TO HOLD 4-H FAT STOCK SHOW SATURDAY

First Weekly Auction Sales Are Success

Over Five Hundred Cattle Are Sold At First Sales Monday

Horses And Mules To Be Sold Each Friday

The first weekly auction sale of cattle got off to a flying start here last Monday when more than five hundred head of cattle were sold the opening day.

A crowd estimated at twenty-five hundred thronged the auction barn pens beginning at eleven a. m. and lasting until after four in the afternoon. Cattle were brought here from great distances and buyers from over a wide area were in attendance. Several sellers report that their stock brought more than they were quoted on the Fort Worth markets.

Kenneth Bozeman, auctioneer for the local sales, stated that this was the second largest opening day he had ever attended, from both the standpoint of crowds and the number of cattle sold.

Although the horse and mule sales held on Wednesday did not attract as many animals or as large a crowd as the cattle sales the first of the week, there nevertheless were a large number.

HORSE SALES ON FRIDAY
By popular request, the Auction Sales of horses and mules, has been changed to Friday, of each week instead of Wednesday. The second sale of this kind will be conducted Friday of next week, according to announcement released today. Until further notice the Friday date will be used.

ber of horses and mules sold Wednesday with a large crowd of buyers, sellers and spectators.

There remains no doubt as to the success of these first sales and the faith that Messrs. Barron, Breeding and Cleveland displayed when they established the Dawson County Auction and Commission Company, has been clearly substantiated.

Jack McKeon of the Hancock community won the \$10.00 prize offered by the chamber of commerce for selling the most cattle at the sales Monday.

Plans are going forward for another major sale next Monday and Friday and buyers here this week indicated that they would be here when the next sales are held.

A total of \$16,000 was the business transacted at the opening day, while the Wednesday total on horses and mules amounted to about \$5,000.

Superintendent of County Schools Makes Austin Trip

County Superintendent Henry W. Norris, returned last week from Austin, where he attended to bond business in the state capitol, and checked on salary aid.

Mr. Norris was also able to put over the transportation aid which will be received in this county. The following announcement was released this week:

CCC Camp Will Hold Open House Here

One of the outstanding features of the open-house celebration to be held at the Lamesa CCC Camp, April 15, is the invitation extended to state representatives from this district to take part in the program. Unless urgent business at Austin intervenes to prevent their presence here, the Hon. C. H. Nelson, Senator, and Hon. Alvin R. Allison, Representative, will be at the camp, and address the citizens of Dawson and surrounding counties who are expected to attend the celebration.

The celebration has been planned to commemorate the 6th anniversary of the establishment of the CCC Camps. A field trip has been arranged for the morning program, to begin at 9 o'clock. Visitors will be given an opportunity to observe some of the work being carried on by the camp personnel and farmers themselves.

During the afternoon, all visitors will be shown the barracks, mess hall, kitchen, recreation hall, quarters, and technical service buildings and equipment. Refreshments will be served.

The speaking program will begin at 2:00 p. m. In addition to the addresses scheduled to be made by the State officials, district and county officials have accepted invitations to appear on the program.

EDUCATIONAL FILM WILL BE SHOWN APR. 10

The public is invited to attend a free motion picture demonstration at the Lamesa Elementary School Auditorium on the night of Monday, April 10, at 7:45 o'clock. The educational picture will be shown by Dr. L. B. Cooper, professor of Education of Texas Technological College, who will also discuss its use in the classroom.

This show culminates a series of studies made by the teachers of the county in visual education. The show will be a full length picture which will be entertaining as well as educational. Many sections of the country have long recognized the value of films, slides, museums, and other visual instruction aids. Other sections are rapidly realizing its value.

Teachers, trustees, pastors, and all others interested in education are extended a cordial invitation to attend.

According to figures released this week from the Department of Commerce, Bureau of Census in Washington, there had been a gain in Dawson County from the 1938 crop a total of 40,196 bales of cotton, as compared with 110,838 from the 1937 crop.

This is the final report on the crop. This should prove very interesting to a great number of people, as there had been much controversy, as well as a few wagers in Lamesa, as to whether the crop would amount to forty thousand bales or under.

