WITNESSES SWEAR BRADY INSANE

STATE AUDITOR POINTS OUT NEGLIGENCE USED BY STATE OFFICES IN GUARDING FUNDS

DISREGARD OF LAWS CITED; BANK DEPOSITS OF 80 OFFICIALS TOTAL OVER \$2,000,000

AUSTIN, Jan. 29.—Inefficiency in state departments and in some cases disregard of laws governing officials were pointed out today by Moore Lynn, state auditor and efficiency expert, in a report by him to Governor Moody and the legislature.

Lynn said the system provided by law for safeguarding the state's funds "has completely failed to attain its purpose, not through any apparent fault of the statutes, but simply through the failure of both the treasurer and the comptroller to comply with plain provisions of the law."

Haven't Recognized Changes. "It seems quite likely that neither of the officials whose negligence is responsible for this situation has fully understood the import of the statutes, nor have they recognized the unchanging and scientific accounting principles upon which the laws are based," Lynn said.

"In fairness to the present treasurer and the present comptroller, it must be stated that the situation appears not to be of recent origin. Each officer, however, has had five years in which to do his part in correcting the situation."

He declared a perusal of laws governing those two offices "discloses the fact that the legislature years ago provided by appropriate statutes an adequate system by which the comptroller would at all times know exactly the amount of cash and securities required to be in the hands of the treasurer."

"Both officers were specifically directed to keep these records, and the comptroller was to make such audits regularly," Lynn said. "The comptroller never knew the total amount of state money the treasurer is supposed to have. He does not

FATHER'S DEATH IS AVENGED

TEMPLE, Okla., Jan. 29.—The slaying of his father avenged, Jim Graham was in jail at Walters, Okla., today, in connection with the killing of Harry Adair, convicted killer of young Graham's father.

The elder Graham was slain last April in a pool hall, after he had ordered Adair to leave the place. Adair, who, it was said, was drunk at the time, left but returned shortly afterward, and without warning killed Graham with a shotgun.

Convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to 40 years in the state penitentiary, Adair was at liberty on appeal bond.

Yesterday he was in a barber shop here, his face covered with a towel, when Jim Graham, the son, stalked into the shop.

Silently he stood beside the chair until the towel was removed by the barber. Then, without a word he pulled out a pistol, fired five times and strode from the room.

JURY NAMED IN TRIAL OF JOE HAWKINS

TESTIMONY SCHEDULED TO START TODAY IN CROSBYTON

CROSBYTON, Jan. 29.—Testimony is scheduled to start here this afternoon in trial of Joe Hawkins, 35, alleged slayer of his father-in-law, S. M. Walker, 78, following completion of the jury at 11:45 o'clock this morning in 72nd district court.

Eleven from a list of 30 veniremen were queried today after the first panel of 100 was exhausted Monday and Tuesday in selection of 10 jurors.

The Jurors. C. E. Cloud, C. T. Starrett, J. G. Ferguson, R. C. Rathall, Ollie Howard, J. P. Williams, A. A. Potter, J. P. Walker, T. N. Richey, and H. B. Handley, P. B. Tyler, and T. E. Traylor compose the jury. All except Handley, who is a well-dressed, are farmers.

Burton S. Burks, assistant district attorney, arrived from Lubbock today to assist District Attorney Durwood H. Bradley in the prosecution. E. A. Watson, of Crosbyton, and T. E. Templeton, of Wellington form the defense counsel.

Hawkins, apparently losing his customary calmness, glanced furiously at the jury.

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SCHOOL HAS DEMANDS FOR GOODLY SUM

SESSION LIKELY TO BE HANDICAPPED IF NO AID IS GIVEN

That the Texas Technological college may be handicapped by a shortage of funds in the 1930-31 session was reiterated forcefully here this morning by Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of the college, following his return from a meeting of the board of directors of the institution at Corsicana.

Appropriations reaching \$136,500 will be presented to Governor Moody and the state legislature during the special session, it was decided by the school's directors yesterday.

W. T. Gaston, business manager of the college, has gone directly to Austin to represent Texas Tech in its plea for funds.

Hopes For Action. President Horn is certain that the matter will be submitted to the state session, but can only "hope for the desired action on the part of the legislature."

