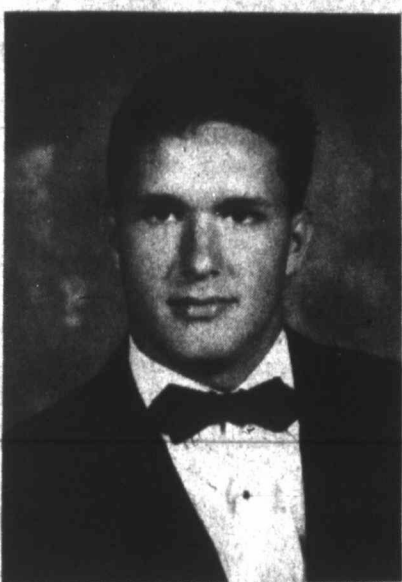

One killed in roll-over

The life of a young Colorado City man was ended early Tuesday morning in a one-vehicle accident South of Colorado City.

Robbie Smith, 19, of Colorado City, was killed in the accident which occurred three-miles South of town on county road 109 -- referred to as 'Seven Wells Road.'

He was a graduate of Colorado High School and had signed a letter of intent to play football in the upcoming season at West Texas State University located at Canyon. Two occupants in the 1987 Jeep

Cherokee at the time of the incident -- James Franco, 17, of Colorado City and Shannon Reeves, 16, of Spokane, Washington, who was in Colorado City to visit relatives -- walked approximately one-quarter of a mile from the accident scene to a residence, where authorities were alerted at 1 a.m. on Tuesday, July 21.

Department of Public Safety (DPS) trooper Kenny Wadsworth said that the vehicle was headed North on the county road when it

went off the pavement and into the bar ditch on the left hand side of the roadway for a distance of 400-feet.

The vehicle then came back onto the road surface and due to the wheels being turned, flipped one-and-three-quarters times end over end before coming to a rest at the edge of a cotton field.

No one was thrown from the vehicle.

DPS reports indicate that James Franco was driving the vehicle and that he was wearing his seatbelt at the time the incident occurred.

Other information remains under investigation by the department.

Robbie Smith was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Keith Ruddick.

Both James Franco and Shannon Reeves were transported to the Mitchell County Hospital for treatment.

The accident occurred just minutes after the anniversary of last year's interstate accident that claimed the lives of five people on July 20, 1991.

Sales tax check up 9%

Colorado City's monthly check boosted the sales tax check total to the point of showing a 9.87-percent increase when compared to payments which had been received by this time a year ago.

State Comptroller John Sharp sent sales tax payments totaling \$104.2 million to 960 Texas cities

which represents a 5.5-percent increase over the \$88.6 million rebates of one year ago.

This month's sales tax payments include taxes collected on May sales and reported to the Comptroller in June by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

Colorado City received a

monthly check in the amount of \$27,436.68 which is 10.01-percent greater than last July's check of \$24,941.02.

The sales rebate checks received by the city this year amount to \$218,601.13, 9.87-percent more than the \$198,957.33 which had

Two coaches hired by Colorado ISD

Athletic director Mark Howeth has announced the appointments of Gary and Sharon Graves at the athletic department at Colorado High School.

"They are two real good people," Coach Howeth said, "and have experience. They will be an asset to the overall athletic program and will be providing a tremendous opportunity for the students they will be involved with."

Gary Graves will serve as an assistant coach for both the varsity football and baseball programs and Colorado High School and his wife, Sharon, will serve as the head volleyball coach and assist with the basketball and track programs.

He comes to Colorado City from a position as assistant football and baseball coach at Paschell, where he served the past year.

Gary was the head baseball and an assistant football coach at Burleson High School for seven-years, prior to transferring to the Paschell school system. He also coached both football and baseball for two-years at Crowley High School.

"The duties for the coaching staff have not been completely laid down," said Coach Howeth, "but Gary will probably be in charge of the receivers and defensive ends."

Sharon attended Baylor University on an athletic scholarship. Her coaching experience includes three-years at Granbury where she coached varsity basketball and volleyball; Burleson High School where she coached basketball and cross country and assisted with the track program; and at Cleburne where she served as an assistant with the basketball and volleyball programs.

Trustees of the Colorado Independent School District will take official action on the appointments at the August meeting of the board.

