Wise Brothers Have State Fair Lamb Winners

Mark and Hank Wise, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Wise of Rockwood, had three major winners in the State Fair junior lamb show last week. Mark had the champion finewool lamb of the show, and the younger brother Hank, had the reserve champion finewool and reserve champion crossbred lambs in the junior division.

Others from Santa Anna who had winners in the State Fair were Tony Owens, 2nd place Suffolk crossbred lamb; Randy Long, 8th finewool, and 19th place Hampshire crossbred; Raymond Holland, 12th finewool, and 24th Hampshire crossbred; and Roy Keeney, 22nd finewool, and 6th Dorset crossbred lamb.

Other winners from the local chapter were Lane Guthrie, 22nd and 26th in the finewool class; Susan Newman, 2nd in Southdown and 14th in Hampshire cross; Elaine Newman, 16th Hampshire cross, and 19th Hampshire; Mark Wise, 12th in Hampshire.

The champion and reserve champion finewool lambs shown by the Wise brothers placed first and second in their class, and the reserve champion crossbred lamb had placed first in the Southdown cross class.

Winning the showmanship award at the State Fair lamb show was Terry Kent of Coleman.

Following the lamb show, an auction was held with 239 lambs being auctioned. Mark's grand champion lamb sold to Safeway Stores for \$300, and the reserve champion finewool lamb belonging to Hank brought \$150. It was sold to Talley Volkswagen of Dallas.

In the swine division of the State Fair junior show, Richard Cupps won first place with his entry in the lightweight Hampshire class. David Cupps had 16th and Tommy McIntire 23rd in that class.

Cline Smith placed 17th in the lightweight crossbred, and 20th in the heavyweight Hampshire classes. Tommy McIntire had 9th place and Billy Diaz, 23rd, in the light crossbred, and David Cupps showed the 12th place heavy crossbred.

Other winners in the swine show were Raul Guerrero with fourth in the medium Yorkshire, and Ronnie Daniel with fourth in heavyweight Duroc class.

Funeral Monday For Walter Hill

Funeral services were held Monday in Comanche for former Santa Anna resident, Walter W. Hill, 66, who died Saturday night in the Brownwood hospital after a sudden illness. Burial was in a Brownwood cemetery.

Born July 14, 1904 in Belton, Mr. Hill married Fay Atkinson of Belton on September 28, 1926. He had lived in Comanche County for the past 32 years and was a member of the Baptist Church and a retired rancher.

Survivors are the wife, one son, Dr. William A. Hill of Comanche; five brothers, F. B. Hill of Santa Anna, Homer Hill of Iraan, Arthur of Alpine, O. L. of San Angelo and Jewel of Stephenville; two sisters, Mrs. B. A. McSwain of San Angelo, and Mrs. Roy Richardson of Artesia, N. M., and three grandchildren. Also surviving is a sister-in-law, Mrs. D. R. Hill of Santa Anna.

Seven Constitutional Amendments Included on Ballot Next Tuesday

On General Election Day, November 3, Texas voters will face a heavier than usual responsibility. In addition to casting ballots for the candidate of their choice, they will also be voting for or against seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution. Some of these have the potential for far-reaching effects.

To aid voters in understanding of the proposed

amendments, the Texas Legislative Council of the 61st Legislature of Texas has prepared "Analyses of the Proposed Constitutional Amendments."

The proposed amendments are given briefly as follows:

Among the seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution which voters will consider on November 3, is Proposed Amendment Number 1 which relates to the removal,

retirement or censure of justices, judges, and justices of the peace under prescribed circumstances. The proposal would alter seven subsections of the constitution which presently covers the retirement and compensation of justices and judges.

The proposed amendment was drawn to enlarge the jurisdiction of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission and to enlarge its powers of censure and removal from office of all state and local justices and judges whose conduct is deemed inconsistent with the proper performance of the duties of the court.

Proposed Amendment No. 2 would authorize the legislature to enact a mixed beverage law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option basis. The amendment would repeal that part of the Texas Constitution which prohibits the open saloon and which empowers the legislature to define that term and enact legislation against it.

