RALPH BLODGETT DIES AT LIBERAL

Ralph Blodgett age about twenty-five years died at the Liberal Hospital last Monday night about eight o'clock.

Ralph was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Milo Blodgett a farmer who lives in the southwest part of the county.

Besides his mother and father he has a wife and baby and one sister to mourn his loss.

Death was caused by a fall from a motor cycle about two years ago, which at that time his head was seriously hurt, and about six weeks ago he was taken to Liberal to be operated on and for several days he was some better, but during Sunday and Monday he sank slowly.

His funeral was held at the Methodist Church here Wednesday afternoon and burial took place at the Ochiltree cemetery.

OIL NEWS

The first of the equipment for the Empire well northwest of Perryton was placed on the location last Thursday the 14th. The men who have been contracted for the hauling of material to the location are putting in overtime in getting supplies to the well.

The Empire people sent their crew of five rig builders here from Eldorado, Kansas here, and it will not be but a few days before the derrick will be up and then it will be about two or three weeks before the drilling will start.

MAKING EMPLOYEES SAVE

There are reports that Henry Ford requires an accounting at the hands of every employee as the best method of enforcing thrift. Unless the employee arranges to save a certain portion of his wages he is eventually separated from the pay roll.

The Ford idea is spreading. Now comes the report by the National Industrial Conference Board that a group of associated utilities in northern Kansas has adopted the slogan of "save or be fired." The minimum saving must be 10 per cent a month and it must be invested in safe interest bearing securities. Does the plan work? It does. It has not only worked for 10 per cent but for 20 and even 30 per cent. Furthermore, there are no reports of employees complaining because of any shortage of their "private rights," and no reports of any shortage of available help on the part of the companies who are enforcing the saving requirement.

It is a booming more and more paternal in its operations. Compulsory thrift may hasten an understanding as a sadly needed remedy, that there is no line of cleavage between employers and employees, but that on the contrary they are part and parcel of the same thing.

Employers have always made certain requirements of employees. Banks have required that they be honest, railways that they be sober. All large organizations are more and more requiring that employees be healthy by compelling the observance of certain standards. Why not require that they be thrifty, and thereby become in turn the guardians of their own habits, health and morals? A man who is thrifty is seldom tempted to be dishonest. The thrifty man is in position to give proper care and attention to his health, and the man who is healthy is not likely to filch the time that rightfully belongs to his employer. Let's go for compulsory thrift.—Texas Commercial News.

THE KU KLUX KLAN PARADES IN TEXHOMA

Tuesday night, the 12th inst. marked one of the most spectacular and thrilling incidents in the history of Texhoma and vicinity. According to previous announcements the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, of Oklahoma, Klan No. 218, made a parade that made all Texhoma "sit up and take notice." The local Realm of the mysterious order is known as "Texhoma Boosters Klan," with a membership hard to estimate. There were 57 hooded knights in the parade, and it was noted that there would have been three times that number in attendance had it not been for the blizzard that swooped down upon the community. The Texhoma Concert Band had been employed to furnish the music for the occasion, and the boys did themselves much credit with the good concert for an hour and a half before the hooded Knights appeared. The streets were thronged with men, women and children for two hours before the procession appeared from the south on second street, but all were orderly and jolly, cracking jokes and telling what they might do in case the hooded Knights should undertake to "base" them. Rev. Robert Fife and Rev. P. E. Chappell were sure they would lead the procession in the get-away, unless their long legs should fail them to preambulate fast enough.

When the procession finally disappeared at the south end of second street led by the "Firey Cross" it was a sight wonderful to behold. The heavy Cross was carried by five men in a car leading the procession. In front of the cross was a large American flag carried by one of the knights. As they reached the flag pole on the public square, the band played "Hail! Hail! The Gang's All Here." The procession went one block north and turned back to the flag pole and halted. The Klansmen sang a verse of "America" in which many of the spectators joined heartily.

Many interesting placards were carried by the hooded Knights, setting forth the cardinal points for which the order stands. One that caused much laughter among the women, and caused some of the men to look sheepish read: "Car Ride with your own wife." Others said: "Boot-leggers and gamblers leave." The man next to you is a Klansman. "We uphold the law and order." "No good citizen need fear us." "We will uphold the Constitution of the United States." Another placard that set the audience guessing said "There are ten Knights in the crowd for every one in the parade."

To say the least of the whole affair, it made a profound impression on the town. These men looked like giants, and their white robes and black masks produced an awe over the crowd. They looked like a determined set of men who are liable to carry out plans they might cause to lay. It is no doubt proper to say "The Ku Klux Klan is here to stay," as long as there are evil doers in the community and the safest policy is to be good.

