Rebelettes Impound QC Bulldogettes

The Queen City Bulldogettes and the Pittsburg Pirates were barking up the wrong tree when they challenged the Rebelettes last week.

The Rebelettes impounded the Bulldogettes 68-27, Tuesday night in the Rivercrest gym.

The Bulldogettes took possession of the tip off, but almost a minute elapsed before either team scored. Finally, Robyn Reeder rolled in a layup to turn the score. That was only one of the ten baskets sank

by the Rebelettes in the first quarter. As the teams left the court, Rivercrest was in charge by a score of 20-8. Once on the court again the Rebelettes wasted no time in carrying the ball to post player Veronica Howerton, who layed up two points in the first few seconds of the second quarter. The scoring was equal to that of the first period as Rivercrest turned in another 20 points and Queen City eight, making the halftime score 40-16.

After the half, Veronica Howerton went to center court for the Rebelettes. Rivercrest had possession most of the quarter, but both teams played defensively and the scoring decreased in this period. The Rebelettes

held on to their lead and ended the third quarter 50-22. The Rebelettes were headed by Veronica Howerton, who sank for 17 points as well as grabbing 11 rebounds and two steals. Accompanying her were Robyn Reeder with 13 points, five rebounds, and one steal, Scotti Wood with 12 points, five rebounds and four steals, Judy Via with eight points, seven rebounds, and three steals, and Janet Webb hitting for eight points.

Lori Lightsey led Queen City with eight points followed by Sharon Haynes with five points.

The Rebelettes tangled with the Pittsburg Pirates once again Friday night at Pittsburg and for the second

time came out on top 60-33.

The Pirates scored first, but that was the only time they had the lead as Rivercrest took over and outscored the Pirates by three points in the first quarter. The scoreboard read 14-11 as the buzzer sounded.

As the second quarter got underway the Pirates took possession. Both teams scored about the same in the quarter as Rivercrest sank for a total of 12 points and the Pirates 11 points. At the half the score was 26-22 in favor of Rivercrest.

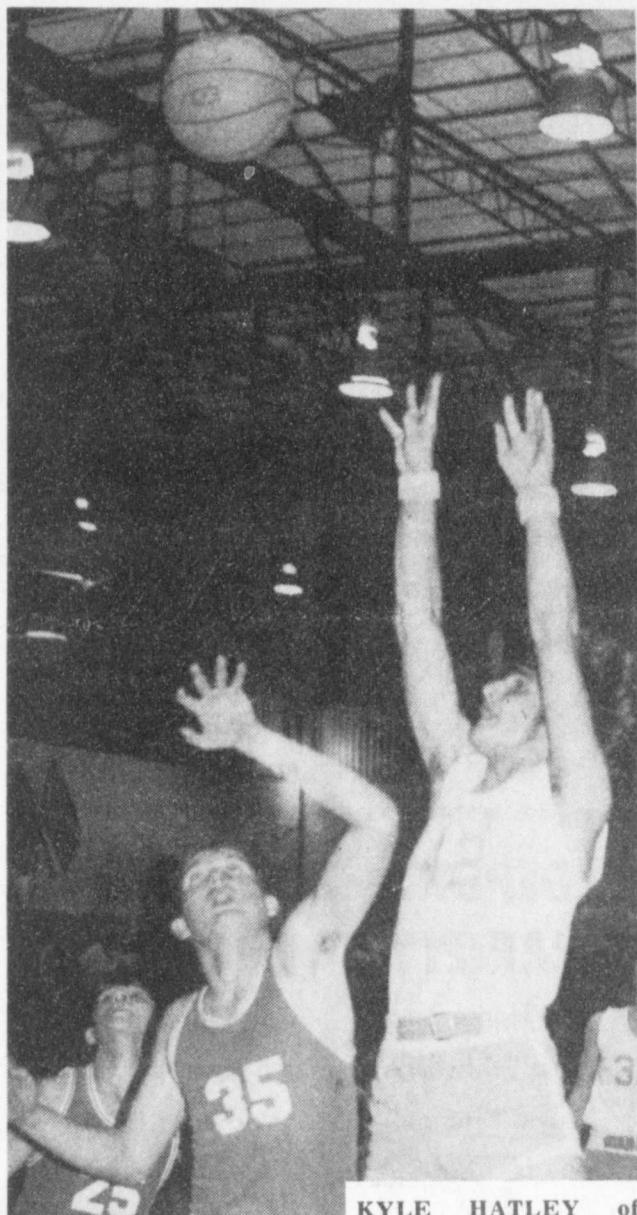
Pittsburg took possession once again, but headed to the wrong goal and lost control. At one time during the quarter the Pirates tied up

the score when Bobbette Johnson sank three 15 foot shots for Pittsburg. However, the Rebelettes pulled ahead once again and ended the quarter in the lead 42-32.

