- The Texico Class of 1964 will ride the Pleasant Hill Fire Truck in the LTD parade.

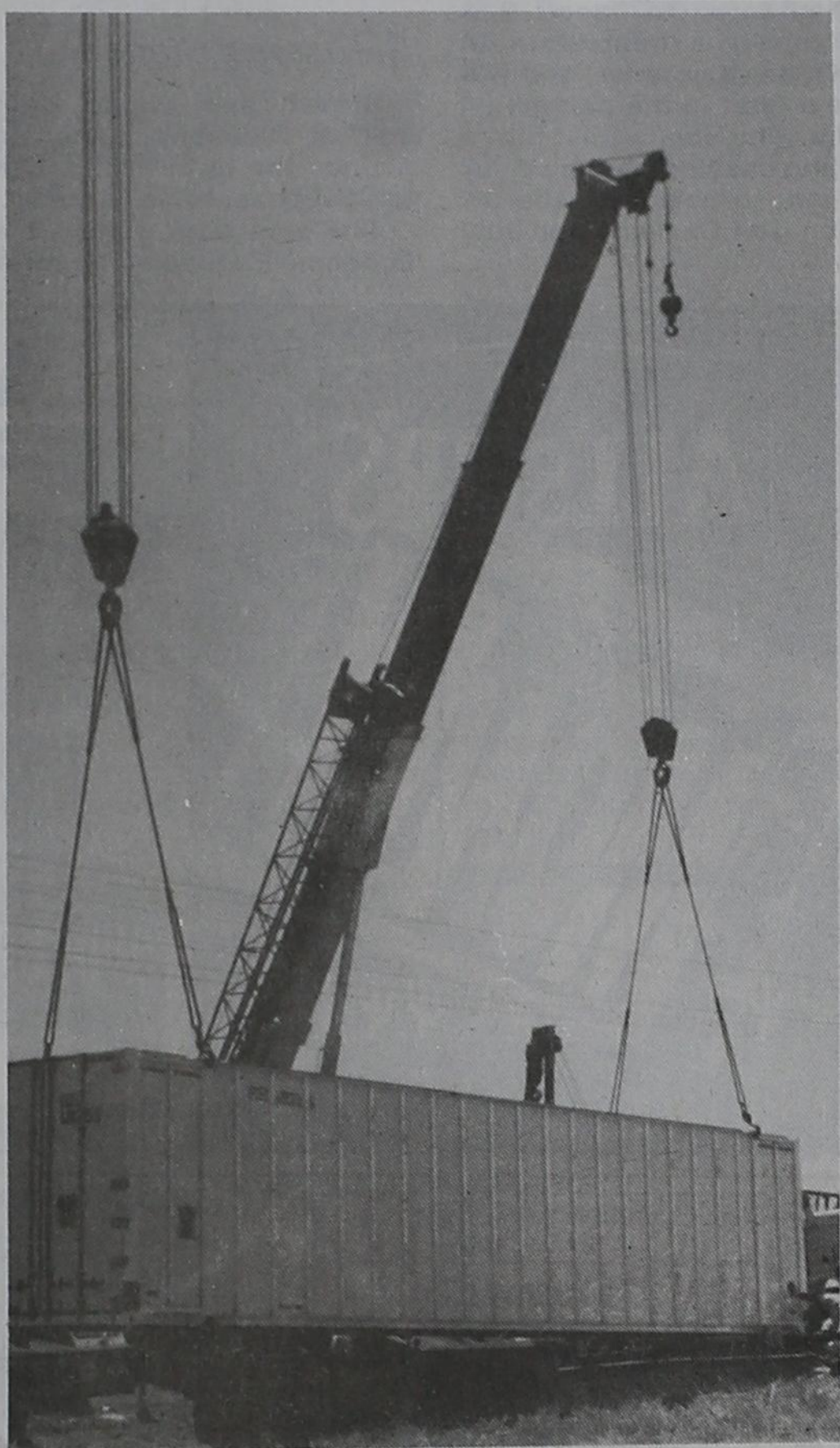
- The Farwell Class of 1979 will have a reunion at the park after the parade.