SPECIFICATIONS FOR MARKING THE D-C-D

The following specifications for marking the D-C-D Highway were adopted by the General Convention of the D-C-D Highway held in Canadian, Texas, in April, 1922, and ratified and approved by the Oklahoma State Convention held in Wilcox, Oklahoma, on November 14-15, 1922: A band of white paint four inches wide, a band of black paint four inches wide, and a band of white paint four inches wide to be painted on posts at each cross road and turn indicating the direction of the Highway; one post to be painted every one mile on straight runs where there are no turns or forks; the letters "D-C-D" also to appear on the posts; thru villages, towns and cities one post to be painted in each block and two posts, one at the corner and one additional, where turns are made; outside of villages, towns and cities, two posts in addition to the corner or turn are likewise to be painted indicating the direction of the turn. Two coats of paint of the best grade will be used. The contractors will be required to give good and sufficient bond, payable to the President and Secretary-Manager of the D-C-D Highway Association.

TEACHERS INSTITUTE

The Teachers Institute for Ochiltree and Lipscomb opened Monday morning at 10 o'clock following a lecture on education by State Superintendent S. M. N. Marrs at the Methodist church Sunday night, which was enjoyed by all present. He emphasized Christian education, sturdy manhood and womanhood. The Monday morning session opened by singing "America the beautiful" led by Professor Dewey, Allen. Prayer was offered by Judge J. M. Grigaby followed by welcome address by Rev. Hitchcock. GOVERNORS AND PROHIBITION

Several of the governors attending the national conference in West Virginia are opposed to state cooperation in enforcement of the eighteenth amendment. Many of them are critical of the president's plan for a meeting of governors with federal authorities to discuss prohibition enforcement, professing to see an attempt to "pass the buck."

These governors may have their individual opinions of prohibition, but they cannot avoid the fact that, so long as the amendment is a part of the fundamental law of the land, cooperation in its enforcement is obligatory on both state and national officials. To allow indiscriminate disregard of it is to breed a disrespect for all law that will be detrimental to the enforcement of both state and national measures.

The matter of state's rights and duties is an old and much discussed question; but the nation will be in a precarious position when the enforcement of federal laws, which are the result of popular referendum, is denied cooperation by the states.

The problems incurred in the enforcement of the prohibition laws are so involved as to necessitate the closest cooperation on the part of both state and national officials. If there is to be that rigid enforcement that all law deserves, neither must "lay down on the job." Governors who would avoid their obvious duty in the enforcement of a law which is national in its scope are not actuated by the highest principles of statesmanship.

So long as the prohibition laws are on the statute books, there is but one issue, and that is their enforcement. It is idle to talk of anything else. The president has asked the assistance of the state executives in maintaining the integrity of the law. It will be a clear case of lying down on the job if that assistance is denied.

RAYMOND COFFEE KILLED IN AUTO ACIDENT

Raymond Coffee and G. C. Brillhart both of this place left here Sunday morning for Las Cruces, New Mexico. About 17 miles from Amarillo on the Canyon road one of the front tires blew out causing the car to skid into a concrete culvert a few feet ahead. The car turning completely over, alighting on its own wheels within the length of the car.

In turning over Mr. Brillhart was thrown completely clear of the car and Mr. Coffee was caught under the steering wheel, breaking his neck and crushing his skull and chest, and death was instantly.

The body was brought back to Amarillo and was shipped here, arriving at Perryton Tuesday at noon. The K. of P. Lodge met the body at the train and taking it to G. R. Wilson undertaking Parlor where the body remain until Thursday afternoon when the funeral services was held at the Methodist Church and afterward interment was made at the Ochiltree cemetery.

Raymond who was 21 years of age was the son of H. C. Coffee of this place and besides his father he leaves four brothers and three sisters to mourn his loss.

THE FARMERS NEEDS

What the farmers of Ochiltree and Beaver Counties need is more milk cows, more hogs and chickens, more diversified farming.

I have been talking to the Bankers of Perryton in regard to going north and bringing down a car load of pure bred milk cows, they believe that that is the surest, quickest and safest road not only to a good living but to real prosperity, they are unanimous in saying that they will finance their patrons who wish to purchase a pure bred cow.

Now I think that is the ideal time to stock up, as certainly we cannot expect to get them any lower than they should be right now.

Most people myself included milk from 2 to 4 cows getting from 2 to 4 gallons of milk when we should be getting from 10 to 12.

While the initial cost of a pure bred will probably be several times the cost of a scrub it is real economy to pay the price and get started right, we are pure bred people, lets have pure bred live stock.

