Excavation Started On New Picture Show

Monday of this week the excavation for the new picture show was begun, and work of tearing away of the west end of the Hankins Drug Co. store will be completed by the latter part of the week, when the construction work on the theatre building by Mr. E. G. Lockley will be started.

Mr. Lockley appears to be slightly more fortunate in his construction of his part of the work, as there is some delay in the beginning of the work on the other two stores. Mr. Kindrick, who is to build on the east of the theatre, has been delayed in starting his construction work, as has also Mr. Hankins who will join the Kindrick building on the east, and will occupy the corner of the lot with the Hankins Drug Co.

The theatre building will occupy a space 28x94 feet, facing north, and the Kindrick grocery will occupy a space 20x40 feet, facing north, and the Hankins Drug Co. building will be 34x40 feet facing 34 feet north and 40 feet east.

It is stated that work of construction will begin on these two latter buildings about the first of next week, and the three buildings will be under one roof, covering a space of 82 feet north by 40 feet east, with the exception of the theatre building, which will extend 54 feet farther south than the others.

The entire structure will be finished with stucco on the outside and plastered on the inside, and when completed will add much to the appearance of that corner.

Mr. Lockley, in putting up his theatre, expects to give the public one of the most comfortable amusement places to be found in this section. He has purchased new opera chairs, some of which were installed in the old place; he has purchased a new projection machine, added to the other, eliminates the long tiresome waits between reels and when all is considered, he will conduct an up-to-date picture show when the new building is completed and his equipment installed.

Mr. Kindrick will also have much neater and comfortable quarters for his grocery business, and will be in the heart of the business district, while Mr. Hankins, with the Hankins Drug Co., will have the corner with an east and north entrance, which add much to the comfort, convenience and appearance of his place.

Ranch Near Angelo To Be Playground of W. T. U. Employes

One of the first 'dude ranches' in Texas is to be established by George W. Fry, general manager of the West Texas Utilities Company. Last week he bought 3,100 acres of land at the junction of Dove and Spring creeks, near San Angelo, for the purpose.

The ranch will be electrically equipped. The current will be supplied from a high line which is to be built from San Angelo to the oil fields in Reagan and Upton counties.

Located in one of the prettiest sections around San Angelo, the ranch is regarded as ideal for the purpose for which it was acquired—namely, as a site for employes of the company to hold their outings. It is easily accessible and contains some of the best holes of water on Dove and Spring creeks.

In addition to equipping the ranch with every modern electrical convenience, Mr. Fry also plans to stock it with registered cattle, sheep and polo ponies. It is reported he will build a large barn there this summer and will later erect a residence. There is plenty of water with which to supply the 175-acre irrigated farm which is included in the ranch.

The land was bought from Sam Ross of San Angelo. Immediately after the purchase it was leased to Ross for the remainder of the year.—Abilene News.

Mr. Fry at one time had pending a deal of similar nature with the people of Junction, but owing to the inactivity of the Chamber of Commerce, the project was abandoned, and the ranch which Mr. Fry bought for the West Texas Utilities Company is now on the market and will likely be sold within a few weeks.

This is merely to show what is frequently lost to a town by the inactivity of its Chamber of Commerce.

There is some talk at present of the reorganization and revival of this institution here and The Eagle will take great pleasure in making public the views of those who care to express themselves along the line of mode of organization or any other matter pertaining to the welfare and progress of the town.

Visits Junction in Interests of Highway

There has been quite a lot of good printer's ink used by two or three of the newspapers in the territory between Junction and Austin, in regard to the proposed highway from Austin to Junction via Fredericksburg, Harper, Noxville and intersecting the Old Spanish Trail at Segovia, leading to Junction, and up to date there has been little come of it.

However, there has been many things enter into the proposition to prevent immediate action being taken, the greatest of which was the known change in the Highway Commission, but since the appointment of the new Commission by Governor Moody, the matter has again come to the front for consideration, and the various counties between Austin and Junction have taken the question up seriously. Individuals in the different communities have become interested and readily see the feasibility in and the advantage of the proposed highway.

