DRILLING ON WOLF CREEK OIL WELL TO BE RESUMED

It is very glad to be able to announce to the people of this county that drilling on the Wolf Creek oil well will be resumed in the near future. As most of our readers know, the well was started during the summer of 1920 by the Casa Oil Co. For some unknown to us operations were stopped after sinking the hole to 100 feet. This is a test that will tell much to this country. The well is located about sixteen miles east of Perryton on the banks of Wolf Creek.

It is only through the untiring efforts of H. C. Coffee that T. O. Coffee and his associates have been able to take over the interests of Casa Oil Co. in this well. Mr. Coffee has been here for the past several weeks and has, with the assistance of Mr. Coffee, obtained new leases and renewals on a large block of land surrounding the well.

Mr. Turner is an experienced oil man and geologist and made the final location and survey for this well. He was at that time in the employ of the Casa people. Mr. Turner and his associates figure that they will be able to commence drilling operations here sometime between February 1 and April 1.

Starting to work on this property will install much "pep" into the oil business in this section and it will also be more business for Perryton as supplies and tools will be hauled to this place. And if they get the people should not forget the fact who put this deal over and that is our own H. C. Coffee.

PERRYTON AGRICULTURAL LOAN CO. GRANTED CHARTER

Capital Stock of \$25,000.00

Through the efforts of the officers and directors of the Farmers & Stockmens State Bank there has been organized an agricultural loan company with a capital stock of \$25,000.00. The object of this organization is to meet the financial needs of the farmers and ranchmen of this locality, so as to eliminate the necessity for sending immature stock to market and to save the breeding herds, and to assist the small grain growers and all other branches of our agricultural industry.

We have been informed that the Farmers & Stockmens State Bank has already placed \$42,000 at the low interest rate of 7 1/2 per cent. These loans are for a period of one year from date of note with the privilege of renewing for two additional years provided maker of note wishes extension of same.

The money for these loans will be obtained from the War Finance Corporation. The Corporation has no authority under the law to make direct loans to individual farmers. Along with other methods, it is seeking to reach the farmers and stockmen through a local financial institution—an institution with which he is accustomed to do business and which is in close touch with conditions in his community. By advances to such institutions, not only will the pressure for forced liquidation be relieved, but the banks will be put in better position to take care of the current needs of the farmers to the extent that their individual credit may warrant.

Similar results may be expected in this locality from the efforts of this new company as has been experienced in the South. There the purchasing power of the cotton planter has been greatly increased, he can now go into the northern and western markets for products that he needs to carry on his business and to support the labor that works his plantations.

In normal times it has been the practice of the farmer to sell his products within a short time after the harvest. He was then in position to put the returns into meeting his financial obligations and buying his supplies and equipment for the next operation. But when he has to carry his output, or a large part of it, on the farm or in the warehouse, as has been the case this last season, his capital is tied up and he is not only faced with the difficulty of meeting his obligations but he cannot go ahead properly with his regular farming business. He hasn't the money for seeds, labor, and equipment and he is brought to a standstill.

When the agricultural population is affected in this way the whole nation feels the pinch. The farmer is the greatest buyer in the country as well as the greatest producer. But his potential purchasing power cannot make itself felt in an effective manner so long as he is compelled to play the role of keeper of the national storage, so to speak. He may have done his part in producing food and other commodities. He may want to continue operations and be willing to make the necessary expenditure, but unless he can find a market for his products his hands are tied.

The way out of this situation is to untie the farmer's hands—to provide him with the means of spreading the marketing of his products over a longer period and at the same time of barring on the regular farm operations. If, in this way, we can help the farmer to help himself, the good effect will extend gradually through our whole business structure.

The War Finance Corporation is now making every effort to supply just this help. To assist in the orderly marketing of agricultural products, the Corporation is making advances on adequate security and on a sound business basis to properly qualified associations of producers, to financial institutions, and to exporters of agricultural products.

