Public transportation grant given go-ahead by C-Court

People for Progress, Inc. obtained a resolution from the Mitchell County Commissioners' Court Thursday morning that would allow the organization to provide public transportation to the citizens of Mitchell County.

Gladys Gerst, a representative for PPI, said that the transportation system would be used to take citizens grocery shopping, to work, to school or to visit a friend.

It provides a way of getting from one place to another for those

who do not have a reliable form of transportation, she said.

The service would cover a five county area including Mitchell, Scurry, Fisher, Nolan and rural Taylor Counties.

This public service would not be limited to senior citizens, handicapped or low income persons, but would be accessible to anyone wanting to use it as a form of transportation, Gerst added.

Gerst pointed out that all the vehicles used would be equipped to handle handicapped patrons as well.

Costs for using this service would be \$1 for inside the city

limits and .25 for every additional mile outside the city limits.

Gerst made it clear that the County would not have to pay for any part of the project because it is funded by the Texas Department of Transportation through Section 18 grant funds, which require PPI to match dollars with the state.

"The only thing we are asking for is permission to come in and provide transportation to Mitchell County residents," Gerst said.

Two types of transportation services will be provided by PPI.

The first is a demand response

Construction on state jail moved up

Construction on the new state jail in Colorado City has been moved up eight weeks from its original date.

The jail is expected to be completed on July 5, 1995, instead of its original September 1, 1995 date.

According to Nancy Sullivan, a spokeswoman for the Mitchell County Economic Development Board, a pre-bid date has been set for September 25 in Colorado City.

"Actual bids will be taken October 11," she said.

Construction on the \$21 million site is expected to begin November 8.

The jail is being constructed as a result of a recent court order that gave Texas until September 1995 to ease overcrowding in state prison and jail facilities.

The Texas Department of Criminal Justice is expecting the use of local and minority personnel on this project.

Democrats to place Richmond on ballot

The Mitchell County Democratic Party Executive Committee has chosen to place Kay Richmond's name on the November 8 election ballot as its choice to run for the Justice of the Peace position Districts 2 and 3.

Chairman for the Executive

Committee Woody Anderson said five applications were submitted.

Edith Womack, Ronnie Bannister, Tex Blankenship and Billy Ray Williamson were the other applicants.

Richmond has been a resident of Colorado City almost four years. She was born in Tom Green County and had been a long time resident of Midland prior to coming to Colorado City.

Richmond said she feels her prior job experiences have prepared her for the JP position.

"I have worked with the public in some capacity since the age of 16," she said. "I have a lot of management experience that I feel aids me in dealing with people in both pleasant circumstances and in those circumstances which might be more difficult or sensitive."

Pre-bid meeting lays out plans for prison industry building

The Texas Department of Criminal Justice was host at a pre-bid meeting held at the C.C. Thompson Room Wednesday afternoon that gave contractors information on the proposed industry building to be constructed at the Wallace Unit.

The actual bidding for the industry building will take place September 4.

Nancy Sullivan, spokeswoman for the Mitchell County Economic Development Board, said construction on the \$3 million site is scheduled to begin in early October.

She added that she expects the project will be completed between three and six months.

Feasibility study is okayed by Commissioners

People for Progress returned to the Mitchell County Commissioner's Court Thursday morning with a consultant to discuss a proposed idea for a day care facility and community center.

The Commissioners approved a motion to allow PPI and its consultant to pursue a feasibility study into the County's need for the facilities.

Kaye Howard, a consultant from Lubbock, said the possibility of Mitchell County obtaining a grant from the Texas Community Development Program's Community Development Fund did not look good.

"I didn't mean to come in here

Doctor reception set for Sunday

Drs. Gus A. Gross and Dan Scott both agree on several things. They are both overwhelmed by the support given to them by Colorado City residents, they both wanted to get back to the rural lifestyle and they both find themselves working with some of the best staff they have ever worked with.

And...they and their families are excited to be here.

Dr. Gross is a Cuban-born, Spanish-speaking, former member of the U.S. Airforce.

