HUMBLE FINDS OIL AT TIMBER LAKE, GEORGE BARNARD TRACT

Humble Oil and Refining Co. has what looks like a fair well in their Timber Lake George Barnard No. 1, near Sulphur river, three miles northeast of Talco.

Drillers started coring at 4,718 feet on Monday and recovered 30 feet of oil-cut mud and 45 feet of oil, coming from the Paluxy. There was also five feet of oil-bleeding sand and another core was planned Tuesday afternoon or Wednesday.

Location has been made west of this test for a tank battery and for another test well. The company has 2,600 acres of leases in the vicinity.

Stephens & Peveto discovery test, east of Humble's new well was reported having water trou-

ble below their Paluxy production, leading to their Rodessa discovery at 6,470 feet, and will probably plug back.

One of Stephens & Peveto's two offsets to their discovery that were dry in both Paluxy and Rodessa and which it had been announced would go to 10,000 feet, has closed down and the rig is stacked.

With two offsets south and east of the discovery dry, there remains west and north across Sulphur in Red River County for testing.

A failure has been drilled in the Dalby Springs Paluxy pool area southeast of that township. Ace Oil Company No. 1 J. C. Gingery. A. F. Hancock survey, missed pay in going to 4,616 feet.

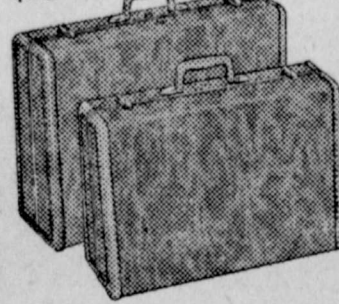
Riddle Files to Drill 2nd Well

Pumping Unit and Oil Storage Tanks At Williams No. 1

A pumping unit and oil storage facilities have been installed at Millsap Oil Co. Williams No. 1, two miles northeast of Fulbright.

On Tuesday 7500 gallons of acid was used in treating the 2271 foot well and better production is expected with the acid treatment and pumping, according to Robert E. Igo who visited the well on Tuesday.

Another test to 3,500 feet is planned by Millsap Oil Co. in the vicinity of the Williams well. It was drilled on a 2,200 acre block assembled by Raymond Dugger and his neighbors, who assigned the leases for the test.

Farmers' Receipt On Crops Rises

Washington.—The Agriculture Department reports that the prices farmers received for their crops and livestock rose three per cent in the month ending May 15. It was the fifth straight monthly rise.

The department said, however, that farmers' production and living costs rose one per cent during the month.

The twin rise left the farmers' return at an average 85 per cent of parity. This compared with 83 per cent in mid-April and 86 per cent in mid-May, 1955.

Tax Rates Texas Cities, High-Low

Austin.—Round Top (Fayette County) had the lowest municipal tax rate in Texas in 1955—15 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation, a University of Texas Institute of Public Affairs survey shows.

Lynn F. Anderson, the Institute's assistant director, conducted the biennial survey for the League of Texas Municipalities. His report is published in the latest issue of the League's monthly journal, Texas Municipalities.

Seven towns have a 25-cent tax rate, Anderson found. They are Avery (Red River County), Beverly Hills (McLennan Co.), Blum (Hill County), Byers (Clay County), Point Comfort (Calhoun County), Rio Vista (Johnson County) and Woodsboro (Re-fugio County).

Nine small cities levied no property tax whatsoever in 1955: Olmos Park and Terrell Hills (both in Bexar County), Richland Hills (Tarrant County), Fairfield (Freestone County), Roma (Starr County), Iraan (Pecos County), Newton (Newton County), Camp Wood (Real County) and Roanoke (Denton County).

At the other end of the scale, eight cities levied the constitutional maximum tax of \$2.50 per \$100 of assessed valuation: Breckenridge, Cisco, Eastland, Edinburg, Lockhart, Mercedes, Ranger and Weslaco.

The average tax rate for all 189 cities included in the survey was \$1.45.