Mrs. T. A. Whetstone from the Noxville community was in Junction Monday, and interviewed different merchants and business men, soliciting their aid and influence in securing the highway. Mrs. Whetstone visited a number of the business men here who signed the petition she was circulating for the purpose of ascertaining the attitude held by Junction and Kimble County.

We understand that the Commissioners' Court of Kimble County is strongly in favor of the highway and will readily join with the other counties, Gillespie and Blanco, in putting it over.

The Harper Herald has been hammering at this project for more than a year, and has been very earnest in its efforts, which will in time be realized. Mr. Hunter, the owner of the Herald has been very enthusiastic in his fight for this movement and should be commended by his readers for the stand he has taken and the efforts put forth.

If the business men of Junction and the Commissioners' Court of Kimble County will only get busy and put half the effort into the matter of securing this road that has been expended by the Harper Herald, it is a foregone conclusion that the road will be designated and built within the next few months.

Looking at the project merely from a selfish standpoint, the business men of Junction cannot afford to look upon it lightly, as it will open up a vast territory to this town, the bulk of which has been going elsewhere.

Austin, Feb. 2.—Certificates have been awarded 37 University of Texas coeds for completing a course in camp fire leadership which has been offered there this term under the direction of Miss Florence Heintz, national secretary for the camp fire movement. There are now a number of cities where camp fire work is well organized and a paid executive is employed. These students are eligible for positions as guardians of camp fire organizations, and Miss Heintz stated she would recommend any member of the Camp Te-Waa-Hiss, the athletic club which is interested in such work, for such a position.

Hill Country Gets OST Routing Direct On U. S. Highways

The Old Spanish Trail from San Antonio through Junction and Fort Stockton and on westward is included in the map of the new "United States System of Highways," according to information received by H. B. Ayres, managing director of the Old Spanish Trail, from Washington. This confirms advice received two months ago by Ayres from the same source.

When the United States Highways were being designated in 1925, only two across Texas were included; the route from Fort Worth to El Paso, and the route from San Antonio through Del Rio to El Paso.

Mr. Ayres went to Washington last spring and reopened the question and, on the ground that the Hill Country of West Texas was of too much importance to have all travel routed around that section, either northward or southward, the question was reopened and the highway designated.

This makes the Old Spanish Trail now wholly a "United States Highway" from St. Augustine, Fla., to San Diego, Cal. It will cease being known according to the various State highway numbers and will take the United States shield numbering and it is now up to the Old Spanish Trail membership according to OST officials, to see that the distinctive Old Spanish Trail marking is also installed and the highway established forever now as the great and distinctive "Old Spanish Trail" that has been planned and so successfully promoted all these years.

SHEEP MEN BACKING PREDATORY ANIMAL BILL

Austin, Texas, Feb. 2.—The Sheep and Goat Raisers Association and other interests of West Texas are urging passage of the bill which effects close co-ordination and co-operation between the State and Federal governments in an effort to exterminate all predatory animals and noxious rodents.

The bill, carrying an appropriation of \$50,000 annually for destruction of predatory animals and \$25,000 for injurious rodents, was introduced in the House by Pool of El Paso, Runge of Mason, Petch of Fredericksburg, and others, and in the Senate by Senators Berkeley of Alpine, Real of Kerrville and Woodward of Coleman.

C. R. Landon, representative in Texas of the United States Department of Agriculture, is in favor of the bill. Others here urging its passage are T. A. Kincaid of Ozona, president of the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association; James Cornell, general attorney for the association, both of San Angelo; Bob Martin of Eagle Pass, and W. O. Schultz of Paint Rock, directors; Bob Massie, president, and John Allison, director, of the Wool Growers Central Storage Company, San Angelo; Robert Real, Kerrville; C. C. Belcher, Del Rio; Joe Kerr, Sanderson; Oscar Galloway and W. C. Bryson of Comanche, L. S. Munger of Sonora, A. L. Mudge and Goke Stevenson, Junction; C. D. McMillan and H. P. Jondan, representing wolf clubs in Mason and McCullough counties; Harris Duncan, Burnet, and Tom Parks and others of Bosque County.

