WE HAVE OUR OWN STYLES

If we are going to attempt to entertain the women of the state in another year we should begin to think now of things to offer them. When Lubbock extends her hospitality at the Houston convention, something must be given to the women as an incentive for coming here. Interest may have lagged in having the convention and local club members and the Seventh District may not intend to extend the invitation again this winter. But if the bid is to be offered, preparations need to be started now, a month ahead of time.

There is an element of advertising in having a convention brought to a city and it seems to me that this city could have no greater compliment than to be chosen as a meeting site by the federated club women of Texas.

Here's Famous Quake Maker



For the first time a photographer has caught on his lens an image of the San Andreas fault of California which extends more than 600 miles through San Francisco to the Imperial valley. The fault is at once a maker and breaker of earthquakes. Sometimes quakes starting on one side are stopped by the fault, then again, slipping at the fault, causes an earthquake. This geological formation was responsible for the San Francisco earthquake of 20 years ago. Photos show the fault near Bakersfield, Cal., and Major H. A. Erickson studying it through a stereoscope.

Clothing Prices Lower This Year

Prices of clothing, both ladies ready to wear and men's, as well as dry goods, are lower this year than for several years, salesmen who have been showing their lines at the semi-annual Market Week here declared.

One salesman said that his house was selling a line of percale at 13 cents a yard that in 1919 to 1922 was sold for as high as 45 cents a yard.

Other items of dry goods have come down almost as much in proportion the past few years.

Lubbock Fire Loss in 1929 Was \$67,770

National Association of Fire Underwriters Makes Report of 182 Alarms Here During Past Year; Analysis Made

Lubbock had 182 fire alarms during 1929 according to a bulletin issued by the National Association of Fire Underwriters, with losses amounting to \$67,770 and insurance payments of \$58,250.

The report, just recently issued, gives an analysis of the types of buildings, the losses, etc., together with other information on the configurations of the past year.

Only Two Spread
Of the fires covered by the report, 172 were confined to the building in which the blaze originated and 10 spread to other buildings.

None of the fires was in buildings of strictly fireproof type, such as reinforced concrete, or brick and steel. There were 21 fires in brick and stone buildings, four in concrete, 62 in frame, three not classified and 34 other types of buildings.

Losses claimed were insured and non-insured buildings, \$23,300; contents, \$44,470; total, \$67,770.

Losses paid, buildings, \$19,800; contents, \$38,450; total, \$58,250.

Values of the buildings was given as \$224,900.

Area of Lubbock is 622 square miles, with an estimated population of 22,000.

Fires per 1,000 population was estimated at 7.91.

ENTERS PLEA OF GUILTY

Defendant Frightened When Death Penalty Mentioned

DALLAS, Oct. 7 (AP)—Frightened when a juror said he would have no objection to assessment of the death penalty, Harle Corney Middleton overruled his attorneys here today and pleaded guilty to the murder of Charles Brown last May 26 in an attempted holdup. He was given a 99-year penitentiary sentence.

Officials announced Miss Lucille Mills, indicted as an accomplice in Brown's slaying, would be released because of information she gave the state.

Between \$100,000 and \$150,000 Worth Of Clothing, Dry Goods, Shoes, Other Merchandise Shown for Market Week

Between \$100,000 and \$150,000 worth of clothing, dry goods, ladies ready-to-wear, shoes and other merchandise, were brought to Lubbock for the second semi-annual market week according to some of the leading salesmen and wholesale executives who were here for the exposition.

There seemed to be a difference of opinion on the exact value of the more than 60 exhibits but a conservative estimate placed each one at not less than \$2,000 each, making approximately \$125,000 to \$130,000 for the total.

Exhibits Costly

Several exhibitors of ladies ready to wear goods said they had brought with them \$6,000 to \$8,000 worth of merchandise, at wholesale prices. One man, who estimated his stock at approximately \$10,000, said there were four who had between \$10,000 and \$12,000 worth of merchandise, while the eight or ten others had from \$5,000 to \$10,000 worth, with an average of \$8,000.

This same exhibitor estimated that the firms displaying other lines such as wash dresses, ladies underwear, hosiery, shoes and the like, did not have very large stocks as their types of goods did not run into much money.

Here's a coat that has a wholesale price of \$79.50," said this exhibitor. "It does not take many, you see, to make a \$1,000 worth of coats."

Most of the coats, however, seemed to be priced wholesale at between \$16.75 and \$49.50.

Wash Dresses Lower

Wash dresses, of which there were a large number, were mostly priced at under \$4 to \$5 wholesale. The general average seemed to be between \$2 and \$3, wholesale.

While ladies underwear, pajamas etc. were priced higher than wash dresses, there were not as many exhibiting as of the former. Several of the Dallas concerns who make dresses of various kinds are adding a line of lingerie to their manufactured lines. Some of these models were apparently, to the layman, the equal of nationally advertised lines.

The several shoe displays, while containing several hundred or more shoes each, were not as large in total value as the ready to wear line.

