FARM LABOR PROGRAM

Wallace Kimbrough, County Agent of Texas A & M College Extension Service

The cotton pulling situation does not appear as tight as it did this year last year when practically all of Texas made a good cotton crop. From the best reports I have been able to receive the cotton crop is very spotted over Texas. It is in Garza county. It looks as though West Texas is its fair crop will be able to pull about as many cotton pullers will be needed and probably as many are needed. There is some talk of attempting to put a ceiling on cotton pulling in Texas.

Apparently every farmer who has custom combining is finding a combine readily available. As a result of statewide publicity farmers are bringing their combines to the grain sorghum harvest in West Texas in large numbers. Some counties have reported more combines than they can use.

Since the Extension Service is charged with the Farm Labor program, they have Field Assistants working on both the cotton and the grain sorghum harvest. Any farmer needing cotton pullers or the services of a combine should get in touch with the County Agent who will assist in obtaining either. Please place your order a few days in advance to your need.

RATIONING CALENDAR

Meats, Fats—Red stamps AS through 28 and AS through 28, indefinitely.

Processed Foods—Blue stamps through 28 and AS through 28, indefinitely. Blue stamps through 15 become good September 1 and remain good indefinitely.

Sugar—Stamps 30, 31 and 32, good for five pounds after September 1 and remains good indefinitely. Sugar stamp 40, good for five pounds of canned sugar through February, next year.

Canned—A-12 coupons good through September 21.

Alcohol—Airplane stamps 1 and 2, good indefinitely.

Stabilization Of Cotton Price Made By Gov. Agencies

The War Food Administration and the Office of Price Administration have announced, jointly, a revision of the cotton price stabilization agreement, which was announced on April 24, 1943.

Under the original agreement, in lieu of a price ceiling on cotton, the War Food Administration agreed to offer for sale Government-owned or controlled cotton through the Commodity Credit Corporation in the open market when market prices reached parity.

Under this revision, which is effective until May 1, 1945, the Commodity Credit Corporation will not offer for sale any of the cotton owned or controlled by it except at prices which will not prevent cotton from averaging parity. For the present, this will mean that no Government owned or controlled cotton will be sold in the open market except at 50 points (1-2 cent a pound) above the parity price, this margin having been determined to be necessary, in view of the fluctuations of the market, to net a parity average. The margin of 50 points will not be reduced prior to May 1, 1945, unless the price of cotton should average above parity in an amount and for a period of time sufficient to raise a question as to the adequacy of manufacturing margins under ceiling prices that are being computed for major cotton textiles on the basis of parity prices for cotton. In that event, the sale price of cotton of the Commodity Credit Corporation will be reduced only in an amount sufficient to prevent the price of cotton from averaging above parity.

The two agencies have further agreed that no ceiling price is to be placed on raw cotton prior to May 1, 1945, below the price at which, under the terms of the agreement, the Commodity Credit Corporation will offer cotton for sale.

This action is taken in furtherance of the purposes of the law recently enacted by Congress that directs the President, acting through any department, agency, or officer of the Government, to take all lawful action to assure that the farm producers of cotton, and other basic and proclaimed agricultural commodities, receive parity prices.

Peaches To Arrive In Post On Sept. 18th

A 300 bushel truck load of peaches will arrive in Post on Monday, September 18, according to word from Mrs. Roy James, chairman of the Home Demonstration council marketing committee.

All persons who have registered for peaches should report to the Pure Food Market to receive them the day they will arrive. Chairmen of club marketing committees will act as cashiers for their particular community. Mrs. W. C. W. Morris and Mrs. Ray McNabb will act as distribution clerks.

Grocers in Post, it is understood, will also have peaches for sale that will come in on this truck from Denver. Peaches will be packed in bushel baskets.

Cash also raised the second bale of cotton from on top of the cap area. It was ginned on the 8th at the Close City gin as was the first bale.

Cash said he believed he would also have the third bale from that part of the county.

P-TA Year Book To Be Distributed At Opening Meeting

Year books cataloging the monthly programs of the Post High school P-TA for the 1944-45 school year are to be distributed to members when they assemble for the first meeting this afternoon at the High school auditorium. Mrs. Willard Kirkpatrick, chairman of the year book committee, will distribute the books.

The book, one of the most attractive ever styled by the organization, features a blue and red color note for the covering and carries information of value not only concerning the year's programs but information about the rules and regulations of the organization, list of officers and committees, Objects of Parent-Teacher Association, Parent-Teacher Prayer, etc.

Garza-Lynn County Oil Developments Still Progressing

There is still oil activity in Garza county with one small producing well and the drilling to be started on another in the western edge of the county.