Topping Pecans Leads to Profit

Topping of unprofitable pecan trees in the winter preliminary to summer budding is advocated in a statement from the horticulturist at the Texas A. & M. College. He says the practice affords an opportunity to make over those trees whose past performance has proven them to be undesirable and unworthy of future care and attention. Trees that are known to produce small or inferior pecans, topped and later budded, can be made to turn in a very acceptable profit.

Trees selected for topping must first possess constitutional vigor and be free from Rosette or other similar troubles. Most satisfactory results have been obtained by selecting trees, whose trunks are 12 to 16 inches in diameter, and with main branches four to seven inches in diameter. Frequently, trees, larger than the sizes mentioned have been successfully topped and budded; however, it is a safe policy to avoid extremely large trees for the best results from topping work.

In cutting the limbs, a large pruning saw, or buck hand saw that has been cut off to the length of 18 inches, is most satisfactory for doing the work. The limbs should be cut by removing the lower ones first, and working upward to the top. The underside of the limb should be cut first. When one-third through, cut through from the top. Limbs for the frame work of the permanent top should be cut from one and a half to three feet from the main trunk. Where extremely large limbs are encountered, it is best to first go out five or six feet and cut the limbs at that point to prevent a possibility of splitting back. Then make a second cut back to the desired length which can be done with safety.

Following the removal of the branches of the tree, it is advisable to cover the cut surface with some protective material. White lead and boiled linseed oil mixed thoroughly to a thick consistency, or asphaltum paint make an excellent covering for the wounds. Several pruning compounds made by commercial companies also give satisfactory results as coverings.

It is a hazardous practice to allow the limbs to be removed from the tree and remain piled around the body where they fall when cut. Late summer fires occasionally break out and with this dry wood around the tree, a havoc is sometimes wrought. It is best to remove all dead limbs from the orchard.

TEXAS AND TEXANS.

Future of Southwest

The president of the Missouri Pacific railway lines in a recent advertisement said: "The Great Southwestern will continue for the next few years the greatest agricultural development and expansion in the history of the country. This development is proceeding along sane and sound lines—not in any sense a boom." The greatest Southwestern development is in Texas. Railroads are showing their faith in Texas in the extension and improvement of their lines. More railroad building is under way and in contemplation in Texas than in any other part of the country. This in itself means the spending millions in construction and many more millions in operation of railway lines. Railroads do not spend money now unless there's an immediate prospect of financial returns. The faith the railroads have in Texas should extend to every citizen. Texas is a State of wonderful opportunities for those who have enough vision to profit by its prosperity.

Water Conservation Projects

In its last report the Texas Board of Water Engineers, basing its statement on detailed figures submitted, says there is no reasonable doubt that Texas will in the next ten years spend more than one hundred million dollars in water conservation projects. These projects consist of water power plants, levee construction and irrigation systems, now under way or on which filings have been made for surveys. The investment in these represent only a small part of the increase in land valuation that will result from the expenditure and an infinitesimal part of the crop production due to control and use of the water. The filings now made do not represent one-tenth of the feasible water conservation of the State. If you like startling figures get a pencil and attempt to estimate the possibilities to Texas from proper water control.

Huge Road Building Enterprise

Cameron County has voted to issue \$6,000,000 in bonds for road building. That county already has many miles of the best concrete roads in Texas and is eager for more of them. The county has decided that the cheapest roads are the best that money can build. There is not a bit of doubt that before Cameron county has finished building its roads adjoining counties will take up the work and that soon the entire Rio Grande Valley will be cobwebbed with good roads. As soon as confidence is completely restored in the Highway Department—confidence that a dollar's worth of roads will be built with every dollar spent—Texas will start a road building era on a scale as yet not thought possible.

