was pierced in the head and legs by steel fragments as a shell from the first zero exploded in his compartment. Without waiting to inspect himself for injuries, Carson fought off the three Zeros with his twin 50 calibre machine guns. One enemy fighter banked sharply to avoid Carson's fire, and was shot down by two P-38's flying nearby as escort for the bomber.

As the last of the three Zeros finished its pass at the Lib's tail, another Jap attacked head-on. A 20 millimeter shell slammed into the pilot's compartment and exploded three feet from the heads of the pilot, and the co-pilot. Miraculously, neither was hurt.

When the Liberator landed at its home strip at an advance 13th AAF Dutch East Indies base, Sergeant Houchin and the other crew members, surveying the damage, agreed luck had flown with them.

In addition to the holes in the wings, tail and nose, fires had skimmed the wings. Tremendous backwash from the props had put out the flames before they could cause serious damage, however.

Badge Awarded Pfc. E. Guinn For Conduct In Action

A combat Infantryman Badge has been awarded to Pfc. Elma Guinn for exemplary conduct in action against the enemy on Peleliu Island, according to official word received here from George R. Wagner, Captain of the Infantry, commanding.

Pfc. Guinn is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Guinn, who reside on Route 2 in this county. His wife makes her home in Ft. Smith, Arkansas, but at the present time is visiting in Lamesa.

Pfc. Guinn has been a member of the Army for the past three years. He is now stationed in the Pacific Theatre of War.

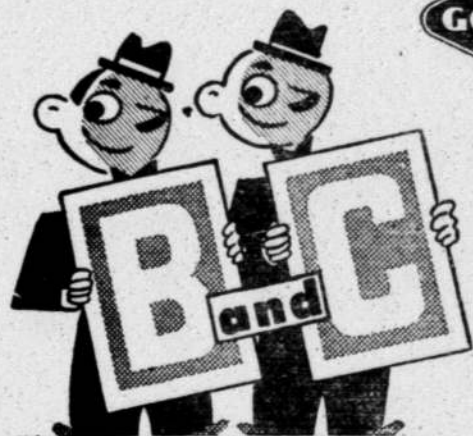

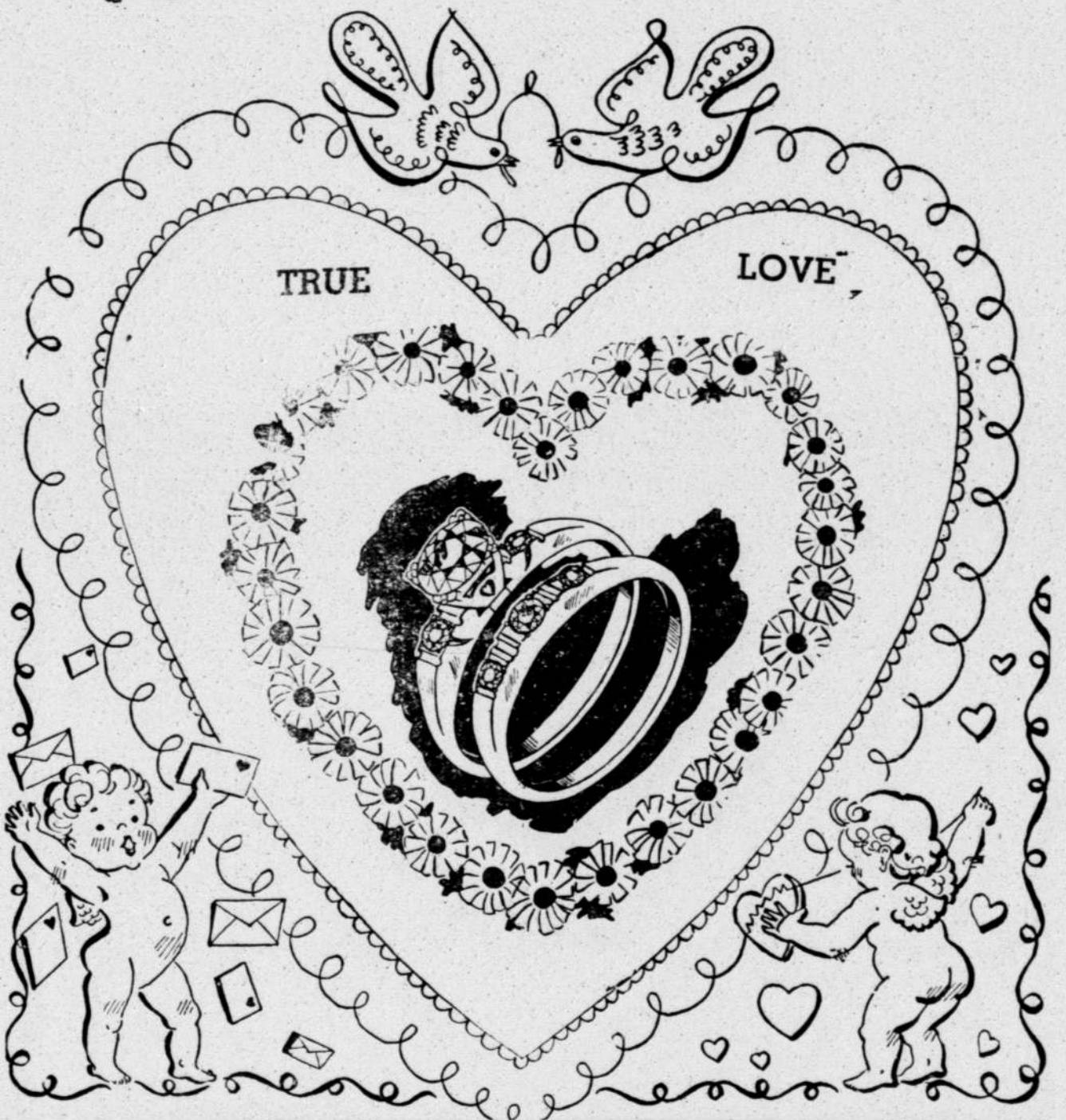

 They took it from Frederick the Great, the French-speaking autocrat who brought the Prussian military tradition into first flower. They did it with ill-trained and poorly led troops but held it only three days.
 Three years before the Russians barged in, a flying detachment of 4,000 Austrian cavalry under command of daring Gen. Haddick razed a Berlin suburb and forced the capital, under threat of similar treatment, to pay ransom. Within 12 hours Haddick wheeled his troops and was gone before the Prussians discovered the meagre size of his forces.
 Gustavous Adolphus, the Swedish soldier of the Cross, was in Berlin in 1631.
 Napoleon swept in from the west in 1806 and exacted heavy levies to fill his empire war chest.
