ADOBES WALLS CELEBRATION PLANS ADVANCING RAPIDLY

Preparations for the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the Battle of Adobe Walls, are going forward authoritatively. The monument which is to be placed at the historic spot near Miami, has been purchased, and is expected that it will be in place on the first day of the celebration.

The program will be sponsored by the Panhandle Plains Historical Society, Judge Thos. F. Turner, president of the Panhandle Plains Historical Society, will be master of ceremonies. The first day, June 27, the monument will be unveiled, and will be speaking by Judge Nelson A. Phillips, formerly of the Supreme Bench of Texas; Judge Turner, W. E. Connelley, Sec'y of the Panhandle Plains Historical Society; J. B. Thomas, Sec'y of the Oklahoma Historical Society; President J. A. Hill of the West Texas State Teachers' College, and others. Andrew Johnson Dodge City, Kansas, (who fought the battle in 1874) will address the audience and promises to relate the history which has never been related.

There will be a great gathering of old timers from Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and other States. Music will be furnished by the Canyon Band. The second day's program will include speaking horse racing, and other amusements.

Plans are being made to feed the crowd which is expected at the celebration, June 27 and 28. A dozen men will be barbecued and bread, pies and pickles will be provided. Those who attend the meeting should be provided with anything further wished in the line of food, as it is doubtful that further arrangements can be made.

Those attending who expect to spend the night at the Adobe Walls, should bring their own blankets, and if possible, tents will be available for rent, but not enough for the entire crowd.

SAVE THE SURFACE AND YOU SAVE ALL

We have a joke now on our table reading as follows:—

"So you want to be a farmer, eh? Do you think you have any qualifications for the job?"

"Well, I know how to grumble about the weather."

Undoubtedly farmers grumble about the weather more than other folks, but the truth is they have a right to grumble more. The weather interferes with farm work to a much larger extent than it does with town work. The townsman works indoors, the farmer must work out in the open. Not only must the farmer expose himself in bad weather, but rains and cold may prevent him from doing what he wishes to do and what needs to be done.

Nevertheless, we might as well own up that most of us who conduct farms complain about the weather a great deal more than we should need to do if we only did well we might do to hold soil moisture and to prevent clods and hard soil-crusts from forming. And to do this, the most important rule is to keep the upper soil surface stirred. Then we needn't bother much about the rest—provided

the land was broken deeply to begin with.

The paint manufacturers of America have come together and adopted a slogan as follows: "Save the surface and you save all."

In the same way we sometimes think that harrow and weeder manufacturers would do well to get together and adopt the slogan: "Cultivate the surface and you cultivate all."

Certainly during these next sixty days Southern farmers need to keep this truth constantly in mind. We can get over the ground rapidly and cheaply with these surface-cultivating implements, the weeder and the harrow, whereas deeper-reaching implements take more time and are expensive to operate. More than this, they are so slow in getting over the crop after a season comes that the moisture dries out of a good part of the land before we get to it, whereas the weeder or harrow by covering the whole acreage quickly would have kept a soil-mulch or dust-blanket over the whole area, holding in the moisture and keeping the plants at a maximum growing rate until the next rain.

"Save the surface and you save all" is true of farm buildings, and it is equally true of farm lands that if we cultivate the surface we cultivate

all. Let's use the weeder and harrow more these next sixty days, and deeper-going implements less.—The Progressive Farmer.

ESSENTIALS OF SUCCESSFUL DAIRYING

The following are some of the basic facts and conditions which make dairying profitable—

1. The Production of the best roughages—pasture silage, and legume hays.
 2. Furnishing juicy or succulent feed throughout the whole year, by silage in winter and by supplementing poor pastures in summer by silage or soiling crops—crops that are cut and fed green.
 3. The improvement of the herd by getting rid of grade or inferior bulls and using nothing but purebred bulls whose dams and granddams are high producing cows.
 4. The weeding out of the inferior cows by weighing the milk and testing for fat. Keep only those cows that produce enough to more than pay for the food consumed.
 5. Intelligent feeding—feeding according to the production of the cows and on those feeds which produce milk most economically.
 6. Good care, regular feeding and milking, and protection from bad weather, mud, and other hard ships.
 7. Care in breeding the cows so as to have them freshen in the fall.
- If these seven points are looked after carefully, much better results will be secured from cows than where haphazard methods are used and poor care given the cows.—The Progressive Farmer.