Impetuous in the immediate need of the local institution is the matter of funds necessary for the continuance of the regular summer school. An appropriation of \$35,000 for this organization is included in the list of needs to be submitted to the legislature.

Organization Delayed. "No definite organization for the 1930 summer school will be affected until some action is taken by the legislature," Dr. Horn said this

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NEW LINE TO BE GREAT AID

HEARING IN ABILENE BRINGS OFFICIALS ON STAND

(By Associated Press)

ABILENE, Jan. 29.—Two officials of the Missouri-Kansas-Texas railroad today placed in the Interstate Commerce Commission record testimony that construction of the Abilene and Eastern between Abilene and Cross Plains would serve a large public interest and also "clearly justify itself as good business."

The witnesses were George T. Atkins, St. Louis, vice-president of traffic, and H. E. McGee, vice-president and general manager. The hearing was before Examiner T. F. Sullivan.

Interventions Heard. With interventions to be heard briefly from Waco and Houston later today, the applicants' case will close late today. Testimony for the opposition will be offered by the Texas and Pacific and Abilene and Southern railroads, and the city of Cisco.

Atkins and McGee testified they themselves had recommended extension by the Katy of its DeLeon branch from Cross Plains to Abilene, first in 1925 and again in 1928. Merger proceedings intervened, Atkins said, and the matter was not pursued.

The conductor was puzzled for a moment. Then he concluded that the ticket might have been deposited in the mail chute in the baggage car and the search confirmed his conjecture. There in a stack of letters was the ticket where it had been dropped in by the boy thinking that persons he had seen depositing mail in the slot were preparing to board the train on a "pay-as-you-enter" basis he had heard of.

HOOBLER IS GIVEN NEW TRIAL TODAY

DECISION REVERSES CASE; PRUITT IS DENIED PLEA

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Jan. 29.—D. J. Hoobler, Wichita county, under death sentence for murder, won a new trial today when the court of Criminal Appeals reversed and remanded the case.

Bishop Adams, negro "Voodoo" doctor, given death by a Travis county jury for the murder of William Glover, grocer, lost his motion for a rehearing.

Rehearing was refused William Pruitt, Jr., Dallas county, under sentence of 99 years for robbery with firearms of O. L. Buck, the case having been affirmed some time ago. A death sentence for murder against Pruitt is pending on rehearing.

H. E. Green, Mitchell county, 35 years for murder of Little Green, his wife, motion for rehearing overruled, court sustaining former affirmation.

Hoobler's reversal was based on a statement the officer were alleged to have obtained from the defendant following his arrest. Hoobler claimed it was coerced, but the trial court refused to submit an issue on this point. Hoobler was indicted for the murder of A. Pendergraft on January 27, 1929.

SPAIN JUBILANT OVER PREMIER'S ACTION OF RESIGNING

(By Associated Press)

MADRID, Jan. 29.—Police today battled crowds of students boisterously celebrating in the streets of the capital the resignation of General Primo De Rivera, for six years premier and dictator. Almost 200 were arrested and many were injured, several seriously.

Meanwhile General Primo De Rivera, whose resignation was accepted by King Alfonso last night, conferred with his successor—and perennial enemy—General Damaso Berenguer, chief of King Alfonso XIII's military household and former commander in Morocco.

DEAN LEIDIGH GIVES INFORMATION ON CO-OP PLANS FOR TEXAS; MUST BE MEMBER TO SECURE FEDERAL AID

Dean A. H. Leidigh, of the school of agriculture, Texas Technological college, returned this morning from College Station where he met with Governor Moody's recently appointed committee to consider the operating possibilities outlined by the United States Farm board.

"We are endeavoring to make possible under the conditions outlined by the federal board for the cotton farmers of Texas to receive assistance from the board and derive benefit under provisions of the national farm act," said Dean Leidigh.

Must Be Member. The government will require that the individual member in the state who is hooked up with the state and national agency by a producer. Attention should be specifically directed to the fact that both the state and national laws require this.

"Our committee had no authority to even discuss the possibility of gin cooperative, farmers, or buy-

ing and selling organizations joining in to secure federal aid. Farmers were warned not to mischievously start organizing local cooperatives, because the government will have nothing to do with them.

