RURAL AID OKEYED

Body's Signature To Help Financially Weak Schools

AUSTIN, July 24. (AP)—Gov. Cody today signed the rural aid bill carrying \$500,000 for the support of financially weak schools during 1929-30, the first major appropriation measure to be acted on.

A \$500,000 appropriation passed the second special session was passed at the same time all other bills were sent back to the legislature to be readjusted. About \$100,000 will pay tuition of rural school students who have been denied to the resident districts to obtain a high school education.

South Texas Has Boll Weevil Woe To Contend With

Year's Acreage Is Two Per Cent Greater Than Last Year But Abandonment To Offset Gain Made

Five Millions Top

Favorable Conditions May Boost Estimate; Corn and Wheat Crops Look Good. G. B. Terrell Reports

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, July 24.—A cotton crop of 4,775,000 bales was estimated today by George B. Terrell, Commissioner of Agriculture. In a resume of agricultural conditions of the state.

With favorable conditions the yield might total 5,000,000 bales, the report said, but it is likely the crop will fall below this figure. Acreage was increased two percent over last year, but abandonment will offset the gain.

Weevil Is Active

"Considerable damage was reported by boll weevil and the leaf worm is cleaning some of the fields in South Texas," the agricultural survey said. "Many of the growers are now poisoning cotton. This, however, should be done upon the first appearance of the worm unless the cotton already is matured," Terrell advised.

The corn acreage is practically the same as last year. Old corn is in good condition, but the late crop is cut short in Central, East, North and West portions of the state. Terrell said the yield might fall slightly below last year's total of \$9,000,000 bushels.

Wheat Shows Good

Acreage and production of wheat have been increased and the crop may reach 30,000,000 bushels, or an increase of 8,000,000 bushels over last season.

The production of hogs has increased 8 percent and that of poultry 10 percent.

Farm Board Will Study On Grains

Members to Convene Friday In Chicago To Look Into Wheat Problems And Talk With Experts

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, July 24.—The attention of the Federal Farm Board will be turned to the situation confronting wheat and other grain growers at a special meeting in Chicago Friday to be attended by all the board except Secretary Hyde.

While one result of the meeting may be a curtailment of possibilities for assistance in grain marketing which could be rendered under the farm act, the statement announcing the meeting gave no indication that the board would concern itself with an investigation primarily intended to inquire into the feasibility of invoking the stabilization sections of the farm relief law.

"The purpose of the meeting," said the board's statement, "will be to acquaint the board with the problems which today exist in the marketing of wheat and coarse grains."

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Pelican Bothers City Of London

LONDON, July 24. (AP)—A pelican which soared away from St. James Park, last week, and has taken refuge in different trees all over the city has caused the City Fathers much grief. Today the officer of works, issued instructions to citizens on how to catch the bird after warning sportsmen not to shoot. The advice said:

"The pelican is very timid. It will be quite helpless if seized by the bill, with one arm, while the other arm is placed around the body, thus closing its wings." Throughout the metropolitan district zealous policemen have walked their beats armed with cans of tempting sardines, but the pelican refuses to be tempted from the treetops.

Frame Charge In Dallas Puts Two Police On Shelf

Commissioner Says Veteran Officers Hoped To Catch Him At "Beer Party"; To Have Trial By Mayor

(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, July 24.—Two plain clothes policemen were suspended today by Police Commissioner W. C. Graves, who charged them with attempting to "frame" him into a compromising situation.

The formal charge against the officers, Mike F. Higgins and A. B. Farrow, is insubordination. They demanded a trial before the Mayor and Board of Commissioners, which Graves said he would grant.

Graves declared a woman several days ago told him that the accused officers had urged her to invite the Commissioner to a house for a "beer party" that they might raid the party and take their superior.

Conversation Framed

The official said he then by arrangement met the woman later in a downtown office with several witnesses. He and several others listened, he asserted, on an auxiliary telephone while the woman talked with Higgins and Farrow. No names were mentioned "but the conversation has significant intonations that convinced me," the Commissioner added.

