"Choose Patterns Wisely" If Planning To Do Some Sewing

Planning to do a lot of sewing? Remember to choose your patterns with care, according to Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent. Taking time to determine size and type best suited for you will save time later by cutting down on alterations needed. And less handling and fewer fitting problems will give a more professional look to your finished garment.

Use your bust measure as the first key in deciding the size pattern you should buy. If the hips are large in proportion to the bust, it is better to buy a pattern according to the bust measure. Usually the skirt is easier to alter than the bodice. You will also need to measure your waist, hips and back waist length.

Write down your measurements and compare them with a standard measurement chart. "CHOOSE YOUR PATTERNS WISELY," a leaflet written by clothing specialists, gives a standard measurement chart for patterns. Also included are suggestions for selecting pattern styles for different figure types.

Get a copy of the new leaflet from your county home demonstration agents' office, or from a leader attending the basic sewing workshop. All sections of the county are represented in the basic sewing workshop being taught by Miss Wirges. The workshop was planned by the Wichita County Program Building Subcommittee on Clothing. Mrs. George Wyatt is chairman of this subcommittee.

Life-Saver or Death Trap?

It is a shameful thing that an average of 1,200 Americans meet death by poisoning every year, but the fact that one third of these are children under four years of age is downright tragic.

And if you think it couldn't happen in your household, it's time to inspect your medicine cabinet and see what you find. For the protection of young and old, Bauer and Black, who manufacture first-aid products, recommend five specific steps:

1. Make sure all drugs and remedies are far out of children's reach.
2. Make sure all medicines are properly labeled and printed instructions followed.
3. Flush down the drain (do not throw in waste basket) all medicines without labels, or old medicines that are outdated or have changed color or consistency.
4. Remove from medicine chest all household cleaning fluids cleansers, etc.—potentially dangerous to children—and store away out of reach.
5. Impress on children that the medicine chest is out of bounds. Teach them they must never eat or drink substances found in play—either at home, out-of-doors or elsewhere.

In the fourth annual "Clean Out Your Medicine Chest" campaign, presented in cooperation with the nation's retailers, Bauer and Black reminds us of risks we have doubtless all taken at times—but from which not all have survived. Rule number one is: Never take medicine or give it in the dark. Get your glasses if you need them to read the label carefully. Never trust to memory. Overdoses can be serious, even fatal. It is equally dangerous to give medicine to a person other than the one for whom it was prescribed.

And here is a final bit of advice: When you remove from the medicine chest the various things that shouldn't be there, stock up on the essential drugs and first-aid needs that should be there. (Your druggist has a folder that lists what you need.) And lastly, paste in the medicine chest the day and night telephone number of your doctor, druggist and poison control center. (If you did that last year, check up to see that they are still correct.) Minutes today could mean a lifetime tomorrow.

Grass Roots Opinion

According to Newsweek, U. S. manufacturers cut their appropriations for new plant and equipment overseas by 26 per cent during the second quarter of this year, probably because of international tensions. Major decline was in durable goods industries, which registered a 77 per cent drop. Nondurable manufacturers, on the other hand, increased appropriations by 51 per cent.

According to Chain Store Age, chain store companies buy almost 14,000 new trucks a year and operate some 75,000.

Big business is looking for more executives now than at any time since 1959, according to a survey of major companies made by a leading management recruitment firm. It finds that within the next few months some 138 companies, with annual sales averaging \$133 million, will have to fill about three managerial positions each, at salaries ranging from \$10,000 to \$75,000.

A short time ago the number of shares listed on the New York Stock Exchange set a new record—in excess of seven billion.

The Associated Press reports that a Federal Trade Commission examiner has dismissed price fixing charges against five companies which produce antibiotics. The government complaint was filed in August, 1958. The examiner decided all the issues involved in favor of the companies.

RUTHERFORD, N. J., NEWS: "The two party system of our politics has been the bulwark of democracy in the United States. But, it is meaningless, if we allow policy to be determined by bureaus rather than those chosen by ballot.

"Bureaus frequently are frozen into permanency by Civil Service regulations and, therefore, are beyond the reach of any election."

