5 die in interstate accident



The Garcia vehicle which was involved in the early Saturday morning accident on Interstate 20. Five persons, four of whom were occupants of the pickup perished in the accidents.

Five persons were killed and three others injured in two related early Saturday morning accidents at a site near Colorado City.

The wrecks were reported at 12:57 a.m. Saturday at a site on Interstate 20, east of Colorado City at mile marker 218, just past the Lone Wolf Bridge.

Four of the victims that lost their lives were members of a Dallas family that were traveling west on Interstate 20 in a 1977 Ford pickup that was pulling a trailer.

Department of Public Safety (DPS) reports listed the four occupants of the vehicle who were pronounced dead on the scene as Fernando Garcia, 31, Petra Franco Mata Garcia, 31, Fernando Franco Garcia, Jr., 12, and Adrianna Erika Garcia, 9, all of Dallas.

DPS Trooper Kenneth Wadsworth, who is working on the case, noted that preliminary indications show that the pickup was traveling in the left lane before the accident.

The vehicle first hit a guardrail on the left side of the Interstate,

then swerved across the two lanes and hit a guardrail on the right side of the road.

DPS reports indicate the vehicle was then upended and slid on its top for a distance of 257 feet before coming to a stop in the left hand lane of traffic.

The trailer that was being pulled by the pickup stopped in the right hand traffic lane of the Interstate.

A car with six occupants that immediately came up on the wreck pulled to the side of the Interstate and three men from the vehicle got out to render aid.

Two of the men then became victims of the second accident in their attempts to assist.

As they crossed the interstate a third vehicle, with four occupants, came up on the scene.

The driver swerved at the last moment in an attempt to avoid hitting the upturned trailer in the right hand lane of traffic, but instead clipped the corner of the trailer, hit two of the three pedestrians that had gotten out of their car and the Garcia vehicle.

C-Court authorizes bid letting

County commissioners met Tuesday morning to authorize seeking bids for renovation work at the Berman Building and a pickup to be used by the County Extension Agent.

Texas Department of Human Services representative Bob Mehaffey met with commissioners to discuss renovations to the Berman Building and the joint bid to be made by the State and County for the work.

Commissioners noted at the meeting the Tax Office will be

moving to the new building due to a lack of space in their present quarters and added equipment requirements that will soon be installed at the office.

The commissioners approved seeking and advertising for bids.

Bob Mehaffey noted that he would be back in Colorado City on Monday, July 29 for the pre-bid conference to be held with contractors at the Berman Building.

At that time bid specifications will be released to the contractors.

Commissioners also approved

seeking and advertising for bids on a pickup to be used by the County Extension Agent.

Bids for both items will be opened at the regular Commissioners Court meeting on August 12.

In other business, Commissioners approved payroll and payment of bills.

County Judge Ray Mayo and Commissioners Ed Roach, Carl Guelker, Buddy Hertenberger and Bill Preston were all in attendance at the meeting.

Hospital Board Hires Consultant

The Board of Mitchell County Hospital District met Tuesday evening to hire a housekeeping consultant, hear reports and appoint a new member to the Hospital Auxiliary.

Ed Golden was hired by the board members to serve as a housekeeping consultant for a period of 90 days. His contract will begin on August 1.

Hospital Administrator Wendell Alford noted that the housekeeping expenses of Mitchell County Hospital are \$70,000 to \$100,000 above other hospitals of comparative size.

"We are looking at every

department in an effort to be as cost effective as we possibly can," Alford noted.

"We have to get expenses in line with revenues," Alford said, "and it

has been confirmed...that we can save \$60,000 to \$80,000."

The consultants job will be to evaluate the housekeeping staff over

WHAT'S THAT I SMELL?

Skunk alert issued by city police dept.

A skunk alert has been issued by the Colorado City Police Department due to several positive rabies tests.

Police Chief David Montgomery noted that the easiest way for an individual to contract rabies is through a family pet which has been infected by a skunk. He advised residents to ensure their pet has been vaccinated for rabies.

Animal Control Officer, Joe Wallace, said that a family pet such as a dog or cat should be vaccinated by the time they reach four months of age.

The alert is to advise people of

the increase and to be cautious of any skunk seen during daylight hours, Montgomery noted.

Individuals should stay away from any skunk. All pose a threat of having rabies.

Montgomery noted that anyone seeing a skunk should contact the Police Department.

