Polish Plane Believed To Be Over Mid-Atlantic Body of Slain Girl Found Near Hollywood; Man Held

Girl Is Identified As Member Of Prominent Philadelphia Family By Wife of Man Held for Police Probe

Physicians Say Victim Was
About to Become A
Mother; Suspect Denies
Any Connection.

WAS FORMER CREDIT MANAGER FOR STORE

Wife, From Whom Suspect
Separated for More Than
Year, Says Two Became
Acquainted In East.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 3 (AP).—A man known here as Russell Barlowe and Russell St. Clair Barlowe, whom police believe is a member of a prominent Philadelphia family today was held in connection with the death of a young woman whose body was found in Stone Canyon, north of Hollywood last night.

The woman about 22, with whom police said Barlowe or Barlett lived in north Hollywood, was known as Norma Barber, Norma Barlowe and Barbara Morrow. Officers said they had information she, too, came from a prominent Philadelphia family. Physicians said she was about to become a mother when her death occurred, apparently from a bullet wound in the head.

Barlowe denied knowledge of her death, but stated he and the young woman had lived together, had quarreled and that she had left him in Stone Canyon when they had gone there on an automobile ride.

Embezzlement Was Charged In East

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 3 (AP).—Harrell St. Clair Barlett believed to be the man under arrest in Los Angeles in connection with the slaying of a young woman near Hollywood, was formerly credit manager for a Philadelphia department store. He deserted his wife and two children here in 1927 and disappeared.

Refinery Blast Toll Reaches 23

Physicians Endeavor To
Save Lives of Thirteen
Survivors But Little Hope
For Any Is Held.

VINCENNES, Ind., Aug. 3 (AP).—While the number of dead in the Lawrenceville, Ill., refinery explosion Wednesday reached 23 tonight, physicians endeavored to save the lives of the 13 remaining survivors. Little hope, however, was held for any of the men although hospital attaches said three or four might pull through.

Horton In Final Stretch

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 3 (AP).—Gov. Henry H. Horton entered the stretch in the democratic gubernatorial race today with an unofficial advantage of approximately 2,500 votes over H. H. McCallister, but the latter's headquarters declined to concede his nomination.

SMILE ALMOST SAVED OREGON

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 3 (AP).—The winning smile of General Alvaro Obregon fell just short of staying the shots which ended his life, his assassin, Jose De Leon Tural, told an interviewer for El Universal Grafico, Mexico City daily, today.

Tural said that as he handed the slip of paper on which he had drawn a cartoon of the president-elect to him, Obregon smiled fleetingly. So friendly, charming it was, Tural said, that he felt a flash of uncertainty and hesitated.

But then he remembered that he was doing what he considered God's work. He says he whispered an Ave Maria, commended his soul to God, and with a prayer on his lips pulled the trigger of his gun, and pumped the fatal bullets through General Obregon's body.

July Rain Total Boosted by Third Of Inch Friday

Rains Reported In Every Direction, Though No Section Reports Heavy Downpours.

Following slight rainfall early yesterday morning additional moisture was received over this section.

Hoover Forces May
Gain Convention
At Dallas, Fear

DALLAS, Aug. 3 (AP).—Efforts of leaders of the Dallas county democratic faction, opposed to the election of Governor Alfred E. Smith and of Smith followers to effect an agreement on the program of tomorrow's county convention failed today.

After unsuccessful conferences between George Puri, representing the anti-Smith group, and C. C. Renfro, Smith supporter, each side began preparations for a fight on the floor of the assembly tomorrow. Leaders of the Smith group admitted probable defeat tomorrow. In that event they said that they might hold a separate convention and name delegates to the state convention at San Antonio.

Women Hold Meeting At Fort Worth Friday

FORT WORTH, Aug. 3 (AP).—Organized opposition to the presidential candidacy of Governor Al E. Smith because of his attitude toward prohibition was launched among Tarrant county democratic women at the initial meeting today of the central committee for the Hoover for president club.

Approximately 100 women attended. They declared they were not "bottlers" from the democratic party but intended to support the republican nominee.