Now so far as the breed is concerned a man should be able to get whatever he wants, Jerseys, Guernseys or Holsteins, as for myself I have concluded that the Holsteins are much the preferable, they are much stronger and more rugged, they are the healthiest, the beef product is much better in the steer calves, and while the Quality of milk is not so high it is more than made up for in quality, and quantity fed to the pigs is one of our best sources of income.

I think that two men should go for these cattle as two heads are better than one, but whoever goes there are 4 points to be followed in purchasing, they must be young, they must be good individuals, they must be good producers if giving milk or coming from high producing families if not yet fresh.

I am going to see the Cashier of the First National Bank at Booker as I am sure he would be glad to come in on the proposition. Anyone wishing to go in on this deal will please leave your name with your banker. I will try to find out the approximate cost of these cows during the next two weeks.

THE PLAINS—COUNTRY
OF OPPORTUNITIES.

The Panhandle-Plains region is composed of thirty-eight counties in Texas and three counties in Oklahoma, known as the Panhandle of Oklahoma.

The hardy pioneers who carved out of this uncharted area the great Panhandle-Plains region, suffered untold hardships and many sacrifices. They loved this country because it was so hard to conquer. We love it because it is so easy to make a living in. Few people in Texas who have never visited the Panhandle-Plains section of Texas I dare say, have little conception of what this country has to offer to the farmer, stockman, merchant and manufacturer.

As has been said, less than one-third of the tillable land in the Panhandle is in a state of cultivation, though each year hundreds of progressive families are arriving in the Panhandle to secure homes. No section, known to civilized man, can boast of a larger body of tillable land than is found in the Northwest (Panhandle) section of Texas. Acres, even millions of acres of land—rich tillable land—may be found in one body. It is possible to plow a furrow a hundred miles long without a stop. And the beauty of it all is the fact that the land is all fertile.

When this land is seeded it is very prolific. For this reason, together with many others, homeseekers are turning their eyes toward the great Texas Panhandle—the country, which without doubt, offers an opportunity to every man who is willing to work. There is sufficient farm land in the country now, which is idle, to furnish a home for a hundred thousand farmers, and then each farmer will have more land than is customary in the average farming sections of America.

In this territory there is contained approximately 20,000,000 acres of land plus, ranging in price from \$15 to \$100 per acre, and when figured out on the average price per acre settles approximately at the \$25 mark.

This is pre-eminently an agricultural and stock farming region. Its great wheat belt is famous the world over; and its feed crops are enormous, sufficient to support its immense live stock production, with a great surplus for shipment. In the southern portion, the cotton fields yield their hundreds of thousands of bales of this staple product.

Oil activity is steadily increasing in the Panhandle. The field is now estimated to have production of more than 1000 barrels daily. A pipe line company has been chartered to pipe oil to the refinery in Amarillo. Six new oil well locations were recently made in Carson and Hutchinson Counties where there are now four wells known to be producers of from 200 to 600 barrels each daily.

While most of the activity in drilling is now in Carson and Hutchinson Counties, where oil is already actually in production, wells are al-

so drilling in Potter and Gray Counties with excellent prospects. Collingsworth County also promises to be developed soon. Oil activity on a limited scale extends from the Potter County field northeast to Canadian and northwest to Dalhart.

But regardless of whether much oil is ever found the soil products—wheat, oats, kaffir, maize, etc., will make the country independent, as the agricultural resources are unsurpassed. Oil men are welcome in the Panhandle, and should a great oil field be brought in it will make it possible for an early development of the country. Oil men declare that prospects are bright. Geologists, without an exception, have made favorable reports. Representatives of the major oil companies in America have holdings in almost every county in the Panhandle.

The greatest gas field in the world is located just north of Amarillo. One well, alone, is making more than one hundred million feet of petroleum gas daily. Several other wells in this section have enormous flows. This makes it possible for Amarillo people to have cheap fuel. There is talk of factories and manufacturing plans, and these like an oil field, will be welcome. The total gas production is nearly 600,000,000 cubic feet daily.

Yet Panhandle people will never allow themselves to forget the agricultural products. Agriculture has made the country, and agriculture will hold it. Should the oil field prove to be one of the greatest in America, its days will be numbered, so far as is known. The skyscrapers which are built during an oil boom, to care for oil boom trade, must in time crumble. For, regardless of the field's richness, the liquid gold cannot be classed as a permanent asset.

Climatic conditions are very favorable in the Panhandle for farming and stock raising. The summers, on account of the high altitude, are very pleasant; and the winters are, as a rule, not severe.