He grew up in Miami, Fla. where he received his undergraduate degree at Miami-Dade Community College. He then pursued a career in medicine at UCE in the Dominican Republic.

From there, Dr. Gross said, he did one year of his residency at the Veterans Administration Medical Center at Duke University in Nashville, Tenn. His emphasis was on internal medicine.

After a year at Duke he finished his residency at East Tennessee State University James H. Quillen College of Medicine, where because he had previously had a year in internal medicine, he was allowed to take pediatric and obstetrical courses.

While he was doing his residency, Dr. Gross was the recipient of several awards including Outstanding Resident of the Year and a Society of American Teachers of Family Medicine Award.

According to Dr. Gross, in 1990 he became involved in the Air Force's Sponsorship Program, which permitted him to get through school in exchange for time in the service. He was on active duty from 1992-94.

While in the Air Force he served as Assistant Chief of Family Practice for the 93rd Medical Group, Castle Air Force Base, Calif.

Dr. Gross said he feels that being fluent in Spanish has helped him to relate to the Hispanic population of the community.

"I think they feel more comfortable with me and enjoy being spoken to in Spanish," he said.

He added that he feels this acceptance by the Hispanic population has made adjustments easier for him.

Gross said he thought that working with the civilian population and the military population were similar.

"It's not different from working with the uniformed services at all," he said. "You strive to do the best you can and you get feedback that affects the way you provide care."

His wife, Robin, and his sons Justin, 11, and Michael, 7 are all adjusting well to life in Colorado City.

Dr. Gross said there were several reasons he and his family chose to live here.

"Some of the main reasons we came here were because we wanted to get away from crime and we wanted a better lifestyle and a better environment to raise our children," he said. "The school system is the best we've seen for the public sector."

Local resident in need of heart transplant

Colorado City resident George Ward is a candidate for a heart transplant as a result of a third heart attack he suffered on August 15.

A fund has been set up in his name at the Mitchell County Branch of the Big Spring Education Employees Federal Credit Union to help defer the medical costs.

His wife, Linda Ward, said the total cost for the transplant will run into hundreds of thousands of dollars.

"The medication alone for the first year will cost \$32 thousand," she said.

The family has accepted donations from friends and there is some talk about holding a benefit dance, she added.

Ward, 45, has suffered three heart attacks in the last year.

According to his wife, after the first heart attack in July of last year, a doctor from Lubbock told the Wards that his heart was in good shape and did not give him advice on what to do to prevent a second heart attack.

I don't think the first doctor

was honest with us," she said. "He really didn't know what he was talking about."

Mrs. Ward said she felt that if a bypass had been performed after the

Dr. Gross pointed out that he interviewed in several other states including Alaska, Colorado and Iowa, before deciding to come to Colorado City.

"We really hope to make this our hometown," he said. Dr. Dan Scott is a native Texan from Richardson, a suburb outside of Dallas.

He received his degree from Texas Christian University and then attended the University of Texas Medical School in Houston for three years.

He served three years as an intern and resident at John Peter Smith Hospital in Fort Worth.

Dr. Scott went on to practice medicine in Athens for nine years and later in Lake Jackson for four years, prior to accepting the Colorado City position.

Like the Gross family, Dr. Scott and his wife of 20 years, Leslie, his two sons Danny, 16, Kenneth, 6, and his daughter Ann Marie, 13, are all successfully adjusting to small town life.

Dr. Scott said he chose to practice medicine in Colorado City because in the past, he had been moving away from a rural practice and getting into a more suburban one.

"I wanted to get back to the rural practice," he said. "So far it's been a challenge to get back into the groove of things."

Scott explained that as a practicing physician in more suburban areas he did not have to be on call at night and did not perform some of the duties that he does now.

"Now I get to deliver babies and do a few more procedures that we don't have specialists for," he said.

Drs. Gross and Scott both said that the Mitchell County Hospital District staff is among the most professional and most efficient staff they have ever worked with.

"The quality of medicine offered to a small town is fantastic here," Dr. Gross said. "The staffing is the best I've ever worked with."

Dr. Scott shared his colleague's opinion.

