Texas Highways Go To 70 MPH Speed Aug. 23

Austin.—More than two-thirds of the Texas highway system will come under the new 70-miles-per-hour daytime maximum speed for passenger cars which becomes effective August 23, the Texas Highway Commission revealed today.

Under the speed law passed by the Legislature this spring, all highways not zoned down by the Commission will automatically go to the new 70-mph speed Aug. 23. This means that some 41,500 miles of the state-maintained highway system will be allowed to come under the higher maximum speed.

The Commission today passed a Minute Order which zoned some 18,640 miles of the highway system at a maximum of 60 miles per hour daytime and 55 miles per hour at night for passenger cars, effective August 23. These highways will be restricted to the lower speed limit because engineering studies indicate they are inadequate to accommodate a 70-miles-per-hour maximum.

The Commission's action followed a series of engineering traffic studies conducted thru-out the state by the Highway Department's 25 highway districts.

A large percentage of Texas' vast Farm to Market Road System will come under the 70-mph maximum, although some of these roads (and some of the older primary routes) will be restricted to the lower 60-mph maximum where conditions warrant.

No Serious Injury As Trucks Crash

Gordon Holley and James H. Auwen of Lone Star, were carried to Titus County Memorial Hospital, Mt. Pleasant, Saturday night by Bogata Funeral Home ambulance after the Mercer Co. trucks they were driving were involved in an accident at Bogata. Their injuries were not considered serious.

The trucks were reported damaged when the rear one struck the forward one as both were traveling down Highway 271 from Paris about 1 p. m. Colliding, the vehicles spun in opposite directions, one hitting a utility pole near home of the late Mrs. Luther White and snapping an electric line, the other coming to rest in the Jim Fother pasture. It was morning before the trucks were righted and moved from the accident scene.

The impact with the utility pole disrupted electric power to towns served by Community Public Service Co. for about an hour.

Mercury Climbs To 100 Tuesday

Continued hot weather has prevailed the past week in this area. The mercury climbed to 100 degrees Tuesday and the daily high reaches near the century mark.

Skies have been clear except for an occasional thunder cloud. Monday afternoon an isolated thunder shower was reported north of Deport.

Announce 1964 F. Grain Program

Major provisions of the 1964 Feed Grain Program have been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and basically will be the same as in 1963.

The major change is an increase in the top limit on diversion from a farm's base acreage with an increase in the rate of payment for maximum diversion. This, the USDA said, is intended to encourage producers to divert additional feed grain acres and to increase their income.

Under the 1964 program a producer may divert as much as 50 percent of his feed grain base acreage compared with a top of 40 percent in 1963. Those who divert from 40 to 50 percent will receive diversion payments at the maximum rate for all acres diverted. As before, the maximum acreage diversion will be 25 acres if this is more than 50 percent of the base.

Producers who divert at least 20 percent of their feed grain base will be eligible for payments computed by multiplying the number of acres diverted times 20 percent of the normal yield times the county total price support rate for the grain diverted. For acres diverted between 20 and 40 percent of the base, payments will be based on 50 percent of the normal yield times the total county support rate. A diversion from the base between 40 and 50 percent (or 25 acres if this is larger) will earn payments for the producer of 50 percent times the normal yield times the total county support rate. Payments may not exceed 20 percent of the value of the land diverted.

The total national average price-support levels in 1964 will be the same as in 1963, but a slightly larger proportion of the support will be made available through loans. Payments-in-kind for both diversion and the non-loan part of price support will again be made in the form of negotiable certificates. The sign-up period for both fall and spring sown crops is expected to be early in 1964.

Morris Floyd Trimm, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. B. Trimm of Bogata, was brought Sunday afternoon to home of his parents from Idabel, Okla., hospital, where he was admitted Saturday night after a highway accident. He was reported in good condition Monday though suffering from back injuries.