Owing to the fact that many Panhandle counties are very sparsely settled, it has been impossible in the past to make great improvements in the way of roads, public buildings etc., however, the roads and public buildings, as a rule, are above the general average. During the past two years many counties have begun campaigns for improvements. Hundreds of miles of first class roads will be constructed within the next few months. Public buildings are being enlarged and remodeled, and when the low tax rate is considered, together with the small number of tax payers, it will be noted that officials have never been extravagant.

Sickness is almost unknown in this section. No more healthful locality will be found.

In days gone by the cattle king was ruler, but as the population increases, as the new farm is fenced, he is slowly giving way to the stock farmer, the man upon whose shoulders rests the future destiny of the Panhandle.

Upon the wide-flung plains of the Panhandle of Texas and under its crystalline skies there lurks a lure stronger than the spell of the "Wat-

ers of Caey Fork." Who drinks once of its vitalizing waters must needs return to drink again; and he who once falls under the spell of the prairie and canyon, the glory of its sunsets and the wine of its morning winds, knows that here life finds its greatest vigor and zest and effort its surest reward. Nature has endowed the land with her choicest riches for all production to meet the needs of man and beast, and here the pioneers of the land have laid the foundation broad and deep for the needs of commerce and all requirements of civilized man. When all the story has been told and the Panhandle comes into its own, here will be found the warm beating heart and fountain of vigor of the greatest empire the world has ever known, the most sought and the best loved spot in all the vast territory of America. This is the land of which the poet speaks.

"Out where the world is in the making,
Where fewer hearts in despair are breaking,
That's where the west begins.
Where there's more of singing and less of sighing;
Where there's more of giving and less of buying,
And a man makes friends without half trying,
That's where the west begins."

Cor. of said Sage Headright. Thence due north along the R. line of said Sage Headright to the N. E. Cor. same being the S. E. Cor. of the McGee Headright.

Thence due west along the S. line of said McGee Headright to a point where public road intersects same line running in a north and south direction thru the Mitchell Headright.

And we do hereby notify all persons and any and all persons owning lands through which said road may run, that we will at the same time proceed to assess the damages incidental to the opening and establishment of said road, when they may, either in person or by agent or attorney, present to us a written statement of the amount of damages, if any, claimed by them.

TEXAS FACTS

If all the people of the United States were to move to Texas, its population per square mile would not exceed that of Massachusetts.

Texas is one and one-fourth times as large as the German Empire was before the war.

Texas has more farms than any State in the Union—417,770 in number. Texas has 24,000 farms that contain 500 acres each.

The farmers of Texas spend \$16,000,000 annually for agricultural implements.

The uncultivated area of Texas could support all the people to the United States, using as a basis of calculation two acres per capita, which is the world's average.

Eighteen per cent of the world's cotton crop is produced in Texas. In Texas there are 4,670 gins, 113 compresses, 228 cottonseed oil mills and 10 cotton mills.

The average yield per acre of Texas cereals is \$14.30, while the average for the United States is \$12.76.

The annual production of Texas factories is valued at \$999,998,000. Twenty-five per cent of the cotton seed products of the United States comes from Texas mills.

There are 372,000,000 pounds rice milled by Texas plants each year. Texas rice mills turn out \$3,142,000 of products annually.

The mining industry of Texas represents a capital investments of \$20,000,000.

It is as far from Texline to Brownsville, Texas as it is from Chicago to New Orleans, or from Detroit to Jacksonville, Florida.

For the past three years, Texas has produced approximately 100,000,000 barrels of oil annually, which is more than one-fifth of the production of the United States for that period.

Nearly one-half of the total lignite area in the United States is in Texas.

Texas is the second in number of National Banks. They have resources of more than \$785,000,000.

The annual production of rice in Texas would furnish the cereal every day for every breakfast table in his State for more than two years.

LEARN VALUE OF SHRUBBERY

Matter Has Been Too Long Neglected, but Its Worth Is Beginning to Be Appreciated.

It is only comparatively recently in America that we have discovered shrubbery and how to use it. Not many years ago people used to deal in individual shrubs. One shrub on each side of the gate was thought plenty. Occasionally a little clump was set out in the middle of the lawn. But when home makers began to experiment with masses of shrubs, when they began to frame their houses in forsythia and wigelia and spirea and rambler roses and honeysuckle, they found they had made a transformation. The whole appearance of the place was changed. A house that otherwise might be commonplace, in a proper setting of foliage and blossoms proved wholly charming and lovely.

Necessarily with the shrubbery came trees, both in the parking outside and within the yard. Trees for a background, for protection from the sun in summer, and for the delicate tracery of branches in winter, for the wonderful play of lights and shadows—trees there must be.