"We are the ones who are victims of a frame-up," Higgins and Farrow declared. "Such things are among the penalties peace officers receive when they are diligent in trying to enforce the law. And we'll be able to convince the Commissioner and all concerned that we are being framed before it is all over."

Both Veteran Officers

Farrow and Higgins have been with the police department for a number of years. Higgins served for a time as special county investigator under District Attorney William McCray. He left that office last year to become a candidate for Sheriff.

Shelby S. Cox, formerly grand dragon of the Ku Klux Klan of Texas, is representing the policemen.

TERRELL WILL QUIT

Agricultural Commissioner Will Not Run Again

AUSTIN, July 24. (AP)—George B. Terrell, commissioner of agriculture for the past nine years, will not be a candidate for the office in 1931, he announced today.

The veteran office-holder said that he had informed friends that he would retire to his farm near Alto after completing his fifth term.

Representative Sam Bateman, of Gelina, recently indicated he would run for Terrell's post. Representative Henry Webb, of Odessa, and J. C. Albritton, of Yorktown, also were mentioned as candidates.

Fight Is Feature Of Testimony As Leahy Case Opens

Fists Swing Lustily When Lawyers Clash On Word Of Star Witness; Nobody Is Seriously Injured

Attorneys "Fired"

South Texas Rancher Tells Counsel To Go Home And Efforts To Exclude Him Are In Vain

(By Associated Press)

GEORGETOWN, July 24.—A brief but turbulent fist fight, and a dramatic moment in which the defendant sought to discharge his attorneys, marked the first testimony in the sanity hearing of Harry J. Leahy, under sentence of death for the slaying of Dr. J. A. Ramsey, of Mathis.

The fist fight occurred while attorneys were examining the first witness, Miss Amanda Davidson, of Taylor, whose affidavit that she believed Leahy insane won the defendant a stay of execution and a sanity trial.

Has Known Leahy Long

Miss Davidson, an attractive, smartly dressed woman of 30, testified she had known Leahy for eight or nine years and that his acts since his conviction, as well as his letters, had indicated his mind was unbalanced.

H. N. Graves, of the prosecution, on cross-examination asked Miss Davidson whether she knew that Leahy was married and yet received letters from him and then went on to ask her who had told her what to say from the stand. A carbon copy was produced which Miss Davidson identified as a transcript of what she had told defense attorneys she would testify.

E. B. Simmons, of San Antonio, then took the witness on redirect examination and attempted to show that the paper in question was a Leahy letter.

Governor Vetoes Plans For Lobby

Legislative Committee Not To Be Given State Funds For Trip To Capital On Vets Hospital Drive

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, July 24.—Asserting he was opposed to expenditure of state funds by legislators in a trip to Washington to lobby before congress, Governor Moody today vetoed the concurrent resolution under which a joint legislative committee of six would have requested congress to appropriate funds for a world war veterans' hospital in Texas.

Under the resolution each member of the committee would have been allowed a maximum expense account of \$250.

Is For Plan

"I think it would be a fine thing for the veterans bureau to establish such a hospital in Texas and I hope congress will accept recommendations of the director of the bureau and proceed to establish such a hospital in the state," Governor Moody said.

"We have 13 representatives in congress from the United States senate. I have faith in their ability to secure the location of such a hospital if the facts justify or make it necessary."

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He Faces Trial In Murder Case

Seven Jurors To Sit In Judgment Of Snook Chosen

Four Women, Three Men Selected As Trial Opens For Professor Charged In Death Of Co-Ed

(By Associated Press)

COLUMBUS, O., July 24.—Seven jurors, including four women, were seated tentatively at the opening today of the trial of Dr. James H. Snook, deposed Ohio State university professor, charged with first degree murder of Thea K. Hix, 24-year-old co-ed paragon.

"Emotional insanity" and self-defense were indicated as the probable basis of defense in the questions put to the prospective jurors by Snook's attorneys.

