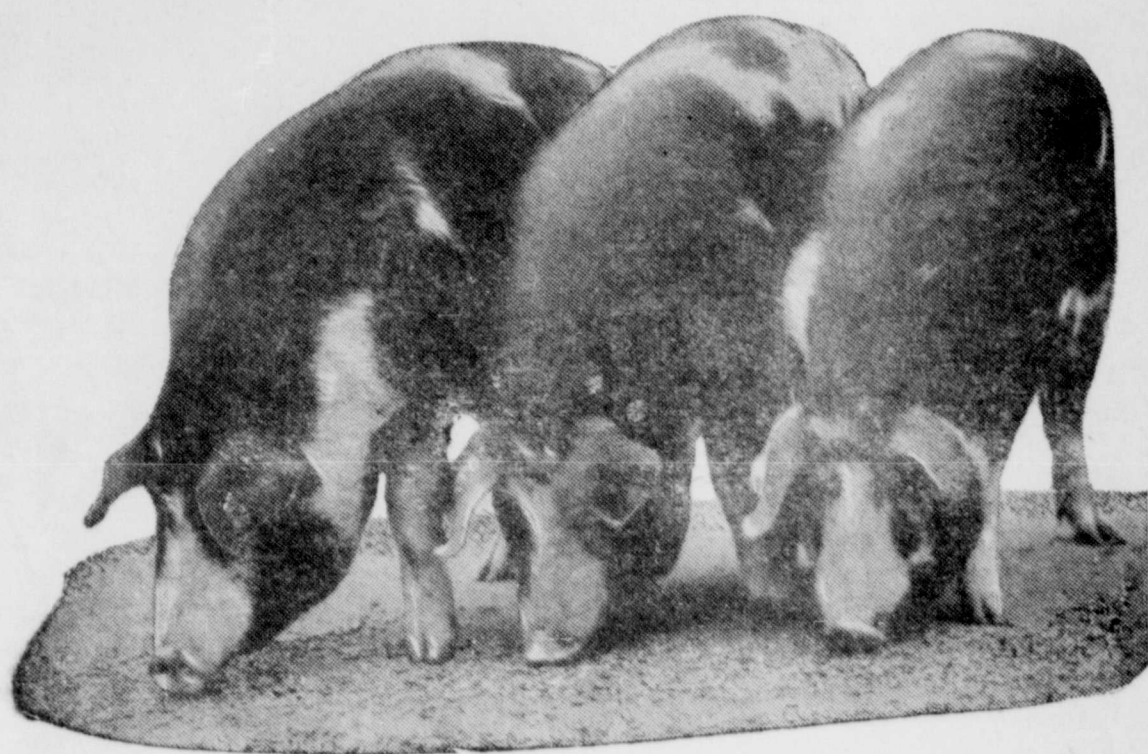

**Rules Given On
Wheat Allotment**

According to J. Earl Laney, Chairman of the Hale ASC County Committee, beginning with the 1958 crop of wheat, for a farm on which the acreage of wheat is in excess of the farm allotment, the history for that year will be the allotment acreage. Farms which comply with their allotments will still be given their proportionate shares of the division credit which the county and State will receive in determining the history for the year. Farms that plant wheat under the 15-permitted acre provision, will not receive history credit for the wheat acreage planted, since the allotment for this type farm is zero.

Pasture fertilization will pay. The real expense is the omission of fertilizer from the pasture, E. M. Trew, extension pasture specialist.

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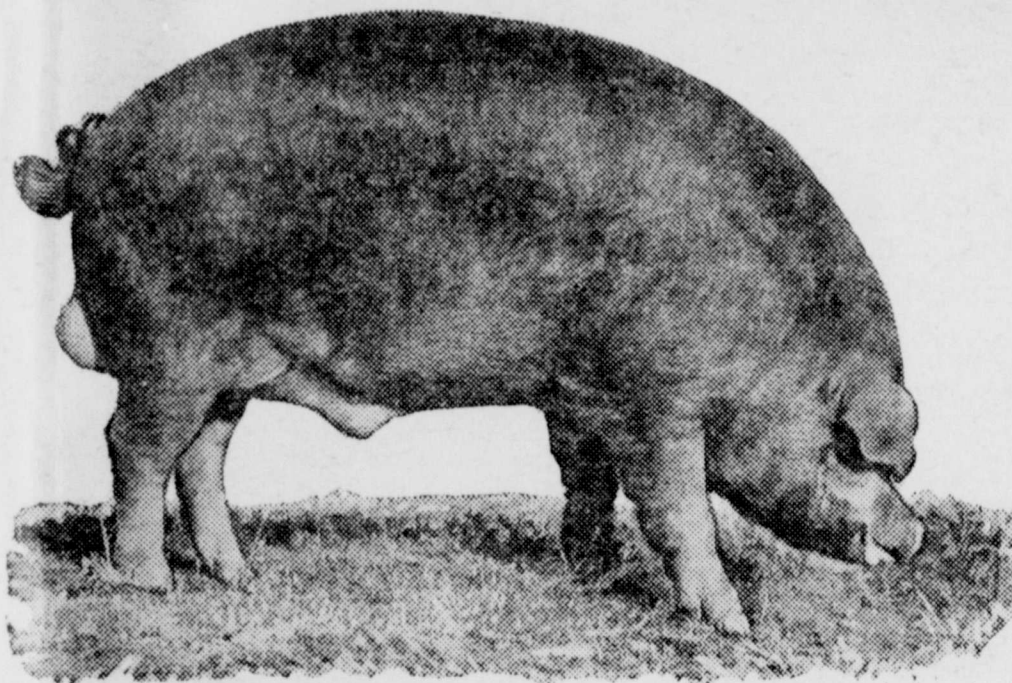

Anger?