The Agricultural Credit Act, under which the War Finance Corporation is now making advances in the manner indicated above, is an emergency measure designed to meet the abnormal conditions that grew out of the war. Its object is to make possible the orderly marketing of agricultural products. A time limit is set, July 1, 1922, after which no further advances can be made.

The total amount of advances outstanding at any time is limited to \$1,000,000,000. The Act authorized the War Finance Corporation to make advances for any purpose connected with the growing, harvesting, preparation for market, or marketing, breeding, raising, fattening, and marketing of agricultural products, or the marketing of livestock. The law provides that a bank obtaining an advance from the Corporation for loans for agricultural purposes cannot charge upon such loans a rate of interest more than 2 per cent in excess of the rate charged by the Corporation.

The ultimate objective of the work of the War Finance Corporation is to hasten the return of a normal flow of business. If the producers can be enabled to handle their products for marketing in an orderly way, they can go ahead with their regular business in a normal manner, make their plans, purchase their supplies and equipment and start a business cycle.

WHITSELS ARRIVE HOME FROM EXTENDED TRIP IN EUROPE AND EGYPT

Mr. and Mrs. W. I. Whitsel arrived home this week from an extended European trip. The following story was obtained from them in Amarillo Tuesday by a representative of the Amarillo Daily Tribune, as they were in that city on their way home from Boston, after a trip of four months in Europe and the Holy Lands. The Tribune's story:

"According to Mrs. Whitsel, they were members of a party of twenty-four that landed in Glasgow, Scotland, several weeks ago for a sight-seeing trip to points of interest in the old world. London was among the first cities visited and together with thrills on the water and on the land the party also experienced the sensations offered by a journey via the air, having made the trip from London to Paris in a twelve-passenger airplane. Mr. and Mrs. Whitsel made a thorough tour of the war zone and before leaving France visited Napoleon's tomb and viewed the private quarters of his wife, Josephine, in Versailles.

"Leaving France the party went thru Switzerland and across the Alps to Rome, Milan and other famous Italian points. The next delightful experience was the trip to Egypt, the first stop being Alexandria; and from Alexandria the party proceeded down the Suez canal to Cairo, which, according to Mrs. Whitsel, was to her the most interesting city of their travels. She declared that everything is extremely foreign, and that the dress is practically the same as during the ancient times.

"After viewing all the Biblical sights in the Holy Lands the party sailed from Alexandria to Brindisi, Italy, on the Es. Peria, one of the finest Italian ships afloat. Mrs. Whitsel described the walks as being draped with the finest silk, and the floors being covered with the most exquisite Oriental rugs imaginable, as well as all furnishings being a personification of beauty. The fare on this floating palace was \$75 each

per day. During the sojourn in Egypt the party mounted camels and proceeded to the Sahara Desert, where they camped for one night, later visiting Memphis, the home town of Cleopatra.

"Mr. and Mrs. Whitsel are well known in Amarillo and they were entertained by a number of their friends here Monday. They are planning on spending the winter at their home in Canadian and are planning another trip to Europe next year."—Canadian Record.

TWENTY COUNTY AGENTS IN PANHANDLE

"Where you find a county that is progressive enough to employ a county agricultural agent, there you will find a county that is a leader in crops," stated D. P. McCalib, Panhandle-Plains supervisor of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, with headquarters in Amarillo.

It may be news to some people to learn that the Panhandle-Plains country is getting near the top in the number of agricultural agents in its counties, but such is to be expected, for the first thing the stranger learns when he arrives in this country is that the people are always on the alert to find means of advancing the country.

Of thirty-eight counties in the third district, as arranged by the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College, twenty of them have agricultural agents. Six of the twenty have been employed during the past year, and seven other counties are now making arrangements to get agents as soon as they can secure them.

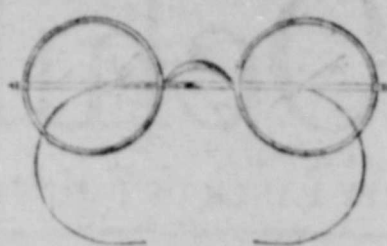
The counties that have secured agents during the past year are Knox, Gray, Dallam, Donley, Collinsworth and Wichita, Hansford Ochiltree, Deaf Smith, Briscoe, Motley, Palmer and Bailey are after agents.

