BURLESON WILL PROCEED TO ACT

INTENDS TO ENFORCE NEWSPAPER PUBLICATION LAW, DESPITE AGREEMENT

INJUNCTION NOW SOUGHT

Test of Law's Constitutionality to be Made Following Suit Filed by Papers Tuesday

By Associated Press. Washington, March 12.—Unless the supreme court restrains Postmaster General Burleson from enforcing the newspaper publication law as it was asked to do yesterday, Mr. Burleson will immediately enforce it regardless of the agreement by former Postmaster General Hitchcock to withhold action pending a determination of its constitutionality. Mr. Burleson made this announcement today.

Final notices have been sent to a number of publishers that if they don't furnish the information required within ten days their publication will be denied admission to the mails. Approximately 91 per cent of the publishers affected have filed their reports with the postmaster general and otherwise have complied with the law. The delinquents constitute about nine per cent and generally include the larger daily newspapers. It was pointed out today that Postmaster General Hitchcock before leaving office had on February 28 decided to terminate the agreement and had ordered postmasters to call upon publishers to submit their reports.

Suit Filed Tuesday
Counsel for the New York Journal of Commerce Tuesday applied to the supreme court to restrain Postmaster General Burleson from immediately enforcing the "newspaper publication law." Former Postmaster General Hitchcock had agreed not to attempt to enforce the law pending a prompt appeal to the supreme court from the decision of the federal courts in New York.

The request was based upon an agreement between counsel, the department of justice and the postoffice department last October that no action would be taken by the postoffice department to compel newspaper publishers to comply with the law or enforce any of its penalties until the supreme court had passed upon its validity.

Notified to Comply With Law
Robert G. Morris, counsel for the Journal of Commerce, in a statement to the supreme court declared that on March 4 the postmaster at New York had notified the papers that unless the statements required were filed at once he would enforce the penalties. Similar letters had been sent to other papers. Since March 4, Morris said, the postmaster general had informed him that unless the required returns were made on or before March 11 he would enforce the penalties which include disbarment from the mails. The law requires newspapers to file twice each year a sworn statement showing the names of their bondholders, security holders, stockholders, amount of daily circulation and to designate all paid-for articles as "advertisements."

The supreme court has had the validity of the law under consideration for several months, but has announced no decision.

Taken Under Adversement
The court took the motion of Mr. Morris under adversement.

Solicitor General Bullitt stated verbally that the government took cognizance of the motion but did not agree to all the statements Mr. Morris filed with the court.

Later Mr. Bullitt stated that his recollection was that the postoffice department had informally agreed not to enforce the law for a reasonable time but that it did not specifically agree not to enforce the law until the supreme court had passed upon it.

Warns Wilson Against "Crank" Reputation.

London, March 12.—President Wilson's teetotal policy at the White House has aroused the resentment of the London Standard, which editorially warns the President against "gaining the fatal reputation of a crank."

Other papers refrain from comment but the Daily Mail has taken occasion to ascertain that there are about 100 teetotalers in the British house of commons, and on this point remarks that President Wilson's ideas would not suit the majority of the British and Irish members.

Mexican Consul at Naples To Meet Porfirio Diaz.

By Associated Press. Naples, March 12.—The Mexican consul here has been instructed by the Mexican minister to Italy to go on board the steamship Adriatic on her arrival here tomorrow to greet Porfirio Diaz.

WITHDRAW REPRIMAND FOR CRITICISM OF JEW

Way is Cleared for Promotion of Frank Bloom, Whose Case Attracted Much Attention

By Associated Press. Washington, March 12.—One of the last acts of the Taft administration was the issue of a presidential order wiping off from the military record of Col. Joseph Garrard of the Fifteenth Cavalry commander at Fort Myer, Va., the reprimand administered to him because of his unfavorable impression upon the examination papers of Frank Bloom, a young Jewish private who was seeking a command. Garrard pronounced Bloom undesirable because of family conditions and religion. The effect of the presidential action is to clear the way for Bloom's promotion.

Wireless Messages Are Sent Over 7,000 Miles.

By Associated Press. Key West, Fla., March 12.—Captain Hlyden, commandant of the naval station, has a letter from Cairo, Egypt, saying that Lloyds wireless station there has several times copied messages sent by the Key West station. It is claimed this breaks all wireless records by more than 500 miles. The distance involved is more than 7000 statute miles.