Amendment No. 3 would authorize the legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands based upon the capability of the lands to support the raising of livestock or to produce farm and forest crops. The present section of limited to land owned by natural persons as opposed to corporate or any other type of ownership, while the proposed section contains no such limitation.

Amendment No. 4 establishes the State Building Commission as a three-member commission to be appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The governor, attorney general and chairman of the Board of Control have served as ex-officio members of the State Building Commission.

Amendment No. 5 is a proposal to authorize any county to issue bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of real property in the county. Bond use would be for construction, maintenance, and operation of roads and turnpikes.

Proposed Amendment No. 6 would increase the exemption from forced sales of a homestead from \$5,000 to \$10,000. It has been 100 years since the homestead exemption was set at \$5,000.

Proposed Amendment No. 7 has long been a topic of growing concern. It authorizes the legislature to provide for consolidating offices and functions of government for performance of governmental functions by contract between political subdivisions in any county.

Every qualified person should exercise his basic responsibility to vote. Vote your choice on November 3, but be sure to vote!

Physics Paper Is Co-Authored By Jerry Ellis

Two Sam Houston State University physics professors presented papers to the American Physical Society, 1970 Meeting of the Division of Nuclear Physics in Houston Oct. 15-17.

Dr. Hugh E. Hall, associate professor of physics, and Dr. David P. Ross, assistant professor of physics, gave their papers before a group of nuclear physics from American and foreign universities.

Hall's paper, "The Decay of Naturally Occurring Lanthanum - 138," was co-authored by Jerry L. Ellis of Santa Anna, who is a graduate student at Sam Houston State.

The paper was the result of research work supported by the Robert A. Welch Foundation of Houston; the Welch Foundation grant was awarded in 1968 for a three-year period.

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In Our Opinion

JUST A REMINDER to take advantage of your privilege and responsibility next Tuesday and vote.

The only way to return the government to the people is for the people to honor their own responsibility to participate. Their only sure way is to cast their ballot at every opportunity. Just to reuse an old cliché, "If you don't vote, don't gripe!"

SOME OF US CAN REMEMBER the old jokes we used to hear about "shovel leaning" and such back in the depression days when the WPA was furnishing work for the needy.

And now, 35 years later, there is a growing sentiment that welfare recipients should do something, if they are able-bodied, for the money they get.

There has been some support of President Nixon's welfare reform program including the minimum family income provision of \$1,600 per year for a family of four. However, it still boils down to the fact that it is a "guaranteed annual income."

But many think that in order to receive this welfare, when the recipient is physically able, he should perform some public work for the benefit of the community.

During the WPA days, many things were done for the benefit of the local communities by those who needed public help, and in those days there were no jobs available, as today many people are looking for help, but are unable to find it.

It is true that the greatest demand is for skilled labor, but some people who have no skills are not willing to accept menial jobs because they feel they are above them, yet they are not above accepting welfare which to our way of thinking is much more degrading.

What it all boils down to is that welfare will pay as much or more than the unskilled jobs and they don't see any logic in working when they can get it for nothing. If there are some strings attached to getting welfare money and the recipient has to do something to earn his money, it might encourage some to accept jobs from other sources, and in turn give help to those who need it.

Let's suppose that, as the government contends, it takes X dollars for a person to live. They would get it by cleaning up the city park, or some other useful job that would benefit the community as a whole. The WPA even built buildings for the community, and other constructive projects where everyone benefited. I'll wager that many of the older residents can point out such projects that are still being used.

Why, then, are those in need any better than they were then?

Our contention is that there is more pride in working for what we get than having it doled out for no effort, and that present programs encourage laziness, and at the same time deprive those who would hire help of getting any.

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STATE Capital NEWS

Austin — Auto insurance company spokesmen have called for an "absolute minimum" 11.7 per cent profit allowance after taxes.

Industry representatives told the State Board of Insurance at a two-day hearing that they must have that margin to stay afloat and serve car owners.

At the same time, they told the Board it should consider all sources of insurance company earnings in arriving at rates. Meeting was to hear testimony as to whether company investment income should be included in the auto premium rate base.