To Have Districts. "In the interest of the best kind of mutual understanding and because of the vast size of the state of Texas it appears probable there will be district organizations in widely separated parts of the state. The committee went on record as being favorable to this development, and on the other hand it recognized that existing property rights of people who have for a long time been engaged in active marketing must be taken into consideration. For that reason every effort is being made to have a uniform contract which will provide for district or regional groups when deliveries in those

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DECISION ON COACHES TO BE DELAYED

DIRECTORS LEAVE POST UP TO ATHLETIC COUNCIL HERE

Final decision in the matter of reorganization of the coaching staff at Texas Technological college is hoped for "within the next ten days, when an announcement will likely be made," Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of the institution, said here this morning.

Doctor Horn returned early today from Corsicana, where he attended a meeting of the directors of the college on Tuesday, when, among other matters of interest, the proposed coaching staff reorganization was up for discussion.

Need More Information. "The directors," the president said, "did not feel that they had all the necessary information to make final decision on the athletic question yesterday. It was the consensus of opinion that an investigation into finances, character and ability of several applicants for the coaching position be made and that a further study of the question is essential."

News dispatches from Corsicana, saying that the Tech directors were leaving solution to the coaching problem up to the college athletic council, are not entirely correct in that regard, President Horn said, indicating that before the matter is turned over to the committee the directors will make a further investigation.

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COLVIN BROWN HAS PRAISES FOR CC WORK

TEXAS OUTSTANDING IN WORK, OFFICIAL DECLARES

Chamber of Commerce work in Texas is outstanding, as compared with other states of the Union, says Colvin B. Brown, organization manager of the United States Chamber of Commerce, who was one of the chief speakers here yesterday at the semi-annual meeting of the South Plains Commercial Executives association.

Recognized as a foremost authority on chamber of commerce activities, Mr. Brown has averaged in travel 50,000 miles a year and visits to 1,000 chambers of commerce during the last 15 years.

Provides Machinery
Properly organized, a chamber of commerce should provide the machinery whereby the many conflicting and half-formulated views and plans of well-meaning individuals can be studied, an agreement reached concerning the relative importance of suggested activities and a program formulated thereon that will meet with the support of the members. To this extent the chamber of commerce is a project organization, the projects determined upon forming its program of activities.

"But a chamber of commerce is much more than a project organization. The membership and public expect it to act on all sorts of matters as they arise, and most of the time is spent with matters that have no direct relation to the program.

Should Be Limited
"It is obvious that with so wide a field and with such a multitude of activities as come under the general purview of chamber of commerce work, no chamber can do everything that may be expected of it. It seems therefore, that the chamber should limit itself to such things only as the means at its command will enable it to carry on. It would be better to have a chamber of commerce devoting itself exclusively to one single activity, if it did it well, than to scatter over a number of things and do them poorly.

"The fact is, however, that a chamber of commerce can function effectively in carrying out a general, though limited program of business and community building. To do so, however, it must provide leadership in its official, personnel, judgment, tact and ability on the part of its staff, and be able to enlist the services of members.

Mr. Brown further explained in this connection that possibly the main thing in selecting activities is to discover their importance to the greater part of the community. "A chamber of commerce should be a business organization conducted on business lines, as far as that is possible in a voluntary association of men with conflicting views of what to do and how to do it," he continued. "There are many chambers of commerce with small staffs that are doing good work, and that have the confidence and support of their communities.

"The object of the chamber of commerce is to determine what is to be done and create the machinery to do it."

Just watch me scamper off with ease." And then the Tynmites tried to do it, not to build a machine and then try to find something for it to do.

"Before the board of directors should commit the chamber to any policy or activity, it should be in possession of all the facts. Getting at the facts in any given case affords the opportunity for the appointment of a committee that will get the facts, analyze them and report to the board. There can be as many committees as there are proposals to be investigated, but in each such case there should be careful selection of men who are not only qualified to do the work, but who will do it well."

"The conscience of the whole subject of committees is that they should be aids and not hindrances to the secretary and his staff, and that this should be in mind when making selections of men to do committee work. It is not always easy to get men qualified in every way, but they should be striven for. It would be better to have no committee in a given case than to have one that would be a hindrance rather than an aid. Certainly a committee should never be appointed unless there is work for it to do, and only then when men can be found who will take an interest."