ADRIANOPLE IS TOTTERING FAST

"I CAN HOLD OUT ONLY A WEEK LONGER," SAYS COMMANDER

ECHO OF NAZIM'S DEATH

Internal Troubles Still Brewing as Result—Priest Adds Fuel to the Flames

Balkan Conditions of Peace Excessive.

By Associated Press. Belgrade, March 12.—The allied Balkan nations have agreed to accept mediation of the powers but only on conditions whose acceptance is unlikely. According to unofficial announcements the consent is contingent on agreement of Turkey to surrender Adrianople and Scutari and the Aegean Islands and also to pay a war indemnity.

By Associated Press. Constantinople, March 12.—A despairing cry of "I can hold out only a week longer" was sent in cipher by wireless today from Shukri Pasha, Turkish commander of Adrianople to his superior officers here, according to unofficial reports.

Shukri who was held out many months against the hundreds of sergeants of the Bulgarians and Servians is said to have informed the Sultan that Adrianople is practically at the end of its supplies of food and ammunition and that there is much sickness especially scurvy and intestinal disorders. He urges that either peace negotiations be hastened or that an immediate attempt to relieve the city be undertaken from the Tchaudja line.

The Turkish ministry is undecided what to do and probably will have trouble in reaching a solution.

The disorder caused by the murder of the late Nazim Pasha continues to threaten internal trouble. At a service today in Nazim's memory the official priest pronounced a malediction on his assassins and "on those who have deceived the Sultan of Turkey, the head of the Mussulman faith."

Champ Clark Admitted to Supreme Court Practice.

By Associated Press. Washington, March 12.—Speaker Champ Clark was today admitted to practice before the supreme court. He was introduced by former Judge Sheppard Barclay of St. Louis, who vouched for his good standing and qualification as a lawyer. The speaker does not expect to practice before the court in the immediate future at least.

SINALOA REVOLTS AGAINST NATIONAL GOVERNMENT AND JOINS REBELS

AGUA PRIETA EVACUATED

General Ojeda and His Force of 400 Men Leave for Nogales—Quiet at Eagle Pass

Nogales, Ariz., March 12.—The state of Sinaloa, south of Sonora, has revolted officially against Huerta's national government and named a provisional governor according to reports of persons arriving today from Hermosillo. They also report that the Yaqui Indians of Sonora have volunteered to assist the insurgents.

Orozojo Jr. Leaves Torreon for Capitol.

By Associated Press. Torreon, Mexico, March 12.—Pascual Orozojo Jr., who expressed himself decidedly for peace left here for Mexico City at 2 o'clock this morning.

Rural Police at Nogales Threatened with Attack.

Douglas, Ariz., March 12.—General Ojeda and 450 men evacuated Agua Prieta at 9 o'clock today and began an overland march west to Nogales, where the rural police are threatened with attack. Each man carried all the arms and ammunition possible. The rest of the garrison equipment, arms and ammunition were left packed in cars.

Piedras Negras Shooting Causes General Stampede.

By Associated Press. Eagle Pass, Texas, March 12.—There is but little change in the local situation. Carranzites in Piedras Negras fearing an attack last night from railroad men and other refugees in Eagle Pass, placed several box cars on the railroad bridge and barricaded the Mexican end of the wagon bridge. However, nothing developed. A personal encounter at between two railroad at Piedras Negras yesterday in which one or two shots were fired and a horse wounded caused a stampede to the American side.

Conference at Austin on Oil Trust Cases.

Austin, Texas, March 12.—A conference was held Tuesday in the attorney general's office in regard to the receivership recently appointed by district court of Hunt county in the suit of the State against the Magnolia Petroleum Company and the Corsicana Petroleum Company.

Those participating in the conference were Attorney General Looney, First Assistant C. W. Cureton, Assistant C. A. Sweeton and W. B. Hamilton of Greenville, representing the State and George C. Greer of Beaumont, J. W. Terry of Galveston and Judge E. R. Cavin of Galveston, representing the defendants; also John Sealy of Galveston and E. R. Brown of Corsicana, defendants in the suits and Sam B. Brooks, the receiver.

The defendants will not contest the appointment of the receiver by the district court of Hunt county and hence the receivership will be maintained as inaugurated.

The conference was with reference to the proper policy that should be pursued by the receiver in the management of the business and properties of these concerns, and there was no dissent expressed by anybody from the idea that the business of these concerns should be so managed and its status maintained so as not in any sense to impair the same; that the employees, as at present engaged and upon salaries at present paid, should be retained by the receiver. In other words, that there should be no violent disruption of any contractual relations that existed at the time of the receivership.

New Daylight Wireless Records Established.