Further hearing in November will determine what actual rate recommendations will be. Apparently, no rate change will go into effect before January.

Industry recommendations -- including consideration of all income and fixed allowance for a fair rate of return -- would add up to a 6.5 per cent increase in the auto premium rate for most motorists, experts estimated.

Under industry recommendations, future rate inadequacies would be the "sole responsibility of the (state) regulators if they fail to recognize a proper rate of return," spokesmen said.

Expert witnesses told the Board that state-regulated utilities, which have far less risk of loss than casualty insurance companies, are permitted higher profits.

Others said that casualty insurance companies are among those that have the lowest rates of return of any major industry.

Unimpressed, Texas AFL-CIO President H. S. (Hank) Brown promised the biggest fight "since the Battle of the Alamo" if the Board agrees to another rate increase.

COURTS SPEAK — Texas Court of Criminal Appeals held that a Houston judge was not disqualified from presiding at the trial of a man whom he prosecuted (as a district attorney) 10 years earlier on another charge.

State Supreme Court set arguments for December 2 over whether a Dallas firm's contracts giving dealer exclusive territories for breath sweeteners is a violation of anti-trust laws.

Also set for December 2 were arguments over losses covered by "vandalism and malicious mischief" provisions in insurance policies.

Still another December 2 argument is scheduled in an Austin case involving whether death of a motorist was solely due to an auto accident or whether chronic illnesses contributed. Son of the deceased man would collect \$20,000 in insurance if the accident was ruled to be the sole cause of his death.

AG OPINIONS — A county may pay overtime subject to budget and maximum salary laws and may pay for accumulated vacation time in line with contracts, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that: • Public junior college districts are classified as political subdivisions of the state for the purpose of elective coverage of employees under unemployment insurance.

• State employees under the classification system may be reclassified downward without change in duty assignment, without mandatory pay rate reduction not to exceed "step 7" of lower pay group.

• Central Education Agency has authority to contract with

private firms to set up and operate experimental diagnostic programs for language-handicapped children.

• Harris County Commissioners Court has the mandatory ministerial duty to approve and pay budgetary expenses allotted for the county purchasing agent and fixed by board of judges.

• Wife of Waller County road administrator may be employed in the county road and bridge department.

BOND LIMIT RAISE URGED — Interim study committee has called on the 62nd Legislature to expedite submission of a constitutional amendment to remove the four-per-cent interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds.

Texas Water Resources Study Committee, in a special report, emphasized that the Water Development Board has authorization to sell \$100 million in bonds to make loans to local governments for water improvements, but the interest limit makes the bonds unmarketable.

Inability to sell at prevailing high interest rates is blocking construction of dams, reservoirs and treatment facilities in all parts of the state, said the committee.

Members pledged to offer later recommendations for providing financial assistance to cities and towns to help them get adequate facilities and attract federal matching funds.

COLLEGE ENROLLMENT SOARS — There are 427,472 students in Texas public and private junior and senior institutions of higher education this fall. It's a new high!

Percentage of enrollment growth was 8.34 per cent over 1969 when enrollment reached 389,102. Texas growth rate is well above the national average of 4.5 per cent. Figures are preliminary.

Public junior college enrollment jump was phenomenal — 16.26 per cent — totaling 112,219. Public senior college and university headcount increased 5.68 per cent to 240,597. Private senior colleges and universities also gained — 4.61 per cent — to 67,810. Only the private junior colleges showed a drop. They were off 24.87 per cent, to 6,846.

BOUNDARY SOUGHT — Attorney General Martin and former Gov. Price Daniel will tour the Sabine-Neches area this week (Oct. 30) looking over territory involved in Texas-Louisiana boundary dispute.

Louisiana claims the western shore of the Sabine River and Lake as part of the Louisiana Purchase. Texas claims jurisdiction to the middle of the river and lake. Outcome of the law-

suit is seen as a major significance to the Sabine-Neches area. Official party will cruise the Sabine from Orange to Sabine-Neches Waterway at Port Arthur.

PASS EASEMENT ACCEPTED — Parks and Wildlife Commission voted 2-1 to accept a 400-foot easement for the \$3 million Corpus Christi water exchange (fish) pass across Mustang Island.