County health costs remain same

Cost of the county's medical and life insurance will remain the same as last year -- and the employee's will receive two additional benefits under the new coverage.

"We are very pleased to advise that Mitchell County will not be receiving any rate increase on medical or life rates," Ted L. Parker and Associates representative Rita Lawlis said.

Travelers Insurance was selected as the re-insurance carrier, offering additional benefits to the county's employees at the same cost of last year's coverage with Commonwealth Life.

The basic cost for insurance will be \$85,166.16 for the year, with claims possibly pushing the cost up to but not above a maximum of \$132,219.96.

Additional benefits which county employees will receive include a prescription drug and a preventive care program.

The prescription drug program is set up to provide a \$25 deductible rate on medication with an employee maximum of \$1000 and a family maximum of \$2000. Employees will pay \$10 per name

TCC offers public hearing

A public hearing to be held on Thursday, July 23, in Abilene has been scheduled by the Texas Conservative Coalition (TCC) -- in an effort aimed at seeking public input on key state issues including state finance, welfare reform and private property rights.

"These public hearings are a chance for Texans to speak their minds to a panel of state legislators on important state issues," said Rep. Harvey Hilderbran, R-Kerrville, chairman of the TCC's Interim Study Committee. "We encourage everyone in the areas surrounding the hearing sites to make use of this opportunity."

The hearing to be closest to Colorado City will be held in Abilene, at 4 p.m. on Thursday, July 23, at the Johnson Building located on the campus of Hardin-Simmons University.

Hosts for the public meeting will be Senator Bill Sims and Representatives Layton Black, Charles Finnell, Bob Hunter and Bob Turner.

"Citizens seldom have an occasion to speak to elected officials and know they will be heard," said Rep. Warren Chisum, D-Pampa, a member of the Coalition's Board of Directors. "While all 51 of our members will

not attend each hearing, each of them will receive a detailed report of the proceedings. The hearings represent an important opportunity for citizens to have an impact.

Topics to be discussed at the hearing include state finance, to include debt management or elimination, tax restructuring and state spending limits; welfare reform, to include workfare, learnfare and the availability of affordable health care; and private property rights, to include environmental restrictions and groundwater regulation.

Conservative lawmakers have been criticized in the past for opposing legislation without providing alternatives.

Through these hearings, the TCC hopes to provide its members with a background for workable solutions to major state issues.

Information gleaned through this series of public hearings will be used in developing a legislative agenda for the TCC during the 73rd Legislature, which convenes in January of 1993.

The TCC was organized in 1985 and is comprised of 51 state legislators from both the Democrat and Republican Parties. Coalition members promote governmental policies which support limited

government, free enterprise, individual liberties and traditional family values.

Besides Abilene, the other sites at which the public hearings will be held include Austin, Conroe, Laredo and Lubbock.

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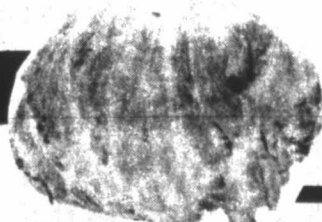

However, common to individuals with mental illness is an impaired ability to function, limited motivation to complete daily living tasks, and impaired ability to maintain good relations with family and friends.

Because of this, families must adapt by learning methods of coping with mental illness, and new ways to deal with the mentally ill family member.

An objective of this center is to support the consumer's family in learning about mental illness and in learning how to cope with the family member who has a mental illness.

Monthly meetings will be held at the mental health center to provide an opportunity for family members to develop a support group, to share mutual concerns, goals and solutions.

CHIEF LONE WOLF

The first rattlesnake roundup ever held? Why, it was right here in Mitchell County. Thought you knew that.

Back on March 9, 1936, the commissioners court agreed to pay a bounty of 10 cents per head (or maybe it was per rattle) and proof was "to be presented to the county clerk."

Course, these days lots of towns have rattlesnake roundups, but whether ours was really the "first ever" or not, Mitchell County was rounding up rattlers more than 50 years ago!

And there's evidence snake hunting with a bounty may go back further than the commissioners minutes book indicates. Consider this story from the Colorado Record, dated December 21, 1934:

"Rattlesnakes have proven a profitable source of income for Dee and Nelson Bassham of the 7 Wells community. During the past 14 months these two youths have slaughtered about 5,000 of the reptiles receiving a bounty of .10 cents each.