Two Light Rains Bring .41 Inch

An electrical storm, accompanied by a shower, hit this section Friday night. Some localities reported precipitation heavier than the .08 recorded at Deport. It was reported about 1½ inches of rain fell in the Cunningham area and was heavier west of Cunningham.

Sportsmen Desire Slight Change in Deer Season

Red River County sportsmen who sat down with Texas Game and Fish Commission biologists and game wardens last week have asked two major changes in the 1956-57 regulations.

Out of the Red River parleys came the recommendation that the county's deer season be changed to November 28 through December 2. The old dates are November 16-20.

The sportsmen asked the change in order that the five-day season would fall during the Thanksgiving holidays and also during the dark of the moon.

They also recommended that the spring squirrel season be closed in Red River. They hope to give the mama squirrels a better chance to raise their young, and thus improve fall squirrel hunting.

Whether or not the proposed changes will be made is up to the Game and Fish Commission now. The sportsmen have made their recommendations.

Miss Barbartine Black, sister of the bride, was maid of honor, and Doyal Rushing of Mt. Pleasant, served as best man.

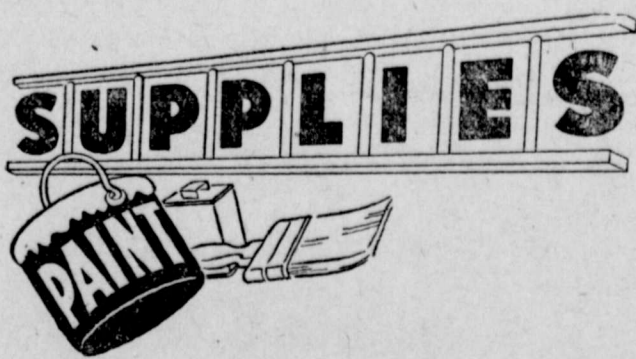
They will make their home in Mesquite where Mrs. Medlin will teach school and Mr. Medlin will attend school in Arlington.

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Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

Austin.—Regardless of who is elected this summer, most Texans probably won't find their daily lives greatly changed. But to one segment of the population, the 22,000 state employees and their families, it matters a lot. It affects their livelihood. As much as a 20 per cent turnover in state employees can be expected after the new officials take over in January.

This estimate comes from Pirtle Watts, executive secretary of the Texas Public Employees Association. About one-third of the membership is concentrated in the Capitol; the rest is scattered over the state.

TPEA members on the whole are quite discreet in their politics, Watts thinks. Their association by-laws expressly prohibit any group endorsement. But individuals, especially certain key personnel, are courted by candidates. Many office-seekers, especially in Travis County, regularly promise "more adequate pay."

And those employees whose jobs hinge on the boss' being reelected naturally pull for him. State law, while not as strict as the federal Hatch Act, puts some restrictions on this. Formerly a rider on the appropriations bill forbade any political activity by state employees. Now the ban is only against use of state cars, or campaigning on state time.

INSURANCE COMPANIES RE-ALIGN — "Merger" will be a much-discussed word in the Texas insurance industry during coming weeks. Wind-up of the State Insurance Commission's stringent solvency survey left 94 companies—or seven per cent—without licenses. New permits were granted to 1,219 firms.

Results confirmed Chairman Byron Saunders' prediction that the industry would prove 90 to 95 per cent sound. He said so last January when the commission began its drive to "weed out the bad apples." Many already have negotiations underway, or completed, to merge with stronger companies. More realignments are expected, especially among life companies where many large firms actively seek reinsurance business.

RADAR TRAPS ATTACKED —Are the Texas Highway Patrol's radar speed nets illegal? Amarillo Attorney Horace E. Wilson says he will fight to the Supreme Court, if necessary, to prove they are. Wilson was arrested recently and fined \$5 plus costs. A radar set near Seguin had clocked him at 71 miles per hour.

He declares Section 803A of the State Penal Code provides for automatic dismissal of a speeding charge if the arresting officer lies in wait or hides.

In Austin Patrol Chief W. J. Elliott said "nothing in state law prohibits hiding the radar unit, but the highway patrol does not make this a practice. We can do more good by putting ourselves out in the open."