Wallace said the largest population of skunks has been found in the area of East 17 - 18th streets, in the area around the high school.

Traps are being used in that area to cut down on the growing population.

Property values released

Mike Burt, Mitchell County Tax Collector, has released values of Mitchell County property to be used by the various entities in formulating the tax rates for next years budget.

Burt explained that tax rates will be set on the values they are certifying to the boards, minus applicable exemptions.

The value of the Mitchell County General Fund stands at \$504,868,547, dropping from last years \$513,957,128.

The values for Mitchell County

Road Fund stand at \$501,498,087. Mitchell County Hospital District values are \$513,164,900.

City of Colorado City values are set at \$64,442,000, City of Loraine at \$6,272,840, and City of Westbrook \$2,539,230.

School districts will be setting tax rates on the following values:

Colorado Independent School District \$293,878,480, Westbrook Independent School District \$187,044,990, and Loraine Independent School District \$23,232,660.

a 90 day period and to make recommendations to the board.

It will be the consultants job to evaluate job descriptions, assess cleaning products, to provide a plan for maintenance and painting, assess equipment, and to provide an estimate on replacing the carpet in patient areas with a surface on which infection and odor might be controlled.

After discussion of the three bids received by the board, members opted to hire Golden for \$25 per hour based on a 32 hour week for the 90 day period.

At the end of the contract period the consultant will report to the board with recommendations and evaluations concerning the techniques used by the Mitchell County Hospital to cut down on the cost required for the housekeeping department without detracting from its effectiveness.

Alford presented the Hospital Statistical Report to board members.

He noted that Mitchell County Hospital had an average daily census of 7.4 during the month of June and 221 patient days.

There were 37 admissions and 40 discharges in the month.

He also noted that the Hospital had received a disappointment

share check from the State Comptroller as part of a Medicaid supplement.

A report on Valley Fair Lodge was presented by administrator Marsha Rickard who discussed the linen service contract and noted that residents missing clothes had turned into a major issue at the Lodge.

She noted that at the end of the reporting period there were three vacancies in the Lodge.

Rickard also touched on the new linen service contract that is being used by Valley Fair Lodge.

Dr. McNally gave the Medical Staff report noting areas of quality testing and patient requirements at the hospital for the previous month.

He also mentioned the excellent job that the nursing staff provided during the emergency situation on early Saturday morning.

Board members also approved the closed door session of the Quality Assurance report as given by Linda Mize.

Board members approved the administrator to look into an insurance policy for service equipment that Alford noted could save the hospital \$8000 a year on the maintenance contracts that are now in place.

One of the men, Adalberto Gonzalez, 23, of Arlington was pronounced dead at the accident scene.

The other, Miguel Angel Gonzalez, 30, of Dallas, is listed in critical condition at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock according to DPS reports.

Gonzalez suffered multiple fractures of the body and had a leg partially amputated in the accident.

He was transferred from the accident site to Mitchell County Hospital where he was stabilized and air flighted to Lubbock.

The two front-seat passengers of the third vehicle were also transported to Mitchell County Hospital.

Faye White Hardin, 63, of Dallas and Radonna Ruff, 49, of Arlington were listed in stable condition following admission and were released Saturday.

Two passengers in the back seat of the third vehicle escaped serious injury.

Wadsworth noted that the investigation of the accidents has not been completed.

Funeral services for the five who died in the accident will be conducted in Mexico.