In the last quarter the Rebelette defense allowed the Pirates to score no field goals, but with 35 seconds left in the game a Pirate was fouled and sank one of her free throws.

Scotti Wood led the Rebelette offense with 18 points, followed by Robyn Reeder with 12, and Judy Via and Sarah Scales hitting for 10 each.

On defense Judy Via pulled down 11 rebounds and two steals, and Scotti Wood had six steals.

In the opening round, Detroit defeated Avery girls 38 to 11, then beat the Talco girls 25 to 18 for the cham-

pionship. The Detroit girls won both rounds of regular district play.

Talco girls won second place after defeating Bogata in the opening round 25-14. Avery won third place with the defeat of Bogata in the consolation bracket.

The Talco boys defeated Bogata in the opening round 50-34, then defeated Detroit

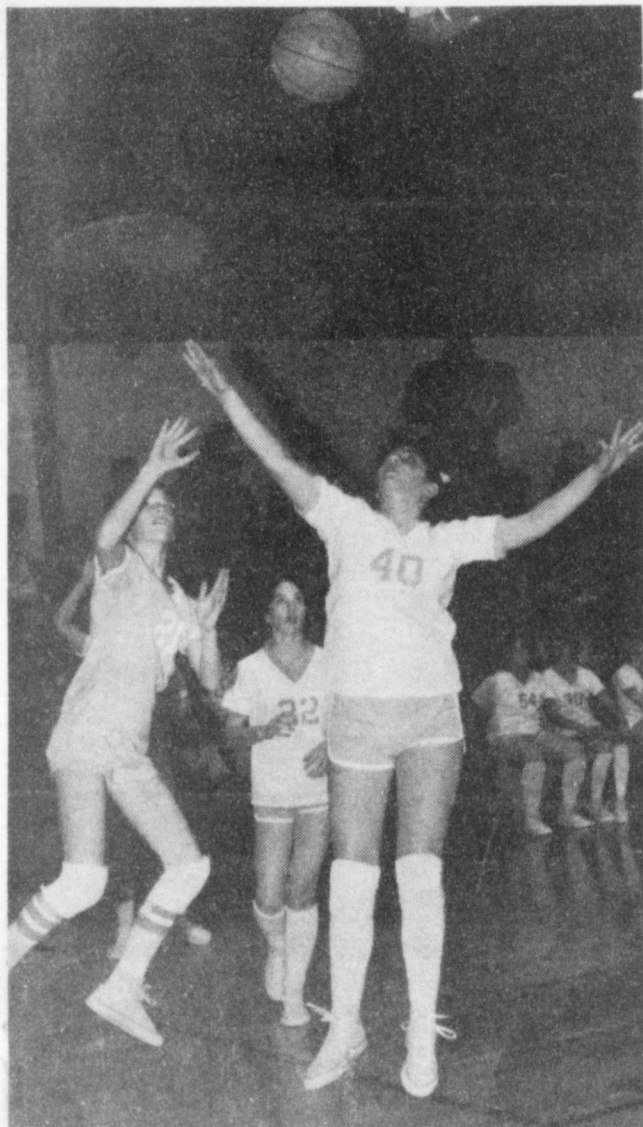
39-19. The Bogata boys defeated Avery in the consolation bracket to take third place.

Highway 37

Contracts Awarded

A major contract for highway improvement in Red River County has been awarded with work expected to start within 30 days, weather permitting.

The job specifications call for widening of State Highway 37 southwest to Scatter Creek, a distance of about 5.9 miles. The work will include construction of additional hard surface driving area, a building of additional shoulders, and a widening of the structures where necessary.

Richard L. Stouter, District Maintenance Engineer in the Paris office, will be in overall charge but the local office in Clarksville will also provide inspection personnel during construction. Specifically, the existing 22-foot roadway will be widened to 24 feet and 10-foot shoulders will be added. Also, the roadway will be resurfaced with one and a half inches of asphaltic concrete.

Winning contractor for the bid was J.H. Howard, Inc., Construction Company of Detroit, with a low total of \$1,627,455. Others also bidding included the McKnight Construction Company of Commerce, Lattimer Materials of Sherman, and Bonham-Fields Equipment Company of Denison.

Stouter will shortly schedule a pre-construction meeting to plan the work scheduled.

Franklin County

A Highway 37 improvement program has also been approved in Franklin County for 4.6 miles extending south from a point 1.4 miles south of the Red River County line. McKnight Construction was awarded this job on a low bid of \$1,572,936. Kieby Pickett, the Senior Resident Engineer in Sulphur Springs, will supervise this work.

