1000 MORE TROOPS RUSHED TO MANAGUA

Washington, Government Is Determined to Stamp Out Fires of Insurrection in Central America.

(By Associated Press)
BOSTON, Jan. 3.—Five destroyers at the Boston navy yard received orders tonight to proceed at once to Hampton Roads, en route to Nicaragua. The vessels were the J. K. Paulding, Overton, Putnam, McFarland and Sturtevant. All prepared to get under way at midnight.

The mine layer Shawmut was ordered to leave for Hampton Roads tomorrow morning. There it will take on board 25 officers and 400 men for Nicaragua.

AIRPLANES FAIL TO FIND REBEL TROOPS

MANAGUA, N. C., Jan. 3.—(AP)—Airplanes arriving this afternoon from the region of Quilali were unable to find any sign of rebel troops. It is believed they have gone to El Chilote, 18 miles away, to concentrate against the American marines who captured the base. The original capture of the city, reinforced by a combat patrol, are holding Quilali with an additional column of reinforcements on the way and the promise of 1,000 more marines from the United States to assist in controlling the situation throughout the country.

Creager, of Brownsville, national committeeman, today sent a letter to officials of the Texas Republican party naming Herbert Hoover as the man "who will best carry out the Coolidge policies and perpetuate the prosperity associated with the Coolidge program" state headquarters announced here. The letter described Hoover as a "friend of Texas, a genuine Republican and a great man in every sense of the word."

ESCH RETAINED

Peculiarity in Government Rules Save Post

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—(AP)—One of the peculiarities in the rules for running the American government today permitted President Coolidge to continue John J. Esch, of Wisconsin, in office as a member of the interstate commerce commission notwithstanding the fact that the senate has not yet confirmed his nomination.

LUFKIN, Texas, Jan. 3.—(AP)—A special session of district court will be held here within a few days to try John Ballinger, negro, said to have confessed to attacking Mr. and Mrs. James H. Lee, and to attempting to assault a young woman of Lufkin.

YATES APPEAL TODAY

Plea In Oil Cases Goes To Higher Court Today

AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 3.—(AP)—The appeal of L. O. Yates, Pecos county, and others from the Travis county district court action overruling their plea of privilege in the state's suit on West Texas state land oil leases, involving the much-controversed "indemnity" act, will be submitted Wednesday before the court of civil appeals here.

KIDWELL CHARGES

Reiterates That Prosecution Was Threatened

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Edward J. Kidwell, Jr., who recently wound up his first day's testimony in the Teapot Dome oil contempt case by alleging that the prosecutor had threatened him with a charge that an assistant district attorney had threatened him with prosecution if he failed to testify that false affidavits were true.

Mrs. Appleby Died

After Body Put In Ditch, Verdict

Coroner's Jury Rules That Death of "Sack Murder" Victim Resulted From Congestion of Lungs.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Mrs. Amelia Appleby, wealthy "sack murder" victim, died after her body had been thrown into a ditch by an unknown person, a coroner's jury decided here today. Death resulted from congestion of the lungs due to exposure.

Dr. Charles M. McMillan, held as the woman's suspected slayer, refused to testify or advise a coroner. The inquest was held at San Fernando, twenty miles northwest of here, near which town the body of the woman, trapped in a sack, was found December 28.

A murder indictment against Dr. McMillan will be sought by the state, district attorney's officers said.

SEEK SINCLAIR DELAY

Postponement of Retrial Is Sought by Attorneys

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Postponement of the re-trial of Harry F. Sinclair and Albert B. Fall on charges of conspiracy in connection with naval leases set for January 16, in Washington, will be sought, it was announced here today by Owen J. Roberts, one of the attorneys for the government in the oil case. Beyond stating a motion would be made in the supreme court within the next few days asking a continuance, Mr. Roberts made no comment.

NAVAL QUIZ STARTS

Inquiry Into Sinking Of Submarine Today

BOSTON, Jan. 3.—(AP)—The naval investigation into the sinking of the submarine S-4 by the coast guard destroyer, Paulding, off Provincetown, December 11, with the loss of 48 lives will start here tomorrow. A naval court of inquiry will convene at the Charleston navy yard at 10 a. m.