This is a record to be proud of, taking into view the fact that in the extreme southwest part of the district there are several counties that have less than 500 population each, but must be counted in as part of the thirty-eight.

As the state and federal government will pay a good part of the salaries of county agents, there is little reason for any county not to have one. Where there is not work enough, according to the opinion of the county commissioners and others in authority, to keep an agent busy, they can cooperate with some other county in securing the services of the agent. This has been done by Potter and Oldham Counties, and the fourth place won by the latter county and the high standing of the first, at the Dallas Fair shows what can be done through the assistance of such experts, Mr. McCalib said in closing.—Southwest Plainsman.

County Health Notes

(Dec. 12, 1921.)

"The solution of the Tuberculosis problem lies not with the present, but with the future generation, and the best cure for the adult of tomorrow is the prevention of infection in the child of today."

The Red Cross Health Center had quite a busy day on Saturday, for several parties came in to be weighed, to receive literature or to select books from the circulating library. Also some encouraging reports were left.

Miss Bolton of the Brillhart School reported that they have had hot lunches this last week. Little Gentry Castleman came in to see how much he had gained in weight and to say that he had cocoa, tomato soup, corn soup, and beef stew on the different days. Their health club call themselves "Cho-Cho's Helpers". Mrs. Nies has loaned them a three burner oil stove for the lunches.

Miss Van Kirk of the Prairie School came in for some books and reported that their health club is very much interested and has made some clever posters and have had hot lunches for about two weeks with great success. All the patrons are very cooperative and the children bring milk to school and are enjoying the lunches immensely.

Mrs. Wittingham's room at Perryton enjoyed a hot lunch of cocoa with their dinners on Friday.

Miss Tucker's room has proven themselves very apt at writing rhymes for the health posters.

On Monday, Mr. Forbes loaned his new Buick car and Mrs. Forbes spent the day with Miss Thomas visiting schools.

The children reported their health clubs and were weighed and measured.

The Cedar Bluff School has the Cedar Bluff Health Club, and six of the nineteen weigh up to the average.

Mrs. Forbes and Miss Thomas reached the Ridge School about noon and before entering, could smell the whiffs of a fine hot lunch and the children certainly enjoyed it and when asked if they wanted to discontinue it, they said decidedly not. One of the pet riding horses that was confined in the school grounds also seemed to feel the need for a lunch after the door was opened, and being refused admission, tried to satisfy himself by biting a piece out of the leather cushion of the Buick. They call their health club the "Scout", and have a clever poster which is drawn in ink. Five out of twelve are up to normal weight or above.

Mrs. Forbes and Miss Thomas enjoyed dinner and a visit with Mr. and Mrs. Wamble.

In the afternoon they visited the Flower School. The children there call their health club the "Willing Workers". Mrs. Westbrook and Mrs. Lott were also visitors at the school. Seven of the ten children are up to normal weight or above. They are very near getting one of the prizes offered by the Red Cross and hope to gain the necessary amount before long.

On Tuesday, Mr. C. C. Carter took Miss Thomas to the Black and the Blodgett Schools.

At the Black School they had no health club but the children were weighed and measured and seventeen of the thirty-seven were up to normal weight.

Mr. Carter and Miss Thomas enjoyed a fine dinner and a visit with the Reeds near the Blodgett School.

THE NEWSPAPER

There are some people who take the view that a newspaper is a garbage bucket into which anything may be dumped. Mistake No. 1. There are some people who think that a newspaper is published only to serve their selfish interests and throw the harpoon into the other fellow. Mistake No. 2. There are some people who think that the paper should print what is obviously advertising without a single cent of compensation. Mistake No. 3. There are many other similar mistakes with regard to the publication of a newspaper, but these will answer for the moment.