Gibraltar, March 12.—It was announced today that the United States scout cruiser, Salem, on her trip across the Atlantic to this port, set several new world records for consistent and reliable wireless communication by daylight.

The Salem was sent out to make tests with the high powered government wireless station at Arlington. She was able to send complete day messages to Arlington from distances up to 1,300 miles and receive from distances above 2,400 miles. Night transmission distances were considerably greater.

MEDICAL SOCIETY MEETS, SEVERAL PAPERS READ

Monthly Session of Local Physicians Organization is Held Tuesday Night

Hartsook, president of the society, presided. The meeting was opened with a paper on "Gangrenous Appendicitis," by Dr. Wade H. Walker following which reports of cases were made by Dr. Daniels and Dr. Everett Jones. Dr. McNew of Charlie, Texas, a member of the society, led a discussion on "Granulated Eyelids" in which discussion all the members present participated.

FRIEDMANN WILL MAKE HIS METHODS PUBLIC

Alleged Tuberculosis Serum Will be Given Publicity and His Secret Revealed

New York, March 12.—When Dr. Friedmann returns from Montreal, where he went to demonstrate his tuberculosis vaccine, he may reveal his secret.

"On my return from Canada," the doctor is quoted by his secretary as saying, "I shall deliver accurate and scientific lectures on the preparation and application of the vaccine. These lectures will be delivered before medical bodies."

Dr. Friedmann may also find Bellevue Hospital, the largest of city hospitals, opened to him for further demonstrations here when he returns. Dr. John F. Anderson, director of the hygienic laboratory of the public health service, has opened negotiations with the directors of Bellevue for the admission of Dr. Friedmann. This institution would provide a larger variety of cases than any other, it was explained. While the decision of the Bellevue authorities is pending, the Montefiore Home has decided to open its doors to Dr. Friedmann, and it was said he has accepted the welcome and will treat patients there. Mount Sinai Hospital, where Dr. Friedmann conducted tests for the Federal Health authorities, will, however, be first visited by Dr. Friedmann upon his return. The hospital has given notice that all fresh cases of tuberculosis of the joints or glands—meaning cases which have not been operated upon—will be treated without fee under the auspices of the public health service.

STEVEDORE'S FOREMAN BLAMED FOR EXPLOSION

"I'll Move That Box or Blow Up the Ship"—He is Declared to Have Said

Baltimore, Md., March 12.—Norris Price, a stevedore, testifying before the coroner's jury investigating the blowing up of the dynamite ship Alum Chine last Friday, declared that William Bomhardt, assistant foreman of the stevedores, was responsible for a first explosion which preceded the destruction of the boat.

Becoming angered at the manner in which the men were working, Bomhardt, according to the witness, muttered an oath, grabbed a cotton hook from a stevedore and swung it into a box of dynamite.

"There was a small explosion," said Price. "It sounded like a pistol shot, and then I saw smoke issuing from the hatchway. I did not stop to see any more, but jumped overboard."

The witness said the second explosion took place ten minutes later. Contradicting the testimony given last night by Capt. Ansley of the Alum Chine, Price said that the cargo of coal was first piled in the holds, planking laid on top without air space between and the dynamite boxes were piled on the planking. Capt. Ansley was called to the stand and denied this.

Capt. Bill McDonald North Texas Marshal.

Washington, March 12.—Senators Culberson and Sheppard agreed on Capt. Bill McDonald of Quanah for United States Marshal for the Northern District of Texas, to succeed United States Marshal Green of Dallas.

EXTRA SESSION MAY BE DELAYED

UNDERWOOD ASKS PRESIDENT WILSON TO POSTPONE IT A WEEK

CONSIDER ONLY TARIFF

Not Likely Any Other Subjects Will be Considered—Committee Will Need More Time

By Associated Press. Washington, March 12.—President Wilson was urged today by Representative Oscar Underwood of the Democratic House leader to postpone the date of the extra session of Congress at least one week. As a result of Mr. Underwood's suggestion recently, the president had fixed April 1 as the date. Mr. Underwood today advised the President that the ways and means committee would require more time in preparing the new tariff bills. Inasmuch as Mr. Wilson has said he would be guided by the counsel of House leaders it was regarded as practically certain today that the new Congress would not convene before April 7 or 8. Mr. Underwood discussed with the President the advisability of including anything more than the tariff in his first message.

Issue Proclamation Today.

