Pre-Glider School Gets Under Way This Week, With Flight Schedule On Monday

Planes Arrive Friday Afternoon Without Incident From Big Spring, Many Flown By Cadets—More Students Wednesday

Actual operations at the Artesia Army Flying School were under way the first of the week, with the flying schedule started Monday afternoon, and now things are moving smoothly.

About half of the initial class arrived here Friday afternoon, according to schedule, many cadets flying training planes here from Big Spring, Tex., the former location of the pre-glider school. The second half of the class was due to arrive sometime Wednesday.

In the flight of planes here Friday from Big Spring, no trouble was encountered and all landed safely on the new field.

However, no trouble was expected, as the cadets are all a high-class type of young men, well behaved and educated and on their toes in their new work.

In fact, the pre-glider school has an enviable record, with no fatality since the school started the first of June at Big Spring.

The school plant is now about 75 per cent complete and the buildings are rapidly being finished.

Officers of the school explained this week that the pre-glider cadets receive ground schooling in addition to flying, half of them attending school in the morning, while the other half takes to the air. In the afternoon the procedure is reversed.

Ground schooling includes meteorology, navigation, physical education and military training, the officers said, emphasis being placed on military training and building up the men physically.

Each class, as it approaches graduation from this phase of training, finishes with night flying.

The gliding program is divided into three phases, it was explained: The pre-glider phase, as taught here, by means of small power airplanes, with training in dead-stick landings; basic glider training, which gives the cadets their first actual work with small, two-place gliders; advanced glider training, in which large gliders are used.

The pre-glider program at the Artesia Army Flying School is based on a five-day week, ordinarily with the cadets off on Saturdays and Sundays. However, when the weather is bad and the required flying is not completed in the five days, the program continues into Saturday, and sometimes into Sunday.

Because of the rigid and strict schedule, which the cadets must maintain, it is probable they will have leave only on Saturday nights. The men are required to have a stipulated amount of rest and therefore cannot be permitted to come to the city on other nights than Saturdays, reporting in on Sundays.

Officers, enlisted men, cadets and civilian personnel alike expressed their appreciation for the reception given them by the Artesia people. The friendliness of the citizens was great in contrast to what had been experienced in other places, according to the general feeling.

Hightower, Grier No. 4-X, Flows 500 Barrels Per Day

Nay Hightower made the only oil well completion of the week, but it was an exceptionally good one, flowing 500 barrels a day, natural, from his Grier No. 4-X, in SE NW 31-16-31. The well was drilled to a total depth of 3,135 feet.

Bulk of Mail for Christmas Should Be in Postoffice by December 1

Next "A" Card Rationing to Be Wednesday, Dec. 2

All persons, who did not receive their "A" rationing cards for gasoline are to register on Wednesday, Dec. 2, at the local ration office, room 225, Ward building, the county board announced this week.

Board members said it will do no good to attempt to register before that time, as no applications for "A" cards will be taken in the meantime.

C. R. Vandagriff has been employed full time for the office and will handle most of the rationing problems, relieving North Eddy County board members, George E. Currier and J. S. Ward, who serve without pay.

Olmstead Tells About Training Of Glider Pilots

Although not generally known, gliding in motorless airplanes originated in the United States, members of the Artesia Rotary Club and guests were informed Tuesday noon at the weekly club meeting by Lt. B. L. Olmstead of the Artesia Army Flying School. But, the lieutenant added, the Germans were the first to make use of the glider.

Now glider training is gaining in this country and the future use of the motorless planes still is unknown. However, Lt. Olmstead predicted, their use is unlimited. He mentioned their use for parachute troops, cargo and passenger. Flying a glider teaches a person things he does not learn piloting a power ship, the speaker said, for the glider pilot gains knowledge in the employment of thermals and takes advantage of them, whereas the aviator in a conventional airplane depends on his power lone.

Lt. Olmstead explained the phases of glider training, in which there are four steps, including the primary pilot training. That is what the cadets coming to Artesia have had, equivalent to obtaining a private pilot's license, with thirty-five hours of flying time in a small power airplane.

Here, he said, they receive their primary glider training, or pre-glider training, as it is termed, taking the next step in their advancement, but still using power training ships.

At the school here and others of the same type the cadets are really in the Army for the first time and are regulated and supervised by Army officers, although the teaching is done under contract. (Continued on last page, column 2)

Box of Powdered Eggs, Made for Lend-Lease Of Much Interest

A small, compact package, weighing only five ounces net, and just received by Wilson & Anderson, is of interest to everyone who sees it, for the package contains a dozen eggs in powder form, the kind put up for lend-lease distribution in Britain. It is a sample and not for sale.