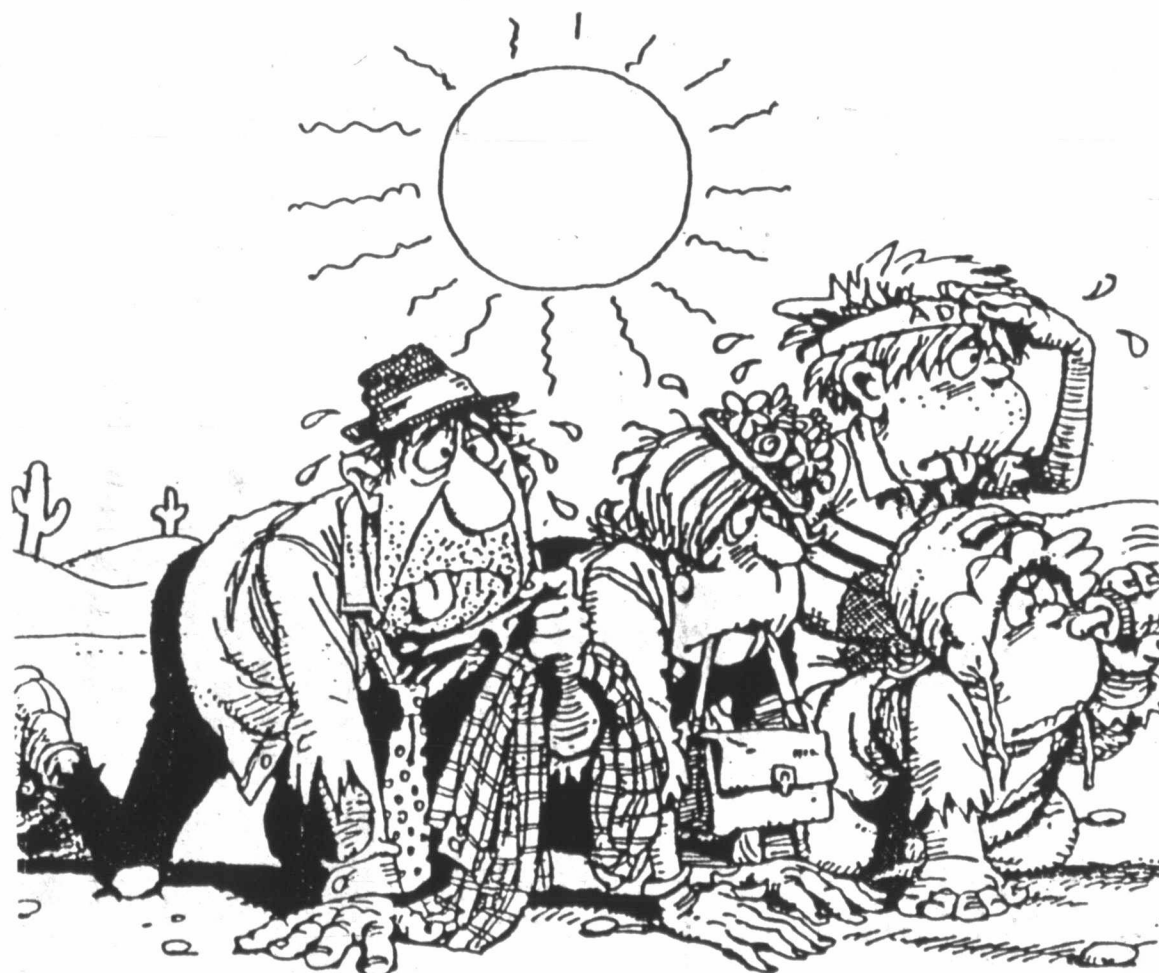

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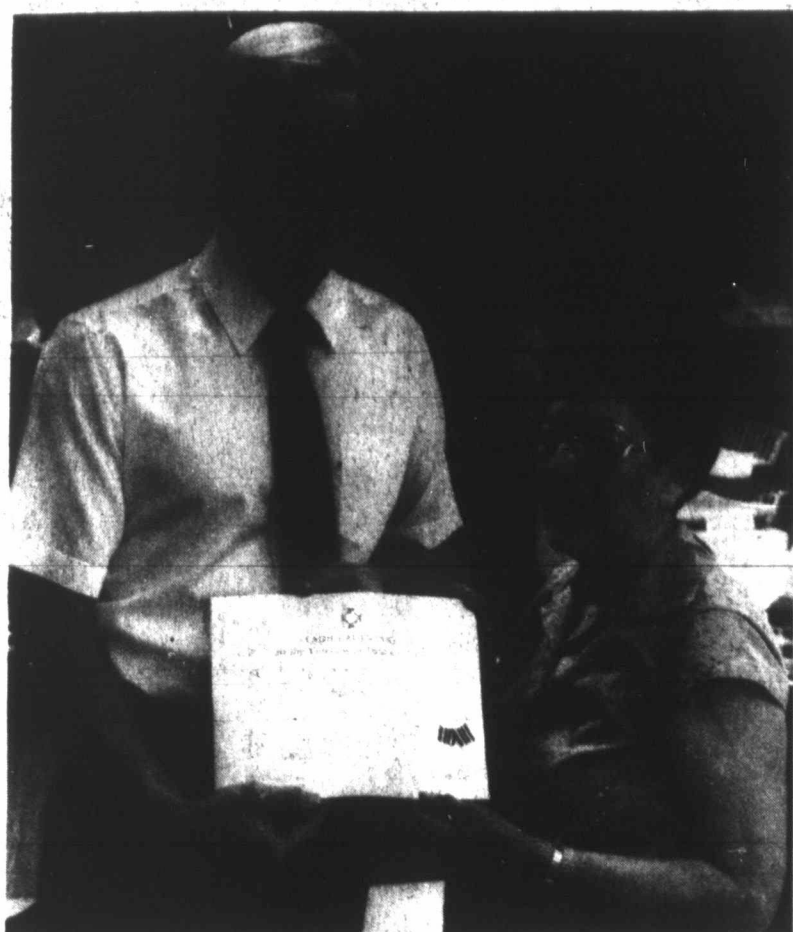