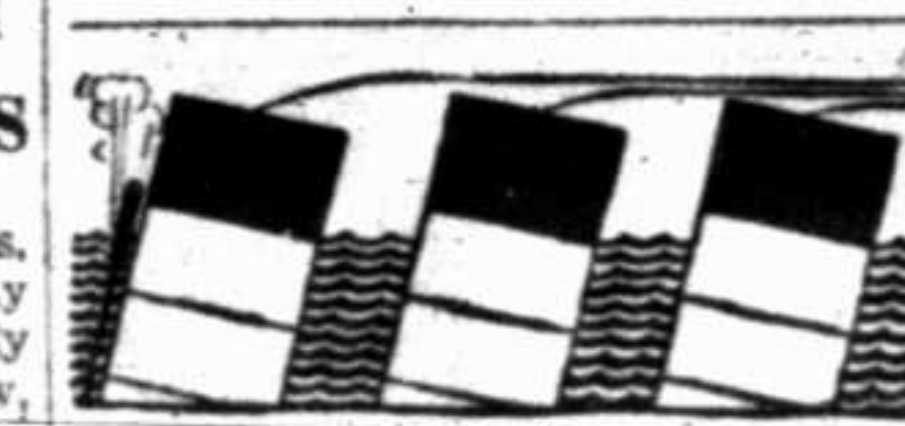
Three Men Are Found Guilty

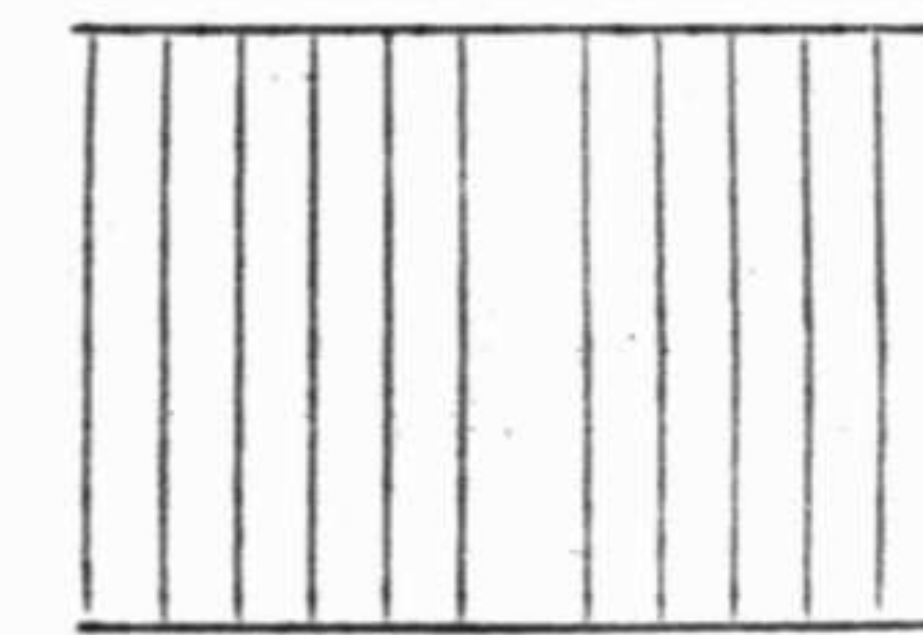

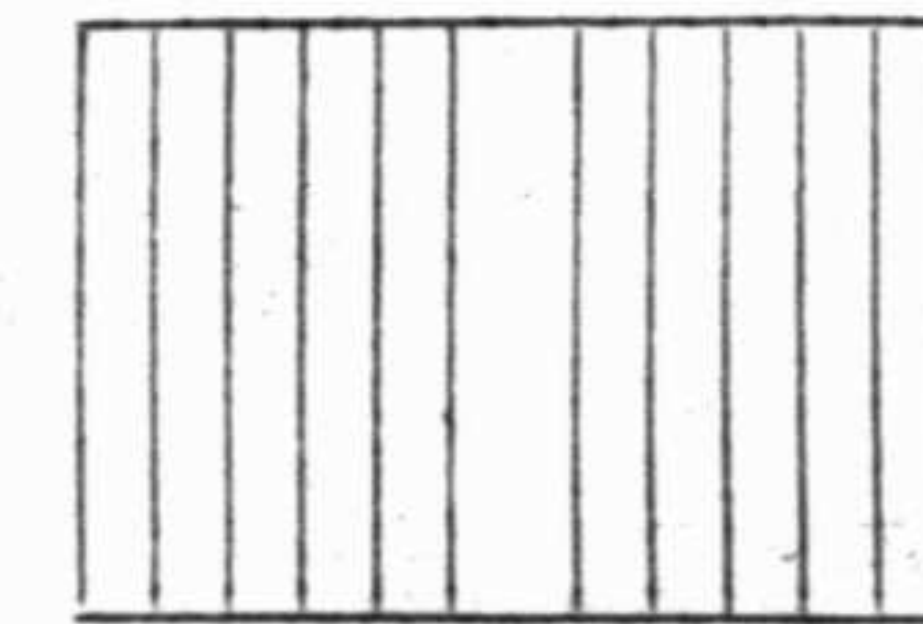

LUBBOCK'S MOTOR MENACE

THE plan of the local Alien Brothers Post, of the American Legion, to decrease accident hazards in the public school zones of the city, might well be extended to cover the whole of Lubbock.