BANDIT CONVICTED

Chicagoan Dealt 25 Years
And Big Fine

CHICAGO, Aug. 3 (AP).—Charles "Lumpy" Cleaver, head of the band that held up and robbed a Grand Trunk mail train at Evergreen Park last February, escaping with \$123,000, today was sentenced by Federal Judge James H. Wilkerson to serve 25 years in the Atlanta penitentiary and pay a fine of \$10,000.

"Lumpy" was convicted yesterday with Charles S. Wharton, Wharton, convicted of conspiracy and facing a maximum sentence of two years in prison and a fine of \$10,000, has made a motion for a new trial which will be argued in September.

SERVICE CHARGE

Call Loans by Non-Bank
Interests to Cost

NEW YORK, Aug. 3 (AP).—The New York clearing house association today approved an amendment to the constitution providing for a bank service charge of one-half of one percent on call loans made by non-bank interests.

The new rate, effective September 1, in effect doubles present service charge of 5 per cent. on the interest yield when the call money rate is 5 per cent.

HOOVER FINISHES

Acceptance Speech Is Now
Ready for Delivery

Aug. 3 (AP).—Herbert Hoover had unburdened himself tonight of the long task of preparing the address which he is to deliver here a week from tomorrow formally accepting the Republican nomination for president.

The computed draft of the speech about six thousand words, was sent to the printer late today. After the nominee had labored all day with it, assisted at times by William J. Donovan, assistant to the United States attorney general and foremost in Hoover's counsel of advisers.

Equalization Fee Unacceptable To Smith, He Avers

Nominee Says He Has No
Plan For Agriculture
Surplus Control, As Yet;
To Confer With Walsh.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3 (AP).—The equalization fee provision of the vetoed McNary-Haugen farm relief bill is unacceptable to Gov. Smith, and so far as he is concerned it can stay in the scrap heap for good.

The democratic presidential nominee recognizes and feels that his party by its platform is committed to control of the sale of agricultural surpluses with the cost borne by the crop group benefited, but his thumbs are turned down on the McNary-Haugen method.

Pacing newspapermen today in his suite, Smith went further on the farm question than he did yesterday after talking things over with George N. Peek, Illinois farm leader who has cast his lot with the democrats.

Someone recalled this sentence in his statement of yesterday: "control of the sale of agricultural surplus is an essential need." Its goal to be imposed on the unit to be benefited, and that if elected, that was to be construed as an endorsement of the equalization fee principle.

Smith turned to an editorial declaring that it summed up his views "concisely." Comedian From Stage

NEW LONDON, Conn., Aug. 3 (AP).—Fred Stone, whose stage antics above provoked mirth for half a century, may have to forego his career as a result of injuries he received in a plane crash near the Grison airport today.

The veteran comedian received a double compound fracture of the left leg, fractured right thigh, fractured lower jaw, fractured left wrist, dislocation of the left ankle and right shoulder, lacerations of the scalp and hands, and abrasions of the face.

Two Women Die In Shooting Fray At Waco Friday

Police Believe Slayer Was
Temporarily Deranged;
Shooting Took Place In
Newspaper Office.

WACO, Aug. 3 (AP).—24-year-old Mrs. B. O. Ashworth walked into the joint offices of the Waco News-Tribune and Times-Herald today, engaged Miss Charlie Lawson, 24, in a brief, low-voiced conversation and a moment later shot her to death as she ran screaming for safety behind a concrete pillar.

Menacing other clerks with a tiny automatic pistol, Mrs. Ashworth sought to force said down the throat of her 18-month-old daughter, whom she carried in her arms, and then drained the fatal contents of the pistol just as her husband, cashier for the newspaper, rushed upon the scene.

Mrs. Ashworth died a few minutes later at a hospital. The baby was said by physicians not to have been injured seriously.

Believed Temporarily Deranged. Ashworth declined to make a statement. After an investigation the police reported that they believed Mrs. Ashworth had slain Miss Lawson while temporarily deranged.

