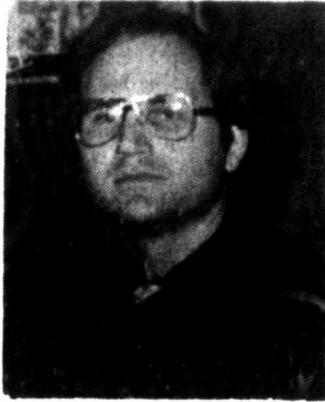

Chamber of Commerce Board Nominee Betty Williams is a native of Tulsa, Okla. but has lived in Colorado City for about 20 years.

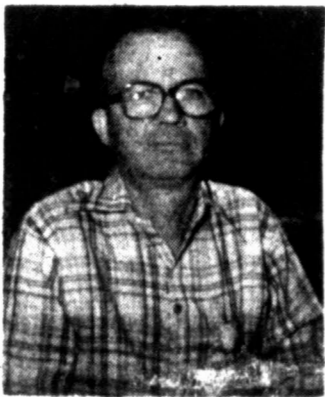
She is the owner and manager of the Little Critters Shop and also serves as Southwestern Bell Agent.

## County Tax Rebate Figures Indicate A Healthy Economy

Colorado City received \$7,812.98 as its share of the one per cent sales tax rebate paid out to Texas cities for the month of October by the Texas State Comptroller's Office.

This \$7,812.98 figure compares with the \$6,011.25 which Colorado City received in October 1978. Through the first 10 months of 1979 Colorado City has received \$101,703.14 in sales tax rebate as compared with \$110,742.40 for the first ten months of last year. This represents a decrease of eight per cent.

Loraine received no sales tax rebate for last month and also received no rebate for Oct. 1978. Through the first 10 months of 1979 Loraine has received a total rebate of \$3,423.82 as compared with a rebate of \$3,688.74 for the first ten months of 1978. This is a decrease of seven per cent for 1979 from the previous year.

A Colorado City woman was treated for cuts and bruises Tuesday night after her 1971 Chevrolet collided with a Mrs. Baird's bread truck in front of Ramage Appliance Store in the 1800 block of Hickory Street.

Olivia Hernandez, Rt. 3, was southbound on Hickory Street at about 8:30 p.m. when her ve-

hicle veered off the road and collided with the truck which was being loaded in the front of the store.

The truck was facing east at the time of the accident and the impact knocked it about 70 feet and left it facing a southeasterly direction.

The gas tank of the truck was ruptured and

## Community Nominees Are Placed On Ballot

Emergency feed program, agricultural conservation practices, low yields and failed acres are just a few of the items busy farmers are considering this week, according to Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service Director Don Stewart.

Limited funds have been received for ACP practices, he noted. Application for these funds may be submitted through the ASCS Office and will be considered on a priority basis by the County Committee.

"We have about \$20,000 for ACP program work," he noted. "We are currently also taking applications for low yields and failed acres. If a producer feels he is eligible for low yield, an application may be filled out in the office. Evidence of the crop must still be apparent for inspection by ASCS and application must be filed within 15 days of harvest," Stewart stated.

"So far, we have only a few applications on cotton and feed grain. Last year we had a total of 618 low yield payments on cotton and 80 on wheat, one for barley and 64 for grain sorghum," he said.

"Any producer feeding above normal who has lost 40 per cent of the grazing or crop may be eligible for cost sharing on livestock feed purchased," Stewart indicated.

"Any producer who feels eligible should apply at ASCS. Feed purchased prior to application is ineligible for cost share unless the feed purchased is on hand the date the application is made and can be verified by a representative." See VOTE Page 9

## Bale Count Grows

With cotton harvest nearing the halfway mark, producers have trailed more than 32,012 bales of cotton to the eight gins within the county.

Buford Co-Op Gin reports 2,302 bales ginned and 430 on the yard.

China Grove Gin reports 2,970 bales ginned and 1,100 bales on the yard.

Colorado Gin reports 1,380 bales ginned and 250 on the yard.

Farmers Gin reports 1,704 bales ginned and 100 on the yard.

Loraine Co-Op reports 6,043 bales ginned and 3,220 on the yard.

Mitchell County Gin reports 3,515 bales ginned and 800 on the yard.

Westbrook Gin reports 2,811 bales ginned and 350 on the yard.

Producers Gin reports 4,037 bales ginned and 1,000 on the yard.

## Political Opinions Are Polled By State Representative

Results of a personal opinion survey questionnaire presented by State Representative Walter Grubbs in September were released Monday along with some very interesting information about political opinions within the five county district.

Rep. Grubbs mailed 2,208 questionnaires to persons in the 61st Legislative District.

He noted 610 questionnaires were completed

and returned to his office.

Of those answering, 94 per cent indicated they consider themselves moderate or conservative in political philosophy.

