G. A. CARTER, 63, BURIED SUNDAY

Well Known Farmer Living 9 Miles North Of Town Dies After Several Weeks Illness

G. A. Carter, 63, well known Lynn county farmer residing on Highway No. 9 about nine miles north of Tahoka, died Saturday at the family home. He had been sick for several weeks, leakage of the heart bringing his life to an end. A large crowd of friends gathered at the Dixie church Sunday afternoon, where the funeral service was held. Rev. Lawrence Hays, pastor of the Tahoka Baptist Church, and Rev. Thurston, pastor of the Wilson Methodist Church, officiating. Interment was in the cemetery here.

Mr. Carter had been a resident of Lynn county for about four years and had many friends who were deeply grieved to learn of his passing.

He was born October 8, 1869 in Howard county, Arkansas, and married Miss Florence Middleton January 20, 1889.

Deceased is survived by his widow, three sons and one daughter, six grandchildren, two brothers, and two sisters. The children are: Otto and Claude Carter, Tahoka; Ira Carter, West; and Mrs. Frank Russell, Dallas. They were all present at the last two weeks of his illness.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist Church here at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon. Rev. Lawrence Hays officiating, and burial followed in the local cemetery.

Vital Statistics Cards Mailed

Cards are being mailed this week to all citizens in the state of Texas by the Department of Commerce at Washington in order to make a check on the number of births and deaths during the past year. The survey is being made to see whether or not Texas will be admitted to the registration area. W. L. Austin, director of the census, writes the News that Texas is the only state in the union not now included in the area. He requests that the cards be returned if there has been a death or a birth.

The proper registration of births and deaths is of the greatest importance not only to the individual but also to the public at large. A birth certificate will prove right to inheritance, citizenship, legitimacy, school age, legal age for marriage, right to hold office, age for military service, and qualification for jury service. They are also used in securing passports and determining the birth rate in states, counties and cities.

No civilized community should allow a human being to die and be buried without an official record being made of the fact. Such records are indispensable in determining the cause of death, relative death rates, ratio of deaths to births, duration of life, rates of insurance, and relative healthfulness of different states and localities. They are necessary in proving death for probating wills, settling estates, establishing claims for insurance and pensions and proving amnesty and heredity.

Rex Rogers Is Killed At Eden

Rex Rogers, 35, former Tahoka cafe owner, was killed in a dynamite blast near Eden, Concho county, at 7 a. m. last Thursday. The body was taken to Pottsville, Hamilton county, where he was reared, for burial.

Mr. Rogers was a construction foreman on the Highway No. 9 paving job being done in Concho county, and was supervising the blasting of rock along the right-of-way when an rock along the right-of-way when an other man.

His wife had a serious operation a few weeks before and had just recovered enough to be up and had been to see him two hours before he was killed.

Mrs. Rozelle, 48, Died On Sunday

Mrs. J. T. Rozelle, 48, of the Midway community, died in a Lubbock sanitarium Sunday night at 9 o'clock following an illness of about three weeks. She was taken to the sanitarium Saturday.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist Church here at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon. Rev. Lawrence Hays officiating, and burial followed in the local cemetery.

Mrs. Rozelle, whose maiden name was Mattie Thornton, was born and reared near Tyler. The family moved to this county five or six years ago and have been farming near O'Donnell until about three months ago, when they moved to Midway. Three weeks ago she became ill with bronchitis. Pneumonia developed, and she was taken to the sanitarium, where an examination showed she was also afflicted with cancer of the stomach, appendicitis, and other diseases.

The deceased is survived by the husband and the following children: Mrs. C. W. Miller, John, Grace, Ruth, Vigil, Wilburn, Lola Mae, and Marzie Rozelle, and three stepchildren who live at Tyler.

Baseball League Formed Recently

Rev. C. V. Williams, 55, pastor of the Pecos Methodist Church and a brother-in-law of Mrs. E. S. Davis of Tahoka, died in that city two weeks ago tonight and was buried Saturday, April 15th. Mrs. Davis, accompanied by Sherman, attend the funeral and visited a few days with her sister.