Nobody heard the conversation which preceded the shooting. Ashworth said he had not known of his wife's presence until he heard three shots.

Newspaper employees said that Mrs. Ashworth appeared to be composed as she entered the office, carrying her baby daughter in her arms. Nothing unusual was noticed until Miss Lawson leaped to her feet, shrieked and raced toward the concrete pillar. Without another word Mrs. Ashworth whipped out the little pistol and began shooting in her hand when she sank to the floor unconscious from the acid.

An inquest was set for tomorrow.

In East

NEW YORK, Aug. 3 (AP).—Eastern states, sweltering in the second day of a torrid wave, were promised no relief before tomorrow night.

Rhode Island in a twenty-four hour period had two deaths, attributed to heat, and several prostrations.

Boston, with 94, equalled the highest mark of the season which was reached on July 3.

New York sweltered under a high humidity, the thermometer reading 90 late today. There were several prostrations.

Death of Morris Hildefer, Columbia graduate student, today brought weather fatalities in New York to seven since the heat wave began two days ago.

Chicago Election Probe Implicates Those Higher Up

Prominent Leaders In City's
'Bloody Twentieth' Ward
Fall Under Scrutiny Of
Special Grand Jury.

CHICAGO, Aug. 3 (AP).—The special grand jury investigating irregularities in connection with the April primaries today hit at the "higher ups" toward whom it has been directing its guns since the inquiry started two months ago.

Returning a blanket indictment charging conspiracy to violate the election laws the July special grand jury included in its list of twenty persons the names of Morris Eller, city collector and Republican nominee for sanitary district trustee; his son, Judge Emanuel Eller, until recently acting chief justice of the criminal court; State Senator Jas. B. Leonard, Abe Klass, related to the Ellers, and others prominent in Republican politics in the "bloody twentieth ward" of which Morris Eller is the self-styled "boss."

The July grand jury as it passed out of existence returned fourteen indictments in all, naming more than a score on charges of election day kidnappings and assaults and recommending that an August special grand jury be called to carry on the quiz.

The call was petitioned today, the August grand jury being the third to be called to investigate violence, fraud and at least one slaying in connection with the primaries.

One count in the blanket indictment against Eller and the others accused the defendants of conspiring in the killing of Octavius Grandy, negro politician and opponent of Morris Eller for ward committeeman. He was shot on primary day.

Both Morris Eller and his son issued statements that they would not resign their political positions. Each charged indictments were inspired by the newspapers and by their political enemies.

MYSTERY CLEARS

Death of Boy On July 1 Is
Explained

AMAROSA, Ill., Aug. 3 (AP).—The mystery slaying of Harry Boyd, eight-year-old Omaha boy who has been missing since July 1, was solved today when Clarence Lukens, 21, confessed to reformatory officials here.

Lukens was sentenced to 12 years confinement two days after killing the youth, when he was found guilty of assaulting a young girl who resided in the same neighborhood.

BULLET IN HEAD

Still, Negro Girl Lives, At
Marlin

MARLIN, Aug. 3 (AP).—Johnny Ellis, Amos, two-year-old negro girl of South Marlin, probably will go through life with a bullet in her head.

After being shot accidentally yesterday when a pistol with which he was playing was fired, the girl was rushed to a local hospital. An x-ray showed the bullet lodged in the back of her head.

Are Not Sighted At Azores But Are Believed Flying In More Direct Route for New York.

CONDITIONS FAIRLY FAVORABLE FOR HOP.

No Radio Aboard and Craft
Stripped Down to Bare
Necessities; Take-off Was
Startling.

Another trans-Atlantic flight venture has entered the silent phase of such attempts.

At 9 p. m. Eastern standard time last night, 21 hours after it had left Le Bourget flying field, the "Marshall Pilsudski" plane of Major Louis Laskowski and Kazimierz Kubala, Polish fliers, had not been seen since a reported sighting in the Bay of Biscay, 60 miles off the French coast, early yesterday.