"This hospital district is unique in that there is no competition between the different groups," Dr. Scott said. "Everybody is on the same team and working together, which makes it a lot more efficient to do things."

A reception to welcome Drs. Gross and Scott is scheduled for Sunday, August 28, from 2-4 p.m. at the Family Medical Associates Clinic, 505 Chestnut Street.

The reception will provide an opportunity for the community to become acquainted with the doctors and their families and to welcome them to Mitchell County.

Sullivan said the reasons behind the pre-bid meeting was to view the site and to give general contractors the chance to meet local contractors.

"Anyone who wants to bid had to come and see the site," she said. "[We are] also encouraging the general contractors to hire locally."

Sullivan said there was a large local population that would be able to work on the facility if hired.

TDCJ representative Bill Gains told contractors what was required of them.

"Our minority participation goal

for this project is 30 percent," he said. "I realize that the demographics of Colorado City and the Panhandle might make this difficult, but please consider all your options."

He explained that not only hiring minorities as sub-contractors or for labor crews, but buying materials from minority businesses would also help to fulfill the 30 percent goal.

Sullivan said the facility would be used as a work station by inmates to make inmate and government employee uniforms.

first heart attack that the second and third attacks would have been prevented.

She added that after his second heart attack the Wards changed doctors.

"After the second heart attack the doctor suggested that he get on disability and retire and prescribed a low sodium diet and exercise," she said.

Ward's second heart attack left his heart in only 40 percent working order. In August, his third

and throw cold water on your project," she said.

Howard explained that recent changes in the scoring system used to decide whether or not a municipality receives a grant would make it difficult for the county to obtain state funding for the project.

"Counties are limited because they don't have water and sewage plants or high concentration of numbers," she said.

Howard said the possibility in pursuing this project at a later date was still open.

"In the future the state and appointed committees may loosen up on where they think the priorities are," she said. "So, this does not mean that some time in the future this wouldn't be a good project to apply for."

However, she added that if the County was serious in its pursuit of a new day care facility there were other avenues the Commissioners could take to obtain the necessary monies needed to complete the project.

"The best alternative would be to seek private foundation dollars," she said.

Howard said if the County

"We had a choice of relocating to different areas, but we like Colorado City and decided that this is where we want to retire."

"Oil filter recycling is quickly becoming a success story," said Kit Seay, manager of used oil grants and outreach in the CLEAN TEXAS 2000 pollution prevention program of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC).

"Oil filters are completely recyclable. We can truly close the recycling loop and keep an incred-

ible amount of material out of our landfills," said Seay. Since imposing a statewide ban in April 1 against dumping used filters in landfills, the state has been encouraging the establishment of more oil filter collection centers. "We have about 800 public and private centers that will take used filters and the number is growing constantly," Seay said.

According to TNRCC estimates, roughly three million gallons of used motor oil are contained in the 50 million filters used in Texas each year.

When placed in landfills, the oil becomes a potential contaminant of Texas waterways.

"In addition, we were wasting a tremendous resource in the materials found in the filters themselves," Seay said.

More than 1,200 service stations, auto parts stores and oil-change businesses across the state accept up to five gallons of used motor oil at no charge to the customer.

Many of the same locations that accept used oil will also accept used oil filters.

Through its Texas Country Cleanup program, the TNRCC has collected more than 24,000 gallons of used motor oil and nearly 20,000 oil filters in 1994. This rural collection program also accepts empty pesticide containers, used tires and lead-acid batteries.

 • Change your oil and filter on a clean, dry surface.

Register now for fall GED class

According to Reily, the informality of the classes helps students to feel more relaxed.

"We try to make the classes as informal as possible with each student free to advance at his or her own pace," he said.

Reily said that both he and Conner were looking forward to the new year.

"It has been very gratifying to see so many students in the last two or three years obtain much better jobs that require a high school diploma or GED certification," he added.

