Accused Of DWI

Murder Charge Against Driver

A charge of murder by motor vehicle has been filed as a result of the highway crash death here of Verbell Cole Goff.

Defendant in the felony complaint is Richard Jackson Brown, who still is in Root Memorial Hospital recovering from injuries received in the two-car collision.

Brown, 46, is accused of being under the influence of intoxicating liquor at the time of the accident.

1 of 3 Accused Still at Large

One of three persons charged here with theft of a large amount of pipe at Westbrook is still at large.

The other two are free on bond posted in Oklahoma.

Felony complaints filed by District Attorney Weldon Kirk in Justice of Peace Leonard Henderson's Court name the trio as Cliff Raper, J. B. Davis, and Jimmy Davis.

They are accused of taking 147 joints of 7/8 inch pipe (each in 38 feet length) from an American Petrofina pipe yard four miles north of Westbrook Jan. 22.

Raper and Jimmy Davis were taken in custody in Oklahoma and have posted bond on the felony charges filed here.

J. B. Davis has not been apprehended, according to officials here.

Officer Dallas salesman, was killed instantly in the Sunday evening wreck on Interstate 20 near Moran Creek Bridge 4.5 miles west of Colorado City.

A companion of Goff, Evelyn Johnson, also of Dallas, was severely injured and remains in Root Memorial Hospital.

It accuses Brown "while intoxicated and while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, drive and operate a motor vehicle, to wit: an automobile upon a public highway within Mitchell County, to wit: the public highway leading from Colorado City to Big Spring, and did there in the execution of said unlawful act, through mistake and accident, kill Verbell Cole Goff by then and there driving said automobile into and causing it to collide with the automobile occupied by said Verbell Cole Goff."

The felony complaint will be investigated by the Mitchell County grand jury in its next session.

Two trucks are believed by officers to have been involved in the Petrofina theft and one truck is believed to have reached Oklahoma City and unload in that area.

Police bulletins on the Westbrook theft were issued immediately after Petrofina personnel discovered the pipe missing the morning after the theft.

Sheriff Lewis Claxton reported that a lock was broken on the pipe yard gate, then a truck driven inside the yard and loaded with the 38-foot lengths of pipe.

More than 600 persons are qualified for Mitchell County's first distribution of welfare food commodities.

Initial monthly issuance of the foods is set Feb. 17 and 18 at the new Mitchell County Office Complex in 100 block of East Third.

The date was announced Friday by Mrs. Bonnie Burt, who will supervise the Commodity Distribution Office.

She reported to Commissioners Court 617 persons have been approved for the commodities - a joint program between Mitchell County, State Department of Public Welfare and U.S. Department of Agriculture.

These 617 represent 177 separate cases and include seven babies under 12 months of age.

There is a wide range in the number included in the separate cases or families. Largest individual family counted 15 persons, Mrs. Burt reported, and several families counted more than 10 members.

The number of recipients of

the food assistance is expected to increase with additional applicants after the first month's distribution.

For initial distribution Mitchell County trucks will go to San Angelo Tuesday to load up with 25,500 pounds of foods.

This haul of approximately 12 tons will be required for the 617 persons already approved.

Mrs. Ona Moseley, com-

modities distributor for this area at San Angelo, said more pounds would be needed next month for Mitchell County.

Twenty-three food items are included on the list which the trucks will bring back this week. They will be parceled out to qualified persons on basis of individual or family requirements under the commodities program.

Mrs. Burt said a thorough check has been made to deter-

mine that the initial 617 persons are qualified for the program according to requirements set by State Department of Public Welfare.

These checks on applicants' income and other eligibility requirements included verification of family incomes.

Monthly maximum income for Mitchell County's program is set in these amounts: 1 person - \$110; 2 persons - \$150; 3 persons - \$170; 4 persons - \$190;

persons - \$210; 6 persons - \$230; 7 persons - \$250; 8 persons - \$270; 9 persons - \$290; 10 persons - \$310; each additional person over 10 - \$15 each.