Most cities have plenty of object lessons in the effect of massed shrubbery and trees. It would pay any person interested in the appearance of his home to wander tomorrow through the residence districts where shrubbery and trees are growing in profusion, just to contrast them with neglected districts where foliage has been neglected.

It is wonderful how defects in architecture can be made to disappear by the proper handling of the masses of green nature has put at man's disposal.

GET THE COMMUNITY SPIRIT

Excellent Results Follow the Getting Together of Organizations for Civic Betterment.

Recently quite a good-sized company toured the lower half of the eastern shore to attend the summer meeting of the Maryland State Horticultural society, with visitors from the Maryland Forestry association, the Florists and Gardeners' club of Baltimore, the Peninsula Horticultural society and the Maryland Agricultural society and affiliated organizations—a pretty comprehensive representation of rural Maryland.

In Easton the local federated farmers, the Rotary club, the Men's Community club and other societies got together on the program of entertainment, mobilized the automobiles and arranged plenty of shelter and food. Other towns were moved to supplement Easton's leadership.

The point we call attention to here is the evidence the trip affords to the growth of the inter-community spirit. Rural Maryland caught it during the war, and it did great good. After the armistice there was a lull, but last year the farmers and the city men got together in a meeting held in Baltimore and the mutual feeling was revived and set in motion. We now see it at work in the summer meetings of the farmers and their various organizations. The value of it is indisputable. It brings our people into better acquaintance; it exalts the state spirit; it makes for happiness and good fellowship. And in the end it leads to better methods and better results on the farms and in the orchards, all of which is reflected in more prosperity in the towns.—Baltimore American.

DAIRY

REPLACING OLD DAIRY STOCK

Oregon County Organization Striving to Save Animals From High-Producing Stock.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

While calves from low-producing cows are saved to maintain the herds on some farms, on other farms and in other sections, where higher-producing cattle are kept, calves from 300-pound cows by purebred bulls are often veiled because no market is found for them as dairy stock. This is an economic waste which, according to re-

ports received by the United States Department of Agriculture, the extension organization of Coos county, Ore., is striving to eliminate.

About thirty calves from the best stock in Coos county were saved last year by arrangements made with farm bureaus of other counties to take them when two weeks old at \$12 a head, crated and delivered at the express office. Arrangements also were made recently for a representative of the Klamath county extension organization to spend 30 days locating newborn calves of good stock and finding a dairyman to feed them for two weeks before shipment to farmers in his own county.

The reports also say that calves two weeks old are shipped safely as far as 500 miles, or for 36 hours' travel; day-old calves can rarely be shipped.

PUREBREDS AID MILK YIELD

Tribute to Value of Improved Sires Is Contained in Statement by J. C. McDowell.

A tribute to the value of purebred sires is contained in a recent statement made by J. C. McDowell, of the dairy division of the United States Department of Agriculture, who pointed out that the average production of 38,000 grade cows in cow testing associations in 1920 was 5,980 pounds of milk and 200 pounds of butter, while the average production of all cows in the United States was 4,000 pounds of milk and 200 pounds of butter. The average milk and butter yield of grade cows was 50 per cent higher than the average for all grades and scrubs taken together. The economy of production was over 100 per cent greater.

INCREASE FAT ECONOMICALLY

Best Plan Is to Put Cows on an Abundant Ration That Is Rich and Easily Digested.

In a herd of well-fed cows it is not practical to try to produce milk containing more fat by giving rich feeds; that is a pretty well-settled fact. In a herd of poorly-fed cows, though, the percentage of fat can be increased by putting the cows on abundant ration that is rich and easily digested. Tests in New York showed an increase of one-quarter of 1 per cent of fat, when the cows were kept on good feeds for two years. The increase was economical, too. There was 50 per cent increase in amount of milk produced.

WAY TO AVOID LEAKY TEATS

Good Plan to Apply Collodion After Each Milking—This Closes Up the Opening.

The only way to prevent leaky teats is to smear collodion on the end of the teat after each milking. This closes up the opening and before the next milking it must be removed. This is bothersome, but may be used to good advantage where the cow loses a quantity of milk.

INDIVIDUALITY IS ESSENTIAL

In Selecting Cow It Is Important to See That Strain Is of Large Producers.

Breed is of less importance in selecting the cow than is individuality, for in every breed there are good individuals and poor individuals. It is important, not only that the breed, but the strain or family represented be noted for large and economical production.

Provide Supplemental Feed.

If concentrated feeds are not provided to supplement the pasture, the cow must either reduce her production or draw on reserve materials from her body.