CITIES NEED MORE WATER —A majority of Texas cities feel their water supplies are inadequate for the future. State Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas, chairman of the Texas Water Resources Committee, says a recent survey of 255 cities shows 54 per cent with this problem. Purpose of the survey was to search out needs and sentiments for a statewide water program. Recommendations go to the Legislature in January.

Parkhouse said city officials "almost without exception" favor building their own water facilities aided by financing "on the lowest level of government possible." He said he is most hopeful the next Legislature will make such a program possible.

DAVY READY FOR TOURISTS —Texans, who tour their Capitol by the thousands each year, will see a fresh-faced Davy Crockett this summer.

Crockett's huge portrait was re-hung in the Capitol foyer last week after an extensive retouching job. Legislators last session authorized \$12,000 for conservation work on five valuable paintings.

Taxpayers have invested \$95,409 in the fabulous art collection scattered over the Capitol. Resale value is estimated as high as half a million dollars. Tourist favorites are "Dawn at the Alamo" and "The Battle of San Jacinto." They are located in the Senate chamber. Each cost \$12,500.

NO TROUBLE SEEN ON POLL —No objection is expected by the Democratic Executive Committee chairman to putting the interposition question on the July primary ballot.

Chairman George Sandlin discounted talk of a court challenge to the validity of the 150,000 signatures on the referendum petitions. Spot checks are being made against poll tax lists, said Sandlin. Texas Referendum Committee presented the petition. It asks a vote for or against interposition, integration of Negroes in public schools and intermarriage of whites and Negroes.

TEEN-AGERS FOR GOVERNMENTS — Three state governments are operating simultaneously in Austin this week. Besides the one in the Capitol, Boys State and Girls State are being run by more than 800 high school youngsters from over Texas. Designed as citizenship laboratories, the two "states" are sponsored by the Texas Department, American Legion and Auxiliary.

Each group—360 girls and 519 boys—learns self-government by doing it for a week. Mythical political parties are formed, and city, county and state officials are elected and inaugurated. Since terms of office are brief, keenest interest focuses on the always-heated state campaigns and selection of representatives to Boys and Girls Nations in Washington, D. C.

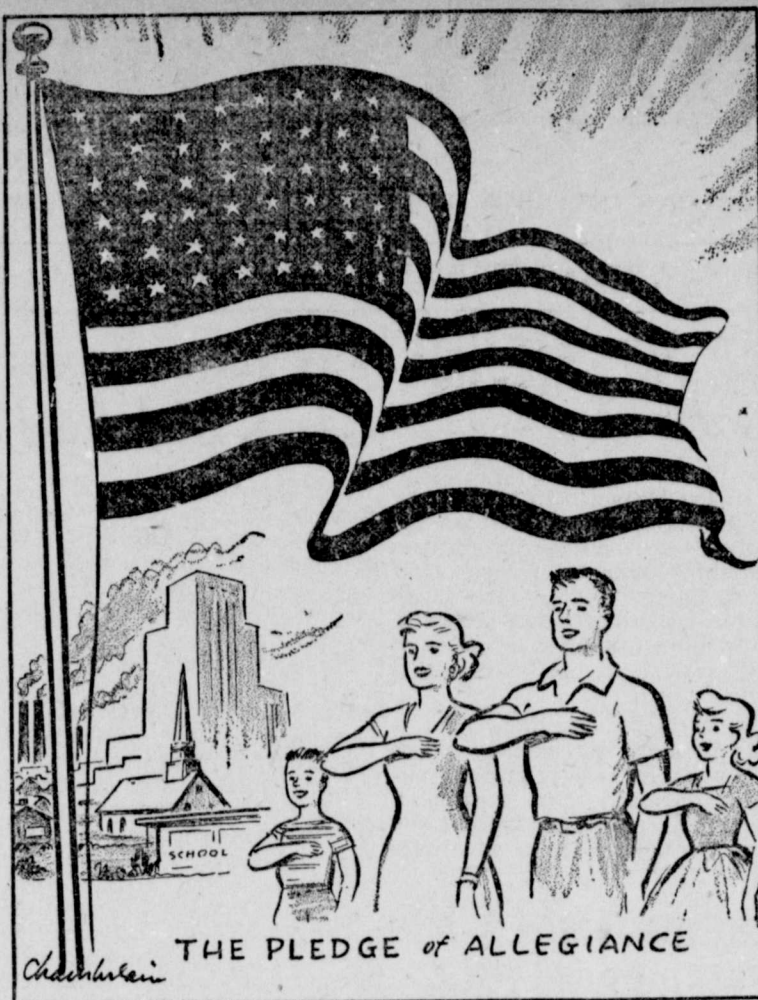
SHORT SNORTS — Dr. John Paul Abbott, dean at Texas A&M College, has been appointed program examiner for the Texas Commission on Higher Education. He will take office July 1. Texas stamp tax for cigarettes, wine and liquor totaled \$4,907,078 in May, nearly one million more than a year ago. Raising of the cigarette tax by the last legislature is cited as the cause for the increase. Claude B. Tate of Huntsville is now with the Board for Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools. He has been director of accounting for the Texas Prison System for the past six years. Newton Gresham of Houston is the new president of the State Bar of Texas. Virgil T. Seaberry of Eastland was elected vice president. Texas farmers mortgaged their property to the tune of \$227 million last year, the Farm Credit Agency reports. This is 31 per cent more than 1954 and 375 per cent above average.