To the Commission

Against this defense the county prosecutor will attempt to prove the professor killed the girl "with forethought." Chester will use Snook's confession against him.

The confession said Snook and Miss Hix had been secretly intimate for several years, but that she had threatened to kill his wife and child.

During a quarrel, Snook said, he thought the co-ed reached for a gun and he beat her on the head with a hammer and then slit her throat "to end her sufferings."

Wears Same Suit

Snook appeared in court wearing the gray suit in which he was arrested June 15, two days after the killing.

Among the spectators were Dr. and Mrs. Melvin T. Hix, of Bradenton, Fla., parents of the slain girl. The court was hopeful tonight the panel of jurors would be completed tomorrow.

Bond Is Made In City Booze Case

Two men, Austin Beasley and L. J. Brown, Wednesday afternoon failed to make \$1,000 bond each, set in the court of Justice of the Peace G. R. Scott, as they were lodged in the city jail following the filing of charges earlier in the day of violation of the prohibition law. Another man, held on the same charges with the two, J. D. Sayers, was released upon posting a bond of \$1,000.

The three were arrested Tuesday night about 11:30 in a raid by officers of the sheriff and police departments, made on a filling station about one and one-half miles north of Tech campus on the Littlefield road. A quantity of liquor was seized.

Simple Ceremony Proclaims Peace For All Nations

Occasion Marked By Naval Curtailment Promises On Part Of Both Britain And United States

Officials Present

Hoover, Coolidge, Kellogg And Other Dignitaries On Hand As Peace Pact Goes Into Effect At Capital

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, July 24.—The Kellogg-Briand treaty for renunciation of war was proclaimed today by President Hoover at a simple White House ceremony with the occasion made more auspicious by promised delay or curtailment in naval construction by the United States and Great Britain.

Before the distinguished gathering met to hear the President, word was received of Premier MacDonald's announcement to the house of commons the labor government had decided to suspend some naval building.

Suspend Ship Building

Later even more significance was attached to the formal putting of the treaty into effect by revelation through Mr. Hoover that the laying down of three American cruisers would be suspended, "until there has been an opportunity for full consideration of their effect" upon the final agreement for peace with Great Britain that he expects to be reached.

In the impressive ceremony in the historic East Room of the White House, the chief executive congratulated "the entire world" upon "this additional instrument of humane endeavor for the sake of peace represented by the Kellogg-Briand pact."

Gathered around a three-sided green-covered table as the president spoke were former President Coolidge, in whose administration the treaty was signed.

Chicago Loop Is Shaken By Bombs

Windows Are Shattered As "Pineapples" Explode In Business Section; Reason For Blasts Lacking

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, July 24.—The South end of the loop was rocked by explosion of a bomb late tonight. Windows of the Davis Company Department store, and in the Lytton, Steger and Kimball buildings were shattered.

The bomb had been placed in an alley entrance to the Davis Company store, just south of Jackson boulevard. A garbage collector unknowingly had tossed the bomb, wrapped in a small package into his wagon. The explosion followed.

Almost at the same time a bomb exploded in an alleyway between Michigan boulevard and Wabash avenue, on 22nd street. Dozens of windows in the Equitable Trust company building on Michigan avenue were broken.

CHICAGO, July 24.—Death today claimed the second participant of a gun fight here last night, James D. Reynolds, 45, dying without making a statement regarding the shooting that also caused the death of J. R. Walraven, veteran Texarkana policeman.

Walraven died soon after the shooting, which according to witnesses, occurred when Reynolds drove up in an automobile and fired a shot into the officer's body. The policeman returned the shot and Reynolds was wounded.

PASSAIC, N. J., July 24.—The Hobart Trust company, beset by many difficulties during the past year, was closed with its two branches, the Service Trust company and the Merchants' bank, today by the State Department of Banking and Insurance.

Frank H. Smith, commissioner of the banking department, ordered the suspension of the bank's activities upon the discovery of an impairment of capital to the extent of \$300,000.

