# Ted Cruz tapped for counsel in US Senate

### Senator uses Harvard skills to build case against 'lawless' president for conservatives

U.S. Sen. Ted Cruz recalls that the Declaration of Independence listed 28 specific legal grievances against King George III of England. His list of "particulars" against President Barack Obama goes up to 76 — and counting.

To Cruz, a Texas Republican known for his vocal opposition to the president, that is not an exercise in historical trivia. It's become a major focus of his Senate office, where he has harnessed his Harvard Law skills to further his narrative of a "lawless" presidency.

Long before the congressional furor over the legality of the Bowe Bergdahl prisoner swap in Afghanistan, Cruz, a potential 2016 presidential contender, was compiling a legal brief questioning the Obama administration's use of executive power.

Policy differences with the White House are hardly new in Washington. But Cruz

has made a name for himself as a leading lawyer for the conservative movement, battling the Obama agenda on health care, crime and immigration — not by passing laws, but by challenging Obama edicts in the legal arena.

#### Call it Ted Cruz, Of Counsel

"Cruz is among the most vocal and energetic advocates for limited constitutional government in our Congress," said Leonard Leo, executive vice president of the conservative-leaning Federalist Society. "There's no one in Congress who has been more systematic in cataloging and critiquing federal branch overreach."

The former Texas solicitor general is often portrayed as an ideological bomb-thrower who shut down the federal government during a budget fight over Obama's health care overhaul.

#### Academic following

But in his first 18 months in the Senate, Cruz, 43, also has cultivated a following in academic circles for his legal work on the limits of federal authority, a cause that has adherents on both the political left and right.

## Wings 'N More Express now open in Midland

Wings 'N More Express, a College Station-based chicken wing restaurant, opens today at 10:30 a.m. and several Texas A&M University alumni have already embraced Midland's newest eatery.

The newly constructed restaurant — next to McAlister's Deli at 4501 W. Wadley Avenue — is the first of several planned West Texas locations to open. Business hours are 10:30 a.m. to 10 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 10:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Sunday.

Mark Dennard, concept founder and

former Aggie, invited the Midland A&M Club to be among the first to try the local version of a popular restaurant near the university's campus.

Others, including the Reporter-Telegram, also were invited to preview Midland's first Wings 'N More before it opened to the public.

The space gives the vibe of a traditional sports bar, as four flat-screen televisions are tuned into ESPN and whichever game may be on at the time. Neon beer signs, hardwood floors, brick walls and exposed ceilings all tie together to provide a relaxed and casual atmosphere.

But what's most different about this

restaurant is that it has a drive-thru, which Dennard calls the company's "bread and butter."

Considering the local population of A&M alumni — and the fact Midlanders love new restaurants — the restaurant's corporate executives anticipate the store will be quite successful.

Richard Gonzalez, director of marketing, was in town last week to help train the local crew. He said more than a dozen members of the Midland A&M Club came out on Friday.

"They're veterans. They've been to our College Station stores," Gonzalez

## DPS: Midland man dies in crash on Highway 191

Death marks 20th fatality this year on Midland County roads

One Midland man died and another is in critical condition at Midland Memorial Hospital after a one-vehicle rollover crash early Sunday morning on Highway 191 near Faudree Road, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Midland County Justice of the Peace George Zimmerman pronounced Luis Escarcega-Brito, 22, dead at the scene of the crash that occurred at about 2:30 a.m. on Highway 191 east of Faudree Road.

The men were in an SUV traveling east on Highway 191. The vehicle left the roadway, went into the center median, then skidded sideways and overturned. Both occupants were ejected from the vehicle. It is unknown who was driving at the time of the crash.

The injured man, a 26-year-old Midlander, was in critical condition Sunday night with incapacitating injuries, according to DPS.

Escarcega-Brito's death marks the 20th fatality this year on roads in Midland County.

The most recent fatality occurred June 2 when a 39-year-old man was killed while crossing Loop 250 on foot near the Midland Drive exit.

On May 27, a 46-year-old Midland man died when the vehicle he was driving collided with a tractor-trailer on East Loop 250 near Interstate 20.

## Last stop, Texas, for country star George Strait

ARLINGTON — Country music king George Strait capped off the last tour of his career with an epic, star-studded final performance at the billion-dollar stadium where the Dallas Cowboys play, dazzling an audience of nearly 105,000 people with duet after duet with some of the biggest names in country music.

The attendance shattered the previous record set by The Rolling Stones at The Louisiana Superdome in 1981. More than 10,000 fans alone took in the three-hour show from the stadium floor.

"Oh, man, I tell you what. This is too much fun," he said. Known for his honky-tonk style, classic interpretation of Western swing and Texas cowboy get-up, Strait is the undisputed patriarch of a generation of country music stars, none of whom left the stage Saturday without paying homage to or receiving a hug from the country music legend.

"In the early '80s when I was a young man in Georgia, I was a big fan of 'Unwound,'" Alan Jackson said of the 1981 hit that propelled Strait to stardom. "You're the reason I came to Nashville, Tennessee. God bless you."

Jason Aldean credited

Strait as "not only a huge influence for me but everyone else in Nashville."

After Martina McBride joined Strait to sing "Jackson," the country classic made famous by the Johnny Cash-June Carter rendition, she remarked on the fun the two had on tour together in 2011 and 2012.

Kenny Chesney called the two years he spent on the road with Strait early in his career "the most educational" in his touring life.

Strait's son, Bubba, a pro team roper on the rodeo circuit, even joined his dad on stage to perform his songwriting debut, "Arkansas Dave."

The unusually chatty Strait appeared to bask in the enormous crowd of fans, standing at their seats, swaying and singing along, regularly raising his arms like a band conductor to raise the volume.

"That's what I'm going to miss the most right there. I tell you what. Thank you so much," he said.

Strait, 62, is also beloved by his legions of fans for his gracious, everyman demeanor, which was in ample display Saturday.

During the second half of the show, he played the 2011 hit "I'll Always Remember You," which he said was inspired by his fans.

"When I take the stage for the last time, you won't be far away," he said, inspiring some enthusiastic

female fans to tear up.

"Damn, I'm so lucky," Strait said so many times, it became almost a refrain.

All of Strait's guest stars returned to the stage for an encore.

The show brought an end to Strait's nearly 40 years on the road, starting in 1975 with the Ace in the Hole Band. Many of the 11-piece band's original members played back up Saturday, "the best band anybody could have out here on the road," Strait said.

Born in Poteet and raised in Pearsall, about 60 miles southwest of San Antonio, Strait has more gold and platinum albums than any other music act except The Beatles and Elvis Presley.

And while he's quitting the road, Strait may yet add to his chart-topping total after renewing his deal with MCA Records last year to produce five more albums. He has said he will continue to play the occasional gig.

Strait began this last tour, The Cowboy Rides Away, last year. Each of the 45 stadiums and arenas he's played in 31 states has sold out. He's performed for an estimated 1 million fans.

As he sang the tour's eponymous song at the end of the set, fans waved, cheered and did the two-step. And the cowboy rode away.

## Texas GOP sees victory in tough immigration plank

FORT WORTH — Just two years after embracing a softer stance on immigration in hopes of wooing the state's surging Hispanic population, the Texas Republican Party has done a dramatic about-face — gutting its own past initiative and vowing that not giving an inch on the issue will ensure future success.

Democrats, who haven't won a statewide office in 20 years, the longest such streak in America, said

shifting demographics means Texas will eventually turn blue. They insist such hard-line GOP policies will only speed the process. But the message from the tea party forces who dominated the recent Republican primary and this week's state party convention was simple: We're not budging.

"This idea that somehow we're not going to be able to attract Hispanic voters to our party over immigration is wrong," state Sen. Dan Patrick, a tea party darling from Houston who toppled long-serving incumbent David Dewhurst to win the

GOP lieutenant governor nomination, told delegates Saturday. "Because, much of the time, all Hispanics want the same thing that you want, they want a secure border."

Opponents said calls to secure the border are an excuse to immigrant-bash while offering few solutions, since defining what constitutes a pacified border between Mexico and the United States is impossible. But Patrick's campaign even distributed signs shaped like a fence with a giant padlock over the words "Secure the Border."

## Dog helps girl with epilepsy complete high school

LUBBOCK — Much like other young yellow Labradors, Shawnee of Idalou craves time with her owner, loves playing fetch and cringes when anyone comes near her with nail clippers.

But unlike her furry, four-legged counterparts, Shawnee has a high school diploma.

As a service dog, Shawnee attended classes at Roosevelt High School for three years with her owner, Jessica Hayes, who has epilepsy. Though Shawnee wasn't always attentive — Hayes said she was known to snore loudly while napping at Hayes' feet — the dog became the honorary 58th member of the senior class, joining them on field trips and in group pictures.

Shawnee, 4, and Hayes, 19, donned caps and gowns Friday and walked across the stage together to get their tassels turned and receive their diplomas. Shawnee's came with a treat and a certificate for "outstanding service, loyalty and companionship" to Hayes.

Hayes said she knew Shawnee would join her on stage, but the diploma and tassel were a surprise orchestrated by staff members and Hayes' best friend Alyssa Davis — one Shawnee tried to rush by shaking her head so hard the tassel turned itself before the appropriate time.

She couldn't wait. Hayes joked to the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal. Graduation wasn't the first time Shawnee sported an outfit. The Hayeses have a cabinet full of dog-sized costumes at their house, including Shawnee's red and black prom dress and the sheet she wore for a Halloween Pac-Man theme.

She's become well known and loved at the school — part of the reason Hayes' parents decided to keep her in the Roosevelt Independent School District even after the family moved to Idalou.

Hayes started getting seizures when she was a freshman in high school, and before Shawnee, she was having two a week at times.

Though not life-threatening, the seizures have caused a few black eyes and damage to Hayes' shoulders, resulting in 30 dislocations and four surgeries.

Because they came on so unexpectedly, Hayes was no longer allowed to be home alone or do other simple things like take baths or go swimming. "Just little things you enjoy. You really don't know how much you enjoy that until it's taken away from you," Hayes said.

She and Shawnee were matched at Canine Partners for Life, a Pennsylvania-based service dog training facility, in 2011, and since then have been attached at the hip. Literally. Hayes leads Shawnee by a leash connected to a belt around her waist where she also carries treats to reward the dog for good behavior.

Shawnee can sense the seizures 10 to 15 minutes before they happen, and she sounds the alarm by jumping, glaring and disobeying commands, Hayes said. This gives her time to call her parents and find a place to sit or lie down to prepare for what's coming.

Getting Shawnee meant Hayes was able to regain her independence. The family said good riddance to the nighttime baby monitor in her room, and her younger brother, Josh, no longer had to act as her baby sitter.

As long as Hayes checks in with Shawnee every seven to eight minutes, she is able to participate in just about anything.

"I started doing things I couldn't do that seizures took away from me," she said.

Both Rejohn Hayes, father of Jessica Hayes, and Davis said they've noticed a big difference in Hayes since she got Shawnee — the most noticeable being a boost in a self-confidence and a sparkle in her eyes.