Rev. Williams was known to a number of Tahoka people, he having preached in the local pulpit several times. Raised at Desdemonia, Rev. Williams grew up with the West and advanced from cowboy, storekeeper, postmaster, and school teacher to preacher.

Many Farm Loans Made This Year

Applications for crop production loans will be accepted up until Saturday night only, A. L. Lockwood, county chairman, states. April 30 is closing date, but since that is Sunday, no more applications will be accepted after Saturday.

Tuesday a total of 357 loan applications had been approved by the local office. Indications are that the number of loans will fall slightly short of last year, when 385 federal loans were made to Lynn county farmers for crop planting purposes. County Clerk H. C. Story states that the checks are coming very slowly now, only about two a day, but that he will mail them to loan applicants just as soon as received. A total of 269 crop loan checks had been received at the clerk's office up until Wednesday.

Protest Reduction Of H. D. Appropriation

Mrs. Joe Poindexter of New Home and Mrs. G. M. Reid of Tahoka represented the Lynn county council of Home Demonstration clubs in a delegation of 1,100 club women who appeared before the Texas Legislature Tuesday of last week in protest against the proposed 41 percent cut in appropriation for this work. As a result of the protest, legislators promised that the cut would not be more than 25 percent.

Mrs. Poindexter and Mrs. Reid were accompanied to Austin by two Farmer county ladies and five ladies from Lubbock county. Monday these women served a dinner in Austin for the senators and representatives of this area.

Tuesday the 1,100 H. D. club women, representing 95 Texas counties, marched five blocks to the Capitol building, where they were given a one-hour hearing. Each delegation carried a banner indicating the county represented.

Fossil Of Prehistoric Nautilus Shows Plains Was Once Covered By Ocean

A fossilized specimen of a "sea-animal" that lived in Lynn county millions of years before old Adam made his appearance on earth is on display at the News office. The fossil was dug up by Bob Caviness and Billy Hill on the west shore of Guthrie Lake recently.

The specimen has been identified as a member of the nautilus family, probably of the genus tetrabranchiata cephalopoda, all of which means little to our happy lives. Anyway, it is a marine animal—a mollusk—similar to our modern snail of nautilus, though much larger, this specimen being about a foot in diameter.

Mr. T. Cephalopod was found securely imbedded in a tomb of solid rock, where he had waited all these ages for some prowling moderns to release him.

Vehicle Licenses Now Total 1767

Seventeen hundred and sixty-seven motor vehicles have been registered in Lynn county to date, according to Aubra M. Cade, tax collector, and registrations are now coming in at a fairly rapid rate, considering the time of year.

Up until this date last year 1880 vehicles had been registered out of a total of 2261 for 1932.

"But, the way registrations have been coming in the last two weeks, I believe as many or more cars will be registered than last year," Mr. Cade said.

Nordyke Says Grader Deal Off

"We have not bought any new road machinery and are not going to buy any," Levi M. Nordyke, commissioner of Precinct 2 told the News this week in asking that we make a correction to the story carried two weeks ago in which we stated the county had contracted for \$7,280 worth of equipment. The contract referred to by the News, signed by four Lynn county commissioners, was not finally approved, we understand, and could not be made to stand a legal test. The county, through Commissioners R. E. Finley and Jim Izard did make a trade for a second hand tractor and a second hand grader and these are now in use in precincts 1 and 4. Mr. Nordyke stated. He modified the above statement, however, by saying he and Waldo McLaurin, Precinct 3 commissioner might trade for some equipment.

The News secured its information in this matter from the contract on file in County Clerk H. C. Story's office. We gladly make this explanation for Mr. Nordyke and for the information of the public.

This morning a road machinery salesman arrived in Tahoka with a reconditioned maintainer, which he said was for delivery to Commissioner Nordyke. "We have not bought the maintainer, but are just going to try it out," Mr. Nordyke told the News over the telephone.

