Following is an item from Jno. A. Price's column in the County Wide News, Littlefield:

"At Abernathy lives a quiet, probably unassuming man, who formerly lived in Lubbock—who is responsible for the inauguration of a system that dated from World War I, and which is proving a major contribution in World War II—an identifying tag, which now seems so simple, but which solved a real problem during the days of the first war. His name is Struve, and he conceived the idea of a badge carrying a number, and a secret register, to identify the wearer or carrier of that badge, in case of doubt or suspicion. If a worker was challenged, the guard might ask 'What's the last two letters of your first name?' etc., and your answer had better check with the register. Today, they use the same system in a thousand government agencies."

Junk Rally Set Saturday

Saturday, Sept. 5, has been set as this city's Junk Rally day in the National Scrap Harvest campaign, as directed by the War Production Board. To focus attention on the need for many items of waste which once went into the scrap pile, or to the city dump, but which are now at war, steel mills and other business firms of the nation the last two weeks paid for large advertisements in which the need was stressed. This week another large advertisement is being printed, but is being paid for locally.

Scrap materials sought in the National Scrap Harvest include scrap metals of all kinds, steel, iron, brass, zinc, copper and lead; waste cooking fats, from which explosives are made, and old rubber. (At present, no market is offered here for scrap rubber, but it may be sold to scrap buyers of Lubbock or other large Texas cities with junk markets, if your supply is worth the effort to get it there.) If you have only a small amount, then you may donate it to some worthy organization, such as the Red Cross, Boy Scouts, U. S. O., or Future Farmers. Leave your scrap rubber contribution here on the east side of the city square.

When sold, money from same will be given to the organization chosen by our war board.

Scrap metals can be sold to two dealers in Abernathy, to one in Hale Center, to the Co-op gin in Cotton Center, or to several in Lubbock, or Plainview. Top ceiling prices are paid by all these firms for your metals.

In Abernathy J. U. Peel and Bill Wolf are buying scrap metals.

Warning Issued

It has been called to our attention that a number of people are presenting their War Savings Stamps at the local Post Office to be cashed. The Postmaster informs us this practice is very common here, in fact.

It is true that you have the privilege of cashing your stamps at any time. Still, this, in a way, defeats the object for which the Stamps are sold. The object is to **Win the War!** When you cash the Stamps the Government buys them from you and you have not helped at all, merely created an extra expense for the government through needless waste of printing the no-longer useable Stamps or booklets.

This practice seems to be more general with children and I urge parents to discourage their children from selling any Stamps unless it is absolutely necessary to do so, as the children, probably, do not realize the urgent necessity to keep them in order to help the Government.

COUNTY BUDGET ADOPTED

Hale county has budgeted an estimated \$170,265.35 income for next year. Receipts are to come from property taxes on a valuation of \$13,877,048; from auto registrations, fines and miscellaneous sources. The commissioners' court set 53c as the tax rate, same as last year. Of the rate, 25c goes to general expense, 16c for maintenance of the courthouse and jail and 16c toward retiring of bonds.

Lakeview School To Open Monday

Opening of the new term is set for Monday morning at Lakeview school, nine miles northeast of Abernathy. Three new teachers compose the faculty of the eight-grade school. They are Mrs. Allen, principal, and Miss McQuar, both former teachers at Mt. Blanco, Crosby county, and Miss Evora Groce of Petersburg.

Students of that district who are in grades above the eighth attend school either at Petersburg or Abernathy.

BAPTIST CHURCH

A successful revival was closed at the church Sunday night. Dr. C. E. Hereford, Lubbock First Baptist church pastor, did the preaching and Andy Reid directed singing. Large crowds attended the services.

Several new members were added to the church during the meeting. Pastor Nix is to conduct a baptismal service at the church Sunday following the evening sermon.

Sunday school attendance totaled 253 with 57 in the Downtown Men's Bible class at Rita theatre.

Rev. Nix, teacher of the Men's class is conducting interesting lessons on the life of Jacob, and next Sunday, he is to continue the study. Men of the area who are not otherwise engaged in Sunday school are urged to attend the Class each Sunday at 10 a. m.

Rev. and Mrs. Nix and possibly others from the local church, plan to attend the associational meeting at the First Baptist church in Slaton, Thursday, Sept. 10. Rev. Nix is to have a part on the program.

Tentative plans for the evening include a drill by the home guard, re-organization of the Parent-Teacher Association, musical numbers, and games, with the climax to be a watermelon feed on the grounds.

The last elected members of the P-T-A. executive board will act as chairmen until new officers can be elected. Mrs. Lamar McKenzie will have charge of the musical numbers and Mmes. Hackler and Boyd Prather are to plan games.

Changing teaching positions involves a lot of changes, a lot of faces to remember, and many problems for teachers, pupils and patrons. Cowden, manager of the Consumers' Cooperative Ass'n., Amarillo. He is an able speaker and will make an interesting and instructive address, which everyone should hear, Richter says.

Members of the Abernathy association will elect one director to serve on the board of directors for the next three years.

"We invite not only members of the association, but any others who might be interested in the welfare of the community," Richter states.

J. C. VINEYARD WINS PRIZE IN SCRAP CONTEST

J. C. Vineyard, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Vineyard, won the \$5.00 cash prize offered by J. U. Peel for the school student who sold him the largest amount of scrap metal by Sept. 1. Vineyard sold 3,440 pounds of metal to win in the contest. Peel is still in the market to buy scrap metal, paying \$9 per ton.

Abernathy and New Deal schools were off to a slow start as the new term opened Monday with both schools minus three teachers each and mud from recent rains causing problems in running school buses.

Two Resign Here

Two teachers resigned at Abernathy late last week to make vacancies in three departments of the school system. Miss Nell Rayburn, who taught here several years, resigned as teacher in intermediate grades and Helen Powell, who taught here last year, resigned as high school history teacher. A teacher also is needed for high school English.

Mrs. Edwin Hardesty, who was a teacher here for several years, was recruited to fill-in for the intermediate grades, and Supt. W. V. Swinburn is busy seeking teachers for the other two places.

Miss Windwehen of Plainview was elected to teach in the intermediate grades. A Mrs. Holleyfield of Lubbock was elected to teach here, but resigned after reporting for duty Monday.

Registration to Wednesday morning had been completed by 500 students, Supt. Swinburn reported. Buses were operating on the pavement only on the Wednesday runs, and Mr. Swinburn said if rains continued school would be dismissed until such time buses could make the routes.

New Deal School

Supt. A. L. Faubion Wednesday announced three vacancies in the New Deal school faculty. Teachers were needed for the fourth grade, music and band, and natural science in intermediate grades.

T. O. McClung late last week resigned as high school principal to start training in Austin to take up duties as a drivers' license examiner. E. C. Caldwell was shifted from the grade school principalship to the same position in high school, and S. O. Hutchinson of Amherst was elected principal of the grade school.

Mrs. Hutchinson was elected to teach in the grade school, and Gladys Wilhelm of Lubbock was named second grade teacher. Mrs. Ida Lou Long of Muleshoe, who was to have taught music and band, failed to report Monday morning.

Less than 75% of the district's scholastic count had been enrolled to Wednesday morning, Supt. Faubion announced. Bad roads have prevented full operation of buses. School was dismissed Wednesday, and the superintendent announced that classes would be resumed when weather permitted buses to make their runs.