Frankly speaking, Lubbock is the home of more careless motor car drivers than many cities twice its size. Absolute disregard of signals, and in many cases of the common courtesy of the streets and highways, is so prevalent here that it attracts comment, even from the casual visitor who is accustomed to more orderly traffic.

In the downtown section, turns are more often made without signals than with them. Cars are halted in the middle of the street, their drivers seeming oblivious to the traffic stream behind them. Parking is careless, and in many cases one machine is left to "hog" space enough for three, and there is a prevalent, if not growing, disdain of stop-lines where there are no signal lights.

In the residential sections motorists back from driveways without even so much as a glance to the rear, stop-lines are often disregarded entirely, turns are "cut" in the middle of the block and speeding is not at all unusual. In brief, Lubbock's untimely drivers, whether they are in the majority or minority, have turned the thoroughfares into a veritable chaos.

Speeding, as The Morning Avalanche sees it, is much the lesser of the other traffic evils which beset the South Plains capital. If driving rules were practiced, "Blue Book" signals used and relied upon, speeding—while never to be encouraged—becomes less of a threat against the keeping of public safety. The fact is, a careless driver never becomes the menace that his slower moving, but ignorant or day-dreaming brother has become upon the streets of this growing city. The problem is not one for the police, alone, to solve. A small force, such as we have in Lubbock, cannot be expected to supply men for all parts of the city, all the time. The question has become more of a public one than purely for the police, although more arrests and fines for careless driving might have its effect.

The citizens of Lincoln, Nebraska, once faced a problem similar to that which faces Lubbock. There was public dissatisfaction and it came to the ears of the mayor and police chief.

"All right, folks," the officials said, "we'll just organize a vigilance squad," and they did. Several scores of Lincoln men and women were deputized to act in cases of traffic violation, they acted a few times and Lincoln, in almost the twinkling of an eye, became a safer, better city in which to live and drive. Erring motorists learned that from more than a hundred private traffic officers were on the look-out, and rather than take chances of arrest and fines, they operated their vehicles accordingly.

The Morning Avalanche doesn't believe Lubbock's present situation demands a vigilance committee—at least not yet. But it does demand some thinking and some action on the part of motorists themselves to safeguard life and limb within our city.

We repeat—the legion's plan to protect school children from accident is a good one, but it could and should go further.

UTILIZING COSMIC RAYS

What is it that from outer space beats on the earth constantly in "waves of frequencies" thousands times more than those of the hardest X-rays? Can the miraculous energy, so powerful it penetrates 700 feet of water, be used?

Contemplating cosmic rays, and the reported discovery now of their probable practical uses in weather forecasting, is it much or is it little that men know?

Again Dr. Robert A. Millikan, president of the California Institute of Technology, gives us a new glimpse into the fascinating subject. He was a Nobel prize winner in physics for his services in demonstrating the existence of these amazing radiations from space, as some say, annihilation of matter in the centers of distant stars. The expected uses in meteorology were disclosed recently by Dr. Millikan before the National Academy of Sciences at Pasadena, Calif., a result from his further study this summer at Fort Churchill, on Hudson Bay, Fort Churchill was chosen because it was the accessible settled community nearest the earth's magnetic pole.

Dr. Millikan also seems closer to determining the inherent nature of cosmic waves. Are they the waves of high-speed electrons? At Churchill, because only 700 miles from the magnetic pole, the radiations, if electrons, should be more intense. Thorough experiments were made and the famous scientist says: "The results show that the cosmic rays have precisely the same intensity at Churchill, in latitude 59 as at Pasadena in latitude 34. The indications are, first, that the cosmic rays enter the earth uniformly from all portions of the sky; second, that they consist as they enter the earth's atmosphere of other waves, not of electrons."

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

PLOT TO BEAT OUT SENATOR NORRIS PROVIDES POLITICAL AMMUNITION FOR DEMOCRATS AND PROGRESSIVES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—Democrat-spellbinders, according to accounts from out on the hustings, are making plenty of capital out of Senator Gerald P. Nye's discovery that there really was a plot to beat Senator George W. Norris out of a place on the Nebraska G. O. P. ticket this fall by means of the rival candidacy of Grover George W. Norris of Broken Bow.

It is, indeed, the finest kind of political capital, because of its simplicity. No argument is required to convince the average voter that a dirty trick was attempted on Senator Norris. The only question he asks is, "Who tried to play it?" For whatever his story may be worth, Grover Norris' testimony pins it on someone in the regular Republican campaign organization. Possibly this someone was some more or less irresponsible underling—but it is not a nice kind of yarn, anyway (from the G. O. P. standpoint), for Democratic stump orators to be broadcasting.