Hayes has been seizure-free for 10 months, and Rejohn Hayes attributes her daughter's good health to medication and Shawnee's presence.

"We're not going to change anything," she said. Shawnee wears a harness asking people not to pet her while she's working. It also has additional instructions: "If my owner has a seizure, do not separate us, do not call an ambulance unless the seizure lasts more than five minutes or injury has occurred."

Having Shawnee around has helped Jessica Hayes raise awareness that service dogs can act as more than just guide dogs for the blind — a common misconception she faces while out in public.

She has a good sense of humor, however. Often when someone stares at her, whispering, "Look at that dog with the blind girl," to a friend, Hayes leans down toward Shawnee and says, "My dog thinks your red shirt is cute."

## Morgan still critical but 'more responsive'

TRENTON, N.J. — Tracy Morgan was recovering Sunday, but was expected to remain hospitalized for several weeks after having surgery on a broken leg suffered in a deadly chain-reaction crash on the New Jersey Turnpike that left two others critically injured and another man dead.

The 45-year-old actor and comedian, a former "Saturday Night Live" and "30 Rock" cast member, remained in critical condition but was "more responsive" Sunday after having surgery for a broken leg, said Morgan's spokesman, Lewis Kay.

Kay said that Morgan also sustained a broken femur, broken nose and several broken ribs and is expected to remain hospitalized for "several weeks." He said that Morgan's family is "tremendously overwhelmed and appreciative of the outpouring of love and support from his fans."

A Wal-Mart truck driver from Georgia was charged with death by auto and four counts of assault by auto. Authorities said 35-year-old Kevin Roper, of Jonesboro, apparently failed to slow for traffic ahead early Saturday in Cranbury Township and swerved at the last minute to avoid a crash. Instead, his big rig smashed into the back of Morgan's chauffeured Mercedes limo bus, killing comedian James "Jimmy Mack" McNair, authorities said.

Also critically injured were Morgan's assistant, Jeffrey Millea, 36, of Shelton, Connecticut, and comedian Ardie Fuqua Jr., 43, of Jersey City. They remained in critical condition Sunday evening, said Zenaída Mendez, a spokeswoman for Robert Wood Johnson Hospital in New Brunswick. Another

passenger, comic Harris Stanton, was treated and released.

Tyrone Gale, who was driving the limo bus, told ABC News that he was disoriented after the vehicle flipped over and could hear Morgan yelling for help.

"I climbed around and heard Tracy screaming for help," Gale said. "I climbed up on the body of the limo bus ... but I couldn't reach them."

Roper, accompanied by his attorney, turned himself in to state police. He was released on \$50,000 bail Saturday night and has been placed on administrative leave, Wal-Mart spokesman David Tovar said Sunday.

Wal-Mart President Bill Simon said in a statement that the company "will take full responsibility" if authorities determine its truck caused the accident.

The National Transportation Safety Board is working with state police to look at any issues in the crash related to commercial trucking and limousine safety.

Morgan, a New York City native, was returning from a standup performance at Dover Downs Hotel & Casino in Delaware when the crash occurred. In all, six vehicles were involved in the pileup, but no one from the other cars was injured.

At a press event Saturday in Los Angeles to promote the upcoming comedy film "Think Like a Man Too," cast members, many of whom have worked and are friends with Morgan, wished him well.

Kevin Hart said he owes much of his success to Morgan, crediting him for paving the way for comics like himself to become successful.

"We just want him to get better and to get back to everyone that loves him and get back to doing what he does best, making people laugh," Hart said.

Fuqua's mother, Doris, said she visited him in the hospital Saturday.

The writer-comedian had toured with Morgan for nearly a year, she said, and had opened for him Friday night.

"We're hoping for the best," Doris Fuqua said Sunday, adding that she didn't know how long he may be hospitalized. "It's too early to tell."

McNair, 62, of Peekskill, New York, was a close friend and mentor to Morgan, Morgan's ex-wife, Sabina Morgan, told the New York Daily News.

"He was one of the first comedians that took Tracy under his wing," she said. "They were very close."

Royale Watkins, a Los Angeles-based comedian who said he had performed in New York clubs with Morgan and McNair, described McNair as having a big personality.

"There may be guys like Tracy who get the fame and notoriety, but you have people like Jimmy Mack who have kind of energized and fueled cats like Tracy and kept them going on the road," Watkins said.

## 'The Fault in Our Stars' tops Tom Cruise at box office

NEW YORK — In a box-office battle that pitted young against old, female against male, modest drama against big-budget spectacle, the teenage romance "The Fault in Our Stars" easily bested the time-shifting Tom Cruise action film "Edge of Tomorrow."

With a \$48.2 million domestic debut, "The Fault in Our Stars" thumped the \$29.1 million opening for "Edge of Tomorrow," according to studio estimates Sunday. It did so with a far less seasoned star in Shailene Woodley and a \$12 million budget a fraction the size of that for "Edge of Tomorrow," made for approximately \$175 million.

The results offered a stark illustration of shifting box-office trends. Whereas big-budget, male-oriented action films with stars like Cruise have long ruled the day at North American multiplexes, those movies are increasingly under siege from films ignited by passionate young female moviegoers.

"The notion of what is traditional summer fare is changing," said Paul Dergarabedian, senior analyst for box-office tracker Rentrak. "Women and young girls are as vitally important to the box office in the summer as the young males, who Hollywood has courted and coveted for decades."

"The Fault in Our Stars," a highly-anticipated adaptation of John Green's best-selling book, was in some ways another example of the power of young-adult fiction. But unlike "Twilight" or "The Hunger

Games," "The Fault in Our Stars" isn't about sci-fi or fantasy, but is rather a more naturalistic drama about young love and cancer.

Twentieth Century Fox said that an overwhelming 82 percent of the audience for the film was female, an unusually large gender gap for such a popular movie. The majority of the audience eagerly turned out for Thursday night and Friday showings.

"We knew that we had an engaged fan base but we weren't sure of the depth of it," said Chris Aronson, Fox's distribution head.

"We also knew we had formidable competition in the marketplace for similar if not identical demographics."

That competition — Disney's fairy tale "Maleficent," starring Angelina Jolie — slid to second place in its second week with \$33.5 million. With a two-week global sum of \$335.5 million, "Maleficent" has performed well, but it remains to be seen if it can be a real money-maker for Disney, which spent an estimated \$180 million to make it, plus huge amounts to market it.

# Storms bring much-needed rain to Wichita Falls

LUBBOCK — Drought-stricken Wichita Falls finally got a heavy dose of rain when a storm system moved eastward over the North Texas city overnight.

Wichita Falls got 1.24 inches of rain from the system, which battered parts of West Texas with baseball-sized hail and powerful wind gusts earlier Sunday and late Saturday night, the National Weather Service said.

Odell, which is 60 miles west of Wichita Falls, got 5.11 inches of precipitation.

Wichita Falls has gotten about 45 percent of normal rainfall from May 1 through Saturday, or 2.32 inches. May and June are the wettest months in Texas.

There was minor flooding in some parts of West Texas, but no injuries were reported.

More rain was forecast for West Texas and areas east of it, including Wichita Falls, later Sunday.

Flash flood watches were in effect Sunday across much of West Texas.

Weather service officials said a 96 mph wind gust was recorded southwest of Lubbock near Wolfforth late Saturday. Meteorolo-

gist Forrest Mitchell, in Norman, Oklahoma, said the weekend rain would only provide a temporary reprieve for Wichita Falls, which is in its fourth straight year of drought.

"This is not the drought buster," he said. "It will be interesting to see how beneficial this rainfall has been in the short term."

The two lakes that provide the city's water were a combined 24.5 percent full June 2.

The end of February marked the driest 41-month period for Wichita Falls since record-keeping began in 1897.

The city's residents are under Stage 5 water restrictions, which prohibit any outdoor watering or filling of residential swimming pools with city water. The city is doing tests for the state to start a wastewater re-use program, which will save a third of residents' current daily usage, city officials said. Fifty percent of the water would come from toilets, dish and clothes washers, and sinks, showers and baths.

Amarillo has gotten 2.41 inches in the past three days and is now ahead of normal for the year. Lubbock got about .8 inches at Preston Smith International Airport since Friday and is slightly ahead of normal for the year.

conclusions," said George Washington University law professor Jonathan Turley, a liberal civil rights champion. "But he's different from many members of the Senate in that he's been actively involved in shaping the legal arguments that are now being advanced in federal court."

In a series of reports studded with footnotes and apocalyptic warnings, Cruz has raised the alarm over what he sees as Obama's "breath-taking" abuse of power and violations of the "rule of law."

Examples he frequently cites are unilateral administration changes to the rollout of the Affordable Care Act, waivers to welfare work requirements, and foregoing deportations of young people who were brought into this country illegally as children.

While presidents in both parties are often criticized for pushing the limits of executive power, Cruz argues that under Obama the degree of "lawlessness" is unprecedented.

"We are in a unique moment in time," Cruz said in an interview. "Our constitutional rights are being imperiled like never before. The threat to the Bill of Rights from a lawless administration is something that should trouble everyone, regardless of party or ideology."

His critics see it as an effort to dress up stock policy differences as legal controversies. Some also question whether Cruz's legal mission is at odds with the traditional conservative aversion to judicial overreach - that is, accomplishing in the courtroom what can't be achieved through elections and legislative action.

"Where were they when (President) George W. Bush was violating the Constitution torturing people and spying on Americans?" said veteran Democratic operative Carlton Carl, who has deep ties with Texas trial lawyer groups. "It's purely politics and hypocrisy. He's dressed up his right wing politics with a patina of

legitimacy because he's a very smart guy and a very good lawyer."

## 'Activist' judges

Cruz acknowledges that he's in the middle of legal crosscurrents. But he reserves the activist label to judges who place their personal policy preferences over the law, not to plaintiffs who want to protect their rights in court.

The question came up at a recent Federalist Society event where Yale University's William Eskridge, one Cruz's professors at Harvard, asked if the senator would lend his voice to criticism of judicial activism under U.S. Supreme Court Chief Justice John Roberts.

"I find myself conflicted," Cruz answered, "because I do think the degree of lawlessness is unprecedented, and there would be real value for liberty to the courts putting meaningful constraints on it."

By all accounts Cruz, a law clerk to former Supreme Court Chief Justice William Rehnquist, is ideally suited to the task, having long operated at the intersection of law and politics.

It was Cruz who took the phone call for George W. Bush's Florida legal team when the Rehnquist court ruled in the Texan's favor in the 2000 presidential recount standoff with then Vice President Al Gore.

Later, as Texas Solicitor General, Cruz argued nine cases before the U.S. Supreme Court, more than any current member of Congress. He won five and lost four.

## Not much in Congress

In the trenches of Washington lawmaking, Cruz has had little more to brag about than Congress as a whole.

"Under (Democratic Leader) Harry Reid," he said, "the Senate is doing nothing, and that is by design."