The package, which is priced at one shilling nine pence—or 1s. 9d., as it is printed—says the powder is suitable for scrambled eggs, omelets and all other uses in cooked recipes, which normally require fresh eggs.

A level tablespoon and two tablespoons of water are equal to an egg, the box discloses.

Jesse L. Truett, Artesia postmaster, this week again said that every effort should be made to have the bulk of Christmas mail in the postoffice by Dec. 1, because of the tremendous task facing the department and the railroads in moving it.

Unprecedented wartime demands on the postal and transportation systems, plus the prospective record volume of Christmas mailings, were cited as necessitating earlier mailings than ever before.

For Christmas mail a year ago, 21,950 mail cars were required between Dec. 12 and 24 to deliver Christmas mails, enough to make a train 270 miles long, Truett said. This would be about equal to the rail distance from Artesia to Albuquerque.

And, the postmaster said, the postal service heretofore has borrowed about 2,500 trucks from the Army and other government agencies and has rented 10,000 trucks from private owners, whereas this year the Army needs its trucks and private owners are reluctant to let someone else use the trucks.

Although railroads are cooperating, by converting hundreds of steel boxcars and similar equipment for mail transportation and the Office of Defense Transportation has ordered all unnecessary travel be cut during the holiday season, a bottleneck is seen unless postal patrons the nation over also cooperate by mailing early.

Even with all precautions taken and early mailing on the part of patrons, delivery cannot be guaranteed in time for Christmas.

So, as Truett suggests, shop and mail early.

John P. Nelson of Cottonwood Dies Early on Tuesday

John P. Nelson, prominent Pecos Valley farmer since the turn of the century, died at his home on the Cottonwood at 3:30 o'clock Tuesday morning at the age of 82 years.

Born April 2, 1860, in Sweden, Mr. Nelson came to the United States in 1885 as a youth and settled at Oakland, Neb. There he was married to Miss Alma Nelson Oct. 29, 1886, and to them were born five children, of whom four survive, with their mother. They are Mrs. Selman Thompson, San Diego, Calif.; John August Nelson, Cottonwood; Mrs. Clarence Pearson, Cottonwood; and C. W. Nelson, Cottonwood. The fifth child was the late Mrs. O. A. Pearson, who died Sept. 10, 1939.

There also survive nineteen grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren, and a brother, Gus Nelson, Corpus Christi, Tex.

All of the children were at his bedside, except Mrs. Thompson, at the time of the death of Mr. Nelson.

The family moved to Louise, Tex., in 1894 and from there to Hagerman in the Pecos Valley in 1901, where Mr. Nelson homesteaded 160 acres of land.

From there the family moved in 1918 to the Lake Arthur and Cottonwood community, where Mr. Nelson lived the remainder of his life.

Mr. Nelson was a Methodist and a faithful worker in the faith all of his life.

Funeral services will be from McClay Chapel at 2:30 o'clock Friday afternoon by the Rev. C. A. Clark pastor of the First Methodist Church. Burial will be in Woodbine Cemetery.

Pallbearers will be Jesse I. Funk, Victor Parker, Everett and Glenn O'Bannon, W. E. Taylor, Carl Jackson and Fred Chambers.

RATION STICKERS INCORRECTLY PLACED

Attention was called again this week to the proper placing of mileage rationing stickers on automobiles, a number of which have been noticed already attached, but placed incorrectly.

S. M. Graf, state director of the Office of Price Administration, last week announced that the stickers should be on left stationary window, where they can be seen at all times. By stationary, he explained, he meant windows which cannot be rolled out of sight, that the wing type are all right.

However, if the front windows roll down, then a sticker should be placed on a rear left window.

"A" book stickers have been noted on windshields, on right windows and on left windows, which roll out of sight. This procedure is incorrect.

Rationing of Coffee Is to Start Sunday

Sales Frozen This Week, Catching Some Persons Short—Others Deplete Stocks in the Local Stores

Coffee has become a scarce article in many Artesia homes this week, while in others there probably is a superabundance, judging from the run on coffee sales in the food stores here prior to the freezing of the popular commodity at midnight Saturday.

Rationing of coffee the nation over will start at midnight Saturday of this week—or, for practical purposes, next Monday morning.

Although grocers attempted to limit the sales of coffee the last several weeks, and especially the latter part of last week, the shelves were depleted in many stores, as customers laid in extra supplies, in preparation for the rationing.

However, many others, who did not take part in the hoarding spree, but wished to buy coffee for ordinary needs, were unable to make purchases, so they are coffeeless this week and until they can buy their first coffee under the rationing system.