Mrs. Burt said the first day's distribution of food, Feb. 17, will be for all qualified with commodity cards numbered 1 through 99.

Those with cards 100 through 191 will report the second day, Feb. 18, for their food.

617 Okayed For Food Trucks Go For 24 Tons Tuesday

\$485,000 Widening

First Phase Of State 208 Project

State Highway Department engineers here already are perfecting plans for a major widening and improvement project on State Highway 208 south from Colorado City.

Texas Highway Commission this week announced approval of \$485,000 for first phase of the

construction during the 1971-72 period in the state's Consolidated Highway program.

Initial phase will be for 4.5 miles extending south from the intersection of State Highway 208 and U. S. 80 East Business Route at the city's east city limits.

Widening of the entire highway from Colorado City south to Mitchell-Coke County line is projected for the future, but will not be scheduled until additional money allocation.

Engineer Bob Finley said plans for the first 4.5 miles will be completed late this year.

"We'll probably do the actual construction work next year in 1971," he said.

The improvements will widen State 208 paved highway surface to 24 feet with 10 feet of additional pavement on each shoulder for a total of 44 feet.

This will conform to the new State 208 link between the U.S. 80 Business East intersection and Interstate 20.

In addition, the project will include leveling and the cutting down of some hills for improved driving and safety, reconditioning, grading and structures.

Coming soon for the U.S. 80-

State 208 intersection is a flasher-type traffic signal.

This had been approved by both State Highway Department and City of Colorado City, according to City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr.

It will provide a flashing red signal for State 208 traffic, north and south, and a flashing yellow caution for east-west U.S. 80.

City and State Highway officials conducted initial signal light project because of serious motor vehicle accidents at the busy intersection.

Commissioners are studying the possibility of extending the road 1.5 mile more on the west from Laskey Road with the Airport Road.

The route for which deeds already have been obtained on the east is in Henderson's Precinct 4 and the additional extension would be in Commissioner Marcus Vest's Precinct 1.

Availability of right of way will be a major factor in the commissioners' decision concerning the second phase.

The new road has been planned to improve mail service in the area as well as for cross-county traffic.

Both the Laskey and Valley View roads intersect with Interstate 20.

Crows Move On Target

Hunters Register For Second Shoot

That unique hunting event -- where there is plenty of crow to eat for the losers -- will start Saturday, Feb. 21.

It is the second annual Colorado City Kiwanis Crow Shoot and registration of hunters already has started.

Thousands of the birds were killed in the first day last year when the crow shoot was inaugurated.

And the hunt with cash prizes and other awards continued from February into April, eliminating more crows.

Joe Weaver is chairman for the 1970 shoot and said prospective participants can register for \$1 in Colorado City at Jay Adams Chevrolet or the law office of Dell Barber.

Crow hunters, who will have such cash targets as a \$100 prize white marked crow to aim for, will have a 100 sections of land marked off for their hunting.

They also will be included in drawing for an automatic shotgun which will be given away free and can aim at other crows tagged for cash.

Four hundred hunters had registered when the first crow shoot began last February and the number increased as information about the unique hunt

was carried back into other areas by the early shooters.

Those opening day registered shooters came from as far away as New Mexico, Dallas and Hale Center, Lubbock and Big Spring sent 50 each that day.

Participants must register by Feb. 22, Weaver said.

Popularity of the shoot is expected to increase the field of participants for '70.

Kiwanis sponsors the hunt for a two-fold purpose. It helps eradicate grain destroying crows which are prolific especially in the county's northern areas and, at the same time, "it adds to the Kiwanis child-help fund."