Anger is emotional excitement induced by displeasure. The word "anger" without a context does not reveal degree of intensity. Other words which reveal different proportions of anger are ire, rage, fury, indignation, and wrath. Each of these words has its connotation, but all of them point to some form of anger.

Anger is said to be an attribute of man given to him by the Creator, for the purpose of self-defense, just as some animals protect themselves by speed, some by color, some by horns, or quills, and some by obnoxious odors. It is also said that an angry man has twice the strength, half the fear, one-fourth the sense of a normal man.

Is this to say that the fits of anger, and the unwholesome outbursts of men are excused and excusable? Not in the least! Like fire or water, there is a use of anger which is good, but there are many abuses which are harmful and destructive. God is greatly displeased with men's evil deeds, and has visited punishment upon them for their lack of repentance (Gen. 6 and Gen. 19). The Christian also is greatly vexed by the evil abuses of men in public and private. We are warned not to allow our anger to lead us into sin (Eph. 4:26).

What is the physical danger of anger? When a man is angry, the adrenal glands secrete a super-active fluid called adrenalin, which has the effect of speeding up the normal activity of bodily functions. The heart beats faster, blood pressure goes up, and the muscles are stronger, but the brain is more confused. Angry people are often described as being "rattled," or "strong as an ox" or "blind as a bat." Extreme anger leads to madness, and may cause one to commit a horrible crime. If anger is persisted in by an individual, the physical effect upon the body will be exceedingly harmful.

The moral effect of continued anger can be even more harmful. It weakens the character and often kills any noble virtues in the person. Solomon said: "He that is slow to anger is better than the mighty; and he that ruleth

his spirit than he that taketh a city" (Prov. 16:32). Lack of self-control is a sign of a weak character, whereas discipline and self-restraint is a sure sign of strong character. Solomon again said: "The discretion of a man deferreth his anger; and it is his glory to pass over a transgression" (Prov. 19:11). A man who easily loses his temper is a fool: "Be not hasty in thy spirit to be angry; for anger resteth in the bosom of fools" (Eccl. 7:9).

Persistent anger can also bring harmful social effects. Because "He that is soon angry dealeth foolishly," he will lose his friends. And, "A man of wicked vices is hated" (Prov. 14:17).

Solomon again said: "Make no friendship with an angry man; and with a furious man thou shalt not go: Lest thou learn his ways, and get a snare to thy soul" (Prov. 22:24-25). No one enjoys the company of one who cannot keep his head. Most people will shun the association of the man who practices anger.

The deadliest result of anger is the spiritual effect it has. In order to please God and live with hope of eternal life, every man must be "swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath: for the wrath of man worketh not the righteousness of God" (James 1:19-20). The wrath of Cain caused him to murder his brother (Gen. 4:5) and "The way of Cain" is condemned by the Lord (Jude 11).

God expects every Christian to be "temperate in all things" (1 Cor. 9:25). "And beside this, giving all diligence, add to your faith virtue; and to virtue knowledge; and to knowledge temperance" (2 Pet. 1:5-6). Some people, by nature, are more easily excitable than others; but self-control must be exercised by every child of God.

Paul said: "Be ye angry and sin not: let not the sun go down upon your wrath" (Eph. 4:26). The child of God will readily be displeased with everything which is not for the glory of God or for the good of man, but he must not allow this feeling to take root in him, for it could lead to malice and revenge. Continued anger is harmful physically, socially, morally, and religiously.

Fire Truck For Rural Service In Operation

The city now has a new, second, fire truck available and ready for use in the rural area and in town. This new unit was designed and built to fight fires in the country. The unit is built on a new Chevrolet truck chassis. Built largely by Bill Wolf and Sons shop, it is an excellent looking piece of equipment, and best of all it has been tried out and it works. It has a 1000-gallon water tank which is twice the capacity of the older truck. Water can be pumped from the tank and also from a fire plug, or in the country, from a lake or anything else into which a suction hose can be inserted.

Adding to the effectiveness, especially in the country, a solution called "Wet Water Solution" is added to this 1000 gallons of water in the tank which adds to the penetrating effect of the water. For example, it is near impossible to

extinguish a fire in a bale of cotton with plain water, but with this "wet water solution" added, the fire is readily extinguished.

The city fathers feel that with 1,000 gallons of water and the added effectiveness of this solution, which only takes about 4 gallons to the tank full, they will be able to render very effective service in fighting fires especially in the country immediately adjacent to Abernathy. The new fire truck, "wet water," and other things all are so well arranged and built that the city was able to get help financially from Hale County in buying and building.
