Co-op Warned to 'Fight for Life'

Directors, employees and "Minute Men" of Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative Inc. were warned here Thursday night they must fight for the life of their cooperative.

The strong words came from Willie Taylor of Lorraine, chairman of the "Minute Men," an educational organization of husband and wives from Lone Wolf members.

Taylor spoke at a Civic House dinner attended by approximately 100 members of the coop family and their guests.

And he reported on the Texas Cooperatives Convention recently in Lubbock with its theme, "Awake and Tell the People."

"The power companies and big corporations are after us (cooperatives), Taylor told the dinner audience, "there is no doubt about it."

"And if we don't wake up, we are not going to be here. "When they say you and I can't own our own power company to light our homes, then they have a fight on their hands from all of us farm people."

Taylor recounted the day years back when the Lone Wolf cooperative first brought electricity to his farm home.

"I'll never forget that afternoon," he recalled, "when I came in from the field. "The electric refrigerator

Cub Scout Rally Day Set Tuesday

It will be Cub Scout rally day in Colorado City Tuesday. And every Cub pack in town will dust off the welcome mat for new members and old ones, too.

But first there will be Cub rallies sandwiched in between classes at Primary School and Hutchinson Elementary for boys eight, nine and 10 years of age.

ALMOST \$5,000 DAMAGE

Youth Killed, 4 Hurt In Six Highway Wrecks

A rash of auto accidents on Mitchell County highways here Thursday, Friday and Saturday took the life of one person, injured several others and resulted in almost \$5,000 damage.

Killed instantly early Saturday morning at 1:45 a. m. was Pedro M. Diaz, 16, Colorado City. Diaz was riding in a car driven by Arturo Pineda, 17, formerly of Chicago and now of Colorado City.

The 1950 Ford in which they were riding overturned on the Sterling City Highway south of the city limits near Sherman Oil Co.

Highway patrolman Al Chambers, who investigated the accident, said the auto was evidently traveling at an excessive speed when Pineda attempted to make the curve.

The auto overturned on its side in the middle of the highway, pinning Diaz under the auto. Pineda was hospitalized with a concussion.

It was Mitchell County's eighth highway traffic fatality of the year, Chambers said.

Funeral is still pending for Diaz, who was born Dec. 21, 1942 in Hobbs, N. M.

He is survived by his parents — father, Modesto Diaz of California, and mother, Angelita Rodriguez of Colorado City.

Other survivors are two brothers — Silvestre Diaz and Juan Rodriguez, both of Colorado City and one sister, Juanita Diaz, also of Colorado City.

Five other wrecks this week were caused by tire blowouts, wet pavement and excessive speed, Chambers said.

A wreck Saturday, 6:50 a. m., 12 miles north of Colorado City on Highway 208 resulted in injuries to Gregorio Martinez and \$500 damage to a 1954 Chevrolet pickup.

The pickup, driven by Sefino Martinez of Rt. 1, Terrell, overturned when a tire

blew out. The Martinez boy was treated at Root Memorial Hospital for chest injuries.

A three-car accident Thursday afternoon near the Lorraine city limits resulted in \$1,650 to damage, but no injuries.

Involved in the wreck were cars driven by Thomas V. Shannon of Tujuaga, Calif., Carlton M. Winkles of Abilene and Emery A. Thomas of Sweetwater.

According to Chambers, the accident happened like this: Shannon slowed down his car as he came into the Lorraine city limits. Winkles' car collided with the rear of Shannon's auto and Thomas' car. Damage to Shannon's car was estimated at \$50, \$1,200 to Winkles' car and \$400 to Thomas' car.

Charges were filed in Justice of the Peace court against Thomas and Winkles, Chambers said.

Another wreck Thursday, 11:50 a. m., resulted in an estimated \$600 damage to a truck owned by Baird Bakery and driven by Floyd W. Pate of Colorado City.

The truck overturned 8.1 miles north of the city when Pate lost control on the wet pavement. Pate was shaken up but not injured.

A 1952 Chrysler driven by Horace Delong of Colorado City overturned Tuesday morning 4.5 miles northwest of the city on FM 1229 to Cuthbert. The car rolled into a barrow ditch, resulting in total loss of \$700, according to Chambers.

