STATE ASKS \$125,000 DAMAGES IN ROAD SUIT

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Dec. 16.—Cancellation of the Hoffman Construction Company's highway maintenance contracts in Kerr, Kendall, Comal, Medina and Bexar counties on the grounds that they constituted a fraud against the state, was asked in the state's amended petition which has been prepared by Attorney General Dan Moody.

The effect of the amendment is to raise from \$100,000 to \$125,000 damages which the state is asking.

Detectives expressed the belief that Mrs. Mephram strangled the boy and then slapped the noose about her own neck, fastening the end of the tape to the bedpost, and then dropped to her knees drawing the noose tight.

FIND BIG BEER CACHE ON RANCH

BIG LAKE, Dec. 16.—More than 200 cases of beer were seized Sunday afternoon on a ranch Northeast of here owned by Duwain Hughes, cashier of the First National Bank at Mertzon when Mr. Hughes was attracted to a remote point in his pasture by the sound of a fusillade of shots. Upon investigation, Mr. Hughes came upon two youthful hunters, residents of Big Lake, who were tossing bottles of beer into the air and shooting them to pieces as they fell. In their rambles over the country in search of game, they had run upon a cache of over 200 cases of beer and were having the time of their lives watching the illicit beverage shower over the country side as their shots shattered the bottles.

Mr. Hughes immediately went to Big Lake and got in touch with peace officers who accompanied him to the scene of alcoholic precipitation and laid violent hands upon the booze. The beer was transported to Big Lake and placed under guard but later moved to a point outside the city. No one has as yet claimed it.

NEW EVIDENCE MITCHELL TRIAL

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—A letter written by John W. Weeks as secretary of war, describing Col. William S. Mitchell as "lawless and unfit for any high administrative position, and possessed of a desire for publicity at the expense of others," was presented as evidence today at the Mitchell court martial.

The letter was written to President Coolidge, by Weeks, who at the time was secretary of war, and gave these as his reasons for refusing to recommend Mitchell to be reappointed as assistant chief of the army air service with rank of brigadier-general.

NEW GREEK LETTER PRAT FOR TEXAS U.

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Dec. 14.—Phi Lambda Uppertut is the name of the unique fraternity of Texas University. As the name indicates, the fraternity is composed of exponents of the manly art of self defense, young gentlemen who deal in jabs, left hooks, and uppercuts. No one is eligible for membership unless he has won the championship of the university in some weight.

The fraternity was organized last year by Joe Goodwin, student boxing coach. One of the purposes of its organizing was to supervise annual boxing tournaments to determine the boxing champions of the university.

Unquestionably, the outstanding boxer of the university is Sandi Esquivel, basketball cap-

tain, and holder of the Southwest Conference record in the two-mile run. Esquivel shows to best advantage when fighting at 148 pounds, the welterweight limit. He is fast, shifty, clever, and carries a "mean" punch in either hand. Before coming to the university, Esquivel, who comes from El Paso, won the amateur welterweight championship of the Southwest.

Some of the other outstanding boxers are: Johnny Estes, a foot-ball star, who fights in the light heavyweight division; Hargrove and Terrell, 175-pounders; Perkins and Nichols, welterweights; Butler, Arnett and Boggess, light weights.

ASKS FOR MORE PASTORS WILL LOOK FOR POOR

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—The demands of naval aviation alone require an increase in the number of appointees to the Naval Academy, Rear Admiral W. R. Shoemaker, chief of the Bureau of Navigation, said today in his annual report to Secretary Wilbur.

Admiral Shoemaker urged that the present allotment of three appointees to each representative and senator be increased to at least four, which he estimated would make available between 700 and 750 officers for naval aviation, while the training of an equal number of enlisted men as pilots would bring the total estimated by the Bureau of Aeronautics to be necessary for carrying out its program.

Admiral Shoemaker does not believe in naval aviators remaining permanently with that branch of the service, but holds they should be assigned to other duties from time to time, as "the aviation problem technically as to the knowledge required is no more specialized than the operation of any other type and is even less than the requirement in some of the technical branches of the line in which specialization is not necessary now."

The recommendation of last year that the enlisted strength of the navy be increased to 96,000 was reiterated in the report and it is pointed out that under last year's appropriation the present authorized strength of 86,000 had to be reduced to 82,000 because of insufficient funds.