Davenport, 91st district court, indicated today, Stirling Holloway, assistant county attorney, said the men will be tried separately but that it is not decided which one will be tried first.

EL DORADO, Ark., Jan. 3.—(AP)—Florence Williams, 9, was burned to death and seven other members of her family were burned seriously, by her mother probably fatally, today when the home of Terleton Williams, farmer, living near here, was destroyed by fire.

CARRIED OUT TO SEA

Kiddies Were Playing On Ice; It Cracked

WILHELMSHAVEN, Germany, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Seven children, carried out to sea today by an undertow on a large ice floe, apparently are doomed as attempts to save them before darkness failed. The youngsters were playing on the ice off shore when the tide came in, breaking off the crust on which they stood. As the floe slowly drifted toward the open sea, they screamed in terror. Their cries still could be faintly heard as the rescuing party last night of them in the night. Rescue crews have little hope of saving them.

BREAKFAST—Stewed figs, cereal, cream, codded eggs, crisp graham toast, cornmeal pancakes, syrup, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Scalloped oysters, cabbage and orange salad, brown Betty, milk, tea.

DINNER—Baked mutton, mashed potatoes, turnips in lemon sauce, pear and peanut butter salad, canned cherries, chocolate cake, milk, coffee.

Turnips in Lemon Sauce—Three cups diced boiled turnips, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 cup water, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 1 egg yolk, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 tablespoon minced parsley.

Melt butter, stir in flour and slowly add water, stirring constantly. Season with salt and pepper and boil five minutes. Remove from fire and stir in egg yolk slightly beaten. NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—Lace has come into its own in this feminine age of costume. The lace frock is acclaimed now as proper for afternoon, dinner and evening.

Always delicately decorative, lace this season achieves a position of honor as the entire medium for some of the smartest creations of the season.

I have really been surprised at the many, many times and ways I have but upon lace to solve this or that problem in getting just the right soft, enhancing effect.

Here, then, everywhere, as a filmy shoulder decoration on this chiffon dress, as the graceful big bow and long streamers at the hip of another gown, as a yoke on a smart blouse of a crepe de chine ensemble, as the flouncings in a tiered skirt that needs a fluttering, soft finish, lace has been just about the handiest thing in the world for the couturier this year.

But it is the lace frock, really, that gives social assurance to the use of lace.

The Variety of Color—Colored lace in vivid greens, blues and reds are as chic as they are delicately vivacious. Black lace is ultra proper for dinner and evening. New metal laces, including silver, gold and bronzes in luxuriously soft new weaves, are all that a woman needs in the way of beauty.

I show today three interpretations of the lace frock. For high teas and dinner more formal wear there is the bronze-tinted metal lace long-sleeved frock.

Smart as it is, different, this costume has a hip-length pocket with the tiniest little nip in at the waist line that is reminiscent of old-fashioned bodices that topped hopped and panned skirts.

Its skirt has two tiers of shaded bronze lace, the edges much darker than the top. These swoop to dipping back lines that spell style in the new silhouette. Becoming, graceful, this gown is an achievement because with such elaborate material the greatest simplicity is attained.

Typical of Semi-Period Vogue—For evening dances, the gold metal cloth with its elaborate gold lace flounce of hip depth is luxurious enough to give great confidence to the lucky wearer. This gown is typical of the new semi-period frocks that are in vogue now. It catches the spirit of the graceful gown of yesteryear and yet embodies all the season's style point.

Unusual is the V-shaped back of the bodice, with its bow-knot of gold chain draping to ends down the back for further softness. A broad banding of the metal cloth finishes the neck and three fitted bands fashion a wide girder to the bodice. While the front is slightly shorter than the back, this frock's longer length backside the approach of lower skirts for evening.