But if the tale of the two Norris' is proving serviceable to Democratic campaigners, how much more serviceable is it likely to prove, between now and election day, to progressive Republican campaigners!

After all, the most a Democrat can say is "My! such foul fighting!" Maybe so; and perhaps the Democrats have a right to be shocked at it—but merely as spectators. In the final analysis, it was a case of Republican fighting Republican, for the two Norris' were intra-party, not inter-party rivals. Trouble among Republicans is not strictly speaking, any of the Democrats' business.

The progressive Republicans, however, are in a position to shout:

"Look at the methods the stand pat folks are willing to resort to, to beat us!"

Senator Norris, as everyone knows, is a progressive. There appears to be no disposition among politicians to question that the Broken Bow incident is calculated to arouse sympathy for him throughout Nebraska, thus strengthening him in his fight for reelection.

But there are other progressives whose senate seats are at stake this year, besides Senator Norris. Senator McMaster is running in South Dakota. Senator Pine in Oklahoma and Senator Schall in Minnesota, and they all of them seem to have hard enough campaigns on their hands to welcome a good story to tell, like the story of the two Norris'.

"Behold," Senators McMaster, Pine and Schall are now enabled to cry, "the brand of tick-tack which reaction is revealed as having employed against Senator Norris in Nebraska. The only difference between Nebraska reaction and South Dakota, Oklahoma and Minnesota reaction is that it hasn't happened to be exposed yet in the ki-ote, sooner and north star states!"

And it may make considerable impression—sufficient, perchance, to decide the balance in a close election.

Progressive-ism is Republicanism and Democraticism nearly non-partisan.

Senator Thomas J. Walsh, running as a progressive Democrat, can harp on the two Norris' string about as effectively in Montana as Senators McMaster, Pine and Schall can harp on it as progressive Republicans in their respective ballwicks.

Senator Borah can harp on it in Idaho—if he needs to, which he probably will not for apparently he has a cinch without any harping—and if he is a progressive, which is open to discussion.

Senator Couzens is eligible to harp on it in Michigan, if he chooses.

Moreover, it can be harped on two years hence when some more progressives, such as Senator Nye himself and Senators Blaine, Brookhart and Norbeck, will be up for reelection.

It makes highly popular music because there is nothing complicated about it.

A used car is essential to appreciate harping on the subject of the tariff, the power question and international relationships, but anyone can understand an attempt to hit a candidate below the belt, as in the instance of the two Norris'.

Incidentally, Senator Nye did a fine piece of work for himself when he exposed the Norris trick.

The senator was in a threatening jam as a result of his controversy with Mrs. Ruth Hanna McCormick over her wire-tapping charges against him in Illinois. None of the political cognoscenti ever had the slightest suspicion that the North Dakotan had tapped any wires, but Mrs. McCormick's publicity in the matter was of a high order, and the press was beginning to give him decidedly the worse of the debate.

By turning up so snappy a scandal as the two Norris' affair just at the psychological moment, he appears to have rehabilitated himself and something over, and stories of the wire-tapping sort are not likely to get started again, once attention has been directed from them.

Your Health

ASTHMA MORE COMMON AMONG BOYS THAN GIRLS

So difficult has been the problem of the control of asthma that special research bodies have been appointed throughout the world to investigate the nature of the disease and to elaborate scientific methods of control.

It is estimated that there are at least 250,000 cases in Great Britain alone, and a special research committee has been working on the subject in that country for the last three years.

In an attempt to discover special means of cure, the committee found all sorts of notions in the minds of people who have asthma, varying from the belief of one old man that he had cured himself by swallowing a large lump of honey before going to bed to the belief of another correspondent that he had cured himself by taking a teaspoonful of olive oil every night after dinner.

Whenever such simple cures as these occur it seems likely that the asthma is psychological instead of real, that the diagnosis has been wrong, and that the treatment has nothing to do with the case.

In the course of its first year's work, the committee studied carefully more than 200 cases and secured some valuable information. It was found that asthma was more common in boys than in girls, but that after the age of 14, cases among men and women are about equal. More than half of the patients with asthma gave a history indicating that someone in the family had suffered with a similar disease.

Unquestionably the mental attitude of the patient toward the condition determines to a large extent the severity of its attack.

The methods of treating asthma have included among others the use of inhalations of various substances, the use of ultraviolet, of a special breathing apparatus, and the application of carbon dioxide gas to the nose. The inhalations with oils and with fine fogs of salt solutions seem to benefit only about 10 or 15 per cent of the patients. Some of them seemed actually worse after the treatments than before. One of the advantages of such inhalations was the increase in the amount of the secretions which the patient was able to cough up and thus to obtain relief.

THE TAHITI DISASTER

She drifted west over the date line and the passengers were rescued on August 18th. Later she drifted over the east side of the date line and sank on Sunday, August 17th. That date line at that point is not on the 180th Meridian but on the 174 Meridian.