The past year saw a general improvement in the character and experience of navy personnel, the report said, with the number of officers gradually increasing.

The canvass will be made this week in order that the distribution committee will know better just what they are going to need.

Those in charge of the campaign state that considerable cash will be required and that all old clothes will be distributed. Barrels will be placed along the main streets where bundles may be deposited and where they will be picked up every day. These are some of the things that we, as club members, try to live up to. For some time we have been having as one of our club programs, "Christmas Candies." Therefore, living up to what we have mentioned above, we are publishing some of our favorite recipes.

Sweet Potato Candy

2 cups sugar
 2 tablespoons Karo (white)
 1 cup mashed sweet potato
 Two-thirds cup water.
 To the sugar add the water and Karo, then the sweet potato and cook until it forms a soft ball in cold water. Remove from the fire and beat until creamy. Add to this one cup of nut meats or if nuts are omitted add one teaspoon of vanilla flavoring. Pour onto a greased platter and when cold, cut into squares. It will be necessary to stir occasionally to prevent scorching.

Irish Potato Candy

1 medium sized Irish potato (a little larger than an egg)
 1 tablespoon butter
 1 package powdered sugar, 1lb.
 1 cup cocoanut or nut meats.
 Cook the potato until well done. Drain all the water off and mash. Be sure potato is as dry as possible. To the potato add the butter. When almost cold (when you can tell there is only a little warmth) begin by adding the powdered sugar, about two spoonfuls at a time, folding in, continuing until you had added a whole package of sugar. Add one cup of cocoanut or nuts and shape into balls, rolling either in

the cocoanut or nuts. If your potato is too warm or you add the sugar too fast, your mixture will not stiffen.

Toasted Marshmallow Candy

1 cup brown sugar
 Half cup Karo (white)
 Fourth cup water
 1 box marshmallows
 1 can cocoanut (browned)
 Cook the sugar, Karo and water until it forms a soft ball in cold water. Remove from fire and roll one marshmallow at a time in the syrup then rolling in the browned cocoanut. As the cocoanut is so easily burned, it is best to brown this first. Place in a pie tin and place in the oven, stirring occasionally. If pecan balls are preferred, roll in whole pecans in preference to the cocoanut.

Date Roll

3 cups sugar
 1 cup milk
 1 box dates
 Nuts
 Mix the sugar and milk together and add dates. Cook until it forms a soft ball in cold water, stirring occasionally to prevent scorching. When done remove from fire and beat until creamy; add nuts and continue beating until it begins to grain around edge of pan; pour onto a wet cloth and roll until firm. Slice before it becomes too cold.

Patience

3 cups sugar
 1 cup milk
 1 cup nut meats
 2 tablespoons butter
 Take one cup of the sugar and brown. Put the other two cups into a sauce pan, add the milk and let it come to a boil. When the sugar in the other pan has browned, combine the two mixtures; pouring the milk mixture into the other. Cook until it forms a soft ball in cold water. Remove from fire and add vanilla and butter; let stand until cool; beat until creamy, add nuts and pour onto a buttered platter.

When cold cut in squares and serve.

Fondant

2 cups sugar
 One-fourth teaspoon cream of tartar
 1 cup of water
 Mix the cream of tartar with the sugar, add water and stir until sugar has dissolved. Cook until mixture will thread from spoon. Remove from fire and pour on to a wet platter. Let stand until a skin forms on top; beat until stiff, then work with the finger tips until creamy. Place in a covered jar and let stand twenty-four hours in a cool place.