Two South Plains women were honored at the annual Seventh District Texas Federation of Women's Clubs meeting at Hereford last Friday. Mrs. W. P. Avriett, Lamesa, was elected president, succeeding Mrs. J. A. Hill, Canyon. Mrs. W. A. Stephens, Lamesa, will be her secretary. The next annual meeting was awarded Amarillo.

The convention went on record as opposing drastic cuts in the state's education program.

Reports made by local women on Tahoka club work were outstanding. The Phebe K. Warner club was represented by Mrs. Larkin Weathers, the Junior club by Mrs. Daniel Davis, and Les Savantes by Mrs. Jess Gurley.

Fishing Is Good In Old Mexico

W. S. Taylor and J. H. Edwards of Tahoka and attorneys Franklin D. Brown and Durwood Bradley of Lubbock returned the end of last week from a fishing expedition down to St. Martin Lake on the Sabina River, 120 miles below Eagle Pass in Old Mexico. They report that they did not have to buy their fish, having caught all the bass from the lake and all the catfish from the Sabina that they could use.

This lake is said to furnish the best bass fishing in the world, a place where the wildest dream of the angler becomes a reality. Last year a San Antonio doctor set a new world's casting record by landing nearly six hundred bass in one day. An Amrillo man recently caught twelve bass in ten casts. Mr. Taylor says that a limit of twenty bass a day has been put on now, however. Americans going to Mexico to fish can procure licenses at four pesos and sixty centavos, which was about \$1.25 two weeks ago, before the U. S. went off the gold standard.

FIRE DAMAGE AT NEW HOME

Four Store Buildings Burned Last Thursday Afternoon; Were Accidentally Set

Four buildings were burned to the ground at New Home Thursday afternoon by fire which started in the John Miller barber shop. The buildings burned besides the barber shop were Acie Bailey's grocery store, and two buildings owned by J. T. (Truman) Balch, one of which was vacant.

Mr. Miller's little boy was looking for a canary bird that had disappeared in the building, and struck a match to look behind the hot water heater, it is said. In doing so some fuzz on the wall was set afire which in turn ignited some oil before the fire could be extinguished. All of the barber shop fixtures and Mr. Miller's household goods were a total loss. The building, owned by Forrest Lumber Co., was insured for \$400.

Acie Bailey suffered the greatest loss. He is said to have had about \$1,000 insurance on the building and stock, which only partially covered the loss. Truman Balch was also a heavy loser. We were unable to learn the amount of insurance he carried.

The Tahoka fire truck was called to New Home soon after the fire started but arrived too late to do any good.

Tips On Taxes

Austin—The Forty-third Legisla-
ture, now nearing the close of its
regular session, will likely reduce
the costs of State government from
25 to 30 per cent. Up to the present

time it has created no new commis-
sions or bureaus and levied no im-
portant new taxes. Every branch of
the State government has had its
budget reduced. Equally important
is the passage of legislation designed
to stop tax evasions, and to provide
penalties that will insure more ef-
fective enforcement of special taxes,
such as the cigarette and gross pro-
ductions taxes. The Comptroller es-
timates that at least \$5,000,000 in
these special taxes, which has been
lost through inadequate enforcement
facilities, will be saved and added to
State revenues.

There are two constitutional am-
endments pending, which if adopted
will be of far-reaching importance.
One would arbitrarily limit total ex-
penditures of the State and the other
would abolish the fee system of com-
pensating county officials and make
for lowering the tremendous costs of
county government, which averages
much higher than State govern-
ment. The first of these amendments
has passed the Senate and the second
has passed the House. Prospects of
their submission seems good, but
citizens can do a real service by
urging the submission of these two
amendments.