Clovis woman killed in car-train collision

Area emergency vehicles were called out at 2:30 a.m. Monday when a 1976 Buick driven by Wanda Wall, 30, Clovis, collided with a Santa Fe Railway train about a mile east of Clovis.

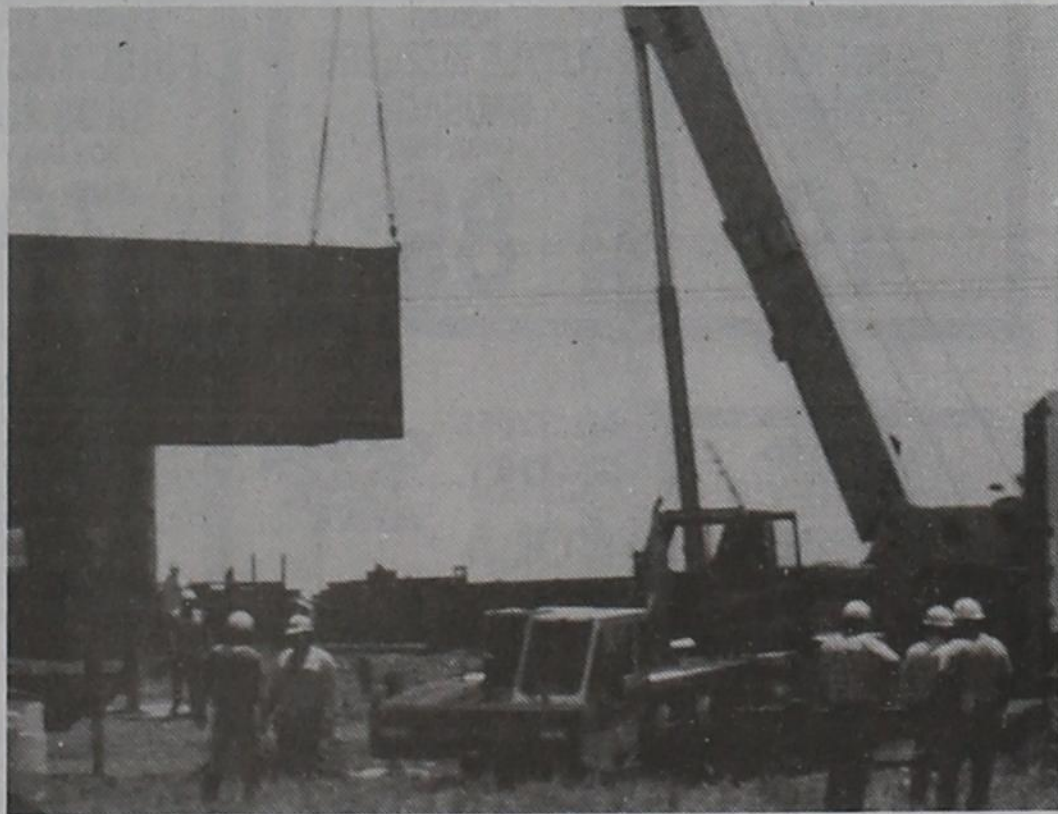
Wall died after apparently driving her car through a traffic arm while northbound at Sugarbeet Road, colliding with the seventh car of the train. The train was traveling about 62 miles per hour.

More than 20 railroad cars were de-railed, and debris was scattered along the side of the track. Santa Fe personnel and others worked quickly to salvage the contents of the train. About \$2 million in damage was estimated.

