Grant application being submitted

City to seek funds for new pool

The City Council held a public hearing Tuesday night on a proposed application for a swimming pool grant to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

A resolution passed to make the request for funds.

J. Martin Basinger of Post, applied for a zone change for a piece of property along the north service road on IS 20. His application was denied.

Work on the old underground storage tank at the North Water Works is proceeding satisfactorily, according to Buzz Rich, Director of City Services. Work on a water well was postponed one month by the council.

The Colorado Independent School District has been advertising lots 7 and 8, Block 38, for sale for use as a site for a fire station. The property is east of the present Administration Building (the old Junior High School). The council will submit a sealed bid.

Councilman Don Bennett mentioned the many openings where city water flows out un-

metered, such as at the ballpark and the cemetery. He said there is no way to tell where city water is going if it isn't metered. There was a consensus of opinion within the council that everything that could be metered, should be.

The council voted to allow payment of the full \$3,500 budgeted for the swimming pool to Tom Ramsey and associates, instead of taking out part of it because of the short season. Councilmen said that would help pay for the work in getting the pool ready.

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Supervisors seek funds from court

The Commissioner's Court met Monday at 1 p.m. in regular session for routine business, and set a budget workshop meeting for 9 a.m. Friday. Initial requests from department heads and county officials are \$90,000 over last year's budget.

Bob Reily spoke for the Library Board in requesting that Geneva Blackard be allowed to work up to 100 hours a month instead of up to 80 hours. Commissioners voted to allow the increase in hours for a period of six months.

Reily also told the group that the Library needs a new copying machine and that the library needs carpeting and painting. Commissioners will study these needs.

Commissioners voted to allow Ann Hallmark to go to County Treasurer's Conference at Amarillo for three days in September. The county will allow \$325 in expenses.

Commissioners voted to allow Sheriff Wendell Bryant to purchase two car radios at a cost of \$1,446 each installed.

County Judge Bill Carter read a letter from John Edwards concerning the possible changing of roads in the Cuthbert area. After discussion, commissioners decided to leave roads as they are, for the present, because of the expense of building new roads.

The court voted to seek bids on three new dump trucks for use on county roads.

Tax rebates look good for C-City

A mixed report was received from Bob Bullock, comptroller of public accounts concerning city tax rebates for the period ending May 31 in Mitchell County.

Colorado City received a check from the comptroller's office totaling \$15,246.14, up over \$4,000 from this time last year and almost \$20,000 over a year ago.

Loraine, however, received no check this period and thus was \$2,067.55 behind last year's payment rate. Westbrook, on the other hand, received nothing all of last year but \$1,257.52 this period.

The July rebate represents the city's one percent sales tax collected on most non-food items.

Four percent of the tax goes to the state.

Colorado City's 21 percent increase is well above the state average of 17 percent. "I would imagine a lot of it (the increase) has to do with liquor sales, but I don't know how much," Rita Espinoza, City Secretary said.

Loraine's economy leans heavily on farming and due to the drought, business is "slow," according to Ray Preston, local drygoods retailer. A representative of Scott Fuel in Loraine said that she was not surprised at the decrease because their sales were way down.

CISD board covers ground in long 5 hour meeting

The Colorado City school board plowed through a massive five hour agenda, Tuesday night. The five hours

included a closed door meeting of 55 minutes discussing personnel.

Early on, the board heard a statement from Mrs. Jim Baum, concerning what she considered the inequity in the distribution of money for eating out of town. In effect, Mrs. Baum said that tennis players got hamburgers to eat, while football players ate chicken fried steak.

The board did not make any public statement in regard to Mrs. Baum's comments.

The board discussed summer maintenance projects, including carpeting of four classrooms for the third grade and the third grade

hallway at Hutchinon School; also building a short fence around the playground area at Hutchinon; and the building of a press and media room at Wolf Stadium.

The board also reviewed the school Five Year Priority Plan set up in 1977-78 and implemented in 1979. Superintendent of Schools Charles Uselton reported that the goals set out had been achieved, and that the planned annual activities were successful in attaining the objectives and the five year objective.

Deer population studied by A&M

Some of the state's top wildlife biologists have embarked on a project to help landowners, lease hunters and hunting clubs get more out of the hunting season by manipulating white-tailed deer population.

