## Scout Week To Be Observed In Lamesa From Feb. 8 to 14

According to E. W. Renner, district committeemen of the South Plains council, Boy Scouts, Cubs, and adult leaders of this city will join with other members of the movement throughout the United States in the celebration of Boy Scout Week which begins Tuesday, February 8, and continues through Monday February 14.

Boy Scout Week marks the 34th anniversary of the founding of the movement in America. Since Feb. 8, 1910, more than 11,400,000 men and boys have been actively identified with Scouting. The present-day active enrollment is in excess of 1,565,000 Scouts, Cubs and adult volunteer leaders.

The birthday will be observed in every city and town in the nation and in hundreds of villages and hamlets as well.

Locally, the highlights of Boy Scout Week will be a Boy Scout Banquet. Details of the banquet will be worked out later. Boy Scouts will pay tribute to their Scoutmasters, all of them volunteer leaders, without whom the movement could not exist. Countless Scoutmasters are former Boy Scouts. Their compensation for the many hours they spend with their Scouts at meetings and in the open comes from the satisfaction of watching individual growth of their Scouts.

Sunday, February 13, is "Boy Scout Sunday" and Scouts will attend church services at one of the local churches.

The brotherhood aspect of the Scout program is getting greater recognition this year. Thousands of former American Scouts and Scout Leaders in the armed forces are meeting with those of other lands. The spirit of the fourth Scout Law, "A Scout Is Friendly" is reflected in much overseas correspondence. American Scouts are swapping notes with Scouts of other lands. The Canadian Boy Scout Association begins its celebration of Boy Scout Week on February 20 and along the unguarded United States-Canadian border it is expected that the Boy Scouts of the two countries will get together for good fellowship.

In 1942 Merrick was elected to the office. Previous to this, he had served as deputy at Big Spring for approximately 18 years.

## State To Operate On 10-Case Purchase Program On Eggs

Texas has been added to the list of states operating under the 10-case Purchase Program for eggs. The support prices to the producer under this program are as follows:

Grade A, Large	36 cents
Grade B, Large	33 cents
Grade C, Large	29 cents
Mediums—8 cents under large.	

These prices represent better than 90 per cent parity, FDA is now ready to accept applications from egg dealers wishing to deliver graded eggs at the above prices plus 4 cents per dozen, or \$1.20 per 30-dozen case handling charge. Only those dealers who have adequate storage space and can arrange for proper grading, inspection, etc., can be approved by FDA.

FDA stands ready to purchase any eggs that local buyers and contractors cannot market through their usual channels. Eggs will be accepted in lots of not less than 10 cases at the announced price plus handling charge, provided they meet the specifications on the days of sale of the tentative U. S. consumer grade under which they were offered. The grade is to be deter-

## NEWS FROM The Home Demonstration Agent

School girls and boys who eat

cold lunches need good, hot, appetizing and nutritious suppers. Samples of one such menu have been served to 96 women, 61 girls and 6 boys at the chicken canning demonstrations given by the agent during January and early February.

Here's the main dish for this good supper: creamed chicken (or other meat) served on onion griddle cakes or waffles.

Every girl who are members of junior 4-H clubs will have fun cooking this supper, using these easy to follow recipes:

### CREAMED CHICKEN

2 cups medium white sauce  
2 cups diced cooked chicken (ham roast, tuna fish, and salmon are good creamed)  
Paprika, minced parsley, chopped pimento, or celery seed, (Use only one seasoning—or not any).

### MEDIUM WHITE SAUCE

4 tablespoons butter, or other fat  
4 tablespoons flour  
2 cups milk (1 cup meat stock or chicken broth may be substituted for 1 cup milk).  
1 teaspoon salt  
1-4 teaspoon pepper

Method: Melt butter and stir in flour; gradually stir in milk. Continue stirring until mixture thickens. Cook at least 3 minutes longer. Use a double boiler if you have one, because it is easier.

### ONION GRIDDLE CAKES

2 cups sifted flour  
3 teaspoons baking powder  
1-2 teaspoon salt  
2 eggs well beaten  
1 1-2 cups milk (scant)  
2 tablespoons melted shortening  
1 1-2 cups raw onions (chopped very fine)

Method: Melt and sift dry ingredients. Combine egg and milk. Add flour mixture and beat until smooth add shortening. Bake on ungreased, hot griddle.

