GIRLS AND CIGARETTES

The girl who crosses her pretty lower extremities, leans back nonchalantly and puffs away at a cigarette should not entertain the delusion that men watching her think she is "clever" and "smart," if a questionnaire sent out by Miss Priscilla Wayne of the Des Moines (Iowa) Register, is to be taken seriously. Answers to the questionnaire which was circulated among several hundred boys reveals that three only were not opposed to women smoking, while the rest of them replied to the question "Do you like to see women smoke?" with an emphatic "No." We do not believe there are many girls in Lubbock who smoke cigarettes, but to the few who do there is some room for introspection.

Girls who smoke are by no means all immoral, but most immoral girls smoke. When a girl puffs her cigarette, laughs frivolously behind a cloud of smoke, and thinks her modernity is appealing to men, she is deceiving herself. She has lost her femininity, her daintiness, and her charm. Perhaps she still has her share of dates, but she has destroyed the chivalry and romance thereof. The men will not stop so readily to pick up her handkerchief, nor would one of them place his coat over a muddy path that her dainty pumps might not be spoiled.

We contend that men are fast losing the universal respect for women that they once had. It is not the man's fault. It is laid at the feet of the women. They have placed themselves in position that will not permit a man to show them the same respect that they would some twenty-five years ago. The general conversation of many women, and the profanity that some of them use, is to blame for the lowering of respect of the chivalrously inclined men of this day and time. There are those men, who will talk about not objecting to the women smoking cigarettes, but there is not one man in one hundred who would want to marry one of them, and we dare say that when wife took to puffing cigarettes that she lost a large portion of the love and esteem of that man—her husband. No young ladies, you are not playing to the men when you smoke cigarettes. We might grant that you have as much right to smoke cigarettes as boys, for we believe that men have no right to expect of women a more beautiful and clean life than they, but a woman is more delicately constituted, she is simply a finer texture, her lovely complexion and form, her beautiful and pretty features—the pride of man—is marred when she enters into coarse, rough and vulgar language, and when she dresses unbecomely, and in the attire of man she lowers her fair name in the sight of the majority of men.

HAPPINESS MUST BE FEARED

"The sorrow in the twilight of life," says M. Georges Clemenceau, former Premier of France, "is that I have discovered that although I have completed the program laid for me, mankind does not find happiness in ending his life's work. Happiness comes only in continuation of work and not in finishing your job. Clemenceau made this statement a few days ago after he had predicted to some of his friends that he would die this year. The French tiger reflects back over his achievements. The average man feels that were he a Clemenceau in the affairs of the world, he would feel his work well done, retire to tranquil living, and rejoice in the perpetuity of his name. Not so with great men. The initiative that prompts them to do their first noteworthy thing usually follows them until they are physically unable to work any longer.

A review of the history of working dreamers reveal colossal stamina and an unceasing work. Those who stand at the peak of success realize that in their work lies their happiness. To them idleness would be insufficiently unhappy. Happiness does not come through material gain it is a condition of the mind, and the mind can be developed into a state of ease and pleasure by prudent choice of living. If we adhere to clean precepts

we can always be assured of a clear conscience, and after all that is the substance of veritable happiness. There is no life that has not its sorrow. There will come brief intervals when we will brood over our circumstances, but remember this—"Sorrow comes to spread out in the heart space for joy." Happiness must be earned. Choose your work in life and then work honestly and laboriously to your goal. The man who accomplishes most in life is the man who is not satisfied in merely finishing a job. The man who is infinitely happy is working constantly. When one job is finished he is looking for another.

SCIENTISTS HELP MEN TO WALK WITH GOD

The San Antonio Express says in commenting on the recent address of Dr. J. W. Skinner, of Kingville, Texas, lawman moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly in El Dorado, Arkansas, that no group is doing more to make it possible for men to walk with God than are the scientists. It is a statement more likely to have emanated from the American Association for the Advancement of Science than from a great religious convention. Dr. Skinner added that these tireless, fearless seekers after truth—often subjected to the railery of the thoughtless and uninformed—have done more to bring light, to banish fear and to mitigate the lot of mankind within the past few years than the church accomplished between 400 and 1400 A. D. (the medieval epoch). The spirit of Jesus is manifested as frequently in the laboratory as in the pulpit, he said in effect. That remarkable utterance may be regarded as characteristic of the more liberal attitude toward scientific inquiry which is permeating many religious organizations. Other heartening indications of this trend which have come to public notice are the Methodist Episcopal educators' resolutions—adopted in Memphis last February—condemning legislative attempts to restrain freedom of thought; the Kansas City and St. Louis pastor's protests against the Missouri "anti-evolution" bill; the Kansas City Baptist ministers' call upon a denominational college to decline a bequest conditioned upon fundamental teaching in the institution. Are these developments to be regarded as evidence that history is repeating itself? In the fierce controversies of other days between new knowledge and traditional theology, the newly-found truth always won finally and the old dogmas were subjected to reinterpretation. There is a marked reaction, within the church itself, against the spirit which would impose religious doctrines by arbitrary fiat. The discussion aroused by anti-evolution laws and the Scopes trial has done some good. It has stimulated thought where blind acceptance of authority had been insisted on too long.