After Dinner Dancing, Too—The perfect dinner gown is black lace, because pressed into service for an evening dance it suffices. Such a one is shown. Of the fine thread lace over black and flesh-colored chiffon this model reveals the novel semi-period silhouette, with slightly flaring skirt, the yoke effect achieved by using a yoke of pink on the black slip and the flounce idea carried out by the same method.

New Treaty With France Is Placed Before Diplomats

French Attitude Will Mean Whether Single Treaty or Double Pact Is To Rule Future Relations.

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—American proposals in connection with the new peace treaty with France to take the place of the Root arbitration pact which expires February 27, have been placed before the French government in alternative form.

Whether the result of the conversations and exchanges of memoranda will result in a single treaty, or in two separate pacts depends presumably on French study of the American suggestions.

In view of the fact that these suggestions were put in definite form and transmitted through the French embassy after Secretary Kellogg had discussed the situation with the entire membership of the Senate foreign relations committee, it is assumed by officials here that the proposals already have a considerable degree of Senate sanction.

Two Different Proposals.—The conversations between Secretary Kellogg and Ambassador Claudel are now known to have had two different proposals, as to ways and means of tightening up diplomatic machinery for preserving peace. They also have made it clear that the Washington government is planning to follow up the conclusion of the new peace treaty or treaties with France by making over its arbitration agreements with other countries on the model of the new Franco-American commitments as the other Root treaties expire.

In the event that the original Briand proposal for a treaty with the United States to outlaw war is followed closely, the Washington attitude is that a multi-lateral covenant to be signed ultimately by other than the two powers now concerned might be framed. It would be a general character, however, and amount to a joint policy declaration by the signatory powers against war, in view of constitutional limitations in this country, however, such as the reservation to congress alone of war making powers, no way appears open to include in a treaty of this character definite commitments not to resort to war under any circumstances.

That circumstance inclines the Washington viewpoint to favor a revision and strengthening of the Root treaty so as to include a policy declaration against war in the preamble.

Successing articles of the treaty however, would recast the commitments to submit to arbitration at The Hague disputes of every character which could not otherwise be settled and which did not involve matters of purely internal and domestic character.

To supplement and further strengthen and at the same time make even more elastic and workable the original Root arbitration treaty the American plan includes a new element in the form of a reference to possible conciliation of disputes or attempted conciliation as a preliminary step to formal arbitration.

Such an innovation might do some good. Certainly, some step is necessary and should be taken at once to cause us to realize the enormous death list piled up every year by our automobiles.

As we write this we are just wondering if this issue of the paper will not carry a story about some Lubbock person getting injured in an automobile accident that is the result of some awful careless driving. Just who the victim may be is a matter that only time will tell. It may be your child, or mine, some perfectly innocent person per chance. Being careful might possibly take a little more time some times, but in the long run it pays.

COOLIDGE GOES TO CUBA

Next week President Coolidge leaves United States for a visit to Cuba, where the sixth Pan-American Conference will convene in Havana. If we understand the purpose of the trip it is to answer the threat of the smaller countries, who have determined, it seems, to bring some pressure on this country through the conference.

Heretofore, these gatherings have been nicely worded love-feasts for the most part with little international politics mixed in the agenda. This country has had its part in the gatherings, about the same authority, one might say, as Uruguay, but so long as nothing serious was attempted this made little difference.

At the Cuba Convention eminent Latin-Americans will gather for the first time in a serious effort to lay down certain rules to govern the relations between one and the other. This is plainly aimed to lay down the law to this country, because our well-meant efforts in Panama, San Domingo, Hayti, Mexico, Nicaragua, etc., have aroused, at times, vigorous opposition in these countries.

The most impressive delegation of American representatives named since the Versailles conference will take care of American interests. President Coolidge and Secretary Kellogg will be guests, not delegates, but heading the American delegation will be Charles E. Hughes, and there will be the ambassadors to Mexico and Cuba, Henry P. Fletcher, Oscar Underwood and a group of others well known in Latin-America.

