

Germans Say Merchantmen Sunk In Raids

Convoying Vessel Claimed Hit By Nazis' Luftwaffe

BERLIN, Nov. 27 (AP)—German aerial raiders sank a 7,000-ton convoying vessel and damaged three merchant ships in far-ranging attacks around the British Isles yesterday, the high command reported today.

Its communiqué acknowledged that "numerous civilians were killed and wounded" and some dwellings damaged by "occasional bombs" dropped on German territory by British planes.

Returning again to the west England area where it claimed to have laid waste to the vital port of Bristol, the Luftwaffe "caused numerous fires" in a night bombing of Avonmouth, the high command said.

Sinking of the convoy vessel was reported in attacks off Falmouth, one of the farthest west of English ports.

Asserting the convoy raids were "numerous" and "successful," DNB (German news agency) described the sunken vessel as an auxiliary cruiser guarding a convoy at the western entrance to the English channel. It was first set afire, then sunk, said DNB.

The high command added that two medium-size merchant ships were damaged by bombs in the Thames estuary, and a small freight vessel was set afire off Avonmouth by airplane cannon—a rare type of attack.

Long-range naval batteries on the continental coast joined in the assaults on British shipping the high command said, firing upon a group of ships in the harbor of Dover, eastern channel port. British harbors also were mined, it was said.

The high command acknowledged that "very poor weather conditions" restricted aerial operations the night of Nov. 25-26 and during the day Nov. 26 to reconnaissance and single raiding flights. Informing quarters reported later activity, however.

Danube River Mouth Sought

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Nov. 27 (AP)—Intensified diplomatic maneuvering for control of the mouth of the Danube river was foreseen by observers today as the next likely development in the behind-the-scenes struggle of Germany and Soviet Russia over division of their spheres of influence.

Bulgaria, which with Russian backing has avoided, for the time being at least, a formal embracing of the Rome-Berlin-Tokyo alliance, took further heart today from a British pledge that the Danube river would be respected, if the country remained neutral in the European war.

War Minister Gen. Theodosy Daskaloff commented that Bulgaria seldom has been "in such a favorable position and with so many friends as now," and said the nightly precautionary blackouts would be terminated, beginning tonight.

Observers said Berlin apparently was avoiding for the present any pressing of the delicate questions of Bulgaria's position in the new Europe.

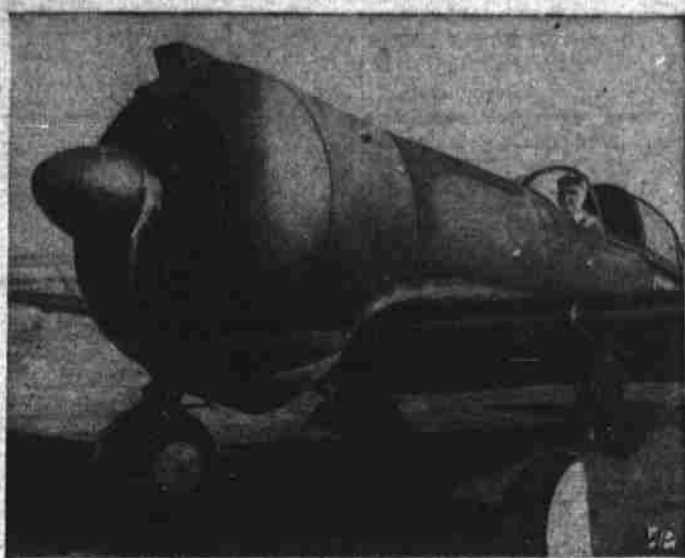
Denton Case Is Continued

Italian Navy Flees Before Britishers

LONDON, Nov. 27 (AP)—Britain's Mediterranean fleet reported that it had engaged a strong Italian sea force at "extreme range" today and that it pursued as the Italians "retired at high speed" toward their base.

The admiralty, which has asserted previously that the Italian navy had refused to come to grips with the British, said no information was available immediately on the outcome of the brief brush between the fleets.

A communiqué reported that the British encountered two Italian battleships accompanied by a "large force" of cruisers and destroyers shortly before noon.

(Britain has claimed, and Italy has denied, that torpedo planes incapacitated half of Italy's battleships in a Nov. 11 raid on Taranto, leaving the Italians only three active capital ships.)