Throughout the entire fall, predictions as to the amount of cotton the county would make varied from thirty to fifty thousand bales, but the more conservative, as well as ginners and cotton men, placed the yield in the neighborhood of forty thousand bales.

Although this is a great deal less than half the cotton the county made in 1937, when it is considered that the government program cut the allowable acres to be planted in cotton to approximately 127,000 acres in 1938, forty thousand bales was a very good crop. For the entire county that figures almost a third of a bale to the acre, and if as many acres had been planted as was the case in 1937, the yield would have been considerably above the forty thousand bale mark.

STATE SUPT. L. A. WOODS TO SPEAK AT UNION

State Superintendent L. A. Woods will deliver the dedicatory address at the dedication program to be held at the Union High School, upon the acceptance of the new \$20,000 gymnasium-auditorium, which was recently completed for this rural school.

Opening at six o'clock, Thursday night, April 6, there will be an exhibit by members of the school, which will be followed by a forty-five minute band concert by the Lamesa High School Band.

Other speakers on the program are a member of the Union School Board, O. E. Witte, member of the county school board, J. H. Norris, county superintendent of schools, J. Easten Day, deputy state superintendent for the district, P. K. Hume, superintendent of the school will preside.

Other musical numbers and forms of entertainment will be included in the program.

Not only the people served by this school, but the general public is invited to attend this program.

Trustee Election To Be Held Saturday For Local Schools

The terms of Lee Billingsley and T. D. Randle expire this spring. Their names will be on the ballot for reelection as a result of the filing of a petition with the required number of names asking that their names be submitted to the voters.

No other petitions were filed with the School Board Secretary. The election will be held in the Dawson County District Court Room, under the State Law governing such elections.

Show Will Open At One O'clock At Fair Grounds In Lamesa

Will Select Entries For Lubbock Show

The 4-H Club Boys Fat Stock Show will be held in Lamesa, Saturday afternoon beginning at 1 p. m.

Scene of the show will be a Dawson County Fair Grounds, according to B. J. Baskin, Dawson County Agent. This marks the close of the 1938-39 feeding program.

The show will be divided into two classes. The first for calves that will weigh 851 pounds or over and the second for calves that weigh less than 851 pounds. The following boys have entered calves in the show: Louis Glenn Clark will exhibit two calves, while Jiggs King, Bernice Smith, Elbert Harvick and Ralph Burleson will exhibit one calf each.

Calves which will represent Dawson County at the Lubbock show will be selected at this time, Mr. Baskin said.

IMPROVEMENT OF COTTON TO BE DISCUSSED

A cotton improvement meeting will be held in the District Court Room at Lamesa at 2 p. m., Monday, April 3rd, B. J. Baskin, county agent, stated today.

Texas, the largest cotton producing state in the United States, exports 90 per cent of its average annual production. The continued practice of raising low-quality cotton, haphazard methods of harvesting and indifferent ginning practices, has definitely destroyed foreign demand for Texas cotton. Any hope of regaining our foreign market is entirely dependent upon Texas farmers. First, producing quality cotton; second, improving methods of harvesting; third, correct ginning faults; and fourth, demanding correction of sampling and compressing methods so widespread today, Mr. Baskin stated.

"Dawson County cotton farmers should be vitally interested in this cotton improvement campaign, and are urged to attend this meeting," E. A. Miller, Agronomist, and F. E. Lichte, Cotton Gin Specialist, Extension Service of the A. & M. College of Texas, will attend this meeting," he further stated.

All who will be asked to report to the Fair Grounds each morning beginning today. Their services are needed, according to the management.

Pre-season practice will get under way next Wednesday. Manager Jodie Tate, who has been in Dallas for the

Keeping Discus Mark Duty Of Steer Sophomore Star

Jack Hughes Faced With Task Wolfe Performed

The problem of keeping the discus throw title of the Texas Relays which Hugh Wolfe won for the University of Texas last season will fall this year on the broad shoulders of Jack Hughes, the big Lamesa sophomore. Hughes, although he has already beaten the winning mark of last year's meet over 143 feet, will have stiff competition from a number of the country's best hurlers.