With the withdrawal of Earl Humphrey from the commissioner's race, George Marshall, Sr., Dean Ward and Bruce Scott will be competing for the Pct. 1 spot. Incumbent commissioner Joe Runyan, Pct. 3, is being challenged by James L. (Sonny) Pryor.

Feb. 11-16 Is Farm Bureau Week

During this week, the local county Farm Bureau will have a special effort to enroll

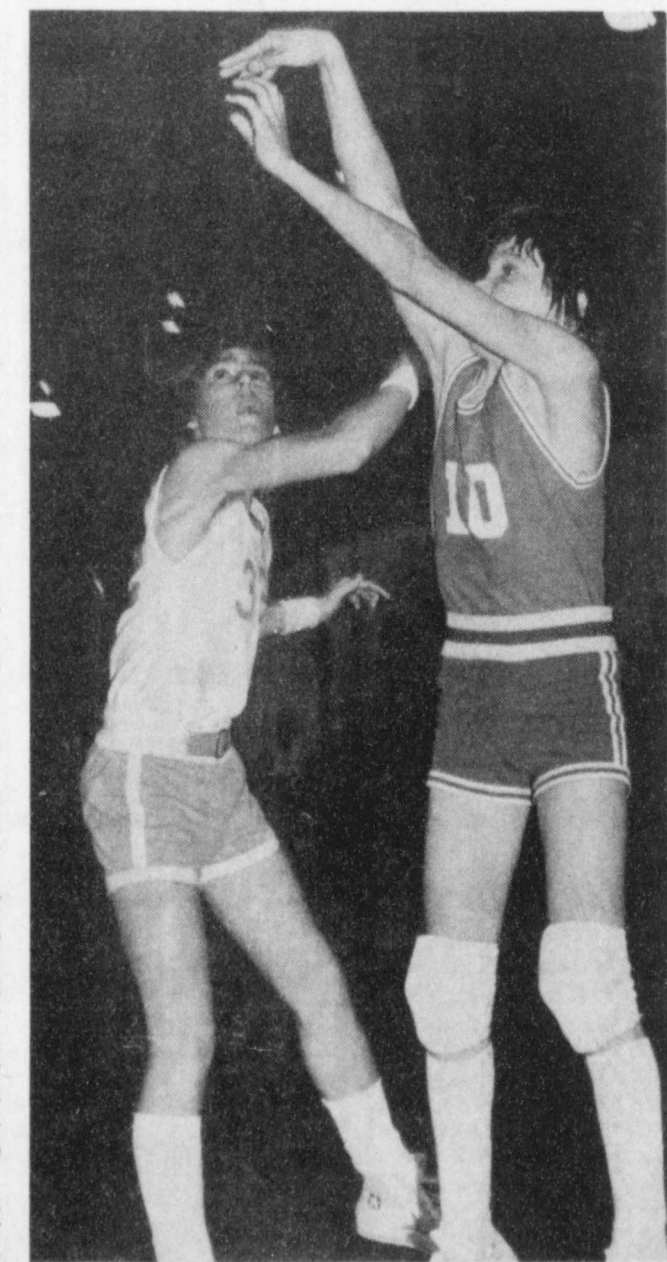
new members in the organization, according to Roy Marris of Bogata, membership chairman.

Part of the "Farm Bureau Week" official proclamation, signed by Judge Sullivan, reads:

"An adequate supply of food and natural fibers is essential to our Nation. Many of our citizens of Red River County are directly or indirectly dependent upon agriculture for their livelihood. All of our citizens benefit from the advancements made in the agricultural industry.

Gullies Destroy Cropland

Each year that goes by many tons of valuable topsoil is washed from fields. Cropland that does not have proper conservation treatment average losing between 15 and 20 tons per acre of soil each year. This soil or silt that washes from fields clog road ditches and fills lakes and ponds.

Active gullies occurring on cropland fields need shaping into parabolic or bowl shape waterway. After they are shaped and sodded to grass they can serve as terrace outlets. Some gullies having large drainage areas could not be stabilized by shaping. When this occurs an erosion control structure is built. Erosion control structures consist of a dam with a designed pipe installed through it. The pipe is placed where it will lower the water elevation at a slow rate without causing erosion.

Both of the conservation practices, waterways and structures are cost-shared through the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). The soil Conservation Service will provide technical assistance to landowners on estimate cost, computing acres or yardage and checking the practice for completion.

The Soil Conservation Service and Soil and Water Conservation District have

long been in the business of fighting soil erosion. It cost about one-tenth as much to prevent silt from going into lakes and clogging road ditches as it does to remove it once it is there. Silt is American's number one pollution.

Soil Conservation Service Technicians are available to help landowners solve their conservation needs. Our Office is in the basement of the Post Office.

