Man is Mobbed For Slaying Wife

LAKE CITY, Fla., May 17.—Taken from the jail where he was held in connection with an altercation in which his wife was slain, N. C. Romey, a grocer, was shot to death by a mob here today. Mrs. Romey is alleged to have fired on an officer seeking to make her husband remove some produce from the walk. The officer returned the fire, inflicting the fatal wounds.

NEW INSTRUMENT AID IN DISEASES OF EYES

PITTSBURGH, May 17.—Instruments enabling the optometrist to detect the existence of latent disease in the eyes were demonstrated here by Dr. A. M. Skeffington, at a graduate clinic of the Pittsburgh Optometric Association.

The instruments are known as stereocampimeter and the perimeter.

By means of perimetric readings of the patient's ability to place colors and by the nerve force flowing into the eye of the patient's state of health can be read, according to Dr. Skeffington.

CALIFORNIA TO RESTORE GEN. SUTTER'S OLD FORT

MARYSVILLE, Calif., May 17.—California is to have another memento of its romantic days of early history.

The original General John A. Sutter fort, erected in the 40's at Hock Farm, on the Feather River seven miles south of Yuba City, is to be restored under the direction of Native Sons and Daughters.

John Bidwell, founder of the city of Chico, and Marshall, discoverer of gold at Coloma, at one time were employed by Sutter at Hock Farm. A portion of the old fort has already been restored, and when completed will be converted into a museum containing many historical reminders of early California history.

Yeager Constructing Bridge Across Elm

During the past year D. W. (Uncle Dan) Yeager, commissioner of precinct number 2, has made considerable headway in bringing up the standard of roads in his precinct. He has widened and graded several miles of road and has cut out some short and inconvenient turns, in some places he has shortened the distance.

Uncle Dan is now doing one of his big pieces of work out toward Eagle Branch community. His second bridge is completely planned, blue print received, and he expects to have the bridge completed within three weeks. It is a steel bridge with a 90-foot span and is to be placed on Elm Creek west of the old Tally oil test. The piles extend 200 feet and will be five and six feet in height at abutments. The road out that way is to be widened and improved.

They invariably dropped in to browse among the books after an evening spent at the cafe.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—A world-wide search for Ensign Beverly E. Wilson, who disappeared from the Newport Naval Station about 13 months ago ended today with the young officer under detention at the Norfolk Station. Young Wilson was found serving an enlistment in the army in Panama. Prior to his disappearance he had suffered a severe head injury in an automobile accident. He says he remembers nothing of leaving the Newport station or how he became a private in the army. His father, B. F. Wilson, of Kingsville, Tex., has arrived in Norfolk to look after his son.

PARIS HAS MORE BABIES THAN REST OF FRANCE

(By International News Service)
PARIS, May 17.—Paris has more babies than any other part of France, according to vital statistics recently published, as well as a lower mortality. Between the years of 1919 and 1928, the number of births in the Ville Lumiere advanced from 38,624 to 43,210 and the number of deaths fell from 44,936 to 39,525. Infant mortality still remains high for children under two years of age in spite of great improvement made in hygiene and medical assistance offered to poor mothers.

On the other hand, Paris compares less favorably with the rest of France when it comes to marriage and divorce figures. During the same period marriages dropped from 46,031 to 32,000 and divorces increased from 2,568 to 3,396.

ARMY RADIO SYSTEM NOW GIVES NATIONAL NETWORK

SAN FRANCISCO, May 17.—In times of emergency, such as floods, fires, storms or war, amateur radio operators from Maine to California will have their sets ready to augment or replace land lines.

This was assured today by announcement of General John L. Hines, commanding the Ninth Corps Area, that development of the army amateur radio system has already provided a national network of communications should disaster break any link in the wire circuits of the country.

Between two and three thousand amateur radio operators on the Pacific Coast are linked in this vast network.