Machinery has been placed for the drilling of an offset well to the Honolulu-Devonian discovery well, Payton No. 1, situated one-half mile east of the Garza-Lynn county line. This new well, known as Payton No. 2, will be a few hundred yards east of the first well.

The proved production of Payton No. 1 is about 110 barrels per day, cased off at 3544 feet.

In Lynn county drilling is progressing in two wildcats. Stuck pipe has been recovered from the hole of the Texas Co. No. 1 R. V. Tunnell six miles southeast of Tahoka and drilling is proceeding in lime at a depth of about 6100 feet.

The Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1-A Bertley well on the Gray tract nine miles east and two miles east and two miles north of Tahoka is drilling in lime at a depth of more than 5,000 feet.

Another test is to be made near Tahoka soon. D. D. Felman of Dallas, an independent operator, has announced his intention of drilling a well on the south east quarter of Section 312 in Block 3 EL & RR RR Survey, which is four miles west and one mile north of Tahoka in the T-Bar pasture.

The name of the contractor has not been announced but drilling is to begin about October 1. The test will be drilled to a depth of 7,500 feet.

College Building Fund Drive To Be Sponsored By Women

A campaign is in progress to raise a fund of \$125.00 for the erection of a Bible-Science building at Wayland College in Plainview, to be built as soon as materials are available. Sponsors for this campaign are the Baptist women of the plains of Texas.

This project and its related plans are being presented at each associational meeting in districts nine and ten. The first of these meetings was held at Calvary Baptist church, Lubbock, on August 31 when the Women's Missionary Union met in annual session.

Mrs. J. H. McClain of Ralls has been appointed director of the drive and spoke at this meeting. She has also conferred with associational presidents about incorporating this drive into the plans of the churches.

Mrs. McClain, in communication with the Dispatch, said "Wayland College is the only Baptist school in this part of the state, and more buildings are necessary to provide adequate teaching space. The general plan to raise this money is to fill stamp books and buy bonds for the college. All women and young people are urged to participate in this undertaking. The Bible Science building will be a memorial to the women of this part of the state."

The citation presented to his wife reads: "for exceptionally meritorious achievement while participating in five separate bomber combat missions over enemy-occupied continental Europe. The courage, coolness and skill displayed by officers and enlisted men on these occasions reflect great credit on the Armed Forces of the United States."

The Post Antelopes between 35 and 40 strong, have been undergoing rugged training, this week and last for the opening game of the season scheduled for the night of September 21st.

The squad for the major part is green and inexperienced. Only three boys have ever played ball previously, Superintendent Bearden, coach stated. Boys showing up for positions are Don Shirley, Jimmy Bird, Hugh Ingram and Harvey Mason for ends; Gene Carpenter, Holmes McLish and Mack Head for tackles; David Hunter, Harry Woods, Wayne Hundley and A. The first two weeks of practice has been spent in learning the fundamentals of the game such as blocking, passing and punting, etc. Intensive training will begin in the next few days on defense and offense plays and formations.

The first game is to be played on the home gridiron on the night of the 21st with Tahoka's Bulldogs. Motorists Should Apply For New 'A' Books Before Sept. 23

Motorists who have not yet made application for renewal of their "A" gasoline ration books are urged to do so immediately so that they will receive their new book before the coupons become valid September 22, the District Office of Price Administration said Monday.

Effective September 15, the requirement that tire inspection records be presented when making application for gasoline or tire replacements is revoked. Drivers will not need their tire inspection records after they receive their new "A" books.

Each motorist will receive a new Mileage Rationing Record, which will thereafter serve as the record of gasoline rations issued, it was explained.

recently discharged soldier
described how he felt.

Now he and many hundreds like
him are returning home, some
without legs or arms, others just
tired and confused, and all with a
fatigue and oldness earned in the
jungles and deserts of the world's
far places.

To what are they returning?

First of all, they're returning to
the love and understanding of
their homes. They're coming back
to enjoy the clean sheets and good
meals of which they've been
dreaming. Most important, they're
returning to resume a dozen new
responsibilities which give mean-
ing to all they've endured.

They want to be good citizens,
good husbands, good sons. They
want to take up their regular
lives where they left them, to
shrug off the tiredness of battle
and win the victories of peace.

They need help in doing this.
Not just financial assistance, but
also a "Welcome Home" feeling

sign on your heart.