COASTAL FIND TO BE TRACED

Rockport.—A mysterious blue-green bottle containing a longitude and latitude message in Spanish was found in the Gulf off Padre Island by R. J. Kemp, Assistant Director of Coastal Fisheries for the Game and Fish Commission.

Kemp, who was collecting marine specimens for the Commission's Laboratory here, said the location given in the message indicated the battle was launched near a small group of islands off the west coast of Africa on November 9, 1542. The exhibit has been referred to national authorities to determine whether the message is, as suspected, a part of a study about ocean currents.

ON FLAG DAY



Old Glory Is 179!

We observe June 14 as Flag Day because it was on that date in 1777 that the Stars and Stripes, by resolution of the Continental Congress, came into being, with "thirteen stripes of alternate red and white, with a union of thirteen stars of white in a blue field, representing the new constellation" in the Western skies.

Our flag was first carried by American troops in the Battle of the Brandywine the following September, and tradition says the first Old Glory was made by Betsy Ross, of Philadelphia, at General Washington's request.

NECESSARY THINGS TO DO WHEN INVOLVED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Now that millions of people are taking their summer vacations and driving about the country, automobile accidents are occurring with increasing frequency. When involved in an accident, it is hard to keep your wits about you and know just what to do.

It is therefore a good idea to plan in advance just what you would do in event of a smash-up. Here are a few simple rules that every driver should commit to memory:

1. Stop! Failure to stop can result in serious criminal consequences.

2. Render aid If anyone is injured: (1) Render first aid. (2) stop bleeding. (3) Call a doctor or an ambulance or both. (4) Do not move an injured person in any way that could possibly add to his injury.

3. Protect the scene from further damage. You may be liable for damages to approaching drivers, unless they are properly warned. If the highway is obstructed at night, have someone turn his headlight beams on the wrecked vehicle.

4. Call an officer. Policemen, Highway Patrolmen, Sheriffs and their deputies are trained accident investigators whose testimony may be invaluable in establishing your civil claim for damages.

5. Gather information. Write it down. Don't trust your memory. Don't guess — be specific. Measure skid marks. Step off distances. Be sure to obtain names and addresses of witnesses. You are required by law to exhibit your driver's license to the other driver—and he must do the same.

6. Be careful what you say. Even if you feel you probably are to blame, it is best to make no admission. You may learn later that the other driver was equally at fault, or more so. Emotional comments can be misconstrued by others, or may be misquoted. Whatever you say, make it factual.