This may be done by presenting ration stamp No. 27 out of the sugar book. This stamp entitles the holder to purchase one pound of coffee between Nov. 29 and Jan. 3, a period of five weeks.

However, the removal of coffee stamps from any book showing an age of 14 years or less at the time of registration last May is in violation of coffee rationing regulations. The OPA announced that when War Ration book No. 1 is exchanged for No. 2 in the near future, books will be checked closely to determine whether any coffee stamps have been removed illegally. The troop is being sponsored by the Baptist Church and makes the third in Artesia active at this time.

Artesia Community Will Throw Blowout Saturday Next Week

Cowboy Garb in Order for Citizens, as Army, Civilian Personnel, Families, Cadets Take Part in Barbecue and Dance

The Artesia community will go Western Saturday of next week in a big welcoming blowout for the Army officers and men, flying cadets and civilian personnel and families of the Artesia Army Flying School.

Included in the program will be a barbecue and dance, the latter with members of the Pioneer Dance Club serving as hosts. There will be old-time Western square dances, as well as round dances for the guests.

A further Western touch will be added on Sunday afternoon, when a rodeo will be staged at the arena west of the city by the Artesia Goat Ropers Club, with many of the customary events.

And when the community goes Western, it will go the whole way, for the city in general and citizens in particular are expected to don Western garb.

The planning committee is seeking a considerable quantity of beef for the barbecue Saturday of next week and is looking to ranchers of the community to step forward with the necessary meat. Anyone willing to contribute call any member of the committee, or H. G. Watson, at the bank.

Further details of the blowout are to be worked out by a planning committee, headed by Mrs. C. R. Blocker, which made the tentative plans Tuesday evening. Initial plans for the entertainment of the city's guests were made Monday evening, when Mayor Emery Carper's service club committee met at the city hall. At that time Mrs. H. R. Paton, temporary chairman, appointed Mrs. Blocker and asked that the committee work out a long-range program of entertainment for the enlisted men and a schedule of costs.

The mayor offered the use of the Carper Terrace in the Carper building for a service club and the committee accepted his offer and immediately set into motion plans to make the men happy and keep them out of mischief while on leave in Artesia.

Cotton Farmers Vote Dec. 12 On '43 Quotas

New Mexico cotton growers will vote Saturday, Dec. 12 on cotton marketing quotas for the 1943-44 season, it was announced this week by Fred L. O'Cheskey, chairman of the New Mexico AAA committee. Growers in the other cotton states will vote on the same day.

Should more than two-thirds of the voting growers in the cotton growing states approve, quotas will be effective for the 1943 crop. In the vote a year ago in regard to the current crop, 94 per cent of the producers approved the quotas.

"New Mexico cotton producers, when they go to their respective polling places Dec. 12," said O'Cheskey, "should remember that the nation has nearly a two-year supply of cotton on hand and that a larger than usual amount of this supply is composed of the shorter staples and lower grades."

"There is a ceiling on the price of cotton," he added, "and if the producers fail to approve the marketing quotas for 1943, there will be no cotton loan program. They would find themselves with a ceiling over their cotton prices, but with no floor under them."

This marks the thirty-sixth year that the appearance of the small tuberculosis seal on the flood of Christmas mail has proved that Americans are sincerely trying to protect their own against the insidious infecting disease.

Americans have full confidence in the seal, a confidence deeply rooted in the victories which have been won over tuberculosis, Mrs. Morgan said.

This year marks a crisis in the anti-tuberculosis campaign, she pointed out, for tuberculosis has always increased during war. The increase is already evident in many sections of this country. Mrs. Morgan said that this year the Christmas seal sale is of more importance to the health and welfare of this country than in any year since 1917.

Large Percentage Applicants Seek Supplemental Gas

Basic "A" gasoline books were issued to 1,671 persons in North Eddy County Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of last week, 1,322 of them in Artesia, while one motorcycle gasoline ration book was issued.

The registration for the most part went off smoothly here and throughout North Eddy County, workers reported.

S. M. Graf, state OPA director, said about half of all applicants in the state who received basic "A" books have applied for supplemental ration books.

George E. Currier and J. S. Ward, local members of the Eddy County rationing board, said the proportion here may run even higher than that in the state supplemental ration application.

After noting the heavy volume of supplemental applications for more gasoline than allowed in the basic four-gallon-a-week ration, Graf added that delays might be inevitable in receiving the supplemental books.

Those who have applied for and do not receive word from local boards as to disposition of their application, should go ahead and use their basic "A" book starting Dec. 1, Graf said.

Any supplemental rations furnished by local boards will be books issued in addition to the basic book issued at schools.