Of some 70 bills, amendments and resolutions Cruz has sponsored,

only two have become law: one renamed a federal courthouse in Sherman, Texas; the other was a well-timed measure to bar Iran's United Nations envoy from the U.S. because of his involvement in the 1979-80 Iranian hostage crisis.

It was a rare legislative victory. But Cruz has won more respect in the legal arena, where he and his staff have issued four reports laying out the case against the Obama administration's alleged abuses of power.

Some observers have likened his office to that of the late Sen. Edward Kennedy, whose Senate office was an incubator of Democratic legal talent. Cruz's position on the Judiciary Committee has given him a chance to nurture legal talent on the right. "There are many areas where we need principled conservatives," he said.

Their interests cover the gamut of GOP grievances against Obama, from his handling of the Benghazi terrorist attacks to the IRS targeting of tea party groups. While other Republicans in Congress have tried to portray the Benghazi probe as an open-ended inquiry, Cruz has made no bones about his belief that administration officials are covering up a crime.

## President's 'overreach'

Some Democrats argue that expansive assertions of presidential power are nothing new in the White House, where Obama, himself a Harvard-trained lawyer, has been forced to use executive action to counter Republican obstructionism in Congress.

But Cruz's critique of presidential "overreach" has found allies outside the usual conservative circles, particularly with regard to the administration's terrorist "kill list," drones, and revelations of NSA surveillance at home.

"President Obama is the president Richard Nixon always wanted to be," said Turley, who has embraced Cruz's "rule of law" agenda.

**RINSE AND REPEAT:** Despite the boost in non-sequels at this year's E3, a slew of follow-ups are scheduled to be promoted on the show floor, such as new installments of "The Sims," "Halo," "Call of Duty," "Far Cry," "Metal Gear Solid," "Assassin's Creed" and "Super Smash Bros." If past shows are any indication, more sequels will be revealed for the first time at E3.

## Questions and answers linger about children at Texas border

SAN DIEGO — About 700 unaccompanied minors mostly from Central America were sleeping on plastic boards at a Border Patrol warehouse in Nogales, Arizona, this weekend, after they were arrested in South Texas and flown to the makeshift shelter. It is the latest illustration of how a wave of immigrants from Honduras, El Salvador and Guatemala has overwhelmed U.S. border authorities. President Barack Obama called the surge a crisis last week and appointed the Federal Emergency Management Agency to lead the government's response. Here are some questions and answers.

### WHAT IS THE SCOPE OF THE PROBLEM?

Illegal border crossings soared for several years in South Texas, which recently surpassed Arizona as the busiest corridor. The Border Patrol's Rio Grande Valley sector made 148,017 arrests from Oct. 1 to May 17, far higher than the 62,876 caught in Tucson, Arizona, which is the second-busiest crossing point.

The dramatic shift is taxing U.S. authorities because Honduras, Salvadorans and Guatemalans make up about 75 percent of those caught in South Texas, the traditional entry point for Central Americans. For decades, the vast majority of people who crossed the border illegally were from neighboring Mexico and could be deported the same day on a short bus ride to the nearest crossing. Central Americans are sent home on U.S. government flights, a more daunting challenge.

An unusually large number of those crossing in South Texas are un-

panied children, many seeking to join parents who are already in the U.S. illegally. Authorities arrested 47,017 unaccompanied children on the border from October through May, up 92 percent from the same period a year earlier. A draft Border Patrol memorandum estimates that number could reach 90,000 in the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, up from a previous government estimate of 60,000.

### WHY NOW?

Rampant crime and poverty across Central America is a big reason. Honduras has the highest murder rate in the world, with 90.4 homicides per 100,000 inhabitants, according to the U.N. Office on Drugs and Crime. The World Bank says nearly 60 percent of Honduras' 8 million people live in poverty.

Some Republican lawmakers and administration critics say lax enforcement practices encourage children to make the perilous journey. They cite an opinion by U.S. District Judge Andrew Hanen of Brownsville, Texas, in December that blasted authorities for releasing a Salvadoran girl to her mother, who hired a smuggler to transport her daughter and was in the country illegally.

"(The government) has simply chosen not to enforce the United States' border security laws," the judge wrote.

The government has

released some immigrants but refused to say how many. The U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement agency said it will make "appropriate custody determinations."

### WHAT'S BEING DONE?

The Obama administration has asked Congress for \$1.4 billion to help house, feed and transport children and plans to temporarily house more than 1,000 at military bases in Ventura, California; San Antonio and Fort Sill, Oklahoma.

Immigration officials, by policy, do not keep children in detention. They are transferred to the Department of Health and Human Services' Office of Refugee Resettlement to be housed in shelters until they can be reunited with parents or guardians.

A Homeland Security official said Health and Human Services turned to the Border Patrol to house children temporarily at the Nogales warehouse because they were overwhelmed. About 2,000 vinyl-covered mattresses were ordered, and the official expected the population there to double to 1,400.

The government has also been flying families from South Texas to Arizona and El Paso, and releasing them at bus stations. ICE has only one detention facility for families — an 85-bed center in Pennsylvania.

## Will Dems get that third White House term?

History indicates parties have trouble holding on to the presidency

Publication of Hillary Clinton's new book, "Hard Choices," along with her many coming public appearances has sparked renewed speculation that the former secretary of state will seek the presidency again in 2016.

No one has been more active in flogging that speculation — and in stressing Clinton's potential obstacles — than Karl Rove. President George W. Bush's political "brain" who is now both a Fox News analyst and an adviser to a firm that produces Republican political ads.

Despite the partisan intent of Rove's comments on television and in his weekly Wall Street Journal column, he makes some valid points. Clinton's health will be an issue, especially if she displays any symptoms of the 2012 concussion that briefly hospitalized her. Likewise, her record as secretary of state, including the Benghazi chapter, will be a focus.

Rove, who regards himself as a historian as well as a political operative, also was on firm ground when he wrote recently that one of Clinton's biggest handicaps is that "it's tough for a party to

win a third White House term."

Every party wears out its welcome, as Rove well knows from the GOP's 2008 defeat after Bush's two terms.

Since 1900, incumbent parties have won more than two White House terms on four occasions: William Howard Taft in 1908, Herbert Hoover in 1928, George H.W. Bush in 1988 and the 20-year Democratic tenure of Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry S. Truman.

But that summary doesn't tell the whole story. Four of the five elections since World War II in which a party failed to win a third term were extremely close and could easily have gone the other way.

In 1960, Republican Vice President Richard Nixon sought to build on Dwight D. Eisenhower's two terms. He lost to John F. Kennedy, but the popular vote margin was just 112,827 votes. Kennedy

might have failed to win an electoral majority, throwing the election into the House of Representatives, had he lost Texas and Illinois, where many Republicans accused Democratic machines of stealing the election.

Eight years later, Nixon won narrowly, preventing the Democrats from adding a third term to the two served by Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson. Their nominee, Hubert Humphrey, was closing fast and some allies still think he would have won if he or Johnson had disclosed what they considered improper interference in Vietnam peace talks by a Nixon backer, Anna Chennault.

In 1976, Jimmy Carter ended eight years of GOP rule by narrowly defeating President Gerald Ford, who became the only non-elected president when scandals forced both Nixon and Vice President Spiro Agnew to resign. Though Carter's popular margin was more than 1.7 million votes, a switch of fewer than 10,000 in Ohio and Hawaii would have given Ford an electoral majority.

Most analysts thought Ford would have won if he had not pardoned Nixon or had not claimed in a debate that Poland was free of Communist domination.

The fourth example came in 2000, when Texas Gov. George W. Bush defeated Vice President Al Gore in the closest modern election, 271-266 in the Electoral College vote. Gore had a 500,000-vote popular majority, but Bush won when the Supreme Court halted a recount in Florida, securing his 527-vote margin in that state, despite considerable controversy.

Gore was running to succeed Bill Clinton, whose popularity was high amid continuing economic growth. But he ran a poor campaign, including an odd debate performance in which he groaned and sighed audibly after Bush's answers and a reluctance to use Clinton more in states where his popularity might have enabled Gore to win.

If Clinton runs in 2016, her success will depend on her ability to avoid mistakes and on whether Republicans nominate someone whose personal appeal can surmount the GOP's current negative image and the demographic changes that favor the Democrats.

That outcome is neither foretold nor guaranteed by history.

## Commercial exploitation of space should mean economic development

With America's manned space program adrift after the end of the shuttle era and dependent on Russian craft at more than \$70 million a seat for access to the International Space Station, the future status of Houston as Space City USA is increasingly in doubt.

With flight assignments for astronauts far fewer and U.S. deep space missions unlikely for years, the spotlight has shifted from the Johnson Space Center to private rocket developers.

A bit of good news from the Federal Aviation Administration last week offers the possibility that rockets could be propelling commercial payloads and perhaps people into orbit in a few years from a new spaceport to be built near Brownsville on the Texas coast. California-based SpaceX, owned by billionaire Elon Musk, currently launches supplies in its unmanned Dragon craft to the ISS under a contract with NASA and is building a version of the vehicle capable of transporting a crew of up to seven to and from orbit.

In the latest development, the FAA issued an environmental impact study approving the construction of a spaceport on an eight-acre site at Boca Chica Beach. It found that the planned facility with up to a dozen launches a year would not cause environmental damage and "is consistent with existing national environmental policies and objectives."

While SpaceX has not officially selected the Texas site, there are apparently no other finalists, and Musk had previously indicated that all that stands between Texas and a gateway to orbit was federal approval.

According to the FAA report, SpaceX identified South Texas as the only viable location for its future spaceport.

The commercial exploitation of space is expected to be a landmark economic development of the mid-21st century. With our rich history as a center of manned spaceflight development, it would only be fitting for Texas to be in on the ground floor.

## GOP scandal machine is humming

The Bergdahl trade has become Benghazi 2.0

Rep. Buck McKeon displayed the probing intellect this week that we expect from a chairman of the House Armed Services Committee.

Commenting on Fox News Channel about the prisoner swap with the Taliban that sprung U.S. Army Sgt. Bowe Bergdahl, the California Republican explained why he plans to hold hearings on the matter. "It really is kind of ironic, because this is kind of playing out much like Benghazi," he said, "where they kind of do or don't do something, and uh, and then kind of come up with a story afterward of why they did or didn't do something. This is really mind-boggling."

So the prisoner exchange in Afghanistan is "much like" the 2012 attacks on U.S. facilities in Libya because, in both cases, the administration did or didn't do something and then later gave an account of why it did or didn't do that something. Scandalous.

And this is just the beginning of the uncanny similarities. Both events happened — you're not going to believe this — under President Obama! And in both instances, one of the people involved was — yes, you guessed it — Susan Rice! Don't forget that Bergdahl and Benghazi both begin with the letter "B," and although Afghanistan is in Asia and Libya is in Africa, both continents begin with the letter "A."