Failure of the plane to be sighted at Horta, Azores, which it was expected to reach possibly before midnight Friday, caused no immediate apprehension, however, inasmuch as the fliers had stated that if all went well they might steer a true course to the north of the archipelago and miss it altogether.

Discounting the effect of adverse winds and other possible adverse weather conditions, the plane was expected to arrive in New York as early as 1 p. m. Saturday (E. S. T.) 37 hours after its start. To do this would require it to maintain an average speed of 100 miles an hour.

WHY IS IT?
These words of wisdom spring from one of the frequent anonymous communications sent forth by an organization self-styled "Association Overworked-Underpaid-Dishwashing - Housewives" with headquarters "By the Cook-Stove and the Cradle with the Wash-Tub Nearby." The communications are not always so sensible as this sample.

One is oftentimes prompted to believe that the most modest women are those who have the least affection about their bodies and make no pretense to draping them. The attitude expressed in the communication goes back to a day when woman was man's possession and as such he resented the gaze of other males at his property.

SHALL BABIES BE SAVED?
The infant mortality rate in cities of the United States dropped to 94.9 deaths for each 1000 babies last year, the lowest it has ever been. This creates one of those odd personal-impersonal situations. Scientists—eugenicists, biologists, statesmen deplore the fact. They know that one of the most alarming phenomena of life today is the ever-increasing life line and the ever-decreasing death line. The earth cannot much longer feed our population, they say. But biologists, eugenicists, economist, statesmen, is also a father, and as a father he calls this decreased infant mortality news—the greatest news possible.

The little 3-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Poole, of Grenadier, Ontario, seemingly was drowned the other day. She had been in the water three hours where she lay unconscious, stupored by a fall onto a rock which her father found her. He picked her up by the back, carried her to shore, and in a few moments noticed that the child was breathing. The doctor explained that lying unconscious from the blow on her head, she had taken little water into her lungs, and that which she did was expelled when her father carried her head downwards.

"But I never worry. We taught them how to take care of themselves when they were young. They get their bumps, of course, but they usually come out all right."

"But you can't stop an airplane if it falls, and automobiles get wrecked with the best of drivers."

"Yes—that's true. Of course I do have my bad moments with such an adventuresome family. But they have that feeling of safety always that they get when they are in an emergency. That's half of it. All of them have cool heads, quick judgment and steady nerves. They don't worry so I don't."

It is an age of machinery. Chance plays a bigger part in our

lives than it did in the lives of our fathers. It is going to play a still bigger part in the lives of our children.

They are entitled to be taught to take care of their bodies as early in life as possible. They can't learn that sitting still.

Children can learn to swim at three. I should have a child taught swimming in a safe place, of course, when he is five or six years old at least.

BREAKFAST—Blackberries, cereal, cream, omelets, popovers, milk coffee.

LUNCHEON—Open tomato sandwiches, gooseberry tapioca pudding, milk tea.

DINNER—Stuffed calves' hearts, potatoes in parsley butter, stewed onions, head lettuce with Thousand Island dressing, sliced peaches chocolate layer cake, milk, coffee.

Wash hearts thoroughly and let stand in very cold salt water for an hour. Then remove any muscular portions and stuff with any well seasoned stuffing. Bake two and one-half hours, basting frequently. Fat should be added since heart is lacking in fat. If a fireless cooker is used allow about four hours for cooking and add 1-2 cup water.

Gooseberry Tapioca Pudding—One-half cup pearl tapioca, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1 cup boiling water, 2 cups gooseberries, 1 cup sugar, cream.

Soak tapioca in slightly salted water over night. Drain and put in double boiler with water and salt. Cook over hot water until tapioca has absorbed all the water. Add sugar and gooseberry tender and broken and tapioca is transparent. Turn into individual molds and chill. Serve with sugar and cream.

Remove "tops" and "tails" from berries before washing them. Take care not to break the skins of the fruit when working with them.

Quick cooking tapioca can be used in place of pearl. The quick cooking variety needs no soaking. Use one-third as much minute tapioca as pearl.