President Coolidge will make one speech, on the sixteenth. This will probably be an exposition of the American conception of duty and responsibility in this hemisphere. It will be an important occasion and the message will be one of vital interest.

TOO MUCH HEAT IS UNHEALTHY

At this time of the year it is probably well to call the attention of our readers to the danger of excessive heating. Americans, as a rule like their homes and offices to register not less than 70 degrees and there are individuals who get cold in a room where the mercury shows less than 75 degrees.

Too much heat is dangerous. Excessive temperatures cause increased heart beats and accelerated respiration, with a fall in blood pressure. Eminent physicians are agreed that the high pneumonia rate in winter is cause, not by cold weather, but by the habit of many people, who keep their houses too hot.

According to Dr. C. E. Dinslow, of Philadelphia, the proper household temperature is between 64 and 68 degrees. This is healthful temperature. Any more is dangerously unhealthy.

There are many homes in Lubbock, and in other towns, who are readers of this paper, and this page who do not have thermometers and there should be one in every household, and every business. These instruments do not cost much and every household should certainly have one and several would be better, so the temperature can be kept at an even heat. We go into buildings in this city every day where the temperature is entirely too high, and there is no wonder that there are sick people. Looking after the health of the family and those who work in the offices should be one of the duties of the parents of the family and the managers of the businesses where a number of employees are working.

We farmers are in one grand fix, but I do not advocate any farm legislation, as all such legislation has the earmarks of special legislation.

R. H. Cabiness in a recent issue of Farm and Ranch gave his experience with farm organizations and winds up with, "give the farmers and wealth-producers justice, or give them death." I have been in only one farmers' organization in my time, but it was enough to teach me that justice must be the foundation of all our laws, and that very few farmers are broad minded enough to realize the fact that we farmers are not the "whole cheese," and that the market of all production (factory or farm) is governed by the number of our fellow citizens who are able to buy and not by a restriction of time or by the popular phrase of "society."

I recently read of an American mother with four children, whose late residence was in New York City. She was trying to clothe, feed and school her little ones by pressing garments. She had the misfortune of selecting a garment which reduced her weekly check. With room rent of \$22 and her gas for heating and cooking shut off she broke the gas meter and sent

herself and four little ones to an untimely grave. Until we farmers as Americans realize that it is a duty we owe ourselves and our fellow citizens to remove the cause of such cases we can never hope to better our own condition.

There is no condition, good or bad without a cause, and when we once find the cause the remedy is indicated. In the winter of 1919-20 Cleveland, Ohio, had 22,000 citizens wanting houses. Rents consumed a greater portion of the pay check, which in turn reduced the amount of food and clothing. At the same time the city had 3,500 acres of land within the city limits which were unoccupied and taxed as improved land.

To get a better understanding of the tax on improved and personal property take two lots side by side having an assessed value of \$100 each. A home builder on one lot has a house assessed at \$1,000 and a vacant lot valued at \$100.

The home builder has an assessment for taxes of \$2,100, while the holder of the unimproved lot has an assessment for taxes of only \$100. In the Cleveland case, if the 7,500 acres of land were assessed at the same value as the improved lots the city would have had a just tax system, and rents would have been lower and the renter would have had a larger portion of his pay check for food and clothing, while the farmers would have had a better market.

YOUR HEALTH

The bodies of men and women differ not only in the external characteristics and in their internal organs that are specific for each sex, but also in the general reactions of the body to various conditions.

Physiologists in the University of Michigan have made a special study of differences in the heart action of the two sexes. The term here used refers to the physical powers of the heart and not to the emotional reactions, which constitute an entirely different story.

Converts Shark, Man's Enemy, Into Friend That Is Economic Boon

LONDON, Jan. 2.—Since the beginning of time, when men first ventured onto the sea, the shark has been man's enemy. Now an American citizen of Czech origin, Dr. Alfred Ehrenreich, is going to make the shark work for man.

The more sharks that infest the seven seas, the happier will Dr. Ehrenreich be. He has already been able to make the shark work for man.

For after long years of study of the shark and after many devices carefully patented, the doctor has found a way to make the shark about 90 per cent commercially valuable.