Graf also urged that all who have not secured a certificate of automobile registration seek to do so before Dec. 1, when rationing takes effect, and that motorists should apply to local boards for basic ration books upon receipt of the certificate from the state authority.

And each in turn is destined to failure, at the same time constantly trimming down the army and navy of the mikado, until ultimate defeat will have come about and Japan will have committed "hari-kari" as a nation, rather than admit defeat, take a licking in the Solomons and attempt to win the war elsewhere.

"Hari-kari," as applied to the Japs, is a great institution; we're for it.

(Here are three letters from Lt. James M. Webb to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Webb, written in September and October and published in the order written.)

Sept. 2, 1942.

Dear Mother and Dad:

Sent you a cablegram today. Hope it reached you soon after I sent it, because it may be days before you get another.

I am in England and it is cold. My blood has to get a bit thicker than it is now.

Jo came to see me at Fort Dix, N. J., for a few days, then went back to Oklahoma City. She said she had just written you.

By the way, while I was at Fort Dix, I received the package you sent. It had been following me around. I gave the things to Jo. She wrote Big Mama to thank her for the presents.

Don't worry about me here, because I think we are probably safe. Sure hope this war comes to an end soon.

This English money is a mess. I exchanged my American money for it and now I have to walk one-sided to carry it around.

As yet there is not much to say, but write me all the news to the same address.

Sept. 26, 1942.

Received your V-Mail today. Letters should have reached by now, one cablegram and about two letters on way.

Jo's address is 1207 N.W. 26, Oklahoma City, Okla. That has been the same address all the time.

I do not understand why your letter was returned. Also received a letter from L. C. and Artie today. Really was surprised to receive a letter from them so far away. They seem to be getting along very well.

Jo is working in Oklahoma City and by her letter she is having a hard time getting used to working. Says she is getting fat; may even weigh 200 pounds when I get back, but I cannot talk much because I still weigh about 220 pounds. It is hard to believe, but I do.

We keep moving around so much that our APO number changes all the time, but write me the one they gave on the safe arrival card from Washington.

Took a visit to London the other day, quite a city but nothing like U. S. cities. No large buildings at all. Some blocks have been bombed out completely, even worse than the pictures we used to see of it.

Where is Homer now? Hope George does not have to go into the Army yet. Maybe the war will be over by the time they call him.

They must have lost one of my letters because it explained all about receiving the picture in a box. Well, anyway they are just what I wanted. I carry them in my pocketbook all the time.

If you have any old candy bars or anything sweet laying around the house you don't want I sure would like to have some. The sweetest thing I had since we left New York is some sweetbread (they say it has sugar in it, but I doubt it).

About all we do is stop, eat, and work. At night the whole nation is blacked out, everything. I even caught the devil the other night for lighting a 5-cent cigar after it had got dark.

Had a two-day visit of London: what a place! Many city blocks have been wiped off the map. We went in the House of Parliament, saw Winston Churchill in person, also 10 Dowling Street, where he lives. Went to Westminster Abby, where all the old Englishmen are buried. Saw the John and Charles Wesley tombs and hundreds of other former Englishmen.

Still with a Negro outfit. The English think they are the roughest soldiers in the world, so we let it go.

Half the American Army over here seems to be from Texas, so I feel right at home among them. There is a doctor in an outfit near ours who is from Pleasanton, Tex.

Having a little trouble with our colored chaplain, who is a hard-boiled Baptist from Philadelphia, but I have about got him straightened out.

The deep pink complexion around Little Rock, Ark., police headquarters are not sunburns. Within twenty-four hours, a masked gunman held up a service station across the street and escaped; a safecracker robbed a restaurant safe—also across the street; two tires were stolen from a truck parked in the filling station, and then somebody inserted twelve slugs in the soft drink vending machine in a city hall corridor adjacent to headquarters.

In Philadelphia, John Michel, Red Cross executive, made this appeal: "Will the party who found a 12-bed emergency hospital in North Philadelphia yesterday kindly return it to the Red Cross?" Michel explained that a cabinet maker, who built the interior of the 20x30-foot canvas emergency station, was delivering it when he lost the whole thing off his truck.

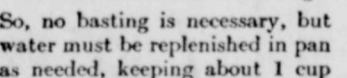
You can enjoy Your Thanksgiving Dinner

You will have greater enjoyment from your Thanksgiving dinner if you have been able to prepare it with a few quick twists of the wrist instead of making yourself a holiday slave to the kitchen. Simply use a dough blanket over your turkey—no basting—no watching. Result—a beautiful golden browned bird with no trouble at all!



