Splash day set Friday at pool

It may have been delayed this summer, but splash day at Ruddick Park swimming pool slated this Friday will be a memorable one.

Friday marks the opening of the new pool and renovated bath house thanks to a state grant and donations from hundreds of people who contributed to the fund.

City Manager Brenda Tarter said the pool will open at 12:30 p.m. Friday and will be open daily except Wednesday. Pool hours will be from 12:30-6:30 p.m. each Monday, Tuesday, Thursday Friday and Saturday and from 1-5 p.m. on Sundays.

Gate prices are \$1 each and family passes for the summer will be \$20, said Mrs. Tarter.

In addition, the pool will be available for private parties from 6:30-8:30 p.m. and from 8:30-10:30 p.m. after regular

pool hours. Cost will be \$50 per party up to 20 persons and \$60 for 20-50 persons.

Ten sessions of swimming lessons are to be offered beginning July 21. Cost is \$25 per person and reservations may be made by contacting the city hall.

Lifeguards will be Holly Tarter, Gary White and Donnie Hearn. The pool will be managed by Mark Merrell and Tom Ramsey.

"We're delighted that we were able to have the new swimming pool completed by this season as promised," said Mrs. Tarter who cited a number of individuals for their assistance including Brian Bassham, Woody Anderson, Bus Rich, Sheriff Wendell Bryant, Mitchell County and the Colorado City Police Department.

Bang-up Fourth set for local residents

Colorado City residents can be assured of a bang-up July Fourth this year.

Fireworks, a fly-in, opening of the city swimming pool and school reunions are all on tap as the holiday gets underway Friday.

The annual Colorado City Fly-In will start at 7 a.m. Friday at the Northwest Jet Strip Airport with a free breakfast for all fly-ins. Others will be charged \$3 each for the breakfast which will be catered by Mac-Michael's Restaurant.

"We're expecting a lot of airplanes for people to look at," said J. O. Dockrey, chairman of the event. "We're hoping that a lot of people will come out and look at the planes."

There is no admission charge to the sesquicentennial fly-in, said Dockrey.

The Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department will again sponsor a fireworks display, except it will be on Saturday, July 5 at Ruddick Park.

Firefighters will sell barbecue, soft drinks and snacks beginning at 1 p.m. on Saturday and ending when the fireworks begin at dark, Fire Chief Jerry Hammond said.

The new swimming pool at Ruddick Park will open Friday and will be open on Saturday as well.

Crews were cleaning up the park this week in anticipation of the crowds expected at the pool opening and for the fireworks display.

The Colorado High School graduating classes of 1943, 1944, 1945 and 1946 will hold a combined reunion in the Colorado City Civic Center Saturday beginning

37 teachers named to career ladder

The Colorado Independent School District board of trustees Tuesday night named 37 teachers to Level II of the career ladder for the 1985-86 school year with each teacher receiving a salary supplement of \$1,500.

Asst. Supt. Don Nimmo said that there were 52 applicants for the career ladder, which is mandated by state law, and that the school district received only enough funds for 37 teachers. He said a point system based on evaluations from the 1984-85 school year was used by a committee composed of administrators to select the top 37.

He said that last year, only enough money was received to name 27 to the career ladder.

Board member Dwayne Harris made the motion to accept the written recommendation of Supt. Charlie Useilton who was on vacation and not at the meeting to name the 37 teachers. The motion was seconded by Eddie Gregory and approved unanimously. Board member Kathy Bassham was not present.

In other business, the board opened bids for a tax collection software package and after consulting with Mike Burt, chief appraiser for Mitchell County Appraisal District, voted to accept the bid of Business Records Corporation of Dallas.

The system will be used for the IBM System 36 computer and will cost \$7,000 plus \$200

monthly maintenance fee. Installation and training is included.

Other bidders included Davis Kinard Company of Abilene and Northeast Texas Data Corporation of Sulphur Springs.

CISD Business Manager Geneva Findley said that Burt recommended Business Records Corporation to the county, but the county chose Davis Kinard. The appraisal district was to have awarded a bid on software at a Wednesday night meeting.

Burt said the appraisal district was waiting until the school district chose a system before making a final decision.

The school board also conducted a public hearing concerning the use of Chapter II funds for 1986-87. No one was present at

the hearing, and the school board agreed to spend the \$10,915 for the hearing and the board agreed to continue to spend the funds in the gifted and talented program at Hutchinson Elementary for the teacher's salary.

Mrs. Findley said that funds for Chapter II for the 1986-87 year total \$10,915 and that a carry over balance from the 1985-86 school year totals \$1,635.

To make application for funds, the school district must consult with the parents, teachers and administrators of participating children, said Mrs. Findley.

The board will meet again in special session Tuesday night to conduct a budget workshop session.

"Without their valuable assistance, we couldn't have finished the project by Friday," said Mrs. Tarter. "We've had a lot of fantastic cooperation."