Now comes word that Hillary Rodham Clinton, blamed for Benghazi, was also behind Bergdahl's swap, which occurred 16 months after she left office. The conservative publication Human Events reports that "Benghazi Clinton has now become directly involved" in the Bergdahl affair. How does Human Events know this? Well, because "Jake Tapper of CNN wonders if Obama was briefing her," the outlet reported.

Voila! Clinton is "directly involved" in the Taliban exchange — because Jake Tapper wondered about it. Actually, Tapper tells me, he wondered no such thing, and the Human Events link provides no evidence. But, by way of confirmation, Fox's Catherine Herridge also found it "noteworthy" that Bergdahl's release came just as the Benghazi excerpts from Clinton's new book had come out.

A bit of idle speculation was all Obama's critics (particularly those at Fox) needed to fire up the Benghazi scandal machine.

"This is a Fox News Alert," Eric Bolling proclaimed at the start of Fox's "The Five" on Tuesday. "The story surrounding the president's deal with the Taliban is huge, Benghazi-huge."

A few hours later, Fox strategic analyst Ralph

Peters told Megyn Kelly that "what you just saw and heard was Benghazi 2.0."

Certainly, there are fair questions to be asked about the prisoner exchange. The Obama administration disobeyed the law requiring it to inform Congress 30 days before releasing prisoners from Gitmo. And Rice's televised claim that Bergdahl "served the United States with honor and distinction" was, at best, premature.

But to draw parallels to the Libya attacks requires the type of mental agility that, as the liberal website Media Matters has noted, already has led Obama's accusers to draw associations between Bergdahl and the missing Malaysian jet, New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie's bridge scandal, Yom Kippur and gay football player Michael Sam. How do they do it?

Some allege a conspiracy. Britain's Daily Mail quoted the father of a soldier killed in Afghanistan (allegedly searching for Bergdahl) saying that "it's a big cover-up like Benghazi."

Others claim, as Fox's Greg Gutfeld did, that the Bergdahl release, like the Benghazi response, was intended to alter elections. As evidence, he cited a Rolling Stone article — from 2012.

Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., was one of many to find a link in Obama's claim that "we don't leave our men or women in uniform behind." Said Graham, "It really bothers me when he embraces a military concept called 'We don't leave our people behind' and he won't tell us what he did in Benghazi." (Military officials have said there was no way to get help in time to the two diplomats and two CIA contractors who were killed in Libya.)

Obama's opponents came up with more links than a sausage factory. People in both instances had signed nondisclosure agreements! In both cases, there were contradictory accounts of what happened! Fox's Sean Hannity found a tie between the two in his contention that "we're being lied to an awful lot."

Former congressman Allen West, R-Fla., found the two instances similar because "there is a lot to this whole episode — like Benghazi — that we may never know."

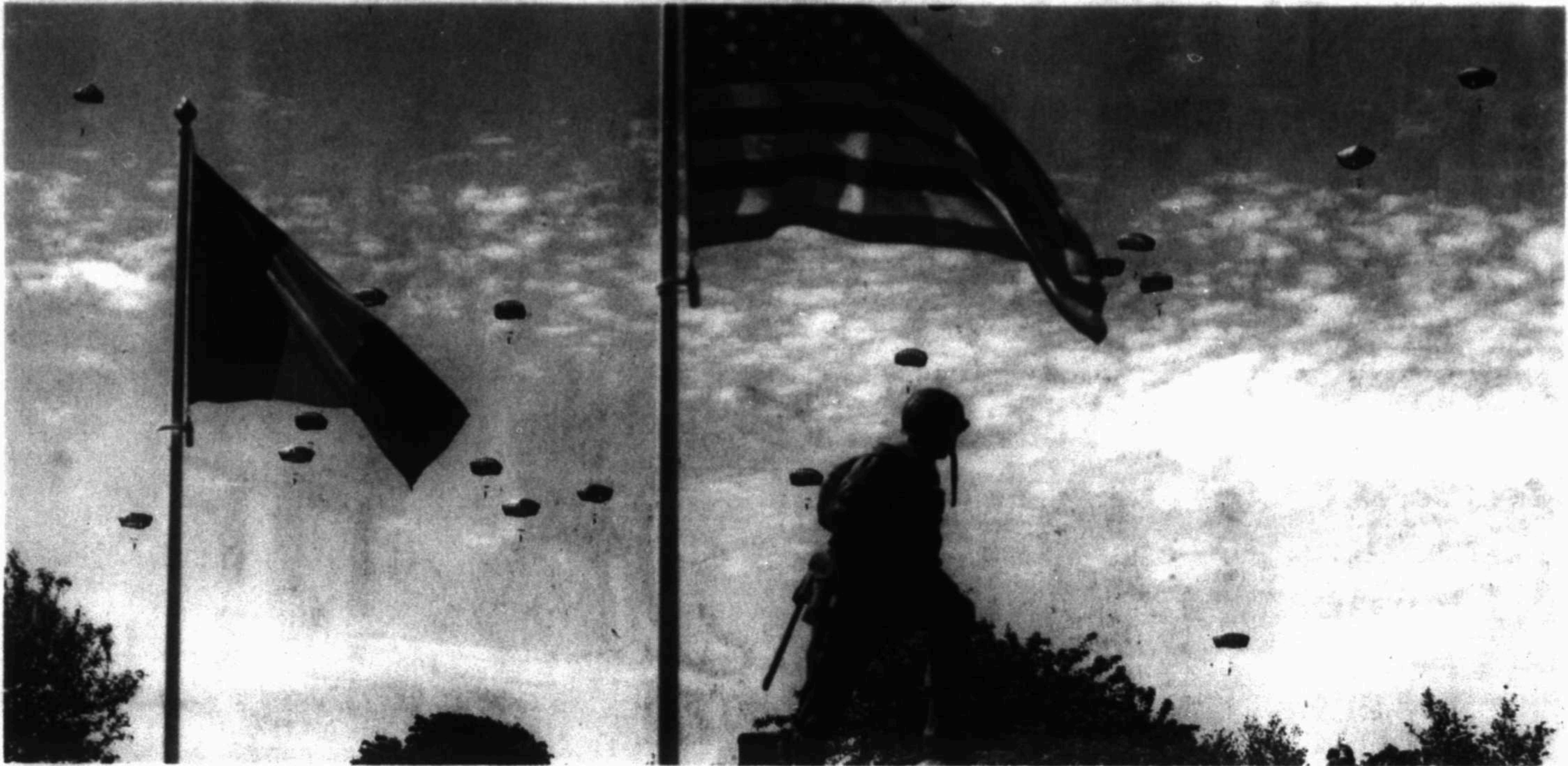
Luckily for West, knowledge is not a requirement. He has already declared l'affaire Bergdahl an impeachable offense.

# Aerial re-enactment caps D-Day celebrations

LA FIERE, France — Nearly 1,000 paratroopers dropped out of the sky in Normandy on Sunday — but this time they did so in peace, instead of to wrest western France from the Nazis as they did during World War II.

Drawing huge crowds who braved hot weather and lined the historic landing area at La Fiere, the aerial spectacle re-enacted the drama of the Normandy landings and served to cap commemorations marking the 70th anniversary of D-Day.

Among the planes ferrying paratroopers for the event was a restored C-47 US military transport plane that dropped Allied troops on the village of Sainte-Mere-Eglise — a stone's throw from La Fiere — on June 6, 1944. And the pilots who originally flew it took the controls again last week, 70 years later, remembering their experiences.

Sunday saw dozens of veterans escorted down a sandy path to a special section to watch the show alongside thousands of spectators — most of whom lined two sides of the field. Others took shelter in the shade as the lack of wind caused the sun to beat down hard.

Planes including the C-47 aircraft flew by loudly overhead several times, with two dozen military paratroopers — from countries including the U.S., Britain, France and Germany — jumping with each passage.

They were scenes reminiscent of the pivotal event, when around 15,000 Allied paratroopers were dropped in and around the village of Sainte-Mere-Eglise on D-Day. It became the first to be liberated by

the Allies and remains one of the enduring symbols of the Normandy invasion.

Veteran Julian "Bud" Rice, a C-47 pilot who participated in the airdrops of Normandy on D-Day, watched the show.

"It's good to see 800 paratroopers jump here today, but the night that we came in, we had 800 airplanes with 10,000 paratroopers that we dropped that night, so it was a little more," he said.

Rice flew in a C-47 aircraft earlier in the

week, similar to the one he flew on D-Day. With him was veteran pilot Bill Prindible, with whom he watched the show.

"Very impressive," Prindible said. "You just have to imagine there'd be a squadron of 72 aircraft, 36 aircraft going by every time one of those guys went by."

At the invitation of the French government, this restored Douglas C-47 — known as Whiskey 7 — flew for the festivities and released paratroopers as it

did when it dropped troops behind enemy lines under German fire.

The plane has almost as rich a story to tell as the pilots who flew it.

Although the twin-prop Whiskey 7, so named because of its W-7 squadron marking, looks much the

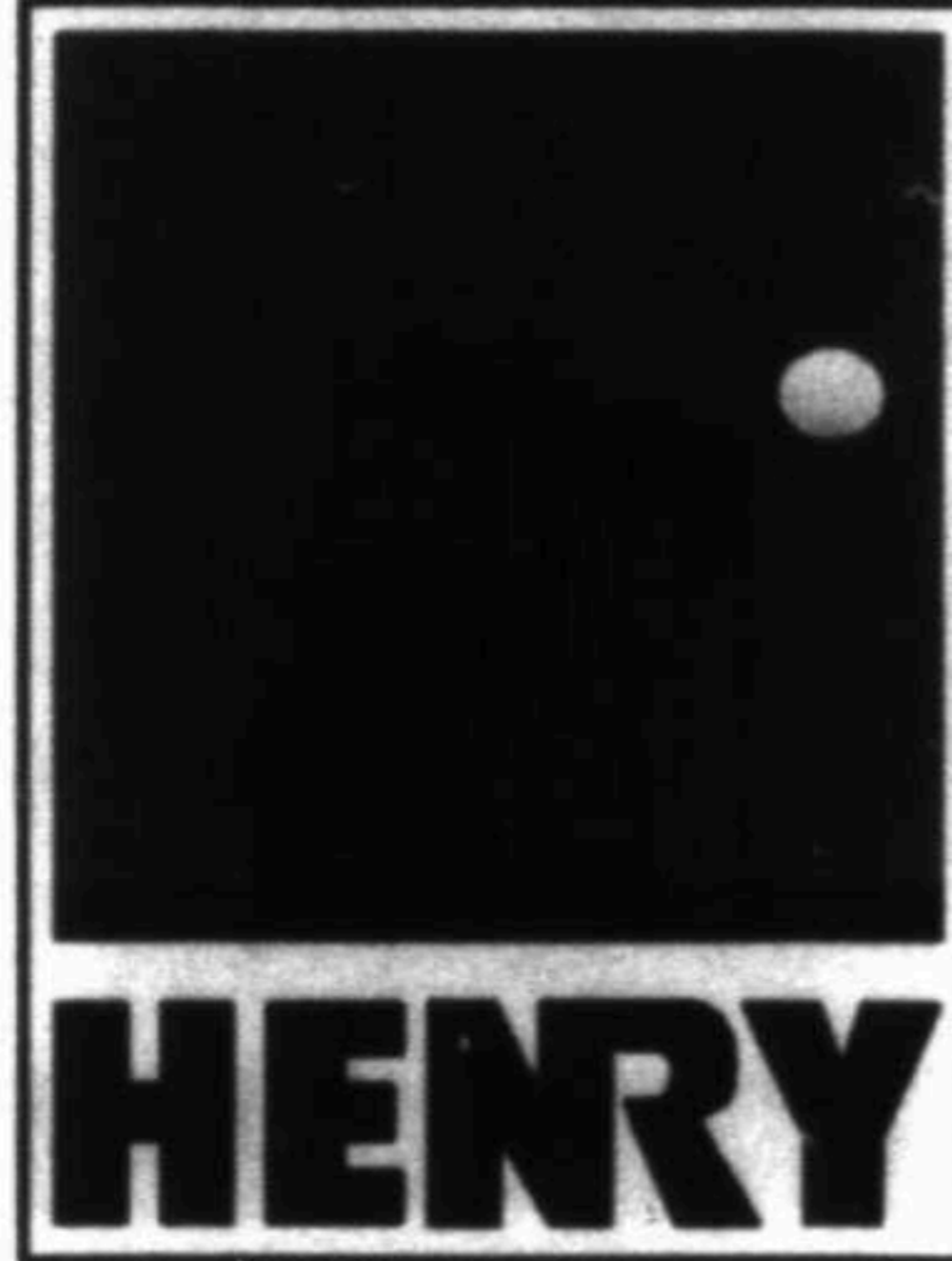
same today as it did on June 6, 1944. It looked very different when it arrived at the National Warplane Museum in western New York as a donation eight years ago.