The proclamation calling the new Congress probably will be submitted to the cabinet today. It is expected to point out that the extra session is for the purpose of revising the tariff alone. Mr. Underwood today assured the President that House leaders would be able to confine the attention of Congress to that subject although several Democrats interested in other legislative matters are still anxious to have them considered before the regular session in December. Mr. Underwood said the Democratic caucus will decide whether the tariff shall be revised in one bill or each schedule be taken up separately.

CHARGES FOLLOW THAW'S ALLEGED BRIBERY PLAN

Superintendent of State Prisons of New York Declines to Resign When Asked

Albany, N. Y., March 12.—Gov. William Sulzer, who since his inauguration, has had differences with Col. James F. Scott, superintendent of State prisons, has demanded that Scott resign. The latter refused and as a result will have to face charges which will be brought against him. Under the Constitution the superintendent may be removed by the governor upon charges, after an opportunity has been given him to be heard.

The friction between the governor and Col. Scott arose, it is said, when Scott refused to appoint Charles F. Rattigan, a member of the Democratic State committee, as warden of Auburn prison. Then came the Thaw bribery scandal, which included charges against the prison department and in which Gov. Sulzer's name was mentioned without his authority, the governor said.

Col. Scott, who is well known throughout the country as a prison official, was appointed to his present position by Gov. Dix.

MANY INDIANS JOININ CARRANZA'S REBEL FORCE

Are Being Stirred Up by Governor's Emissaries and May Take Part in Uprising

Monterey, March 12.—Federal troops are reported to have driven a large body of Carranzistas back toward Musquiz, after a fight on Sunday at San Salvador Bonavide, in Coahuila.

Envoys are said to be spreading the rebel propaganda among Kikatsi Kickapoo Indians, many of whom are flocking to Carranza's standard.

Gen. Trucey Aubert, with a column of Federal troops, has advanced to Barataria, sixty miles north of Monclova, and it is expected that he will attack Carranza's men at Musquiz shortly.

The city council of Torreon has been removed from office owing to the support given by its members to Madero. It has been replaced by a commission empowered by the government to use all available means for the pacification of the city and the surrounding country.

Gen. Mangel Blazquez has been named Military Governor of Coahuila.

ENJOINS COMMISSION IN CONTROL OF PIPE LINES

Commerce Court Grants Preliminary Order to Test Constitutionality of Recent Ruling

By Associated Press. Washington, March 12.—The commerce court today granted preliminary injunction restraining the order of the Interstate Commerce Commission in what are known as the pipe line cases. The constitutionality of the Interstate Commerce law as applied to all pipe lines in question.

Bryan's Bible Class Attracts Young Men.

Washington, March 12.—Secretary of State Bryan has been invited to take charge of the young men's Bible class in the First Presbyterian church Sunday school and in consequence the membership of the class is going up by leaps and bounds.

Mr. Bryan has not yet accepted, but the pastor of the church, the Rev. Dr. Donald McLeod, believes that he will do so.

The secretary of state long has been interested in church matters and has had a decided leaning toward the Sunday school. He is a personal friend of Dr. McLeod, who is urging him to undertake the work.

ALAMO CASE TO BE TRIED AGAIN

Supreme Court Grants Writ of Error in D. R. T. Controversy

Dallas Case Reversed

Former Tax Assessor Who Failed to Make Report Will be Given New Trial

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, March 12.—Application for a writ of error was allowed today by the supreme court in the Alamo case, which has created no little attention recently, both in the legislature and courts. The affair remains unsettled by action of the legislature. The House and Senate find no common agreement. The daughters of the Republic were granted an injunction restraining the superintendent of public buildings and grounds from interfering with them. They lost in the lower courts.

Dallas Case Reversed.

On the definition of official misconduct the court of criminal appeals today reversed the case of James Bolton of Dallas county. Bolton was tax assessor of Dallas county on December 1, 1911 and failed to make report showing the fees collected by him as required by law. He was found guilty in the Dallas county court and fined \$100.

The court held today that the county court had no jurisdiction in cases of this nature and ordered the case reversed and remanded to the district court.

Closing of Mine Forces Many Out of Work.

Eagle Pass, Texas, March 12.—A train load of railroad employees arrived here at 6 o'clock last evening from Monclova and other points. They report everything quiet at Monclova, and that Gen. Aubert's forces have apparently returned south. The suspension of traffic will force many coal mines to shut down and throw over three thousand miners out of employment. It is feared that this will result in many of the miners joining the revolution or in the formation of small bands of looters. The streets of Eagle Pass today resemble a large city on circus day.

Washington Government Hears Disquieting News.