"The situation is chaotic," Smith said.

117th Summer Is One Too Many!

GUTHRIE, Okla., July 24. (AP)—Tommy Sloan, who has weathered 116 summers, has found this one too much for him. Tonight he was at the home of his step-daughter, Mrs. M. R. Nickens, here critically ill. Until about six weeks ago, when age appeared to get the upper hand, Sloan had been active about the streets of Guthrie, and at fairs, selling pictures of himself for spending money, none of which, he said, was used for either tobacco or liquor. He never has used either, he said. Sloan was born in Mourne Shore County, Down, Ireland, December 25, 1812. Military authorities rejected him because of his advanced years in the Civil war.

Texas And Robin Planes Continue Record Assaults

Neither Ship Shows Signs Of Faltering As Motors Grow Wealthy

(By Associated Press)

ST. LOUIS, July 24.—Without visible signs of faltering, the monoplane, "St. Louis Robin," and its sturdy pilots, Dale (Red) Jackson, and Forest O'Brien, drove on toward new fame tonight as they neared the end of their twelfth day of sustained flight.

They left the old endurance record of the "Angeleno" more than a full day behind them. In good spirits they were confident of passing the 300 hour mark. They hoped to keep going for 500 hours. At 11 p. m. they had been up 280 hours.

Fear For Motor

The motor seemed to observers of the flight to be drumming smoothly, despite Jackson's statements that several cylinders "act like they had the tooth ache."

For each hour they reeled off in excess of the former record, Jackson and O'Brien were assured of receiving \$110, and tonight they had earned more than \$3,000.

The motor was to be sold by St. Louis firms and the makers of the Challenger motor with which the plane is powered.

Passes 16,000 Miles

Upon passing its 275th hour the "St. Louis Robin" had traveled more than 16,000 miles, consumed more than 2,300 gallons of gasoline, more than 105 gallons of oil, and the propeller had revolved more than 20,000 times.

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All-Texas Tour To Carlsbad Caverns Starts Next Week

Motorcade Will Leave Marshall And Come Through State To Scenic Spot; Itinerary Is Given

(Special To The Avalanche) LAMARCA, July 24.—Motorcaders who make the All Texas Tour which starts at Marshall, August 1, will have an opportunity of visiting the Carlsbad Caverns according to Wm. A. Wilson, of Lamarca, secretary of the Dal-Paso Cavern Highway association and who is in charge of the tour.

Thirty miles southwest from the city beautiful is "The Dream of the Ages," the world's largest and most magnificent Carlsbad Cavern! More than forty years ago according to old timers, tiny bats attracted attention to a great opening from which they came forth to feed. A few drops of ninety feet for many years prevented man's entrance into the cavern. Later, Jim White, the veteran explorer and chief guide, lowered himself on a rope into the earth's bottom and over a period of years explored its innermost recesses and brought back stories of marvelous formations within the apparently inaccessible grottoes of the cave. Now one of the most celebrated caverns, world tourists, art connoisseurs, writers and even lexicographers who have explored the subterranean passages of this newest of national monuments, find themselves helpless to describe the wondrous formations and the unbelievable magnitude of the great cave. In the language of a mineralogist of 25 years service with the government, there is but one explanation applicable to the cavern, namely, the first words to pass over the first telegraph wire, "What Wonders God Hath Wrought!"

Receives Many Visitors
The National Park Service on April 1, 1926, assumed control of the monument and at the close of the year 11,741 visitors had seen the wonderful structure. In 1927 and 1928, there were 29,034 and 46,222 visitors, respectively. Estimated attendance for the current year is 65,000 visitors and probably 100,000 visitors annually hereafter. Electric lights and easy comfortable walks offer to the visitor a day of wonderment unlike any other experience.