Among these are Adrian Davis, of George Pepperdine College, in Los Angeles, who only last week tossed the platter 158 feet, and Pritchard of Oklahoma, one of the best in the Midwest. Another who is given an excellent chance to end up high in the event at the Relays is Jack Price of Howard Payne.

Hughes is considered by Coach Clyde Littlefield as one of the best bets in the Southwest to make the Olympic team in 1940—which, by the way, is the ambition of the West Texas boy. He stands six feet three and weighs 230 pounds. Most notable about his appearance are his arms, which measure 84 inches from hand to hand.

He began to throw the discus as a freshman in high school and came to the State meet the same year, 1934. In this meet Hughes suffered his first loss in competition. He did not lose again until last summer in the National Junior A. A. U. in which he took third place.

During this period of four years he won the state meet twice, set new records in the Fat Stock Show at Fort Worth while in high school, and then raised the freshman record at the same meet from 128 feet to 142 feet.

This year he has been undefeated in three meets, at Laredo, Lockhart, and Fort Worth. Thus, surveying his record as a whole, he has compiled the amazing total of but two defeats in five years of competition and thus far this season.

When he finished school at Lamesa, Jack had offers from colleges and Junior colleges all over the country, but chose to come to Texas because he wanted the coaching of Clyde Littlefield. Since that time he has been improving right along.

Last Saturday at the Fat Stock Show meet, he threw the disc 153 feet, the best distance he has ever hit in a meet. He has, however, gone over this several times in practice. His improvement is also shown by the fact that, according to Hughes himself, he finally "felt" the form which he has been striving for.

Jack, whose genial nature has won for him many friends on the Forty Acres, is studying geology.

He expects to get a degree in this field in 1941, but before then he hopes to represent the Texas team on the Olympic squad and to capture the National championship for the Orange and White, two desires which observers believe are coming closer to fulfillment every day.

Thousands Of Dollars Saved For Citizens Of Lamesa And Dawson County

Last December a movement was started to organize a Farmers Co-operative Association to handle Petroleum Products. Meetings were held at various points in the county in school houses and churches to acquaint the farmers with the plan.

When this movement was started prices for High Octane (Leaded) gasoline ranged in prices from eighteen to twenty cents per gallon retail, and fourteen to fifteen and one-half cents wholesale. Now the citizens of Lamesa and Dawson County can buy this same commodity retail for sixteen cents and wholesale for twelve cents per gallon. This price change did not come about because the price had been lowered at the refinery, for in fact the price at the refinery has been slightly raised. In view of these facts we will leave it up to the citizens of Lamesa and Dawson County to judge why and how they can now buy gasoline at these greatly reduced prices. History is simply repeating itself, for if you care to check up you will find that wherever a Co-Operative Movement is started in a community, prices in the commodity which the Co-Operative proposes to handle immediately are lowered. Surely anyone, giving it a little thought, can realize why this is done. Nothing more or less than a plan to discourage the Co-Operative movement. However, the citizens of other communities have been quick to realize the facts and have gotten behind the Co-Operative movement with their support and backing.

Now our local Co-Operative has become a fact. Directors and officers have been elected and Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws have been filed with the Department of Agriculture of the State of Texas.

The name of our Co-Operative is "CO-OPERATIVE SERVICE ASSOCIATION" of Lamesa, Texas. The corporation has a capital stock of \$25,000.00 divided into 2000 shares of \$12.50 each, 800 shares of Common Stock and 1200 shares of Preferred Stock. April 15 Final Day On Releases

April 15th has been set by the State Committee as the final date to sign Form SR-327 which releases any part or all of the 1939 cotton acreage allotment. The 1939 regulations permit a producer to release any part or all of the cotton acres allotted to the farm for that year. If the producer does not intend to plant all of the allotted cotton acres, any number of acres released up to 20 per cent of the allotment will not affect the 1939 Soil Conservation Payment.

The released acres will remain in Dawson County and will be reapportioned by the County Committee to other farms in the county. Any cotton allotment released by a producer will automatically increase his 1939 Feed Allotment in the same proportion.