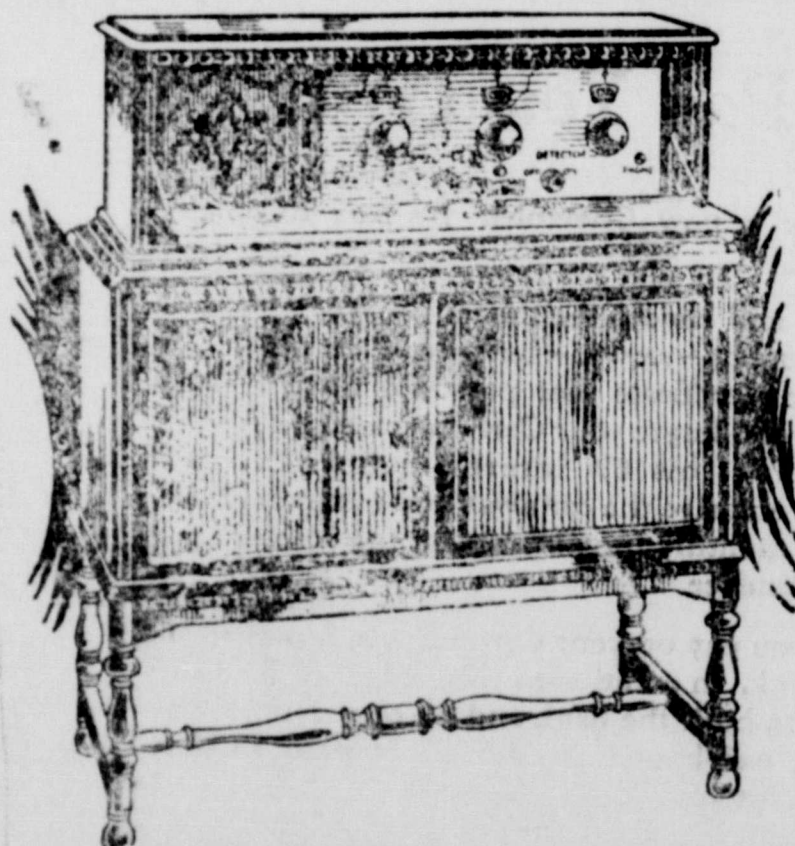

JUJUBE TREES GROW IN TEXAS

(By Associated Press)

COLLEGE STATION, Texas, Dec. 16.—Jujube trees may be grown anywhere in Texas, W. B. Lanham, chief of the division of horticulture, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station here, said. The jujube tree is apparently little affected by drouth, will grow in fence corners, and provides a hardy succulent addition to the Texas fruit family.

The jujube is of Chinese origin and is more of a bush than a tree. Its fruit ranges in size from a cherry to a plum, and makes a delicious confection. It is said to taste much like the fruit of the date palm.

Mr. Lanham said the jujube has been grown extensively enough in Texas to indicate it is a dependable producer in practically every section of the state. The tree responds to cultivation, which tends to increase the size and better the quality of the product.

"When green, the fruit is greenish in color, not unlike a green plum," Mr. Lanham said.

"As it ripens, the color changes from green to white, and next brown or purple spots appear, the fruit, when fully ripe having a skin of chocolate color."

"The tree, while deciduous, is ornamental during the spring, summer, and into the late fall. It resembles some evergreens in foliage. The tree is erect in form. It does not grow to a large size, and is desirable in landscaping. Its beautiful glossy, green foliage and numerous fruits give an attractive appearance."

"The jujube blooms late, escapes damage from spring frosts and seems adapted to a wide range of moisture and temperature and to almost every type of soil. It begins to bear in the first or second year and no

crop failures have been noted in Texas.

"A few trees have been producing fruit in Texas for more than 40 years, though they are not of the improved types introduced about 18 years ago."

"Jujubes should be planted in the winter or early spring just as any other deciduous tree. For the first few years, the jujube should be given the same care given any other young fruit tree. Because of the certainty of the crop and its hardiness and wide adaptability, the jujube offers opportunity for every one of the 465,000 farm houses in Texas to have some fruit about the place."

"The fruit is eaten fresh, pickled and preserved. Candied, the jujubes are known as the Chinese date, for they look and taste much like candied dates. The fruit is not highly flavored and when eaten raw is delicious."

"It is probable that the jujube when better known will become more and more popular as a fruit and food. It compares favorably with the fig and date in food value. Dried jujubes carry more protein than dried figs or dried dates, more sugar than dried figs and about the same amount as dried dates."

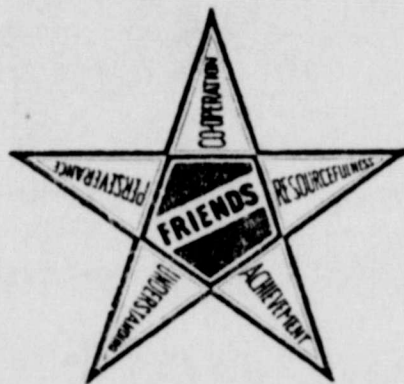