Cotton Injured By Heavy Rain

Staple Damaged and Picking Made Difficult According to Don L. Jones, Experiment Farm Superintendent

Recent rains in this area have injured cotton, damaging the staple and causing difficult picking, in the opinion of Don L. Jones, superintendent of the state experiment station here.

The precipitation will help fall pastures considerably, although the benefits will be offset somewhat by the loss from cotton damage, Mr. Jones said.

Will Cause Stain

Sand which was in much of the cotton before the rains will be reached by the moisture, causing the staple to stain, the experiment station chief explained. Much of the cotton was on the ground and the precipitation will make picking difficult, he said.

"The moisture also made the bolls heavy. I think the farmers will find it much harder to pick the cotton because of the rain," Mr. Jones added. "There will also be some damage of the staple that will hurt its price."

A number of farmers have discussed planting wheat for fall and winter pasture. Mr. Jones added. Rainfall this month is 31 of an inch.

"That is enough to start wheat germinating," the superintendent added. "With these cool nights and short days, moisture like we have had is enough to start wheat. If the summer the rain would not last very long."

Miller Speaks To Lions Club

Observance of Fire Prevention Week Theme of Speech Given by City Manager; to Address Rotarians Today

Object and observance of Fire Prevention week was the theme of a talk by J. Bryan Miller, city manager, Tuesday noon before the Lions club at its weekly luncheon in the Hilton hotel.

The city manager will speak on the same subject today before the Rotary club in the Lubbock hotel. Other speakers will appear this week before civic clubs, women's organizations and student bodies.

Three major points of Mr. Miller's talk Tuesday were: What is fire loss? Who pays this loss? What is the cure for this loss?

The average loss in premiums is \$50,000,000 in the United States yearly, according to the speaker's figures. Sixty per cent of this loss occurs in the home with mercantile districts ranking second.

Premium Losses Low

Loss in premium paid in Lubbock during the past six years follows: 1924, \$66,655; 1925, \$52,106; 1926, \$36,958; 1927, \$42,442; 1928, \$56,227; 1929, \$34,888. This will represent a little more than 50 per cent of the actual loss.

Mr. Miller declared that the people themselves pay for the losses. Insurance companies are merely collectors and distributors in the long run. The people not only pay for the loss but must pay for the cost of insurance companies' operation, according to the speaker.

Enjoys Good Rate

At the present time Lubbock enjoys a fire credit of 15 per cent on insurance rates but due to the fact that a heavy loss has been experienced during 1930, officials are of the opinion that this credit will be taken away and a penalty of about three per cent added. During the past year a saving of approximately \$2,500 has been effected through the 15 per cent credit and this amount, together with an additional three per cent will be added during the coming year.

Discussing municipal loss, Mr. Miller stated that when property burns taxes cease on it and these taxes must be distributed to other property owners. Fire interrupts business, contributes to dismissal of employees and generally scatters customers.

Assurance of close cooperation on the part of the school system, given by Superintendent M. H. Duncan, has heartened the committee. Mr. Duncan has given splendid cooperation, he has done admirably in the schools, said H. D. Woods, chairman of the Lubbock fire prevention committee.

Fire Chief W. E. Twitty, Fire Marshall Alvin Metcalfe and possibly Wesley Reed, fire insurance agents' representative, will explain fire prevention before the high school student body in assembly Thursday morning.

Club Members To Talk

Club men and club women this week will speak as representatives of Lubbock Fire Prevention committee, discussing prevention of conflagrations as both a safety measure and economic safeguard.

Mrs. O. L. Peterson, president of the Junior Twentieth Century club, spoke before her group Tuesday in connection with Fire Prevention week.

Mrs. A. T. Buggers, president of the Beta Delphi chapter, will discuss fire prevention with that organization Thursday.

Miss Margaret Mallard, president of the Business and Professional Women's club, will address her fellow members on the subject Friday.

Mrs. J. S. Johnson of the Twentieth Century club will present the matter to that organization at its next session.

Chairman of the fire prevention committee, Mr. Woods, will speak before his club, the Kiwanis, Thursday.

Ben Powell will make a similar appearance before the American Business club, Friday.