An added attraction of the Carlsbad community is the fresh mineral water bathing beach attraction only a few minutes' drive from the main business district, and summer tourists on their return to Carlsbad from the Cavern Trip, find their way to the lake for a plunge in the waters of the Carlsbad mineral spring. Carlsbad is also known for its hospitality. Recent discoveries of potash within a few miles from the beautiful, and increased activity in oil development, likewise have given the city a place of unusual prominence.

Itinerary Is Set
The itinerary for this tour according to Wilson is August 1, Marshall, Longview, Mineola, Grand Prairie, Willis Point, Breckenridge, Anson, Robery and Snyder, and second night Snyder; August 2, Gail, Lamarca, Seminole, Hobbs, and Carlsbad, N. M. (spend night Carlsbad); Sunday, August 4, visit Carlsbad Caverns National Monument; spend fourth night in Carlsbad; August 5, leave Carlsbad for El Paso while the party will break up with entertainment at the El Paso Chamber of Commerce. According to Wilson, in charge of the tour, many notable and prominent citizens from all parts of the state will be in this tour.

President Hoover Will Use Commissions Plan In Work

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, July 24.—President Hoover believes special commissions for inquiry the best method for determining the facts on any public question and he intends to pursue a policy of naming such groups throughout his administration.

Replying today to a question of a newspaper correspondent whether

he proposed to name any more commissions, the president replied, "I certainly do." He added, however, that he had no more specific inquiries in mind at this time.

Both the chief executive and his cabinet members have followed this method of fact-finding since the administration took office. President Hoover named a commission to study law-observance and enforce-

ment and another to inquire into child welfare. Secretary Wilbur appointed a commission of outstanding educators to study education. Secretary Hyde named a body of plant specialists to inquire into the Florida fly menace, and Secretary Lamont appointed fourteen business men and economists to help formulate plans for taking the first national census of distribution in 1930.

Seminole School Granted Credits

Five Additional Units A Accredited Institution As High School Is Increased To Four Year Course

(Special To The Avalanche) SEMINOLE, July 24.—Reports from the State Department of Education to the Seminole school authorities state that the high school in this city has been granted five additional units of affiliation and the classification of school raised from a three year to a four year high school.

Affiliation was secured recently in third year English, one unit each in Ancient History, American History, General Science, and Book-keeping. Last year the school secured credit in five and one-half units, thus the total now stands at 10 1/2 units secured in two years time. Prior to that time the school had no affiliation or classification.

School Is Expanded
In addition to securing four year classification and affiliation in two years time the school has this year been expanded by direct consolidation of seven surrounding districts until the district now has a total area of 425 square miles, one of the largest in area on the South Plains. Seven transportation lines will be operated by the school. Four new trucks with modern bus bodies were ordered last week by the school board for immediate delivery to supplement the present equipment. There will be ten teachers for the next school year. Vocational agriculture and home economics are both taught and a commercial department has been installed. Additional building space is to be provided to care for the increased enrollment due to consolidation and the anticipated further increase due to the development of the Hobbs oil field, 25 miles to the west, as well as to the increased settlement of this immediate section.

LUBBOCK AND SINO-RUSSIA

MOST of us have been informed—albeit by long, colorful editorials and speeches—that the world is growing smaller.

By the statement "the world is growing smaller" the writer and speakers upon the subject mean, of course, that people everywhere are becoming more cosmopolitan; that our more rapid and general means of transportation, our world-wide system of telephone and telegraph wires, not to mention radio, are making of the peoples of this sphere one great family.

The Morning Avalanche, of course, has heard these and similar statements and has noted, more or less disinterestedly, the editorials. But like most people, this newspaper has never given the matter much time or much serious thought—that is, until the past few days.

When the war drums began rolling in far off Manchuria the attention of the Morning Avalanche was forcibly called to the fact that as never before people everywhere are interested in people everywhere else. Citizens of Lubbock, Texas—clear around the world—are showing an active interest in the dispute along the Russian-Chinese borderland. They call the newspaper office day and night to ask "What are they doing in Manchuria?" They talk about the threatened war in barber shops and in restaurants in offices and on the street. And the threatened war mind you, is thousands of miles away and concerns peoples in which we on the South Plains haven't the slightest bit of personal interest!