The communiqué said: "Information has been received that our naval forces in the Mediterranean made contact shortly before noon today with an Italian force reported to consist of two battleships accompanied by a large force of cruisers and destroyers."

"Immediately on becoming aware of the approach of our forces, the enemy, diverging course and retired at high speed toward his base. Our forces pursued, and it is known that they engaged the enemy at extreme range."

"No further information is at present available, but full details will be announced as soon as possible."

A meeting was announced for late afternoon between Constantine Oumansky, Soviet ambassador, and Sumner Welles, undersecretary of state. It was the first such conference since U. S.-Russian conversations stopped shortly before Molotov went to Berlin for talks with Adolf Hitler and other German leaders.

This was interpreted in informed quarters as a sign that Molotov's Berlin visit had not impaired the negotiations which have been in progress here for several months looking to a general improvement of Russo-American relations.

The Welles-Oumansky talks dealt mainly with trade and related problems with a view to adjusting these before going on to broader questions.

Rep. Walter (D-Pa.) requested that the senate amendments be submitted to the house for approval when it reconvenes tomorrow. If he carries his point and the amendments are accepted, the measure will go to the White House, where a veto already has been forecast.

Senator Democratic Leader Barkley, who predicted that President Roosevelt would veto the controversial measure, said he believed the senate would sustain the president in that event.

U. S. May Give Planes For British Motors

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—An official prediction of "a very large shortage" of engines for American warplanes by next spring suggested the possibility today that another trade of United States bombers for British-ordered engines might be in the offing.

Such a deal was regarded as being in line with the existing policy of dovetailing the filling of American and British military orders here as far as possible.

A few hours before the war department announced the impending motor shortage yesterday, Lord Lothian, British ambassador, made his second call at the state department in two days to discuss all the war needs of his country in the light of his recent visit to London.

Lord Lothian has summed up Britain's most urgent requirements as ships, munitions, planes and finances, but he said he made no specific request for aid.

Heavy Snows Blanket Big Eastern Area

New England Gets Storm Warnings As Winter Comes

The heaviest snowfall of the season blanketed eastern states today while colder weather overspread the mid-west and flood waters inundated sections of Texas and Louisiana.

The snowstorm in the east began last night in some sections and by midnight the fall ranged up to six inches in Pennsylvania.

Ice and snow covered highways slowed motor traffic in the east and central states. Air transportation was halted by swirling snow at New York, Boston and other eastern terminals.

Storm warnings were posted along the New England coast and on the Great Lakes. The Chicago weather bureau warned shippers to prepare for 15 to 25 degree temperatures in the north and west and 25 to 32 in the south and east.

Snow plows went into action for the first time this fall in New Jersey and Missouri.

Rain and sleet preceded the worst snowstorm of the season in Pennsylvania. A heavy snowfall covered New York City after alternate periods of snow and sleet.

The weight of ice and snow leveled some utility lines in northern Indiana. A third of the highway system in Ohio was glazed with ice. Snow plows cleared Wisconsin highways of a four to six inch snow fall while in Michigan the snow measured up to five inches.

Kansas, New Mexico, Washington, Iowa, Nebraska, Minnesota, Illinois and North Dakota were among other states whitened by snow.

District's Oil Pools Exempt From Order

AUSTIN, Nov. 27 (AP)—Texas oil fields, except those in the Panhandle district and others scattered districts, will be required to close down nine days each in December and January under terms of a 60-day state-wide proration order issued by the railroad commission.

Included among those districts in which non-production days will not be observed were district 8, including Hendricks, Howard-Glasscock and Iatan-East Howard pools.

The new production schedule, effective Dec. 1, will permit average daily production of 1,318,089 barrels, 1,432 less than estimated average allowable on Nov. 23.

The Dec. 1 allowable will be 89,657 barrels greater than the U. S. bureau estimate of December market demand for Texas oil. The average underproduction reflected by commission records will result in actual daily flow of about 157 barrels over the estimate, engineers said.

Dads Discuss City's Paving

An outline of a proposed airport project with an overall expansion totaling \$426,000, was given by the city manager, E. V. Spence, who explained that CAA had proposed the work if the city would furnish land.

West Texas Towns Plan Defense Educational Projects

Both Youths And Adults To Participate

More than a score of West Texas towns now have under consideration plans whereby they may participate in a program of training for industries essential to national defense.