RURAL AID BILL TO BE UP MONDAY

AUSTIN, Jan. 29. (P)—Legislation to restore needed additional financial aid to the rural schools of Texas, discommoded by a recent injunction against the \$5,000,000 special rural school aid fund, will be introduced in the house Monday, representative Ray Holder, chairman of the house education committee, said today.

Tentative outlines of two bills to this end were discussed by the committee today. One of these is the Love-Holder bill rejected by the last session which would apportion special aid funds to the counties on a per capita basis of scholastic population these funds to be distributed by the counties to the schools within them under supervision of the state board of education. The other creates a rural school division of the state board with an approved new board of directors.

The new plan proposes resignation of the trusteeship committee named last December 3. The new trustees proposed by Mr. Untermeyer would be Bernard M. Baruch, H. Delafield, president of the Bank of America; and Herbert P. Howell, president of the Commercial National bank.

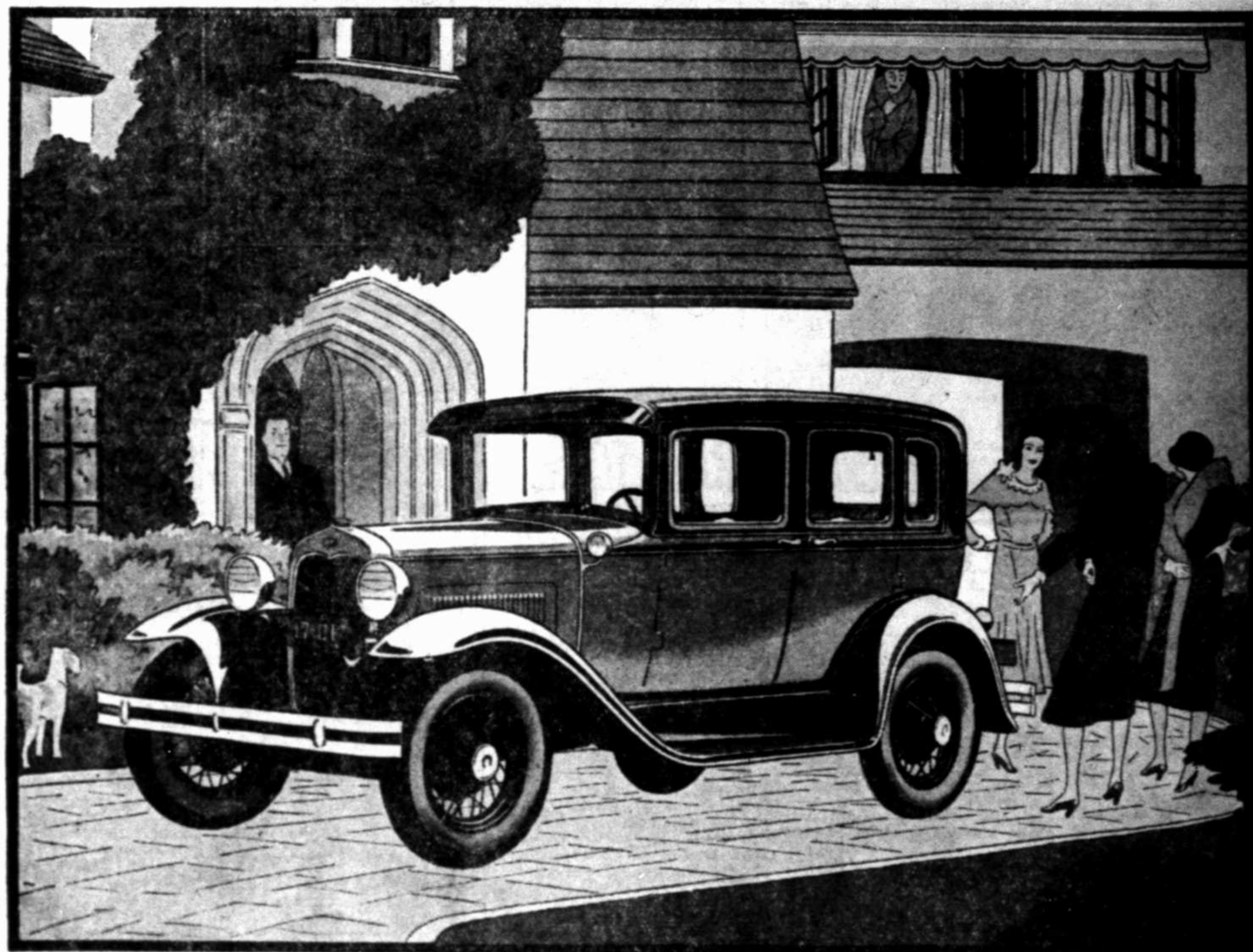

Elder, with a victory over Wilander already to his credit this year, makes his second eastern appearance in the St. Joseph's Catholic club games at Newark tonight. His chief opposition probably will come from Daley. Elder is to run in the Rupert F. Mills Sprints series at 50, 60 and 70 yards, distances well suited to the Notre Dame football player.

Fred Sturdy, famous Yale pole vaulter, will make his first appearance of the year against such rivals as Barne Berlinger of Pennsylvania, and Vic Packard, formerly of Pittsburgh and a member of the 1928 Canadian Olympic team.

Phil Edwards, Ray Conger and Eddie Blake are to battle in a 1,000 yards scratch race.

CLUBS ARE TO HOLD SERIES

SUPERIORITY OF TWO LEAGUES TO FACE SEVERE TESTS