7. See your doctor if there is lock.

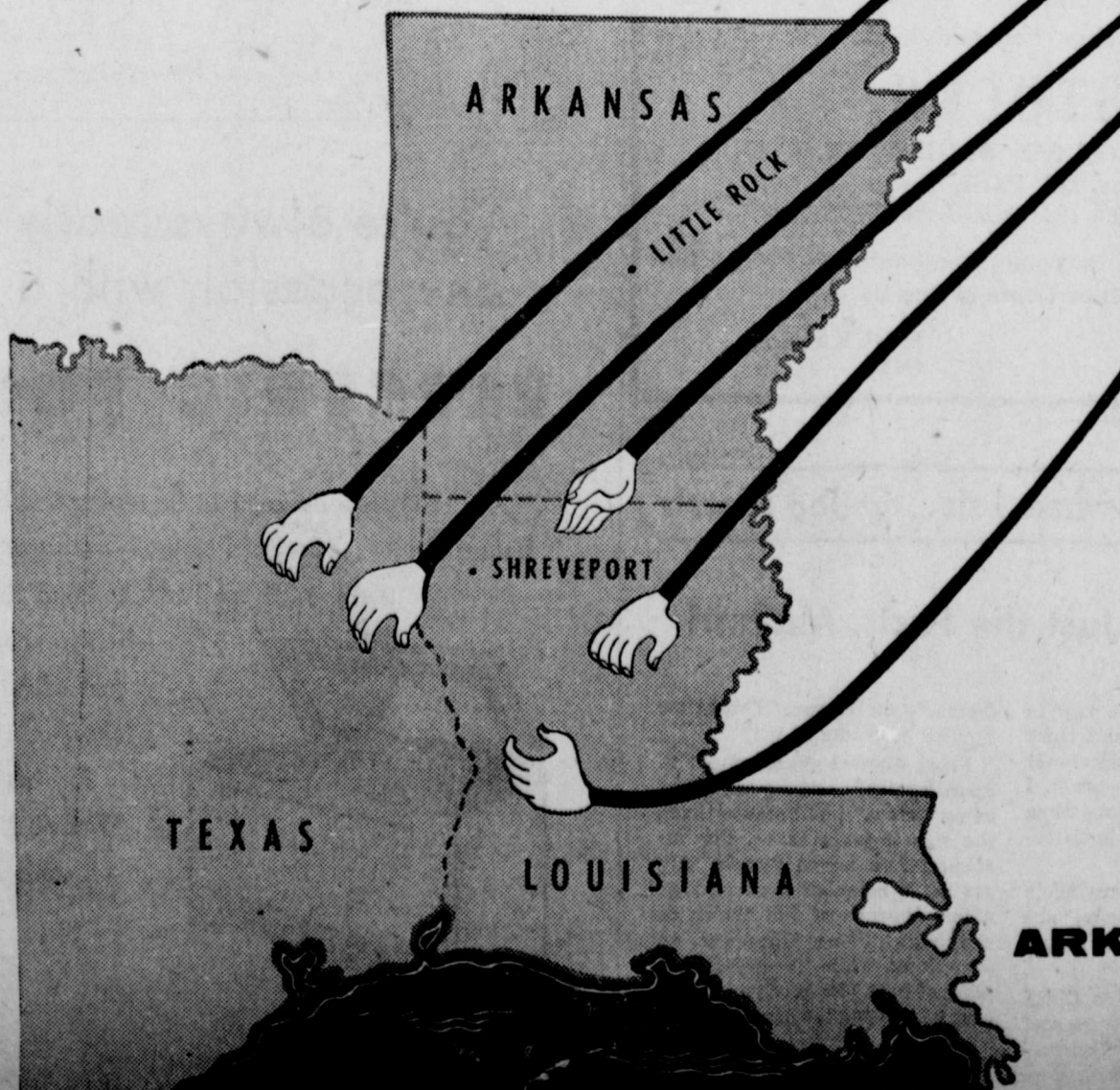

Human Bones Are Freezer Deposit

St. Paul's Hospital in Dallas has established a bone bank, patterned after the idea of an eye bank or blood bank.