Many Uses.

Here is what he proposes to get out of sharks:

Leather from the hide, at the same time tough and pliable. Leather from the big intestine as fine as the finest chamois.

Valuable oil from the shark liver. Chemicals from the glands for use in tanning.

Pigments from the gall.

Dehydrated flesh, which can be sold not only to the Chinese but also to the Hindus, who will not eat the flesh of mammals.

Shark fins preserved and finding a ready market in China, where they are valued as one of the greatest delicacies.

Fertilizer from the refuse.

Moreover this is not theory. It has already been put into practice in his factory at Carnarvon in West Australia, in whose waters millions of sharks are to be found.

The other day I saw a visit to the latter, lying in the East India docks. It used to be a private luxury yacht. It is now the only floating factory, tannery and chemical works in the world.

I was shown a luxurious dining room and a comfortable bedroom. The stowaways were lined with silk brocade. And from these rooms—lung into a factory with whirling machinery. Shortly the latter is going to the waters of Ceylon and Australia, where the sharks abound. It will then be one of the busiest ships in the world.

It carries ten motor boats, each equipped with 15-horsepower Diesel engines. Each boat is capable of holding five tons of sharks.

Each boat's crew will put vast numbers in the shark-infested waters. Steel nets are so spread because the fighting shark would bite through the steel with his powerful teeth and jaws.

Drowning Sharks.

The soft hemp proves efficacious. An inflated shark is first towed forward in the soft net. He only succeeds in entangling his gills—

and drowns to death. If he doesn't the crew hit him a blow on the nose with a small steel hammer and that puts an end to Mr. Shark.

When the haul is made, the sharks are brought back to the ship. Here an ingenious machine invented by Ehrenreich skins the hide off as easily as you would peel a banana. The hide is then immediately salted down and treated with chemicals to make it ready for use.

Heretofore it has always been difficult to employ shark hide for many purposes because of its rough corrugated surface, which is also studded with little points of bone. Hence only shagreen, a rough leather, could be made. Under the Ehrenreich process all the rough places are removed and a smooth hide remains.

Rivals Other Leather.

The latter is equipped with all the machinery and vats necessary for tanning. The hide is made ready for beauty and pliancy, any made from cows or sheep. There are some which are just naturally spotted and from which beautiful "leopard coats" could be made.

There is a dye spraying machine which makes beautiful colored leather. The big intestine is tanned and makes leather soft enough for gloves.

The liver is cut up and a wonderful quantity of oil is extracted and then deodorized.

The liver is cut up into strips and placed in huge aluminum pans which are shovelled into a dehydrator. In a few hours a perfect dried meat is obtained.

All the balance of the shark's carcass is chemically treated and when it comes out of various machines is ready for use as fertilizer.

The latter can handle 30 tons of sharks per day. When a shark is torn the torn displays a very fine thin silky fiber. Dr. Ehrenreich says this fiber can be woven into silk that will be a better and cheaper than the silk of the silkworm.

No Breeding Expenses.

His brother said to me: "The possibilities are endless. Men who are engaged in the industry of converting cattle and sheep into meat, whether glue and fertilizer, always have to count that it is a very long and very expensive process to breed, rear, graze and ship the cattle."

There are the long years when they have to feed, and keep the plains. There is the freight cost of shipping them to the stockyards. "We have none of this expense. The shark just naturally breeds in the ocean and does their own feeding. The only expense we have is to catch them and that is easy. The supply of sharks in the southern waters is seemingly endless."

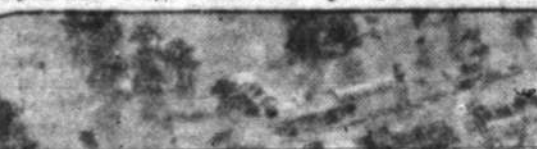

The New Year norther had abated little of its intensity Tuesday night over most of the state. Minimum temperatures were unusually low, although a cessation of the hard wind made it seem warmer. Milder temperatures were again forecast.