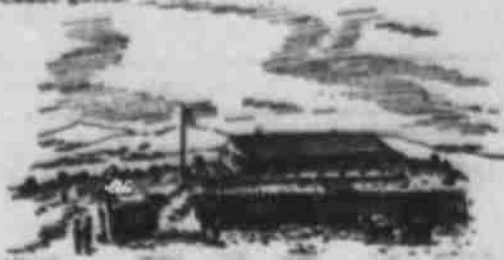

Highlights On Life Of "G.I." Correspondent Ernie Pyle

Editor's Note—Many are the
favorable comments received
since Ernie Pyle's column was
added to the Dispatch as a
weekly feature. As this "G. I."
correspondent is one of the
world's most popular writers
both on the war front and the
home front, the editors are pre-
sents a few facts concerning
his life that we believe will be
of interest to our readers. The
data was compiled by Mrs. John
Cearley.

Ernie Pyle is called the No. 1
War Correspondent by Lieut. Gen.
Sommers and he received the
Pulitzer prize for his masterful
reporting of war happenings.
More and more people are read-
ing his column, not only because
he shares the hardships but be-
cause his writings are so very
personal, like letters home.

One Garza County boy in
answering his mother's query said
"I am following Ernie Pyle." May-
be other boys have mentioned him
so if you would like to know some-
thing of the personal life of the
man with the slight frame, sage
head and big heart, Ernie Pyle,
here are some facts.

Ernest Taylor Pyle, son of Mr.
and Mrs. William C. Pyle, was
born 43 years ago on a farm south-
west of Dana, Indiana. When Ernie
was 18 months old the Pyles pur-
chased a place 2 miles south and
1 1/2 miles east of Dana. Mr. Pyle
still lives there. Ernie's mother
died in 1941, while he was in Eng-
land, and the house is kept now
by his aunt, Mrs. Mary E. Bales.

The school career of Ernie Pyle
began in 1906 in Dana but the next
year Helt Township School at
Bono was built and Ernie trans-
ferred there. He graduated with
the class of 1918. He enrolled in
a Naval ROTC unit but the Arm-
istice was signed before he
reached the Great Lakes Naval
Training Station.

Ernie wanted to travel but the

urge to be a journalist brought
him back to the farm to await
opening of the next year at In-

funds in Seattle, they signed on as
deck hands, only to find out, when
the team landed at Yokohama, that
they had to stay on the ship and
finish the trip to the Philippines
and Hong Kong.

Back at the university that fall
the call of the printed page got
stronger and he accepted a posi-
tion with the La-Porte (Ind.)
Herald-Argus. The University of-
ficials gave him permission to
complete work for his degree at
his leisure and so far there has
been none. In May 1923 the
Scripps-Howard Syndicate offer-
ed Ernie employment and he went
to work for the Washington News.
He has been with that paper in
various posts since except for one
year.

The passing of time has dis-
solved the community of Bono so Dana
claims him as one of its own favorite
sons. The Hoosier State and Hoos-
iers everywhere have climbed on
Ernie's bandwagon. He has been
proclaimed "Outstanding Hoosier
of 1944."

man; he only weighs 110 pounds
but he has as much stamina as

typewriter, he has transformed
himself into one of the folks at
home possessed of a million live
questions about G. I.s—their hopes

Home Cooking For The Boys Overseas

By Mabel Ann Manley, County Home Demonstration Agent

Tomorrow, September 15, is the starting date for mailing Christmas packages to boys and girls overseas.

Fruit cakes are first on any list when making up packages. Methods of making fruit cakes and the process used in canning were listed in the Sept. 7 issue of The Dispatch.

This week other items are listed for those who want to send canned goods. According to postal authorities, army officials and the men who receive the gift, canning goods is the only safe way to send gifts and be sure they will be in A-1 condition upon arrival.

Preserves is one of the most satisfactory products that can be sent. Use your favorite recipe. At the end of the cooking or if you reheat the preserves you can pour the preserves into R-Enamel cans. Fill cans full and leave no head space. Seal, and then invert the cans and let them cool in cold water.

Jelly should be handled the same way. Avoid handling jelly during the cooling period or it may not set properly. Once it is placed in the water do not move it until entirely cool. Another problem in sending canned jelly is the high temperature the containers may be held at during transportation.

If you wish to send cookies they may be canned too. Cookies made by recipes containing molasses or honey keep well. Also butterscotch cookies are very good. Cookies which are made with dried fruits and nuts usually keep moist. The baked cookie should be packed in the can with a piece of waxed paper between every layer and tissue paper or popped corn filling in the extra space, seal the can and it is ready to go. Candies may be packed in the same way. Fruit-nut candies, peanut brittle, taffy, crystallized fruits are the best keeping candies. Candies containing chocolate should be avoided. It seems that the fat in the chocolate decomposes and the candy gets old.