TEXAS U. RANKS 1ST IN NATION'S STATE SCHOOLS

Its student body numbering 10,870 for the year, The University of Texas leads the national field of universities with separate A. & M. colleges, figures released in Austin this week by the registrar show.

There were more June graduates last year than the University had students during the first 21 years of its existence, the records reveal.

Its increase of 4,218 students in the last five years is larger than the entire enrollment of the state universities of Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Mississippi or Arkansas.

From 1923 to 1927, to University's enrollment increased 23.8 per cent, from 1928 to 1932, 21.5 per cent. Largest increase came in the period from 1933 to 1937, registering 50.1 per cent.

Dairy Day Program

1. Classes will be shown as follows: A. Females: (1) 3 years and over (2) 2 years and under 3, also yearlings in milk (3) 1 year and under 2, (4) Calves 6 months and under 1 year.

B. Bulls: (1) 2 years and over, (2) 1 year and under. No bull allowed in show ring unless he has a ring in his nose. Ages will be "as of the date of the show." Class for bulls with three daughters in show—based on quality of daughters as well as the bull.

2. Awards: For Females and Bulls: (a) Class A—Blue Ribbon, classed as "very good" and "excellent", 85 points or above. (b) Class B. Red ribbon, animals classed "good plus" or "good", 75 to 85 points. (c) Class C. White ribbon, animals classed "fair", 70 to 75 points. (d) Class D. No ribbon, animals classed "poor". Best Female, purple rosette.

3. Dairy Products Exhibit: (a) Entries received up to 9 a. m., April 14, 1939. (b) Two identical samples of each product to be submitted. (c) Farm butter prepared for market, wrapped in butter parchment. (d) Cheese, cottage, processed cottage and Neufchatel cheese may be exhibited in one-half pint glazed cartons. (Note, all cheese may be colored, however, should be shown plain. No flavoring materials will be permitted. Cottage cheese should be creamed.) (e) Milk. Sweet milk to be displayed in quart bottles, capped with cardboard cap and covered with parchment paper, using a rubber band to hold it in place.

4. Awards: (1) Class A—Blue ribbon, dairy products classed "excellent" or very good, 90 points or above. (b) Class B. red ribbon, dairy products classed "good", 85 to 90 points. (c) Class C. white ribbon, dairy products classed "fair", 80 to 85 points. (d) Class D. no ribbon, dairy products classed "poor and bad", below 80 points.

SOUTH PLAINS STOCK SHOW STARTS MONDAY

The South Plains Junior Fat Stock Show will be ready to open its doors Monday, April 3, according to an announcement made this week by C. C. Johnson, Lubbock County agent and general superintendent of the show.

Total entries for the three divisions have already passed the 300 mark. Johnson stated. Entries in the Baby Beef, Fat Pig, and Fat Lamb divisions are the best in years, it was reported.

Approximately \$500 has been set aside this year for premiums in the three divisions, with the Baby Beef division claiming a little more than half the money. The other two divisions split the remainder of the premium money. The American Hereford Association will pay direct to each premium winner one-fifth of the premiums offered in the baby beef division.

Sifting begins at 10:30 a. m. Monday, April 3. The afternoon will see a meeting of all baby beef exhibitors, county agents and vocational teachers. That evening there will be provided entertainment for the exhibitors.

Judging in the Fat Pig Division begins at 9 a. m. Tuesday and Fat Lamb judging at 10:30 a. m. Fred Hale, expert from College Station, will judge the pig show while Ray C. Mowrey of Texas Tech will decide the honors in the lamb show.

Tuesday afternoon beginning at 1:30 p. m., W. L. Stangel, head of the Animal Husbandry Department at Texas Tech, will judge the Baby Beef division. The auction sale will take place with Col. Kenneth Bozeman in the ring at 1 p. m., Wednesday, April 5.

Already more than 1000 4-H and FFA boys have entered the Second Annual 4-H FFA Boys Parade. Thirty 4-H Clubs and 10 FFA Chapters have entered with some ten or twelve floats. Several bands from over the South Plains will participate.

RETAIL SALES OFF FOR YEAR REPORT SHOWS

Declining retail prices reduced dollar sales of Texas department stores for the first two months of 1939 to a figure 2.7 per cent below January and February last year. University of Texas business statisticians have reported.

