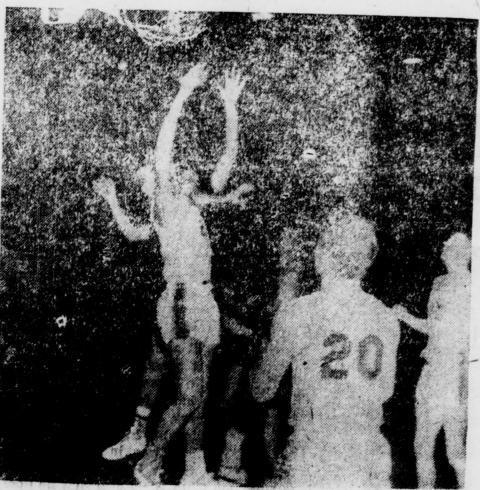

Mr. Carroll went on the show that the state of Texas spent approximately \$255 per student.

for education, during the 1957 school year. However, Crane High School spends more than \$500 per pupil.

"The board here gives a student every available opportunity, but expects a student to try to learn."

He went on to explain how expenses could be cut, by lessening curriculum and other means, but that the school administration wanted the students to have every opportunity available.