Persons answering the poll are indicated to generally be between the ages of 30 and 60 years, married, live in a city and in good health.

About 10 per cent of the answers came from retired persons and 39

per cent of those polled say they are professionals.

"It is difficult to analyze an opinion survey and remain objective," Rep. Grubbs said. "In politics especially, we tend to try to make polls and surveys show what we want them to show."

Because of the fact, the final tabulations from the survey have been made available to the news media and

many of those who participated, Rep. Grubbs said.

"The information obtained through this survey will be valuable to me in attempting to represent the views and ideas of the people in this district," he said.

The poll included a question requesting areas in which citizens feel the most serious problems exist, he noted.

Of the six leading problems listed, inflation, fuel supplies, federal taxes, illegal aliens, drug law enforcement and interest rates, Grubbs suggested five of these are basically rooted in Washington and not in the state capital.

"However, with less federal control and regulation, the state government, perhaps, might be able to make some headway at least in the area of fuel supplies." See FULL Page 9

Thomas R. Sheppard III, Rt. 1, Colorado City, pled guilty to burglary and was sentenced to two years in the Texas State Department of Corrections.

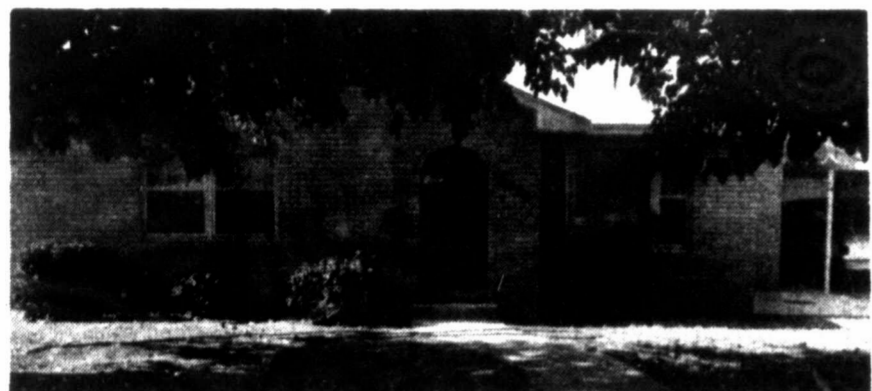

# Colorado Wolves Puts Winters Blizzards On Ice

Colorado City's Wolves had a fun time Friday night as they pounded the hapless Winters Blizzards 38-6 at Winters in the final meeting of the two teams in the foreseeable future.

The game was somewhat of a success for Winters as they scored on the Wolves for the first time in four years and they held the Wolves to less than 50 points for the first time in four years.

Three years ago, the Wolves won 50-0, the next year Colorado City won by 51-0 and last year the Wolves won 61-0. However, due to a district realignment, the Wolves will not be playing Winters for at least the next two years.

It was the last football game in the Wolves' uniform for Colorado City seniors and two of those got a long hoped for opportunity as they got to run with the ball the last two plays of the game. Tackle Raul Gomez, No. 79, picked up two to three yards and Tackle Britt Chaney, No. 52, tacked on five more yards as they fulfilled a dream. Chaney also kicked a field goal in the contest.

The biggest ground gainer of the night for the Wolves was Doug Johnson with 167 yards on 14 carries and three touchdowns rushing. Johnson also caught a seven yard pass for a touchdown.

Jay Green got 157 yards on 11 carries and one touchdown. The only problem for the Wolves in the game was penalties as they amassed 150 yards on 12 penalties which was more than Winters' total defense.

The Wolves got the kick-off to start the contest and moved quickly downfield for 79 yards to score with the tally coming on a seven yard pass from Mark Carter to Johnson and Chaney kicked the extra point to make the score 7-0 with 7:20 left in the first period.

The Wolves got the ball back four plays later after tackling the

Winters punter who got a bad snap from center at his 28. The Wolves could only get a little real estate and Chaney came in to boot a 22-yard field goal, making the score 10-0 with 2:20 left in the first quarter.

On Winters' next possession, there was a fumble at their own 15 which was recovered by Lowrance, one of two fumble recoveries for him on the night. The Wolves moved in quickly with Johnson going three yards to score with 11:25 left in the first half and Lowrance came in to kick the extra point for the first time. Using a soccer style kick, he exploded it through the uprights with only a stocking on his foot, making the score 17-0.

The Blizzards later got the ball at the Wolves 28 after a long run back and a penalty and moved in to score with the touchdown coming on a 20-yard run on fourth down and two by the quarterback, Toby Gerhart. A try for two extra points failed, making the score 17-6 with 4:05 left in the first half.

The Wolves came

right back with a 72 yard drive, the final 68 of which was on a run by Johnson on a option pitch from Quarterback Mark Carter. Lowrance kicked the extra point to make the score 24-6 with 3:06 left in the first half and ending the first half scoring.