It had been converted to a corporate passenger plane. The museum's president

said that for its restoration they had to take out the interior because it then had a dry bar, lounge seats and a table with a map of the Bahamas.

And it has moved with the times — now sporting two GPS systems to keep the aircraft on course.

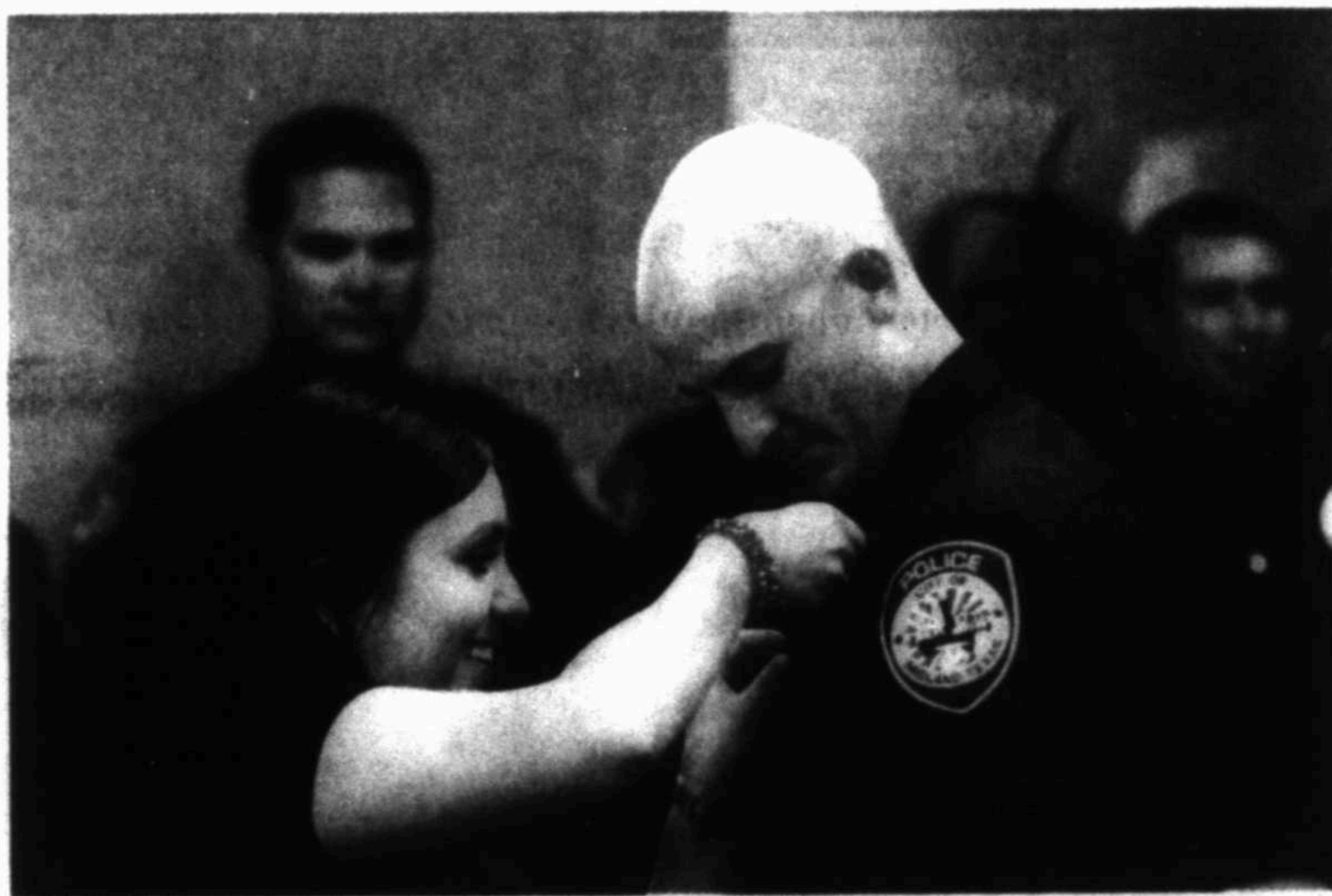

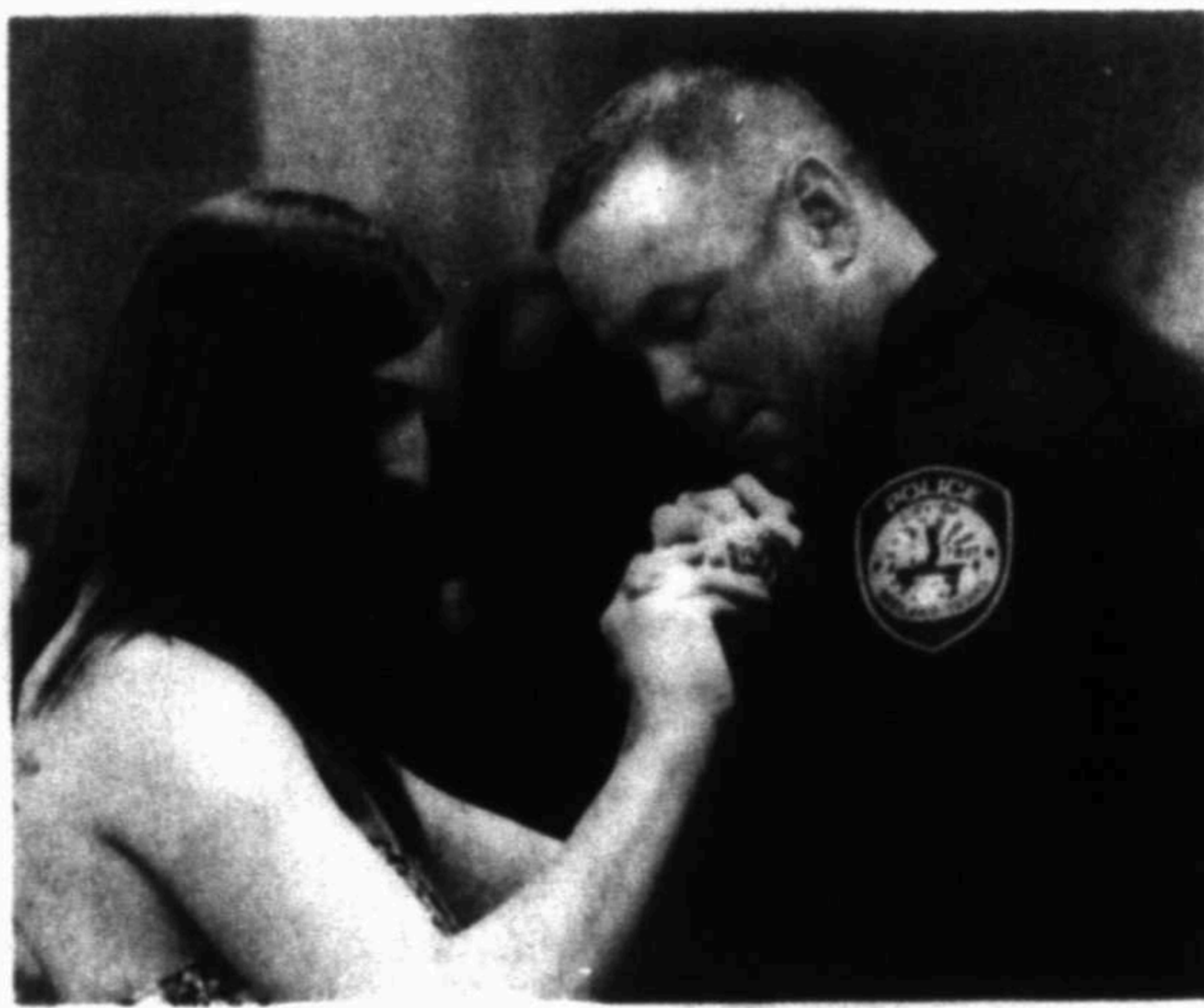

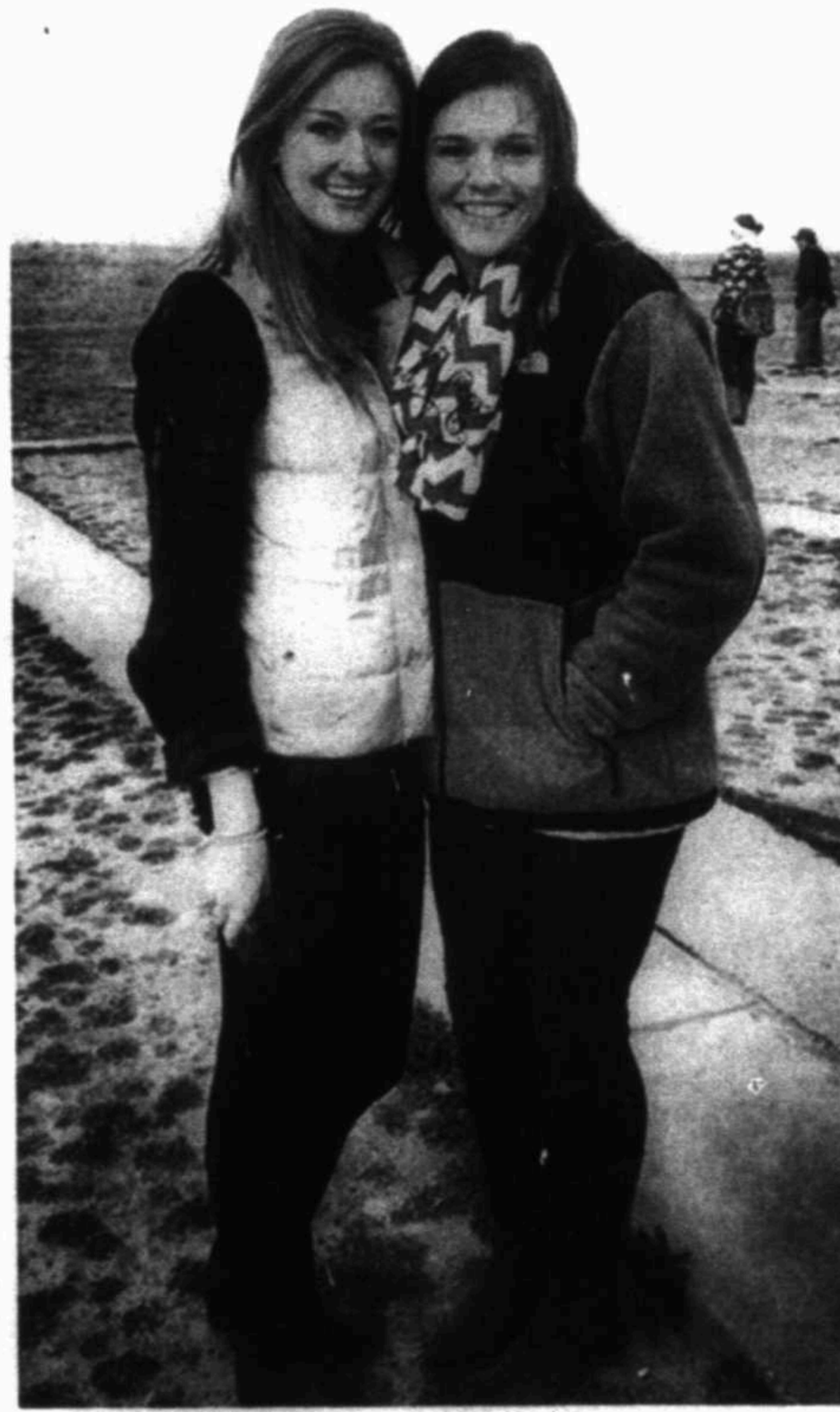

## James carries Heat past Spurs to even NBA Finals

SAN ANTONIO — No cramps, no problems for LeBron James. And with their superstar making it to the finish this time, the Miami Heat won Game 2, just as they always do when they drop an opener. James had 35 points and 10 rebounds in a powerful bounce back from cramps that knocked him out of the key part of Game 1, as the Heat tied the NBA Finals with a 98-96 victory over the San Antonio Spurs on Sunday night. Chris Bosh made the go-ahead 3-pointer on a pass from James with 1:18 remaining for the Heat, who have won 13 straight following a loss in the postseason. Just like last year,

they rebounded from a loss to the Spurs to open the series. Bosh had 18 points for the Heat. Game 3 is Tuesday night in Miami. James played 36 minutes, making 14 of 22 shots. He was only 1 for 4 with three turnovers in a shaky first quarter, then made 11 of his next 13. After two days of enduring criticism for not finishing and getting suggestions on how to avoid cramps, James changed the subject. "Got to play hard," James said. "I believe the man above will protect me. I just try to put myself and my teammates in position to succeed." He also had a key strip of Tony Parker down the stretch, playing a

dominant game on both ends as if he had something to prove. Whenever the haters come out, James always quickly can silence them. He had 11 points in the second quarter, helping Miami erase an 11-point deficit early in the period. The game was played within a margin of a few points from there, and the Spurs missed a chance to seize control in the fourth quarter when Tony Parker and Tim Duncan combined to miss four straight free throws when they had a two-point lead. James then made a 3-pointer and two free throws, setting Miami up to pull it out.

FORT WORTH — Pepperdine's Aaron Brown beat TCU with his arm — from the mound and center field. Brown pitched seven scoreless innings, then made a game-saving throw from center as the Waves held on for a 3-2 victory Sunday night. They forced a deciding third game in the NCAA Fort Worth super regional for a spot in the College World Series. "Aaron Brown was obviously outstanding, all over the field," TCU coach Jim Schlossnagle said. "To me, he's the story of the game. As (Texas) coach (Augie) Garrido says, sometimes