The result of the work will be a book written in lay terms to give Texans who aren't trained biologists a better understanding of information such as the deer's life history, habitat requirements, population dynamics and economic value from the standpoint of leasing and hunting, says Dr. William Sheffield of Texas

A&M's Department of Wildlife and Fisheries Sciences.

About two-three million white-tailed deer comprise the largest proportion of all deer in the state and live throughout most of Texas.

Sheffield and 25-30 other wildlife experts and biologists from Texas A&M's College of Agriculture, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, private interests and scientists from the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are contributing to the book.

Caution is wise during snake season

Summer is snakebite season and time to exercise caution, warns a Texas A&M University wildlife specialist. Even so, the odds are 50-50 that most poisonous snake bites won't be fatal.

"Chances are only four in ten that a poisonous snake will release venom when it bites," says Dr. Fred Henricks of Texas A&M's Department of Wildlife and Fisheries Sciences. "But that's no excuse not to be cautious."

The fatality rate from snake bite is extremely low. Less than one percent of the victims who are struck die from the 2,000-plus bites annually reported nationwide, he said.

"If you do encounter a snake, simply walk away," Henricks said. "Most snakes are not aggressive and most man-snake encounters go unnoticed by man."

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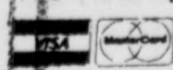
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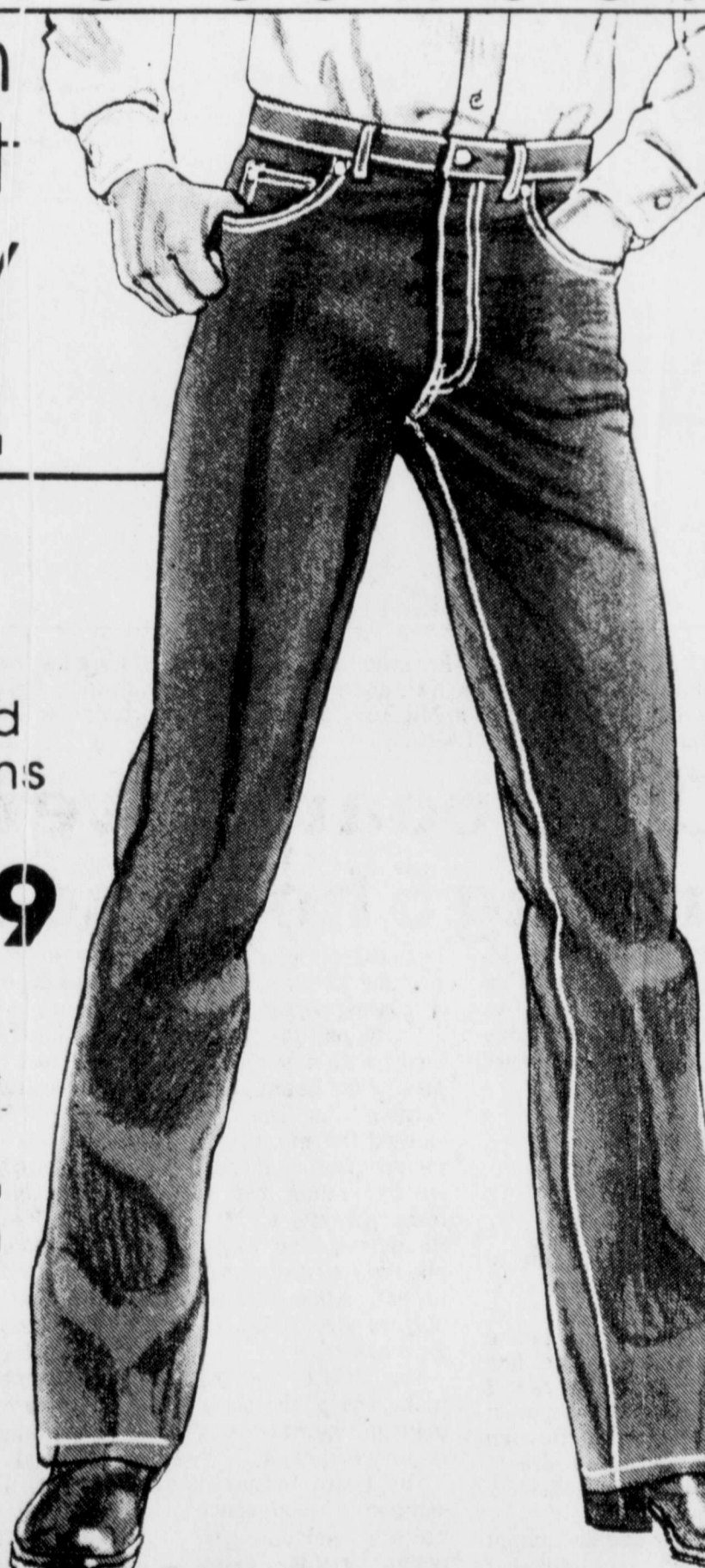

Take precautions with food

By DEBBIE CHRISTIAN

July begins the peak picnic—and food poisoning—season. But with a few simple precautions, this unpleasant and sometimes serious illness can be avoided.