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- Use a drop cloth to catch accidental spills.
- Always set the emergency brake and block tires to prevent accidents.
- Use a wide, flat pan or basin to prevent splatters and catch all of the oil.
- Drain the oil from the collection pan via a funnel into a milk jug, an empty four-quart oil jug or a container purchased specifically for used oil.
- Containers with screw-on caps work well to prevent spills during transport.
- Drain oil that remains in the filter by setting the filter in a funnel that drains into a milk jug and allowing it to drain for 24 hours or puncturing a hole in the top of the filter and allowing it to drain into a suitable container.
- Remember—it's almost impossible to get the last drop out of the filter. Care must be taken during transport.
- Filters can easily and safely be carried in a milk jug (cut out the side of the jug and leave the handle on) or in a container made specifically for oil filters.
- Call before you leave home to be sure the location will accept oil and filters.
- If you cannot find a convenient collection location, store your filters in a safe place.

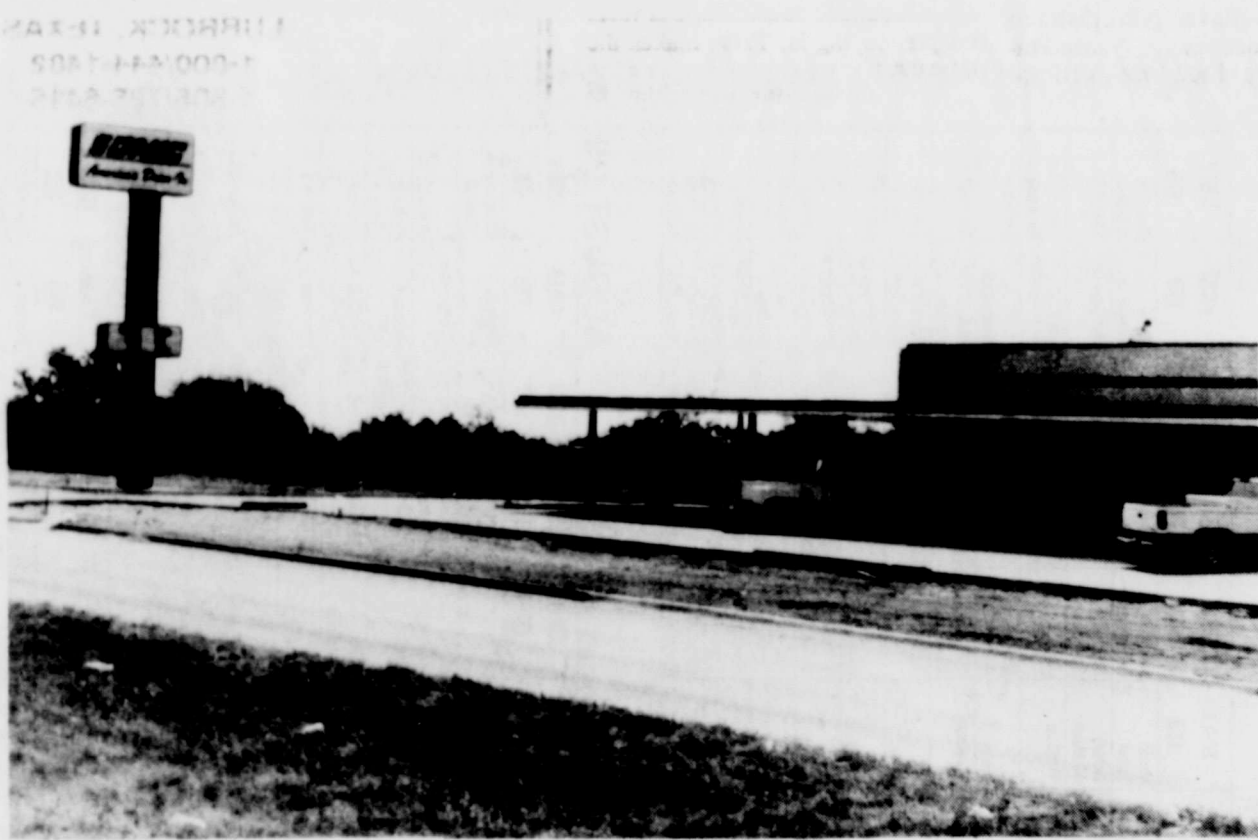