Volume of goods sold is estimated to be fully equal to or slightly in excess of that of last year, the University Bureau of Business Research has found.

Sales during February declined 3.6 per cent from January and 3.3 per cent from February last year.

Proportion of credit sales to net sales increased substantially over February last year, while proportion of collections to outstanding accounts declined, the Bureau's report said.

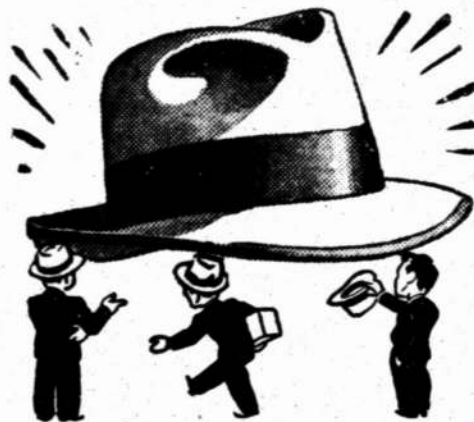

REPORT SHOWS EMPLOYMENT IS UP IN FEBRUARY

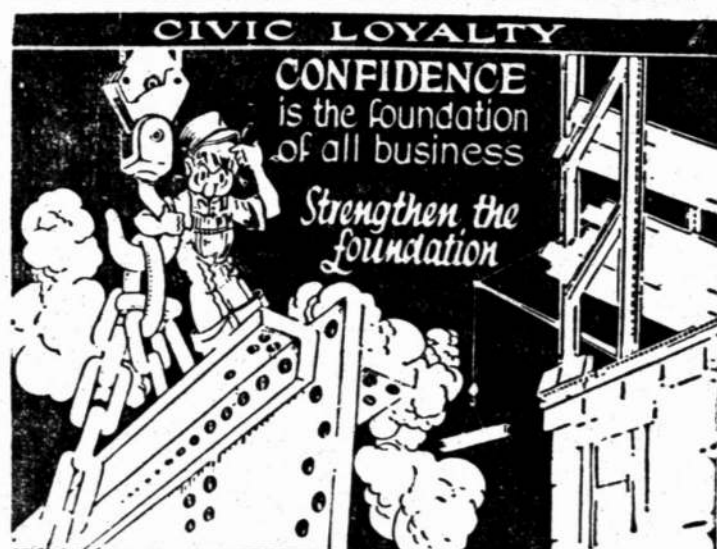
A total of 126,155 workers were employed in Texas manufacturing industries during February, an increase of 1 per cent over January and 1.4 per

cent over February last year. The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research has reported. Manufacturing pay rolls totaled \$2,413,064, a gain of six-tenths of one per cent over January but a drop of 1.1 per cent from February 1938.

Employment in all non-agricultural industries remained about the same as in January, both in number of employed workers and total pay rolls. Both dropped slightly below February, 1938.

CHEESE OUTPUT IN TEXAS IS OFF FROM LAST YEAR

Production of cheese in Texas dropped
32 per cent in comparison with
February of last year, reports to The
University of Texas Bureau of Busi-
ness Research for last month indicate.

Production lacked only 1.4 per cent
of equalling January's output, however.
Other dairy products likewise slump-
ed, but not as drastically. Creamery
butter production fell 25.9 per cent
from last February but increased 9 per
cent over January, 1939; while ice
cream was down 12.6 per cent from
February 1938, but 12.2 per cent above
January.

ONE BOOK READ IN 15 SECONDS

University of Texas students check
out, read and return one library book
every fifteen seconds, Librarian Don-
ald Coney estimates. Checking 318,095
books over the library desks, students
are 11.8 per cent heavier library brow-
sers than last year's student body, Mr.
Coney reported.

Largest in the South, the University
library was fourth in the national col-
legiate field in the number of books
passing across its loan desks during
the period, Mr. Coney said.

He believed the bulk of the 33,632
book increase resulted from accentuated
student research. The branch li-
braries, housing books on the advanced
and technical fields, showed a cir-
culation advance of 20.6 per cent.