The home run king already has an enormous trust fund to take care of him after his diamond days are over, but he wants this increased to \$1,000,000.

This recent attitude of Ruth is in marked contrast to the former position when money didn't mean anything to him. He isn't distributing so much dough to charity causes these days but on the contrary is holding on to just about all he gets. It is understood that his contribution to the trust fund within the past few years has been sufficient to guarantee him an annuity of \$1,000 a month for the remainder of his life and that he is desirous of swelling the fund to the point where it will pay him an annuity of \$2,000 a month.

To do this Ruth must pour \$150,000 more into the fund. If he could be sure of collecting \$225,000 from the Yankees during the next few years, it would be possible for him to make the grade, hence his insistence on the \$85,000 for the next three years. Colonel Jake Ruppert insists that the \$75,000 a year offer on a two-year contract basis is absolutely the maximum he will pay his chief gate attraction while the Babe is equally as stubborn in demanding an extra 10,000 per year. Just a few days ago he learned against one at Miami for a 348-yard tee shot, but this is no record. Last winter he was engaged in a driving contest at Clearwater with Dazzy Vance, the famous Brooklyn strike-out king, and the Robin hunker showed Babe a few things about golfing.

Prior to the friendly game, the Babe and Dazzy became embroiled in an argument about how far they could drive, so the story goes. A box of cigars was wagered on the result and they went out to the first tee at Clearwater to settle the debate. Number one on the course measured 376 yards. The Dazzy took one shot and the ball sailed far over the green.

"Go collect the cigars," roared the Babe as he refused even to take his turn.