Canned Chicken, barbecued chicken or beef needs no extra preparation to send and then there is chili and hot tamales for the boys that particularly like these foods.

The sending of eggs and potato salad is discouraged. These two products do not reach their destination in very good condition.

A good way to determine what food is the one to select a favorite of the man overseas and can it and send it. Sometimes it is black-eyed peas, sausage or maybe kraut.

As a rule it is not recommended to put pickles or relish in metal containers. The acid reacts with the can and causes hydrogen sprayers. However, pickles or relish will keep in R-Enamel cans if they are to be used within two or three months. If the pickles are thoroughly fermented or cured with heat to 170 degrees F before sealing. This usually takes 20 minutes in No. 2 cans when it is steamed in a water bath. If the pickles are not well cured or fermented, heat No. 2 cans for 30 to

35 minutes. In case you are canning freshly made relish pour into the tin can while it is boiling hot and seal. Cool cans as rapidly as possible. Wash the outside to remove any acid or brine which may cause corrosion.

Directions for preparing and canning vegetables, as well as fruit cake, meats, crystallized fruits, jams, jellies and preserves can be obtained from the office of the county home demonstration agent.

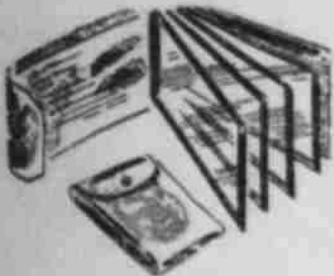

The remainder of the cargo was chiefly Red Cross Christmas packages for American prisoners of war, to be sent into Germany by a similar route.

POST-WAR CONSUMPTION TO BE HIGH IS OPINION OF RESEARCH EXPERTS

An estimated domestic consumption of 10 million bales a year may be achieved after the war with the aid of research to develop markets.

It is predicted that increased efficiency in the manner of manufacture of cotton goods and new products made from cotton fiber will aid in developing new civilian markets. Pre-war domestic consumption has averaged from five to six million bales annually.

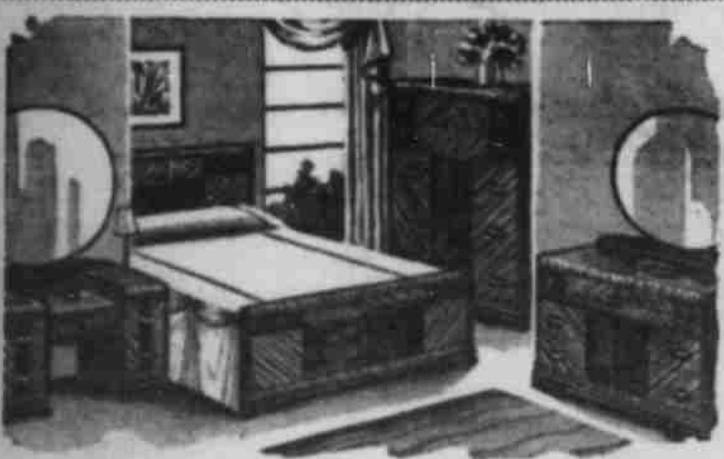

"Keep 'em Growing" Says Geo. Samson As Sept. Hints Given

September is an important month in garden affairs, says Geo. Samson, the Scotchman, who has the reputation of having a green thumb. He has given flower garden enthusiasts some pointers on work that should be done this month to insure future flower gardens.

Peonies—This is a good time to plant peonies. Since peonies can remain in a flourishing condition for several years without disturbance, preparation for the soil should be deep and thorough. A liberal application of rotted manure thoroughly mixed in the soil before planting will do much good and no harm. Plant so that the buds are covered two inches. Pick a spot that gets sun for the greater part of the day.

Irises—Varieties of bearded and Japanese iris are often divided and replanted immediately after flowering, but this is also a good time to do the job. Be very careful in the selection of divisions.

Bulbs—Few hardy bulbs give more satisfaction than the narcissus in its varying forms. Place in shrub borders, cover with six inches or more of soil, depending on the size of the bulbs.

Chrysanthemums—Hardy "Mums" are useful to prolong the floral display in the flower garden, especially in protected spots. When transplanting water well a day or two in advance of lifting if the soil is dry. Lift roots carefully with a ball of soil around them, soak well after transplanting.

Home gardeners will be wise to order all their bulbs as early as possible such as tulips, narcissus, daffodils, etc. Those who are not particular about varieties should give the dealer a second choice or the option to supply the best he has in the colors ordered.