It was reported the accident occurred between Clarksville and Idabel as Trimm, rounding a curve, met a car being driven across the center line. Pulling off on the shoulders to avoid a collision, rain-slick grass and wet dirt caused him to lose control of his car, which came to rest on its side in a ditch.

The Trimm car, a '57 Ford, was badly damaged.

Data Processing Change Arkla Gas Bill Schedule

A new gas meter reading schedule will cause Talco customers of Arkansas Louisiana Gas Co. to receive their next gas bill a little earlier than customary, the company reported today.

Talco residents will receive their next gas bill about Aug. 20. It will be due Aug. 30.

The schedule revision is a result of the company's conversion to an electronic billing system.

The company's new data processing center eventually will receive meter readings from all of Arkla's nearly one half million customers. They will be calculated and forwarded at the rate of 25,000 a day, 20 days a month. To achieve this uniformity, it was necessary to revise some meter reading dates, including those in Talco and Mt. Pleasant Districts.

The previous bill for Talco customers will be due Aug. 10. The bill due Aug. 30 will cover gas used between July 11 and about Aug. 9. Talco residents will receive their gas bills around the 20th of each month hereafter.

The new bill will show exactly number of days covered by the meter reading. A stable reading date will be applied in the future and will assure a customer's due date falling on the same work day each month. There will be no more than three days variance in the meter reading schedule from one month to the next.

With the time saved by the electronic system, bills can be processed and mailed to customers much nearer the actual meter reading dates.

OIL & GAS PRODUCTION WORTH \$14 MILLION IN TITUS COUNTY

With oil and gas production worth about \$14 million a year, Titus County citizens have a financial stake in the worldwide demand for energy and the complex economic and political problems involving the petroleum industry, according to statistics released this week by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

"We have pulled together some figures from the most authoritative sources so residents of Titus County can see how local pocket-books are affected by some of the issues which involve our industry," said J. Clyde Tomlinson, Association president. "Issues of current concern include the proposals to cut percentage depletion rates, extension of federal controls over prices at which Texas producers sell their gas, and development of laws and production methods that will help Texas compete with other states and nations for markets."

The latest year for which U. S. Bureau of Mines figures are available (1961) shows Titus County producing more than 4.6 million barrels of crude oil, valued at about \$15 million; and a small amount of natural gas. Titus ranks 77th among Texas counties in value of oil and gas production. In 1961 there were 269 producing oil wells in the county, according to the Texas Railroad Commission.

Although its first field was discovered 27 years ago, Titus County is the scene for the industry's continued search for oil and gas. Some 31 wells were drilled in the county last year, with 4 being wildcat exploratory wells, according to the Oil & Gas Journal. The Association estimated that more than \$1.4 million was spent on drilling in the

county this past year and that some \$380,000 of this went for dry holes. Close to \$168,000 was spent last year on geophysical crews using seismic devices to probe the underground formations of Titus County for possible drilling locations.

Leasing adds many thousands of dollars to the county's economy. Tabulations by the International Oil Scouts Association show major companies in 1961 were paying rentals on about 60,000 undeveloped acres, which comprise about one-fifth of the county's area.

Royalty payments to Titus County farmers, ranchers and other landowners are running at more than \$1.7 million annually, the Association calculated.

Titus County producers and royalty owners also make a sizeable contribution to the support of state government, with production tax payments of more than \$637,000 a year.

Industry taxes likewise are important to the county government and school districts in the county. For instance, 91 percent of the local property taxes collected for the Talco Independent School District comes from oil and gas operators; and 18 percent at Mount Pleasant.

A sizable impact on the Titus County economy has been registered by petroleum industry payrolls. About one out of every three payroll dollars in the county is derived from employment in oil and gas work, according to figures from the Texas Employment Commission. The industry payroll is more than \$2.7 million a year.

Titus County has one refinery with a capacity of 19,000 barrels a day.