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Hoover Managers Quietly Build Up Forces In South

Hope to Make Organization Acceptable Both to Bolters and Old Line Republicans As Well.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—Quietly but vigorously representatives of Herbert Hoover's national political managers are building up an organization in the South with attention centered on lining up a group acceptable both to the bolting Democrats and to the old line Republicans of that region.

Chairman Work of the national committee, who left today for conference with middle west and far west Republican leaders, has been giving the South consideration and as the first step in a possible campaign below the Mason and Dixon line he decided to build up new organizations where needed.

The work has been going on almost since the national convention with Horace A. Mann, former Tennessee leader, in charge, but it has been proceeding without much publicity so far as Mann and his cohorts are concerned.

Already signs of the work are appearing. Reports have reached Washington of the setup of a new Republican organization in Georgia where the party factions have been engaged in dispute for some time. So it is going in other states, although the regular Republican leaders in North Carolina seem to be acceptable to party leaders without the remodeling process.

It is the opinion of leaders that success in the South must be predicated on the establishment of responsible leaders in charge of the organization to this end Mann is bending his efforts.

To what extent the Republicans will set aside precedent and actively campaign in the hitherto neglected Democratic stronghold awaits a conference of party leaders, here in September must the return of Herbert Hoover and Chairman Work from the Pacific Coast.

Removal of One of Chiefs As Judge Brings Matters To Climax and Results In Denunciation of Hulbert

AMSTERDAM, Holland, Aug. 3. — A wide open split has developed in ranks of amateur athletic union officials connected with the American Olympic organization. 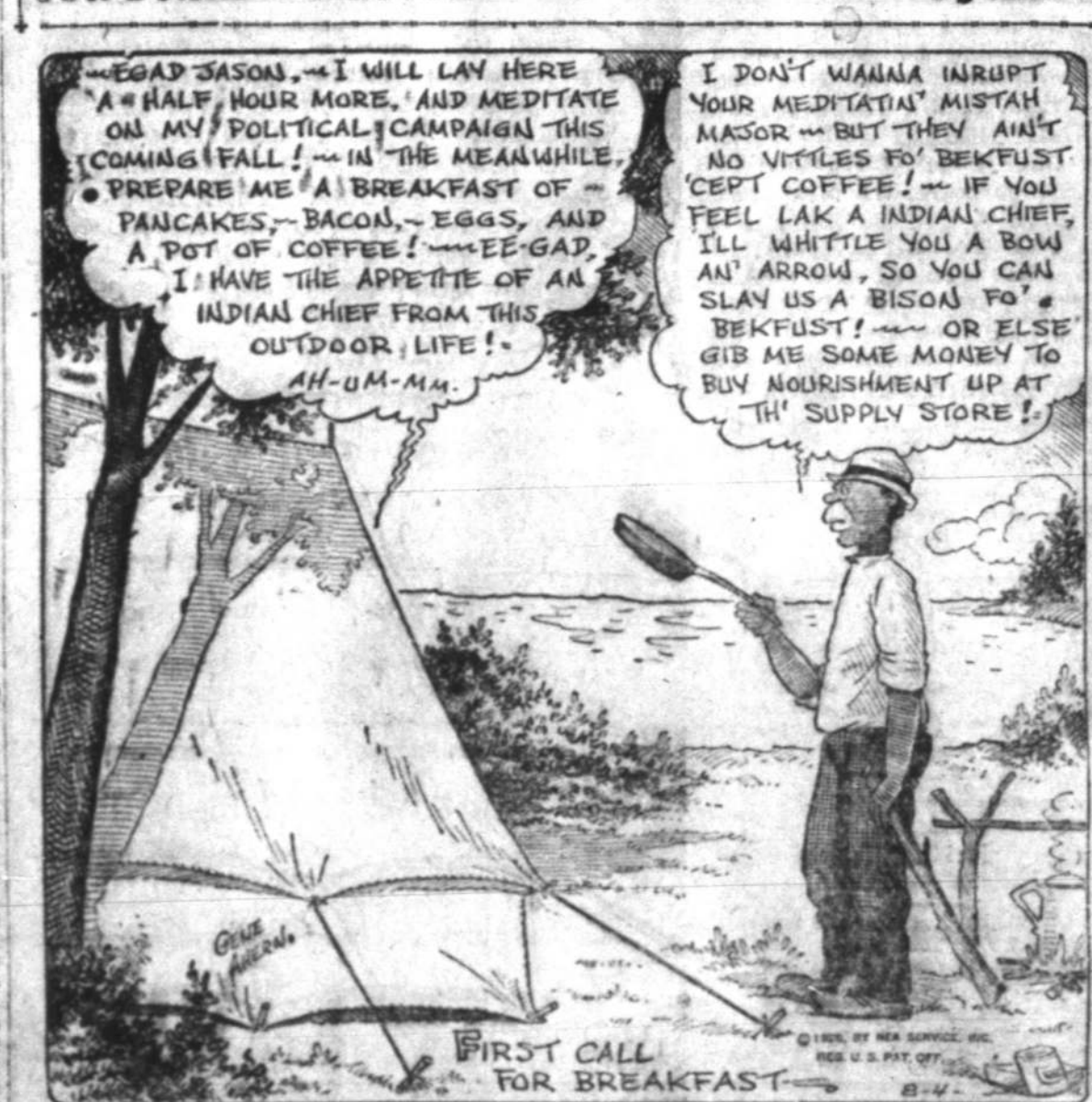