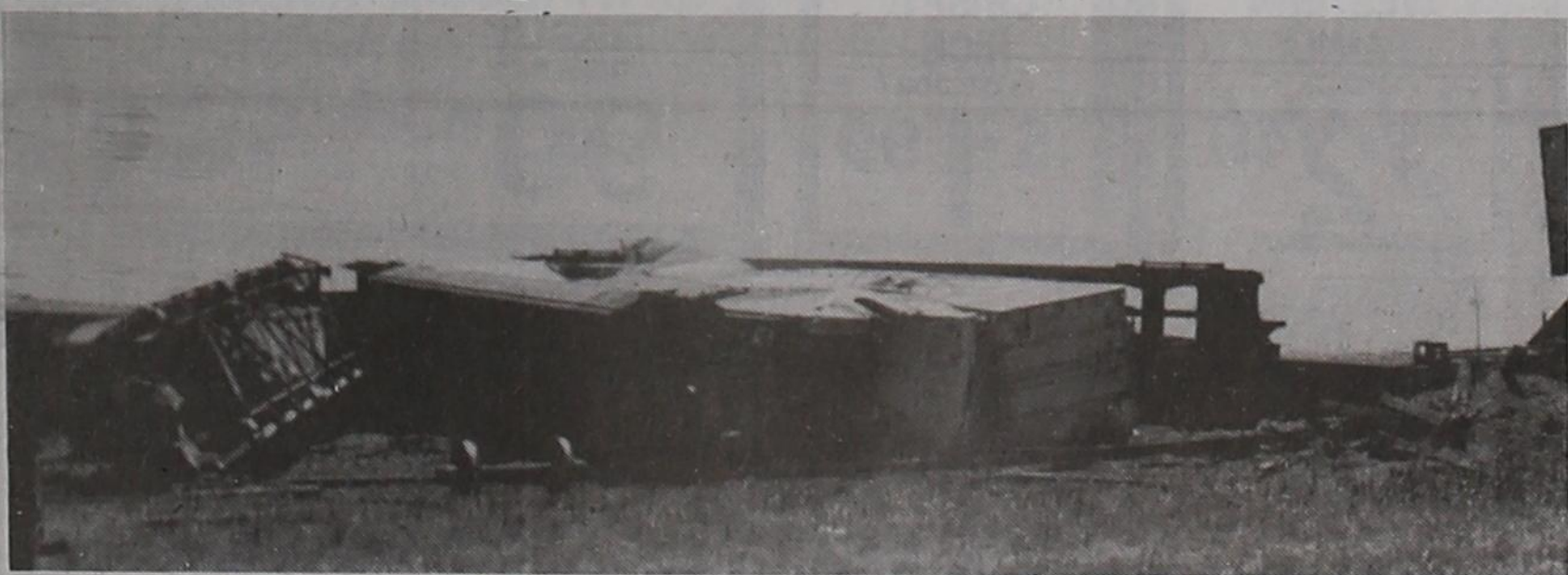
New Mexico State Police Officer Ken Terry responded to the call, and summoned help with the cleanup. Later he was joined by officer R.W. Durham.

Hulcher Resources, an Amarillo contractor, was called to help with the cleanup because they specialize in hazardous waste cleanup. Bulldozers, cranes and flatbed trailer trucks were called in to expedite the work. Some hazardous wastes were involved.

BTD planning in full swing

Welcome to July: And July means... the 28th annual Border Town Days!

Planning is well under way for the popular annual Twin Cities' event, this year set for Saturday, July 30. It's always easy to remember when LTD is - the last Saturday in July.

It's time for Texico and Farwell groups (and let's not forget Pleasant Hill and Lazbuddie) to get active and make their plans for the big day. This year, it looks like another super event, with a complete range of activities planned.

For the past few years, the crowd has been estimated at between 3,500 and 4,000. Not bad when you consider the combined population of Texico-Farwell is about 2,400.

Here's a rundown of LTD as the countdown begins:

Giveaways

This year's major giveaway will be a new pickup truck, sponsored by the Texico Volunteer Fire Department. Tickets cost \$20 and are available at local businesses.

Another giveaway will be a cash drawing for \$50 as part of the commemorative button sales (see below).

Buttons

Commemorative buttons are sold as the key fund-raiser for LTD. They have been placed at local businesses by Rick Sullivan, who is in charge of this activity. A \$2 donation is asked.

At LTD, a drawing will be held and the person whose name is called (they must be present) wins \$50. Each button is

Texico slates July 4th Jamboree

The annual Texico July 4th Jamboree is on tap. As in the past two years, they again plan for a big day at KKR Park. Events Monday include:

Folks attending are reminded to bring chairs and sun shades. The trees and the picnic shelters in the park provide some shade, but not enough for everyone.

Texico: 'Water line isn't our problem'

The Texico City Council discussed the water line west of the Port of Entry Tuesday.