A newspaper is not duly bound to print anything that it doesn't want to print. There is no rule that requires it to print something of absolutely no news value just because somebody wants it printed. It is not obliged to effusively laud some person where laudation is not earned, where adverse criticism is not deserved. It is not printed for the purpose of satisfying selfish motives. There is not the remotest reason why it should give away its space to somebody who is running something for monetary benefit.

The mission of the newspaper is to print news of general interest. Advertising is not news. Something concerning a single individual is not news. An article skinning some private enemy or opponent is not news. Numerous other things of a like nature that find their way into a newspaper office are not news. It is not hard for a trained newspaper man to draw the distinguishing line. It is not hard for anybody to draw the line at a moment and give the matter logical distinguishing line if they will stop and think.

True is it that a newspaper gives away much, especially where charity is concerned, but it does not follow that the publisher should adopt charity as an established custom and open the door freely to all comers. Space is the only thing that a newspaper has to sell, and the publisher who gives it away is no wiser than the merchant who gives away a hat or a suit of clothes to the man who comes into his store and asks for them.

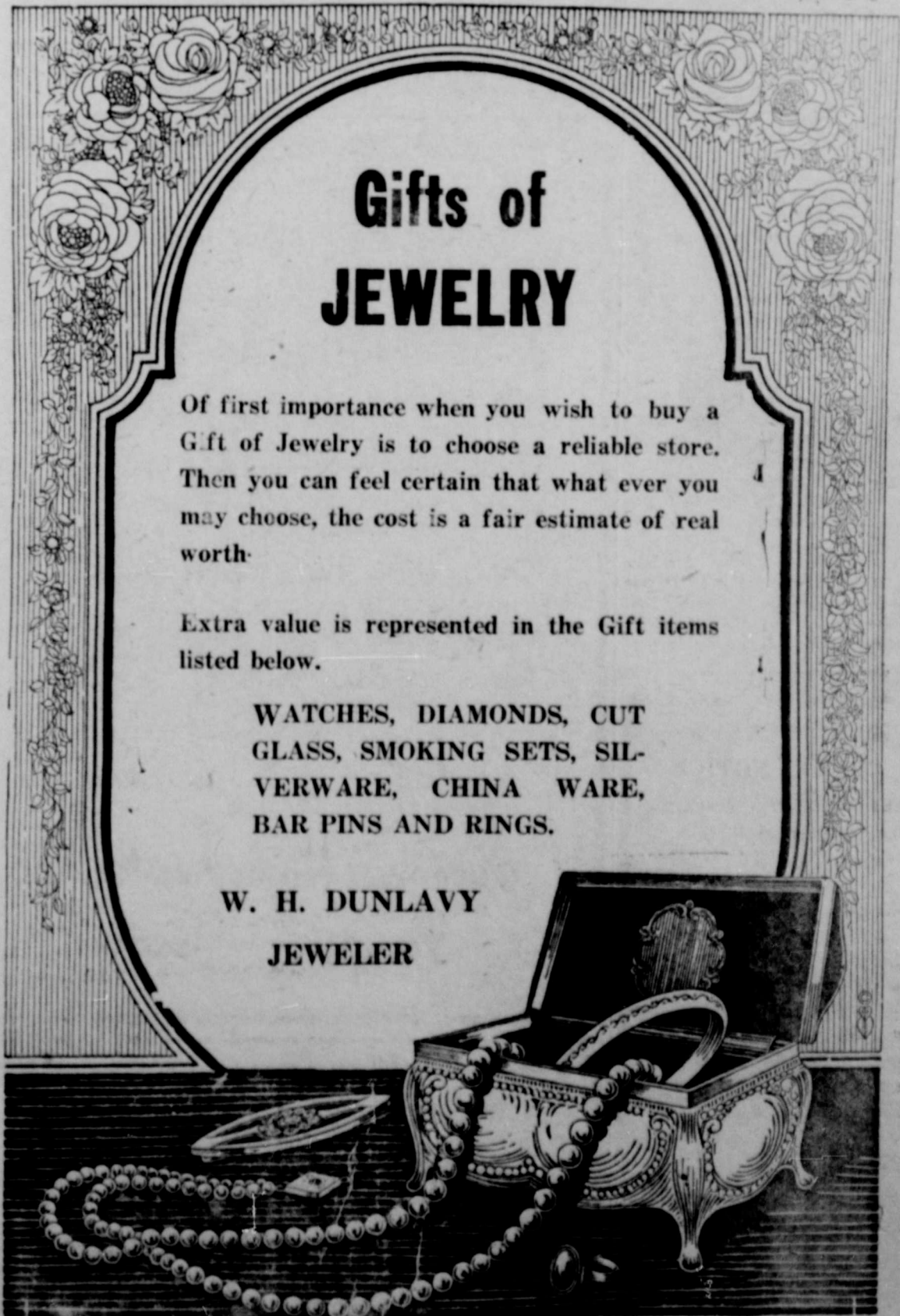

THE SCHOOL QUESTION
By a Reader

December 12, 1921.

Anent The School Question:
As an interested by-stander we have watched with considerable interest the many twists and turns of the vexatious problem, and having followed it with unusual interest, and also being intimately acquainted with most of the details that have been injected into it first and last we come to the conclusion that all the trouble that has ever been encountered from any source has arisen from no fault of the main question, but on the contrary, because we have lost sight of the fundamentals underlying it. We have talked with a great number and have yet to find the man who is opposed to good schools; in fact all seem to be imbued with the spirit that nothing "is too good for the ditch." The question then naturally arises what is really the trouble? The answer comes to us: It is because we have lost sight of the real issue which is: An educational system commensurate with the needs of the community. Because we have lost sight of the child, (the real part at interest), and have drifted into the error of figuring on the basis of towns and selfish interests. We now seem to go upon the theory that it is not the building up of an educational system in the county, but rather a question of seeing that the bond money shall be divided so that each community will get its proportionate share measured by the amount paid in, and this without reference to any school need, and without reference to