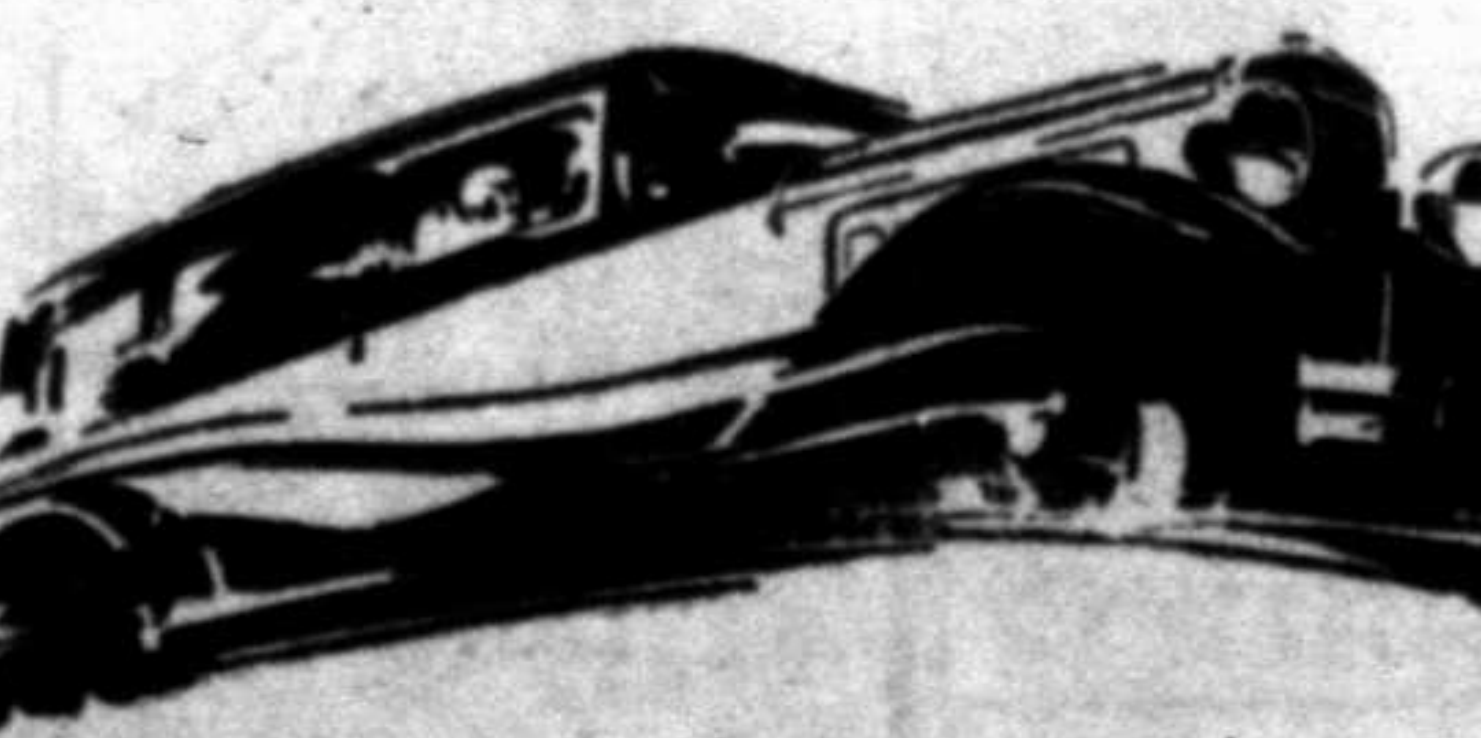

MORE SOUTH TEXANS NAMED IN DRY CASES

GALVESTON POLICE AND FORMER COAST GUARD MAN IN GROUP

(By Associated Press) GALVESTON, Jan. 29.—The federal government's campaign against alleged liquor importing rings in South Texas involved another Galveston group in a conspiracy indictment today, including George Muey, two members of the Galveston police force and W. R. Schultz, former boatwain in the Coast Guard service here.

Schultz, a warrant officer, was in command of a coast guard patrol boat operating from here about a year ago. He has been out of the service for ten months and there is nothing in the indictment indicating he had any part in the conspiracy during his service as a coast guard. Schultz and Muey are mentioned once in the bill as having put out in a speedboat last July to "search for the rum runner Douglas B. Conrad."

Involve 120 Men In the past two days grand jury indictments have involved about 120 South Texas men in various conspiracy cases.

The Muey indictment, brought under the customs laws, alleges a well organized ring here to import

foreign liquor along the Texas coast, particularly on Galveston Island. Muey, named as the purchaser and principal, has not been arrested. Most of the other defendants, including Joe Marrero and A. Gleich, Galveston policemen, are free on bond. Some of the others named also have not been apprehended.

Bryant, alias Charlie Logan; W. R. Schultz, a man known as "Cheerio"; Joe Marrero.

SOUTH TEXAS SETS DATES FOR FAIRS

VICTORIA, Jan. 29. (AP)—Following debate over dates, New Braunfels announced its withdrawal from the South Texas Fairs association just before adjournment of the association's 8th annual convention Tuesday.

Boerne was selected for the next meeting place, and the following officers named: President, Dr. L. J. Gregory, Boerne; vice-president, George A. Pringle, Victoria; secretary-treasurer, George J. Kempen, Seguin. These officers, with Walter Zipp, New Braunfels and W. E. Donovan, Gonzales, constitute the board of directors.

The association went on record as endorsing the movement to have the legislature authorize state aid for chartered fairs to be distributed as payment for agricultural premiums. Secretary Kempen was instructed to attend the meeting of the Texas Association of Fairs at Dallas Friday to urge similar action by that organization. Illinois, Ohio and Iowa were cited as states where the system was followed.