LENNOX, S. DAK., INDEPENDENT: "As we take a good look at the whole social security program we can't help but feel that it has characteristics of an overdecorated Christmas tree that is precariously weaving back and forth. With each new Congress, someone tries to hang some more 'junk' on this tree in the form of so-called additional benefits and amendments."

SELDEN, KANS., ADVOCATE: "Here' what the American Bankers Magazine, a publication which represents a traditionally hard-headed profession, has to say: "No business man or women in any town should allow a newspaper to go to press without his or her name being mentioned in its columns."

LIVE BETTER . . . ELECTRICALLY**Have Car Safety Inspected for '62 By April 15th**

Less than thirty per cent of the registered vehicles in this area have been safety inspected for 1962, according to Patrolman Harlan Eades, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

With the April 15 deadline, for having the vehicles checked, rapidly approaching, this means there are approximately 37,900 vehicles in Wichita County remaining to be inspected by the 53 approved inspection stations available.

Many motorists are going to find long lines awaiting them as the deadline draws nearer, due to the inspection stations not being able to cope with this large number.

The patrolman urged drivers to have their vehicles inspected as soon as possible to avoid this last minute rush. In addition, he reminded drivers that this time of the year is noted for adverse weather conditions which prevent the inspection stations from checking the vehicles.

"Passenger cars are inspected for brakes, lights, reflectors, horn and windshield wipers; while commercial vehicles are inspected for the above plus additional items required by law," Patrolman Eades said. "All motorists not displaying a valid 1962 inspection sticker by April 15 will be in violation of state law."

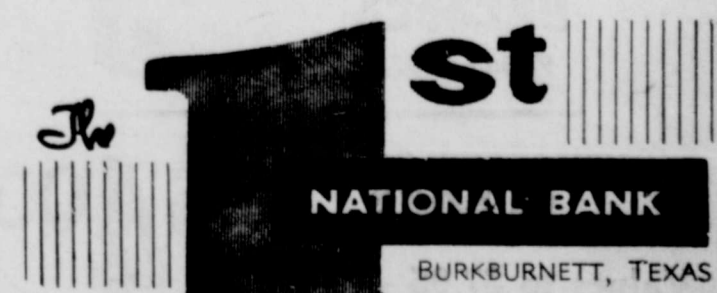

Babson Discusses the Big Question Confronting Investors

This question briefly is: Should we buy the most popular stocks, or should we buy those in little demand? Most Popular Common Stocks for Investment

Probably drug stocks are the most popular today. This is the time of year when so many are sneezing and your favorite drug store is doing its best business.

Also life insurance stocks are always attractive. Everyone is striving to live longer; while the doctors, the hospitals, and the government are helping them to. Consequently, life insurance stocks are high, and hence pay the smallest cash yield of all groups. Investors do not want to sell their life insurance stocks, especially as the companies constantly declare dividends, which investors like. They pay no taxes upon these until they sell the stock received.

Other popular stocks are those of companies making of-

fice equipment, due to the scarcity of good office help. This scarcity is the result of older, efficient workers coming into Social Security. If President Kennedy has his way, this will increase to further help the aged, the ill, and other unfortunate. Companies selling food are also popular. Everyone must eat, and most people like the great new self-service food markets which are becoming a social center where you meet your friends. Of course, the stocks of these food chains are high; but the population is constantly growing. It may reach

200,000,000 in five years. Common Stocks Bought for Speculation

These are primarily the "electronic and space" issues of companies getting U. S. defense contracts. I do not like these, even though they are much lower in price than they were a while ago. Some time this nuclear weapons race will end. I do not expect that any readers of my column will see "world disarmament." This is silly to even talk about now. But the use of atomic and hydrogen bombs to destroy cities will be controlled, especially before China gets them. As this is generally recognized, these stocks will lose their present unjustified glamour.

Unpopular stocks are the railroads, the cement companies, the coppers and other metals. I would keep out of railroad stocks (bonds are different); but the world surplus of metals is constantly becoming less. This, in a way, applies to the making of aluminum. To make aluminum there must be cheap and abundant electric power such as exists in Africa. I like to buy copper stocks when they are cheap. The "beams" to and from satellites may someday reduce the demand for copper but these beams and the universal use of microwaves are long years ahead.