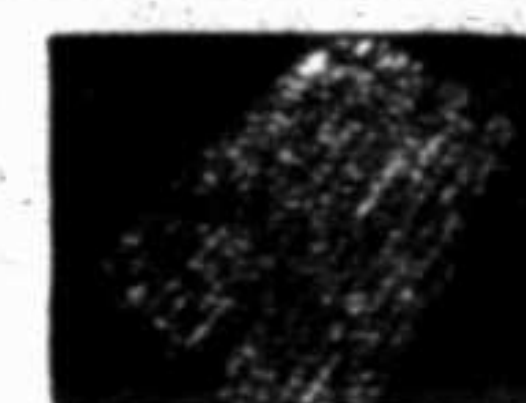

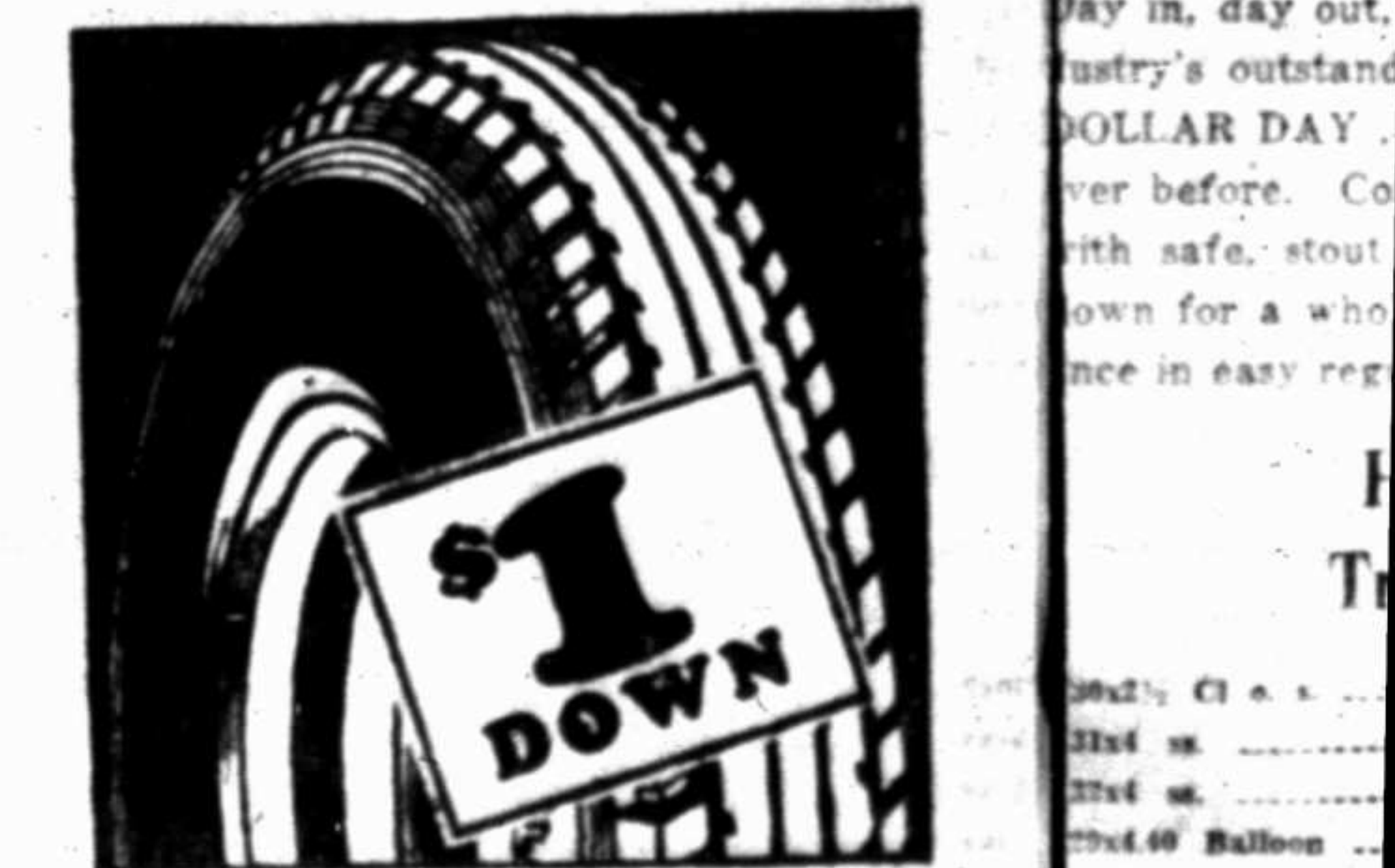

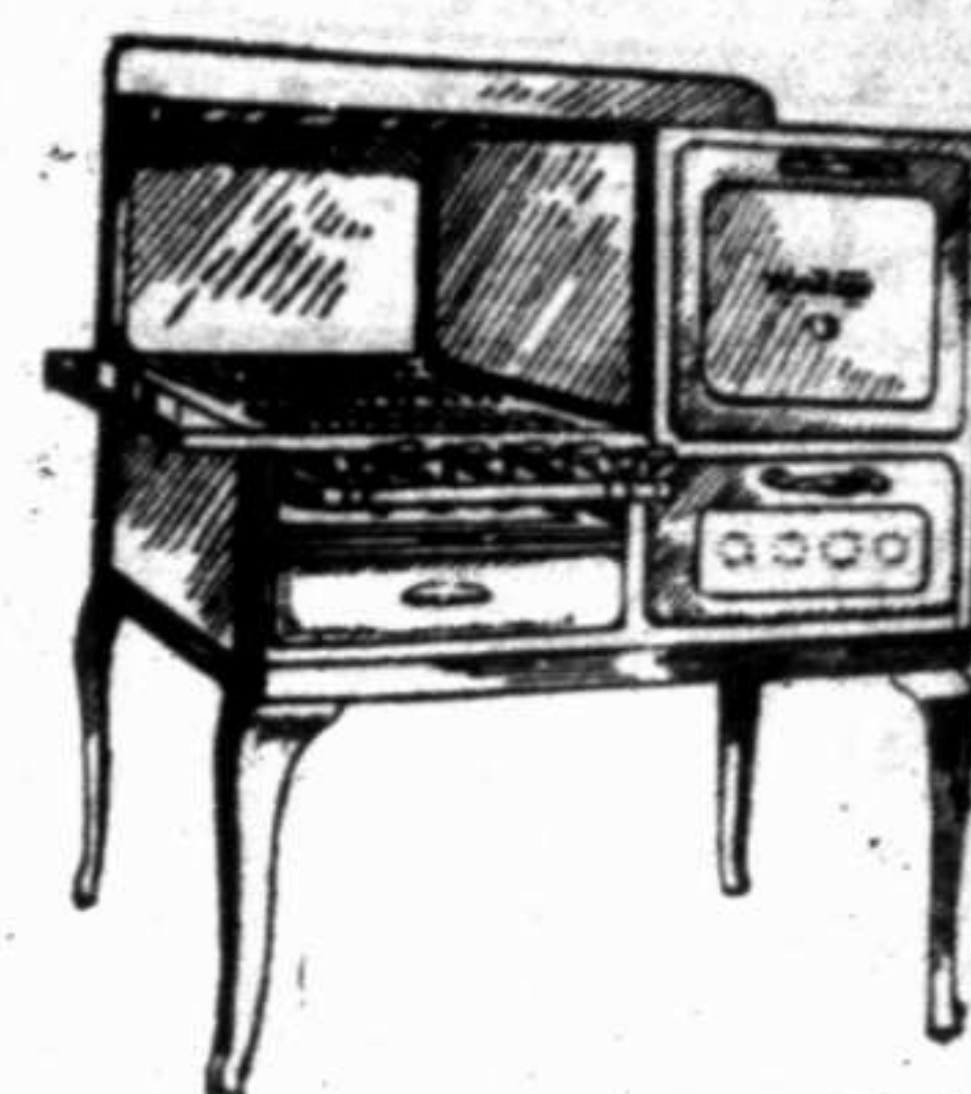

can League champions swept the opening two games of the annual classic here. The rally of the Cards that captured two of the three battles in St. Louis has set the whole town scrambling for a chance to be at the death when the sixth game starts at 1:30 tomorrow afternoon in Shibe park.

Surprised at Cardinals The baseball bug of William Penn's colony had no idea that the mighty slingers of Mack would ever be back to wind up the series in their own backyard after belting the National League title holders around in the first two matches here. They saw the Cardinals' ace, Burleigh Grimes and Phil Rhee, go down under the clouting of bogey Jimmy Fox, Emiliano Al Simmons, and the fighting Mickey Cochrane, saw Lefty Grove and Big George Earnshaw dominate the pitching situation and concluded, as they had thought all along, that there was not enough opposition in the thing to really get excited about.

Cards Determined to Win The Cardinals, grim and determined, rolled back into Philadelphia early this afternoon, trailing two games to three in the series, confident of the problem of winning tomorrow or joining in defeat the three National League champions in a row before them. The Pittsburgh Pirates of 1927, the Cardinals of 1925 and the Cubs of 1905. There was nothing of the beaten about them as they jostled about gaily in the railroad station, threw their bags into a line of taxicabs, and wheeled away to their hotel under escort of motorcycle police.

A crowd of several hundred formed in the station to point out Bill Hallahan, the quiet southpaw who played a shutout on the A's in the first game at St. Louis Saturday. Jess Haines, who belted the Mackmen Sunday, and Grimes, courageous, fighting form, who went down yesterday to a 2 to 0 defeat when Fox belted him for a home-run with Mickey Cochrane on base in the fifth. There was respect for these western warriors in the attentiveness of the faithful, and the hoots and catcalls from the fringe of the crowd attested at least the fact that the rabid ones still consider them dangerous.

Seventh Game Phobias They seemed to be considerable feeling that a seventh game will be necessary if Hallahan, already nominated to do the hurrying for the Cardinals, pitches anywhere close to his shutout performance against the A's last Saturday. The general impression is that Lefty Grove will be on the hill for the Athletics against tomorrow but the fans are beginning to wonder if the Maryland southpaw can go on indefinitely winning ball games for Connie Mack. Grove captured the opener, lost to Haines in a tight duel Sunday, and came back to hold the Cards safe after Earnshaw retired for a pinch hitter in the eighth yesterday. The general belief is that Mack will hold Earnshaw in reserve for the final battle Thursday if Lefty fails tomorrow.