Use your favorite waffle recipe if you have a waffle iron. Some of the club women preferred the griddles when the onions were heated in fat until yellow. Others liked the crisp raw onions better.

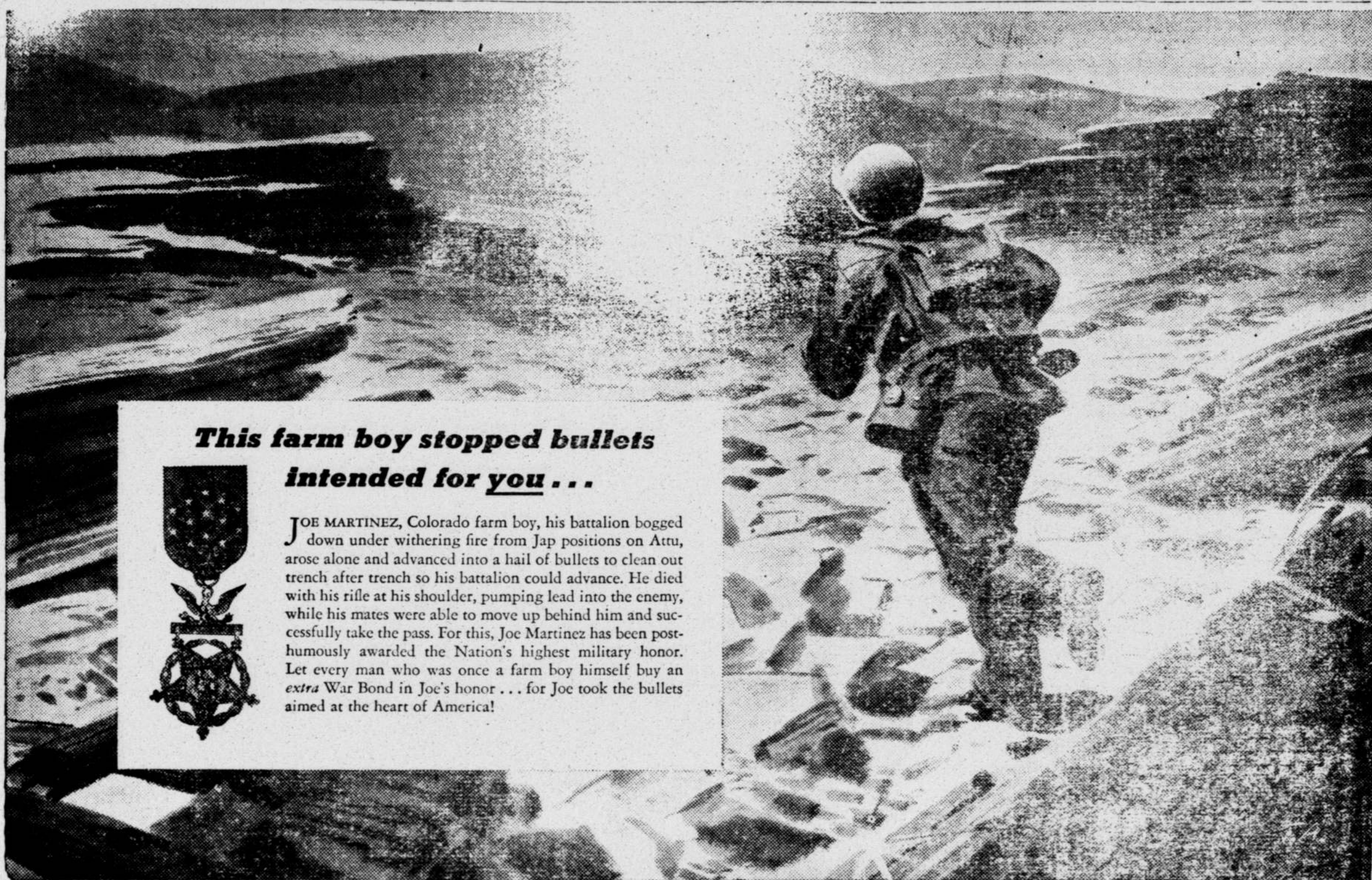