New Daily Papers

Edinburg is to have a new daily paper conducted by Marshall McIlhenny, a veteran newspaper man. The number of daily papers springing up in that part of the State is strong proof of the prosperity of the section. Brownsville, San Benito, McAllen and Harlingen already have successful daily papers. The small city newspaper that is well supported is the best advertisement a community has as to its progressiveness. A poorly supported paper creates the impression that the business of the place is poverty stricken. A newspaper failure does more harm to a place than the closing of a bank, because it shows that the people have lost all heart in their business and all interest in the progress of their community. The local newspapers is the barometer of local business and local pride; the bank is merely the convenient medium through which business is transacted.

Moody Refuses Commutation
Governor Dan Moody's first action on a pardon application

was to refuse to commute the death penalty of a negro sentenced at San Antonio to be electrocuted. The board of pardon advisors, composed of ex-Governor Sayers and George Christian, former assistant attorney general, reported that it saw no good reason why the judgment of the courts should not stand, to which the Governor agreed. The verdicts of juries and courts should not be set aside lightly. The law abiding people are entitled to the protection that enforcement of law, and that alone, can afford them. Judges, jurors, attorneys and others should refuse to petition for reversal of judgments of courts, except for newly discovered evidence, and in such cases the board of pardon advisors, should consider itself a new trial court, and should make as thorough investigations as trial court.

Great Man Passes On

Texas has lost one of its greatest men, though he was a man known to but few people. Dr. J. T. Wilhite was for twenty years the director and head of the Pasteur Institute at Austin, and gave practically all of his mature, working life to the study and treatment of rabies. In that time more than 12,000 people were personally treated by him, and of that number only 16 died. He consecrated his life to the service of mankind without thought of personal reward. The highest salary he ever received was \$3,000 a year, though his talents would at any time have commanded much more. He shunned personal publicity and cared nothing for the luxuries that money could bring. He toiled that the unfortunate might live and to free lives from impending death was his greatest delight. His daily life was a living, daily eulogy to the man.

Not Lured By Fortune

A quarter of a century ago, F. E. Clark, now pastor of a little church in South Houston, saved the lives of an old friend's two daughters when they were drowning on the Pacific coast. He has been notified that the friend has left him a fortune of \$800,000, in appreciation of

that service. The pastor of the little church has decided to continue to preach to the little flock and forego the comforts and ostentations of riches. If he persists in that decision and uses his wealth to help others, he will indeed prove a worthy steward of a fortune entrusted to his keeping.

Coffee Drinking Contests

About the most foolish contests that men have ever engaged in are coffee drinking Marathons in which men test the capacity of their stomachs for holding coffee consumed at one sitting. The Port Arthur Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring such a contest and is backing a Port Arthur real estate agent, who claims a record for guzzling 130 cups, against any coffee swiller who come. Greta business this for a Chamber of Commerce.

Lived Well to the Last

Amasa Clark, who recently died at Bandera at the age of 101, had a history closely allied with the strugglers of Texas, but he was not satisfied to live in the past, even at the age when most men are in their dotage. He demonstrated that fruit growing could be made profitable in the Bandera Hills and prided himself in his orchard to the day of his death. In that way he doubtless prolonged his life.

TEACH CHILDREN SANCTITY OF LIFE

School children inspection of fire hazards is credited with saving Kansas City a million dollars in needless fires, within the past five years. The children are trained in the schools to note and to eliminate fire risks; and they are encouraged to make their city safe from fire by pointing out or abating these proven hazards.

Every needless fire is that much wanton destruction of the life work of those who built the property, whatever it is. From this standpoint, every fire is a public calamity, even a crime. To teach the children to abate fires is to teach them the sanctity of life.

TRAFFIC TALKS

It is the inalienable right of the pedestrian to walk on sidewalks and to cross streets at intersections in safety and without being compelled to run.

