UNION CALLS POLITICAL STRIKE IN CHINESE WAR

(By Associated Press)
SHANGHAI, March 18.—The General Labor Union today issued a communique, calling for a general strike to begin tomorrow at noon and to continue until the Nationalists occupy Shanghai.

The communique calls on the workers to maintain order and to avoid becoming involved in any mob actions and notifies the public that the strike is of a purely political nature, intended to show sympathy with the Nationalist cause in the fight against the Northerners.

Detachments of Shantungese troops have been ordered along the Shanghai-Nanking railway to prevent the workers from leaving.

SHANGHAI, March 18.—The fall of the city of Nanking is daily expected, and it is regarded as significant that the Shantung forces are not offering serious resistance to the Southern army.

NOT LIKELY TO SEND OBSERVER

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, March 18.—France is not likely to send even an observer to the three-power naval disarmament conference as proposed by President Calvin Coolidge, it was stated today, since Washington's strong disagreement with the League of Nations disarmament commissioners was apparent in the note made public yesterday at Geneva.

NEW ORLEANS, March 18.—Harold Berget, 27, a Junior and an architectural student at Tulane University, shot and killed himself in the home of his parents here today.

CHUNKIANG, China, March 18.—More than 100 persons are believed to have been drowned last night by the wrecking of a motor vessel in the Yangtze River near Luchow.

Most of the victims were soldiers.

The disaster is attributed to the soldiers' demand that the vessel undertake to navigate this dangerous stretch of river at night.

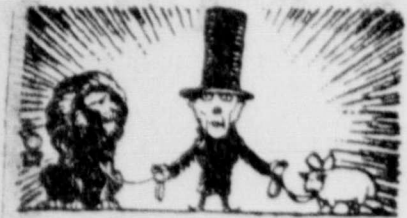

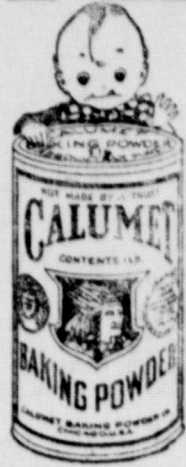