A few homes outside the city are on this line, plus the Texaco Auto Truck Plaza.

The state's Port of Entry is expanding its truck checking area and is apparently putting in a holding pond there. This pond is going over the water line and Texico was told to move the line.

Texico plans to respond that it's not the city's problem and it's up to the project engineer to handle it.

In other business, the council:

- Told city employees to buy fans for City Hall.

- Heard that lightning destroyed the Fax machine and telephone lines at City Hall, but insurance covers it.

- Heard that Mayor Butch Tharp and city employee Matt Meeks plan to go to Santa Fe to buy surplus equipment, such as a rodding machine and tractor.

- Noted that the street problems continue. Some are "a sea of oil" it was said. State officials are coming to view the problem.

- Agreed to put a stop sign on South Garwood at Avenue F to southbound traffic. Jim Burrows had asked for more

The Chief's Corner

Editor's note: This column is not written in Roy's normal informative style. He says that he meant the tone to be tongue-in-cheek.

Today's topic will be on effective ways to cost your city millions of dollars in lawsuits. Most cities that have lost lawsuits have found that the best method for losing millions is to simply ignore the law and then wait for something to happen.

Now this is not as easy as it sounds, it is a tough job because of the ten percent factor. Simply put, the ten percent factor means that there is less than ten percent of any community who whine, cry or otherwise complain about obeying the law. In order to lay your city open to a lawsuit, there are several steps that must be taken.

He will also be able to put things in perspective, such as informing the elderly that they should learn to appreciate rap music; then it won't bother them to have their windows rattled by monster speakers.

4. The fourth step is to make it clear to all that those cities that lost millions in lawsuits were not Farwell, Texas. It can't happen to us because we are different. After all, any lawyer with half a brain will realize that we didn't enforce a law because we in Farwell simply didn't need that law. Now I must apologize to the ten percenters. The City of Farwell was recently named in a law suit concerning a railroad crossing fatality. The only control the city has over crossings is traffic law enforcement, possibly because of all the tickets I have written for failure to stop for a railroad crossing, the plaintiff will not be able to prove a policy of negligence. Possibly, by just doing what I am supposed to do, at the council's direction, I have prevented the city from losing a lawsuit.

Maybe I will try to change and become a good old boy....But, don't hold your breath.

Noblett has a degree in ag economics from Texas Tech.