Method

Brush the cleaned, stuffed and trussed bird with shortening; place securely, breast up in a large flat pan. Prepare stiff dough, using 6 to 8 cups of flour depending on the fowl's size. Add just enough water to form mixture that can be rolled. Knead mixture well; roll out ¼ to ¾ inch thick and large enough to form a blanket that will drop clear down on either side of the bird. Place over bird (no tucking under, mind you). Be sure to let it hang free and be sure that it covers the bird! Pour 1 cup of water in pan; place immediately in hot oven (450° F.) for 15 minutes to allow blanket to set. This is absolutely necessary. And don't let the turkey stand with the dough blanket on. If blanket should stretch thin at legs or thigh, take it off and re-roll it. When blanket is set, reduce heat to 350° F. and continue cooking. So, no basting is necessary, but water must be replenished in pan as needed, keeping about 1 cup in the pan all the time. Remove blanket by cracking with a small hammer about ½ hour before roasting period is through. Be careful not to break skin when removing blanket. Brown uncovered if a deeper color is desired.



For Roasting Time
Turkey generally takes 15 to 25 minutes per pound depending on the way the bird has been fed. The smaller the bird, the longer the time per pound required for roasting. Cook at 325°-350° F.

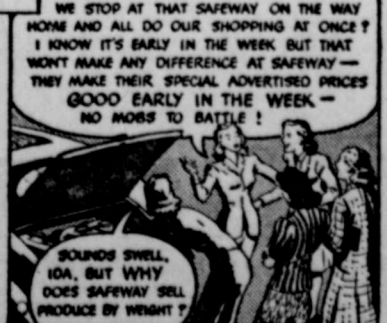

Artesia Women Are Active in "Women at War Week," Nov. 22-28

The Women's Division of the War Savings Staff has a recipe to increase the consumption of War Bonds and Stamps by the American people.

With additional bombers, destroyers, tanks and guns as its yield, every woman in the country is being called upon to try this new recipe in her own home every day for the duration. Its main ingredient is the spirit of sacrifice, to which is added a major portion of planning, a dash of imagination, and a cheerful outlook. Given these four essentials the Women's Division believes that a dish can be concocted which will contain spice enough to keep up the morale; nutrition and warmth for a healthy nation, and provide a mental attitude which will enable every woman to face the boys as they return from the front with the thought that "I too have done my part!"

It is not an easy recipe to follow. It will take courage and determination to give up even a few of the good things which are now accepted factors in our lives. It will require ingenuity to provide substitutes for the necessities we must do without. It will take thought and extra work to make over clothing, re-knit the wool, and use the odds and ends which have heretofore been discarded.

The material yield will vary with the station in life, and the amount of sacrifice made, but the recipe is guaranteed if followed by everybody to yield a spiritual satisfaction, and to maintain the constant stream of production of war materials which the boys need to lick the Axis; decrease the cost of war and the cost of living, and furthermore, to help put the boys back to work in peacetime activities after their war job is done.

Women of America are being asked now before it is too late, to sacrifice, conserve and buy War Bonds and Stamps. The goal is 10 per cent of the national income. Plan now to make part of the contribution regularly and systematically.

The organization of women now being perfected in every state are welded together to launch the work of the women in a special drive.

In cooperation with the retailers, with radio and the press the efforts and activities of the women will be coordinated and directed to one end—the sale of more War Bonds and Stamps than in any other single week since Pearl Harbor. New outlets and devices for the sale of bonds and stamps will be provided by the women.

Various entertainments are being sponsored by women over the nation this week in the "Buy Bomber" campaigns.

Housewives, farm women, business women, including every woman in the Artesia community, are being urged this week when in town shopping to buy a bond. Arrangements have been made at places of business in the city for the sale of bonds.

Friday, Nov. 27, has been designated as "Farm Women's Day," when all women in the farm districts are being asked to buy their quota of bonds and stamps.



Saturday, Nov. 28, will be the "American Family Day," which will conclude "Women at War Week," when all members of the family are being asked to buy bonds and stamps.

Human revolutions are of slow growth. Modern democracy is the heir of the ages, of men dead for many centuries. It begins in the thoughts of Egyptian, Hebraic, and Grecian philosophers, and burst into open fire in the Magna Carta, when, for the first time, the Rights of Man were boldly proclaimed. It progressed through hundreds of years of darkness, oppression, and misery, sometimes shining brightly, sometimes almost disappearing in the murk of tyranny and despair. It broke into a wider blaze in the American and French Revolutions. But democracy is still in the process of becoming. It may take many hundreds of years longer before it has perfected itself, rid itself of the old grossness and injustice which is inherited from the Dark Ages.