Washington, March 12.—Dispatches to the war department indicate a serious condition at Piedras Negras, where the forces under Governor Carranza appear to be in full control. General Aubert, with federal cavalry, is reported near Monclova. The railroad near Piedras Negras has been abandoned by the central government and Carranza is trying to operate the line by impressing discharged employees. Inhabitants of Piedras Negras fear the town may be destroyed. It is reported that Carranza intends to take part of his force to Cuatro Cieneegas.

Derrick on Bywaters Well Is Destroyed by Flames

Fire yesterday afternoon destroyed a derrick belonging to John Dyson, drilling on Producers No. 14 Bywaters. The derrick and rig were almost a total loss, but the fire was confined to the rig. The cause of the fire was not learned.

KIRBY ANSWERS BAILEY ARTICLE

Bitterly Assails Magazine Which Criticized Former Texas Senator

DR. FRIEDMANN INVITE

Tuberculosis Cure May be Tested in Texas—Senate Confirms Several Appointments

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, March 12.—Representative John Henry Kirby today in a plea of personal privilege denounced in the bitterest terms, stories carried in the current issue of the Cosmopolitan, copies of which had appeared on the desks of members. Mr. Kirby declared:

"The inference from this publication is that I corrupted a United States senator. I cannot sit silently here when a charge involving such infamy is being read by members of this body. I have never corrupted nor attempted to corrupt, at any time or in any place, any man in either public or private life."

Denying that he had personal interests in legislation, he told the story of his employment of former Senator Joseph Bailey, referred to in the Cosmopolitan. He said that in 1901 he went to New York to look after Texas development projects. He found himself in the hands of an unscrupulous man and he needed help. He telegraphed Senator Bailey to meet him in New York, because he needed a fearless lawyer.

Says Bailey Not Rich.
"Senator Bailey came; the Kirby company paid Mr. Bailey \$15,000 and not \$225,000 as charged by the cosmopolitan who writes for this dirty, muckraking magazine."

Mr. Kirby denied the charges that Mr. Bailey is now a multi-millionaire saying that he is on his notes and knows what he is worth.

After the Kirby plea of personal privilege the House shimmered down and work was done in a hurry. At the instance of Mr. Kennedy a resolution was adopted inviting Dr. Friedmann with his tuberculosis serum tests to come to Texas.

The action of Representative Ross in refusing to doff his hat while smoking in the House, evidently bore fruit, for Mangum and others introduced a resolution which was referred to the rules committee, providing that there shall be no more smoking in the House in the future.

The Senate spent most of the morning in executive session confirming recent appointments which Governor Colquitt has made with the advice and consent of the Senate. Appointments on the state insurance board have not been confirmed.

The article to which Mr. Kirby referred appeared in the April issue of the Cosmopolitan. It was written by Alfred Henry Lewis, a well known political writer, under the title, "The Hon. (?) J. W. Bailey." That part of it which brings in Mr. Kirby's name, follows:

"The records indicate that Bailey cast other records upon the golden waters, always to see it return after not too many days. There was one Kirby of the Houston Oil Company and the Kirby Lumber Company. The lavish Kirby took the Austin witness stand and told how, in a mere handful of months, under one head or another, he paid Bailey, a tired of being poor and rapidly growing rich, a round \$225,000 and still owed that in-jurious publicist money. Bailey, too, had made a feast of his good fortune and bought the Grapevine ranch, a \$250,000 proposition and was eagerly acquiring trotting horses."

The article is in the nature of a review of Bailey's career in the national Senate, and contains very little of a complimentary nature. It deals in detail with the legislative investigation at Austin in 1906, after Bailey had been re-elected to the Senate. In summing up Bailey's services to the State and Nation, the article says:

"There is no law on the statute books which can be called better because of Bailey. What little he contributed to legislation was obviously bad."

Escaped Convict Has Been Located in Oklahoma.

Denton, Texas, March 12.—Ed Goss, who was given a ninety-nine year sentence here in August, 1910 on his plea of guilty to first degree murder, and who subsequently escaped from the penitentiary, has been found in Oklahoma, according to a telegram received here today.

Goss was indicted in Cooke county for the murder of Henry Davis, whose body was burned in an effort to destroy evidence.