For the most part, the snakes were killed in pastures of the Spade Ranch. The boys would trail them to their hiding places in rock cliffs, caves and other places of hibernation and chop their heads off with a common weeding hoe.

Along with realizing \$500 in cash during times of depression, the boys have accumulated one of the largest collections of rattles ever seen in this part of the southwest."

How about that, rattlesnake roundup fans? To take this thing a step further, maybe Mitchell County was the first to ever stage a Prairie Dog Roundup, too. Yep, a Prairie Dog Roundup.

It was back in 1917. The county didn't offer a reward, but there was a threat of punishment for property owners who didn't participate in the program. Here's what we mean:

"Every landowner in Mitchell County is required to kill or have killed all prairie dogs on his or her land as the law governing the same will be strictly complied with and all dogs not killed by August 28, 1917, will be killed by the sheriff and the expenses charged against the land on which the dogs are killed and said land will be sold to pay expenses, if necessary."

So, now you have a clue as to what happened to prairie dogs that helped romanticize the old west. But, those little critters (as well as rattlesnakes) weren't the only enemies on which the commissioners declared war. No sir!

The first bounty ever offered in Mitchell County goes back to 1888. A .50 cents bounty was paid for scalps of wolves and coyotes. (For the record, D. K. McMullen was the first local bounty hunter. He brought in two scalps and earned a dollar. E. S. Bartell and C. M. Hall also brought in some scalps in 1888).

By the turn of the century, rabbits were ravaging this area, so once again, the commissioners declared war. A bounty of .03 cents was offered for jackrabbit scalps and .02 cents per scalp was pledged for cottontails. Eventually rabbit drives would have to be conducted to rid the county of its rabbit population.

So, more than 100 years after the first bounty was paid in Mitchell County, what's the situation on our varmints, reptiles and rodents? It's not necessary to go very far out of town at night to hear the chorus of howls sent up by wolves and coyotes....also, from the time we still have outbreaks of bubonic plague which reminds us there are still plenty of rabbits and other rodents in the county.

And rattlesnakes? Well, evidently ol' Dee and Nelson Bassham didn't get 'em all. Rumor has it, the rattling ones are still abundant throughout the county.

Maybe it's time for another "county bounty?"

COOK'S CORNER

Connie Waldrip was born and raised in Colorado City. She has lived here her whole life with the exception of ten years, when she attended Texas Tech. She also lived in Seymour for a short time.

Connie is one of our fine school teachers, teaching 4th grade students at Hutchinson. Connie is married to Mark Waldrip, President and CEO at the first National Bank. They have three children: Allan, 15 Mandi, 12 and Aaron, 8.

She enjoys reading, needlepoint and swimming when she gets the time. She says she really likes to cook, but her lack of time has limited her enjoyment. Connie remembers a day when she was

making a red velvet cake. She discovered she was out of red food coloring, so she followed the directions on the food coloring box on how to make red, and came up with a purplish-brown cake. It looked so bad the whole cake was thrown out!

Connie's helpful hint - Measuring Shortening: For one cup of shortening, put one cup of water in a two cup measuring device. Spoon in enough shortening (with a heated spoon) to bring the water level to two cups. Pour off the water and you have one cup of shortening with very little mess. Adjust the amount as needed. Example: for 1/2 cup shortening =

1/2 cup water raised to 1 cup. For 3/4 cup shortening = 3/4 cup water raised to 1 1/2 cup, etc.

CANADIAN CHEESE SOUP (from Lynn Carter, sister-in-law)

3 potatoes (diced)
3 carrots (diced)
1 cup celery (diced)
1/2 onion (diced)
1 stick butter 3 T. flour
1 pkg. frozen chopped broccoli
2 cans clear chicken broth
16 oz. American processed cheese

1/2 cup milk
3 T. cornstarch
Water

Simmer potatoes, carrots, celery, onion, and broccoli in water

(just enough to cover vegetables) until tender. Combine chicken broth, butter, cheese until all melted. Add milk. Add cooked vegetables. Combine 1/2 cup water with flour and cornstarch and mix till smooth. Then add to soup mixture.