But even in its present imperfections it is still the noblest concept which man has ever dreamed of and for which multitudes have heroically died. In each century it

must again engage in the ancient struggle against the primordial forces of destruction and reaction. And each time that the battle is won the march of ultimate democracy is hastened.

It is worth fighting for, this ultimate democracy, though we ourselves may never see its perfection. However, by the Grace of God and our own devotion and strength, our children will see it. They shall inherit the treasure for which we have fought and died—if we have faith, if we realize that nothing is too much to sacrifice for this inheritance. Work is not too much. Courage and our lives are not too much. All the money we can pour out into War Bonds and Stamps is not too much. For, if we hold back, in courage, in life, in money, we shall not bequeath democracy to our children. We shall bequeath them only the bitter knowledge that when we were tested we gave "too little, too late," and that they have inherited from us only slavery and fear.

Social Security Board Office Cutting Mileage

W. G. Hearn, manager of the Social Security Board office in Roswell, this week announced that hereafter practically all travel out of his office will be by bus or train and that the present schedule will be reduced 60 per cent compared with that of a year ago, because of the necessity of conserving rubber and government funds. Itinerant stations, which are central locations where claimants and employers may meet representatives at states times, have been reduced to three in the nine counties served by the office. The present itinerant stations are Carlsbad, Clovis and Hobbs.

Inquiries have been received from employers and persons wishing to file claims for old-age and survivors insurance as to the time a representative will be in towns where it has been necessary to discontinue itinerant service. If these clients cannot conveniently go to the office in Roswell or to one of the stations named they should write to the Roswell office and forms and instructions will be furnished them by mail, Hearn said.

It is very important that persons wishing to file claims get in touch with the office as soon as possible, because claims filed by wage earners cannot be made retroactive to the sixty-fifth birthday, and claims filed by survivors of deceased wage earners can be made retroactive only to the third month back.

Under the itinerant schedule, the next call at Carlsbad will be at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, Dec. 29, at the U. S. Employment Service office in the Short building. A call was made there Tuesday of this week, and the next will be a month hence, so it is advisable for persons wishing to file claims to address the Social Security Board office at Roswell.

RATIONING FOR TRUCKS POSTPONED TO DEC. 1

Effective date of the Office of Defense Transportation's mileage rationing program for commercial motor vehicles has been postponed from Nov. 15 to Dec. 1, in line with the OPA program for passenger automobiles, Asa J. Merrill, regional motor transport manager for ODT announced.

Merrill pointed out that the extension gives additional time to commercial vehicle owners, who have not yet applied for their certificates of war necessity, which are required for every commercial vehicle after Dec. 1. He urged those who have not yet applied to contact immediately the nearest ODT field office. Field offices are at Denver, Pueblo, Albuquerque, Casper, Cheyenne, Billings, Butte, Boise and Salt Lake City. At the same time, Merrill said additional time also has been granted for the first tire inspection required of each vehicle. The inspection now must be made by Jan. 15 at any station officially designated by OPA.

Candy As a Food in Thanksgiving Recipes; a Tip From Armed Forces

Homemakers may well take a tip from the Armed Forces, which use candy as a necessary item of emergency field rations, to give men quick nourishment when they are far from field kitchens and to sustain their lives in foxholes, lifeboats, in deserts and jungles. War workers eat candy to counteract fatigue and give them new energy for the battle of production.

Homemakers, too, can use candy as the armed forces and war plants do, to give nourishment and energy to the family's diet. Here are some quick and economical suggestions for Thanksgiving delicacies—good all year, too!

Glorify That Cup of Tea

With tea becoming scarce, you will want to make a pleasant ceremony of each precious cup. There are many ways to add extra touches. Serve rock candy in colors or in clear crystal, instead of sugar. Use lemon drops in place of both sugar and lemon. A bowl of little round spice drops in attractive colors, add to the aroma and taste of a cup of tea. Peppermint drops are as delicious in hot teas as fresh mint leaves are in iced glasses. Candied fruits do double duty as sweetening and flavor.

Thanksgiving Breakfast Apples

For a simple but cheerful addition to breakfast, have cocoanut apples colored with red cinnamon candies. For six apples use one-half pound of red cinnamon candies; one pint of water, and one cup of shredded cocoanut. Dissolve the candies in boiling water in a shallow sauce pan, then put in the pared and cored apples. Cook over a low flame until tender. Turn the apples after they have cooked ten minutes so the syrup will penetrate the whole fruit. Remove the apples from the syrup. If the syrup is not sufficiently thick, boil longer. When the apples are cool enough to handle, roll them in cocoanut. Pour the red syrup about the base of the apples. They are delicious hot or cold.