Hospital Patients Continue to Die

CLEVELAND, Ohio, May 17.—A check of hospitals here revealed 35 patients exposed to lethal gas in the Cleveland clinic disaster. Of these physicians held hope of recovery for not more than half. Many of the victims have died since breathing the gas who were before thought to be uninjured. The effects are terrible, eating away tissue, breaking down the red corpuscles. Oxygen and blood transfusions as last resorts to save many of the patients have failed in most of the cases. The clinic was turned into a research laboratory today with the arrival from Chicago of a delegation to make investigations with the purpose in view of preventing such disasters in the future.

CLEVELAND, O., May 17.—Negligence on the part of someone in leaving the fire door to the basement room where the inflammable X-ray film stood open, is being investigated today in a probe into the Cleveland clinic tragedy. The death toll stood at 124 this morning. Flags of the city are at half mast as families of victims planned for a simultaneous funeral. Thus far no criminal negligence has been uncovered by the investigations being carried on.

Graf Zeppelin Lands Safely

PARIS, May 17.—The French Air Ministry announced tonight that the Graf Zeppelin had landed at Toulon at 8:45 p. m., landing without accident.

VALENCE, France, May 17.—The Graf Zeppelin is returning towards Montelimar late this afternoon, where there is a more favorable air landing. Montelimar is a few miles south of here. Reports received state that troops have been ordered to stand by and assist in landing the dirigible.

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, May 17.—Anxiety developed here today over the ability of the Graf Zeppelin to make Friedrichshafen without a stop. The ship is badly crippled, and it is believed that only two motors are working. She was held up by winds on her return, and may not reach here before Saturday. An emergency landing in France is considered possible. The Graf had completed a thousand miles of the voyage when her motors stopped.

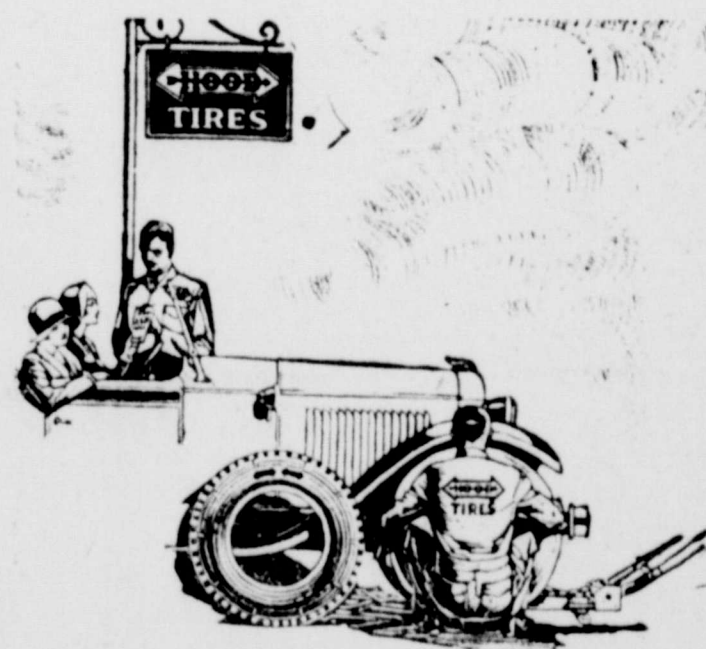

Committee and Commission Meet

The City Commission and the Citizens Committee met at the city hall Thursday afternoon in a called meeting which was ordered by the commission for the purpose of getting both groups familiar with the proposed work to be considered in the building of a new city hall and the enlargement of the water system.

The Citizens Committee is a group of men who were named several months ago to assist the commission in an advisory capacity, with the proposed projects, and they will work jointly with the commission until the work is accomplished.

The committee is composed of Paul Trimmer, H. W. Lynn, Will Doose, C. R. Stone and F. M. Pearce. O. L. Parish and C. P. Shepherd were originally on this committee until Mr. Parish was elected a commissioner and Mr. Shepherd appointed city attorney. Two other men were named to fill their places on the committee.