While no programs actually have been set up as yet, several cities have taken definite steps to include the work as an education activity and many others are seriously considering the idea, said Pascal Buckner, district supervisor of vocational education.

Under federal provisions, training is to be made available in aviation, machine tools, electricity, communications, heavy forging, foundry, sheet metal, ship building, armament, etc. At Monahans, Odessa, Amarillo, Lubbock, San Angelo, Big Spring and Abilene there have been discussions concerning the adult and youth training programs, and school authorities in a few of the places are actively working toward instituting the programs.

Adult training is to be available in two phases, supplementary courses for those actively employed in national defense industries, in refresher courses for those who have had a background of training but are now unemployed.

The youth training is for men from 17 to 24 years, inclusive, who will receive a minimum of 80 hours training each week. Theirs will be essentially job training and not necessarily occupational.

Third part of the program is to be for the NYA, which will offer instruction related to work the youths are doing in addition training in citizenship, health, hygiene, etc.

Local school systems cooperate

In the program by making available housing facilities, and furnishing a limited part of the equipment necessary for complete operation. Federal funds are used for teacher salary, supervision, instructional supplies, utilities, janitorial service, etc., and in supplementing local efforts in equipment.

Over the area the program could easily go into the tens of thousands of dollars, based on allotments made for state-wide program.

Eighteen cities have under consideration NYA training programs, said Buckner. They are San Angelo, Big Spring, Lamesa, Wink, Lubbock, Plainview, Brownfield, Levelland, Canyon, Childress, Vernon, Amarillo, Wellington, Snyder, Abilene, Haskell and Sweetwater.

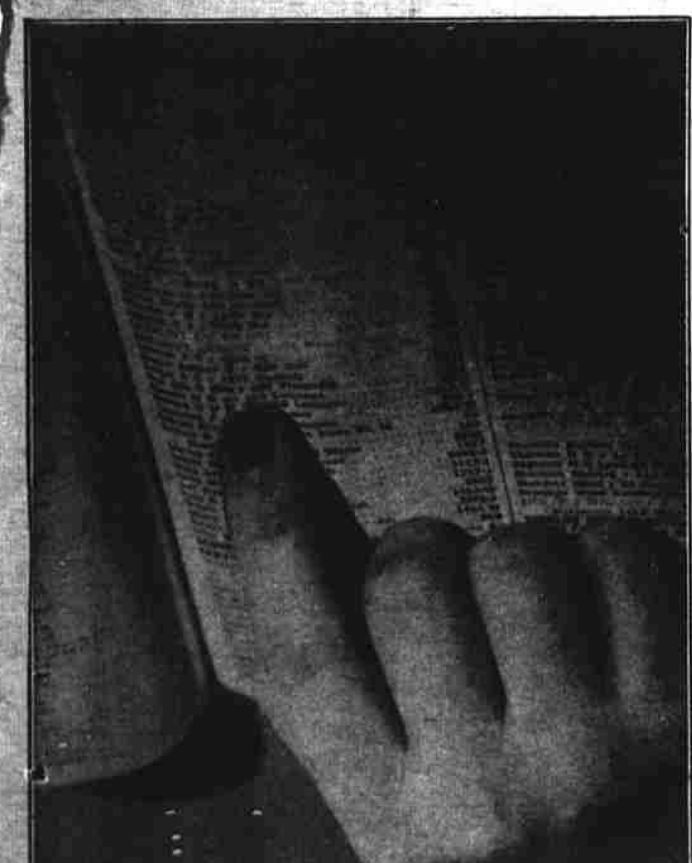

Wichita Fire Injures Two, One Fatally

WICHITA FALLS, Nov. 27 (AP)—

A second death was expected here today in a blast and fire which trapped eight persons Tuesday afternoon in a two-room shop and residence. The tragedy followed the explosion of a homemade gasoline welding device.

George Sheppard, 35, co-owner of a fire and battery business conducted in the shop, was critically injured and little hope was held for his recovery.

Mr. and Mrs. Barker and family lived in the residence portion of the structure.

Cold Weather Doldrums Hit Oil Industry

TULSA, Okla., Nov. 27 (AP)—The oil industry plodded through cold weather doldrums today.

The seasonal call for fuel and burning oils continued good, with the market strong in some areas.