Filled Cracked Sandwiches

Date Filling: Put a quarter pound of dates and a quarter pound of peanut brittle through a food chopper and mix well. Spread between buttered graham crackers. Peppermint Filling: Crush chocolate peppermints with a wooden spoon and blend them thoroughly with a tablespoon of cream. Spread between vanilla wafers.

Nougat Filling: Slice nougat bars as thin as paper with a sharp knife. Spread them between tiny ginger snaps.

Blushing Apple Tapioca

One - half cup sugar, 1 1/2 cups water, 4 large apples (cored and pared), 1 lemon thinly sliced, 2 tbsps. red cinnamon drops, 2 tbsps. quick cooking tapioca, 1 tsp. lemon juice.

Combine sugar, water, lemon, and cinnamon drops. Cook until cinnamon drops are dissolved, stirring constantly. Add apples and cook until tender, being careful that syrup does not boil away. Remove apples, measure syrup, and add enough water to make one cup. Add tapioca and cook in double boiler 15 minutes, or until tapioca is clear, stirring frequently. Remove from fire and add lemon juice. Fill apples to overflowing with tapioca mixture. Chill. Serve with whipped cream. Serves four.

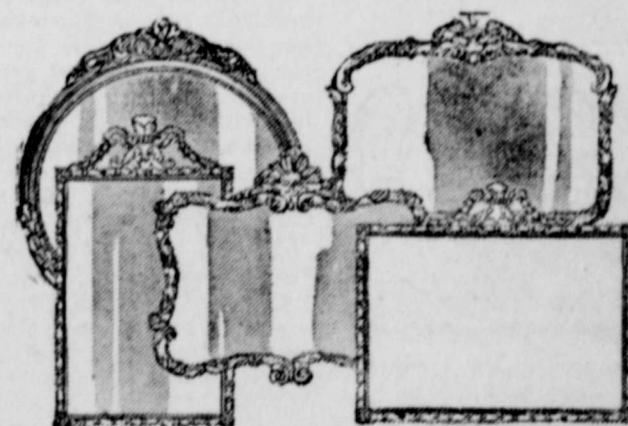

Thousands of workers in the Rocky Mountain region are expected to apply for extra gasoline rations to enable them to return to their permanent homes after the season is over. Application for such gasoline rations should be made to local war price and rationing boards in the communities in which migratory farm workers are at work, Collins said.

Farmers Urged To Convert AAA Checks to Bonds

More than 6,000,000 farmers, recipients of Agricultural Adjustment Agency checks, are receiving a leaflet from the Treasury Department urging them to convert a part or all of the payment into War Savings Bonds. Mailing of the leaflets began late in October and is to continue until late winter.

State and county AAA workers and state representatives of the War Savings Staff are also to receive copies of the leaflet.

The leaflet, in addition to pointing out the benefits to purchasers of War Bonds, contains an order form on its back to facilitate the conversion of AAA checks into War Bonds. It especially emphasizes that farmers will get \$4 for every \$3 invested if they hold their bonds until they mature.

"Lay 'Em on the Fighting Line," is the title of the folder, which outlines a three-fold financial plan for farmers. It recommends that farmers "Produce all you can on your farm," "Get your debts in shape," and "Invest to the full limit of your ability in War Savings Bonds both to help your country and safeguard your own future."

Four reasons are given to illustrate that it is both patriotic and profitable for farmers to convert a portion of their income into War Bonds. They are: "You will be helping to buy the fighting equipment needed by your sons, you will be making the safest investment in the world, you will be getting a profitable return on your money, and you will be doing your part to stave off inflation."

"After the war," the leaflet emphasizes, "your savings will enable you to buy the necessities and luxuries you perhaps need now but can't get until then. Your savings will provide you with funds for adjustments on your farm, education, travel, recreation and retirement."

It further stresses that "War Bonds are the best form of financial reserve ever offered to United States farmers," and urges these producers to "Make Every Market Day Bond Day."

IDENTIFICATION CARDS FOR GUARD OFFICERS

A new type of identification card for State Guard officers has been designed, Lt. Col. J. R. Guild announced.

The identification cards will carry a photograph of the officer, his signature, the state seal, and the signatures of the State Guard commanding officer, Lt. Col. Guild and of Adj. Gen. Russell C. Charlton.

OCB BOOK ON MORALE IS DISTRIBUTED FREE

Copies of a booklet, "Civilian Morale," have been mailed to local defense councils for general distribution. The booklet carries an account of the experiences of an American in France at the time of the German invasion.