The "poison" is actually produced by a certain bacterial, a type of staphylococcus, which contaminates the food. The poison is eaten with the food and produces symptoms such as nausea and vomiting.

For most people, food poisoning is just a miserable experience, but it can be serious for babies, elderly people and those with other illnesses.

The bacteria often re-

ach food from the hands of the person preparing it. But even when you're careful to wash your hands, bacteria from the skin, hair or throat, can be spread to food.

Since these bacteria are especially food or protein, precautions should be taken when serving high protein foods—such as meat, poultry, salads containing egg, custards and some baked foods—on picnics.

The most likely sources of food poisoning are those dishes that you don't normally heat or reheat before serving on a picnic.

It's never wise to assume that high-protein foods are safe after being kept at room temper-

ature. Since refrigeration prevents the bacteria from making their poison, the most effective way to avoid food poisoning is to eat them right away or else keep them cold until they are served.

Refrigeration temperatures should be below 45 degrees Fahrenheit, which may be difficult to maintain in an ice chest or other type of cooler.

Contrary to myth, mavonnaise isn't commonly the main culprit in food poisoning. So it's important to keep all hot foods hot and cold foods cold to reduce the chances of taking food poisoning along on your picnic.

Brucellosis vaccination hearings set

A schedule of four hearings on a proposed mandatory brucellosis calfhood vaccination regulation on change of ownership for the Class C Area of Texas was announced by Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission. The schedule is:

July 31 at 1:30 p.m., in Tyler, Ramada Inn, 5701

South Broadway; August 1 at 1:30 p.m. in Bryan, Brazos Center, 3232 Briarcrest, Room 102;

August 2 at 1:30 p.m. in Wharton at Wharton Junior College, 911 Boling Highway;

August 3 at 1:30 p.m. in Alice, Alice National Bank, 601 East Main.

"All female cattle which are born after October 1, 1984 and are four months of age or older, shall have been officially vaccinated, S branded or spayed prior to change of ownership. Heifers may be consigned to a livestock market for official vaccination, S branding or spaying on arrival at no expense to the State of Texas.

"Females are exempt from these requirements if they are: 1. sold as a pair and still nursing their tested dams; or 2. consigned direct from a farm or ranch to slaughter or a quarantined feedlot."

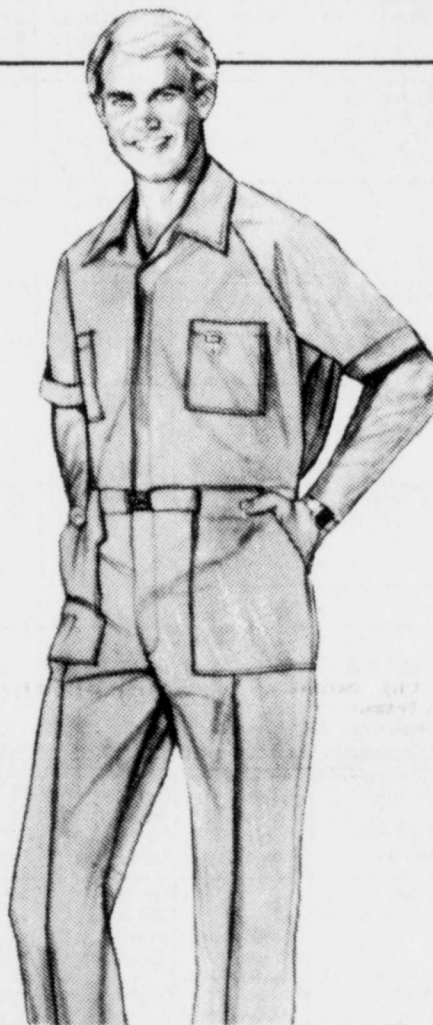