Aviators Make Good Time As Last Sighted

PARIS, Aug. 3 (AP).—Trying to be first to reverse the route of Lindbergh's New York-Paris flight, two majors of the Polish army air service, Idzikowski and Kubala, tonight were believed winging their way westward somewhere over the Atlantic.

They staked high hopes against a low barometer, but made excellent progress through heavy, foggy weather until they disappeared off the French coast.

Their big machine was sighted 60 miles off the French coast three hours after its last sighting from Le Bourget field. The Aviators, in mid Atlantic probably will be the next point to signal the passage unless some stray ship spies them.

They hope to reach the Azores after about 16 hours flying, bringing them there between 10 p. m. and midnight Paris time (between 4 and 6 p. m. Eastern standard time).

No radio is aboard. The plane was stripped down to bare necessities and even then made a take-off that caused during French aviation at Le Bourget to gasp. Absence of radio means the officers must continue their struggle with air and water—and perhaps the danger of fire—until dusk of Saturday, when they hoped to sight the skyscrapers of New York.

Despite the risk involved the two took off as simply as if they were going downtown to business. They slipped dungarees over street clothes and did not even take a clean shirt. If they need shaves when they reach New York some other person's razors will be used. Even that small implement was discarded from their equipment.

Hoover Uses Much Care In Arranging Acceptance Speech

Nominee Spends Days In Laboring Over Address Which Will Mark Official Notification

(By Associated Press.)
STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Aug. 3.—Behind the thick oaken door which shuts off the study in his hillside home here, Herbert Hoover devoted today to putting the finishing touches to the most momentous address of his career, that accepting the republican nomination for president.

In this address, to be delivered in the Stanford stadium one week from tomorrow, he will present his views on the two most discussed issues of the campaign, prohibition and farm relief, and mention other issues which he believes must have their weight in the scales by which the voters will measure the candidates on November 6.

Philosophy To Be Studied
As important as Hoover's pronouncements may be upon these subjects, astute political observers will study his address for something more, for those things which will reflect his personality and disclose to the nation his philosophy of government. Since this is Hoover's first adventure upon the highway to elective office, leaders of his party frankly say that these things will be of high importance.

He has sought advice from many sources upon a variety of subjects and he has had advice thrust upon him. All has been weighed with the care with which he handles problems, but his closest advisers have asserted that the ultimate decision as to what is to be said and the manner of the saying has been his own.

The address has been shaped and reshaped, and now is taking the final form by way of alterations in the printed copy run off as the nominee was putting affairs political behind him for his journey through the land of redwoods and fish streams that stretch far to the northward of this university. Coat off, his huge oaken desk cleared of all except the print of the speech, the nominee went over the document paragraph by paragraph.