An analysis of that statement brings out several facts of interest to pedestrian and motorist alike.

First, it is assumed that the pedestrian will refrain from jay-walking, the crossing of streets at places other than street intersections, one of the commonest of all causes of accidents.

Secondly, it assumes that with a change of signals, motor cars will not start until pedestrians have had a chance to walk to the curb. But it also assumes that pedestrians will not start from the curb after motor cars have received the signal to go.

Thirdly, it assumes that pedestrians will be given ample opportunity to cross streets at crossings without having their line of march cut off by vehicles coming around the corner. Pedestrians should be allowed to cross first before cars are permitted to make turns.

I have no patience with the motorist who compels the pedestrian to run to get out of the way of the car. It is discourteous, to say the least. In addition, it is dangerous.

I really believe that most people are considerate and courteous. It is common to see motorists stop even when they have the right of way, to wave to pedestrians to pass.

Courtesy and consideration will do much to eliminate the little things which are irritating to the man who walks and to the man who rides.

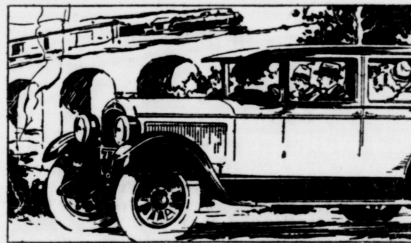

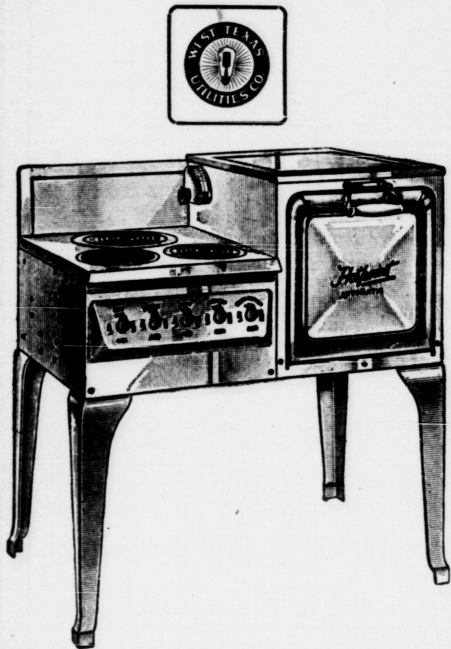

ELECTRIC POWER INCREASES PROSPERITY

In no country in the world are business executives spending as much of their time, energy and money in perfecting their plants and industries to actually give the people the highest type of service, as are our own industrial leaders.

TOMATOES AT FIRST THOUGHT POISONOUS

College Station, Texas, Feb. 8.—Tomatoes which today constitute one of the most important of the vegetable crops were in the early days of the cultivation grown as ornamentals and were not used as food since they were considered poisonous. F. S. Jamison, instructor in horticulture, A. & M. College of Texas, has pointed out in a discussion of tomato growing delivered recently over Station WTAW, the A. & M. College radio station.

"Tomatoes were seldom grown or used before the beginning of the last century," Mr. Jamison said. "Before that time people grew them as ornamentals in their gardens, but never attempted to eat the fruit which was regarded as poisonous. Today, the fruit is used as a food in at least 115 different ways. To satisfy the demand for tomatoes 469,620 acres were planted in the vegetable last year. The crop from this area sold for \$61,099,000. Of this large tomato acreage, 330,600 acres were grown for manufacturing into soup and other canned products. In other words, our market for canning tomatoes is much greater than our market for the fresh product. The figures mentioned do not include the tomatoes grown in the home gardens."

THE POWER OF PUBLICITY

A batch of reports or audits to be read and studied may mean drudgery to one man, while to another they provide an enjoyable opportunity to delve into the details of his business and secure valuable information.

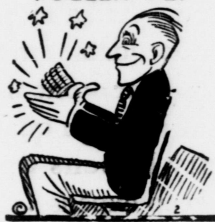