No definite steps were taken at the meeting Thursday but Mayor McCarver stated that plans were moving nicely toward getting the work started. There is quite a bit of preliminary work to be done before either project can actually be started. An architect will be employed soon to draw plans and specifications for the city hall and the engineering work on the water project will be checked.

The condition of the bond market is a matter that will likely cause some delay. The market has been in bad shape for some time and there seems to be no immediate change in sight before early fall. The city bonds cannot be sold at a sacrifice and this may cause an unexpected delay.

The city owns lots which were bought several years ago for the site of a city hall. However, this phase of the work has not been considered yet.

Mr. McCarver stated that all the work would be rushed as fast as possible.

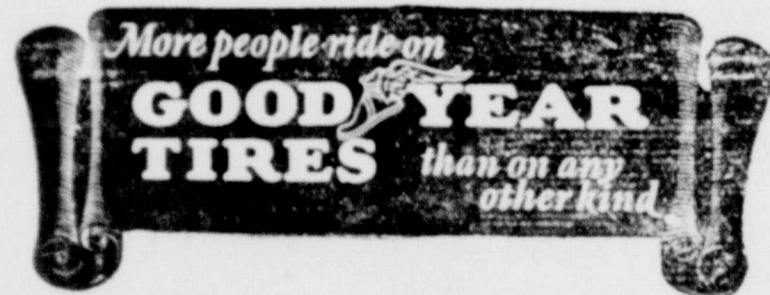

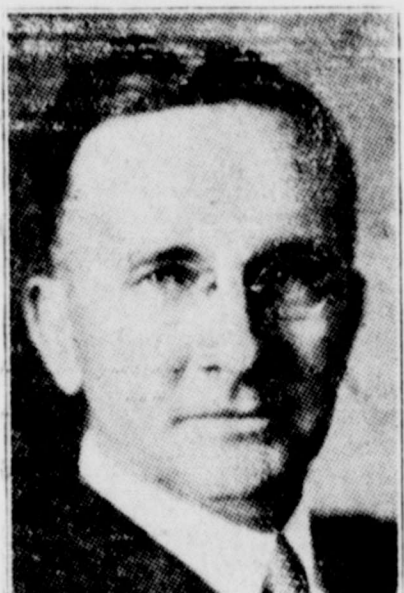

BUILD BABY AIRSHIP IN NEW GERMAN EXPERIMENT

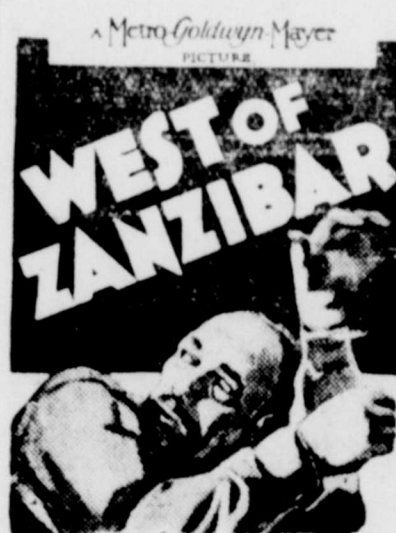

A few days later she returned and wanted to have the charge dismissed. She was married to her persecutor now, she said.

Harris refused to dismiss the case, so her husband must face the consequences.

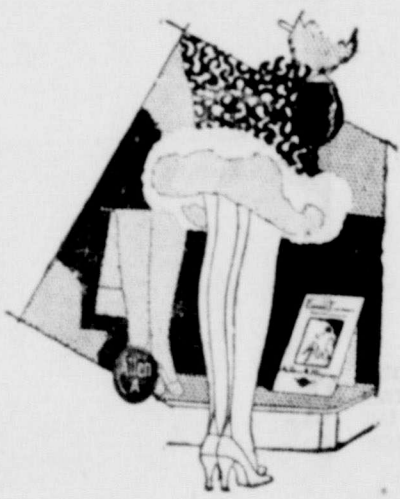