AUTO ROAD FROM TEXAS TO COLORADO SPRINGS

Wichita Falls May be on Summer Tourist Route—New Mineral Wells Line

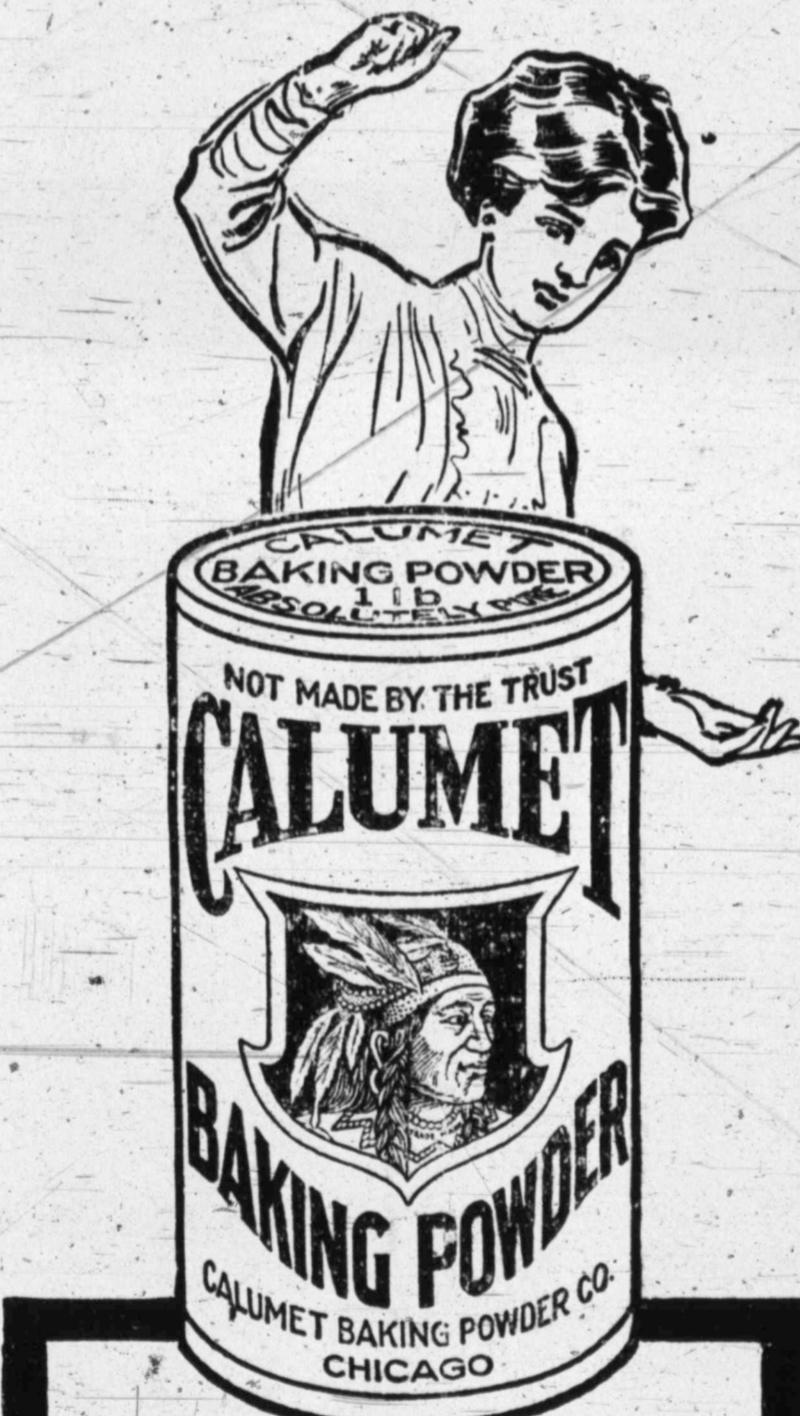

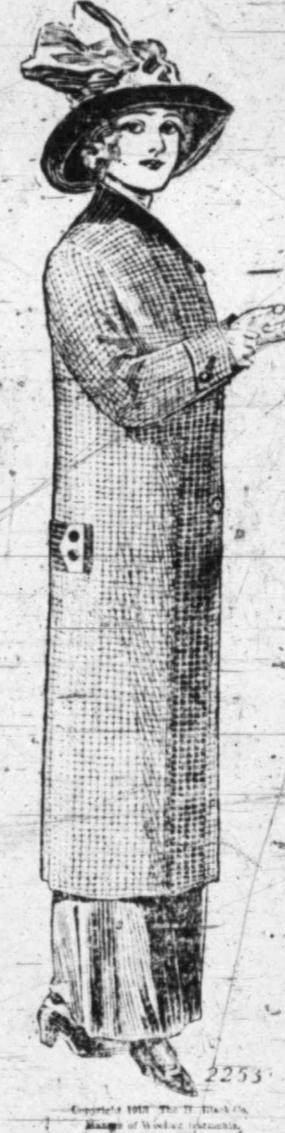

Texas is a great State, wealthy enough to pay all her public servants salaries that are in keeping with the offices they hold. But there are instances where the fees of some officers run into the thousands of dollars annually, and after paying all clerical and deputy hire, and every other expense imaginable, still have left a lump sum for the head of the office that, compared with the salary the governor of the state receives, is enormous. It may be that there is no remedy for this, but if not, it is a great pity.