Grain Is Essential.

The feeding of grain to dairy cows on pasture is essential to sustained high production.

Give Plenty of Water.

Give the calves plenty of clean water to drink.

THE BOVINE HALL OF FAME

Not so many years ago it was customary in the average farmer's herd to dispose of a cow to the butcher before she was seven or eight years of age, due to the belief that her days of usefulness as a profitable product and reproducer were over. Today the average cow is considered in her prime at seven or eight years of age, while many individuals are producing heavily and profitably up to fifteen years of age, and a few have even increased their period of production to beyond their twentieth birthday.

Of late years many an old cow has been placed on official test in order to determine her capabilities and to support her progeny with a record dam. The marvelous performances of Grace Darling of St. Mary's, Sophie 19th of Hood Farm, Financial King's Interest and Pogis' Irene 2d at advanced ages, are still fresh in our minds, but now closely following comes a new champion.

Snip Wauger 2d 243040, dropped on August 25, 1908, is the latest Jersey Queen to uphold the Jersey banner for large production at advanced age. She began her official test on October 22, 1921, at the age of thirteen years and one month, and finished her year with the remarkable production of 18,226 pounds of milk and 941.11 pounds butter-fat. This remarkable record credits Snip with the following honors: Champion Jersey, all ages, State of Ohio. World's Champion Jersey for cows ten years of age or over. United States Champion, all breeds, for cows twelve years of age or over. World's Champion Cow, all breeds, for cows thirteen years of age or over.—Southwest Plainsman.

POULTRY

PLAN TO PREVENT MOULTING

Natural for Very Early Hatched Pul-
lets to Go Through Partial
Moult in Fall.

Every fall we hear a number of re-
ports of pullet-egg production being
cut down by fall moulting. This is
perhaps only natural when we consid-
er that every one is working toward
early maturity and production by
means of better breeding early hatch-
ing and heavy feeding. It is natural
for very early hatched pullets to stop
laying and go through a partial moult
before cold weather. In addition to
this natural tendency, the moult may
be hastened by any sudden change of
feed, care or environment. The fol-
lowing simple rules, if followed, will
be helpful to prevent this fall moult:

1. Avoid hatching out of season; March, April and May are best, the exact time depending on the breed.
2. Provide free range during the entire season.
3. Avoid rations containing an excess of protein.
4. Do not attempt to hold pullets back, let them mature normally.
5. Have the pullets in their winter quarters before production starts.
6. Avoid any sudden change in feed, care or management after production begins.—Connecticut Experiment Station.

DIFFICULTIES WITH TURKEYS

Hard Work to Keep Flocks From
Wandering Over Wide Area and
Invading Other Farms.

(Prepared by the United States Department
of Agriculture.)

One of the greatest difficulties with
which turkey growers have to contend
is to keep their flocks from wandering
over too wide an area and invading
neighboring farms. To some extent,
feeding heavily night and morning re-
duces the area over which turkeys
range, but even then they often go too
far. When trouble of this kind oc-
curs, the most effective plan is to
drive them into an inclosure and keep
them there until about noon.

In warm weather turkeys do most
of their ranging early in the morning,
and by nine o'clock they are usually
as far from home as they will get dur-
ing the day. As soon as the sun be-

comes very warm they spend most of
their time in the shade, until three or
four o'clock in the afternoon, when
they begin moving toward home, rang-
ing for feed along the way. If the
weather is not too warm they do not
spend so much time lying in the shade,
and consequently range over a larger
area, and may keep moving away
from home until noon. By feeding in
the pen every morning they soon
learn to go there on coming down
from roost, and no time is lost in pen-
ning them. If they fly out of the
pen after being fed, the flight feathers
from one wing should be clipped.

KILLING OFF BEST CHICKENS

Housewife Makes Mistake in Getting
Rid of Cockerels Because They
Are Large

The housewife who kills off her
largest and best cockerels and pullets
is not as much a poultrywoman as
some people think. Often it is the
cockerels that are the most valuable,
yet nearly every farm woman thinks
she is justified in killing off her large-
est chicks if they happen to be cock-
erels. It is not a very hard matter to
get \$2 and \$3 for good, vigorous util-
ity cockerels nowadays. Better be
certain before you kill the next one.

GIVE OLD FOWLS ATTENTION

Hens Intended to Be Sold Should Be
Fattened and Placed on Market
Soon as Possible.

Just now your greatest attention
should be directed toward the care of
the old hens. Those that you intend
to keep over another year should be
given a separate pen where you can
give them additional care and a spe-
cial ration to meet their requirements,
but those you intend to sell should be
fattened and placed on the market as
soon as possible. It doesn't pay to
waste time in the culling work.