## Nadal tops Djokovic

PARIS — Trying to beat Rafael Nadal at the French Open is, without a doubt, the toughest task in tennis. Indeed, must be among the greatest challenges in all of sports. The pressure he applies, from set to set, game to game, point to point, shot to shot. That bullwhip of a high-bouncing, topspin lefty forehand. Those quick-reflex returns that help him break an opponent's serve — and his will. Doing what he does so well on the red clay of Roland Garros, a surface and site he dominates so completely, the No. 1-seeded Nadal wore down No. 2 Novak Djokovic 3-6, 7-5, 6-2, 6-4 in a muggy final Sunday to win his ninth French Open championship and fifth in a row, both records. "For me," Nadal said, "playing here in Roland Garros is just unforgettable, forever."

It is also his 14th Grand Slam title overall, tying the 28-year-old Spaniard with Pete Sampras for the second most by a man, behind only Roger Federer's 17. That includes Nadal's two trophies apiece at Wimbledon and the U.S. Open, along with one from the Australian Open, proving he can beat the best on grass and hard courts, too. But it's on the clay of Paris where Nadal reigns supreme: He has won 66 of 67 career French Open matches.

Since the only loss, against Robin Soderling in the fourth round in 2009, Nadal has won 35 consecutive matches at Roland Garros. No other man has won more than seven titles at any of tennis' four majors. "It's not impossible, but it's very, very difficult to stay with Rafa in this court, throughout the whole match, on the highest level of performance," said Djokovic, who was broken in the final game of each set, including with an anticlimactic double-fault on match point. Nadal ensured that he, not Djokovic, will be ranked No. 1 on Monday. In the process, Nadal once again prevented six-time major champion Djokovic from completing a career Grand Slam.

"He deserves to win this tournament," Nadal said. "I am sure he will do it in the future." Djokovic had won their four most recent matches, including on clay in the best-of-three-set final at Rome last month. Beating Nadal in best-of-five is a whole other matter. Nadal also topped Djokovic in the 2012 final, and the 2013 semifinals. In all, Nadal leads Djokovic 6-0 at the French Open, 9-3 at major tournaments, and 23-19 in total.

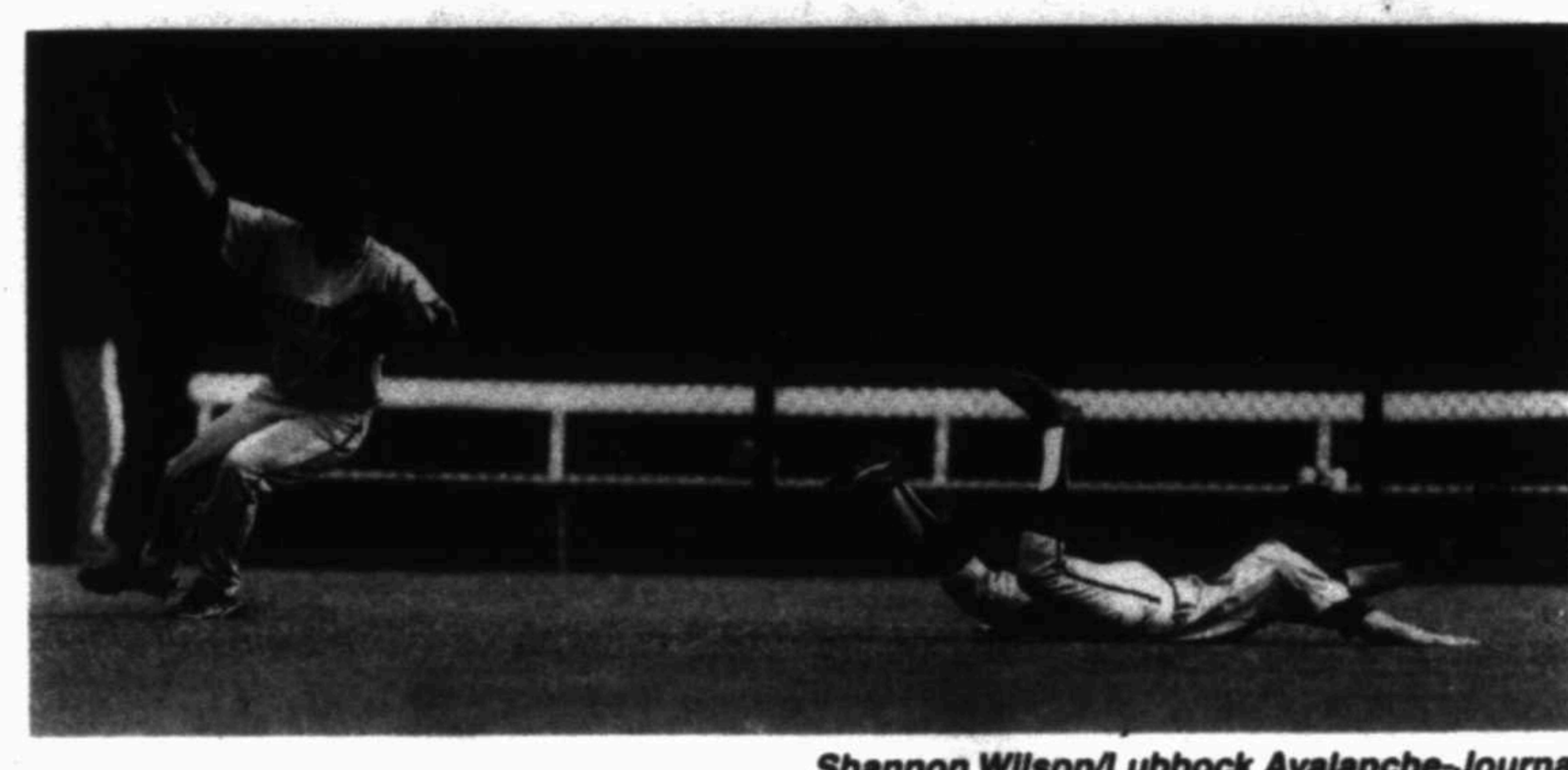

"It's been fun. We like playing off of each other," Singleton said. "That's definitely a bonus. When one person does well, it carries over and it's contagious."