Commission also accepted from Mrs. Sam E. Wilson Jr. of Corpus Christi the gift of 130.5 acres of land on the island to provide fishermen access to the pass from the north.

Meanwhile, at a budget hearing, the Commission directed its staff to ask the Legislature for more general appropriations and to rely less on income from hunting and fishing fees to finance operations.

Actual contract for the pass will be delayed pending a permit from the U. S. Corps of Engineers and formal approval by the State Building Commission and the governor.

SHORT SNORTS

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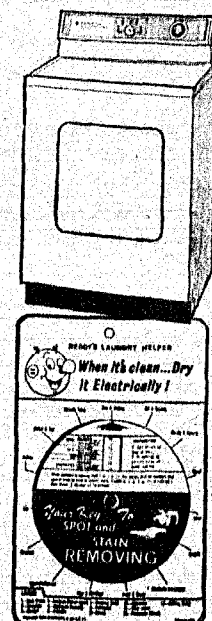


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Trickham News Notes

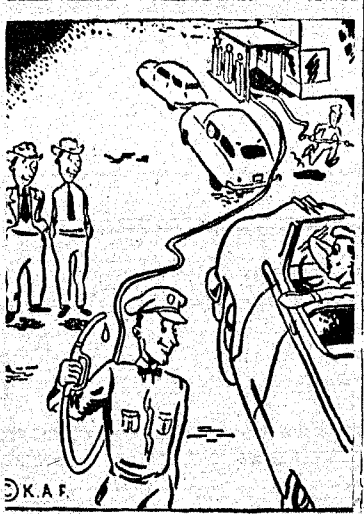

ASC News...

by Joe K. Taylor

Coleman County wheat growers are directly involved in the new Wheat Research and Promotion Act, according to Rankin McIver, chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin has said, "Domestic utilization of wheat in human nutrition and industry can be encouraged by the recently enacted Wheat Research and Promotion Act. The prospect is quite promising that research can develop new products and greater utilization of wheat."

Financing of the program under the new law is to come from proceeds of the 1968 wheat export certificate pool not claimed by eligible farmers.

All 1968 wheat producers whose computed export certificate pool amounted to \$3.00 or more, were mailed a letter last Thursday, Oct. 22.

It is of utmost importance that the payment computation statement attached to the letter be signed by the farmer and returned to the ASCS office. We must have this statement signed and back in our office before the check can be released.

A producer may choose to receive his share of the export certificate pool or he may leave it in the pool to finance the research and promotion program.

Wheat growers in Coleman County entitled to receive less than \$3.00 will not receive a special notice but they can nevertheless claim a share of export certificates by filing a written request for payment with the county ASCS office. Each producer's share of the export certificate pool will amount to about 5 cents for each \$100.00 of the 1968 domestic wheat certificates earned.

Wheat growers will have until December 25 to notify their county ASCS office of their choice.

Deer Hurts Man In His Driveway

Austin—Just mention Bam-bi to Joe McKinney, and he'll flinch.

McKinney, a Kendall County construction worker, is recuperating at his home near Boerne where he was attacked last week in his driveway by a 150-pound buck deer.

The victim suffered multiple lacerations on his head, chest and both legs from the incident and might have been hurt even worse if his wife had not felled the berserk animal with two shots from a .33 caliber pistol.

McKinney told Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game wardens he had no time to escape. He noticed the deer trotting toward him as he was leaving his car and walking down the driveway toward his house. The deer lowered his head and ran full tilt into McKinney, knocking him to the ground.

Mrs. McKinney saw the attack from a window, grabbed the pistol and rushed outside to see her husband pinned to the ground under the buck's antlers. She fired pointblank at the deer, hitting it in the chest both times.

Observers speculated that the deer, which perhaps was someone's pet at one time, became spooked when a child's T-shirt accidentally became impaled on its antlers when it ran under a clothesline.

The shirt was still on the deer's antlers when the battle ended.