On April 9, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to request that the optional feature "Call Transfer Disconnect" be available to all PLEXAR I customers by including the feature in Southwestern Bell's PLEXAR I tariff. Currently, this optional feature is available only on a customer requested basis.

Call Transfer Disconnect (CTD) is an optional feature that allows PLEXAR I customers the ability to transfer a call to another telephone number within or outside their PLEXAR I system, hang up, and permit the two remaining parties to continue with the call. The PLEXAR I user is then free to place or accept another call. CTD is not intended to be used to avoid toll charges. Therefore, CTD will not be available to PLEXAR I customers subscribing to optional Extended Metropolitan Service or Extended Area Calling Service.

If the company's application is approved, the monthly rate for CTD will be \$4.00 for each PLEXAR I station line. Prior to the June 19, 1991, interim rate approval, Southwestern Bell was billing customers who receive the service \$1.50 for each station line equipped with this feature. In addition, under Southwestern Bell's proposed tariff, every line within the PLEXAR I system must be equipped with this feature. The nonrecurring charge for the additional lines which must be equipped with CTD will be waived for existing CTD customers. The tariffed monthly rate will apply to all existing and future CTD customers.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible. A request to intervene, participate, or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. Loraine Class of 1966 held reunion Saturday

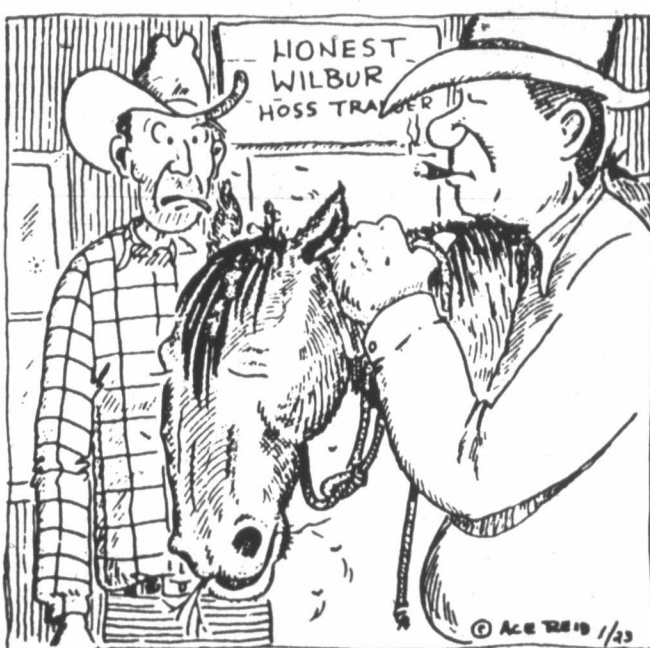
The class of 1966 of Loraine

CHIEF LONE WOLF

After the lead had quit flying during those early morning hours of 1884, Colorado City residents attempted to resume normal lives. No doubt it had been one of the wildest nights, if not the wildest, in the cattle towns history.

At Jake's Restaurant, dapper Jake Maurer toted up the charges from the previous night. All the drinks, all the meals, had added up to \$274!! (Hey, that was big money in '84. To put that figure in perspective, add an extra zero, or \$2740, in today's money).

Jim Lane promptly paid Jake with a check on the Colorado National Bank.

Who was Jake Maurer? Where was his restaurant? Thanks to the late Lee Jones, Jr., and local residents who knew Mr. and Mrs. Maurer, we can learn much about what at one time was "the most famous eating place in the whole vast cattle domain of west Texas."