Its purpose: to keep in deep freeze healthy bones, taken from patients during surgery, for future use in patients needing bony repair.

Unlike blood, bones are not grouped. Anyone's bone will

suffice to help a patient needing a "borrowed" bone provided:

1. The bone is from a healthy individual, and

2. It has passed a series of rigid tests conducted in St. Paul's laboratory, which establishes that the bone itself is free of any disease.

Formerly, bones which needed to be removed at surgery at St. Paul's were discarded, even though they were healthy.

Now, through the deep-freeze bank, the bones are stored for later use on patients who need bone grafts. This eliminates the necessity of making a second incision to get the needed bone from another part of the body of the patient.

Alcorn is Ready to Join Soil Bank With Pay for Crops Plowed Up

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, will get about as far with his idea this week as he does with a lot of others he's had.

Dear Editor: Since Congress was nice enough to provide us farmers with a soil bank, I have been studying every angle I can find to figure out a way to get in on it. It's not going to look right if we sit back and drag our feet.

Therefore, I've been reading everything I can lay my hands on in this connection, and last night I believe I ran on to the idea I've been looking for.

It was a statement by Sec. Benson, who I guess you'd say is president of this bank and is the man to look to. According to him, he is going to be as generous as he can in getting the bank going and will even let a farmer put some land in it this year that's already been planted provided "the group isn't too far advanced."

Now I haven't got time to take this to the Supreme Court to find out what "too far advanced" means, but if Sec. Benson will place a generous, liberal interpretation on it, he and I can do some business.

For example, I've got some crops not only this year that aren't too far advanced, I've got some from 1955, 1954, 1953, 1952, and 1951 that could be classified in the same category. What I would like to do is put 50 acres of not too far advanced crops in the bank this year and also for the years just mentioned, using the same 50 acres multiplied by payments for six years. After all, this big surplus we've got staring us in the face wasn't created in one year, and a man ought to be entitled to payment not only for not contributing to it this year but for past years too.

A long-range, far-sighted program ought to have the virtue also of looking back as well as forward. Of course, I understand to get land in the bank with a crop that's not too far advanced, you'll have to plow it up, but the payment is not for plowing up, but for dodging a surplus, and what difference does it make to Sec. Benson whether I plow up this 50 acres six times, one for each crop that never got too far advanced since 1951, or just once?

If something can be worked out along this line, let me know. I'm a specialist in producing crops that never get too far advanced. Yours faithfully, A. A.