Sam Womack Game Warden Titus-Morris

Sam Womack has been named as game warden for Titus and Morris Counties. He succeeds Bentley Wood, who recently was appointed district chief of the Dallas office.

Womack, an employee of the Texas Game and Fish Commission for one year, has been serving as warden for Canton and Van Zandt Counties and lived with his wife, Annette, in Canton. He is a native of Troup.

Womack officially began his duties in Mt. Pleasant Aug. 1.

Fred Clifton Is Hurt In Fall

Fred Clifton of Deport is in a Paris hospital after being injured in a fall early Wednesday morning while working at the Home Gin. It was reported Clifton was working on a scaffold, helping to repair the scale shed of the office at the gin plant and fell about 12 feet to the ground.

Both his feet were broken and he suffered a back injury, according to reports from the attending physician. He was taken, via Grant ambulance, to a Paris hospital for further examination.

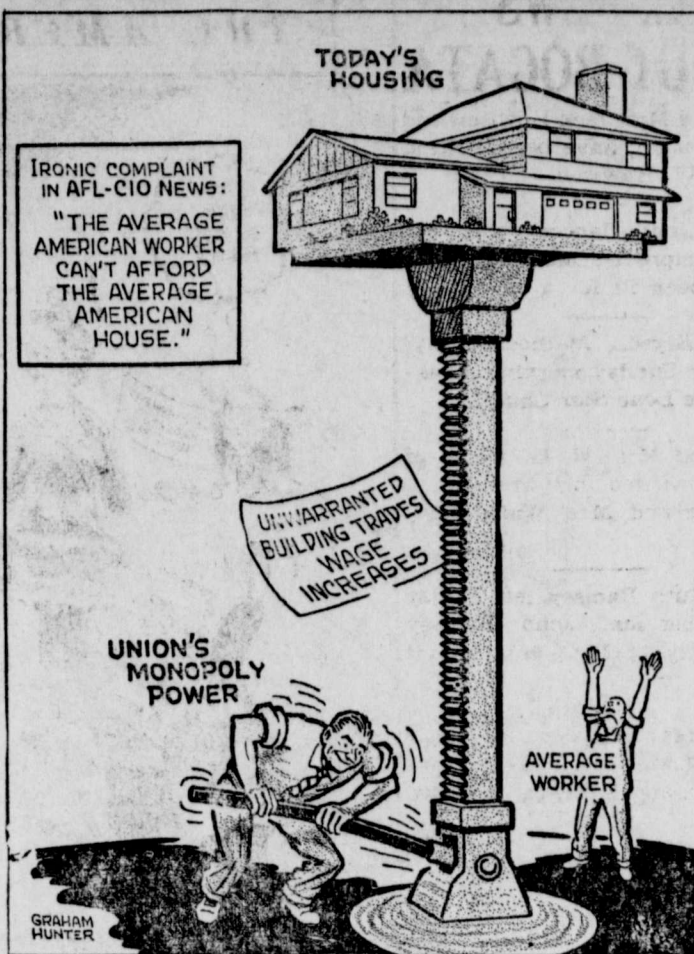

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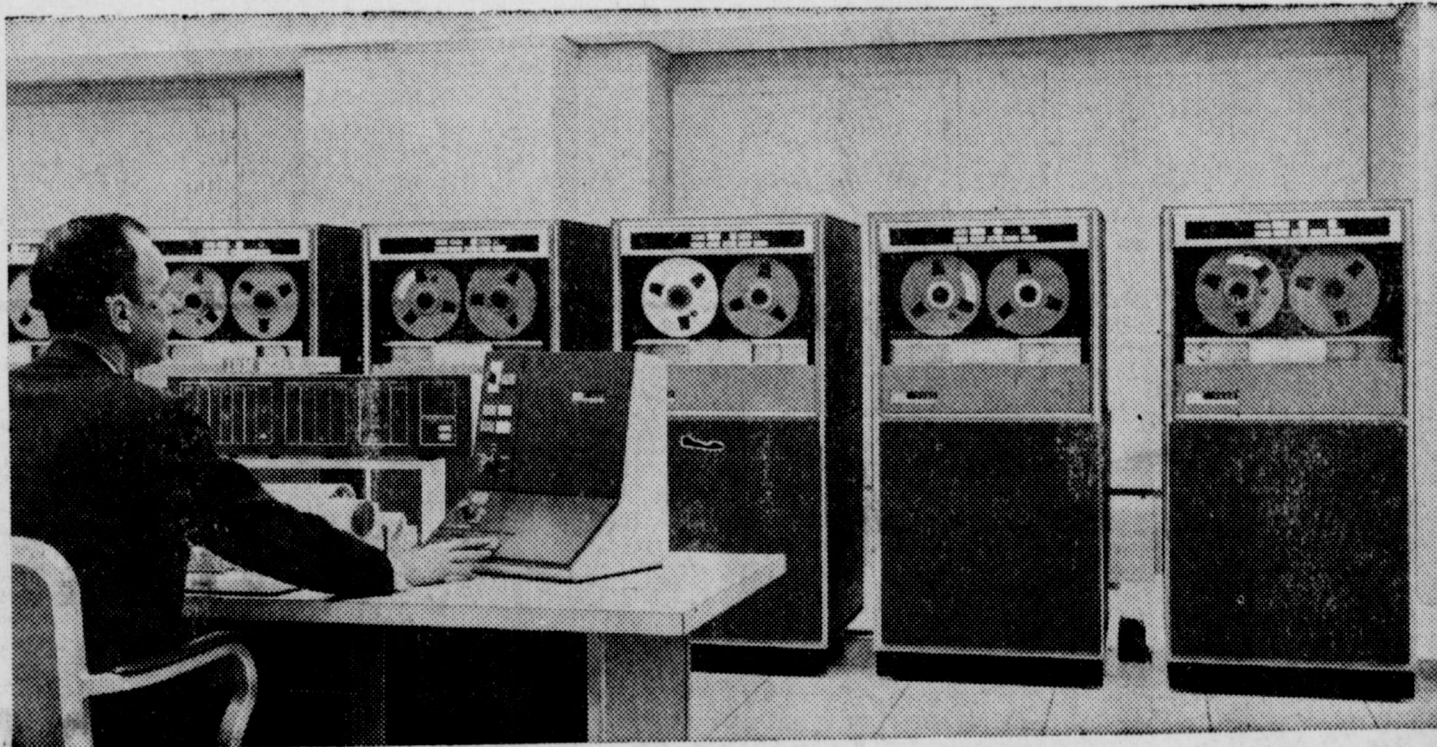

Alcorn Admits He Is Confused About All The Talk About Test Ban Treaty

Editor note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur is worrying with the test ban treaty this week, his letter indicates.

And as far as Russia's word goes, if she keeps it for three months, that's progress.

For all I know, Russia's word may be as good as her bond, but I don't believe I'd be interested in investing in Russian bonds.

Oil Test Well Near Bogata

A wildcat oil test will be drilled in Southwest Red River County four miles southwest of Bogata by Locke Purnell, Dallas, and Hinton Production Co., Mt. Pleasant. The 7,000-foot hole will be No. 1 H. D. Brown, 467 from the northerly north and west lines of R. Peters survey, A-695 and an 80-acre tract.

Location would fall about miles east of the 1-well Northeast Charleston Smackover gas pool in Delta County.

It is reported the slush pit has been dug, drilling machinery moved to the location and surface casing set. Drilling is expected to get underway soon.

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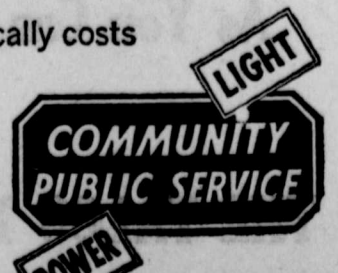