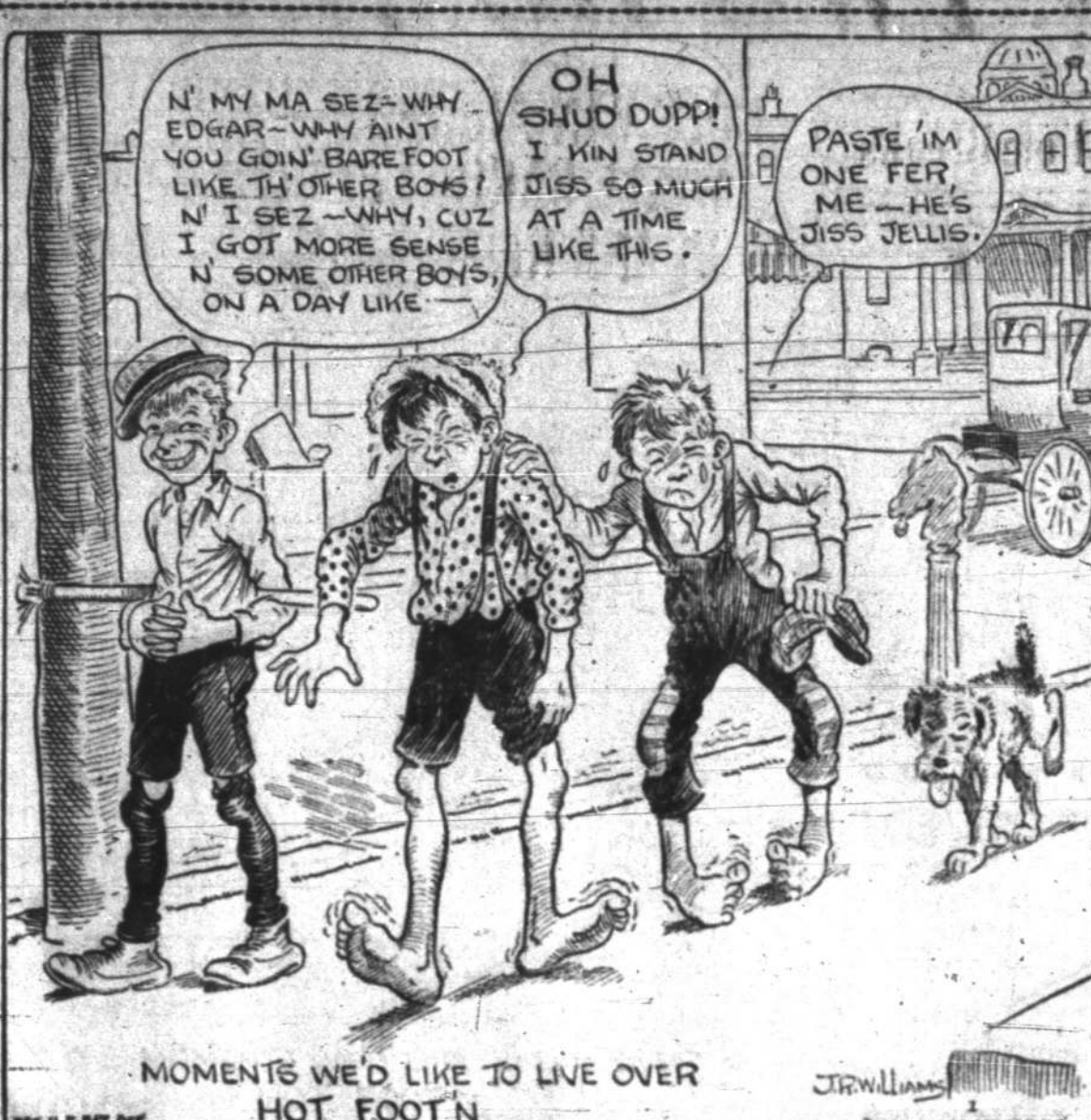
We think when some husbands get into their noogie that women do not appreciate a joke, they must certainly overlook the fact that their wives really appreciate them.