Fifteen years ago a pitiful arch-duke was slain by a pitiful radical. As a direct result, three years later, thousands of American boys lay down their lives for a principle. That taught America a lesson. The world's problems are America's problems. The problems of Russia and China have become the South Plains problems.

Aside from the unusualness of the situation, there is another important angle to the situation. It is the angle that the world, at large, is interested in preserving peace. When the people of America become interested in the troubles of Sino-Russia, they are interested to the extent of keeping a close touch with every troublesome move therein—the force of the world-wide desire for peace is brought home to us—emphatically. More important, more far-reaching than solemn pacts and high sounding phrases of diplomats is the interest being shown and it speaks a vast power against bloodshed by nations.

The Avalanche doesn't fool itself by thinking the people of Lubbock and the South Plains are particularly interested in whether or not the Chinese and Russians lay each other along the Manchurian border. We don't care about it, generally speaking, but we do care when we stop to consider that in shooting each other the Chinese and Russians may force the world—and us as a part of it—into deadly conflict.

So it is a good sign and tribulations of peoples foreign to us in every regard. It means that America, in this instant typified by this city and section, does not intend to be unnecessarily drawn into another conflict.

A NATION OF READERS

Some well-known intellectuals question the high plane of the American's taste for reading matter but they can not deny that the American reads more than the other peoples of the world.

Government statistics disclose that there are 20,000 newspapers in the United States and that the country's book business last year was \$130,000,000. The nation consumed 10,000,000 tons of paper last year. In the face of these amazing figures none can complain that Americans do not read enough. If we don't all read classical literature all of the time we at least read and that is a healthy sign.

A comparison of paper consumption reveals that more paper is required for the United States than for all of the rest of the world and that this country's consumption per capita is more than twice as great as that of the next largest user of paper.

The population of the United States has not kept pace with the paper consumption since 1890. Some idea of the growing demand for paper and reading matter is supplied by data showing an increase of four hundred per cent in paper consumption since 1890.

Invariably when the subject of paper consumption is brought up for discussion someone predicts that unless there is immediate curtailment the country's timber source for paper will be exhausted within the current century. In answer to these alarmists a recent federal bulletin announces that America's lumber industry has become so vast that its waste is adequate for the manufacture of the country's entire paper supply. Paper can no longer be charged with the destruction of America's majestic forests.

Readers and nature lovers can both rejoice in the news that the country is doing more reading and restoring more timber than ever in its history.

CONTROL NEEDED

Henry Ford believes in the efficiency of one big power trust for the entire country, and compares its possibilities to that of the postal system. Combination of electric and producing interests is in the interest of efficiency, to be sure.

But if and when it shall be formed and during the process of its formation, there is need of careful supervision and strong control in order that public and individual rights shall be protected. There can be no monopoly more vitally affecting public interest, or whose control over rates and service is of more consequence to public welfare than a monopoly which controls the supply of motive power.

One big corporation may be the solution of the power problem, but the key to its efficiency is adequate control.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

PRESIDENT WON'T HAVE TO WORRY, EVEN IF SUNDAY OBSERVANCE LAW IS ADOPTED IN NATION'S CAPITAL

WASHINGTON, July 24.—Secretary Linn Gale, of the National Association opposed to Blue Laws, surely cannot have understood the real object behind the recent appeal by Bishop James Cannon, Jr., Canon William Sheafe Chase and other strict Sunday observance advocates to President Hoover to use his great influence in favor of a weekly day-of-rest code with teeth in it for the District of Columbia.

If he had, it is hard to believe that he would have referred to their plea as "audacious."

He would have had to admit that they presented it mightily tactfully.

At any rate, such is the opinion expressed to me by persons who advised members of the delegation of 17, in advance of their visit to the White House, concerning the most diplomatic fashion of slipping to the president the hint they wished to convey to him without hurting his feelings more than seemed absolutely necessary.