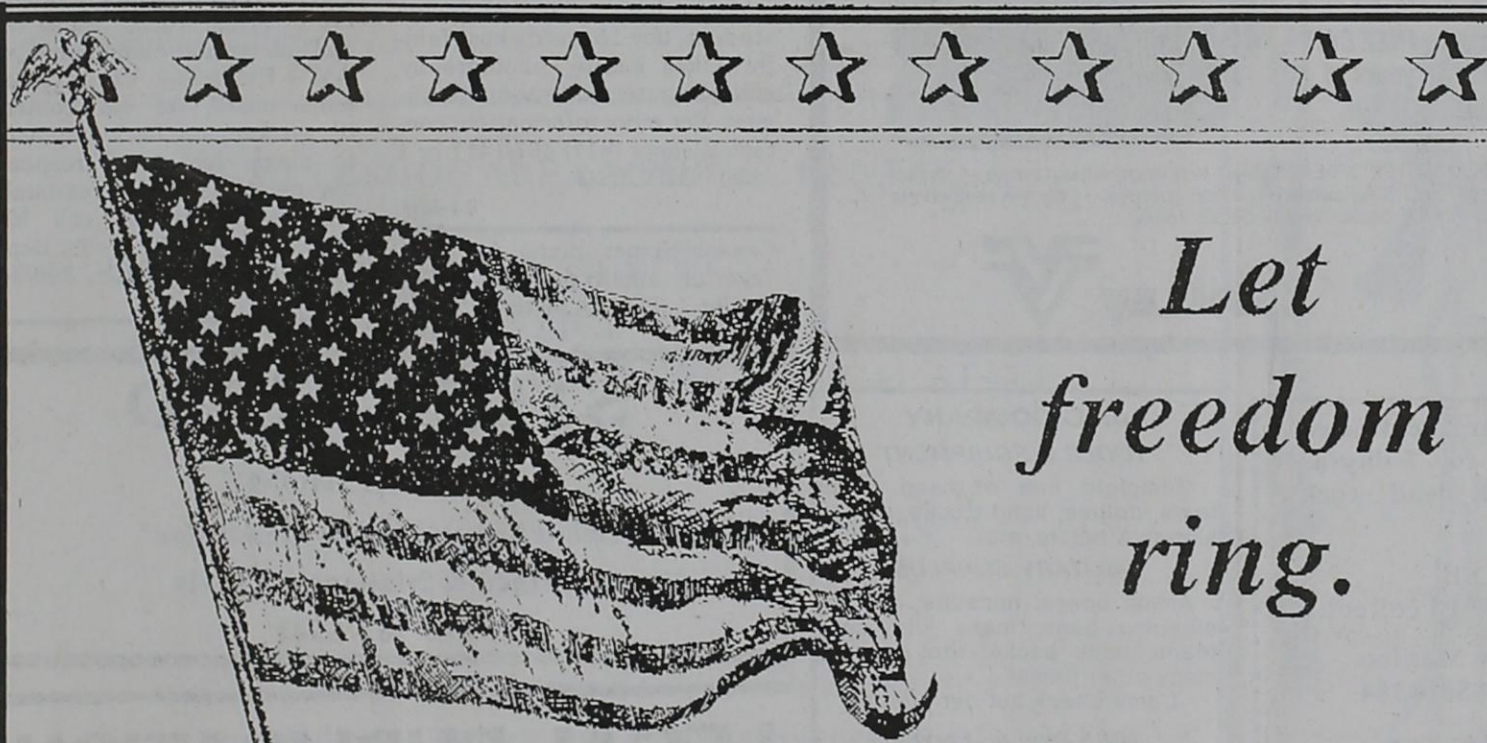

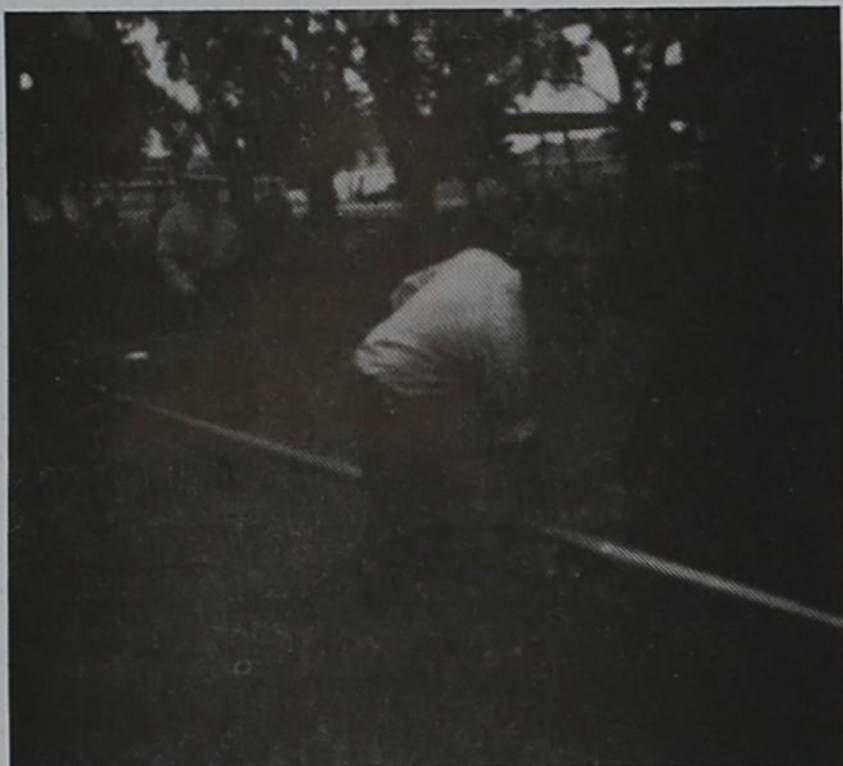
The couple was wed on Aug. 11, 1943 in Tucumcari, N.M. The celebration was postponed due to illness.