The Wolves scored on their first two possessions of the second half, one on 93 yard drive, ended by a 42 yard run by Green, Lowrance adding the extra point, to make the score 31-6 with 6:40 left in the third period.

The final score of the game came on 64 yard drive, the final 57 yards of which was on a run by Johnson with 9:48 left in the game and Lowrance added the extra point, resulting in the final score, 38-6.

Two Winters drives were stopped on turnovers, one at the Wolves four on a fumble recovered by Russell Noel and one on a pass interception near midfield by Chuck Claxton.

Just for the record  
Among the new record sets hitting the market today you find such super names as Willie Nelson, Crystal Gayle, Moe and Joe (Bandy and Stampley), Hank Williams Jr., Margo Smith and George Jones. I mention George Jones last because this column will be devoted to him. Many country artists and disc jockeys proudly refer to him as "King George."

It's an established fact in the country music biz that George can do absolutely no wrong when it comes to a song. Certainly his new album "George Jones My VERY Special Guests" (Epic 3544) lives up to the reputation and expectations from King George.

It's a unique album because George is teamed with not one, but 10 different singers or duets. Count 'em! Ten! Of George simply sings the fire out of 10 different renditions with the likes of such good pals as ol' Waylon, Emmylou Harris, Linda Ronstadt, Willie

Nelson, Johnny Paycheck, Pop and Mavis Staples. He even slips off the beaten path with such non-country stars as James Taylor, Elvis Costello and Dennis and Ray (of Dr. Hook), but still manages to maintain the George Jones image.

One gets the idea from listening to the album that it's a labor of love from the various artists—an honor, really—to sing with the king. Even ex-wife Tammy Wynette got in on the session. And fantastically so. She warbles with George as she never sang with him before. Their duet, "It Sure Was Good," should be a single. However, practically any cut from the album would make a good single release.

Without a doubt, certain selections outdo the others. However, again, this would be a matter of personal choice.

Let's simply take the tunes as they appear. "Night Life"—the Willie Nelson composition, is performed with George's ol' pal Waylon Jennings. George has long been Waylon's idol and it shows when they sing together. Both are in the best voice.

"Bartender's Blues" with James Taylor is very good. However, the next track, with Emmylou Harris, is a country music masterpiece titled "Here We Are." It's a real tear-jerker that pulls the real talent out of both George and Emmylou. You seem to ask yourself, "Why haven't they done this before?"

The needle gently grooves from Emmylou to Linda Ronstadt on cut No. 4. It's another sad one titled "I've Turned You to Stone." Since I'm not the most devoted fan of Miss Ronstadt, I didn't personally expect this particular tune to knock me out. However, it did just that. It flat knocked me out and made me somewhat of a fan of Linda. She has never sounded better. The feeling is there in both voices.

Track No. 5 is the before mentioned "It Sure Was Good" with Tammy. It's known within the industry that George and Tammy still have strong feelings for each other, even though they divorced a few years back. That devotion and love comes out in the song.

Side two on the album shines with George and Willie teamed up on "I Gotta Get Drunk." George and Johnny Paycheck singing great together on the often performed "Proud Mary." "Stranger in the House" with Elvis Costello. "I Still Hold Her Body (but I think I've lost her mind)" with Dennis and Ray, and the great gospel song "Will The Circle Be Unbroken," which George sells so well with Pop and Mavis Staples. The gospel tune is my personal pick of side two on the disc.

Put all 10 of the tunes together and they spell money in the bank for the Epic Record people.

However, it's not the money that counts on this marvelous mixture of music. Instead, I find it a study in brotherly and sisterly love for a person who genuinely loves his fellow man as no other artist I have ever had the pleasure of knowing. A man who has never taken his God-given talent for granted. He deserves his title "King George I."

There'll never be another like him.

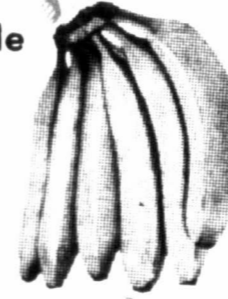

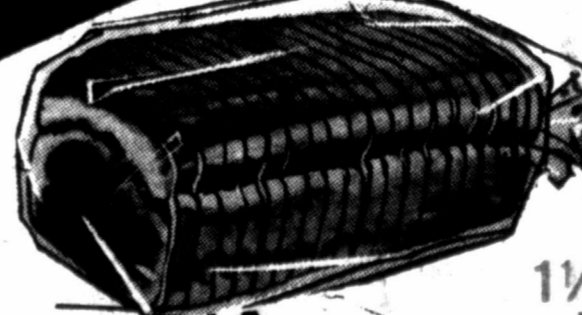