Jake's building, which is still standing, was located in the 100 block of West 2nd and is now utilized by Bill Holbert as a repair shop. Maurer had been born in Bavaria and came to America at the age of 12. He had "heard the call of the west," and as a young man, bought a wagon and drove overland from Indiana to Ft. Worth, Ft. Griffin and eventually, Mitchell County.

An old newspaper clipping, quoted from in a newsletter published by the local historical society, states that Jake Maurer helped Pete Snyder move his trading post in 1880 from Snyder to Colorado City.

By 1884 Jake had his own business, the restaurant, and he operated the popular place for 35 continuous years.

Perhaps the best known characteristic of Jake was his generosity. He was known for never turning away a hungry man. In fact, he not only gave away food, he provided money to vagrants and others to bed down for the night.

While it's true he never refused a cowboy credit, (or food or a loan), in later days Jake would occasionally ask a man to let him see his horse so Jake could verify the brand of the ranch on which the man claimed to work.

As a further service to his clientele, Jake kept a bulletin board in his restaurant. Cowboys looking for work posted their names while ranches looking for hands did likewise. In addition, messages for cowboys were left on the bulletin board.

Jake, recalls one acquaintance, "was the best old man who ever lived. he had to be a saint to live with her."

"Her" was Georgienna Jalvery, a French Canadian from Quebec who came to Colorado City in a wagon with a group of dance hall girls in 1884. The young, bright eyed lass caught Jake's eye and about a year later they were wed.

The remainder of her life she was known as "Mrs. Jake" or "Rowdy Kate." Together, Jake and his bride ran the restaurant.

While Jake was known for his friendliness and magnanimous ways, Mrs. Jake, as one person understated it, "didn't have a real good disposition."

The Maurers were immaculate in their ways. he always wore black trousers with a freshly starched clean shirt and a black bow tie. She is remembered for keeping their home and herself spotless. While Jake shared his meals with penniless visitors Mrs. Jake was known for giving flowers from her own hot house for funerals, weddings and parties.

During the heyday of Jake's Restaurant, "Rowdy Kate" would round up girls to perform as "can can dancers" and other forms of "ranchy burlesque." Due to the lack of space at Jake's, dancing would occasionally take place on the boardwalk and in the street in front of his restaurant. It was not uncommon to hear six-shooters being fired into the air by visiting cowboys.

After operating the restaurant for 35 years, Jake and his wife quit the food business and opened a small hotel where the City National Bank now stands.

During the years Jake lived in Colorado City, he was a member of the Lutheran church and was an active worker as well as a Sunday school teacher. he died at the age of 72 at his home on October 31, 1925.

He was eulogized by the Reverend M.C. Bishop of the 1st Baptist Church as a man who never turned a hungry man away and as a man of integrity and honor.

"Had Jake followed another policy, that of turning away those who came to him in continued formation during those 35 years," Reverend Bishop said, "the funds represented in the food he gave away and the cash he furnished the unfortunates to pay for beds would, no doubt, have made him a rich man."

On August 2, 1945, Mrs. Jake joined her husband in death. After leaving the restaurant business, Jake had printed the following slogan on his hotel letterhead: "I fed you for 35 years, now sleep with me 35 years."

Today, Jake and Mrs. Jake are sleeping in the Colorado City cemetery. They earned their rest.

Storage tank owners need to register by Oct. 15

The Texas Water Commission has announced that, beginning immediately, owners of underground and aboveground storage tanks who have not yet registered their tanks with the state agency may do so without penalty for late registration until October 15, 1991.

"Many individuals or small business owners who own and operate tanks, or who have unused tanks on their property, have not registered the tanks with the TWC because of lack of knowledge regarding registration requirements or a fear of penalties for late registration," said TWC Executive Director Allen Beinke. "Because our main goal is for every tank to be properly registered in order to protect the environment, we are granting this short 'grace period' for owners to voluntarily comply with the law."

Owners of underground storage tanks that contain petroleum and other hazardous substances have been required since 1987 to register those tanks with the Texas Water Commission. Tanks not currently in use, but not properly closed out according to TWC standards, also must be registered. In addition, aboveground storage tanks that contain motor fuel-type petroleum products have been required to

register with the Commission since 1990.