Appropriations for expenses of the
Legislature were approximately
\$500,000. This represents a reduction
of about 30 per cent below the cost
of the regular sessions since the pay
of legislators was increased by con-
stitutional amendment. The Senate
voted to make the pay of members
\$8 per day, instead of the constitu-
tional limit of \$10. The House re-
fused to concur and fixed salaries of
House members at \$10 and Senators
at \$8. It is impossible to give the to-
tal cost of the session. It may be
prolonged beyond the four months
and thus necessitate an additional
appropriation for salaries of mem-
bers and other expenses.

The effort to again bring up a
sales tax bill has failed for the time
being. The House committee on re-
venue and taxation gave an adverse
report on the Kayton bill, which
differed somewhat from the adminis-
tration sales tax bill, killed earlier
to the session. It is regarded as
doubtful whether the bill has a
chance of being brought out on a
minority report.

The income tax bill which has

passed the House seems to have lit-
tle chance of passing the Senate.

The House took up the higher edu-
cation appropriation bill last week
and made drastic cuts in salaries and
other items, going below the reduc-
tions already approved by the ap-
propriations committee. This is the
last of the major appropriation bills.
Senate figures in the appropriation
bills average higher than House fig-
ures and differences are being com-
promised in conference.

**Two Draw Lake
Greatly Improved**

"There may be greater joy in this
world but to the angler there is no
day equal to May first in this sec-
tion, as it is the opening day of
the fishing season," Eddie Warren,
editor of the Post Dispatch stated
to the News while here Monday,
accompanied by J. C. Combs, on a
mission of good will. On this day,
Two Draw lake, one mile north of
Post, will be opened to anglers.

"The lake is in better condition
this year than in quite a number of
years," Warren said. "Repairs of ev-
ery nature have been made in anti-
cipation of the vacationers, who will
spend many days fishing and camp-
ing there. New boats, new bridges,
new furnaces, new tables, new ben-
ches and new play-ground equipment
have been added and a general clean-
up of the entire lake grounds has
been made recently.

"The lake is an ideal spot in West
Texas, not only for anglers, but for
the whole family. It is surrounded by
beautiful shade trees, under which
free camping grounds are available
to everyone. Brick furnaces, tables,
benches, garbage cans, and city wa-
ter and lights are accessible to the
campers.

"The center of all sports begins at
the bath house where the caretaker
rents bathing suits, boats and fish-
ing equipment, and where a large
concession stand is located in which
visitors can buy candy, cigars, cigar-
ettes, sandwiches, fishing tackle, live
bait, campers supplies of groceries.
"Another feature of the lake
grounds is the small zoo which has
been started recently, and which will
house West Texas game.

"The lake is re-stocked each year
with government fish. In the fall of
last year 20,000 baby bass, crappie
and bream were put in Two Draw
lake. Old boats have been repaired
and new ones added.

"The lake is under the supervision
of the Post Chamber of Commerce
and we have secured the services of
Bob Morgan, an angler of some re-
pute, as care-taker this season. He
lives on the lake-grounds and will
be at the services of all visitors at
all hours."

causing the sea to recede. These mollusks were covered with muck which soon dried and hardened into rock, and this mollusk, among others, fossilized.

This branch of the nautilus family is said to have developed in the Silurian period of the Paleozoic era, estimated by geologists at 175-million years ago. Most of this species were extinct by the end of the Permian, and became entirely extinct during the Tertiary (first) period of the Cenozoic (modern) era, estimated to have begun about 20 million years ago. But, regardless of its age or the accurateness or theory of scientists, it is evident that some queer life existed in this section in the past ages.

The plains, particularly the South Double Mountain fork of the Brazos of which Mocar's Draw is the head, and the Canadian River section on the North Plains, are said by archeologists and paleontologists to be among the richest fields of research in the world. South Double Mountain canyon is said to contain fossilized remains of the giant dinosaur and the mammoth, as well as of other prehistoric reptiles, mammals, and mollusks. Though little has been said of excavations in this area, it is said that fossils from the canyon rest in Smithsonian Institute and other national and world-famous museums, where they are studied by scientists and marveled at by the public.