FEDERAL HELP STRENGTHENS

Much More Accomplished for Country
Than Simply Provide Funds
for Construction.

(Prepared by the United States Department
of Agriculture.)

Federal aid has done a great deal
more for the country than simply to
provide funds for road construction,
according to the bureau of public roads
of the United States Department of
Agriculture. One of the most far-
reaching results has been its influence
in placing the greater part of the high-
way work of the country in the hands
of experienced engineers of state high-
way departments.

In 1915, prior to the federal-aid act,
70 per cent of the road work was done
by agencies other than state high-
way departments, most of it by county
officials. Such a system was bound to
be wasteful. Overhead costs were
high, engineers were not always em-
ployed, systems to serve the best in-
terests of the state as a whole were
not developed, and the opportunities
for corruption were greater.

With the passage of the federal-aid
act of 1916 and the insistence of the

government upon the construction of
federal-aid roads under the supervision
of state departments, existing state
highway departments were enlarged
and strengthened, and in 17 states
adequate departments have been cre-
ated where there had been none or the
existing one was not properly equipped
to perform necessary functions.

With adequate departments the work
has been shifted to their control until
at the present time they supervise
more than 60 per cent of the road
work. This assures to the taxpayer
the services of engineers trained in
road work, a centralized authority re-
sponsible for the expenditure of funds
and a far-sighted plan of development
and financing.

COMPILING COST OF PAVING

Figures Secured by Bureau of Public
Roads Cover 68,000,000 Yards
of Work.

Average costs per square yard of va-
rious types of paving for country
roads have been compiled by the bu-
reau of public roads, United States
Department of Agriculture. The fig-
ures cover 68,000,000 square yards of
paving constructed with federal aid
in all parts of the United States dur-
ing the period of 1916-21. The costs
per square yard are as follows: Sand-
clay, 18 cents; gravel, 46 cents; plain
and surface-treated macadam, 95
cents; bituminous macadam, \$2.10; bi-
tuminous concrete, \$2.50; plain cement
concrete, \$2.57; reinforced-cement
concrete, \$2.74; and brick, \$4.10.

These figures cover only the cost of
the paving; they do not include the
cost of grading, and officials point out
that it must not be assumed that roads
of the several types can be construct-
ed in any locality at these figures. For
example, the cost of bituminous con-
crete varied from \$1.70 in the New
England states to \$3.13 in the group
of states including Kentucky, Tennes-
see, Mississippi and Alabama. In one
group of states the cost of brick
dropped to \$2.40. Costs of construct-
ing these types in the various groups
of states have been compiled and can
be obtained from the bureau.

HELPS TO SUSTAIN PRICES

One of the Big Factors Is Construc-
tion of Good Roads Planned for
the Coming Year.

One of the factors that will help to
sustain farm prices is the large
amount of road building planned for
this year. The government will spend
a larger sum for this purpose than
ever before, and states and counties
will co-operate to the extent of their
financial abilities.

Money for Good Roads.

In Washington a bill authorizing
\$140,000,000 for good roads for the
next two years was recently passed in
the house by a vote of 230 to 51. The
measure provides that \$65,000,000 shall
be available by June 30, 1923, and
\$75,000,000 by June 30, 1924.

Good Roads in Quebec.

During 1921 the province of Quebec
constructed 416 miles of good roads.
More than 4,000 miles of highway are
now being kept in perfect repair in
Quebec province.