In brief, it appears that the 17 sought to leave on the presidential mind—in a general way, of course, an idea of their belief in the urgent desirability of a tight Sunday law on Washington—but, more particularly, an impression of their strong disapproval of week-end fishing excursions.

That Mr. Hoover actually fishes on Sunday never has been explicitly announced.

However, there is no question that he leaves the capital pretty regularly on Saturday, for his fishing lodge at the headwaters of the Rapidan, or for Secretary Lawrence Richey's Catocin Furnace estate where fishing certainly is available, and generally does not return until Monday.

Incidentally it has not yet been forgotten that Mr. Hoover, while still president-elect, attended the Sunday race in Rio de Janeiro, in the course of his Latin American tour.

From what I can learn, an assurance by the president that he simply rests on Sunday, but does no fishing, would have been satisfactory.

Of if he has fished hitherto, but had committed himself to an unqualified declaration in opposition to Sunday amusements, I am told that it would have been interpreted as a pledge to do no more of it in future.

The past—including the Rio de Janeiro incident—was not to have been raked up in such an event, as I understand the matter.

What the Sunday observance folk will do now remains an open question.

In any case, a vigorous campaign for a drastic Sunday observance law for the District of Columbia will be launched immediately following the opening of the regular session of congress.

Not only will there be a demand for the closing of all mercantile establishments in the District—such as drug stores, soda fountains, cigar stands and even "fixing stations." The publication of Sunday newspapers will be banned, if possible.

The observance forces will not stop with an attempt to prohibit movies and baseball games like golf, on private links, will be attacked.

The purpose of the crusade, as explained by Representative William Lankford of Georgia, who has fought for the passage of such a bill in several past congresses, is to furnish a "model law" for the entire country.

Presumably the Georgian will lead the legislative effort at the coming session, having had so much experience.

Washington, it may be remarked, emphatically does not want the law.

Temperamentally, the city is wide open. It has objected so vigorously to past "Lankford bills" as to out-and-out fastidiously, more than once, in congressional committee rooms where they were under consideration.

President Hoover will not be bothered, anyway—if he does fish on Sundays, and if he proves balky.

The Rapidan and Catocin Furnace both are well outside the District.

Your Health

DIET IS IMPORTANT IN TREATING GALL BLADDER DISTURBANCES

Thirty or forty years ago one heard little indeed of disturbances of the gall bladder. Now the gall bladder is one of the first organs to be investigated in the presence of complaints of indigestion, of pain coming on after eating, of eructation of gas and of similar disturbances.

Some of the most difficult diagnoses that physicians have to make are concerned in differentiating between inflammation of the gall bladder with or without gall stones, various forms of jaundice, ulcers of the stomach and duodenum, appendicitis acute and chronic, and other disturbances of the organs that lie within the abdominal cavity. Most of these disturbances come on just after middle life and it is quite commonly recognized that the type of patient most given to disturbances of the gall bladder is the woman known as "fat, fat and forty."

The only absolutely efficient treatment of inflammations of the gall bladder when stones are present is surgical removal of the stones and usually of the gall bladder. Under such circumstances such storage of bile as is necessary is taken up by the common duct which carries the bile from the liver to the intestines.

If conditions are not serious it is customary to prescribe for the patient what is known as a gall bladder diet, avoiding substances that seem to have the tendency of increasing the amount and the thickness of the bile.

Thus the person suspicious of gall bladder inflammation avoids fats, greasy soups, cream and butter and all foods rich in fat and cholesterol, such as eggs, brains, fried meats, goose and duck, liver, kidneys and spiced foods. He is told to avoid alcoholic liquors, and to eliminate the condiments, such as spices and chow chow.

Usually such patients are overweight and must cut down starches and sugar and avoid over-feeding generally. Such people are usually what is known as good eaters and they greet this list of things to be avoided with heavy groans and lamentations.