Temperatures above zero was the best Amarillo could do in the way of a minimum Tuesday, but the temperature climbed steadily and promised that the Panhandle would soon be the warmest part of the state. A maximum of 53 was recorded. Lubbock had a maximum of 40 and a minimum of 11 degrees. Wichita Falls, Dallas and Fort Worth did not get as high as freezing during the day, maximums being around 30 degrees. Waco and San Antonio reported "clear and warmer." Houston said "clear, cold; 28 minimum predicted."

The Bayou City reported a temperature of 34 degrees at 2 p. m. Beaumont was slightly colder with a minimum of 23 degrees Tuesday and the same figure predicted for Wednesday morning.

Corpus Has Freeze
Galveston expected a "light freeze," while Corpus Christi experienced a temperature of 40 degrees at 6 p. m., after a maximum of 29. Snowfall began at 2 p. m. Tuesday at Paris and at nightfall, measured an inch and a half. There was a cold during the night.

Temperatures ranged from 15 to 23 degrees.
Edinburgh had a minimum of 30 degrees and a maximum of 45 with a freeze forecast for Tuesday night. Citrus fruit was reported withstanding the cold but peaches and other semi-tropical plants had been injured.

MIDDLE WEST HAS
SOME RELIEF TUESDAY.
CHICAGO, Jan. 3 (AP).—The middle west today obtained some relief from the sub-zero temperature and heavy snowfall that made the double new year's holiday uncomfortable for revelers.

Generally fair skies prevailed over the Great Lakes and Mississippi valley regions blanketed by snow. Continued clear weather is forecast for Wednesday with sharply rising temperature, attaining perhaps 20 above zero.

Air mail service and transportation are again at normal, although in places highways still are partly blocked by snow.

Discovery of the frozen body of a woman, dead in her home several days, ran the deaths attributed to the cold wave here, to thirty-three.

Marines last Friday, was a severe blow to the repudiated liberal General Augustino Sandino, who has used the town as a base of supply since last July. He has made one last attempt at attack since losing the city. The chief concern of the marines at Quilich is at present to remove the sick and wounded to Managua, although medical supplies were taken to them by the reinforced patrol.

Airplanes today dropped quinine and anti-tetanus serum for the seriously wounded.

SLASHING DRIVE TO
BE WAGED BY U. S.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (AP).—A slashing drive to quiet Augustino Sandino, the Nicaraguan leader whom the Washington government regards as a bandit will start soon by the United States marines.

Orders went out today for the immediate dispatch of 1,000 additional marines from the United States to augment the 1,400 already on the ground. Pursuit of rebels however, will not await the arrival of reinforcements from the states.

Already blue jackets have been called from the ships in Nicaraguan waters to relieve marines from guard duty so they can take the trail for the Nueva Segovia strongholds of Sandino.

Marines Eager For Clash
The marines are reported to be thoroughly aroused over the slaying of their comrades in the guerrilla warfare conducted by the rebels and to be eager to clash with the enemy. Machinery was put into swift motion at the navy department for a more intensive campaign against Sandino after President Coolidge had gone over with Secretary Wilbur, official reports of the recent clashes in which lives of marines were lost.

One battalion of marines was ordered moved from San Diego to the fighting zone and another from Puerto Rico to S. C. as quickly as transportation can be provided.

HOPEFUL OF WINNING AGAINST SANDINO

MANAGUA, N. C., Jan. 3 (AP).—With promised reinforcements from the United States and with a column of marines immediately sent forward to strengthen the garrison at Quilich, now held by United States marines and national guardsmen, the American forces are hopeful of pushing the campaign against the rebels under former liberal General Sandino, to a successful termination.

The spirit of the marines has been aroused by the recent engagements fought in the territory in which Sandino has well armed contingents. They already, in contact with Americans, have killed half a dozen marines and wounded many others.

Planes Cause Havoc
With this object in view, several planes have already wrought much destruction in the rebel ranks. Col. Galich declared today the marines' columns, with aeroplane support, had "a splendid day" yesterday.