the effect it will have on any other question. We hear it on all hands: Perryton is getting too much. If that were the basis; if the real purpose and underlying principle was to build towns and communities, this would be true. But is that the fact? Certainly it should not be. At the last school meeting, or rather board meeting, it was suggested to build five four-room buildings outside of the town of Perryton and the rest to be put into a building such as it would erect. Now this was not based upon any need of any particular school. It was based on the matter of "our part." What is our part? It is the whole sum, and our part is to do the man's part by the child we hope to educate. Can we do that by splitting the fund up into portions and parceling it out into small buildings all over the district. If you do so parcel it out and build a great number of these small school buildings, the question then comes to you and you may answer: Have you added a single educational facility that you have not already got? If you have not, then haven't you wasted your money and placed on yourself a burden of taxation for nothing. It was the understanding of the writer that this money was for higher education. For the purpose of making it possible that any citizen of this county might educate his child to the limit of the best schools in this state within the confines of his own county. His was certainly the first talk and if it has changed, then if we had been informed sooner we would have fought against it just as hard as we fought for it. There certainly must be at least one central high school subject to classification and affiliation in this county if the average citizen is to have a ghost of a show to give his child a high school education.

Now, again, if we cut down the present building at Perryton and parcel this fund out, the result will be that before my child and yours, if they are small, will have the opportunity to use it, it will have been rendered inadequate if the country prospers, because the building as first contemplated, and as the tentative contract was let, was estimated to accommodate only 500 hundred children. The school now has over 350 enrolled, this being true, in less than three years it will have become inadequate. Then what shall we do? Shall we say that we will not enlarge it and forgo higher education for our child? Most assuredly not. You and I, and all the rest of us whose child will be ready for a high school, will fight to the last ditch to see that he gets it. How will it be done? With additional bond issues, of course. Then what shall we say when we turn to the \$50,000.00 that we have practically thrown away in brick and tile buildings in the county? Why it just means that we will shoulder that much in additional bonds that we might have avoided. And if the future, shall be governed by the present, we will have to in every case vote 100 per cent more debt than we need to get what is absolutely necessary.

