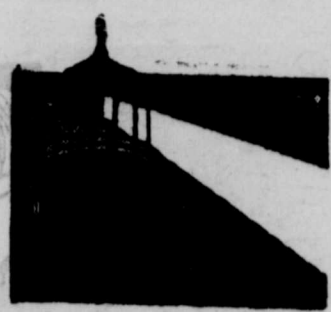




On The BEAM

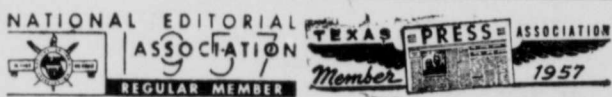

CIVIL DEFENSE "KEYPOINT" for Los Angeles is typical of some 200 such communication centers throughout the nation maintained by local civil defense. In less populous areas, "keypoints" are often police or fire stations, where someone is always on duty. They depend on the Federal Civil Defense Administration's 14,189-mile warning net (faint) to link them to Air Force air defense division control centers. Keypoints notify, in turn some 3,500 "sub-keypoints" which set off sirens and call out civil defense personnel.

The company has well trained mechanics to service all makes of tractors and other farm equipment as well as the service they are equipped to give on irrigation motors.

The Minneapolis-Moline Co. had its beginning in 1865 in a modest shop as Moline Plow Co. The first products of this company were the walking plows and cultivators. In 1878 approximately 300 men were employed making plows, harrows and cultivators.

In December 1915 the company made available to agriculture a general purpose tractor.

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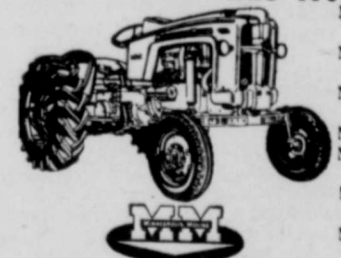

Widows of Veterans May Apply For Higher Pension

Twenty-four thousand widows of veterans who died of service-connected causes before January 1, 1957 may lose money unless they apply for the higher death compensation payments by July 1, 1957.

Robert W. Sisson, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Lubbock, Texas said approximately 80,000 widows throughout the nation have already applied for the higher payments.

VA originally estimated that all the 114,000 widows receiving compensation for the service-connected deaths of their husbands before January 1, 1957, approximately 104,000 were qualified to receive the higher payments.

The 24,000 who have not applied as yet have until July 1 to file application if they wish to receive the higher payments retroactive to January 1 under the Survivors Benefits Act.

Most of the widows who apply after July 1 will find that the higher payments will become effective as of the day their applications are received, Mr. Sisson said.

Those who apply for the new benefit but who would receive more under old laws will be advised by VA against the wrong choice of payment.

TEXAS' NEW EGG LAW

The next few months mark a period of preparation for one of Texas' most important agricultural advances in recent years—the enforcement of an egg grading and standards law.

Recent passage of the Texas Egg Law brings the state into line with all other states which already have active egg programs, making possible the protection of Texas egg producers and consumers alike from misrepresented and mislabeled eggs.

The law became effective immediately upon its passage although it will not become operative in full for a six-months prescribed period. This period presumably is to allow for preparation of persons and firms for compliance with the law in full.

With a few minor exceptions, the new egg law provides that eggs sold for human consumption must be graded according to consumer grades and weight classes set up by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The new law also makes it illegal to sell or advertise shell eggs below the quality of Grade A as "fresh," "yard," "selected," "henery," "newlaid," "cage," or other words which represent such eggs to be fresh. This does not include the sale of eggs from a producer's own flocks. The labeling provisions are among those which will not become effective until 180 days following the law's effective date, or in about six months.

Another provision involves licensing of certain dealers and processors of eggs, with fees set according to volume of eggs handled. The proceeds of these fees will help to defray the cost of administration and enforcement of this act.

Questions and Answers

Q. I applied to VA for an increase in my disability compensation rating. I was supposed to report for a physical examination, and completely forgot about it. What do I do now?

A. Since you failed to appear for your physical examination, VA has no choice but to consider your claim "abandoned." You will have to file another application if you still believe you're entitled to an increased rating.

Q. I am working for my master's degree under the Korean GI Bill. One of my required graduate courses calls for an undergraduate course as a prerequisite, but my school does not offer this undergraduate course. Would I be allowed to take this course in another school?

A. Yes, so long as your school specifically designates to VA the course which is to be taken at the second school, and will accept its credits at full value in partial fulfillment of your degree program.

Q. I am a disabled veteran receiving vocational rehabilitation training. I've had some particularly heavy expenses in the last months, and I am hard pressed for cash. Is there any provision under which VA can lend me the money?

A. Yes. There is a special loan fund for disabled veteran-trainees. You may borrow up to \$100 from this fund, at no interest.

Q. I am receiving a VA pension for nonservice-connected disability. I've been able to get a small part-time job that I can perform in spite of my handicap. In computing my annual income for pension purposes, must I include my gross income or my take-home pay after deductions?

A. Your gross income must be included, not your take-home pay.

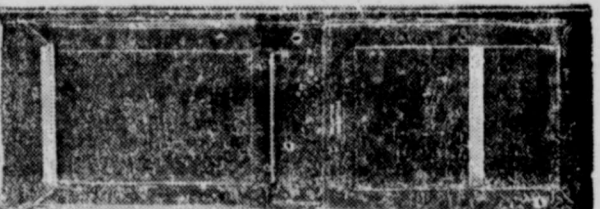