Department officials remind Texans to consider any deer potentially dangerous, regardless of how "tame" they might act. Moreover, keeping wild deer as pets is illegal in Texas, so it's wise to leave fawns in the woods where they are found.

Former S. A. M. D. Dies In Temple

Dr. Charles O. Moody, 65, a longtime Coleman physician, died Monday at Scott and White Hospital at Temple after a long illness. Dr. Moody, who had practiced at Coleman for the past 33 years, was associated with the late Dr. Richard Sealy in Santa Anna from 1935 to 1937.

Dr. Moody was a veteran of World War II, an elder in the Presbyterian Church, and a member and chairman of the Coleman County Medical Society.

Survivors are his wife, one daughter, three sons, and four grandchildren.

Funeral services were held in Coleman.

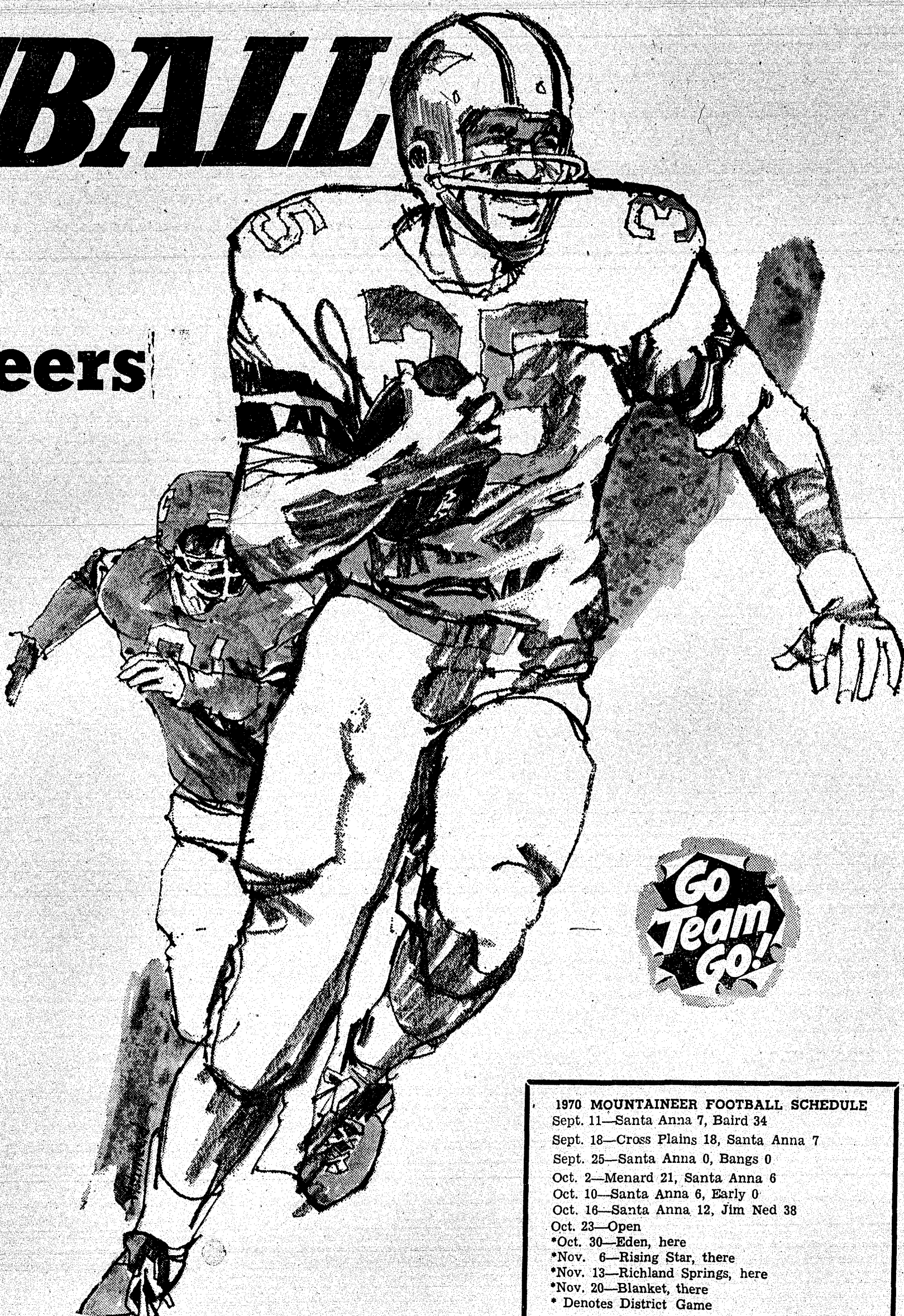

Hunting Mishaps Often Needless

"Hunting season every year brings needless tragedy to Texas, and in almost every incident carelessness is the culprit," the President of the Texas Safety Association said today.

George Wm. Perry, a Dallas attorney who heads the statewide safety group, urged Texas hunters to learn and use the basic rules of weapons handling and hunting safety.

"Last year 24 persons died as a result of hunting accidents in this state," said Perry. The TSA leader pointed to hunting accident records which showed there were 92 separate accidents involving 142 persons.

"The tragedy is that these accidents just do not have to occur. Sixty-nine of the people involved in the hunting accidents last year were under 21 years of age. Forty of those involved were 16 years old or younger," Perry noted.

He said that this was clear-cut evidence that many people are hunting before they have been given property instruction in safe hunting practices.

"Parents need to make sure their youngsters understand

the rules of safe hunting and make sure the youngsters obey them," Perry urged.

There are twelve basic rules for safe gun handling, according to the Texas Safety Association.

1. Treat every gun as if it were loaded, never take anyone's word that a gun is empty.

2. Always point the gun muzzle in a safe direction, never aim at anything you do not intend to shoot.

3. Be sure of your target, never shoot at unidentified noises, wait until the whole animal or bird is visible.

4. Know the correct way to carry your gun, under your arm, on your shoulder, cradled in your arms, and in both hands.

5. Keep the safety on or the chamber unloaded until ready to fire and keep your finger out of the trigger guard.

6. Check bore frequently—through the breech end—to be sure it is clear or foreign objects.