Politics vs. New Ideas
The newspapers devote many columns to politics, and we are inclined to overestimate the importance of politics as our investment statistics show that there is little correlation between politics and the stock market. My readers had far better study the new ideas being developed, as "fuel cells," "new adhesives," and "foods from cellulose." New developments now in test tubes and on drawing boards have great profit possibilities.

Moreover, history shows that it does not require much capital to start a company with only an "idea." But it requires great patience and persistence. Mr. Clinton Woods of 2803 Goodwood Road, Baltimore 14, Maryland has recently published a book showing that 200 of today's biggest companies started without capital. It is important to young people who are willing to work and who have the patience to wait. I have given away over 100 of these books to help the right people, although they can be bought from Mr. Woods. These books are the best investment that I know of for anyone who doesn't want to pay out more than \$5.75 (postpaid).

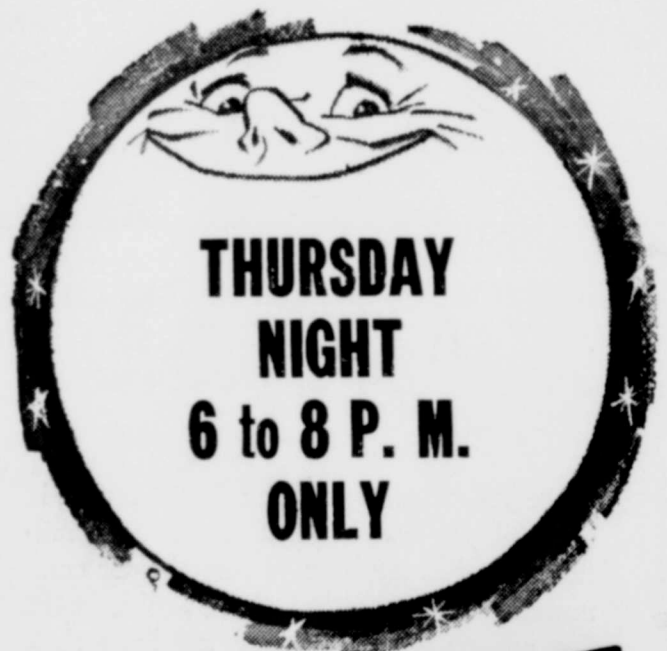

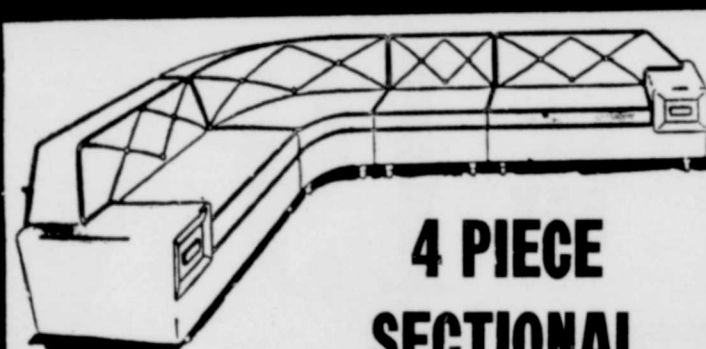

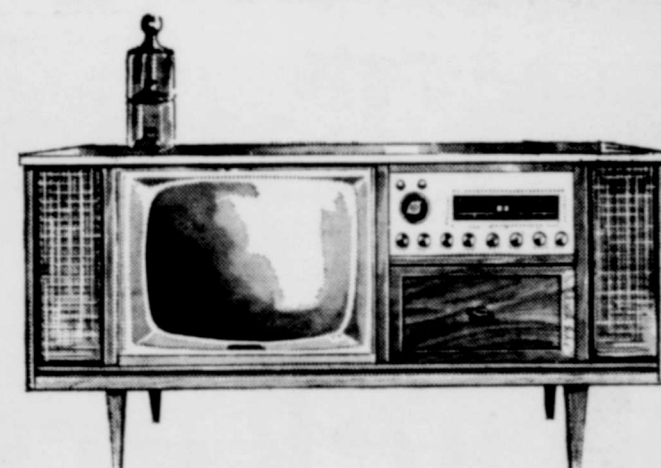

Texas — Although the Youth Council lost its legislative appropriation of \$100,000 to add more of its Juvenile Parole System, it just won a battle for benefit of orphans in state institutions.