Only owners of registered petroleum storage tanks are eligible for clean-up reimbursement from the state's petroleum storage tank remediation fund in the event their tanks leak and result in environmental contamination.

After the tank registration "amnesty" period ends on October 15, 1991, owners with unregistered tanks are subject to fines of up to \$10,000 per day. The amnesty policy does not apply to persons who have unregistered tanks that are discovered independently by the Texas Water Commission.

Registration requirements do not apply to certain tanks exempted by law or excluded by TWC rules,

including small farm and residential tanks of less than 1100 gallons, heating oil tanks, hydraulic lifts, hazardous waste tanks, wastewater treatment tanks, small aboveground storage tanks of less than 1100 gallons, and certain other exempted or excluded tanks.

Soil clean-up measures may change

The Texas Water Commission is encouraging the use of alternative methods in the treatment of soil contaminated by hydrocarbons, a type of contamination often resulting from leaking petroleum storage tanks. The traditional method used consists of excavating the contaminated soil and disposing of it at a municipal landfill.

"Due to the large volumes of soil involved and the relatively low contaminant levels in the soil in

many instance of leaking petroleum storage tanks, options aside from excavation and landfill disposal may be more economically and environmentally preferable," said Allen Beinke, Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission.

Though disposal at a municipal landfill is a legal and viable disposal alternative for soil contaminated with hydrocarbons, other methods of soil treatment may be utilized for excavated soil or even soil remaining in the ground at the contamination site. By using an alternate treatment method, owners and operators of leaking petroleum storage tanks may benefit from more reasonable treatment costs and from possible reduced liability associated with landfill disposal. Additionally, in most cases, tank owners and operators who use alternative treatment methods are eligible for reimbursement from the state's petroleum storage tank reimbursement fund.

The Texas Water Commission has developed guidance for the use of some alternative technologies and is currently developing policies governing the disposal options for petroleum storage tank wastes. For further information regarding remediation of soil contaminated by

New cotton process explained to board



Wanda Mitchell, left, of the Post Economic Development Corporation and Paul Muncrief, Vice-President of Cotton Unlimited, Inc. met with the Kiwanis Club and at a joint meeting of the Board of Economic Development and Commissioners Court on Tuesday.

Representatives from Post, Texas came to Colorado City, Tuesday, to explain a newly patented process which involves cotton.

Paul Muncrief, vice-president of Cotton Unlimited, Inc. and Wanda Mitchell of the Post Economic Development Corporation spoke about the process and the effect it has had on Post.

Muncrief noted that he has patented a method by which cotton and polyester are blended to form a safe alternative to fiberglass insulation.

He noted that Cotton Unlimited is in the process of expanding from Post.

The company is going to license 10 manufacturing plants around the nation, one of them to be in Texas.

Muncrief estimated that it would cost between two and two-and-a-half million dollars to get a line operating.

Muncrief said that his company

produces non-woven cotton products.

The company is currently working to provide non-woven cotton insulation as an alternative to fiberglass.

He explained that cotton insulation does not carry the health hazards or dangers that are associated with fiberglass.

Besides insulation, the company makes oil absorbing material, saddle blankets, sleeping bags and absorbent mops.

Mitchell said that Post was devastated by the pullout of Burlington Industries in 1984.

At that time the Post Economic Development Corporation was formed in an effort to look for industry.

She noted with pride that it was not easy, but that Cotton Unlimited came to Post and is using the building that Burlington had vacated.

Muncrief and Mitchell came to Colorado City at the request of the Board of Economic Development.

They met with the noon Development and the Kiwanis Club and a joint meeting Commissioners Court during their visit.

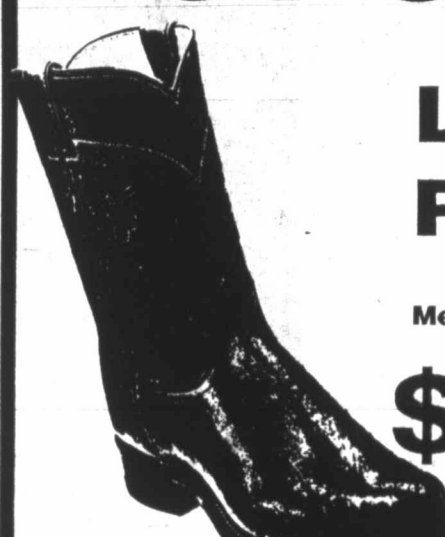