7. Agree beforehand on the area each hunter will cover.

8. Be sure the action is open when handing a gun to another person, or stopping to eat, talk or rest.

9. Transport unloaded guns in cases for their protection and keep them out of sight to prevent theft.

10. When hunting in a group no hunter should carry a gun so that it even points at another person.

11. Unload gun before crossing fences and pass the gun under first.

12. Correct unsafe gun handling whenever you see it by explaining and demonstrating the right way to handle a firearm.

Hints Given On Seed Problems

College Station—The quality of cottonseed for planting purposes could become a problem. Therefore, points out Fred C. Elliott, Extension cotton specialist, careful attention should be given to harvesting, ginning and seed handling in order to insure quality seed for next year's planting.

He lists five primary areas where damage to seed can occur. They are pre-harvest damage; mechanical damage during harvest; damage during trailer or bulk storage at high moisture levels; mechanical damage during ginning and damage from acid delinting.

Follow the moisture guidelines, suggests Elliott, during harvesting and ginning for this is most important and is the one practice where the growers can help.

When cotton opens during wet weather, there is some danger of free fatty acid developing in the seed. This can be detected by cutting the seed and observing whether the meat in the seed has a brown color. Under such conditions, seed should be very carefully handled, says the specialist.

Here are other suggestions from Elliott which should help obtain better quality planting seed. Delay harvesting in the morning until relative humidity at boll height in the field is 60 per cent or less. Wait until the bark on the main stalk and stems are dry following frost or desiccation. Too early stripping will result in barked grades. Store seed at the lowest possible moisture content below 12 per cent. Also store seed under conditions that will allow cooling or air circulation through them.

And this word of warning, if cotton is harvested early in the morning under high moisture conditions, and the trailer is left on the gin lot during the rush of harvest, injury to seed can result. Even overnight storage on a trailer with moisture content of the cotton higher than 12 per cent can cause heating and seed damage, he says.

And finally he makes these suggestions, eat an early lunch and start the stripper around 11 a. m. and save planting seed from afternoon harvested cotton, and ask the county agent for publications dealing with seed problems.