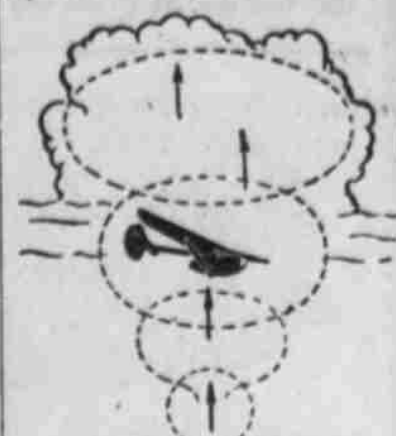


PLANE TALK

BY Rowland Burdick

Soaring in a sailplane is sustained flight without an engine. It is a fascinating sport which was rapidly becoming popular before the war. Any thought that hilly country is necessary for soaring, may be dispelled as the American distance record of over 250 miles was made in the air over the plains of Texas and Kansas.

Soaring is possible because winds blow up from the earth's surface as well as across it. It is these vertical wind currents which propel a sailplane. Warm air which develops on the earth's surface as a result of light reflection continually seeks a higher level and the currents

which result are known as thermals. These air currents or thermals join others in forming large masses of warm air that rises like bubbles to a higher altitude. As these masses rise they cool off and if moisture is present clouds develop. One learns to recognize these clouds as a signal to soar beneath them.

Soaring, then, is not a question of locality, as many people believe but the sport of seeking thermals.

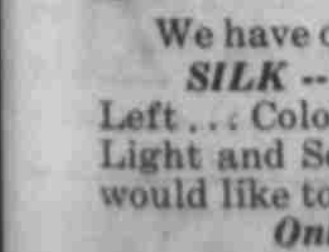

A LOOK INTO THE FUTURE FORECAST BY WORK OF AIR FREIGHT SYSTEMS

For those persons who are looking to the future of air traffic the following news story on Air Cargoes will forecast just the type of freight traffic that might in a few years from now be as common and everyday occurrence as the motor freight or railroad freight systems.

Air cargoes totaling approximately 22,000,000 pounds were flown from remote corners of the world during the period from January 1 to June 30, 1944, over a global aerial freight system, for the benefit of the United States and our Allies, chiefly Russia and Britain, says the Office of War Information. The report was based on data supplied by the Foreign Economic Administration, the War Production Board, the War Department and the Navy.

Daniel Baker College To Reorganize

Trustees of Daniel Baker College at Brownwood have approved a plan whereby it will be made into a self-help college.

Several small industries will be established by the college where students will be employed and will earn their way through school.

The board also voted to elect a new president and a new financial secretary who have had experience in operation of this type of school. Dr. Thomas H. Hart, college president now, will remain on the faculty, but he had recommended that the board secure a president experienced in the administration of a self-help school.

Daniel Baker was established in 1889 under the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A., and became an independent Presbyterian college in 1930. Under this new plan, tuition will be free, except for small fees. No student will be accepted who is financially able to pay his way through college. All students accepted will be guaranteed work to pay most of their expenses of board, room and fees.

BLUE TOKENS—FAREWELL

If you've got some blue tokens in your purse, better use them now because after September 30 they will be good only for the kids to play with. Until next Sunday, the Office of Price Administration says, you can use them just as you always have used them. Beginning Sunday, September 17, retailers will cease giving blue tokens to consumers as ration change, and shoppers will be able to spend them only in groups of 10. If necessary, shoppers may pool tokens to make up groups of 10. Removal of practically all canned and bottled vegetables and fruit spreads and specialties from rationing September 17 makes use of blue tokens unnecessary. Beginning September 17 point values on canned fruits, canned juices, canned tomatoes, catsup and chili sauce will be designated in multiples of 10.

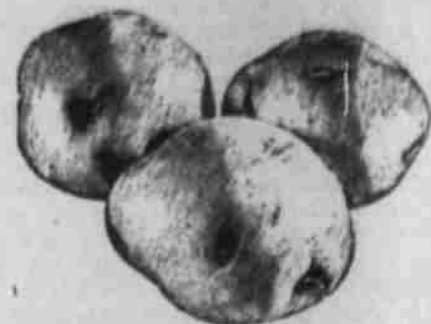

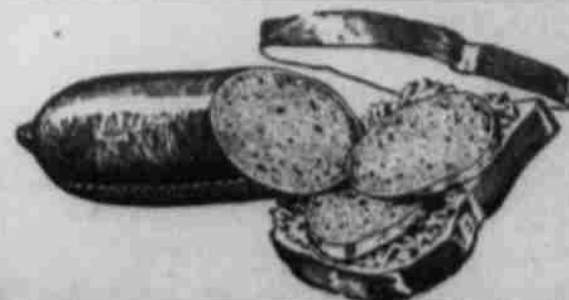