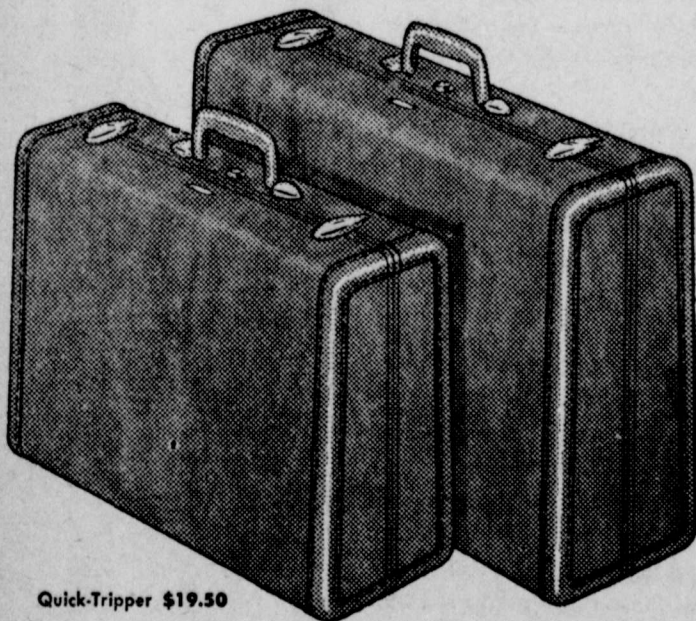

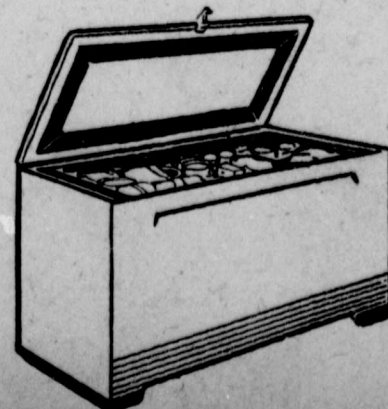

TAX BITE ON FARM PEOPLE IS
NEARLY AS HIGH AS FOOD BILL

The Federal government is spending billions of dollars a year to support farm prices and to help agriculture in other ways. More millions are spent by the states in their own farm programs.

But the farmer doesn't get this government aid without paying heavy taxes.

According to recent estimates of the Department of Agriculture and the Tax Foundation, the average person living on the farm spends about one-quarter of his working time to meet his total tax bill—Federal, state, and local.

According to estimates of the Department of Agriculture, the Federal income tax, various state sales taxes, and property taxes on the farm population amounted in 1954 to \$2.9 billion.

According to estimates of the Foundation, other taxes (including all hidden taxes) on the farm population amounted to \$1.8 billion. These figures include taxes on all people living on farms (22 million in 1954) and not merely farm operators; they also include taxes on income from nonfarm sources. (The total income of the farm population in 1954 was \$20 billion.)

On a per capita basis, the total taxes on the farm population in 1954 amounted to \$216 as compared with \$538 for the population of the U. S. as a whole.

Putting the tax burden on a weekly work-hour basis for the first time, the Foundation finds that in a 48-hour week the average person living on a farm works 12 hours to meet his tax bill—Federal, state, and local, including hidden taxes.

In contrast to the heavy tax bite, the same person living on a farm works 7 hours to pay for clothing and just 3 hours for household furnishings.

Here is how the average farm person's work time is distributed assuming he works a 48-hour week:

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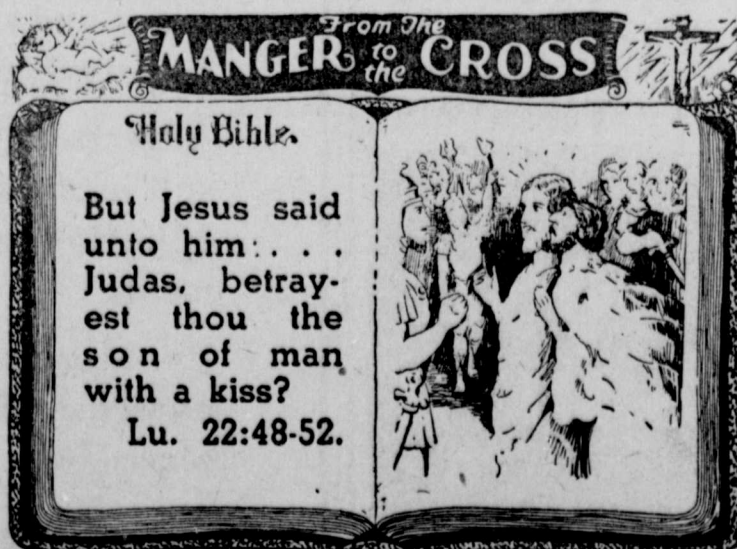

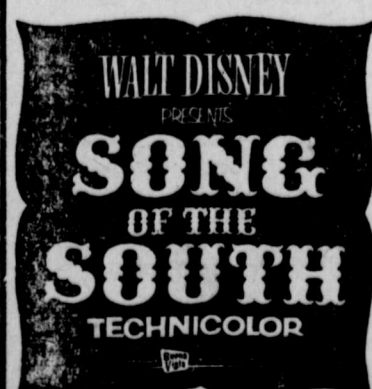

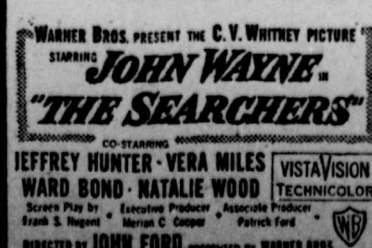