Hitting Average Lower Al Simmons and Jimmy Fox with some timely aid early in the series by Mickey Cochrane, have hit up to their season's averages so far but as a whole the team mark of the Athletics—181 in five games—is far below their American League figure of .294. Similarly, the clouting of the Cardinals have skidded from a season's hitting figure of .314 to a series mark of only .200.

A few weeks ago, Coach Swede McMurray's Pioneer could hold their elder and supposedly more experienced "brothers," the Lubbock High school Westerners, to a standstill, if not run square over them, in scrimmage. It did not look so hot for the Westerners, who were running against plays thought to be used by other teams in the conference. And the Westerners did not look so hot in their first conference game, with Pampa, either. But it is a slightly different story now.

Now Up Better Now The Pioneers can still hold the Westerners and when the former are on the offense, they can tear holes in the Westerner line and charge through for appreciable gains, but they must have a coach, or borrow a few Westerners to do it. Yesterday afternoon they did it, but Coach Keeling was carrying the ball. But at that, the Pioneers were not so powerful against the Westerners as they were earlier in the season. Naturally, they would be expected, for since then the Westerners have played against two of the strongest teams in the conference. The Westerner defense, however, is not what it should be now. It does not declare a championship team. There is a lot of work to be done, and the coaches are doing it.

Work On New Plays Yesterday afternoon the Westerners worked on some new offensive plays to be used against Childress and all other teams that might appear on the schedule. One play, called "Katy Bar the Door," or maybe that's a war whoop, looks good, and when it is perfected should do the necessary business. There are several intricate plays being worked up, the failure of which are to rattle for explanation on paper, and if they were perfect, they would hardly do to print them. On the offense, the Westerners pore through at will against the Pioneers, but they lack something on the defense.

The main concern in the Westerner camp right now is the coming game with the Childress High Bobcats. The game will be played Saturday in Childress. Coach Henry Frka is working on a pass defense, which may come in handy against the Bobcats. In their game last Saturday against the Amarillo Sandies the Bobcats attempted 22 passes. Nineteen of them were completed for a total gain of 196 yards. That speaks for itself. Only a superior, heavier, and more experienced Amarillo team was able to take the one-sided victory, through sheer force of drive. The Bobcats were simply smothered under a heavier line.

Less Tomorrow Night Coach Frka will take about 20 men to Childress, leaving here tomorrow night. Friday will be a day of rest, with a light workout in the afternoon. In the Childress game, the Westerners may be without the service of several star players. It is almost certain that Co-Captain Dub Lawson will be unable to play. The flashy quarterback has been ill with a severe cold since the Wichita Falls game. He was on the field yesterday, but unable to take part in active scrimmage. The other co-captain, Mina Watkins, who flashed brilliantly in the Wichita Falls game, has been slightly under the weather since Saturday and may not play against Childress. One or two other injuries may prevent the Westerner coach from submitting his first string lineup against the Bobcats.

Big Spring Is Air Mail Stop

Celebration to Mark Arrival of First Plane Over New Transcontinental Line on October Sixteenth

BIG SPRING, Oct. 7. (Special)—Elaborate preparations are being made by the Big Spring chamber of Commerce to entertain with a suitable celebration the arrival of the first air mail plane due to meet in Big Spring on the morning of October 16.

Big Spring has been selected as the only stop between Ft. Worth and El Paso on the east-west line and the terminus to Houston, San Antonio, San Angelo, Big Spring line. The ship bringing mail into Big Spring from the south will make connection with the ship to Los Angeles and will remain in Big Spring until the ship arrives from Los Angeles. It will then complete the flight to Houston the same afternoon. Big Spring was selected as the control point on the two transcontinental air mail lines because of its strategic location and airport equipment.

A Western Electric Airways broadcasting station is now being installed on the Big Spring port. With this equipment conversations can be carried on with pilots in the air as far away as 300 miles, according to Lee Garner, local port manager. The present code station now in operation will also be retained and operated between stations along the route. An effort is being made to have 200 pounds of air mail for the first ships leaving the Big Spring port on Oct. 16. The personnel of the Big Spring airport, which has charge of operations, includes: Lee Garner, local and division operations manager; Sam Harry, head of the radio department; Louis Miller, shop manager and chief mechanic; Bob Salting, assistant mechanic in charge of gasoline sales and Babe Thompson, assistant shop manager.

Survey Completed By Texas-Pacific

BIG SPRING, Oct. 7. (Special)—Final survey for the Texas and Pacific Northern railway has been made through Howard county according to report given out by Mr. Ford, engineer for the Texas and Pacific Railway company. Definite plans for securing the right-of-way will be made within the next few days, according to E. A. Kelley, chairman Big Spring Chamber of Commerce railroad committee.

A guarantee to furnish the right-of-way was given by the city of Big Spring immediately following the announcement of the project. A preliminary hearing before the interstate commerce commission will be granted sometime during the month of November in the opinion of Garland Woodward, attorney for the city of Big Spring. The petition asking for grant of convenience is being enthusiastically supported by all the communities being touched or served by the proposed line.