The rebels at various times during the march of marines to reinforce the garrison at Quilich, attempted to concentrate at several strategic points along the mountainous trails. They met the marines with gun fire, but immediately planes would sweep over head, dropping bombs and they would swing low and make the rebels with machine gun fire.

The outlaw bands scattered and it is believed, suffering numerous casualties, sought the shelter of the forest above which the planes still hovered, waiting for a glimpse of some group in flight, and then more bombs would be dropped. So successful was the bombing operations that the rebels failed to inflict any damage to the relief column, which reached Quilich late in the afternoon.

the state department to the French government. The draft pact is it is said, proposes the powers should solemnly declare to their respective peoples that they condemn recourse to war, and agree that a settlement of disputes arising between them of whatever nature or origin they may be, shall never be sought by either party except through peaceful means.

In answer to this suggestion Secretary Kellogg said he had given it careful consideration and warmly reciprocated for the American people the "lofty sentiments of friendship" that had inspired Minister Briand to propose such a treaty.

Welcomes Peace Move
The government of the United States welcomes every opportunity for joining the other governments of the world in condemning war and pledging anew its faith in arbitration. Mr. Kellogg continued.

"My views on this subject find a concrete expression in the form of the arbitration treaty which I proposed to take the place of the arbitration convention of 1908, (the Root treaty.)"

The proposed treaty extends the

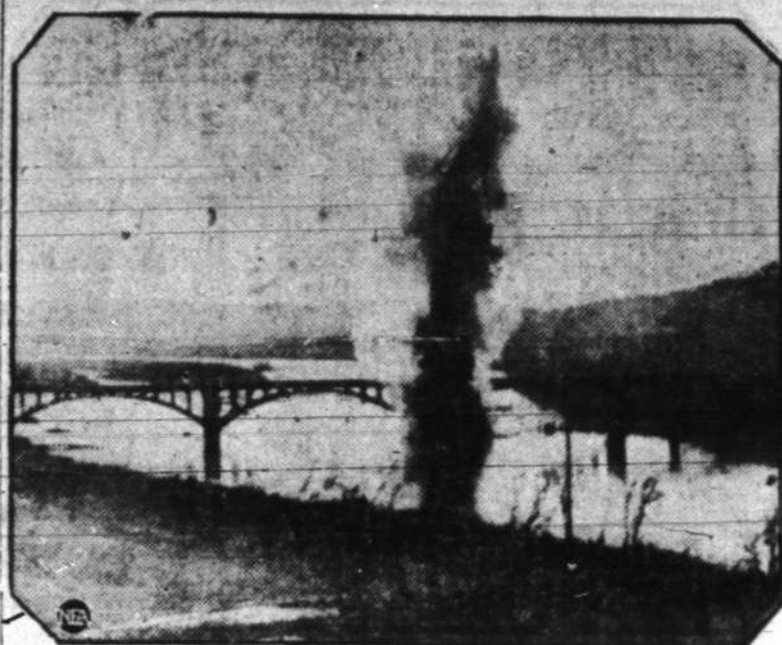
scope of that convention and records the unmistakable determination of the two governments to prevent any breach in the friendly relations which have subsisted between them for so long a period.

"In view of the traditional friendship between France and the United States—a friendship which happily is not dependent upon the existence of any formal engagement—and in view of the common de-

sire of the two nations never to resort to arms in the settlement of such controversies as may possibly arise between them, which is recorded in the draft arbitration treaty just referred to, it has occurred to me that the two governments, instead of confining themselves with a bilateral declaration of the nature suggested by M. Briand, might make a more signal contribution to world peace by joining in an effort to obtain the adherence of all of the principal

powers of the world to a declaration renouncing war as an instrument of national policy. Such a declaration, if executed by principal world powers, could not but be an impressive example of all the other nations of the world and might conceivably lead such nations to subscribe in their turn to the same instrument, thus perfecting among all powers of the world an arrangement heretofore suggested only as between France and the United States."