The two senators from Florida who allied on President Wilson to present his applications of some office-seeking friends of theirs, were politely referred to the heads of departments under which the applicants expected to serve. This was a little unusual, and doubtless was somewhat of a slap in the face of the senators from Florida, who are both Democrats. But there was probably a reason for treating them that way. When Wilson was a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination he made a strong effort to get the vote of Florida lined up for him at the Baltimore convention, and perhaps would have succeeded had it not been for the efforts put forth by these two senators against him and in favor of Underwood. President Wilson is only showing them that he had a memory and could appreciate his friends. It was a gentle hint, if anything, that when the time arrived to distribute political favors in Florida he would call in his friends and advise with them.

Frank G. Carpenter, the world renowned traveler and writer, says in his latest letter written in the City of Mexico: Does Uncle Sam own Mexico? The question is startling, but it is one which the fingers of destiny are writing in letters of gold upon the sky of the financial universe. The answer is: "No, not now, but the time when he will own it is already in sight." This is a foregone conclusion, and it is independent of peace or war, as the following figures will show. We may not flaunt our title in the face of the world, and we may keep our controlling partnership quiet. But the facts are that we already own two-fifths of all the wealth of this country, and that it is a question whether our possessions are not already greater than those of the Mexicans themselves.

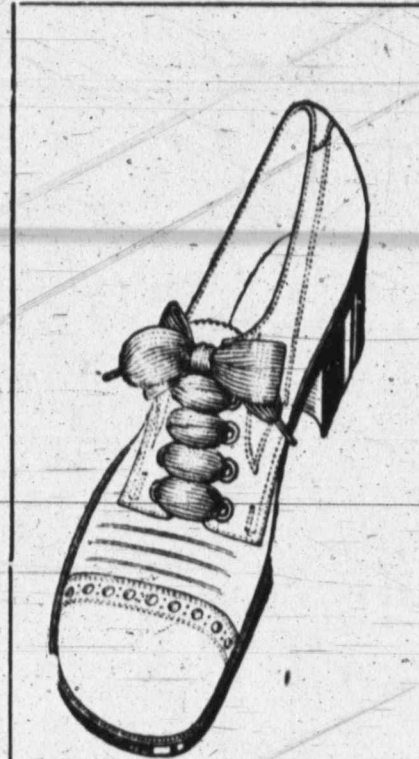
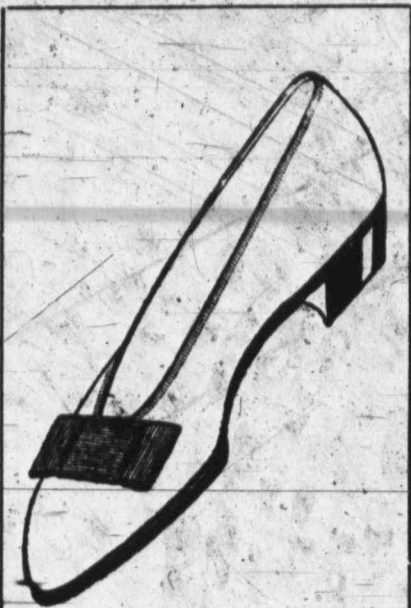

THE CAUSE OF WOMAN'S SUFFRAGE

Rev. Anna H. Shaw was last week given the degree of D. D. by the University of Kansas City, Mo. President D. S. Stevens said she was the first woman to whom this degree had been given by his university.

The Portland Oregonian says of the new state legislature: "Neither senators nor representatives are opposing any measures which will tend to be of assistance to the women. There is a noticeable tendency at this session to vote aye for all such bills. They all now have a new class of constituents at home from whom they are beginning to hear and who are heeding the new voice nobly."

The Cook county civil service commission has decided that Illinois women are eligible to the position of assistant to probate judges. A Chicago woman lawyer, Miss Frances E. Spooner, of 1203 City Hall Square building, appeared before the three attorneys for the commission and made so convincing a plea that all opposition was withdrawn and women will be allowed to take the examination.