Now we would not be misunderstood in this matter. No one has a more sincere desire to see the school house removed to the rural settlements than myself, but on the other hand, no one who has soberly considered the matter, can with much show of reason support the idea that the time has come for ruining the chance of at least one good school in the county by parceling out the money to satisfy personal grudges and build towns. We challenge any one to show us a single rural school need that cannot be met without using a cent of this bond money. This bond money should not be vested at Perryton or elsewhere, but the bonds should be sold, the needed buildings contracted and erected, and the remainder of this bonded debt preserved to be used when and where needed.

We insist that it is not only a waste of money to build permanent buildings of brick and tile in the county at this time, but will be in a great measure a stumbling block in the very near future. If you have been here long, use your own head and call to mind the many changes that have taken place in the location of school houses in this county. How many times has it happened that the large districts have been split up and the old building moved a little one way or the other and a new one built. This process will continue until this country finally settles up, and these permanent buildings will not yield to this procedure; and if in the wrong place they will be destroyed, abandoned, or maintained at a point where they fail to meet the need they were destined to fill. A good wooden building for rural purposes is as good as a brick. A child will learn just as much and there can be no fire risk in a one story building that is worthy to mention. They are better because they are, so as to speak, elastic and can be made to yield to the expanding needs of the communities they serve. We hear one town say we want what you promised. Another says we are to get as much as the promisee, and neither base their claim upon any school need but upon promises. For what reason. We will undertake to answer this: Selfishness and nothing else. And if these people will analyze themselves in this matter we are sure they will inwardly agree, though we doubt a public confession.

We expect to have more to say, but will try this as a feeler and if we are not mobbed or threatened, will proceed later.

MOTHER AND TWO SONS BURN TO DEATH

Monday morning about 7:00 o'clock the town of Darrouzett was given a shock that will long be remembered in that community. At this time the two boys, Herman and Edward, the eldest sons of Mr. and Mrs. I. M. Roper, arose for the purpose of building a fire in the heating stove, and it seems that one boy got hold of the gas can and the other one, discovering it, sets the can down while they got another that had coal oil in from which they commenced starting the fire, and putting in a quantity of oil sufficient for the purpose from which an explosion came in the stove, igniting the gas can also that was in close proximity to the stove, catching the two boys on fire, one of them running to the mother who had not gotten up yet. Through this Mrs. Roper's clothing was set a fire, after which Mr. Roper arises swiftly doing all in his power to quench the fire on the two boys and the mother, taking them and the other little ones out of the burning room to a safe retreat. Medical aid being sent for immediately and all being done for the sufferers that could be to relieve the pain and add life to the burned ones, yet after all possible effort, Herman, a boy about 14 years of age passed away shortly after the dinner hour and within but a few moments afterward, Edward drew his last breath, while Mrs. Roper continued until about 7 o'clock in the evening when she succumbed from the effects of the burns.

The funeral services were held at the home in Darrouzett at 10 o'clock Wednesday, and the remains were placed to rest in the Fairmont cemetery.

The interior of the room was badly scorched and the pictures upon the wall and other articles as well.

Rev. Roy L. Mathew, of the Methodist church of this place, conducted the funeral services, and said the last words at the cemetery Wednesday.

The many friends of this place sympathize with Mr. Roper in this hour of his sad affliction, who at the same time suffers a badly burned hand and lower limbs.—Follett Limelight.

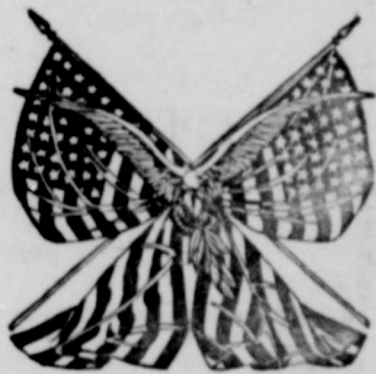
