Galen Carr, Jr., is taining with Co. G. R. O. T. C., Camp Bullis, Fort Sam Houston. And, some of the other boys of that class may be in service.

Continuing with this class: Louis Collins recently married Lillian Smith, 1941 graduate. Claude Houston married Miss Jeffcoat, E. J. Pope, Jr. and Wilma Motheral, both of that class, married. Bernice Neis is now Mrs. Luther Wood of Spade, Sunshine Scroggins is married, Marvin Toler married Miss Mahon of Willow, Okla.

Another member of the class, Willie K. Sterrett, passed away in July of last year.

Rumors are that wedding bells may ring soon for two from that class.

JUDGES ADVOCATE SPECIAL SESSION

PLAINVIEW, JULY 15.—County judges and commissioners from 17 West Texas counties today urged a special session of the legislature to dispose of road bond assumption issues and proposed a compromise to reconcile divergent factions.

The action came during a point meeting of the West Texas County Judges and Commissioners association and the Texas State Highway Improvement association. Officers and directors of both groups approved the suggestions.

The proposal included: first, that all bonds assumed heretofore including Jan. 2, 1939, be paid as provided by the bond assumption act of the 46th legislature, which set aside one cent of the state gasoline tax for that purpose;

Second, that one and one-half million dollars be set aside out of the surplus for the lateral road account for counties as of the 1939 act;

Third, that the state board of county and district road indebtedness assume bonds voted since Jan. 2, 1939, and before Jan. 1, 1941, where proceeds have been or will be expended on state designated routes, under the supervision and direction of the highway department.

Citizens to Give Aluminum For National Defense Use In Drive July 21 to 29

SCOUTS TO AID HERE IN COLLECTION OF ALUMINUM ARTICLES

Citizens of the United States have been asked by New York Mayor, F. H. LaGuardia, Director of Civilian Defense, to contribute aluminum for use in the National Defense program. This metal is chiefly needed for planes. Mayor LaGuardia estimates that twenty million pounds will be collected in the drive, which is to be staged July 21-29. This will be enough aluminum for 2,000 fighter planes.

Scouts to Help

As chairman of the National Defense Committee for Texas, Governor W. Lee O'Daniel named county judges to direct work in the 254 counties of the state.

Hale county judge, Frank Day, named Mayor Fritz W. Struve, Postmaster George W. Ragland and N. C. Hix, banker, as Abernathy's committee for the drive.

Mayor Struve, committee chairman, said Scoutmaster Q. D. Hallmark and members of the Abernathy Boy Scout troop would aid in the local drive to collect the metal.

The aluminum will be received by Hallmark at Struve grocery and Scouts will place it in a warehouse. Those having articles to contribute are asked to bring them to Hallmark, or leave word there and a Scout will be sent to your home for the metal.

Box—At Bank

Aluminum ware may be placed in a large box which is to be located in First State bank for the convenience of contributors.

Committee members urged residents of this area to co-operate in this drive to aid the National Defense program.

To Relieve Shortage

The purpose of the campaign, as communicated to the Governor by

Mayor LaGuardia, is to help remedy a temporary shortage of aluminum in national defense production by conducting a nationwide campaign for donations of used aluminumware. Scrap aluminum in large volume is required to prevent a slow down in the defense program.

No aluminum collected in this campaign can be used for non-defense purposes, by virtue of a priorities order effective June 10.

An attempt will be made to canvass every house in the nation to ask housewives to donate the used aluminumware which can be spared without replacement.

The house-to-house canvass and collection will take place July 21 to 29, inclusive.

Aluminum so collected will be deposited in central bins, such as in fire stations; or in other designated places; then taken to the yards of waste dealers for sorting, classifying, and baling; then shipped to smelters.

The waste dealers have been asked as a patriotic service to contribute their supervision and facilities without profit, the Governor was advised.

The metal will be sold to the smelters at a special uniform price fixed by the Government. The smelters will pay directly by check to "National Scrap Aluminum Fund," care of the nearest Federal bank. The entire net proceeds will be available to the Office of Civilian Defense, and any expenditures required for the proper defense of the civilian population.

Those wishing to participate in the collection of the aluminum may communicate with the mayors of their towns or with the county judges.

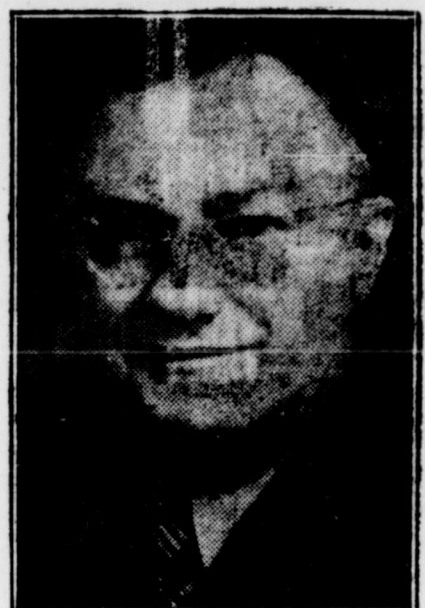

RAIN HAS BEEN CAUSE OF UNORTHODOX WHEAT HARVESTING IN AREA

Wheat harvesting in this year, 1941, has been far from the normal type, according to local grain men, who say the garnering process will take longer than any previous harvest within the memory of wheat producers of this area.

Abundance, or rather superabundance of rain, has upset all orthodox methods. It has been a catch-as-catch-can harvest, catch wheat and dry when you can.

Some farmers have found it possible to do a little weed knifing or row crop planting in the morning, up to 10 o'clock or so, before wheat is dry enough to get into the fields. Then, late in the afternoon or before sunset they have to stop as combines cannot operate.

Heads have been so green at times that harvesting by combine has been delayed a week, so that the grains can ripen and get hard.

High stalks have been blown down by high winds and driving rain and farmers have been forced to make a return trip to the starting point after cutting a swath, as the leaning wheat was so far bent over the combine could not cut it.

In some sections old time binders were used for a time. Fields have been so wet in spots that many acres had to be left standing for a week so that the soil could dry enough to hold up the heavy combine and tractor.

NEW BUSINESS TO MERCHANTS

Merchants selling 100 per cent American grown, processed and manufactured cotton products in Hale county will shortly be in line for increased business from farmers participating in the supplementary cotton program of the U. S. department of agriculture.

All merchants selling cotton goods should be familiar with the rules and regulations governing the program, before accepting or redeeming stamps.

Should Sign Forms

Retail merchants handling new cotton products in Hale county who have registered with, and received acknowledgement from the Surplus Marketing administration, are eligible to take part in the program and benefit from this additional business.

After the merchant adopts the cotton stamps in the prescribed manner for 100 per cent American cotton products, he pastes them on for redemption stamp cards, stamp cards, supplied by the SMA. He then signs a statement on these cards that his store has accepted the stamps in accordance with government rules and regulations, and forwards them to the SMA for redemption. He should receive a U. S. government check within a week in settlement of his claim.

Merchants who misuse stamps will be in the unfortunate position of having made a false claim against the U. S. treasury. This is a serious federal violation, which however, can be easily avoided by adhering to the regulations. The main thing is to accept cotton stamps from eligible farm participants only for new cotton products, made entirely from new cotton that has been grown, processed and manufactured in the United States.