AMERICA MAY LEARN FROM CHINA

Americans usually think of China as a place to which missionaries should be sent, to carry western religion and western ideas. Mr. Koo, the Chinese representative who was in Kansas City last week, suggested that China might learn from America what America would find valuable.

A novel suggestion to most persons. But why should not China have benefited from the life in the course of thousands of years of history that would be worth the attention of the rest of the world?

It is not by accident that hundreds of millions of people for so long a time have been able to live together in peace and harmony. It is that they have worked out a system, a literature, a social life free from most of the social explosions that have repeatedly wrecked western civilization.

China, never, has produced a religion, a philosophy, a natural philosophy of the people, under the inspiration of Confucius, has developed an unusual moral code through the instrumentality of the home and the school. "The chief end of man," said Confucius, "is to be a good man and a good citizen." The obligation to live and let live has been indelibly printed on the Chinese consciousness. The people have succeeded in infusing into these obligations a glow of the enthusiasm which Matthew Arnold put in mind when he wrote that

CO-OPERATION

"The United States must co-operate or die," says Newton D. Baker, former secretary of war. "The next war will sweep democracy off the earth. The last one has left all but a few countries in the hands of dictators. Already the world is full of apprehensions for its security."

Business used to think that conflict was inevitable, the order of nature. Nowadays business stops fighting business, gets together in larger units and proceeds to do a thing as a business can cooperate for its own benefit. It may not be too much to believe that nations, whether formally or informally, can co-operate for their common benefit.

There is a strong tendency that way now. It shows in many ways, of which the League of Nations is only one.

The instinct to fight is powerful, but the instinct of self-preservation may be more powerful still, compelling to make nations find practical means of getting along to co-operate internationally as they do domestically.

That cannot come all at once, but is something for leaders of mankind to work toward. The worst obstacle is found in the suspicion, prejudice and obstinacy of individuals. When men learn to think co-operatively, then co-operative machinery will work.—Gainesville Daily Register.

BIRTH REGISTRATION

There has been a time when the old family Bible was considered the only register necessary for births and deaths, and was used as such, according to J. C. Anderson, state health officer, who has instituted a campaign to have every child born in the state registered with the vital statistics division of the state health department of Austin.

However, that time is now past and the parent is unwise who depends upon the family Bible to prove his child's age, as this is not an official court record and would be worthless in establishing a child's interest in court litigation, or in other wise proving his age in later life.

Every child should have his birth placed on record in our state files, where it will be kept for all time as a legal record, and can be accessible for any necessary reference.

Not Too Late to Have Births Registered

If your child is not registered it is not too late to have this done, as children can be registered upon proper affidavits made by parents. Every child in the state should be registered, and many parents are now registering all of their children at the same time, together with their own birth records.

More than 7,000 birth certificates are received each month by the vital statistics bureau and approximately one-tenth of these do not give the child's Christian name, which necessitates the mailing of supplementary report blanks to parents of the unnamed child for this necessary information. Literature upon infant care and an engraved certificate of birth are also mailed parents upon request.

BIRDMAN GIVEN ROYAL WELCOME BY BRITISHERS**KING AND QUEEN WITH OTHER DIGNITARIES FETE LINDBERGH STRENUOUS DAY****ATTENDS TEAS, DINNERS SHAKES HANDS AND MAKES SPEECHES**

(By the Associated Press.)
LONDON, May 31.—King George of England and Queen Mary gave America's young aviator a fitting welcome when he visited the sovereigns at Buckingham palace today. The King pinned the air force cross on Captain Charles Lindbergh's breast, patted him in a fatherly manner on the shoulder and sat down and listened for 20 minutes to a recital of one of the most venturesome voyages in the air that has ever been taken. Queen Mary came in and sat in rapid succession with eyes of admiration on the youth who has achieved what no man ever achieved before—a straight swift race across the Atlantic, from one great metropolis to another, outwitting fog and winds and storm.