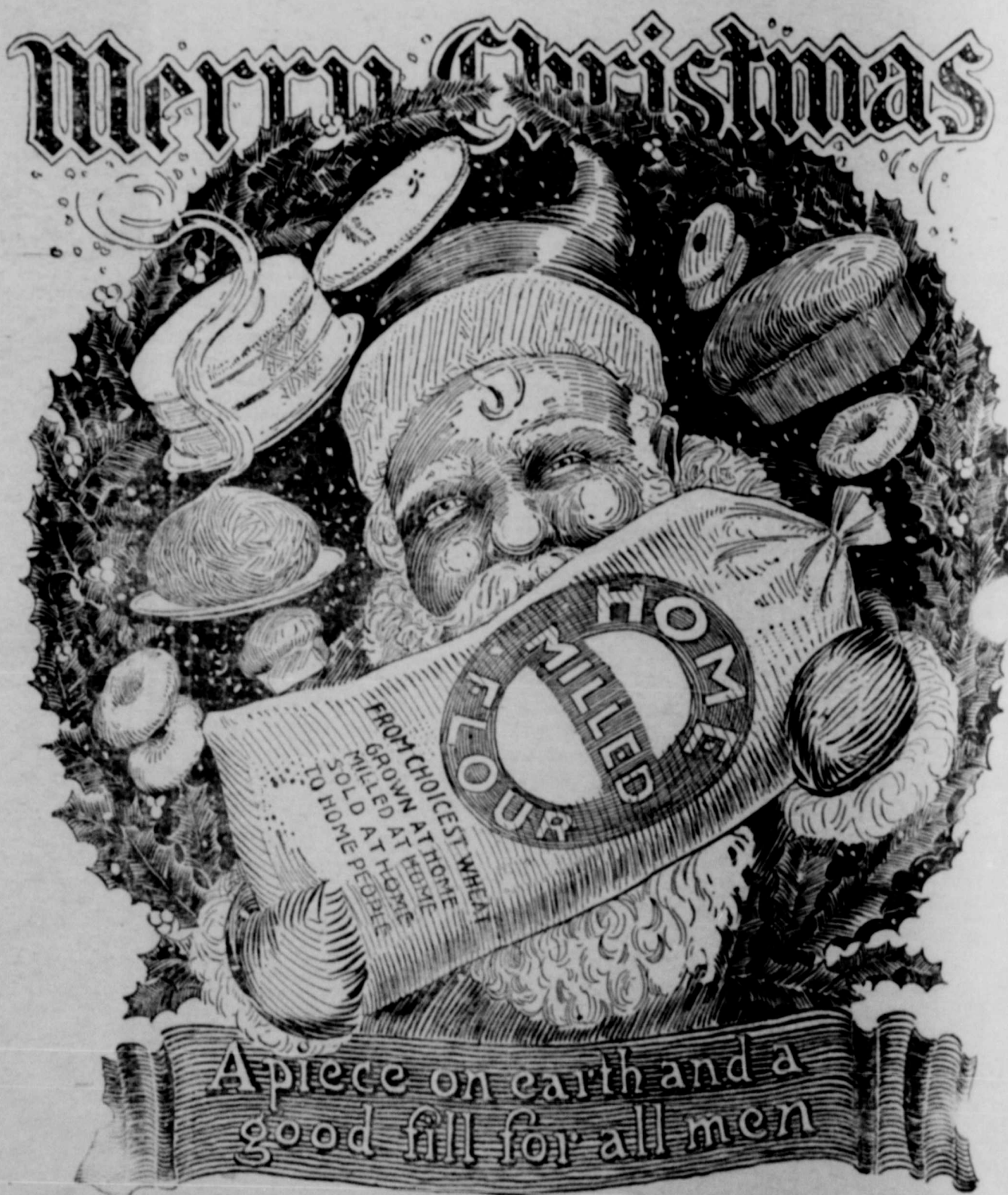

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO APPLY FOR A SPECIAL ACT OF THE LEGISLATURE AT ITS NEXT REGULAR SESSION CONVENING IN THE CITY OF AUSTIN, TEXAS, JANUARY, 1923, RELATIVE TO CERTAIN CHANGES IN THE STREETS AND PLAT OF THE CITY OF PERRYTON, TEXAS.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, That the City of Perryton, in Ochiltree County, Texas, will apply for a special Act of the Legislature at the next regular session thereof convening in the City of Austin, Texas, January, 1923, after thirty days from the first publication of this notice, giving and granting to said city authority to close and reduce certain streets situated in and shown upon the plat of said city as dedicated to public use, as follows:

FIRST—To reduce the street on the west side of Block No. 40 in said city known as "West Main Court" to alley 20 feet in width and establishing the property line at the center of said alley, and to widen Main Street through said block 40 to 125 feet from property line to property line, the center of said street being the center of said block No. 40, and to adjudge all that part of said Block No. 40 west of said Main Street after passing through said block to be a part of Block No. 39, and to plat that part of said Block No. 39 as thus established into town lots to conform to all other blocks and lots in said town situated on said Main Street.

SECOND—To close the street on the East side of said Block No. 40, known as "East Main Court," and to adjudge all that part of Block No. 40 East of Main street after being established through said Block 40 to be a part of Block No. 41, and to establish and declare said block No. 41 thus established to be a public square for public use, after making proper remuneration to all interested parties therein for such interests as they or any of them may have.

THIRD—Granting authority to the said City, by ordinance, to exchange the interest of said city in Block No. 40 to the owner or owners of Block No. 39 and 41 for said Block No. 41 as established after the changes made as above prayed for.

FOURTH—Validating all ordinances heretofore passed in reference to the matters above mentioned.