They are then told that they may eat roast meats without fat, small amounts of cereals, cooked vegetables and fruits, skimmed milk, and water. The meats may include lean fish, lamb, chicken, quab and lean beef, and the desserts such substances as acid fruits, gelatines, cooked fruits and light puddings without cream sauces.

Not infrequently the attacks continue and the gall bladder has to come out anyway.

TERRITORY OF WYOMING

On July 23, 1890, the Territory of Wyoming was created by Congress. It became a state on July 10, 1890. The area now included in the state of Wyoming was acquired by the United States in the Louisiana Purchase of 1803. A small section in the southwest was obtained in the Mexican Cession of 1848.

First white explorers in Wyoming were Sieur de la Verendrye and his sons, who passed through while seeking trading posts in 1734-1741. White hunters visited Yellowstone in 1804. In 1807, fur trading posts were established.

The first permanent settlement, however, was built on Fort Laramie in 1804. Although thousands of settlers on their way to California and the Pacific Northwest passed through Wyoming, few of them settled within the state. A chain of government posts were built to protect travelers against the Indians who declared war on them in 1824.

Following a discovery of gold in 1867, South Pass City was founded. Cheyenne was laid out by the Union Pacific railroad in the same year. A year later, Congress established the Territory of Wyoming.

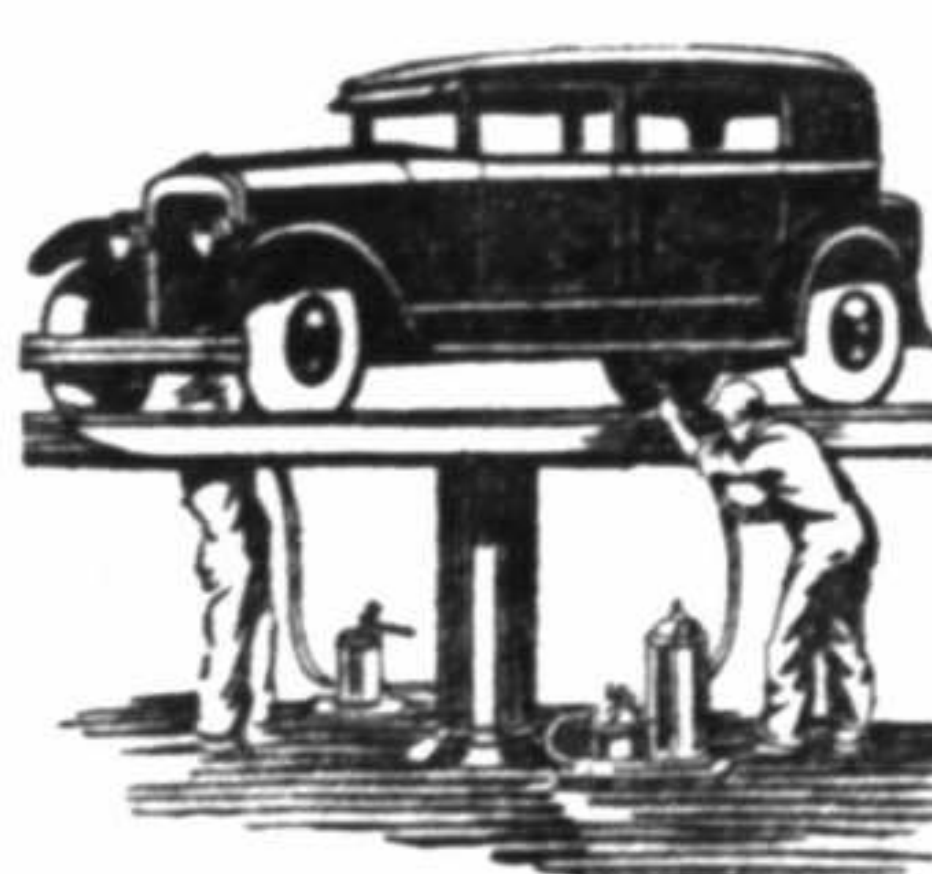