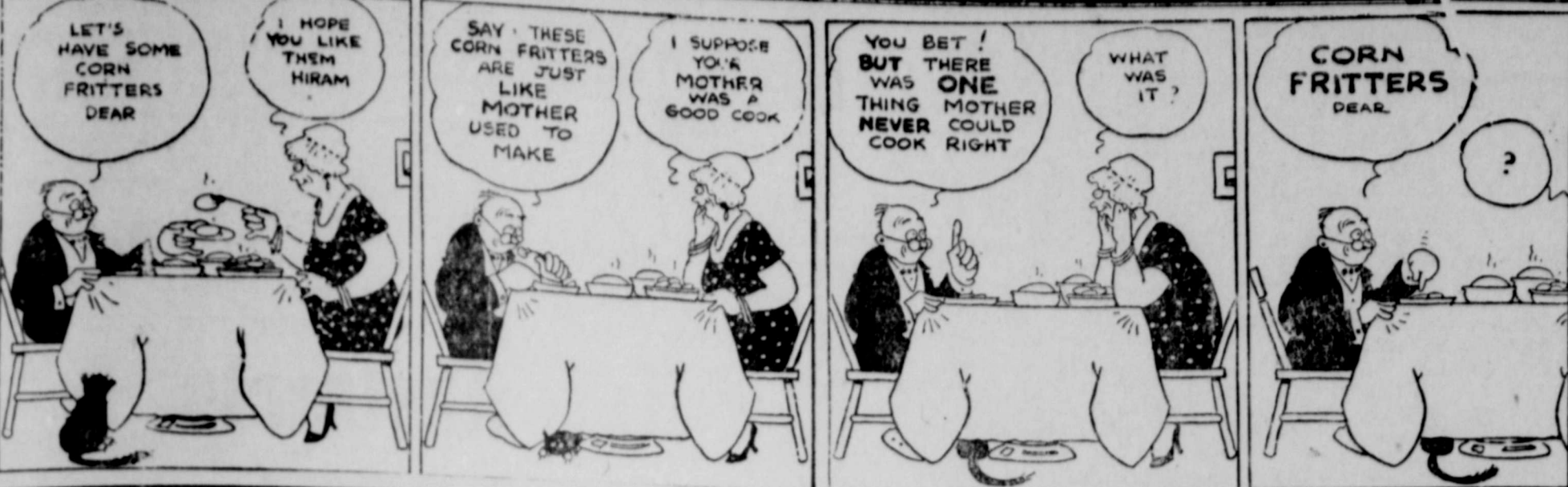

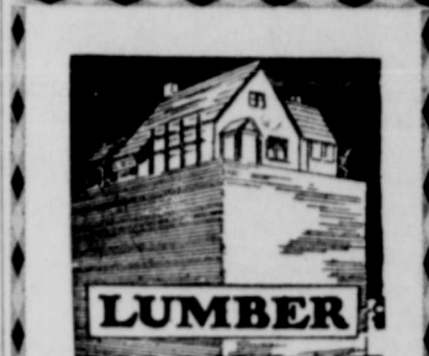

With the campaign to remove unsightly advertising signs from America's roads well under way, attention may well be turned to the character of signs and sign posts marking roads to show their destination and distances.

The historic "sign post" is of wood, with a board nailed to the side, ending in a rude representation of a pointing hand. The board bears upon its face, usually in weather-obliterated letters, the name of the next town.

Such a marker was all right for a trail, or a wagon road, but is as much out of place on a fine, hard road as an ox cart among automobiles. Modern practice dictates that road signs and posts should be permanent, slightly, plain as to information conveyed, sturdy, and artistic.

For national highways, a beautiful bronze sign post has already been designed by a famous sculptor. Road associations interested in some particular road have adopted distinctive markers, in many cases of a high degree of art and beauty, as well as utility. The Old Oregon Trail for instance, which it is proposed to improve from the Missouri to the Columbia, is now in process of being marked with signs of real beauty and significance. Professor Fairbanks, of the University of Oregon, designed the marker, showing a typical covered wagon and pioneer family of early western days. Such a sign is particularly appropriate for this trail, which is the route followed by early-day pioneers in their ox-team emigration from the Eastern States to Oregon and Washington in the late forties and early fifties.

It is not necessary to wait for some large association to design or place markers. Every town can help by seeing to it that the sign posts along its entering and leaving roads are plain as to intent, yet handsome and distinctive. Placing such markers embodies the spirit of welcome to the tourist, which is "good business" for any town, and is most excellent work for local civic organizations to take up and follow through.

ERICK BANK PAYS
DOLLAR FOR DOLLAR

Of the eighty-five banks that have
closed their doors in Oklahoma since
the deflation set in, the Western State
Bank, Erick, Oklahoma is the first to
sufficiently liquidate in assets to pay
its depositors dollar for dollar, ac-
cording to A. C. Gillum, president of
the former institution.