Attorney General Will Wilson over the deed to a \$200,000 ranch along the Lampasas River. It will check for \$12,446 to Dr. A. Turman, Youth Council director. Presentation represents the outcome of a four-year battle. Heirs of the late Mrs. Parrie Haynes consider passing the property to the state.

Turman said the orphans will receive all benefits from the 4,160-acre ranch. It will be used as a summer camp and center for orphans. The Youth Council will raise pigs and sheep there to feed the thousands of orphans in its care.

Rep. Shock Turman — member of the House James A. An, candidate for lieutenant governor and former education expressed concern about

the House Textbook committee, which he appointed.

Turman was shocked when he heard that a witness in an Amarillo textbook hearing alleged that Rep. Ronald Roberts of the committee was a "communist."

"I am afraid the committee members have been too nice and open about letting anyone appear to talk about any sort of censorship," Turman said. He is worried about the committee getting too far astray of its goal of studying the textbook situation in Texas.

In an Independence Day address at Washington-on-the-Brazos, he advocated the teaching of Texas history in all grade levels, and declared, "I think it is a mistake—a sad mistake—for our educational system in Texas to relegate our great state's history into a sort of grammar school fairytale."

The speaker may be tempted—or forced—to touch on the subject again Wednesday when he is honored guest at the Public Schools Week Celebration in Jasper, Texas.

Space Age Seminar—Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, head of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, came to town to tell a congregation

of high school counselors how to move into space will affect American youth.

The Vice President's talk was the highlight of a two-day conference at the University of Texas which featured a NASA exhibit of space vehicles and a talk on "Space Satellites" by NASA representative Dr. Robert Krebs.

Vast Roadwork Underway—In keeping with its claim that Texas leads the nation in highway building, the State Highway Commission issued orders to proceed with \$18,000,000 worth of road building, planning and repairs throughout the state.

Biggest assignment was an okay to purchase right-of-way on three projects on Interstate Loop 635 in Dallas County at a cost of about \$6,410,000. The Commission also authorized the right-of-way on a 1.4 mile section of Interstate Highway 10 in Harris County for \$2,500,000. Original estimate was only \$600,000.

Other expensive items included: Purchase of \$1,900,000 worth of right-of-way on US 90 in Bexar County; plans for development of US 290 out of Houston at a starting cost of \$2,810,000; \$797,000 to repair freeze damage in the Abilene district; a \$680,000 right-of-way okay for a two-mile segment in San Antonio and \$477,800 for relocation of US 59 around Wharton and El Campo.

Less costly projects are set for Fort Bend, Angelina, Brazoria, Gillespie, Hudspeth, Martin, El Paso and Nolan counties.

Sunday No Exception—Just because April 15 will fall on a Sunday this year, drivers won't be allowed to put off auto inspection until the following day. Co. Homer Garrison, Jr.—Director of the State Department of Public Safety, says April 15 is the deadline—Sunday or no.

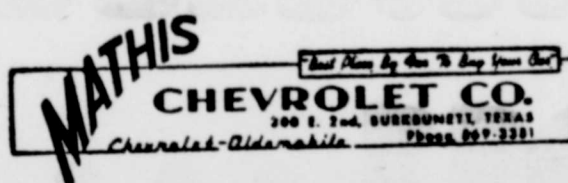
Garrison said he won't ask inspection stations to stay open that Sunday, either. So, owners of the 2,000,000 cars in the state will just have to take care of this problem by the 14th of April, or risk arrest.

Governor Goes To Washington—Gov. Price Daniel went to Washington, D. C., for the week end where he shared honors with Billy Graham as speaker for the annual President's Prayer Breakfast.

As a US Senator, Daniel was president of the Christian Leadership group, sponsors of the annual breakfast for the President, his Cabinet and members of Congress. He has remained active in the program in the nation's capital and in Austin.

Judge Zollie Steakley of the Texas Supreme Court hosted a similar event in the governor's mansion while he was gone.