DAILY MARKETS

NEW YORK, Aug. 3. (P)—The cotton market was nervous and irregular again today. Early advances were followed by partial reactions. After selling up to 19.60 and closed at 19.44. The general market closing very steady, at net gains of 14 to 26 points.

The opening was firm at an advance of 15 to 25 points on covering with possibly some buying in anticipation of rallies after recent severe declines. Rather steadier Liverpool cables than due on the New York close of the previous day, probably increased the disposition to cover short contracts, while later a private crop report was published indicating a condition of 67.1 and placing the indicated yield at 14,280,000 bales of considerably below the average of previous figures.

Prices worked up to 19.74 for October and 19.53 for January, or about 20 to 25 points net higher on the general list, but demand tapered off at these figures, and the market eased again during the afternoon.

FORT WORTH LIVESTOCK

FORT WORTH, Aug. 3. (P)—With the exception of calves, which were around 25c higher, the cattle trade here today generally was steady. Steers sold from \$9.00 to \$12.75, cows \$7.75 to \$8.75 and calves \$11.75 to \$13.00.

Hogs were steady to 10c lower. The top was \$11.00 and the bulk sold from \$9.00 to \$10.50. Sows were steady, selling from \$8.50 to \$9.00. The sheep market was steady. Fat lamb sold from \$12.00 to \$13.00.

COTTONSEED OIL

NEW YORK, Aug. 3. (P)—The cottonseed oil market was inactive and irregular today, closing 2 points lower, to 7 points higher. Prime winter nominal, prime summer yellow spot 9.50; September closed 9.35; October 9.23; December 9.46; January 9.55; March 9.62.

WALL STREET STOCKS

NEW YORK, Aug. 3. (P)—Lowering of call money rates from 7 to 8 percent, tended to allay speculative uneasiness over the credit situation today, and prices moved irregularly higher under the stimulus of pool operations. Extreme gains of 1 to nearly 7 points in the active issues were out down in some cases by heavy work and profit taking, but a number of active issues closed at or near the day's high levels. Trading showed a marked expansion in volume.

The market ran into some selling at the opening as a result of the increase of \$7,000,000 in federal reserve brokers' loans and nearly \$2,500,000 in rediscounts at the New York Federal reserve bank. These offerings were fairly well absorbed, and the market soon headed upward in response to a brisk demand for the oil shares. The rally gained momentum as trading progressed. The action of the New York clearing house association in adopting regulations designed to restrict the unbridled use of corporation funds in the call loan market, apparently was ignored. Weekly mercantile reviews were cheerful in character, stressing the marked improvement on crops and the stiffening in commodity prices. Another batch of favorable semi-annual earnings statements made their appearance during the day, and the Atlantic Refining corporation announced a proposed change in capitalization which involves the reduction from \$100 to \$80 in the par value of the stock.

Okeh Purchase Of More Road Tools

Half Million In Equipment Is Approved At Session of Highway Commissioners Friday

(By Associated Press.)
AUSTIN, Aug. 3. (P)—The state highway commission in executive session yesterday approved recommendations of the highway department to the state board of control for purchase of some \$500,000 worth of good working machinery and equipment.

The recommended contracts were not divulged but were sent to the board of control for that body's consideration today. Whether the board expected to let contracts immediately could not be learned. Numerous bidders on trucks, graders and other highway paraphernalia, who have been here for several days awaited the outcome of the control board conference. The commission completed its contract letting late yesterday afternoon, authorizing \$1,126,955 worth of work, including some 20 miles of concrete roads in 13 counties. Harney, Kent, Karnes, Baylor, Taylor, Hill, Cherokee, Henderson, Wharton, Milam, Hardin, McCulloch and Navarro.