The new pool is 80 by 100 foot. There is also a 10 by 12 wading pool. The bath house has been completely remodeled and is also being utilized as the new entrance to the pool. A fence was being constructed Tuesday and Wednesday.

The swimming pool is the first phase of the renovation project for the park. Plans call for new playground equipment, an underground water sprinkler system and a hike and bike trail.

Mrs. Tarter said that the extensive rockwork in the park, constructed by the WPA in the 1940s, is being utilized in the park plans and that a rock walkway, 36-inches wide, leading around the main park where the swimming pool is located, was uncovered this week.

TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

How to Water Your Lawn During the Summer Months

Watering is one of the most basic practices in maintaining a home lawn, especially here in Texas where the summers are hot and dry. But there is a right way and wrong way to water a lawn.

Ideally, an established lawn should be watered just before it begins to wilt. Most grasses take on a dull purplish cast and leaf blades begin to fold or roll. Grass under drought stress also shows evidence of tracks after someone walks across the lawn. These are the first signs of wilt.

With some careful observation and experience, it should not be too hard to determine just how many days a lawn can go between waterings. Common bermudagrass lawns should be able to go five, six, seven days or even longer between waterings without loss of quality.

When is the best time of day to water? Many people come home from work and go out to the yard to water the lawn in the cool of the evening. This is actually the worst time to water because the lawn tends to stay wet all night, making it more susceptible to disease.

Early morning is considered the best time to water. The wind is usually calm and the temperature is low, so less water is lost to evaporation.

When an established lawn needs to be watered, apply enough water so that the soil is wetted to a depth of 4 to 6 inches. The type of soil has a great deal to do with how much water is



needed to wet the soil to this depth. One good soaking is better than several light sprinklings. If waterings are too light or too frequent, the lawn may tend to become weak and shallow-rooted which, in turn, makes it more susceptible to stress injury.

There is a great variety in the relative need for water between the turfgrasses, so keep this factor in mind when selecting a grass for your yard.

In general, avoid using soluble nitrogen fertilizers, since they tend to promote high growth rates which, in turn, increase the water requirements of the plant.

Shade helps keep mobile homes cooler

COLLEGE STATION—Mobile homes lack the ventilated attic space, overhangs and insulation that make it easier to cool a site-built home. But that doesn't mean that mobile home residents have to suffer with the summer heat.

According to Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service housing specialist Dr. Susan Quiring, mobile home owners can make minor improvements that will increase comfort and help maintain reasonable energy costs.

If your mobile home doesn't have large trees shading it, she suggests adding arbors and trellises to support vining plants that will provide shade. Low-cost, easy-to-build trellises are especially effective on east and west facing walls where the summer sun is intense.

When the roof can't be shaded, coat it with a light-colored or aluminized treatment so that most of the sunlight will be reflected, says Quiring.

To protect windows from direct exposure to the sun, the housing specialist suggests awnings, light-colored or reflective draperies or reflective film for the glass on west-facing win-

dows. While home improvements can help, mobile home dwellers should also be aware that their lifestyle will affect cooling costs and summer comfort, says the specialist.

Since running just a few appliances can consume a large part of an air conditioner's capacity, they should be run in the morning or late evening when it's coolest.

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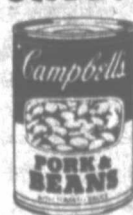

Lake levels rose greatly during rains

The lake levels in Mitchell County have increased due to the recent rains. The level for Lake Colorado City is 2066.30 and Lake Champion is 2068.40. Lake Champion is 15 feet from the full mark while Lake Colorado City is only 4.7 feet from being full, according to S. R. Wilkinson, spokesman for the Morgan Creek Power Plant.

Now that the rains have come to a halt, the usage has been higher in the community, especially due to watering lawns. This constitutes a substantial loss to the lake levels, therefore, a conservative attitude towards consumption is still encouraged. However, "...the biggest loss to the lake levels is a result of evaporation," said Wilkinson. He also stated, "If there is no runoff until September or October, lake levels will lose about 5 feet because of evaporation."

Experiments have been conducted by different municipal counties in Texas with a variety of chemicals that float on top of the water in order to stop or even reduce evaporation. As of yet, no solution has been found.

Veterans warned about life insurance "benefits"

The Veterans Administration is once again warning World War II veterans not to be misled by false information regarding the payment of a special life insurance dividend.

VA Administrator Thomas K. Turnage, responding to a reappearance of a hoax that has plagued the agency for almost 40 years, reiterated that the VA "does not pay dividends on lapsed insurance policies."

The hoax, which first surfaced in 1948, is once again making the rounds resulting in literally thousands of inquiries to the VA from all over the country. It is refuted every few years by the mysterious distribution of "applications" often poorly reproduced, and sometimes directed to a non-existent "Capt. Prosser" at the VA Insurance Center in Philadelphia. The forms claim that dividends are available for the "asking" and promises World War II veterans a dividend based on their military service, "even if they haven't kept their policies in force."

The bogus application also claims that Congress has passed a law authorizing the dividends. There has been no such action nor is there any pending.