Once more it seems as though Austrian women were nearing the first stage of their enfranchisement, i. e., the alteration of the associations laws, which forbids women taking part in political associations. A similar law existed in Germany till 1908, and the progress made by German women since its abolition has been enormous. As yet the new bill has only passed the lower house.

Phoenix is the first city in Arizona to try the commission form of government, writes Mrs. Frances Willard Munds. A committee of citizens has been selected to draft a model charter. Twenty-five women have been placed on this committee of 125, and women are on all the sub-committees. It is predicted that this committee will be referred to in the future of Arizona as the immortal 125.

Miss Lavana Dock, known as Little Dock on the recent Albany hike, is now making a pilgrimage through New York's East Settlement, where she lives, wearing a huge sign, one side of which announces to all voters who read Yiddish, "Every man will have to vote yes or no on woman suffrage in 1915." The other side is for the women. "New York state will give women the right to vote in 1915 if women demand it." And the East

Side is strong for suffrage. Miss Dock made this discovery on her first trip. The only objection is that two years is too long to wait. A push cart man voiced the sentiment of the crowd when he protested: "1915, ah, mine Gott. Dat is too long. We all be dead by then. One month is enough."

Mrs. Frances Munds of Prescott was president of the State Equal Suffrage association last November, when Arizona enfranchised its women; therefore she was suggested as presidential elector. But there were protests. Arizona, was quite a new state and must be very careful of its dignity. A Mr. Webb who protested most, said it was a man's job. In due time he himself started forth with the electoral vote in his pocket while Mrs. Munds stayed at home. When the moment came to deliver the vote of Arizona, Mr. Webb was peacefully enjoying himself in New York. He did not know that he ought to be in Washington on that particular day until he read in the newspaper the next morning that everybody was wondering where he was. Suffragists are not saying very much about it, except to emphasize the fact that Colorado, Washington and Utah all sent women as presidential electors and that they all arrived on time; also they are wondering whether, if Mrs. Munds had been the elector from Arizona, and if she had been in New York shopping.

RACING BILL PASSES SENATE OF INDIANA

Indianapolis, Ind., March 12.—In the closing hours of the Indiana legislative session a racing commission bill was passed by the Senate and went to the governor. The bill provides for a commission which is empowered to grant licenses to race tracks and fixes the time of holding race meets from April 30 to Nov. 1. Promoters of a race meet must satisfy the commission of their "good moral character" before a license is granted, but in case of a refusal of a license the promoters may ask a court hearing. The commission may also revoke a license if dissatisfied with the conduct of the meet. The bill probably will be signed by the governor.

MINERAL WELLS SPECIAL TRAIN PLANS FORMING

Co-operation of Gulf, Texas and Western Officials is Promised—Committee at Work

Acting Secretary Thomas of the Chamber of Commerce has received a letter from Secretary F. Burham of the Mineral Wells Commercial Club announcing that the Gulf Texas and Western will begin operations into Mineral Wells on Wednesday, March 26. He said the Superintendent, P. E. Brock of the Gulf Texas and Western had promised his efforts to arrange to handle the proposed special train from Wichita Falls and said he believed the co-operation of the Wichita Falls & Southern was now all that was necessary.

A local committee has taken up the matter with the Katy officials with hope of securing their co-operation.

GERMANY WILL HELP HER STATE RAILWAYS.

Berlin, March 12.—The Prussian government introduced in the diet a bill authorizing loans amounting to \$135,000,000 for state railways. The principal items are: New lines and additional tracks, \$27,500,000; rolling stock, \$47,400,000; buildings, \$25,000,000.

INJUNCTION ISSUED AGAINST UNION MEN.

Chicago, March 12.—An injunction restraining locals Nos. 9 and 134, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, from interfering with the property of the Postal Telegraph & Cable Company, was granted the federal government here in the United States district court.

The restraining order, which is temporary, is the result of a bill filed by the government charging that the electrical workers, to retaliate against the inauguration of an "open shop" policy of the Postal company.

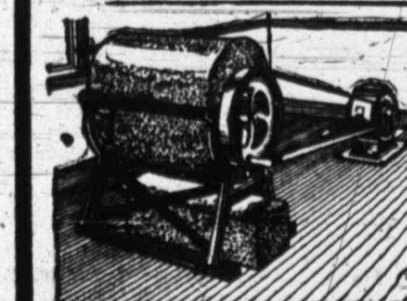