Work in Mid-Continent fields was curtailed by low temperatures and high water. Crude production for the week, however, was up 189,350 barrels daily, the American Petroleum Institute reported.

Texas and Oklahoma regulatory bodies each issued 60-day allowables for December and January. Texas set its order at 1,138,089 barrels daily, a reduction of 1,482 barrels under the net daily allowable reported Nov. 23. Oklahoma's allowable remained unchanged at 390,000 barrels daily.

The Kaw Pipe Line Co. announced it would lay a 23-mile extension of its line from the Gorman pool to the Bemis pool, northwestern Kansas. The company is owned by the Texas company, the Phillips Petroleum Co. and Cities Service Oil Co.

In the field, the Oil and Gas Journal reported 506 completions for the week, compared with 581 a week ago, and 589 a year ago.

The Tubbs area of Crane county, West Texas, was extended a half mile eastward.

RAF Assaults Both Ends Of Enemy's Axis

LONDON, Nov. 27 (AP)—British night raiders struck at both ends of the Rome-Berlin axis while the air attack on Britain lagged for the second successive night. It was disclosed authoritatively today.

Although Nazi bombers laid off completely after midnight, they were back early this morning and put London under a one-hour daylight alarm at about 7 a. m. The raiders came up the Thames estuary and bombed two places on the capital's outskirts.

Targets in northern Italy, in Berlin and other parts of Germany were said to have been the British airmen's objectives.

Authorities now permit the identification of three cities which have borne the brunt of recent Nazi raids on provincial England as Birmingham, great industrial center of the Midlands; Bristol, west coast port and gateway for supplies from the United States, and Southampton, on the English channel.

Germany plans to resume the famous "Silence Week" at Salzburg in 1941.

Abilene Seeks Funds To Assure Location Of Army Camp There

ABILENE, Nov. 27.—More than 100 Abilene civic leaders were busily canvassing the city's population today in effort to raise \$125,000 needed by this weekend to bring a 20,000-man army camp to Abilene.

The war department Monday approved location of the camp eight miles southwest of Abilene, provided the city would provide a camp site and maneuver grounds, on lease.

Abilene must transfer to the government leases on 67,000 acres of land. Of this, 2,229 would be used for the base camp, 5,000 acres for a small maneuver area, and 60,000 acres for a larger maneuver

area in the cedar-covered hills lying south of Abilene.

W. P. Wright, president of the chamber of commerce, said he was informed the initial outlay for construction of the camp would be \$1,800,000. It was estimated that during construction, payrolls would run as high as \$1,000,000 monthly.

It was also announced this week that the city commission had granted the war department use of a 30 acre plot within the municipal airport for use of an air observation squadron to be connected with the camp.

Work in securing the camp was started September 1 by the chamber of commerce.

Two bi-district games for next week already have been arranged, Sunset meeting Masonic Home Dec. 7 at Dallas and Temple clashing with Stephenville at Temple Dec. 6.

Five titles go on the line tomorrow, with the others hanging in the balance with Friday's games.

Amarillo, hailed as the team to defeat for the state title, meets oft-beaten Pampa at Amarillo. The Sandies can lose and still tie for the district 11 championship.

Mighty Paris, conqueror of the fine Sherman team, has only low-ranked Denison in its path to the district 5 pennant.

Tyler can sack up at least a tie for the district 11 crown by defeating impotent Marshall tomorrow and Longview can do the same by beating Gladewater the next day.

All three of the district 12 leaders—Jacksonville, Lufkin and Mexia—play tomorrow, each favored to come through and leave the race in a triple tie. Jacksonville plays Palestine, Lufkin meets Henderson and Mexia tackles Nacogdoches.

Port Arthur's battering forces march against Beaumont in the showdown of district 14. Port Arthur needs only a tie to win the title.

Prairie Lea Claims Title Of Texas' Champ Six-Man Squad

PRAIRIE LEA, Nov. 27 (AP)—There is no way officially to determine the state champion in schoolboy six-man football, but where is there a better record than boasted by Prairie Lea?

The Indians have won 24 straight games, starting in mid-season of 1938, scoring 888 points to 171 for their opponents.

Robin Galaway, who has been the coach for two seasons, says:

"We have never pushed a claim for a state title, but believe we are entitled to it if any six-man team could claim such."

Six-man football goes no further than district championships. There are more than 150 teams in 23 districts.