"It's an absorbing account of the tragic events of the fall of France," Edward H. Oakley, state director of the Office of Civilian Defense, said. "And it carries a lesson for the American people. We thought so much of the material that it was reprinted for distribution by the New Mexico OCB."

The OPA announced that it is essential that every individual have a war ration book No. 1, regardless of whether or not he buys sugar or coffee, for nobody will be able to obtain ration book No. 2 unless he has book No. 1.

Persons who have no ration book include those who failed to register, as well as those who registered, but were issued no books because they had excess sugar and those who surrendered their books to local boards for some reason, as required by regulations, the OPA said.

In any such case, the OPA stressed, an individual must register by Dec. 15 with his local board. The exceptions include persons who are out of the country, those who are in the armed forces and those confined to hospitals or other institutions. In such cases they must register within a month after the change of such status. The other exception is babies born after Dec. 15.

The OPA announced that meat will be rationed about Jan. 15, when new "universal books" are expected. Butter may also be added to the list of rationed commodities.

And as for gasoline rationing, it probably will begin on Dec. 1, as previously announced, in spite of a clamor for extension of time and reconsideration, being asked by Western senators and representatives.

Using the power trainers, the men learn to make dead-stick landings from heights varying from 2,000 to 5,000 feet and their general flying is coordinated.

The training airplanes having the ability to lift themselves in the air by their own power speeds up the dead-stick landing training, Lt. Olmstead said, for there is not the necessity of towing them into the sky. Thus more men can be trained at a time.

In the third phase the cadets are given their basic glider training in small, two-place gliders. There they learn to depend on thermals to stay aloft. They receive thirty hours in the air in this phase, the same as in the pre-glider training here.

In the final phase, the pilots have advanced schooling in large gliders. There they receive sufficient training to make them competent pilots, Lt. Olmstead said.

News Briefs of the "Sunshine State" Gleaned From Many Sources

The happiest guy in football is a coach who confidently expects to lose the rest of his games this season. The coach is Vic Malone of the Santa Fe Indian School. Eleven members of his squad, including both his centers, three ends and three of his best backfield men, volunteered for the Navy. Although the Navy agreed to place them on the inactive duty for the rest of the football season, the boys decided to spend their time at home with their folks. "I used to think it was important to win football games," said Vic today. "Now winning this war is the important thing. I'm prouder of these boys than if they had won all their games. Of course, I did think I could get through the season by putting the team manager and the water boy on the eleven—but they're joining the Navy, too." So—"Well," said Vic, "I guess we'll lose the rest of our games. But I'm applying for the Navy."

A decrease of 2 per cent in dollar sales volume for September, as compared for the same month last year, has been reported to the Census Bureau by New Mexico retailers. For the first nine months of 1942, sales were also below those for the same period a year ago. September sales this year were up 2 per cent from August. Comparison of September sales volume with that for the same month last year showed the following: Albuquerque, down 16 per cent; Roswell, up 25 per cent; Santa Fe down 27; cities 2,500 to 10,000 up 11; places of less than 2,500, up 7. Drug stores showed the largest increase (34 per cent) of any one group, while motor-vehicle dealers, with a drop of 40 per cent, registered the heaviest decrease in comparison of the two Septembers.

Those new airplanes are fast all right, but there's something faster. Lt. Glen H. Hutchinson whizzed in to Denver from his Roswell base, but found he had come in second. The stork arrived first.

A complete inspection of all military property, equipment and personnel under the jurisdiction of the adjutant general's office will be made during January, Lt. Col. J. R. Guild, executive officer in the office of the adjutant general. Col. Guild said that a schedule is being worked out to cover the seventeen New Mexico cities in which State Guard units, armories, and state military equipment are located. Adjutant General R. C. Charlton and Col. Guild will make the complete statewide inspection trip, and battalion commanders will participate in the inspection within their jurisdiction. State Guard companies in all cities will stand inspection. The progress of the training program now under way will be observed and an inventory check of equipment will be made. Col. Guild said that in keeping with war conditions the inspection will be the most thorough that has ever been undertaken by the adjutant general's office.

After hearing oral arguments, the State Supreme Court took under advisement an Albuquerque case designed to test the legality of pinball machines. Attorney General E. P. Chase appealed the lower court decisions of former District Judge Bryan Johnson, who held that the machines were not gaming devices within the meaning of the New Mexico anti-gambling law. Chase and Assistant Attorney General George Hunker, Jr., argued for the appellants, while Hugo Gioni of Albuquerque, the appellee, was represented by former Gov. A. T. Hannett.

A person employed full time to make motorcycle deliveries should be considered a chauffeur. Assistant Attorney General Robert W. Ward held in an opinion for the State Driver's License Division.