A 1958 Volkswagen, driven by Mrs. Mitchner Patton of Amarillo overturned Monday morning south of the city on Highway 208.

Mr. Patton was hospitalized with a broken collarbone while Mrs. Patterson suffered minor injuries.

A tire blowout caused the accident and resulted in \$800 to the vehicle.

TESCO Has Good Year, Prexy Says

Texas Electric Service Company had another good year, J. B. Thomas, president, told the annual meeting of company employees at the Quarter Century Club here Friday evening.

TESCO added \$30,000,000 to its plant capacity during the year, and has filed with SEC to sell \$25,000,000 more to complete this year's construction budget and the work laid out for next year.

"But it is only when we can earn enough to make our bonds attractive to investors that we can continue to operate and grow and create more jobs and more services," he declared.

Next spring will see TESCO pass the million mark in KWH generating power, he reported, for the activation of the 175,000 additional unit at Colorado City's Morgan Creek will then boost the total output to 1,040,000.

Thomas paid his respects to a favorite topic, the intrusion of government into the utility business.

NEXT DECADE THE GREATEST

GMC Consultant Expects Unprecedented Prosperity

"A decade of unprecedented construction, general sales and prosperity in the United States" was predicted Friday night by Dr. Kenneth McFarland, General Motors educational consultant, at a Texas Electric Service Company banquet here Friday night.

The Topeka, Kansas rancher and noted lecturer who spent 25 years as a public school administrator was the speaker at the annual banquet honoring Quarter Century Club members of Texas Electric's Sweetwater district.

More than 250 TESCO officials, employees and guests attended the Civic House affair.

Barring international blow-up, the next 10 years will be the greatest 10 years in the history of our nation, McFarland said, if people only have the get up and go to be ready for the inevitable demand accruing from maturity of the war baby crop.

"In the next 10 years we've got to build so many new things that the value of all the new things we will have to build will be more than all the things we already have built," the speaker said.

"We must remember, however, that the rule book again is working," Dr. McFarland emphasized. "That means simply the law of supply and demand is operating and the customer now is calling the shots."

What the nation needs now is salesmanship and confidence, he asserted. Private citizens of the nation have saved up 303 billion dollars, the greatest wealth in history. And there are more goods and services available than at any time in history. "It's just a question of exercising enough energy and ingenuity to get the two together," McFarland said.

The speaker explained that his means working harder than ever in contacting the customer and in providing the product and services he desires and at his conveniences. He explained further that the rule book was not working in the "depression 30's and the ultra-prosperous 40's and early 50's."

He pointed out that America's free enterprise system is the vehicle which has and will continue to deliver more good things to more people to raise their standard of living more

than any other vehicle ever known to man.

"Yet, a lot of people want to abandon the free enterprise system," the speaker declared. "You and I need to reeducate ourselves to those things which have made America great, remembering all the while that we can't expect something for nothing."

He cautioned that in the dealings between management and workers the guiding rule must be "something for something" and that it is a basic truth that you can't sink half a boat. "There is no such thing as sinking the officers' quarters," he said, "nor is it possible to send just the crew down. Everybody on the same payroll is in the same boat."

Actual program for the meeting will begin Thursday at 10 a. m. at the City Hall fire station.

Registration for the visiting firemen will begin Thursday at 1:30 p. m. in Civic House with the association president from Albany, Welch, presiding.

FIRE CHIEF WAYMON Adcock of Merkel will lead the convention in pledge to flag, Colorado City's ex-chief Leonard Henderson will lead the singing of "America," and Rev. Ortez of Hamlin will speak the invocation.

Official welcome to the convention will be expressed by Mayor Trevor Crawford. Response will be by Bill L. Brown of Snyder, past president of the Mid-West Association.

The association secretary, Asbury, will call the roll after program entertainment. Guests will be presented by another past president of the association, N. W. Aury of Snyder.

Krause will speak at the afternoon session of the convention.

"Rural Fire Protection Districts" will be the topic of a talk by Fire Chief D. A. Porter of Snyder.