NEGRO ESCAPES MOB

Is Heavily Barricaded In Oklahoma Jail

DUNCAN, Okla., Aug. 3. (P)—Promise of an immediate trial for James E. Forrest, 27, Longview, Texas, negro, in the event he survives injuries, is believed by Sheriff E. R. Young to have averted violence last night when a crowd swarmed to the court house after Forrest had been arrested for an alleged assault on a white woman. Sheriff Young said today that Forrest was in a dangerous condition from shot gun wounds inflicted by a posse that captured him after a ten hour chase. The negro confessed, according to the sheriff. The victim of the assault was the wife of a farmer living near Comanche.

Shortly after the negro was jailed a crowd began to form. A group of men started into the building. On the first floor they were intercepted by Sheriff Young and Jesse Long, county attorney, who pleaded with them to let the law take its course.

GASSER STILL ACTIVE

Estimate Flow Is Six Million Cubic Feet

HALSTEAD, Kan., Aug. 3. (P)—A flow of gas estimated at 6,000,000 cubic feet a day, struck late yesterday afternoon by the Roxana Petroleum corporation in its well on the Henry estate, three miles north of here, today continued to shoot rock into the air. Drilling was shut down pending orders from headquarters of the company at Ponca City.

The gas is coming from a chat formation said to be the same as that from which wells in the McPherson field, 25 miles farther north, are producing. Depth of the Henry well is 2,965 feet.

Roxana officials said today there were no signs of it but the well might be drilled deeper. In the McPherson field the Mid-Kansas Oil and Gas company has a 200 barrel oil well in the same horizon from which the gas is coming in the Henry well. The nearest oil production is in the old Newton field, 15 miles east.

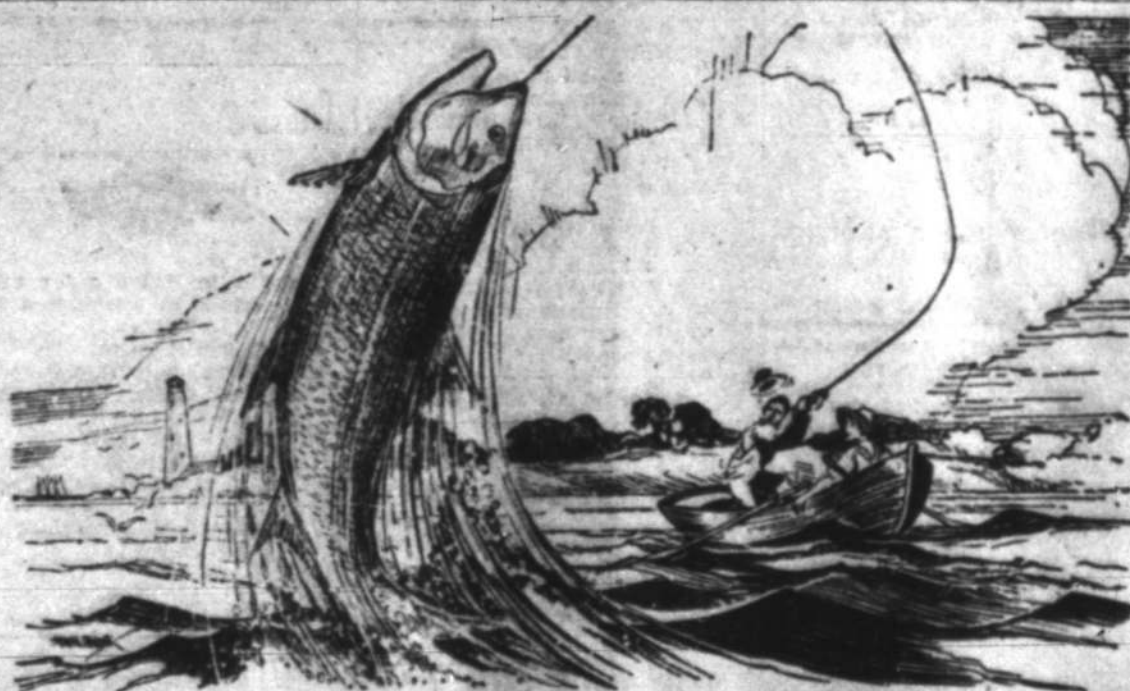