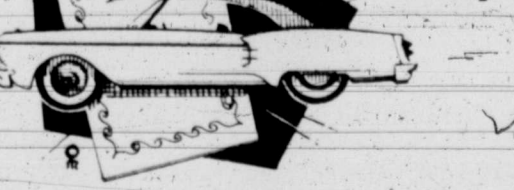

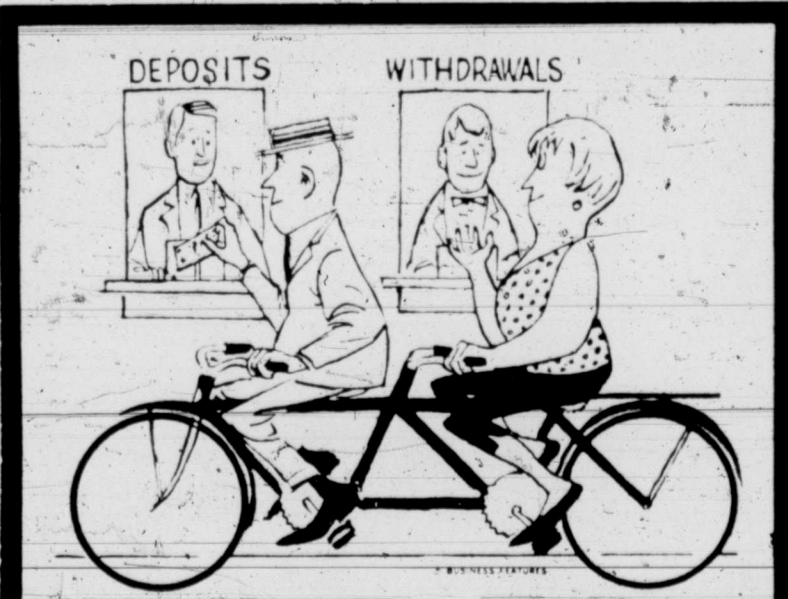

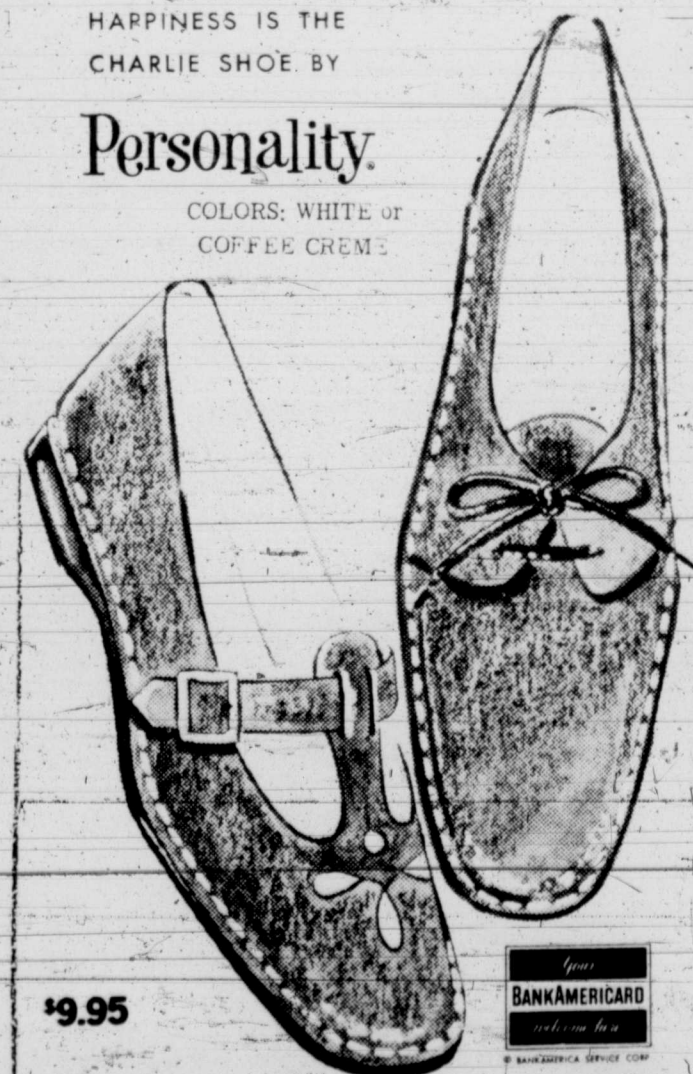