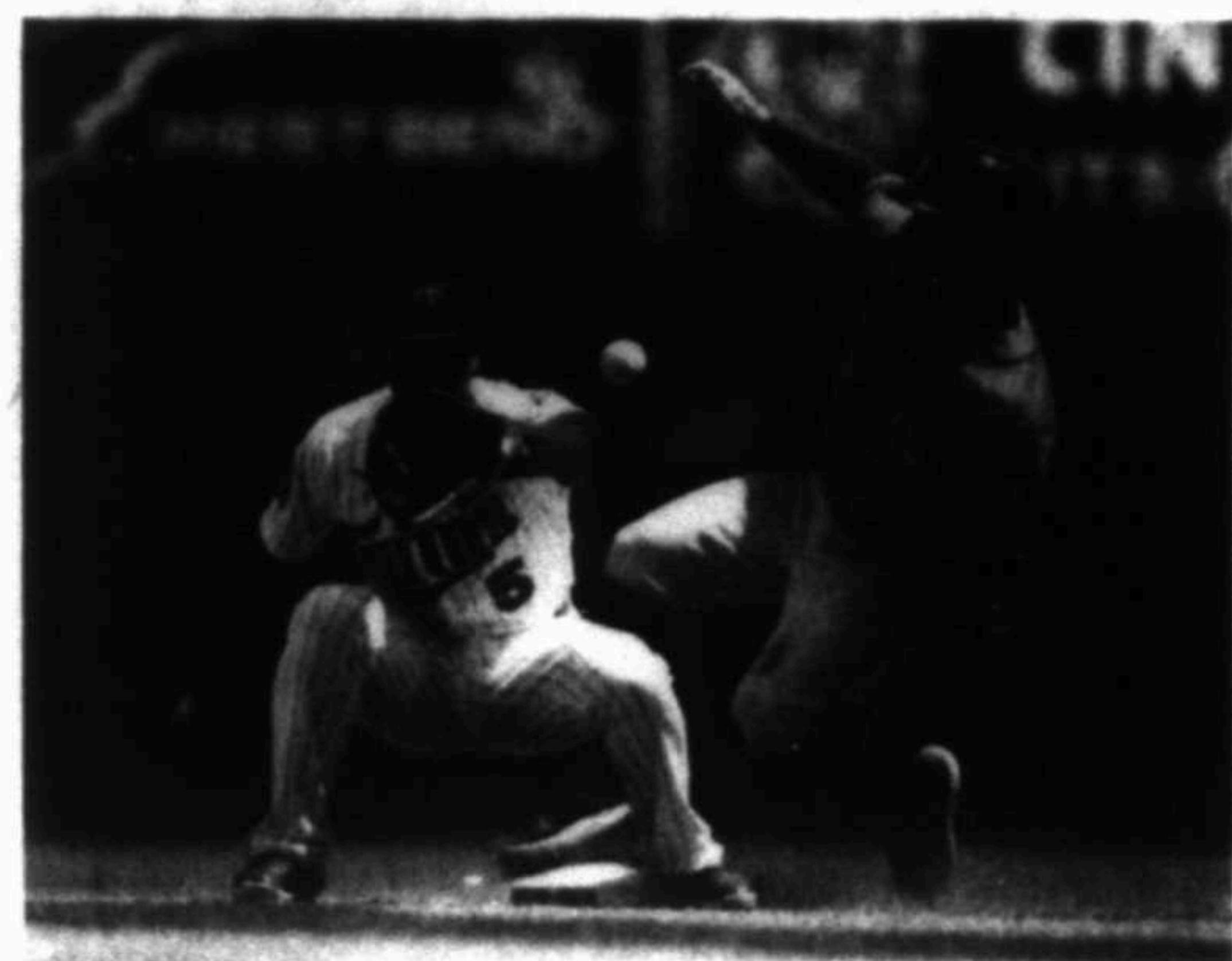
Darin Downs (1-0) got the last eight outs as the third reliever to follow starter Colin McHugh, who fanned six and allowed one run over 4 1/3 innings.

Such an approach might be tough for the Texas players after many more days like Sunday.

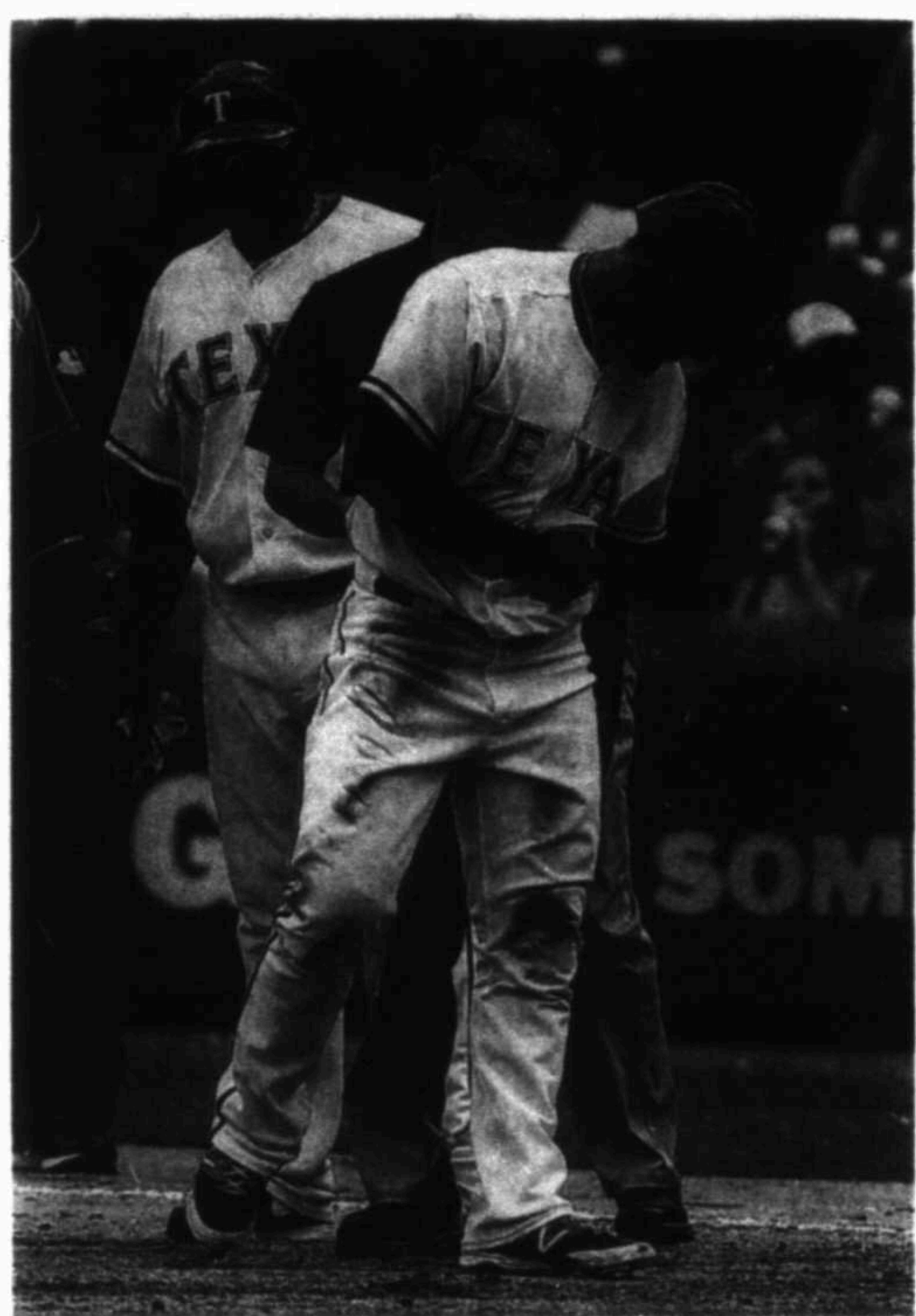

NEW YORK — The New York Rangers know they will have the raucous Madison Square Garden crowd on their side in Game 3 of the Stanley Cup finals.

The whistle and the bounces? That is a whole other story. When the Rangers analyze their two overtime losses to the Kings in Los Angeles, they likely will be happy about much of them — other than the result, of course. New York hasn't trailed for one second in the nine regulation periods played in the championship round, yet the Rangers return home in an 0-2 hole.

They led by two early in their 3-2 single overtime loss in Game 1 and then had three two-goal edges in Game 2, only to fall 5-4 in double overtime Saturday night.

The starts were good, the middles provided success, too. The third periods and overtimes have been the difference, and that is what matters. New York was outshot 20-3 in the third period of Game 1 and outscored 2-0 in the final regulation frame of Game 2.

Both teams spent Sunday flying to New York before Game 3 tonight. "The series isn't over yet," said Rangers defenseman Ryan McDonagh, who had a goal and assist in the first period and logged a team-high 37:48 of ice time in Game 2.

"They've got a 2-0 lead, but we're going home. We're excited. We've got to use our crowd. "We've got to start Game 3 at home having a good approach, keep staying with it, keep believing."

doing to the Rangers what they did to the Sharks. Ducks and defending Stanley Cup champion Blackhawks before them. If New York wants to avoid the head-shaking those clubs endured after being eliminated in seven games, the story line must change quickly Monday.

"We're doing a lot of things that haven't been in our game for years. We're getting away with it," said forward Jarret Stoll, who scored the Kings' first goal in Game 2. "Don't get me wrong, we did a lot of good things to come back, down 2-0, down 4-2. Resiliency to come back and battle and push and pull everybody into it, battle for that tying goal and the winning goal again."

"We've got to be honest with how we're playing. We know we've got more."

Keselowski was second for the second straight race. Earnhardt won the Daytona 500 and now has multiple wins in a season for the first time since 2004. Keselowski has a runner-up

finish to go with his 95 laps led. Kurt Busch, Denny Hamlin and rookie Kyle Larson round out the top five. Earnhardt gives Hendrick Motorsports three straight wins, following back-to-back victories by Jimmie Johnson. Johnson overcame a pit road mishap to finish sixth.