The bank closed its doors of its own
accord March 11, 1932, following the
closing of a depository bank in Okla-
homa City.

C. S. Borin, Erick, was appointed
liquidating agent by Roy Wolsott,
then Assistant State Bank Commis-
sioner. Under his control the assets
of the bank were liquidated and set-
tlement made with the depositors in
three different payments. According
to Mr. Gillum there will still be suf-
ficient liquidations to pay off the capi-
tal stock.

The bank and its officers stood high
with the citizens of Erick and the
surrounding country, their prompt
action in closing the bank when they
found them selves in difficulty and
the speed with which they have li-
quidated their assets is commendable
of the trust which their depositors
have had in the officers of the form-
er institution.

hardware firm of Bonebrake-Gillum
and S. C. Borin is Vice President of the
Farmers National Bank of Erick
—Oklahoma Broom Corn Grower.

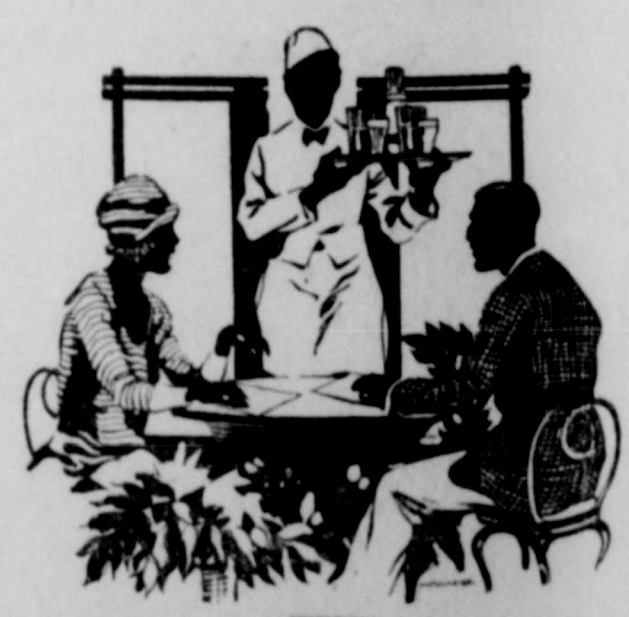

PROPAGANDA IN EAST HARMFUL TO STATE

HISTORIC MASONIC APRON

London—Robert I. Clegg, 33 degree the well-known Masonic writer of Chicago, is visiting England in the interest of Masonic research. Recently he obtained some very interesting aprons of ancient lodges. One apron comes from a lodge in the north of Ireland that dates from 1826 but it is believed that the lodge had a foothold in the 18th century, as a lodge of the same number existed in 1740.

The apron is emblematic of three systems of degrees and evidently was intended to be worn by a brother who had received all of them. The blue of the lodge, the red of the chapter and the black of the Knight Templar all appear in the apron. A Royal Arch collar went with it.

These valuable relics, including a bag of black and white pebbles which were used by the lodge for balloting, are being forwarded to the House of the Temple at Washington, where they will be placed in the library.

AGE LIMIT FOR C. M. T. C.

MAY BE RAISED

The Army Appropriation Bill, which provides for the conduct of the Citizens' Military Training Camps, is now before the Senate for final consideration. The Bill contains a proviso, which if passed, will enable the Corps Area Commander to raise the age limits prescribed for admittance to the Citizens' Military Training Camps to be held in August.

It is the purpose of the Bill to provide training for those young men thought to be worthy of a commission in the Officers' Reserve Corps, provided they have had previous military training and are educationally qualified. In this connection it will be the policy of the Commanding General, Eight Corps Area, to select only those applicants whom it is thought would be best qualified mentally, morally and physically, and to whom the service would offer an urgent appeal.

The C. M. T. C. training schedule is divided into four courses, the Basic Course, Red Course, White Course, and Blue Course.

The Army Appropriation Bill contains the following schedule of age limits for the various courses: With no previous training, Basic Course, 17 to 24 years; with previous training, Red Course 17 to 25 years; with previous training, White Course, 18 to 28 years; with previous training, Blue Course, 19 to 31 years.

Citizens' Military Training Camps will be held in this Corps Area during the entire month of August at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, Fort Logan, Colorado, Fort Sill, Oklahoma and Fort Huachuca, Arizona. Over 2000 applications have already been received and young men desiring to attend should apply without delay to the C. M. T. C. Officer, Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

Men between the ages of 24 and 31

years may now apply and if qualified for the training, their applications will be tentatively accepted pending passage of the Appropriation Bill.