Prairie Lea tied for the district championship in 1938 and won it last season. Tonight the Indians play Lytton Springs at Lockhart for the title. The latter, having lost one game, could gain only a tie for the championship with a victory.

Next season, however, Galaway says he will be glad to schedule the strongest teams in the state for his nonconference dates.

There are 48 boys in school and 17 are out for football. Last season Hans McCartney was chosen on the first string all-American six-man team by a national magazine (American Boy).

But the team doesn't have all the records. Galaway himself has a winning percentage no one can top.

You see, no team coached by Galaway ever has lost a game.

Howard Payne Holds Ancient Jinx On HSU

ABILENE, Nov. 27—A dark hex stands over Hardin-Simmons' campus today, threatening the Cowboy football team's thus far perfect season.

The punchers are drilling this week, to smash in a game Saturday, this jinx, which has hoodooed its teams for 33 years. In one of the Southwest's oldest gridiron rivalries, the Cowboys have never been able to beat the Howard Payne Yellow Jackets three years in a row.

No matter how the dope reads, the Yellow Jackets have a habit of playing over their heads to beat the Cowboys in the old grudge game.

The series dates back to 1907, and covers 29 meetings, with Howard Payne holding a 13 to 12 edge, plus 4 ties.

This year the rampant Ranchers, who have won eight in a row this fall to remain one of the handful of the nation's grid machines undefeated and untied, go "all out" to hurdle the Howard Payne jinx and to keep a season's state clear for a possible post-season bowl bid.

The Cowboys won over Howard Payne in 1938, 7 to 6, and last year, 14 to 0. The chance to make three in a row was the same back in 1937, after Hardin-Simmons wins in 1935 and 1936. The Jackets scored first that day, however, on a long sweeping end run by Jimmy Minor and the Ranchers had to come from behind to earn a 7 to 7 tie.

In 1937, too, the Cowboys had won eight straight before the Howard Payne game, and were out to make it an all victorious year.

This year, making the same bid, there are added complications for those who want to make something of them. Coach Frank Kimbrough's unbeaten Ranchers will be out for their thirteenth win in a row, including four to end the 1939 season.

Mexicans See No Danger Of Revolution

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 27. (AP)—Fears of possible revolution faded in Mexico today following General Juan Andrean Almazan's renunciation of all claims to the presidency.

Almazan's earlier refusal to concede victory to General Manuel Avila Camacho in the July 7 election had kept the nation in constant fear of bloodshed. Anxiety had increased as the inauguration approached.

Avila Camacho will take office Sunday, beginning a six-year term.

Almazan, independent candidate in the July election, handed out a statement renouncing his claims soon after arriving here by plane yesterday following a three-month stay in the United States.

Some of Almazan's followers complained that their candidate had "let them down" and expressed resentment toward the United States for allegedly "forcing" Almazan's reversal by sending Wallace to Avila Camacho's inauguration, thus indicating that nation's recognition of him as the president-elect.

Funds Allotted For Bases In Atlantic

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27. (AP)—Secretary Knox announced today that President Roosevelt had allocated \$50,000,000 for immediate development of a chain of air and naval bases on sites recently acquired from England in exchange for 50 old American destroyers.

At the same time the navy department chief notified an additional class of naval and marine reserves, numbering 31,908 officers and men, that they should arrange their affairs so as to be ready for a call to active duty at any moment.

Knox also announced that additional divisions of organized naval reserves were being called to active duty from New York and New Jersey for service with destroyers operating in the vicinity of the Panama Canal.

These divisions, which the secretary said would be mobilized immediately, are the first and second of North River, N. Y., the sixth and seventh of Brooklyn and the 24th of Jersey City.

Crude Stocks Show Decrease

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27. (AP)—The bureau of mines reported today stocks of domestic and foreign crude petroleum at the close of the week ended Nov. 16 totaled 261,619,000 barrels, a net decrease of 812,600 barrels compared with the previous week. Stocks of domestic oil decreased 550,000 barrels for the week and foreign crude increased 238,000 barrels.

Daily average production for the week was 3,577,000 barrels or a decrease of 8,000 barrels compared with the previous week's level. Runs to stills averaged 3,540,000 barrels daily, compared with 3,510,000 barrels for the preceding week. Daily average imports were 107,000 barrels, a decrease of 3,000 barrels during the week.