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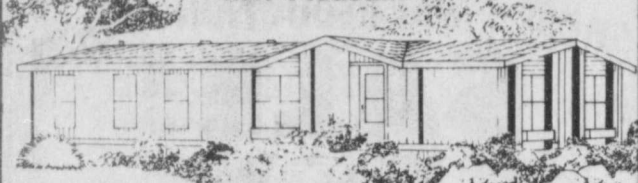

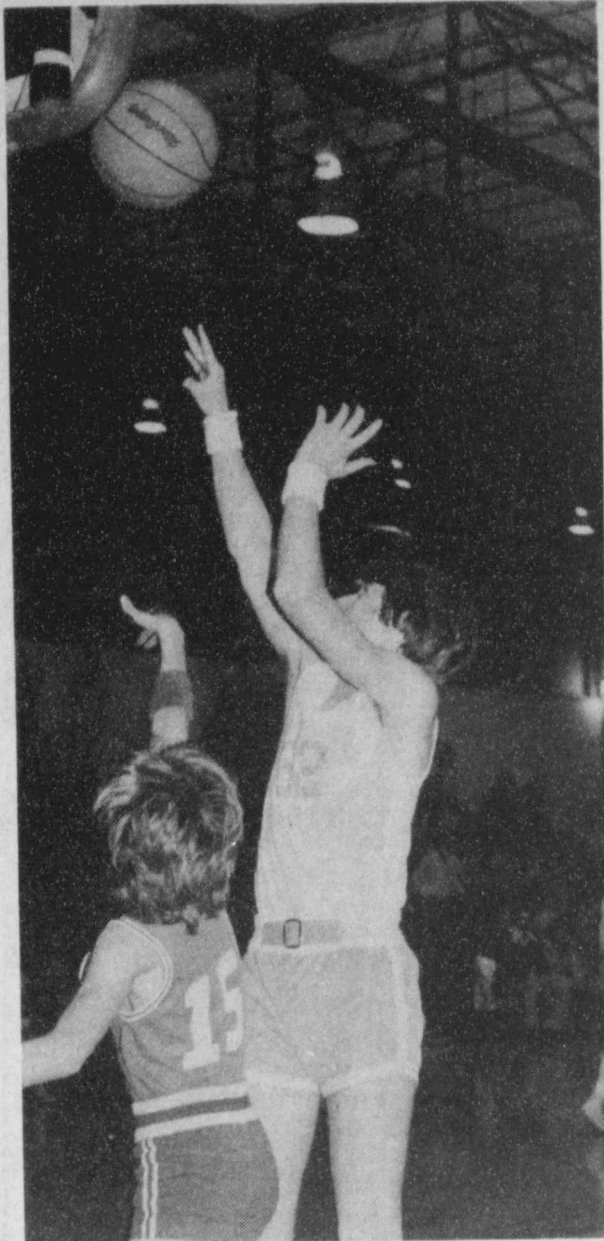

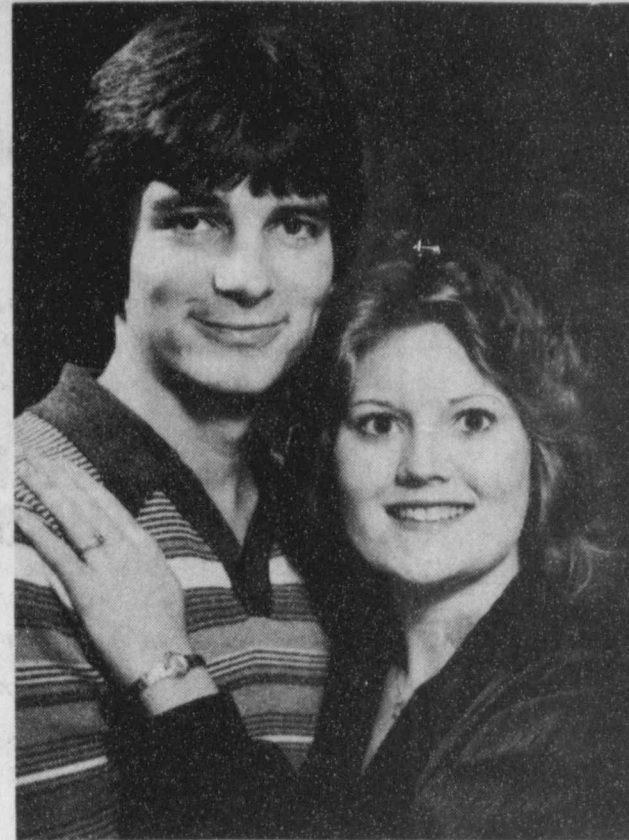