H. R. H. Add Greetings
Later the Prince of Wales, like Lindbergh himself popular through out the world, added his cheery greeting when Lindbergh called to see him, and perhaps more than most others entered into the real spirit of adventure, in which the future king of England glories. And there was the acclamation which the British parliament gave him. His reception in the opinion of all parliamentary hands, and the ovation raised in his honor while the house was sitting, was unprecedented. When Sir Alan Cobham on his return from Australia, was greeted by parliament, the house was not sitting, and even then the demonstration was not so marked.

Guest of Lady Astor
Lady Astor, American born member of parliament had Captain Lindbergh in parliament as her guest. They had tea on the terrace, the airman sitting between his hostess and the Duchess of Atholl. The party was a brief but pleasant function, and the party was soon moving again. As Lindbergh was about to leave the terrace, Winston Churchill, champion of the exchequer arrived, sat and smoking his customary cigar. He took the youth's arm and drew him toward the balustrade overlooking the river and they entered into what appeared to be a highly technical discussion of aeronautics.

This was Lindbergh's most strenuous day since his marvelous landing at Le Bourget. Since daylight he was on the jump, in airplanes, in automobiles, on foot, dashing here and there conversing with crowned heads and cabinet ministers, but in the midst of it all at Buckingham Palace, the little Prince of Wales, daughter of the Duke and Duchess of York. He attended a special luncheon, tea, two dinners, and shook hands with every body that could get in range of him. He was called upon for various speeches, came short, some long.

And that is not all. Even at mid night he still had one engagement to keep. It was the derby eve charity ball in Albert Hall, where he looked in and was charmed, and every body urged him to dance.

His daylight activity was inspired by the fact that he had made up his mind to go back home soon. He expected to sail from Cherbourg on Saturday on the United States destroyer Breck, and it was part of his scheme to get his monoplane, the beloved Spirit of St. Louis, ready for shipment on the steamer George Washington. He flew from Crofton to Gosport with his "old man" leaving it there and returned to Crofton in a British machine, while most of London slept.

The most noted British flying man and his expert got together tonight at a great banquet given in honor of Captain Lindbergh by the various aviation organizations. After listening to the highest tributes paid to him, the youthful flier told of his journey alone across the ocean. One of the features of his recital was the description of a screaming mirage off the Irish coast. It was evident to those who listened to his words that the aviator, in his fancied visualization of land, must have been feeling the efforts of his battle against the elements and the great strain under which he was fighting his way to Paris.

Assigned by Girls
When Lindy visited Albert Hall, he was besieged by fair dancers, the girls refusing to believe that their hero, an American youth, really could not dance. "I am terribly sorry," he apologized, "but I have never danced my life. It isn't that I wouldn't like to dance with all of you, but I just can't. Absolutely nothing doing. I am here as an onlooker." He made his way to a box and took up a position as spectator for a few minutes, and returned to the embassy.

Cruise is Offered
WASHINGTON, May 31 (AP).—Offer of the cruiser Memphis to bring direct to Washington for an official reception before the departure of President Coolidge on June 13 was made to Captain Charles A. Lindbergh today by the cabinet committee, appointed by the president to arrange for a celebration here.

Canadian Planning Non-Stop Air Trip

OTTAWA, Ont., May 31. (AP).—Captain E. L. Janney, 34 years old Canadian flying ace, announced tonight he would fly from Ottawa on the morning of June 30, in an attempt to make a non-stop flight to London, England.

Captain Janney explained that he would make the flight as a part of Canada's jubilee celebration hoping to arrive in London the following evening, Dominion day. He said he would have a companion in the person of a radio operator who would take no part in the operating of the plane. The distance which Captain Janney proposes to cover is approximately 3,000 miles, or about 800 miles less than the distance covered by Captain Lindbergh in his New York-Paris flight. Canada's jubilee celebration will mark the 60th anniversary of the signing of the compact of confederation which brought the provinces together under the dominion government.

11 Of Mob Injured

The mob, not believing a statement by Sheriff Hires that Levin had been spirited from the jail Sunday night, and angered when the sheriff directed firing on the group, stormed the jail and set fire to the sheriff's automobile which was parked in front of the jail. A fugitive hole was torn in a wall of the jail with heavy shovels used by members of the mob in an attempt to force an entrance.

Killed By Mistake
Levin, in his confession, said he killed the Merrells thinking they were another family who had done him "a dirty trick." They were slain in bed with a large hammer, Leonard Thompson, arrested with Levin, and on whom the latter at first placed the blame, was held for further investigation.