**RICCIARDO WINS FORMULA 1 CANADIAN GRAND PRIX:** At Montreal, Daniel Ricciardo won the Canadian Grand Prix on Sunday, breaking the Mercedes stranglehold on the Formula One circuit. 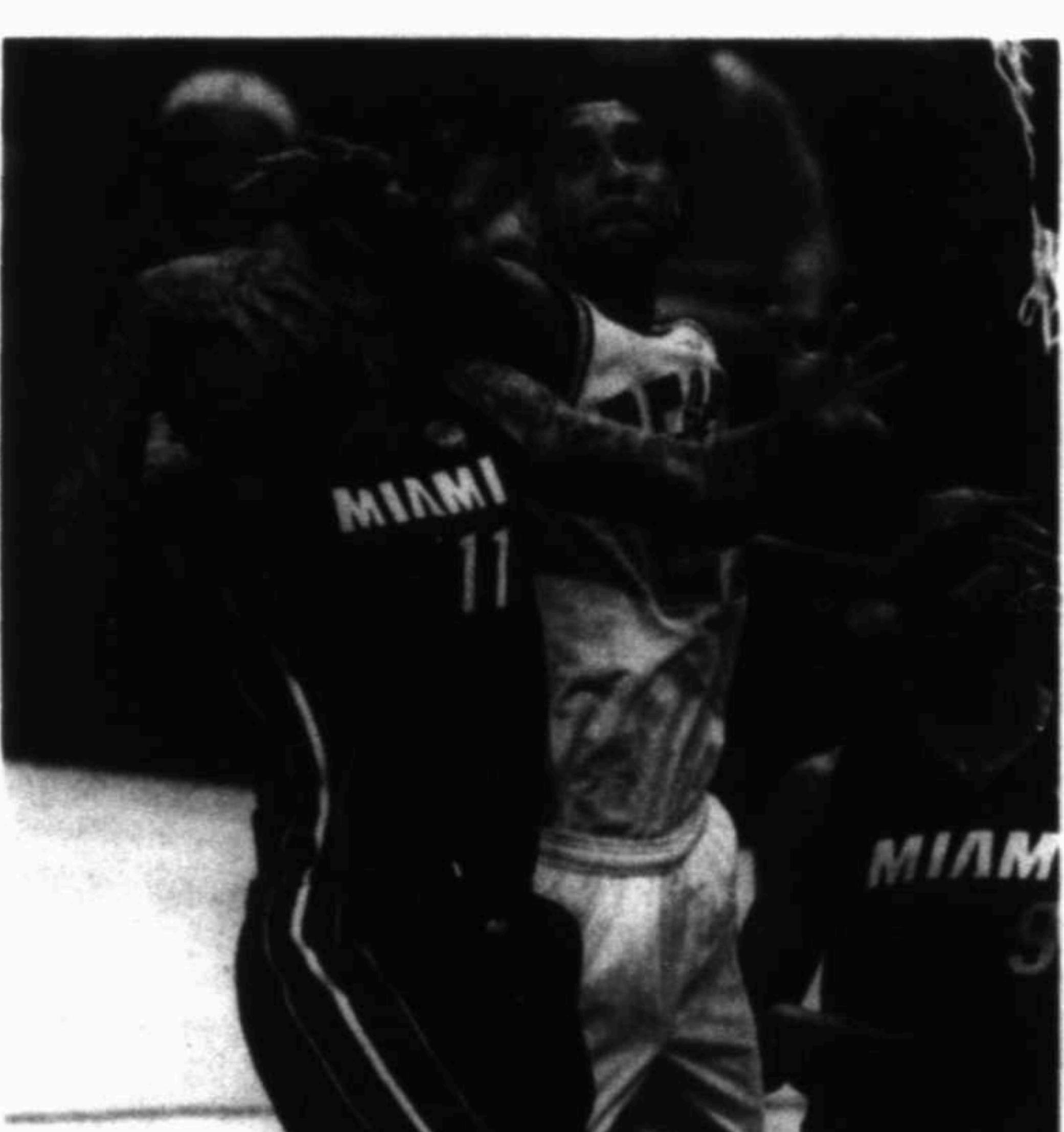
Parker scored 21 points and Duncan had 18 points and 15 rebounds for the Spurs, who had won eight straight at home by 15 or more points.

The game was played in comfortable conditions inside the AT&T Center, where an air conditioning failure in Game 1 sent temperatures soaring to about 90 degrees in the second half. The problem, caused by a broken circuit breaker, was fixed by Friday afternoon, and it was much cooler inside the arena.

James had the toughest time with the heat Thursday, needing treatment midway through the fourth quarter before eventually having to leave for good. He had plenty of time to recover, with the two days off between Games 1 and 2.

He personally erased a 62-56 San Antonio lead by scoring eight points in less than a minute, and his 14 points in the third quarter had Miami down only 78-77 heading to the fourth.

After their sensational finish to Game 1, the Spurs picked up right where they left off, making 10 of their first 15 shots. They led 26-17 after Duncan's follow shot with 1:49 left, but missed a chance to expand their lead by committing three straight turnovers, and coach Gregg Popovich looked irate when the quarter

# Silver: NBA's fight with Sterling almost over

SAN ANTONIO — Donald Sterling hasn't quite given up the fight, but Adam Silver thinks the time is coming. "While I understand his frustration, I think it's over," Silver said Sunday. The NBA commissioner said Sterling still hasn't signed off on the sale of the Los Angeles Clippers, or agreed to drop his lawsuit against Silver or

the NBA. But Silver believes he ultimately will, because Shelly Sterling's agreement with the league covers the NBA's legal responsibilities in case of a suit. "So in essence, Donald is suing himself and he knows that," Silver said. Silver also said before Game 2 of the NBA Finals that there is "absolutely no possibility" of rescinding the lifetime ban or \$2.5 million fine he handed down to Sterling following his racist remarks. Sterling said he spoke with Sterling shortly after delivering his punishment and found him to be "distracted" but "not remorseful at that time." Sterling's attorneys had eventually indicated to the league that he would drop his fight and work with his estranged wife to finish off the record \$2 billion sale to former Microsoft CEO Steve Ballmer. Sterling may be changing his mind now, but Silver doesn't seem concerned.

# NADAL

No other pair of men has played each other as often.

The defeat in Rome was one of three this season on clay for Nadal, raising questions about whether he'd be unbeatable at Roland Garros this time. There also was the matter of his troublesome back, which flared up during a loss to Stan Wawrinka in the Australian Open final and slowed his serve at times during the French Open.

forehand early, Djokovic grabbed the first set, and got to 5-all in the second. "I felt," Nadal said, "the match was more in his hands at the beginning."

Knowing that overcoming a two-set hole might be too much even for him, Nadal raised his level, taking 20 of 26 points to claim that set and a 3-0 lead in the third.

"Without that second set, I don't know if I have this trophy with me now," Nadal would say later.

When a down-the-line forehand winner ended the second set, Nadal leaped and shook both fists, his first sign of real emotion. "The momentum went (to) his side," Djokovic said. "I started playing quite bad and didn't move as well. Struggled a little bit physically throughout that third set."

# Ben Crane wins St. Jude Classic for 5th PGA title

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Ben Crane estimates he slept less than three hours in a night spent praying and thanking God that his game finally has come back around.

Then he played 30 holes Sunday in winning the St. Jude Classic for his first PGA Tour title since 2011, setting off a celebration that included hugging his caddie and high-fiving a reporter. Crane also choked back some tears as he looked at text messages filling his phone.

"Oh my gosh, it just keeps going," Crane said, looking at his phone. "How many can a phone hold? This is so much fun"

Crane closed with a 3-over 73 for a one-stroke victory, going wire to wire for his fifth career victory. Rain delays forced him into the marathon session Sunday at TPC Southwind, finishing 12 holes in the morning in a third-round 69 to take a three-shot lead into the final round.

He two-putted for bogey on the final hole to finish at 10-under 270, days after failing to qualify for the U.S. Open. That marked a low point for the 38-year-old player who spent the past six months reworking his swing to protect his back wondering if his career was over. He spent time with a coach picturing the right way to hit shots. Everything clicked Thursday with an opening 63.

"I did not expect the hole to open up like that and just start making putts from everywhere," Crane said. "Just hit a lot of quality shots and obviously built a nice lead to start out with."

Troy Merritt was second after a 71. Webb Simpson (65), Matt Every (70) and Carl Pettersson (69) were 8 under, and Ian Poulter had a 64 to tie for sixth at 7 under.

Merritt credited the best finish of his career to an improved short game.

"Ben played great," Merritt said. "Hats off to him. Well deserved. He's been struggling for a little while.

Very happy for Ben." Phil Mickelson, among those tuning up for the U.S. Open at Pinehurst, left winless in his 20th event since the British Open. He tied for 11th at 6 under after a 72.

Consecutive birdies on Nos. 11 and 12 put Mickelson at 8 under. But he bogeyed the next two, including the par-3 14th where he hit a 7-iron into the water in front of the green. He still finished much better than his tie for 49th at Memorial last week after an early visit from FBI agents and lingering questions about an insider-trading investigation.

"The way I drove the ball last two rounds I had an opportunity to shoot really low," Mickelson said. "My iron play was poor, and my putting was pathetic. I'll have to make some changes and to get ready for next week. But the game is not far off because I'm driving the ball very well and putting it in play."

Wind, thunderstorms, lightning and fog have delayed play each of the first three days. With more storms forecast, players

started the final round almost immediately after concluding the third. They finished without single delay Sunday as the sun even came out as this tournament finished its 57th year without being shortened because of weather.

Crane had three bogeys in the final round, one more than he had through 54 holes. He became the first winner on tour without a birdie in his final round since Justin Leonard did it at Southwind in 2005.

He cruised along before two-putting for bogey on No. 6, dropping his lead to two strokes over Brian Harman and Merritt. Crane bogeyed No. 9 after hitting his tee shot into the rough. He couldn't clear the rough with his next shot, and his third bounced to the rough behind the green.

Crane said he only glanced at the leaderboard a couple times.

"I just knew I was leading, and I knew Phil Mickelson was out there so," Crane said. "And Phil's a good friend, and he kind of gave me that, 'I'm coming after you.'"

The United States won 13-7 to improve to 28-7-3 in the biennial competition, rebounding from a 10 1/2-9 1/2 loss in 2012 at Naim in Scotland — the Americans' only loss since 1996.

**CLEVELAND OPEN:** At Westlake, Ohio, New Zealand's Steven Alker won the Cleveland Open in the longest playoff in Web.com Tour history, beating South Africa's Dawie van der Walt with a birdie on the 11th extra hole.

Q 1 — Neither vulnerable, as South, you hold:

♠ K Q 10 8 ♥ K 10 4 ♦ A 8 7 6 ♣ A 6

The bidding:

NORTH EAST SOUTH WEST

1♦ Pass 1♣ Pass

1NT Pass ?

What call would you make?

A — You are too good to simply raise to three no-trump without showing your diamond fit, and a jump to three diamonds would not be forcing.

Q 2 — North-South vulnerable, as South, you hold:

♠ A 7 6 3 ♥ Q 9 4 2 ♦ K Q 8 7 ♣ 7

Partner opens one heart and right-hand opponent passes. What call would you make?

A — Bid four clubs. We encourage all our readers, if they haven't done so already, to adopt splinter bids. They are simple to use and very effective. This

bid shows a game-force with four or more trumps and shortness in the bid suit. Perfect!

Q 3 — East-West vulnerable, as South, you hold:

♠ A 10 9 8 3 ♥ Void ♦ K 4

♣ Q J 9 8 6 4

As dealer, what call would you make?

A — This hand is well worth an opening bid, and even better, it is an easy hand to describe. Open one club, planning to bid and re-bid spades if you get two more chances to bid.

Q 4 — Both vulnerable, as South, you hold:

♠ J 4 ♥ 5 3 ♦ A K 6 3 ♣ A Q J 8 2

As dealer, what call would you make?

A — Opening one no-trump with 2-2 in the majors is usually a bad idea, and you are not strong enough to reverse. With a strong four-card diamond suit, we like opening one diamond and re-bidding two clubs. This shows at least nine cards in the minors.
